COMMUNISM ON THE MAYFLOWER

The coming of the Pilgrims to the New England coast in 1620 forms a glamorous chapter in American history. Now, 337 years later, we have been hearing and reading much about a rather thrilling and adventuresome duplication of the trip in a replica of the original Mayflower in which the first trip was made. It would therefore seem to be an appropriate time to review a little known fact about the system of government or control the people on the original

Mayflower set up for themselves. The fact that is generally ignored, overlooked and unknown about this landing at Massachusetts Bay 337 years ago is that it marked the first communist settlement in America. The main lesson about this settlement that is generally ignored, overlooked and unknown is that this experiment in communism failed within three years' time, and—for their very survival—the Pilgrims had to turn to what we know as the free enterprise

system.

Through the years, it would have been—and it still would be—a valuable lesson to the pupils in the classrooms studying American history if this lesson in the failure of communism—some people call it socialism; there is no real difference—were emphasized.

Before landing, the Pilgrims entered into what is known as the Mayflower Compact. Under this Compact, Plymouth was set up as a share-the-wealth community. Nobody owned anything. Whatever was produced belonged to the community as a whole. They called this system "the comone course and condition." They lived under this system from the desperate, disease-ridden first winter of 1620-21 until the hungry spring of 1623. Then they changed to private enterprise. Why?

"We find the answer in a book written by William Bradford, one of the leading original Pilgrims and second governor of Plymouth Colony, entitled "Of Plimoth Plantation." This book had an interesting history itself. It was written by Bradford in 1647, was available to historians until 1767, and then it completely disappeared from this country for almost a hundred years. It was finally located in the library of the Bishop of London in 1855. After long negotiations and finally upon formal request from "The President and Citizens of the United States," Queen Victoria had it sent back and it now resides in the Statehouse at Boston, Massachusetts. Printed copies are available in most major libraries.

The Pilgrims weren't long under this "Comone course and condition," writes Bradford, until it "was found to breed much confusion and discontent, and retard employment that would have been to their benefit and comfort. For the young men that were most able and fitted for labor and service did repine that they should spend their time and strength to work for other mens wives and children, without any recompense. The strong... had no more in devision of victuals and cloaths then he that was weake..."

"Upon the poynte all being to have alike, and all to do alike, they thought themselves in the like condition, and one as good as another. And so, if it did not cut off those relations that God hath set amongst men, yet it did at least much diminish and take of the mutuall respects that should be preserved amongst them."

Instead of a Thanksgiving feast in the fall of 1622, there was literal starvation and hopelessly low morale. "So they begane to think how they might raise as much corn as they could... that they might not still thus languish in misere. At least, after much debate of things, the governor" (Bradford himself) "gave way that they should set corn every man for his own peticular... And so assigned to every family a parcell of land... This had very good success for it made all hands very industrious, so as much more corn was planted then other waise would have bene."

The Pilgrims offered thanks for deliverance from communism with a great Thanksgiving feast in the fall of 1623.

Then Bradford philosophizes somewhat, "The experience that was had in this comone course and condition, tried sundrie years, and that amongst Godly and sober men, may well evince the Vanitie of that conceite of Platos and other ancients, applauded by some of later times;—that the taking away of propertie, and bringing in communite into a comone wealth

would make them happy and flourishing; as if they were wiser than God!"

This is the story about the Pilgrims that should be taught in our schools—because "that conceite of Platos and other ancients" is still "applauded by some of later times." Men still have the idea "that the taking away of propertie, and bringing in communite into a comone wealth would make them happy and flourishing." Socialism and communism were tried many times before Plymouth Colony; they have been tried many times since. "As if they were wiser than God!" They have always failed. lesson? Is it mankind learn the lesson? Is it because the lesson is left out of, or unemphasized in, our history books?

519 Beneficiaries
Received SS
Payments In '56

519 beneficiaries in Tishomingo County were getting monthly social Security payments totaling \$18,510.00 at the end of 1956. The number of beneficiaries increased by 120 over 1955 and the total of monthly benefits being paid in Tishomingo County at the close of the year was \$4,340.00 over the total being paid a year ago, Hugh Tigrett, District Manager of the Tupelo Social Security Office, announced today.

He pointed out that since self-employed farmers were first brought under social security in 1955, many did not qualify before the end of 1956. The majority of these individuals filed claims after December 1956 and are, therefore, not counted in the figures shown above. For example, during the 6 months January-June 1957, many farm claims have been filed in Tishomingo County.

In Tishomingo County for the month of December 1956, 226 retired workers were getting \$10,447.00 monthly. Also 100 wives of retired workers were being paid a total of \$2,196.00 monthly. A total of \$661.00 was being paid to aged widows and \$4,844.00 monthly to widowed mothers with children under 18 in their care and minor children of retired or deceased workers.

Commenting on the growth of the social security insurance in the 20 years of its operation, Mr. Tigrett recalled that the original law covered only about 26 million workers, while as a March 1957, approximately 55.5 million people were in work covered by the law. He further pointed out that 9 out of 10 mothers and children in the United States now have social security protection and that three-fourths of all men becoming 65 this year will be eligible for social security benefit payments.

1 Million Southern
Children
Handicapped

University, Miss.—One million school-age children in the South are handicapped and by 1960 the figure will have risen to 1,250,000 a recent report showed.

Mississippi's education leaders are making plans to meet this problem and as part of this plan the second annual institute on the handicapped child will be held at The University of Mississippi August 5-18.

The conference will aim at teaching the workers with handicapped children how they can do a better job and what materials will help them with their work. Last year's conference was designed to teach how community resources could be used in aiding the handicapped children.

Co-directors of the 1957 institute will be Dr. William C. Geger, Head of the program for the education of exceptional children with the Southern Regional Education Board, Atlanta, Ga., and Dr. William Wolfe, professor of educational psychology at the University of Texas.

Dr. Ray Graham, Director of Special Education for the Illinois State Department of Education,

who was director of last year's institute, will also take part in the 1957 program.

The program is being sponsored by the University of Mississippi

in cooperation with Cerebral Palsy, Inc., which is providing a \$4,000 grant to defray the cost of the institute. Sessions will be in the

modern Mississippi Center for Continuation Study on the Ole Miss Campus. The teachers will be housed in the Alumni House and University Dormitories.

Making Our Community More Prosperous

Park, Miss., July 25. During the past month many towns and cities have held high school graduations. Those young people have been taught the answer to almost every question except the economic place in which they are to live. Let me this morning answer six questions on this subject.

Empty Stores
Question No. 1. Why do we find empty stores on our business streets? Answer: Because more people are going out of the community than are coming into it. The stores are being closed only by the fact that the community produces more than it consumes, every store is empty.

For Unemployment
Question No. 2. Why are good jobs out of work at times? Answer: Because these people have been trained to produce more than one service. More than many young people have been trained for white-collar jobs. Perhaps there are too many offices and not enough factories, services, farms, or homes. Perhaps those who are employed do not take an interest in their work; hence, they are not making money for their employers. Sometimes I feel that those who cannot get jobs are returned to the schools for further training. If we properly trained them in a washer, or vacuum cleaner, or a car, we can return it until it is satisfactory. We should be able to do this with unsatisfactory high school graduates!

For Tight Money
Question No. 3. Why is it now so tight to borrow money from banks? Answer: Because too many citizens are sending money to New York to be put into stocks, and of investing it at home. It might have been a wise thing

The only way I know to beat City taxes is to have a lot of children and get them a free education! However, the duty of paying for schools, highways, fire and police protection should be preached by the newspapers, schools, and even churches. Lee Soybean Gains Quick Acceptance As Good Variety

State College, Miss.—The higher yields and superior seed-holding qualities of the Lee soybean have caused this new variety to be planted on much of the state's farm land devoted to soybeans. Approximately 732,000 acres of soybeans were harvested for beans in Mississippi in 1956. The Lee variety has been estimated to account for as much as 75 per cent of this acreage. First seed of Lee was distributed to one grower in each Delta county in 1954, for increase. Practically all seed produced in 1954 and 1955 was saved for planting to permit this rapid expansion in acreage.

At the Delta Branch Experiment Station at Stoneville, the Lee variety has a 7-year average yield from May plantings on Sharkey Clay soil of 41.3 bushels per acre—and 11 per cent increase over the Ogden variety which is has replaced. In addition to producing higher seed yields, the superior seed holding qualities of Lee permit saving the crop produced, whereas, with Ogden heavy shattering losses were often experienced. In Coahoma County, also on a Sharkey Clay soil, the Delta Station reports that Lee has a 5-year average yield of 39.6 bushels per acre which is 15 per cent greater than Ogden.

The Dorman variety, which averages approximately three weeks earlier in maturity than Lee, has averaged 94 per cent of the yield for Lee when grown on Sharkey Clay soil at Stoneville, and 93 per cent of the yield for Lee in Coahoma County.

Later, taller growing varieties, such as Jackson and Roanoke, have suffered more from late season drought in recent years than has Lee.

Soybean breeding is a cooperative research project of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station. Progress is being made in developing better soybean strains of September maturity. Lines are now available which are better in seed yield, seed quality, seed holding, ground cover during the growing season, and resistance to the major diseases than varieties of cornbelt origin, as Perry and Clark.

CORINTH

Stennis Makes Powerful Speech Opposition To Civil Rights Bill

July 19.—U. S. Sen. Stennis, in a heart-to-heart talk with his colleagues on the floor recently, delivered a powerful speech since touching on the provision of the bill which would empower the Attorney General of the United States to integrate the public school system, he said.

"Schoolhouses & schools are not operated with Attorneys General armed with writs; they are not operated and built by judges; they are not built by United States Marshals; they are not built by men armed with bayonets to enforce the law.

"Senators tell us what we should do about our course of conduct with reference to law enforcement in the schools of the great area of the country I have described. I doubt if they have ever been in the South; that they have been in a schoolhouse or a courtroom of the South. I doubt if they have ever stopped on the highway to try to help someone solve a problem, be he a colored man or a white man, a colored child or a white child.

"The people who live there and carry on these burdens of government are the ones against whom the Attorney General's power would be turned loose. They are the only ones under high heaven who will, or can carry the burdens of the public schools, the churches, the Sunday Schools, the recreation programs, and all the other civic enterprises."

Senator Dennis Chavez rose to commend the address of Senator

Stennis. Said the New Mexico Democrat:

"Mr. President, I have always been recognized as a so-called liberal, and I am. I commend the Senator from Mississippi for what I think is the best American speech I have heard in 24 years on the subject of protecting all of us. I personally do not believe in minorities; believe in Americans. . . . Whether one is a Negro, a Jew, a Mexican, or a so-called Anglo-Saxon Protestant, he said all of us are Americans. I think the speech of the Senator from Mississippi is the most wonderful one I have heard in 24 years."

Other colleagues, Republicans and Democrats alike, most of whom favor a civil rights bill, rose to commend the Mississippi for his "outstanding address." Senator Francis B. Case, Republican of South Dakota, said: "I can say again, as I have on other occasions, that I never listen to the distinguished Senator from Mississippi without feeling he has made a contribution to an understanding of the legislative problem before the Senate."

Senator Spearman Holland described Senator Stennis' talk as "an able address," the Florida Senator said the address was "restrained, poised, patient, and so logical that no one can answer it."

Power Mower Safety

As you or some member of your family pushes your power mower over the lawn, do you remember the do's and don'ts that must be followed? Those that assure you it is a faithful servant, and not a dangerous piece of machinery.

One don't is never leave a mower running unattended where it might tempt children or others who don't know how to handle it.

Be sure children and pets stay away from the machine when you're mowing. Keep a steady footing and balance when mowing on inclines.

Don't make any adjustments, remove clogging grass or sticks, or reach in front of the mower while the engine is running.

festation for the county runs about 30 per cent. Where a sound insecticide program has been carried out, infestation is from two to eight percent. If infestation is over twelve percent, poison three times, four days apart, to bring weevils and bollworms under control.

Poor applications of poisons will not give effective control. For good coverage of the cotton plant be sure the dust or spray nozzle is above the terminal buds of the stalk.

Pastures For Hogs

A good hog pasture will reduce your total hog feed bill up to 10 percent and the bill for protein supplement up to 50 percent.

Good, clean hog pastures are also greatly helpful in sanitation. Pastures will cover a lot of management mistakes and are especially helpful with bred sows and with sows suckling your pigs.

Dairy

Do not neglect keeping salt before animals at all times. The best method for salting animals is to use loose bulk salt and add additional minerals. One of the best minerals to use is Basic Slag. A good mix is to use 2 pounds salt to 1 pound of Basic Slag.

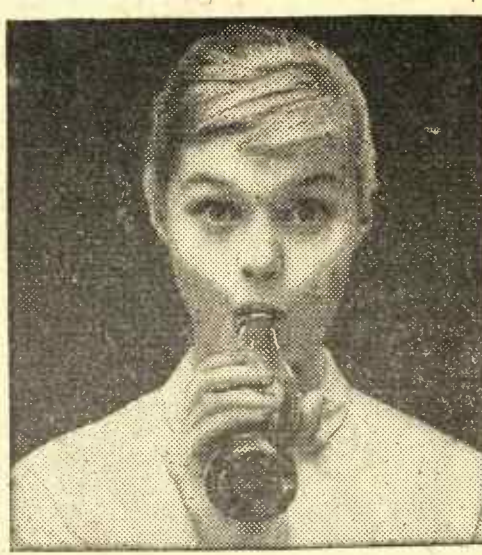

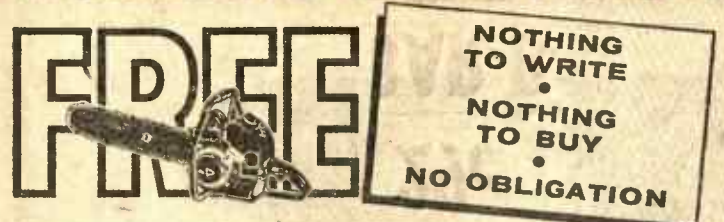

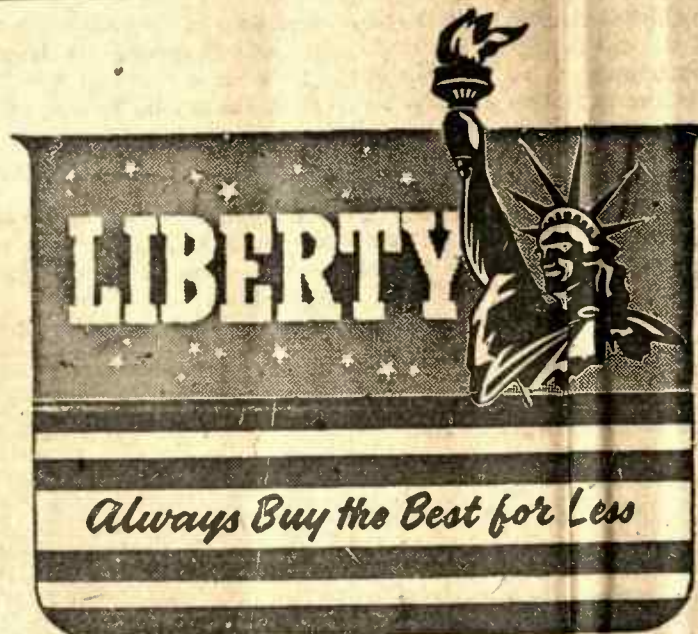
