WHENCE COMETH OUR AID?

Since the end of the Second World War, the taxpayers of the United States have poured out in foreign aid \$62 billion over the face of the globe. There are now funds appropriated but unspent amounting to \$8 billion, and this amount of course will eventually be spent—who ever heard of a bureaucratic agency turning money back into the Federal Government? This will make a total of \$70 billion. The Senate and the House are now in the process of trying to agree on how much will be appropriated for this year, and the prospects are it will be about \$3.5 billion. This would increase the total to \$73.5 billion.

Why have the American taxpayers been so liberal with their money, taking on this additional tax load, increasing their national debt by this amount, doing without things they would like to have for themselves?

A number of reasons have been advanced and have been argued pro and con, but there is probably an underlying reason that is generally overlooked; namely, that the taxpayers do not quite connect themselves individually with this money, that they feel it is the Federal Government spending this money and that it is not coming out of their own pockets as taxes are garnered from the various states of the Union.

The taxpayers therefore do not protest to their Congressmen enough about the expenditure of this money, and the Congressmen, hearing very little from their constituency and being constantly importuned by the Administration & by the bureaucratic agencies that handle the aid to furnish it, go ahead and vote its continuation on only a slightly diminished scale.

If the taxpayers ever gave the matter a second thought—and of

course deep in their hearts they know it is so—they would realize they include in the taxes they pay each year the entire amount expended for foreign aid. Perhaps it should be brought closer to home by relating foreign aid expenditures to the amount of taxes collected by the Federal Government in one particular state.

One percent of the total amount of taxes collected from all the states of the Union by the Federal Government is collected from the State of Alabama. This means that Alabama taxpayers have paid out in foreign aid since the end of World War II, including this year's appropriation, a total of \$735 million. For just this year the taxpayers of Alabama will pay out \$35 million in foreign aid. The people of Alabama could have put to right good use for their own needs that \$735 million spent for foreign aid during the past twelve years. They could use to great advantage the \$35 million they will spend for foreign aid this year in helping relieve their steadily increasing local tax burdens. This same illustration, of course, could be applied to each state in the Union.

Perhaps the solution of this "foreign aid forever" problem would be to place the appropriation authority in the hands of the various state legislatures! Who is to believe that the legislature of Alabama would have appropriated \$735 million for foreign aid during the past twelve years if this had been the case? Who is to believe the legislature would appropriate \$35 million for that purpose this year?

Why, then, are the Congressmen from the various states so docile about appropriating their constituents' hard earned tax dollars for this purpose? Do they also think it comes from the Federal Government and not from the taxpayers of the various states? We know better; they just don't get enough complaints from their constituents about it, so they keep on appropriating the money.

It is this very obscurity about the source of federal funds, however, that undoubtedly is the cause

of much of our large and wasteful Federal Government spending. Just the other day we noticed a newspaper item to the effect that a local chamber of commerce was quite exultant over getting a certain project approved by the Federal Government, and both the chamber of commerce and the newspaper were exuberantly pointing out that three-fourths of the funds required were being furnished by the Federal Government. Where do they think the Federal Government got the funds?

Cotton Insects

Boll weevil infestation is very high and is causing some serious damage, especially in young cotton. Weevils are migrating heavily

at the present time and have been for the past two weeks. Do not stop poisoning cotton until the bolls in the top of plant is old enough that a weevil cannot damage. Weevils will damage bolls until they cannot be cut easily with a pocket knife.

If you can save one boll per ten ft. of row in a cotton field you will pay for your poison application. It doesn't cost to poison cotton—it pays.

Fall Outlook, Business Enthusiasm, Labor's Share Increase Discussed

Babson Park, Mass., August 22.
What is really causing the infla-
tion buildup and how can it be
arrested? Among causes suspect-
ed are the unchecked wage de-
mands of labor and the govern-
ment's earlier mistake in pressing
for easy-money policies.

Business Enthusiasm Declining

The way to
check the infla-
tion spiral, many
say, is through
credit restriction.
Certainly, with-
out the willing-
ness of business
and consumers to
assume debt,
there could not
have been the kind of spending
which has led to the expansion
and production seen in recent
years. Without these tonics neither
production nor prices could have
risen as they have.

Gradual inflation may continue
to the point where the turnover

of money will have finally reached
its limit. Should too many business-
es or consumers become sudden-
ly pessimistic with regard to con-
ditions, an about-face could occur
rather quickly. My personal pool
of businessmen gives indications
of waning confidence.

Labor's Share Increasing

Both businessmen and consumers
should understand that unbridled
spending cannot help but intensify
the inflationary threat. Is it possi-
ble that the only solution is tight-
er direct government controls for
all? But even if both the business-
man and the consumer should be-
come frightened by the inflation-
ary spiral, I believe the full ef-
fects need not be felt for several
months to come.

Despite the current business sen-
timent, production in June and
July about equaled the April and
May levels. Employment is up,
Retail Sales are ahead of totals for
last year at this time. The factory
work week, though slightly longer
at latest report, falls short of that
for the same period in 1956. The
increased number of hours worked
pushed weekly earnings in manu-
facturing up about 80c in June
over May to an average of \$82.59,
resulting in a year-to-year gain of
more than \$2 per week. Construc-
tion activity, which had been lag-
ging earlier in the year, is picking
up. Chemicals, rubber, and utili-
ties are on the uptrend. Gross na-
tional product has passed the \$430-
billion mark. Even with due allow-
ance for higher prices, all of the
foregoing suggests continued heavy
spending.

Important Statistics To Remember

Let us not forget certain basic
ingredients of our economy. Today,
we see about one million new
family formations per year, with
all the resulting wants and needs.
This compares with a figure of
500,000 in 1940. The longer life
span of our oldsters in adding a
large non-producing segment to
our population at one end; while
the high birth rates following
World War II are creating another
big group of dependents at the
other end. In the middle are the
workers, shrunken abnormally in
numbers by the low birth rate of
the depressed 1930's.

Upon this relatively small work-
ers force falls the burden of pro-

duction. The solution to the prob-
lem lies in a vastly increased rate
of output per worker—or in a de-
cline of total demand. Stepped-
up automation may be the real
answer—but this change will come
slowly. I therefore conclude that
Labor Leaders hold the reins; they
must be responsible for the ulti-
mate results. They, and the pol-
iticians who fear them, will sure-
ly cause a smash-up unless they
stop demanding constant wage in-
creases.

Remaining 1957 Months

Bonds are selling lower than
for over 20 years. This is not a
good sign. Stocks are not holding
up. Many commodities are slipp-
ing in price. Investment senti-
ment and reported earnings show
up well so far in July. I, however,
believe that readers will do well
to take profits and deposit the
money in banks where they can
get 3 per cent to 4 per cent await-
ing a good break in the stock
market.

Businessmen should gradually
get out of debt and prepare for
very severe and unprofitable com-
petition during the remaining
months of 1957. Either assured
peace or another war could start
a collapse. I "feel-in-my-bones" that
something unexpected may at any
time happen. I especially have in
mind the fear of either FALLOUT
or DISARMAMENT. Russia's best
defense at the present time is us-

ing the threat of fallout in trying
to force disarmament.

America's Richest Women Named

America's ten richest women—who are they? How much money do they have and how do they spend it? Are they happy? Who are they? They don't know themselves. Nor do their lawyers know; nor can they, their lawyers or their investment counselors say, even within the last \$10 million, just how wealthy they are because their fluctuating assets can only be estimated in round figures.

The September Ladies' Home Journal names the ten women who are probably the very richest and tells, briefly, their life stories. Those listed and their estimated fortunes are: Doris Duke, who acquired her father's American Tobacco Company fortune at age 21 (\$300 million); Mrs. Edsel Ford, heiress to Ford Motor Company millions and J. L. Hudson, Detroit department store (nearly \$300 million); Mrs. Merriweather Post, whose father developed and popularized Post Toasties and Grape-Nuts (\$250 million); Mrs. Horace Dodge Sr., widow of the motor car manufacturer (\$250 million); Mrs. Frederick E. Guest, whose father was a partner of Andrew Carnegie (\$200 million).

Worth between \$125 million and \$200 million are Mrs. Alfred I. duPont, whose husband's family got its start with a gunpowder mill on the banks of Brandywine Creek; Mrs. Charles Shipman Payson, the former Joan Whitney, sister of Jock Whitney, U.S. Ambassador to Great Britain; and Mrs. Mary G. Roebeling, one of the nation's ablest banking brains. Mrs. Chauncy McCormick, heiress of McCormick and Deering farm implement fortune, has an estimated \$120 million and Helena Rubinstein, the list's only self-made woman, has a personal fortune around \$100 million.

their fortunes? They can—and do—buy anything they want. But they spend more on helping crippled children, finding causes for diseases, relieving poverty and raising education standards than they do on themselves.

Are they happy? Most of them are unhappy about the publicity they get. They can't marry, have children, get divorced or write a check without getting attention, which always prompts letters asking "Why do you have so much money?" and "If you have so much, why can't you give me even just one million?"

The biggest problem of a woman of immense wealth is more personal. As one woman put it, it is "finding a place where she can feel she is needed and is doing something worthwhile enough to be interesting."

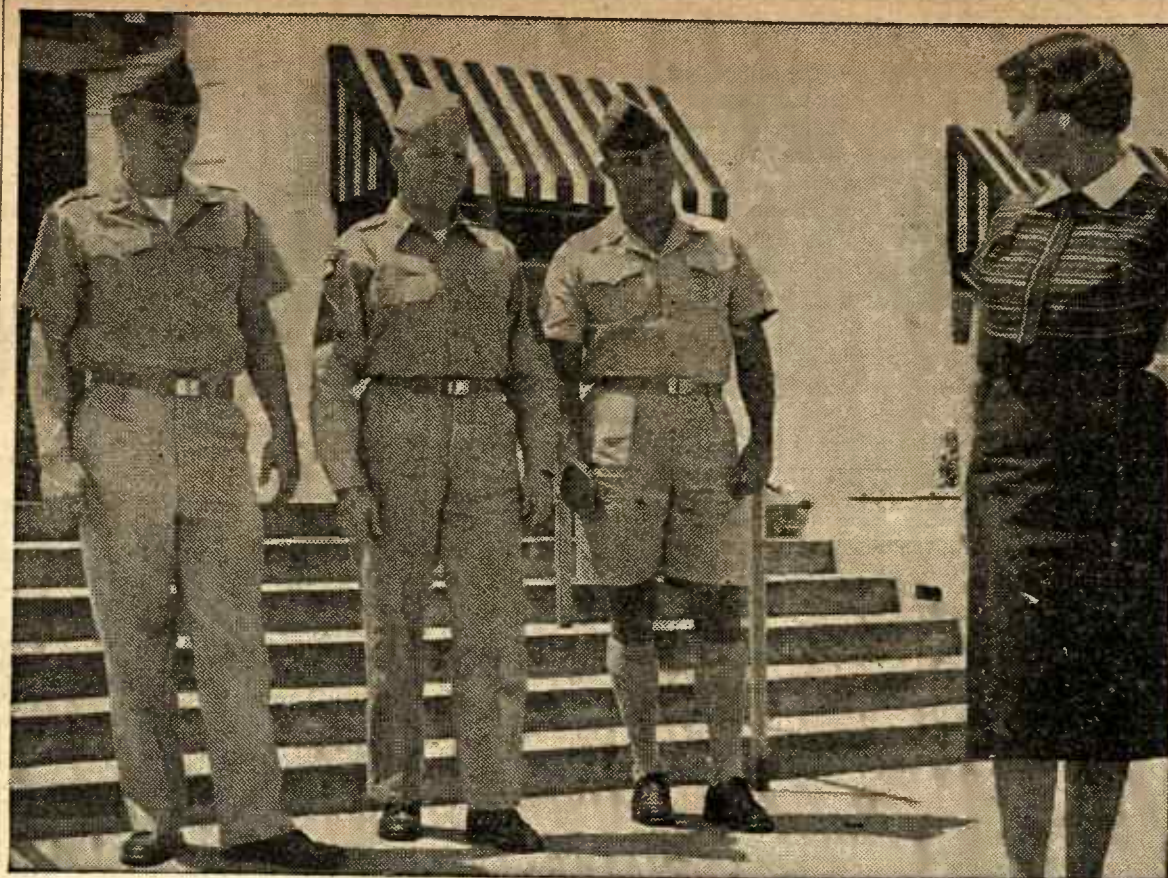

On July 15th Mr. R. C. (Skinny) Martin came by the soil conservation service work unit office, in Iuka, to talk over a Conservation Farm Plan.

When Skinny said he planned to increase his beef herd to 50 grown animals and 25 yearlings I whistled and raised my eye brows. "Oh! he said, 'You are wondering about my pasture aren't you?' I admitted that I definitely was. 'But I have 99 acres in pasture,' he said, and I replied, 'That's just half enough.'"

Mr. Martin is the type of a man that just bubbles over with good will and enthusiasm, and I could tell by the sparkle in his eyes that he had me in a close place. He, quick as a flash, said, "Now brother Jones, what is the difference if I make that half-enough pasture twice as good." I admitted there was no difference, but I still had my doubts as to how he could make his pasture twice as good as the average pasture. "Oh! that is easy, I nitrate and irrigate my pasture," said Skinny.

Sen. Stennis Last Week Introduced Legislation Which Would Prevent Allotted Cotton From Being Lost

In keeping with his past efforts to preserve all possible cotton acreage for our Mississippi farmers, Senator John Stennis last week introduced legislation which would prevent allotted cotton acres from being lost through underplanting.

Pointing out the real and urgent need for broad major cotton legislation, Senator Stennis said, "Most unfortunately, it is clear now, as we enter the closing days of this session of Congress, that there will be no new cotton legislation. However, we owe it to our farmers to take care of the serious problem of preserving their cotton acreage history. Acres once lost can never be regained."

"Our present acreage history laws are far too complex and technical to be understood and adequately followed by those for whom they were passed to help," the Senator said.

Allotments under present law are made on the basis of acres actually planted to cotton for the five latest years. When the complicated requirements for protecting acreage history are not fully met and underplanting occurs for any reason, then both the farmer and his county are forced to suffer a drop in the 5-year average of planted cotton acreage. Under the Stennis bill, acreage Under would be based on the average allotment of the last five years, rather than the average actually planted for those years.

Prior to the 1957 crop, acreage shifts between the states had resulted in considerable acreage loss to the State of Mississippi. The Stennis Amendment of 1956 to prohibit any wide shifts between states for the years 1957 and 1958 saved Mississippi cotton farmers

afford to go to the expense of buying irrigation equipment and use it just to irrigate pastures for the production of beef. Sign-Up Period For Practice Approval On Cover Crop, Sept. 1 Thru Sept. 10

Sign-Up Period for practice approval on Cover Crop, Practice D-1, for 1958 ACP Program will begin September 1, 1957 and close September 10, 1957 as announced by Mack Sanders, Chairman of Tishomingo County A.S.C. Committee.

"All farmers in Tishomingo County who are interested in sowing Winter Cover Crops on your farm this fall must visit the A.S.C. Office in Iuka and make application for your seed and fertilizer. Remember the date September 1, 1957 through September 10," Mr. Sanders said.

"Immediately after the closing date of September 10, the county Committee will review the requests and approve all or part of your requests then you will be notified to come and get your material," he continued.

He further stated, "a number of changes have been made in our 1958 ACP Program. Listed below are these changes: (1) Reducing Cost-Shares for specified units of certain practices from 80 per cent to 65 per cent of the average cost of performing the practice. (For example: You remember you could have one 80 per cent practice during the 1957 program year. Now under the 1958 Program you will only get 65 per cent for your practice.) (2) Reduce Cost-Share rates for pasture practice to 50 percent of the cost. (3) Increase Cost-Shares rates on Cover Crop Practice from 35 percent to 50 percent of the cost. (4) Eliminate Cost-Shares for land-clearing under pasture practices. (5) Require seeded preparation under improving pasture only when seed are added. (6) Increase the Minimum Requirements of Basic Slag from 1,250 pounds to 1,538 pounds per acre for All Pasture Practices where Basic Slag is used to meet the Liming Requirements. (7) All Mechanical Practices such as, Ponds, Ditches, Terraces are reduced to 50 percent of the cost of carrying out the practice."

NOTE: In order for the 1957 and 1958 Programs to operate concurrently in the Fall of 1957 the 1957 ACP Handbook has been amended to agree with the 58 ACP Program. So, as the August 15, all Cost-Sharing for practices carried out on your farm will be the same rate as announced above in the 1958 ACP Program.

Timber in The South

By Collins M. Akin, Area Forester
Protecting Shade Tree Pines from Bark Beetles

Bark beetles destroy shadetree and ornamental pines throughout the south. They normally breed in weakened trees and kill them by girdling beneath the bark.

Three species, known as IPS engraver beetles, are the most common culprits. They differ in size and in their living habits. As might be expected, the smallest IPS infests the branches of the upper crown; the medium-sized species prefers the lower bole. Sometimes each species works independently; sometimes all three bore into the bark at about the same time. Off-bark attack in sequence, killing first the smaller branches and finally the entire tree.

IPS beetles prefer weakened pines, especially those affected by bark injuries, trampled roots, and, most important of all, a scarcity of water. A dry spell provides ideal conditions for bark beetles attack. Pines planted as shadetrees usually are growing under conditions that are less favorable than the natural forest environments. The soil often lacks essential nutrients, and driveways, sidewalks, and packed-down earth prevent the necessary amount of water from reaching the roots. Wounds from pruning, lawn mowers, lightning, and signs and fences nailed to trees add further attraction to the beetles.

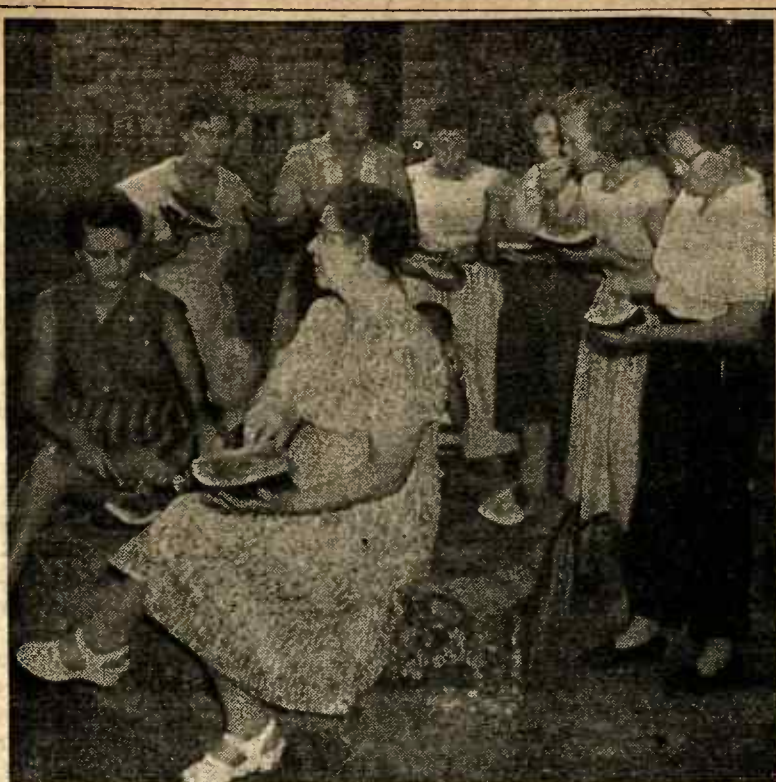
SYMPTOMS—The first indications of bark beetle activity is the presence of numerous, small, gum-like masses of pitch on the

color are observed before these earlier signs are noticed. The needles soon fade from green to yellow, then to orange, red, and finally brown. Generally these changes occur over the entire crown, but sometimes one branch after another dies until all of the foliage becomes discolored.

When bark is removed from infested trees, tunnels cut by the insects are exposed. The shiny-brown to almost black beetles, less than 1/4 inch long, may be seen crawling in the tunnels or boring through the bark. Once IPS beetles become established, there is little chance of the pine recovering. It should be cut while the foliage is still green or just beginning to fade, and all infested material removed, sprayed, or burned before the new brood of beetles escapes. When the tops have turned red, the brood will have left and other trees may be infested.

If there is a general likelihood of infestation, as during a dry summer, or if nearby pines are being attacked, insecticidal sprays will protect valuable shadetrees for periods of several months. If the trees are small, or if only one or two trees are to be treated, a garden sprayer and ladder will serve the purpose. The bark of the entire trunk and larger branches should be thoroughly covered, until the spray begins to run off, with one of the following insecticides:

1. Benzene hexachloride emulsifiable concentrate (containing about 1 pound of gamma isomer per gallon) mixed in the proportion of one gallon of the insecticide in 10 gallons of water.

2. If the odor of benzene hexachloride, or particles of reddish boring dust lodged in bark crevices and at the base of the tree. Usually, however, changes in foliage color are objectionable, lindane, the more expensive and highly refined form of benzene hexachloride, may be desirable. Mix 1 gallon of lindane emulsifiable concentrate (containing 2 pounds of actual lindane per gallon) in 20 gallons of water. Both of these insecticides may be obtained through farm supply stores or other dealers in insecticides. Prepared pine beetle sprays are now on the market.

Benzene hexachloride and lindane are poisonous. Safety precautions, as indicated on the container, should be followed. Keep insecticide off skin and away from eyes and nose. Wash carefully with soap and water after applying spray.

To help make pines less attractive to bark beetles, avoid injuring the bark or pruning the branches during the summer months or whenever dry conditions prevail. Shadetree pines growing under poor circumstances should be fertilized and watered to encourage healthy growth. Commercial fertilizers, having a composition such as 5-10-5, may be broadcast evenly over the entire area beneath the crowns at the rate of 5 to 10 pounds per 1,000 square feet and watered well into the soil. One or two treatments each year are generally sufficient. Fertilizers should preferably be applied in February or November, and should be kept off exposed roots, tender bark, and foliage. During years of normal rainfall, there is less danger from bark-beetle attack, except when trees are struck by lightning or otherwise damaged. Especially during dry spells, IPS beetles also destroy pines growing in the forest. Control under forest conditions is different upon preventing spread rather than protectively spraying standing trees. Rapid removal of infested trees or cutting and spraying the infested bark with benzene hexachloride in diesel oil (instead of in water as with shade trees) is effective. Stir one gallon of benzene hexachloride (containing about one pound of gamma isomer) into 50 gallons of No. 2 diesel oil and thoroughly spray all surfaces of infested material until the spray begins to run off. Turn logs and tops, if necessary, to cover the under side.

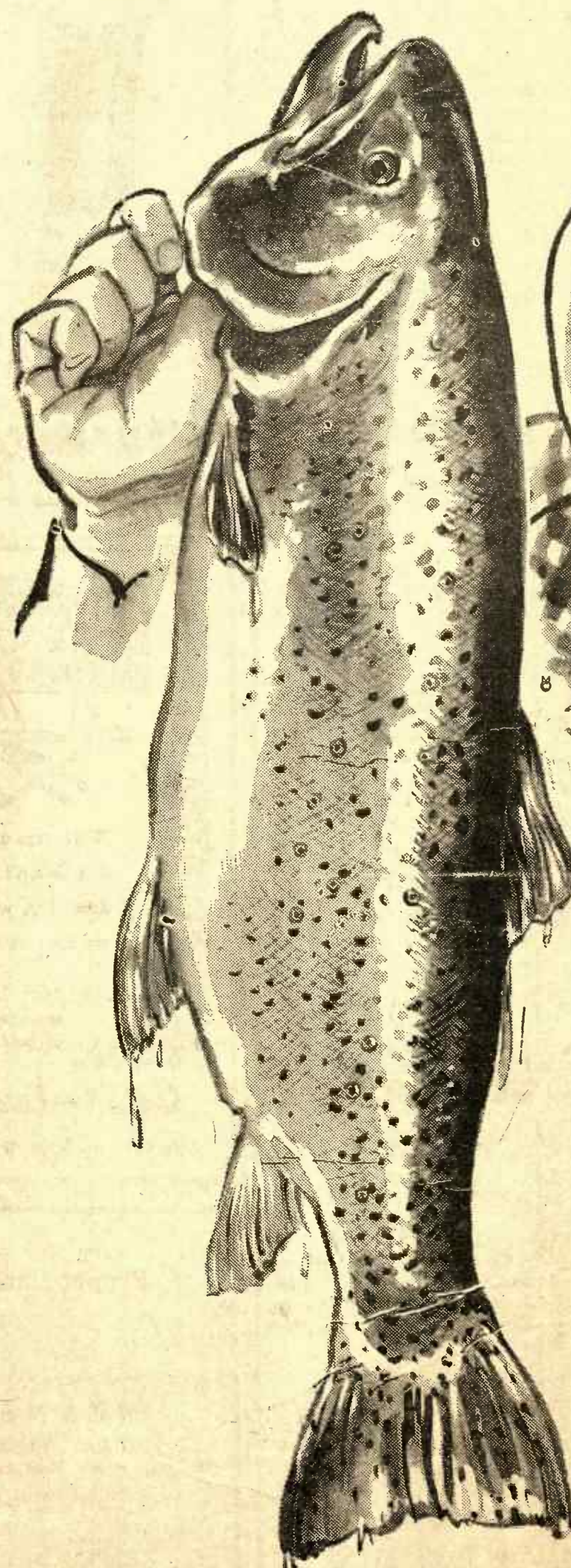

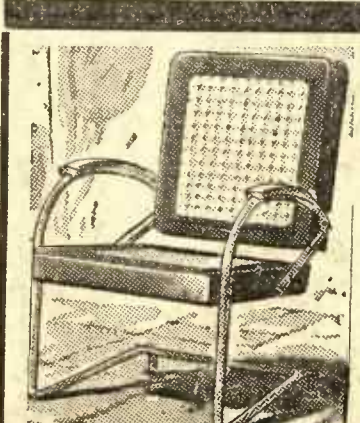

Approximately fifty guests were on hand to view the lovely assortment of gifts that were opened and displayed following refreshments.

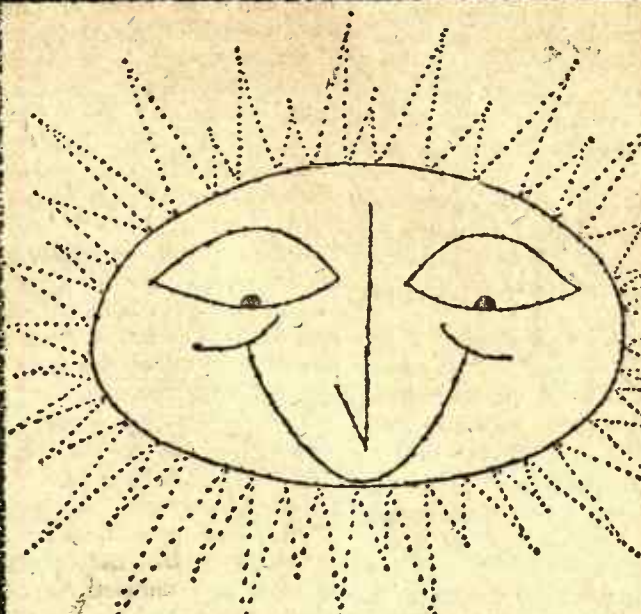

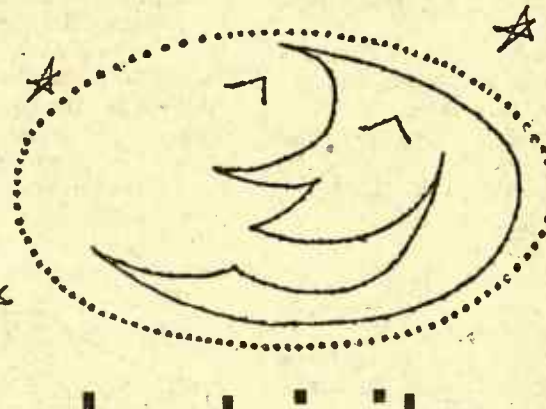

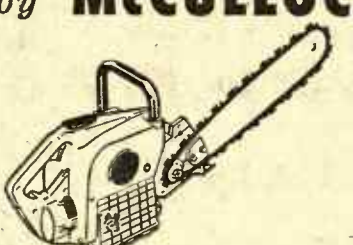
