LOSS OF RESPECT FOR THE SUPREME COURT

It is a national tragedy that the Supreme Court of the United States should have reached its present state of decadence in the eyes of the public. It presages a breakdown in law and order that could result in tragic consequences for our form of government.

That the Supreme Court has lost the respect of the public is quite evident to anyone who has his eyes open. Neither is this loss of respect confined to any one region of the country—which might be explained by a special condition; it is spread nationwide.

If this attitude were that of the general public alone, it might be said that the people generally are simply not enough informed in matters of law to understand the actions of the Court. But the deplorable fact is that this loss of respect is evidenced most vigorously by those who do understand

matters of law—by outstanding practitioners of law, by justices of state supreme courts, by members of Congress. The severe denunciations of the Supreme Court by individuals of this type cannot be passed off lightly.

What has caused the Supreme Court of the United States to enter into this period of decadence in the eyes of the public? It is nothing more nor less than this loss of public respect—because it is only this respect for the Supreme Court on the part of the people that ever gave it any power or any authority in the first place.

When our form of government was established for us by our forefathers, it was set up under three main headings—executive, legislative and judiciary—each with checks and balances on the other. From the very first, the judiciary was recognized as the weakest of the three branches; in fact, it had no power at all except that gained for it by the respect of the people. Such power is extremely great while it lasts; when this respect is gone there is nothing left.

Alexander Hamilton, writing in the Federalist, recognized this situation, when he said:

"The executive not only dispenses the honors, but holds the sword of the community; the legislature not only commands the purse, but prescribes the rules by which the duties and rights of every citizen are to be regulated. The judiciary, on the contrary, has no influence over either the sword or the purse; no direction either of the strength or of the wealth of the society; and can take no active resolution whatever. It may truly be said to have neither FORCE nor WILL, but merely judgment; and must ultimately depend upon the aid of the executive arm for the efficacious exercise even of this faculty."

"This simple view of the matter suggests several important consequences: it proves incontestably, that the judiciary is, beyond comparison, the weakest of the three departments of power; that it can never attack with success either of the other two; and that all possible care is requisite to enable it to defend itself against their attacks. It equally proves that, though individual oppression may now and then proceed from the

courts of justice, the general liberty of the people can never be endangered from that quarter: I mean so long as the judiciary remains truly distinct from both the legislative and executive. . . . It proves, in the last place, that liberty can have nothing to fear from the judiciary alone, but would have every thing to fear from its union with either of the other departments. . . ."

Andrew Jackson pointedly showed up the powerlessness of the Supreme Court while he was president by commenting something to the effect that, "The Supreme Court has handed down its decision; now let them enforce it," which of course the Court could not do without the cooperation of the executive. But there is nothing more powerful than public opinion, and so long as the Court had the respect and confidence of the public, which it had—almost reverently—until the last quarter century, then that very force made the Court powerful and its opinions almost sacrosanct in the minds of the people. All during these years the Supreme Court depended upon good judgment, which, as Alexander Hamilton pointed out, was the only faculty of its own that it had to depend on.

But the important aspect of the judiciary to the people, as pointed out by Hamilton, is that "the general liberty of the people can never be endangered from that quarter . . . so long as the judiciary remains truly distinct from both the legislature and executive."

What has happened during the last quarter century bears out the truth of Hamilton's further statement that "liberty can have nothing to fear from the judiciary alone, but would have every thing to fear from its union with either of the other departments. . . ." because during this period there has been a self-evident union between the executive and the judiciary.

This started with the attempt to "pack" the Court, which failed at the time but later succeeded by replacements anyway, and which misalliance has continued down to the present day. None of the decisions handed down during these years—decisions which have lost for the Court the respect of the people—could have been, or can be, made effective without the connivance of the executive.

Neither the executive nor the judiciary have the authority to legislate, but when the judiciary usurps the power of the legisla-

ture and the executive proceeds to use its power to put such legislative decisions into effect, then it can only be assumed that the executive and the judiciary are in full agreement in relation thereto. The ends desired by the executive and the judiciary may have been, or may be, attained thereby, but the process used bids fair to throw our government into a veritable state of anarchy if it is not stopped.

Economics Of Cotton
Defoliation Studied
At Delta Station

State College, Miss.—Under what conditions does cotton defoliation pay? This is one of the questions which the UDDA and the Mississippi Experiment Station seek to answer at the Delta Branch Station at Stoneville.

A wide range of plant conditions at the time of defoliation was encountered during the period of the study, 1953-55. Plant height varied from 30 inches to 6 feet and foliage from light to very heavy. Net returns to defoliation over the entire test period ranged from a profit of \$3.21 per acre to a loss of more than \$23 per acre with 5 of the 7 locations studied indicating a loss.

The largest contributing factor to the losses was reduction in yield, which amounted to as much as \$20 per acre. The greatest item of gain was reflected in quality where increases as high as \$9 per acre resulted from the use of defoliation. Losses for the seven locations, over the 3-year period, averaged \$6 per acre.

Comparisons indicate that conditions exist under which defoliation will produce marked economic returns. These conditions include rank growth and heavily fruited cotton which matures in the presence of adequate moisture. By the same token, conditions frequently exist under which no such economic return can be expected. These are marked by small, drought-stressed, heavily-fruited cotton which matures in the presence of adequate moisture. 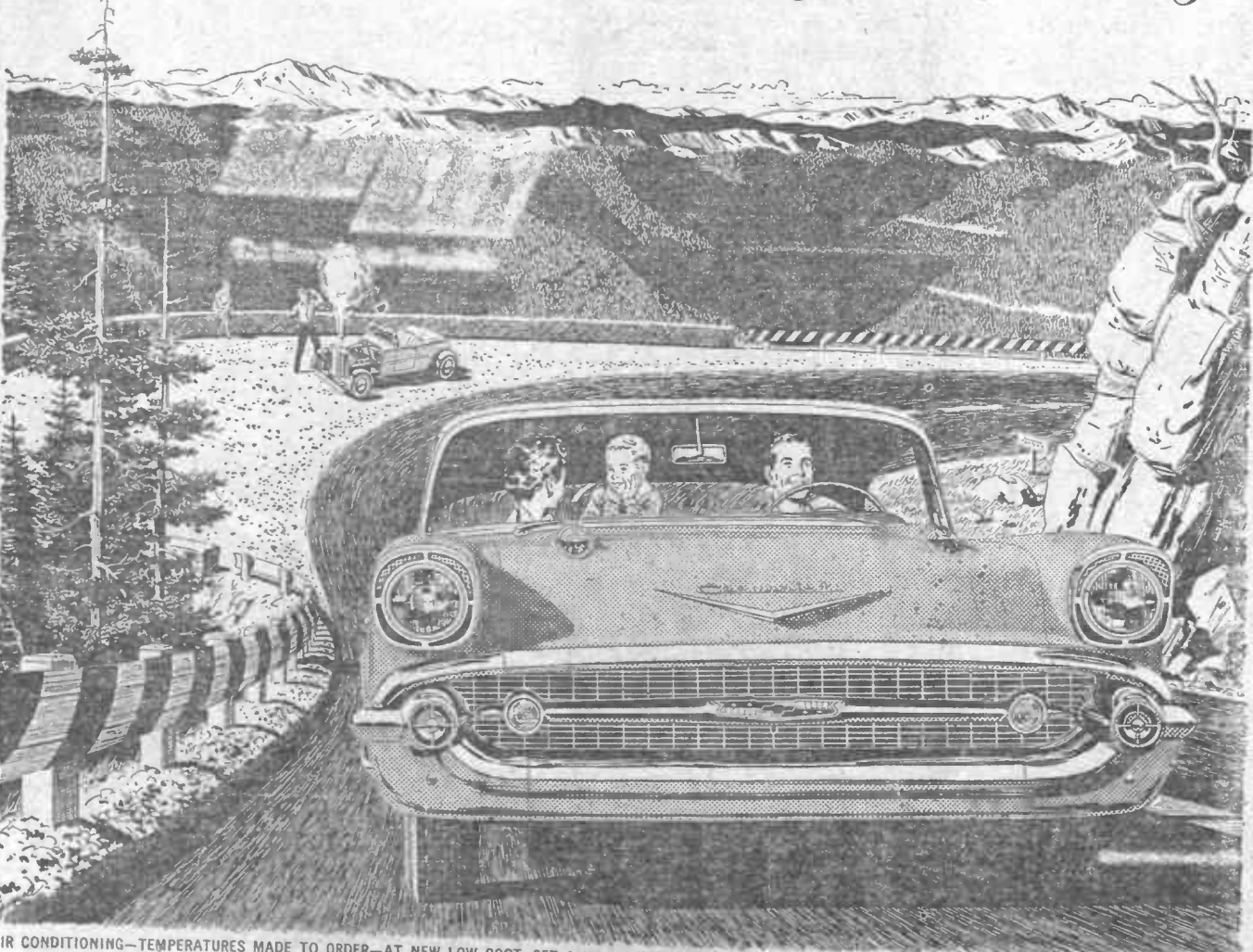

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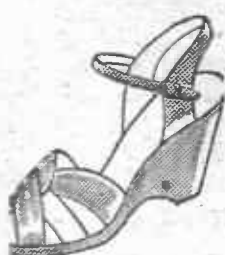
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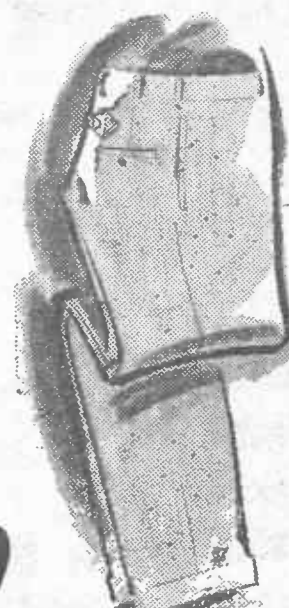

TIMBER IN THE SOUTH

To help provide timber for America's needs today and tomorrow, wood using industries sponsor and operate the American Tree Farm System of growing timber as a crop on private lands. This 15-year-old program, now active in nearly all states, provides assistance and encouragement to the 4 1/2 million small wood-lot owners who own 61 percent of the country's timberland. To qualify as a tree farmer, the landowner must protect his timberland from fire, disease and destructive grazing and must harvest for repeated crops. The program is strictly voluntary with no assessments for dues.

Many individual lumber companies employ foresters in their operations. Some of these men are engaged in manufacturing processes, utilizing their training to improve or maintain the high standards of the company's products and methods. Some are employed in logging operations where they apply their forestry and engineering knowledge in keeping the forest property in good condition for continuous production. Others are working for research in wood utilization and technology to find new uses for wood and to increase our knowledge of its nature. Hundreds of others are employed in the management of company owned property, protecting and caring for the trees until they are ripe for harvest. Many of these men help their company's neighboring small owners to manage their woodlots.

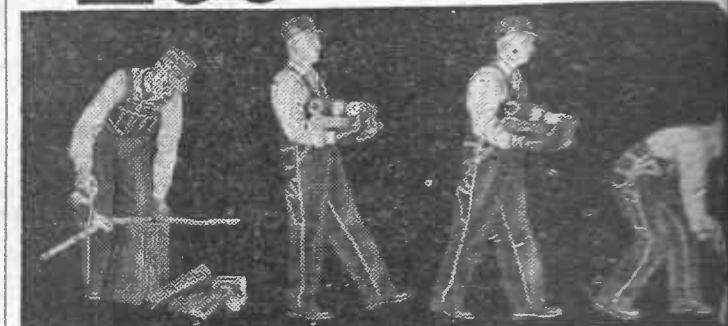

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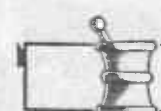

Remember you and your family plan for the Fourth, be careful as you drive, prepare food for picnics. It is a holiday you will have memories of—not a day of memories of a death!

Use Paste Wax
A soft damp cloth into a wax this across the wax—out the wax in chunks. A very thin film of paste wax is more durable than a coat.

out by forest industries, private landowners and by state and federal agencies, he said.

In Mississippi alone, 84,371 acres of unproductive land were planted to trees in fiscal 1956, bringing the total land area reforested to date in Mississippi to over 553,000 acres.

The Jackson lumberman said production of forest tree seedlings is mounting steadily each year and that many new nurseries will be in production in 1957.

"Given a fair chance, nature will reforest much unproductive area, and our best contribution is to help nature do the job by protect-

ing the new trees for her," the industry chairman said. "But in places where repeated burnings or land-clearing operations have destroyed the seed source of desirable trees, man must go in and plant. And then he must see that the new, young forest is protected."

Hood said only 100 million seedlings a year were produced in the United States 20 years ago.

"In 1956, industry and government forest agencies grew 885,968,000 seedlings—an amount which early forest conservationists in America hardly dared dream would some day actually be reached," he declared.

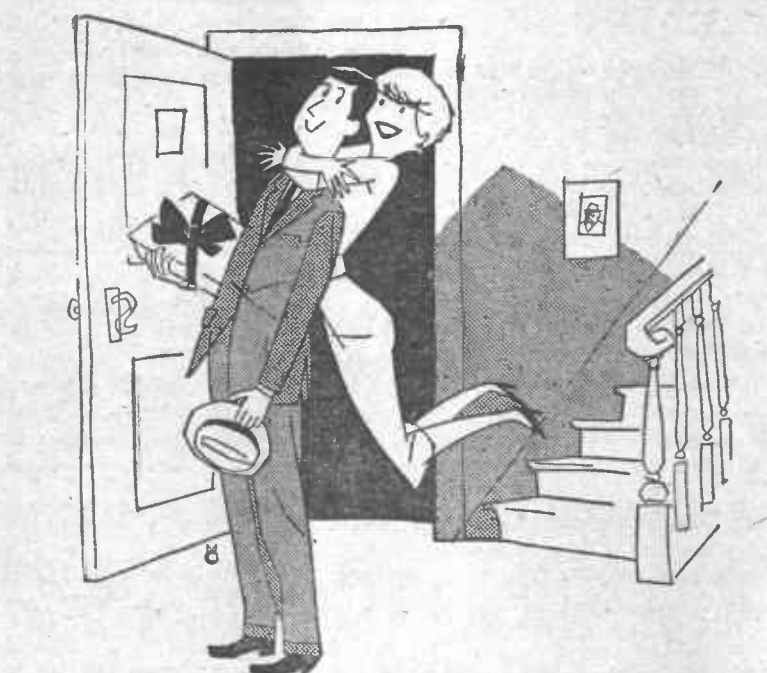

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Background Scripture: Genesis 41:53-59:28
Devotional Reading: 1 Corinthians 13.

What Is Greatness

Lesson for June 30, 1957

"THE habitual vision of greatness" has been called the secret of the ancient Greeks, one of the world's most wonderful people. Many would say that the ancient Hebrews were even more wonderful; and they too had their "habitual vision of greatness." In our Old Testament are stories of great men, for whom even today little children are named. These great men and women too are of different kinds, you might say only one of a kind. Joseph was the kind of great man Americans love to honor. He was an immigrant, for one thing, a poor boy, with nothing but the clothes he wore, when he first crossed the border of Egypt. He was a man who rose through all the layers of society, against very great odds. He was the "big executive" type, and immensely rich besides. Now it is not true that such men are always hailed and honored. Sometimes they are no more loved than General Bullmoose. But when such men do give their fellow-citizens a lift of pride, it is because of that something Extra which we call greatness.

The High Soul
Every truly great man or woman has some qualities or gifts which are unique in him, and are partly brought out by his own special circumstances. The greatness of an Abraham Lincoln, for instance, is not that of a Dwight L. Moody, and neither of these is quite like Helen Keller. But there are some features to be found in all persons who deserve the word "great." Joseph in Egypt is a good example of these. First of all is what can be called the High Soul. His house of life is open to the sky. He is guided by his faith in God. To such a man, faith is not a thing to be analyzed, or talked about. It is something to be lived, and lived by. Every single important step in Joseph's life is connected by his biography with God; and Joseph himself shows that he was conscious of God's guidance. Even that decisive moment when he was being sold to Midianite slave-traders, a moment which just then he would hardly have connected with God—, he later saw was an act of God. "It was not you who sent me here, but God," said he to his brothers later. What will God think of this? was not an afterthought with him, but it entered into his decisions beforehand.

The Open Mind
Great men have their prejudices, no doubt; what human being is entirely free of them? But a great man is capable of living above his prejudices. He can revise his opinions. Neither the man who is forever changing his mind, nor the man who can never change it, is likely to achieve greatness. When Joseph's first son was born, he called him by a name which means "making-to-forget." "God," said he, "has made me forget... all my father's house." Joseph at that time, and for years before and after that time, had no communication with his home back in Palestine. To be sure, his family could neither read nor write; but Joseph could easily have sent a message telling them he was alive and doing very well indeed. On the contrary, he seems to have been quite content to be cut off from home. Very likely he thought the less he had to do with his rascally brothers, the better. But when the famine time came, he got acquainted with his brothers again; discovered in one of them, at least, a noble spirit; and he so far revised his attitude that he invited the whole family into Egypt near him.

The Wide Heart
Joseph's treatment of his brothers showed more than a willingness to reconsider his prejudices. He had a heart willing to forget the past, willing to return good for evil. To men who had been as mean to him as they could possibly be, he was as good and generous as he could possibly be. Most of us think we are mighty virtuous if in return for a dirty deal we do just a tiny grudging act of kindness. That is better than vengeance and mean dealing in return; but the great man is far above measuring what he gives by what has been given him. True greatness includes more than justice; it includes forgiveness and mercy. Voltaire used to say about God, "He will forgive—that's his business."

Lands In General Discussed Well-Known Columnist

N. H., June 27. For a member of my organization has been attending the International Conferences in West. These meetings are for farmers market their products for industrial purposes and for food. People will always be able to spend money on food, shelter, and luxuries, but a rich person can eat no more than a poor person and probably not as much. However, the percentage of fruits and vegetables consumed increases more than the wheat, corn, potatoes, and staples. Progress along these lines will increase the farm property.

The Gibberellin Wonders

Some years ago the Japanese noticed that plants which adjoined a plant with a certain fungus had a remarkable growth. This was found amongst the rice plants especially. Later this fungus was reduced to an acid and used in the ratio of 0.1 to 10 parts per million parts of solution (usually potassium salts and water). Exhibitions are reported where you can almost see the plant grow from hour to hour. The sprays are fairly cheap and although not yet passed by the Food and Drug Administration yet they may revolutionize fertilizers. Instead of mixing chemicals with the soil, the seeds, sprouts, and leaves of the plant are sprayed.

Experiments show that this spraying results in taller forest trees, better yields for pulpwood, and improved fiber crops, such as cotton. Gibberellins also lengthen the stems of flowers, hasten development of transplants, and reduce the work of farmers and gardeners.

Improving Pasture Lands And Lengthening Seasons

Gibberellins make grass greener in pastures. In Florida, where ten acres are now needed to pasture cattle, only three acres may be needed with the use of Gibberellins. Texas cattle may be fattened in their native pastures instead of being sent to Kansas or other Central States for fattening. It is rumored that Gibberellins may reduce the price of the best steaks to one half their present price. In fact, the entire price structure of cattle, hogs, and other grass-fed animals may be revolutionized.

But this is not all that the Gibberellins can do. They may make the raising of fruit, corn, and other products which are subject to frosts a safer business by extending the growing season.

Price Of Farm Land

Although these developments discussed above may hold down the price of farm products, they could easily increase the price of farm land. Don't be too quick to sell your farm land. This especially applies to small farms near cities

where the land could be divided up for residential properties.

Also, remember that the new highway systems to be built by the government may elongate cities. That is, instead of a city being 5 miles square as the average city is today, it will be one-half mile wide on each side of the new highway and 10 miles long. This should greatly improve the price of certain present unprofitable farm land. Besides, one of the new "rare earth metals" may be found on your farm, some of which I will mention: Cerium, Dysprosium, Erbium, Europium, Gadolinium, Holmium, Lanthanum, Lutetium, Niobium, Praseodymium, Promethium, Samarium, Terbium, Thulium, and Ytterbium.

County Agent news

Cotton Insects
Cotton insects are heavily damaging all cotton fields. Most prev-

alent is boll weevil and flea hoppers. To insure a cotton crop poison now. Use 7 to 10 pounds dust per acre or if spraying 2 nozzles per row. I would suggest alternating BHC (3-5-0) and Dieldrin or Aldrin. If it rains or showers within 24 hours after application, apply poison again.

Some reports are that weevil resistance to regular poisons are being noted. In case weevil resistance is noted in your fields and kill cannot be accomplished, the safest phosphate poison to use is Malathion. This material comes in a combination with BHC and DDT. Apply at the same rates per acre as the regular poisons.

With the heavy infestation that is now present, I suggest making 3 applications not more than five days apart.

Late Corn Planting

There are some corn fields that have not yet been planted. Two varieties that will mature and give fairly good yields are McCurdy 95 and Funks G-50. These varieties do not crib too well over a long period of time, but can be used to an excellent purpose for feeding livestock and hogs.

Hornflies

Hornflies are a big problem on cattle. It is estimated that these flies in heavy infestation can cause a loss of one-fourth to one half pound a day in beef gains and a drop of up to 25 percent in milk production on dairy cows.

Hornflies can be controlled with a 1/2 per cent spray of either DDT, toxaphene or methoxychlor. Either one of the sprays will give approximately 3 weeks control of horn flies. Wet backs, necks and
