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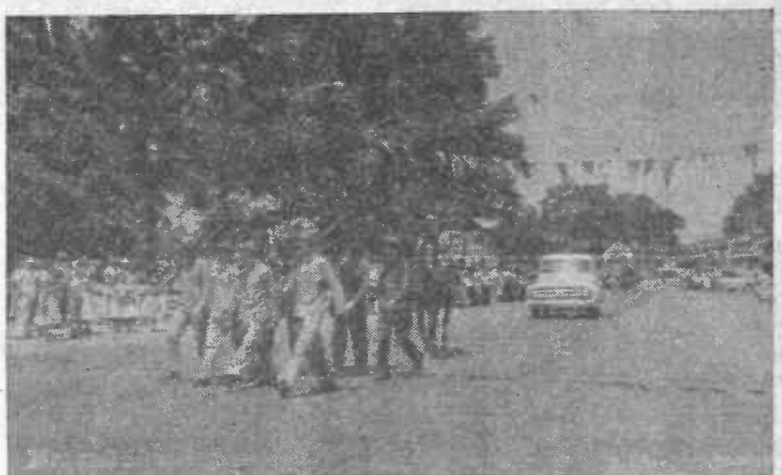

977 Polio Shots Given In Past Two Months

During the last two months the Tishomingo County Health Department has given 977 polio shots, Dr. James C. Totten, County Health officer, stated Wednesday. "We were able to give this many shots due to the untiring efforts of Mrs. Lela Clark," Dr. Totten said. "Mrs. Clark has been employed by the Tishomingo County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to visit parents and encourage them to have their children vaccinated."

In commenting on the polio situation in this county, Dr. Totten said, "There have been no cases of polio this year in vaccinated children. There has been one possible case of polio this year in an unvaccinated child."

The vaccine is still available free at the county health department for all children under 20 years of age.

"This is the season for typhoid fever and food poisoning," Dr. Totten continued. "Typhoid vaccine is strongly recommended for Tishomingo county residents. Everyone should be cautious in eating improperly prepared food and in drinking water of questionable purity. Special caution is necessary when attending picnics and other outings away from home," the doctor concluded.

SENATOR EASTLAND HONORED GUEST

Before a record crowd gathered beneath the huge oak trees in Mineral Springs Park, Senator James O. The state's senior senator said decisions which resulted in the freeing of several communists should be marked as "Red Monday" decisions. He added that apparently they could organize to destroy the United States without violating a law.

He referred to Iuka as "a community with a distinguished past and a great future" and recalled that Tishomingo County had given the state John M. Stone, an early governor and one of its greatest citizens. Gov. John M. Stone of Tishomingo was the greatest governor in the history of the State. He fought carpetbaggers and thieves in the state capital and showed great courage, fidelity and accomplishments," the Senator said.

Columnist Discusses Labor Outlook, Birth Rates, Labor-Saving Machinery

Babson Park, Mass., July 11. Like it or not, labor is a commodity depending on supply and demand. Labor unions can raise wages temporarily just as a dam can raise the height of a stream. But the dam does not destroy the water; sooner or later the water flows over the dam, or the



Roger W. Babson stream dries up. Let Us Look At Birth Rates

During the thirties, birth rates in the U. S. had been running about 17 per thousand. Just before World War II, in 1938, the birth rate was 17.6 per thousand, and in 1943 it was 21.5. Then it began to fall, and slipped lower through the rest of the war years. This was accompanied by a scarcity of

men due to the draft, with a surplus of women workers. While normal manufacturing was greatly curtailed, the war created an excessive demand for labor for war industries. Therefore, labor adjusted itself fairly well.

The war had two closings, but the boys began to return from Europe in May 1945 and babies began to arrive in 1946. This means that the postwar crop of babies is now under twelve years of age. The birth rate is now running around 24.2 per thousand and the schools are becoming crowded, especially in the elementary grades. As the women who went to work during the war become older, they are dropping out of the job market. This accounts in part, for the shortage of labor, the increased wages, and the inefficiency of much of the labor. Every employer complains about it, but I see nothing that can now be done. What About The Outlook?

As the oldest of this postwar crop of babies is now under twelve years of age, no relief can be expected (without a severe business depression) for at least five years. The situation is being tinkered with still further by minimum wage and other labor legislation. In the meantime, business is prosperous and production is close to an all-time high. This means that the supply of labor is low and the demand for labor is abnormally high. I repeat that—barring a business depression—I see no relief until after 1950.

Labor-Saving Machinery

As a result of the above conditions, there is constant demand for labor-saving machinery of all kinds. This especially applies to all forms of office, labor-saving devices. We hear much talk about automation, that is the running of a factory or office automatically with very few employees; but this is for some time in the future. Changing to automation is both a slow and an expensive process and requires considerable capital investment.

The most practical means of bridging the next five years is to take greater care in the selection of employees and to treat them well. There seems to be a natural average wage for given work in a given community. There is no use attempting to buck this wage during the next five years and little point in arguing as to the efficiency of the worker. Wages, however, are not all! Workers have pride and self-respect. They like reasonable hours, good clothes, and a comfortable place to work. Furthermore, the location of the plant or office often demands the expense of an automobile.

Advice To June Graduates

Just now the new graduates are "sitting in the driver's seat." It will be fairly easy for most of this year's graduates to get positions. Moreover, many of them will be paid more than they are worth. This is no reason for them to be careless or to think that their job is secure. They will be watched most carefully, with the idea of a big weeding out after 1950.

Every reader should remember that the labor cycle is constantly revolving—the same as the stock market cycle, the money rate cycle, and the housing cycle. Many June graduates who now find it easy to get jobs will be out of jobs or be "sitting on the tailboard of the cart" in about five years. Therefore parents, as well as June graduates should realize that the present labor situation will not continue unless their "darling" makes good. The present "honeymoon" will continue for a few years more. But it will surely be followed by a period when employers will "clean house" trim down their personnel, and keep only the most efficient. This applies to both men and women.

County Agent news

Cotton Insects

Boll weevil infestation for the county runs from 30 per cent to 100 per cent, with the county average being 64 per cent. Do not wait to apply poison. Poison 3 times four days apart. I suggest using Malathion for the first poisoning, BHC for the second, and Malathion again for the third application. If weevils are not under control after the third application, poison again in five days.

Most cotton needs 10 pounds dust per acre and at least 2 nozzle per row if spraying. For best results of dust apply late in afternoon or during early nightfall hours. Late Planting of Sudan, Millet and Grain Sorghum

For those who want to make late plantings of Sudan, millet or grain sorghum, do an extra good job of land preparation. Fertilizer should be applied at time of planting.

In most areas grain sorghum planted this late will not make grain, but provided sufficient rainfall, it will make good August grazing.

How long has it been since your home food freezer has been cleaned and oiled?

Better check on this. A dust condenser, a motor that needs oiling, a heavy blanket of ice in the food compartment, and you're all set for trouble. Especially with summer temperatures climbing and peak loads of food added for freezing.

Your home freezer should be completely defrosted and cleaned at least once a year. Oil cups for motors not sealed-in should be filed with oil. On older belt-driven types, inspect the belt for breaks and adjust tension for smooth running.

In cleaning and servicing your

home freezer, be sure to follow the manufacturer's directions.

A home freezer operating normally runs about 18 hours out of 24. A dirty condenser can cause it to run 20 hours. A thick coat of ice crystals inside and running time may increase to 22 hours. Then put in a warm load of food to be frozen, and your motor may run all 24 hours.

Handy Brush

A vegetable brush is a handy tool for whisking foam from jams, jellies and preserves. Try it with the next batch you make. Use a clean dry brush.

Use a Sharp Knife

There's a simple test you can apply to be sure your knife is sharp enough to carve the meat properly.

If your knife will cut paper, it can be used for meat. Hold the paper in one hand and slit it from top to bottom. When it cuts easily

without tearing the paper, you are ready to carve the meat.

Summer Cotton Knits

Cotton knit garments are popular, especially in summer. They give freedom of movement and some porus for cool wear. They are easy to launder and often require no ironing.

But have you found that a turtleneck or knit fabric has a tendency to stretch or shrink after laundering?

Recent research shows that if turtleneck shrinks or stretches it is rarely the fault of the yarn. The yarn length changes little during laundering.

But here is what happens. Often the fabrics are pulled lengthwise in finishing and knitting, and the knit loops are pulled out long and thin. When you wash the garment, the loops relax, and the garment stretches in width and shrinks in length.

When you buy, look for fabrics with closer knitting and heavier yarns for greater strength and endurance. Examine the knitted loops to see that they are fairly round and don't look stretched, if it is important that the garment holds its shape.

owed though it may be in qualities of climate and soil that favor tree growth, no where is this heritage so lush, so indestructible that the malignancy of repeated fire can be absorbed without shock, with out loss of vitality to the timber economy.

And every day this condition persists, there can be no freedom from the threat of disaster—from an epic in destruction. Agonizing reminders of this grim truth are tragically fresh—in the Carolinas, in southeast Georgia, in northern and central Florida.

The question for all southerners is—How much longer can this sinister fire cloud be permitted to hang over their heads?

It is appalling enough, in view of the South's dependence upon wood, that in the year just ended—and it is considered a good year as fire years go—better than \$5,000,000 worth of valuable young timber now growing in the commercial forest is doomed—unless that everpresent red peril is erased from the sky.

Even this loss, jarring though it may be, fades before the almost incalculable damage that can and does result in fire-weakened stands when insects and disease take over, when growth rates decline, or when fire-depressed areas are forced to come to grips with drought.

What price then? Most experts estimate that long-range growth losses on a burned area are at least four times greater than the immediate toll in trees killed.

This does not have to happen. Freedom from wildfire is an attainable ideal in the South today.

The forestry movement, from its inception, has sought the security that comes of negligible fire damage. Fire protection has been and continues to be the mainspring of southern forestry, having priority in planning and budgeting.

Furthermore, no responsible leader in the South today, whether he speaks for government, industry, education, politics, banking, agriculture or labor, can be unaware of the destructive force and disaster potential of fire in the woods.

Each should know and unquestionable does know that this eating away at the tissues of the resource forming the region's basic wealth will become increasingly costly as the amazing achievements of technology are more and more applied to southern industry.

Each should know and certainly must know that the same intelligence and forthright action that brought the South to its present economic peak are fully capable of providing adequate and continuing protection to the resources that support it.

Boy Scouts, Explorers, Leaders Leave For National Jamboree At Valley Forge

Boy Scouts, Explorers, and adult leaders from Tishomingo county joining the Yocona Area Council contingent on their journey to historic Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, to attend the Fourth National Jamboree to be held July 12 through 18 were Tony Gaines, Benji Gaines, Jim Chambers and Lloyd Murrah, Iuka; Nash Vickers and Jerry Lee Rushing, Tishomingo; Ken Mayhall and Jerry McAnally of Belmont. Scoutmasters were Cecil Brown of Iuka and Hollis Long of Golden. Tony Gaines is senior patrol leader of the Iuka group.

The group left here on Saturday by bus and expect to return on July 22. Enroute they will visit Chattanooga, Natural Bridge, Washington, Annapolis, Baltimore, New York, Philadelphia and many other interesting sights. While in New York they will board a sightseeing bus for an escorted all day tour of the city, view United Nations headquarters, boat ride to and visit the Statue of Liberty, visit the Empire State Bldg., enjoy a guided tour of NBC TV and Radio Station, tour Chinatown, Times Square, lunch at Radio City, and escorted lecture at Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

United States Senator John Stennis of Mississippi bestowed his best wishes upon the Boy Scouts of America as they prepared to leave for their Fourth Annual Jamboree.

A huge tent city on 2,033 acres, loaned by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, will house the 50,000 inhabitants of America's newest, youngest, and busiest city. In effect it will comprise 38 "villages" of about 1,400 campers each.

About 500 Scouts and leaders are expected from Australia, Bahamas, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Cuba, Denmark, Great Britain, Greece, Iran, Israel, Peru, Philippines, Sweden, Switzerland, and Venezuela. There are 63 nations around the world with Boy Scout Associations with a total membership of over seven million boys and leaders.

The purpose of the jamboree is to strengthen the program of the individual troop and to provide an opportunity for boys to be associated with Scouts from all parts of their own country. Scout officials feel that the simple but significant activities of living together by patrols and crews, cooking, giving demonstrations, hiking, and taking part in bug arena shows and sectional activities all demonstrate democracy in action.

It is felt that the 50,000 or more campers will catch the spirit of patriotism service by living and sleeping where George Washington and his army camped, lived and suffered in that bitter winter of 1777-78, and by so doing kept alive the spark of liberty and secured the nation's freedom.

Jamboree campers are at least 12 years old with second class Scout, Explorer apprentice or higher rank. Each has camping experience to enable him to care for himself in the open, and a cooperative attitude toward fellow Scouts and leaders. Each participates in a three-day, pre-jamboree training camp and submits an official medical examination certificate of physical fitness. Within 24 hours after arrival at Valley Forge, he has a medical checkup.

Here are a few Jamboree Statistics:

Spectacular evening programs on Friday, July 12, and Thursday, July 13, will take place in a natural amphitheater holding 50,000 campers & several thousand guests. The stage is 300 feet wide and 100 feet deep.

Arriving and departing by train will be 30,000 Scouts using 64 special trains.

Warehouse space of 18,000 square feet is being used for the 52,920 cases of food non-perishable foods weighing 752 tons. If laid end to end, frankfurters to

be consumed by the boys would extend over 17 miles. Daily milk requirements will total 74,480 qts., or the full average production of 7,448 cows.

Each day 1,500,000 gallons of water will flow through 8 miles of water mains. Twelve miles of primary electric lines will bring in 900 kilowatts. Six 300-line switchboards will be the camp's own telephone system with 50 trunk lines to the outside world.

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Get Pastures And Ponds Before Buying Cattle

By Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist USDA-SCS

The ideal situation for any livestock farmer is to have excellent pastures and plenty of good water before getting his livestock.

The usual procedure is as follows: The price of cattle begins to rise, and a farmer decides that he can make some money out of cattle. He has about nine (9) acres of open pasture land under fence with a small spring in it. On this nine acres he has one cow, a heifer, and one calf. There is plenty of native grass and enough water at the spring for them, but the price is good and the farmer goes and buys 15 yearlings and turns them in on the 9 acres along with the other three head he has. Soon the grass is eaten off level with the ground, and the spring goes dry. When this happens the farmer wants help, he can buy feed

and hay but he must keep it up. As a result he has 18 head of half-starved, eroded hillside when was some grass, and bogged in by cattle from thirst.

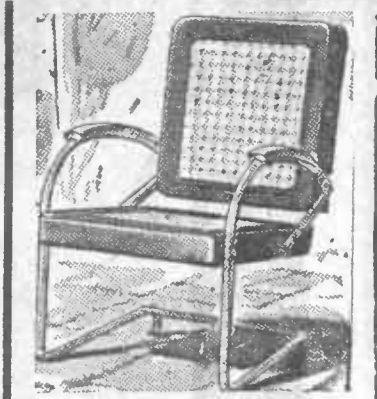

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Exodus 2:15b-22, 4:18-23; 18:1-27.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 119:33-40.

To Give Advice

Lesson for July 14, 1957

To give advice that people will take is not so easy. To give advice that people will be glad they took, is hardest of all. Besides, some people are harder customers for advice than other people. Old people sometimes are more stubborn than young ones; successful people may not listen so readily to criticism as will those who have failed; and members of one's own family may pay less attention than anybody else.

Old Man Jethro
There is a story in the Old Testament of a very old man who gave advice to another man who was younger than he, but still an old man too. The younger man had been tremendously successful, much more so than his father-in-law had ever been. Yet it was the father-in-law who gave the advice. His name was Jethro and he lived about as far off all the beaten tracks as a man could go. When the young Moses had fled from a murder charge, naturally he had gone as far from civilization as he could; and there he came across Jethro, priest and stock-raiser. Moses had married one of his daughters, a somewhat stupid girl, no match for the brilliant Moses. Now, forty-odd years later, with all the glory of the great escape from Egypt fresh upon him, Moses had brought his grumbling people (most ungrateful for their freedom!) out to this same remote region to get organized for their march to Canaan. All day long old Jethro watched his son-in-law, sitting in the midst of a swarming crowd, all talking at once, no doubt, asking questions, demanding attention, complaining of grievances, accusing their neighbors, wanting Moses to settle all their quarrels. It was too much for any man, even a Moses. Old Jethro gave him a simple piece of advice: Set up a graded system of judges. Don't try all the cases yourself, only the hard ones. So Moses took the advice . . . and it worked so well that, forty years or so later, Moses seems to have believed that he himself had thought of the bright idea first.

Character
Why did Moses take the advice of Jethro so quickly? Of course the main reason, no doubt, was that having lived with Jethro for nearly forty years, Moses had listened to the old man before and knew he did not talk nonsense. But what was it that made Jethro worth listening to? To put it into terms of our own problems: What do I need, to get my own advice taken by other people? How can I learn to give advice that people will follow and like? The first thing needed, in order to give advice wisely, is character. Jethro was a man of God. Possibly his idea of God was not up to the Christian standard, perhaps not even up to that of Moses. But the God he knew, he revered and served. Then he was not only religious, he was practical. He knew what would work and what would not. A man of deep faith and conviction, who is also solidly practical, is the best kind of counselor, and people know it.

Acquaintance
Another thing: Jethro and Moses had lived side by side for forty years. Jethro knew Moses like a book, he knew his ability and his limitations. Advice is not best given by total strangers. Sometimes people in trouble will appeal to complete strangers for advice, but that is only because they don't like to tell some local man (or woman) the whole truth. In giving advice, the counselor needs to know as much as possible about the whole background of the person he is advising.

Concern
More than acquaintance is needed, to be a welcomed adviser. The aged Jethro could see that Moses was wearing down, under the impossible burdens he was trying to carry. If Jethro had not cared, he would hardly have offered advice. But he did care; and Moses knew it. Advice is not best when served cold. A good counselor advises from the heart not less than from the head. With the head, one can analyze a situation; but only with the heart can the adviser put himself in the place of the one he helps.

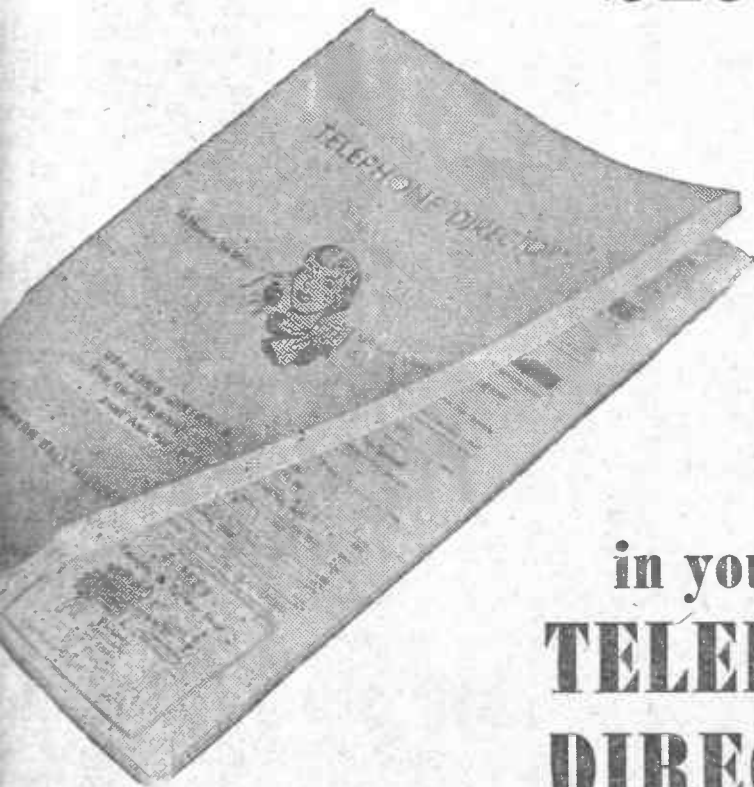
