Local Guards Engaged In Field Exercises At Shelby

County Beer Election Set For Tuesday, October First

Most of last week was consumed in determining whether or not enough qualified voters had signed the petitions to call the election. The names of more than 20 per cent of the qualified electors were on the petitions, therefore the Board has ordered that an election be held on October 1st.

Purpose of asking for the local election is to amend the county law to conform with the law as passed by the 1956 session of the Legislature which prohibits the possession of beer, wine, or any

Information For
Poultrymen In
Research Report

State College, Miss.—Research continues to explore areas where poultrymen may improve quality and lower production costs. A recent report by James E. Hill, head of the poultry department, shows some of the results of studies conducted by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station.

There is a difference in the protein requirement of light and heavy type hens, tests at State College revealed. New Hampshire hens, with a relatively lower rate of egg production than White Leghorns, do not require rations as high in protein as that needed for the smaller breed.

The Experiment Station is studying poultry housing. During the past year 6,752 broilers were grown out in houses covered with aluminum, galvanized iron, built-up roof and a complete aluminum house. Temperature recordings were taken at six inches, three and eight feet from the top of the litter and were recorded at 10,2 and 4 o'clock during the day. There seems to be no correlation be-

tween rate, feed efficiency, livability or temperature and type of house design.

Eight-inch cages were as effective as 10-inch ones in a test involving 324 White Leghorn hens over a two-year period. There was no difference in egg production, mortality or culling rate between the two cage sizes.

Since one of the problems in broiler production is securing enough eggs for chicks, crosses were made using egg and meat type birds in an attempt to increase egg production in their offspring. Preliminary results obtained in 1956 and for several of the past years indicate that excellent egg production may be obtained from some of these crosses.

Mr. Hill's report is published in the August issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

81,391 Receiving
Assistance,
175,000 Over 65

Assistance to the State's needy remained at approximately the same level as it was for June, Welfare Commissioner Holcomb said today.

Of the 175,000 people past 65 years of age, 81,391 are receiving assistance to some degree. The amount of the checks granted to the needy aged ranged from \$5.00 to \$30.00, the maximum allowed under the law. The amount of the monthly check is determined by need of the individual—based upon individual budget—up to \$30.00. The average for June was \$28.63 per old age recipient.

The Commissioner said 4,921 blind people received aid, 41,134 needy children and 4,895 totally and permanently disabled were eligible for assistance.

Children in foster care number 447 in 195 homes. These child-

ren have been removed from their own home for cause, either by the courts or with parent's consent. Holcomb said that although emphasis of the Welfare Department is for preserving home life it becomes necessary in certain cases for the proper authorities to re-

move the children to foster homes for their best interests.

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Miss. Physicians Prepared To Cope With Asiatic Influenza Problems

Mississippi physicians are preparing actively to meet a health problem they hope will never materialize as medical resources throughout the state are being marshalled against Asiatic influenza. This was the statement today by Dr. Howard A. Nelson, Greenwood, president of the Mississippi State Medical Association.

"Our program of operational preparedness is neither a dire warning of epidemic disaster nor a guarantee against influenza outbreak," Dr. Nelson said. "The chief concern of the state medical association is to furnish doctors all available scientific information on the new disease and to organize for the most effective service possible in any situation encountered."

Working directly with the American Medical Association, MSMA officials prepared and released a five-point action program for community level application by local medical societies and hospital professional staffs. A full resume of scientific data, control measures already in effect, and provision for statewide program administration were carried in the policy document distributed to state and local society officials.

Nelson added that "... full details of the MSMA program have been coordinated with the State Board of Health and the Mississippi Hospital Association, both of which are carrying out major and vital roles in this health team effort."

Emphasizing the urgent need for advance preparation, the state medical association program calls for:

1. Local plans for immediate mobilization of all health resources meaning doctors, nurses, technicians, and hospitals—in event of Asiatic influenza outbreak.

2. Special arrangements for immediate dissemination of new and fast developing scientific information among physicians through regular meetings, conferences, hospital bulletin boards, and other appropriate methods.

3. Cooperation with local news media in interpreting new developments and findings on Asiatic influenza with the objective of having available to all citizens necessary and pertinent information on safeguarding health.

4. Immediately reporting cases identified as Asiatic influenza to county health officers.

5. Initiation only of control measures carefully weighed with respect to necessity in safeguarding health to prevent adverse effect upon business, industry, and vital community activity.

"MSMA's policy and program will be directed by our Committee on Medical Service, a group experienced in emergency service plans," Nelson declared. "Dr. Lawrence W. Long, Jackson, is state chairman of this group."

Information released to physicians included documentation on the discovery of the Asiatic influenza virus, first identified by a U. S. Army medical laboratory in Japan last spring. Tests show the new virus is "... strikingly different from previous isolates," and intensive studies of it being continued by the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research, the World Health Organization Influenza Laboratories, and the Commission on Influenza of the Armed Forces Epidemiological Board.

Prototype strains of the newly developed vaccine were made available to American pharmaceutical manufacturers by the National Institutes of Health on May 22 and

Navy Will Complete Two Years Revolutionary Progress Tomorrow

The new U. S. Navy, now steaming at high speed into the nuclear age, tomorrow completes two years of revolutionary progress under the leadership of Admiral Arleigh A. "31-Knot" Burke.

As Admiral Burke headed into his second two-year term as Chief of Naval Operations—the first man since World War II to get a double shot at the helm of the world's fastest and most powerful sea force—the Navy he has helped revitalize paused to take stock of its new profile.

The picture is one of a Navy shifting rapidly from steam to atomic propulsion, from guns to guided missiles, from moderate speed to supersonic planes, and from TNT to nuclear warheads.

It is a Navy of greatly increased mobility and flexibility, with a "Sunday punch" that far exceeds the striking power of World War II forces.

And despite the recently announced inactivation of 60 older ships, a total of 33 modern warships including 23 newly constructed and 10 newly modernized will join the fleet during the next year.

As Admiral Burke puts it: "Naval power with its tremendous combination of swift mobility, long range, and concentrated firepower is an indispensable element in projecting and applying the total military strength of the United States anywhere in the world. Naval power is America's first line of defense today."

"To defend America your Navy has developed new and startling

An air arm of 10,000 operating planes, including Marine aircraft, that features the world's fastest plane—the F8U Crusader jet fighter, speed record holder at better than 1,000 miles-per-hour in level flight—and the A3D Skywarrior, attack bomber that can fly 1500 miles out and 1500 miles back from its mobile airbase with a bomb load having many thousand times the destructive power of that carried by the heaviest carrier-based plane of World War II. It can hit virtually any target in the world.

And finally, a rapidly expanding arsenal of special-purpose guided missiles that give this new fleet of ships, planes and submarines its real "Sunday punch." They include:

Polaris, the Navy's ballistic missile, capable of being fired from submarines and high speed surface ships at ranges up to 1500 miles.

Terror, a surface-to-air missile protecting the skies above the fleet today—on board and in service.

Sparrow and Sidewinder, air-to-air missiles now carried by Navy fighting planes. The latter is a small inexpensive, infra-red, heat homing missile that can accurately seek out and destroy enemy jet fighters and bombers.

Regulus I, jet-powered surface-to-surface missile aboard ships today; capable of striking at ranges over 500 miles; and Regulus II, a longer range, supersonic big brother.

Petrel, air-to-surface weapon that combines the long range of the missile with the underwater effectiveness of the torpedo.

Talos, a long range anti-aircraft missile; Tartar, baby sister of Terrier which gives guided missile

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Forestry Field Day Was Well Attended At State Park On Last Thursday

The county forestry field day held last Thursday at Tishomingo State park was well attended by a large group of citizens interested in the promotion of better forests and in the production of better timber for wood products.

County Agent W. C. Hamilton served as master of ceremonies for the day, and appearing on the program were J. E. Stanley, district Extension Agent of State College; Jimmy Therrell, also of State College who discussed "Management of Saw Logs and Pulpwood"; Dr. Bob Clapp, State College, who discussed "Outlook of Forestry and Forestry School At State College"; George M. Criss of the State Forestry Service, who discussed "Fire Protection"; Paul Weekley, manager of the Hiwassee Land Co. office at Iuka, who discussed "Chemical Control of Hardwoods in Pine Stands"; Monty Montford of State College, discussed "Insects and Diseases of Forests"; John Mitchell, TVA Forester discussed "Pulpwood Thinning".

Last portion of the program was a panel discussion headed by J. S. Therrell, George M. Criss, John Mitchell, Bob Clapp and Paul Weekley.

At noon a feast of Tennessee Blue Cat was served dutch style by John Bacus. Mr. Bacus is already famous for his ability to cook catfish and the meal served in the park was only another example of his unexcelled art.

All of the discussions on the program were timely and full of information about forestry. However, because of new methods of controlling hardwoods, weeds, and undergrowth in timbered land we feel that the speech made by Paul Weekley on Chemical control of hardwoods in pine stands is worthy of reproduction here. Mr. Weekley's speech follows:

"We are all very concerned with the economy of our great state of Mississippi, an economy based primarily upon agriculture and forestry. It is about the second of these two industries forestry, that I wish to talk to you, since this is now the second ranking industry within our state, being topped only by agriculture. Surely an industry which has attained such lofty stature in our economy deserves our most careful consideration. Since it is conservatively estimated that our timberlands are capable of producing three times the volume

of timber now growing on these lands it is not impossible to imagine that the day might come when this enterprise might even rank first in our economical structure. However, before such lofty ideals can even be entertained there must be a considerable change in the management and care of our forests. Under our present practices of cutting and caring for our timber there is little hope that the financial rewards from this source will increase to any great extent. There are many problems, such as fires, insects and diseases and cull hardwood removal and control, which must be faced and overcome before our timberlands can yield their full potential, but the one of these I wish to emphasize today is the last one mentioned, cull hardwood removal and control.

"During the past few years tremendous strides have been made in our farming practices; new types of seeds and fertilizers have been developed better and more efficient machinery manufactured, better chemicals for insect and disease controls are on the market, improved methods and practices have been widely adopted by our farmers, including intensive measures to control undesirable weeds, grasses and other competing vegetation in fields and pastures. Yet these same people, along with the majority of other landowners, will not expend one dime of their money, will not give one hour of their labor and will not give one minute of thought to the problem of preventing their valuable timberland from being completely taken over by just such "weeds", that is by undesirable and cull hardwoods.

"During the past several years my job has made it necessary for me to travel rather extensively over northeast Mississippi. As time has passed I have become more and more awed by the great spectacle of waste and destruction which is rapidly encroaching upon what was once our forest lands. From a financial standpoint much of our land has been taken away from us and more is being taken each year by this evil. Just as erosion has devastated thousands of acres of our farm land, so is this invasion of full hardwoods destroying thousands of acres of our timberlands.

"If we are to expand the forest industry, one of the most important

phases of our economy, or even to maintain it at its present level, then we must reclaim the acres which have been removed from the production of high quality timber crops and prevent other acres from falling to this same state of unproductiveness.

"You might ask: What has been done - or what is being done - or what can be done, to put these lands back in a state of productivity. Several methods have been found by which these lands can be once more be made productive.

"In Mississippi, we use several methods: 1. Seed Tree Law. 2. A. S.C. Payments. 3. Planting Payment.

"These help but not sufficient within themselves. "Fortunately a more effective, efficient and economical method of hardwood control has been developed; the application of chemicals by aerial spraying. Some advantages of this method are it destroys trees and brush, non injurious to man or animals, either livestock or wildlife, and is the cheapest method known.

"Unfortunately, we have laws in Mississippi regulating aerial spraying so rigidly that the companies who do this work will not do it in Mississippi, or if so only in areas far removed from any agricultural lands.

"If we hope to overcome problems of cull hardwood invasion of our forest lands we must work to have our laws relaxed to the point where aerial spraying can be done.

"Spraying being done in adjoining states with good results and with very little damage to crops. Crops are very carefully avoided.

"Companies carrying on extensive planting and girdling program in Mississippi. Small landowners work has been largely ineffective in northeast Mississippi. Due to small area treated and oftentimes work not done properly.

"If we hope to overcome the problem, a much faster and more economical approach must be taken. This can only be done by prevailing upon our legislature and other government agencies and officials to have our laws amended and relaxed so as to allow us to carry out an effective program of brush and hardwood control on our forest lands. I see no reason why a program compatible to both farming and forestry

cannot be worked out since it has been proven both possible and practical by our neighboring states."

50,000 Bushels Of Pine Cones Needed This Year

The Mississippi Forestry Commission needs 50,000 bushels of pine cones this year according to State Forester C. B. Marlin and is prepared to pay a reasonable price which will be announced soon.

Cones from Lobolly and Slash pine are needed in greater volume with less amounts of Shortleaf and Longleaf cones.

The Commission will extract the seed from the cones and plant them in the 3-state-operated nurseries to produce seedlings in an effort to meet the ever-increasing demand.

Seedling production, upped from 29 million in 1956 to an expected 80 million in 1957, must again be increased in 1958 if the seedling supply is to gain even footing with the demand.

Marlin said the 4,343,000 acres of Mississippi's land are in need of planting so that they may be restocked to wood production and return to the status of a profit maker to the landowner. The Commission can supply seedlings to the extent of its nursery capacity and to the extent of its seed collection and purchase.

Cones are collected from the various species at different times, Marlin said, and usually are collected a relatively short period of time. The exact time to begin gathering cones will be announced by the Commission's area foresters in the counties as cones become ripe. No cones collected before the specified date will be accepted. Purchase of cones by the Commission will end when the cones begin opening.

Marlin said other details such as methods used and prices paid will also be announced at a later date by the Area Forester in each particular county. Persons interested in gathering cones should wait for this information before gathering them.

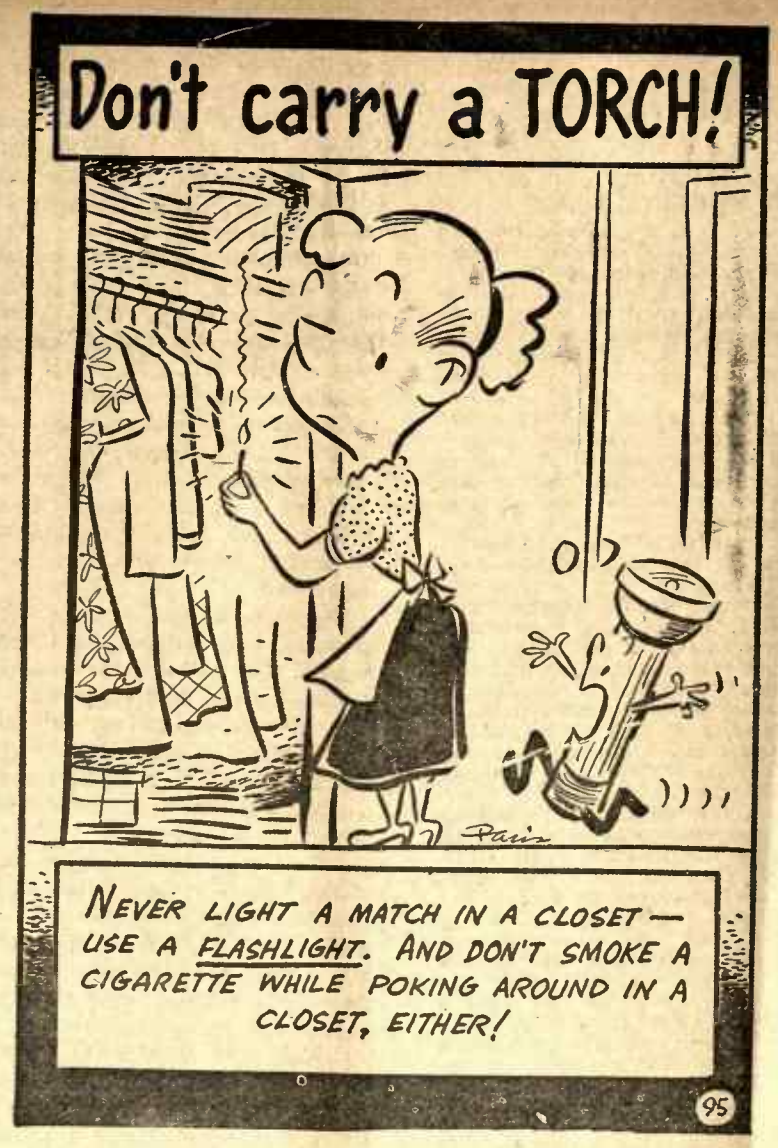

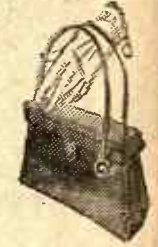

Here is how it works. Take peaches as an example and first find out how much it costs to put up one quart.

$3¢ + 3¢ + 15¢ = 21¢$						

At 21¢ per quart, good freestone peaches are a bargain. You usually save at least 10¢ per quart compared to what you would pay for commercially canned (No. 2½ tin is about 10¢ less than 1 qt.). Savings are still greater when you grow your own peaches, or buy them at less than the above price.

In these calculations, the jar cost is figured on a 10 year jar life, as shown by independent surveys. Fuel cost was developed from tests, while lid and sugar figures are based on current prices. The U. S. Department of Agriculture shows the yield from a bushel of peaches to be 18 - 24 qts.

Similar calculations for other items, such as tomatoes and relishes, show comparable savings; so that it is conservative to say that home canning saves 10¢ per jar. Studies made by a leading research organization show that well over 1,500,000,000 jars are canned each year. Here, then, is how women make big home earnings by home canning: 1,500,000,000 jars canned X 10¢ = \$150,000,000.

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for non-residential construction rose 171 per cent. Of particular interest is the fact that, for the April-May-June period in '57, residential construction ran considerably above that of the same period in '56—\$19,222,000 as compared with \$14,061,000.

In June '57, total tax collections by the state amounted to \$9,945,089—an increase of two per cent over that of the previous month and of three per cent over that of the same month a year ago. Sales tax collections in June totaled \$4,281,595—a drop of 27 per cent from the all-time high of May '57, but still four per cent above that of June '56.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: I Samuel 14:1-15; 24:45; 17:55-18:3; 19:17; 20:1-42; 23:15-18; 31:1-2; II Samuel 1:17-27; Devotional Reading: John 15:9-15.

Friend for Life
Lesson for August 18, 1957

WHEN Jonathan died, his friend David sang a song about him which has come down to us in the Bible (II Sam. 1:17-27) as a sample not only of David's genius as a man's poet, but as a gem in the literature of friendship. The curious feature of it is that at the time of Jonathan's death David was technically and actually a rebel against the government in which Jonathan was an officer. The army, in the defeat of which Jonathan was killed, would have been sent against David except that the Philistines were at the moment Public Enemy Number One. And in fact David was officially an ally of those same Philistines whose troops crushed Jonathan's.



Strange background for friendship! No friendship has stood the final test unless it is a friendship "in spite of" what tries to break it up; easy-going friendship may not be very strong when the test comes.

In Spite of Rivalry

One thing that breaks up friendships in a hurry is a situation in which both friends are rivals—for a job, for a promotion, for a girl, for money. Now Jonathan was David's rival for the most important (and glamorous, too) job in their country: nothing less than being King. Jonathan was the Crown Prince, David only a commoner; but David had the backing of the prophet Samuel. This meant that David had the approval of God, for that high place, as Jonathan did not. It was harder for Jonathan not to be jealous of David than for David not to be jealous of Jonathan. But Jonathan was David's good friend in spite of that. Sometimes a friendship, well started, will keep right on when a rivalry opens up. But is not so often that men already rivals will become friends. Jonathan knew from the start that David had his eye on the throne, for when first Jonathan heard of him, he was trying out for his sister's hand in marriage. Eastern courts being what they were, and still are, that ordinarily spelled trouble for the future; but not for Jonathan. Win or lose, he was still a friend.

In Spite of the Feud

Another thing has spoiled many a budding friendship: family interference. For years, all Jonathan could have heard at home about David was nothing good. Saul hated the very sight of David, and in fact tried over and over again to kill him or get him killed. It reached the point where once at dinner when David's name was mentioned, and Jonathan offered a perfectly sensible excuse for his not being there, King Saul broke out in a red rage, insulting Jonathan and his mother besides, all because Jonathan was acting decently about David.

What your family says about people—the preacher, the school teacher, the mayor, the President, or the next door neighbor—is hard to get away from. It's hard to see good in people when those closest to you see nothing but meanness. It takes a real friend to be able to listen to slander by the ear, and not believe a word of it. It takes a pretty strong backbone to run the risk of breaking with your family in order to stand by somebody they don't like but who you know is worth two of you.

In Spite of Inferiority

Jonathan was, as the stories about him show, a popular man, and an able one. He would have made a better king than Saul... but not better than David. He knew this. For all his popularity, he was less popular than David. The people loved Jonathan, but most of them could see that David would make a better leader of the nation. If Jonathan found this hard to take, he said not a word about it that any one remembered. He did not get himself all choked up in an "inferiority complex." It is easier to be a good friend to people less able than yourself, less good-looking, less popular, less anything good, than it is to be a good friend to some one who, on most counts, outrates you.

All friends wish their friends well. But the acid test of friendship is this: Can you wish your friend well when you know that his success means your eclipse?

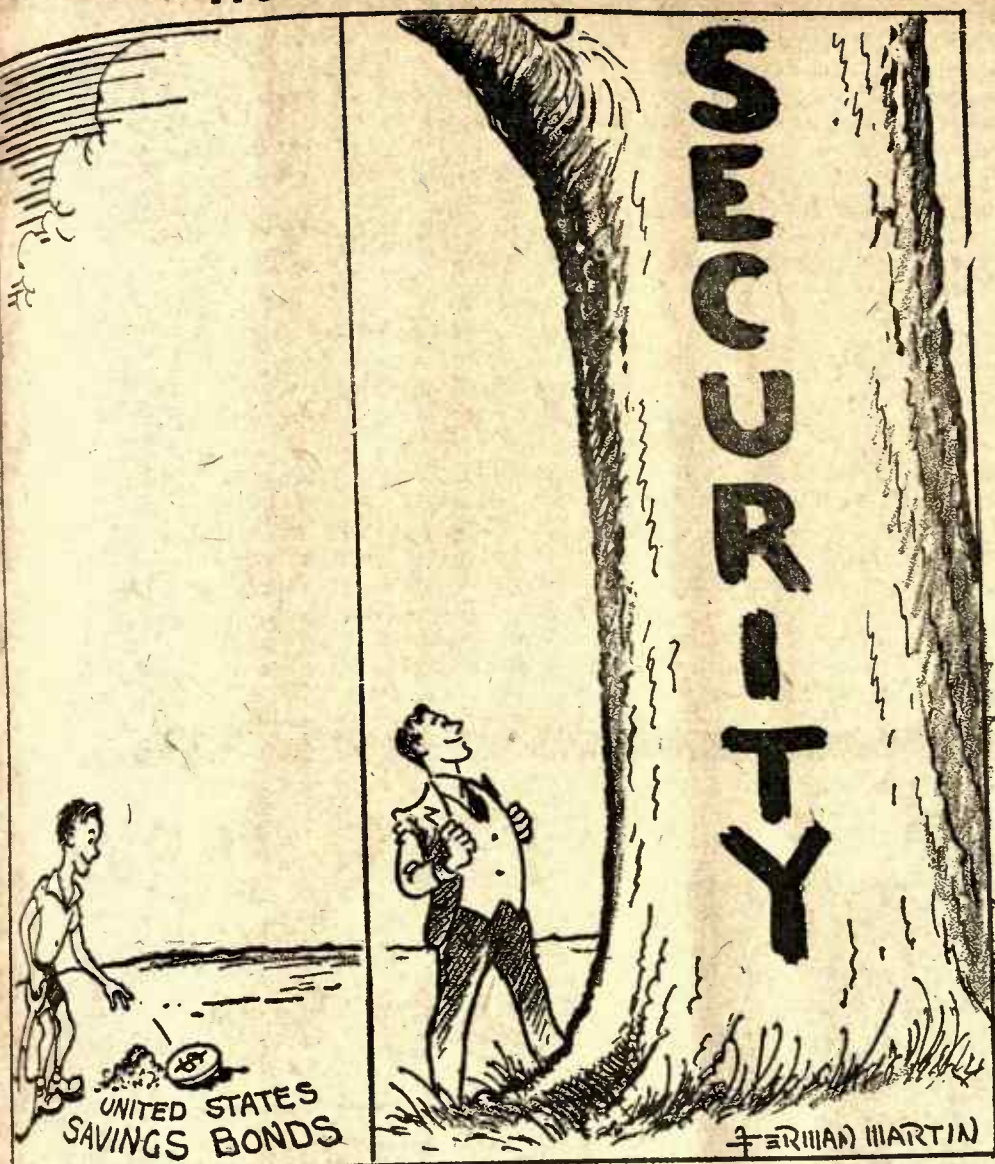

Cotton Insects

Boll weevils are migrating and
are heavily damaging some cotton
fields. Do not stop poisoning cot-
ton now. Continue applications un-
til bolls in top are large enough
that weevils cannot damage.

Hog Production

For successful hog production,
strict sanitation is a must. The
first few weeks of a pig's life are
the most important. Get them off
to a good growthy start by keep-
ing them healthy and by feeding
them a good starter feed.

The farrowing quarters should
be thoroughly disinfected before
the bred sow is placed in it. Scrub
her udder and legs thoroughly
with warm soapy water to remove
any worm eggs.

Land where pigs are raised
should be fresh soil of a sandy
nature and well drained. A tem-
porary grazing crop should be in
the growing stage.

If your pigs weigh 40 pounds
or more at eight weeks weaning
age, then you have done a good
job. Remember that runty, unthri-
vy pigs are poor doers in the feed
lot.

hay. Higher quality hay can mean
higher production per cow and
greater profits from your herd.
Feeding high quality hay also re-
sults in better development of re-
placement dairy heifers.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Mississippi Agricultural
Extension Service

This column is going to con-
tain a number of odds and ends of
household hints. Hope you'll find
ideas that will help you through-
out the house—from the kitchen to
the front porch, and to make some
of your homemaking tasks easier.

Grease Spatter Safety. Pie pans
placed upside down over unlit
burners on the kitchen stove will
protect the burners from grease
spatters from frying food. These
pie pans will be easier to clean
than the burners.

Hanging Pants. After washing
always hang slacks or any type
of trousers by the legs. The wet
weight will take almost all the
wrinkles out so that only a little
pressing will be needed.

Overloaded Circuit. Blowing fuses,
flickering lights and shrink-
ing television pictures when addi-
tional electrical appliances are
turned on are all signs that the
electrical circuit is overloaded.

New Canning Rings. When can-
ning, always use new rubber rings.
Old rings become porous and fail
to make a perfect seal.

Cool Lemonade. A dozen lemons
will make about 16 glasses of lem-
onade. You can get more juice
from a lemon if you let the fruit
set in hot water for several min-
utes before squeezing.

Toys for Trip. A family trip in
a car will be much more pleasant
if you carry along a few of the
youngsters' favorite toys to keep
them occupied when they tire of
the scenery.

Drinkable Watermelon. Plug sev-
eral places in the top surface of
a whole watermelon. Through
these openings pour in a mixture
of fresh lemon or orange ade. The
liquid absorbs the melon flavor—
even some of the melon juice. Ser-
ve by plunging straws into the
plug holes.

Rust-Free Springs. To prevent
mattresses from picking up rust
marks from the springs, give the
springs a coat of paint when the
original paint shows signs of wear-
ing thin.

Jewelry for Accent. A few well-
chosen pieces of jewelry will ac-
cent and lend individuality to a
costume; too many pieces will ruin
the desired effect.

Read Labels. It pays to read the
label on garments if you want
to keep them in best condition.

Prevent Mildew. To prevent mil-
dew damage, always dry soiled
clothes, towels and washclothes be-
fore putting them in a hamper.

Drawstring Buttons. A large but-
ton sewed on each end of cotton
pajama's drawstring will prevent
the drawstring from slipping out
of the garment when it is washed.

Waxing Ash Trays will make
them easier to clean.

Double Knot. Double stranded
thread won't tangle easily if you
knot each strand separately.

Cold Milk. To keep milk cold
through the entire meal, freeze
homogenized milk in ice cube trays
and serve milk cubes in your
glass of milk.



Apply Lime On Your Pastures Now

The value of agricultural lime-
stone is well-known to most farm-
ers of Tishomingo county. The
State Soil Testing Laboratory
at State College, Mississippi re-
commends the use of some lim-
ing material on most of the fields
of Tishomingo county from which
soil samples have been taken and
tested.

Agricultural lime is relatively
cheap, but the great problem fac-
ing farmers, who want to apply
lime on their soil, is getting it
hailed to their farms and spread
on their land.

While ground limestone may be
applied to land any season of the
year, the best time to do this is

while the land is dry. Only when
the land is dry can the heavy
lime trucks with spreader attach-
ments operate successfully.

Most of the permanent pasture
land in Tishomingo county is now
dry enough to permit the use of
this heavy lime spreading equip-
ment.

Because ground agricultural
limestone is not quickly available
to plants, but gradually becomes
available over a period of sev-
eral years, it can be applied to pas-
ture land this summer for the
benefit of pasture plants next spring.
A farmer may apply lime now
while the ground is dry and wait
until next spring to apply phos-
phate, potash, and nitrogen to this
pasture.

We who work for the soil con-
servation service are interested in
farmers having a good cover of
grass and legumes on this upland
permanent pastures. The farmers
need these good pastures for their
livestock, the land also needs the
vegetative cover for protection a-
gainst erosion.

The use of ground limestone in
addition to phosphate, potash and
nitrogen helps in two ways. First,
the lime is a plant food, and sec-
ond, the ground limestone will
cause the phosphate and potash
to be worth more to the pasture
plant. These are well known facts.

It is also a well known fact, to
those who have tried it, that it
is a hard job for the farmer to
spread agricultural limestone on
his land himself.

If a farmer plans to apply lime
on his pasture he should get some-
one with proper equipment to
haul it to his farm and spread
it for him. Now is a good time to
do that.

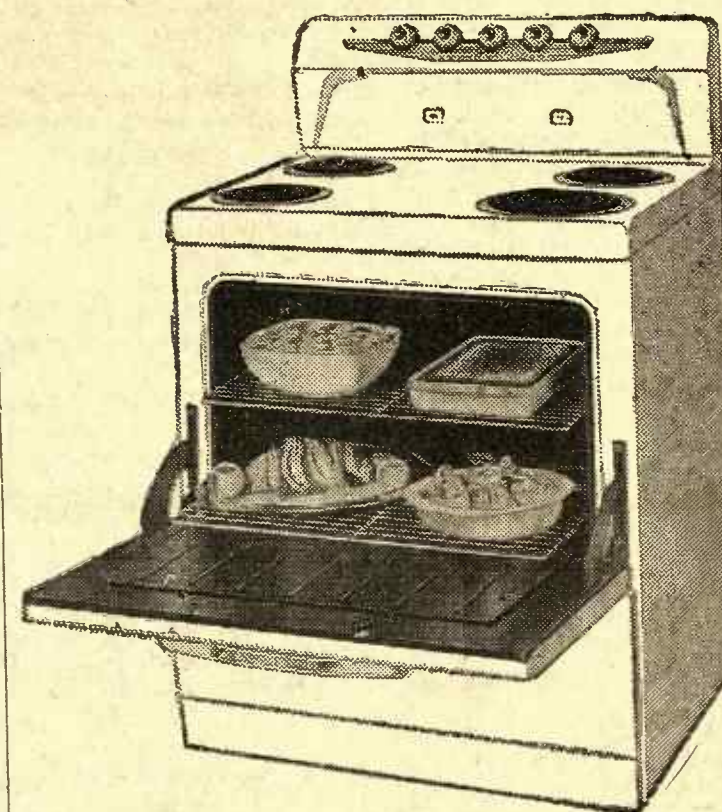

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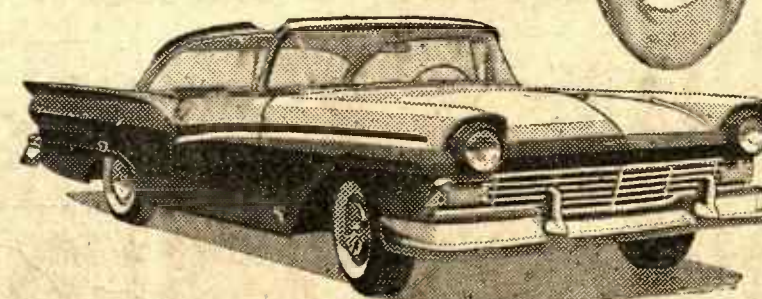

Babson Discusses Liability Insurance

Babson Park, Mass., August 15.
A friend of mine has a small retail store with two or three clerks. He has worked hard and accumulated a working capital of \$15,000. Recently a customer suffered a peculiar accident in the store. A jury awarded the customer \$20,000. This Roger W. Babson not only wiped out the savings of a lifetime, but it put the owner into debt which may result in bankruptcy.



Insurance Agents
We are solicited continually by life insurance agents. And if we have a mortgage on our store, or owe the bank anything we must show in our statement how much fire insurance we carry. In fact, both life insurance and fire insurance are recognized by every retailer and home owner as "musts." The only question seems to be as to the friend to whom we will give the business and the amount which we are to carry.

I especially recommend what is known as the "comprehensive" policy! This includes most casualty risks other than life insurance. Unfortunately, less than 10 per cent of the people use these comprehensive policies. My appeal today, therefore, is for every retailer to take out a liability policy and to make it large enough.

Stores Vs. Wives
Not only should retailers take

out liability insurance for their stores, but also for their wives and children. A woman neighbor of mine had a hat with a protruding feather which put out the eye of another woman during a crowded retail sale. The jury awarded the woman \$25,000, and tried to involve the retailer. In another case, a parent was awarded \$10,000 because his boy got hurt by running into a person while sliding down a hill in winter. A milkman who stepped on a broken board collected \$5,000. I could give scores of similar illustrations!

The point I especially want to make is that you will probably have to ask for such insurance. Telephone your agent today for prices and a sample policy. Read this policy carefully, especially the fine print. If the price seems too high, ask another agent to submit his price and a sample. Life insurance premiums are very competitive and vary little; five insurance premiums are fixed by State Commissions at very low rates; but liability rates vary considerably.

Insurance Stocks As Investments
Stocks of life insurance companies are the most popular and have had a great rise in price during the past few years. Stocks of most fire insurance companies are selling below their book values. Owing to the tendency of State Commissions to hold down rates (perhaps unfairly sometimes) they are not making the money they should. However, they have excellent managements and ample reserves and I believe will some day be treated

fairly. Of this reason I am now buying fire insurance stocks while they are cheap. I have never liked accident insurance stocks.

Juries And Gravity
Probably the most money might be made (or lost) from the stocks of casualty companies. Their gross business will continue to grow. While thus far we have hated to sue our friends or neighbors, it is fast becoming the thing to do! Most lawyers will take such suits on a retainer basis, perhaps for a two-hundred-dollar fee but with the understanding they are to receive 25 per cent if they win the case. Juries are becoming constantly more generous in their awards, due to the rise in the cost of living, increased wages, and the depreciation of the dollar.

There is little argument about life insurance awards; a person is either dead or not dead. Damage from fire can also be fairly well ascertained. Moreover, "wonder drugs," new hospitals, and better doctors are constantly working to help life insurance profits; and sprinkler companies, fire-alarm companies such as Gamewell, and others are working to prevent losses. Furthermore, the Gravity Research Foundation, in N. H., is working to prevent accidents, 80 per cent of which come from falls. Occupational accidents are generally covered by compulsory insurance with fixed standard rates and compensations.
