Deadline For Filing Classification Applications

Smith-Doxey applications for cotton classification and market news services must be filed by August 1 according to Clyde C. McWhorter, Manager South Central Area, Cotton Division, AMS, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Groups that have not filed applications are urged to do so at once.

Last year over 3.8 million samples were classified for some 173 thousand members in 919 cotton improvement groups in the South Central Area. Applications have been received from approximately 418 groups this year. This leaves about 500 to be filed by the August 1 deadline date.

Cotton sampling agents who have not filed bonds or made other sampling arrangements should do so at once. This is necessary so that sampling supplies can be delivered to the agents before ginning starts.

W. H. Gregory, Chickasaw county, H. M. Word, Monroe county, W. C. Loden, Clay county, and Mrs. W. E. Hodges of Lee County, will participate in the program. They will tell how they have used the credit services of the Association in various ways to increase farm income and to provide necessary capital investments.

John Matthews, Fieldman of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of New Orleans, will assist with the program.

Musical talent will be provided for the pleasure of stockholders and guests and attendance awards will be given.

Following adjournment of the meeting, stockholders and others in attendance at the meeting will be guests of the Association at a matinee picture at the Lyric theatre.

The Association, organized under the Farm Credit Act of 1933, makes agricultural loans to stockholders in Alcorn, Chickasaw, Clay, Itawamba, Lee, Lowndes, Monroe, Oktibbeha, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Tippah, Tishomingo, and Union counties.

Two Men In Jail, Charged With Rape

Two county men were lodged in jail at Iuka last Thursday night charged with rape.

Sheriff Whit Wilson reports that Eugene Ewing of Golden and Basil Pharr of Belmont were apprehended late in the evening of July 11, on a charge of assault and rape brought against them by Beatrice Credille, a divorced woman, who has been residing near Tishomingo.

According to the plaintiff's statement in the sheriff's office, she had been hoeing cotton all day and upon her arrival home the two men were sitting in a 53 Ford waiting for her. They called her over to the car and told her to get in. She sat in the back seat with one foot on the ground and one of the men jerked her the rest of the way into the car and drove off. They told her they would take her to Florida and drove down highway 30 toward Paden. They turned off the paved road into the woods where, according to the statement, both men criminally assaulted her. After the attacks, the men drove toward Iuka and stopped at a home about three miles out. The woman ran from the car to another house when the sheriff was called. The attackers, both married men with families, were caught in Enlow bottom.

Sheriff Wilson states that doctors who examined the plaintiff said there was evidence that the woman had been criminally attacked.

COUNTY SCHOOLS OPEN MONDAY, ELEVEN ATTENDANCE CENTERS

County Superintendent of Education Cleston M. Scruggs announces today that all county schools will commence the 1957-58 school session on Monday of next week. Due to re-organization of the county system there will be only eleven attendance centers holding school this year. They are: Burnsville, Belmont, Tishomingo, Holcut, Paden, Dennis, Midway, Holloway, Pleasant Ridge, and Golden; the eleventh one being Carter's Branch, only colored school in the county system.

County schools will have a split 8-month session, they to vacate near the first of September for cotton picking and to resume operation after six weeks of vacation. Mr. Scruggs also states that teachers have been engaged for all the

schools and that none will have to open short of their required number.

Bus Drivers' School

Mr. Scruggs further states that 3 new busses will go into operation this year, bringing the total of county owned vehicles to 14. There are thirteen for white pupils and one for colored. In addition to the county-owned-busses twenty-three others will be operated during this session. Drivers have been engaged for all the routes.

A school bus drivers school will be held at the Iuka institution next Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, with Prof. Howard Carpenter of NEMJC serving as instructor. All new drivers are required to attend each session and older drivers are required to attend these schools every other year.

Mr. Scruggs also states that the County Board of Education has passed on a long-range plan that has been forwarded to Jackson to the State Educational Finance Commission for approval. The plan deals with the creation of attendance centers; determining the numbers of class rooms for each, cafeterias and gymnasiums. The local board cannot act further until approval is given by the Commission in Jackson.

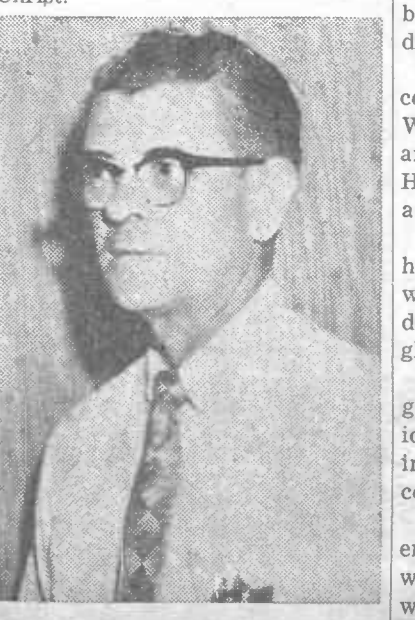

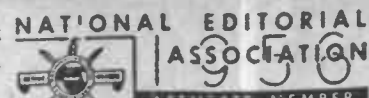

You will be hearing a lot about safety next week, I know. It is

National Farm Safety Week. The dates are July 21-27.

Please heed the suggestions you hear. The death toll from farm-work accidents last year was higher than for any other major industry.

You hear a lot about morning and afternoon "coffee breaks" in industry. The National Safety Council says a "break" in work routine is as important to farmers and homemakers as to city workers. They reduce possibilities of accidental deaths and injuries. And they improve working efficiency.

Most farm work accidents happen during late morning and mid-afternoon. If you are working with a tractor, stop long enough to get off and walk around the machine. If possible, turn the tractor off for a few minutes.

Mrs. Farm housewife, you can help by packing a mid-morning and mid-afternoon snack and taking it to the field. It will remind your husband or son the time has come for a few minutes off from routine field work.

Cooking in Aluminum Foil
Aluminum foil is right handy to use in preparing for outdoor

meals. It can save you dishwashing time for in-the-kitchen cooking, too.

You can make a pan by folding together one or more thicknesses of foil, turning up the sides and creasing them firmly at the corners. Foil can be used to catch liquids that run over in the oven. Just think of the savings on a messy cleaning job!

Place the foil on the shelf that holds the food or the one under the one the food is on. Foil interferes somewhat with browning, so put it under the food only when it begins to show signs of running over.

Don't cover the entire shelf or most of it, as this interferes with heat circulation. Don't put a large piece of foil on the bottom surface of the oven or in any way line the bottom of the oven.

Line the broiler pan. This will eliminate another messy cleaning job. Almost any pan or baking dish may be lined with foil to prevent hard washing and scouring afterwards.

Pigs in Blanket

A frankfurter in a biscuit wrapper makes a tasty dish. To prepare, make biscuit dough. Pat it

into a quarter-inch layer as the frankfurter and wider than the diameter of the frank. Wrap the "dog" then wrap both, twisting the ends. medium hot coals for minutes.

Campfire Vegetables
Wrap sliced potatoes, peas or other frozen vegetables which you have added to seasonings in aluminum foil. The edges of the foil seal with a double fold, neat little packet.

Thaw the frozen vegetables enough to break them in before wrapping.

Place the packet on top of the grill or hot coals for about 15 minutes. Push the packets to the fire and the foil will seal and the goodness of the whole meal is ready to eat.

are in metal-mining companies, including gold, copper, zinc, lead, uranium, and even the rare metals. Most of these stocks do not now represent producing properties, although some of the non-producers are building mills or refineries. There are probably many that are now selling for less than a dollar a share which will some day sell for many times this. But only experts can pick them at this time. For the ordinary investor to buy them at random is a good deal like betting on a horse race. Some horses will surely win; but which one is another matter. Relation Between Price and Reserves Even if a mining stock is selling cheap, that is, below a dollar per share, yet one should first find out how many shares are outstanding. The brokers here tell me that most of the buyers look only at the prices and do not consider the number of shares outstanding. Of course, the number of shares should be multiplied by the price to see what the mine or the prospect is selling for. Certain stocks which now pay no dividends are probably the best buys. The most important thing for the investor to know is the amount of real ore reserves, whether iron, copper, lead, zinc, uranium, nickel, or whatever the metal may be. These ore reserves can be determined pretty well by diamond drilling. An honest broker will tell you approximately the amount of the reserves. In addition to knowing the quantity of the reserves, one

should know the percentage of ore to a ton of earth. With this information the investor can divide the price at which the mine is selling by the reserves and secure a rough estimate of the price that he is paying per ton for the ore. Other Factors to Consider There are other factors to consider, such as distance from a railroad, a navigable river, or even highways. Before a metal can be marketed, the ore must be brought to the surface and refined and the metal transported to market. Each step is expensive, but very important. Then, of course, the amount of "overburden" is important; that is, how much earth must be removed before the ore can be taken out. The diamond drilling will give the figures on this. The main thing to keep in mind is: Buy reserves of ore and study the price you are paying for these reserves. Forget the stock market and imagine that you are merely a metal merchant buying copper or one of the other metals. For instance, if you are studying a coal company, instead of figuring too much on the price of the stock, figure how much you are paying for a ton of coal. Investors who take the trouble to get this information should really be able to make a lot of money. Sometime in the next 30 years most metals will be selling at several times their present prices. There are only so many tons under the ground of every metal, and the amount is being reduced every day. I really believe that \$12,000 invested properly in Canadian Oils and Metals, will, at some period during the next 30

years, be worth a million dollars! Such an investment, however, requires much care in the selection and supervision of the companies.

Timber in The South

By Collins M. Akin, Area Forester The South, with more at stake than any other section of the country, still has wild fires and they must be stopped. Although the woods still flash with this dreaded enemy, as it is frequently called cancer of the woods, has to some extent decreased. It can probably be curbed but never stopped. It continues to sap the growth of millions of feet of timber a year which will double any other region in the country today. It is no exaggeration to say that today the most valuable timber producing plant stretches from the Rio Grande to the Potomac. Or that no area of comparable size, regardless of value, must endure so many firebrands so often. The big question is WHY? Why, despite protection spending which has multiplied over the years, despite mechanization and better training and tools for fire control personnel, despite vastly expanded education in all fields of fire control and prevention. Why is it that eleven Southern States continue, year in and year out, to be responsible for two of every three acres of timberland burned in the continental United States? In terms of dollars and cents, this represents two-thirds of the national timber loss from fires. The idea of organized statewide fire protection has been at work in this country for three quarters of a century; federal aid for cooperative fire protection has been available to the states and to private landowners for nearly half a century; organized education by agencies of the people, of industry, of the state, of the federal government, has been continuous over a quarter of a century; for nearly two decades there has been Keep Green, Smokey Bear and other devices to help curb the destruction of wild life. Yet last year, wildfire consumed more than the South's multi-billion dollar pulp and paper industry! Why is the question and it is still the greatest mystery of all

Why? That the South has 84 per cent of its commercial timber under organized protection is of great significance. It is perhaps the most important advance made along the road to freedom from wildfire. But it does not—and cannot—obscure the fact that in this day and age 31,000,000 acres are still with out protection. Nor can its reflection mask out disclosures by the Timber Resource Review of 1955 that the degree is the lowest in the nation. The people of the State of Mississippi are beginning to recognize that the fire situation in the state is a grave one and through the efforts of the Mississippi Forestry Commission and the cooperation of the people in the state, it can be curbed to a minimum small threat to the timber of the state, which must meet the increasing demand of industry. Industry depends on the state for timber, small woodlot owners depend on timber for a portion of their income; this is a definite barrier for security will open the eyes of the people not yet in agreement with protection of our timber resources. 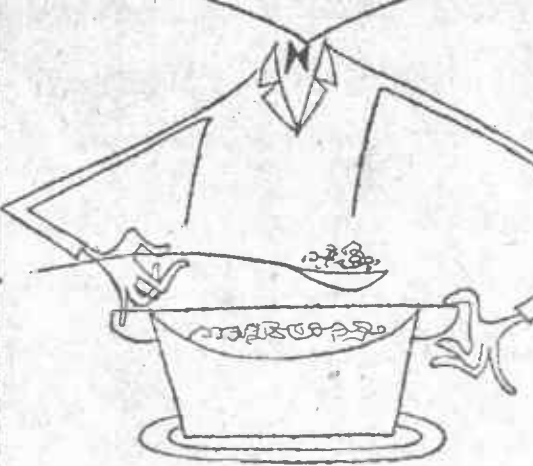
