They realize that civic and commercial development of a community go hand-in-hand, and that a newspaper is needed to give direction to community progress.

In fact, the newspaper is often the integrating force which establishes a trade area. It is the major builder of the community spirit and loyalty to local institutions which convert a group of

Ratings of various phases of the sanitation program include: raw to plant 95.63; pasteurization plant 97.99; pasteurization milk 97.20; and enforcement rating method 99.00.

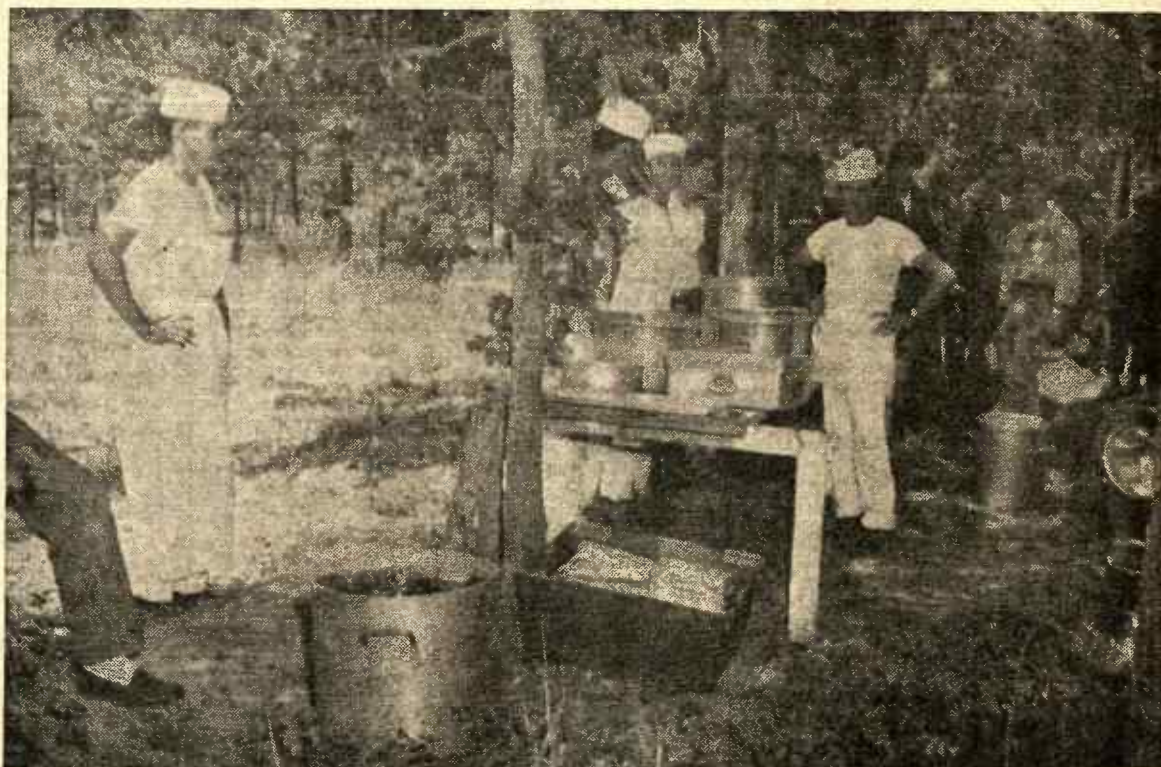

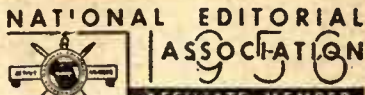

SENSING THE NEWS

"GONE ARE THE DAYS"

Have we, as the youngsters say, "gone off our rocker" in this country? Have we lost our equilibrium? What has become of our light-hearted banter, our practice of giving and take, our tolerance, our traditional American sense of humor? Something has happened—we

know that. We are too sensitive, we are too easy to take offense, other people might think, both at home and abroad.

This attitude and this state of mind is perhaps expressed as well as anywhere else in the overworked use we have made in recent years of the phrase, "race, color, creed or national origin." For fear that someone might take offense, designation by any of these classifications is just about taboo.

What is wrong with "race, color, creed or national origin?" Actually, there is something wrong with anyone who is not proud of his race and his color and his creed and his national origin. There is something wrong with the state of mind of a nation that will not face the reality of these characteristics on the part of its individual citizens.

The Lord made different sorts of people, they happened to be born in different countries, and it is their privilege to adopt different creeds. Any attempt to ignore these

facts is to adopt the communist philosophy of ignoring God in the affairs of man and reduce everybody to a common denominator, make everybody a mass without individuals, and act as if we were wiser than God.

The result of such procedure is to eventually produce a sort of thought control by an impersonal state, a complete censorship and a burning of books, thus throwing those who live thereunder into a "dark age" of their own.

So far, in our country, we haven't seen much book burning as yet, but we have seen a lot of word burning, and if we keep on the way we are going book burning will inevitably follow.

No longer may the fine old songs of Stephen Foster, written with complete affection and beloved for years by millions, be carried over the national networks in their original state. Words must be changed; no more race and color! In fact, "Old Black Joe" just cannot be used at all, because it would be rather awkward to say "Old An Undetermined Color Joe." So indeed, as the song says, "Gone are the days when our hearts were young and gay." Old Black Joe was a patient, lovable old character, but we'll just have to forget him.

"Massa" is no longer in the "cold, cold ground"—it's "That Man Who Used to Direct Our Activities" who is in the cold, cold ground, if he is to be mentioned at all! The "darkies" are no longer "gay" in "My Old Kentucky Home"—they just aren't there. Neither do the "darkies" bemoan the fact they are "far, far from home" in "Swanee River"—they are not there to bemoan anything.

Joel Chandler Harris was one of the most lovable, kindly writers in American literature. His "Uncle Remus Stories" have given untold pleasure to countless thousands of children and grown-ups alike. So far as we know, the book has not been burned—but perhaps it just as well have been, because we never hear of it anymore. Tell the story of "Br'er Rab-

bit and the Tar Baby"—heavens forbid! What the children of this day and time are missing!

Some of the finest, most humorous stories ever written were by a Jewish boy born in Charleston, S. C., with the scenes laid in Birmingham, Ala. and centered around Negro characters in that city. They were carried for years by a national magazine. Can anyone imagine such stories being used now! The author is still living, but he has gone into a different kind of writing.

These are just a few of many illustrations that could be cited as to what is happening in this country in the name of "race, color, creed or national origin." Thus, as freedom is often crucified in the name of democracy—witness the Iron Curtain countries who claim they live under democratic governments—so, in the name of tolerance are we seeing intolerance intensified in our own country. Are we going to keep on swallowing this communist line? What has happened to us? Have we lost our balance wheel?

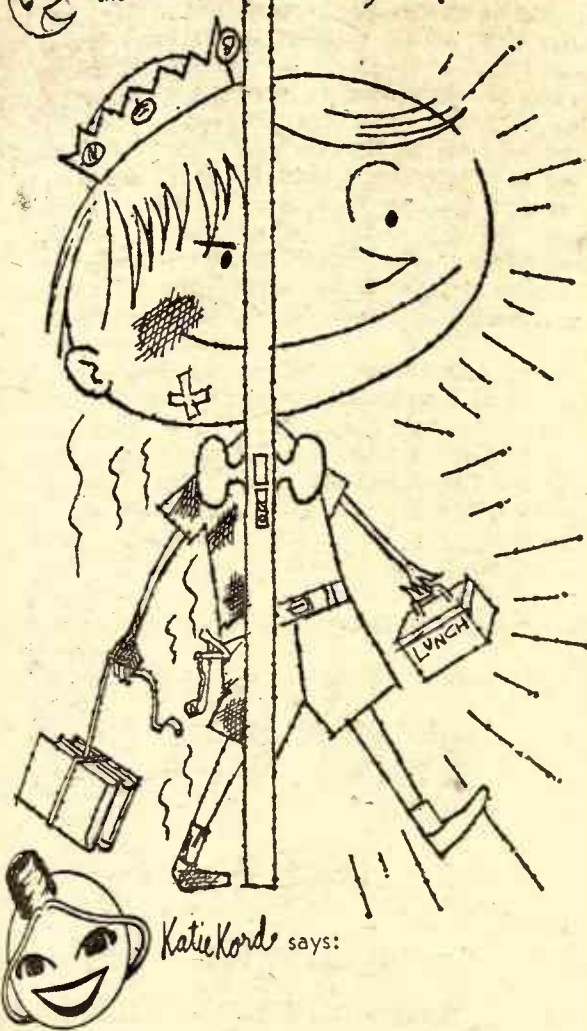
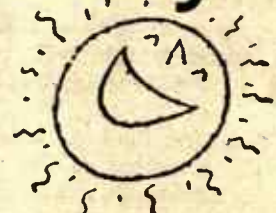

Shopping Center, City And Town Government Topics Of Discussion

Babson Park, Mass., August 29.
Merchants ask me as to the future
of Shopping Centers. My answer
is that each must
be judged on its
own possibilities
according to loca-
tion, surround-
ings, and "back-
bone." They al-
so ask whether
we are facing ei-
ther World War
merchandise or Disarma-
ment.

THREE RULES FOR SUCCESSFUL SHOPPING CENTERS

The first requirement is that
each one must have a strong back-
bone or core in the form of a
large, successful, and well-known
department store or supermarket.
The second requirement is that
each Shopping Center should be
able to support itself on the sub-
urban development surrounding
it.

The third requirement is that it
must be well financed.

Certainly the well-established
downtown stores of nearby cities
must wake up. These new Shopping
Centers are started and operated
by active young men. Too many
of the leading stores in adjoining
cities are coasting on the past
work and policies of a father or
grandfather. These older "Main
Street" stores are also now bene-
fitting from valuable locations se-
lected years ago. But good locations
are not permanent. Every city is
slowly growing in some one direc-
tion. The most valuable downtown
"four corners" is gradually moving.
Even good will is temporary. The
founder of the business could al-
ways be found (excuse the pun) at
his store, but his children and
grandchildren have too often "gone
out to lunch" or are at some cock-
tail party.

City And Town Governments

Some Shopping Centers are pro-
fitable because of the jealousies,
stupidities, and shortsightedness
of the nearby local city govern-
ments. Different councilmen self-
ishly favor different sections. As
a result, nothing is done until the
Shopping Center draws business
away from all sections.

As all merchants are dependent

upon the production of the con-
sumers of their community, so
every consumer is dependent upon
these merchants. These merchants
are the life blood of all. If the
stores are profitable, every citizen
should be prosperous. If there are
many vacant stores, then the en-
tire community will suffer. I hope
that no newspaper editor will say:
"But this does not apply to us.
We are too small." Let me reply
that my comments are more im-
portant to the small communities
because they can now avoid the
trouble from which the larger
cities are suffering, plus possible
Fallout threats.

Parking Is The Great Problem

The automobiles may be robb-
ing your city of money by send-
ing away so much money collect-
ed for cars and gasoline. These
automobiles demand parking priv-
ileges. If parking space is not pro-
vided, they can block traffic, hand-
icap productive industry, and
choke every other business. Small
cities and towns have not yet
suffered from this economic blight;
but it is on its way. Every com-
munity will some day surely suffer
from lack of parking space unless
a courageous and farsighted local
some relief from taxation. Mer-
chants are the veins through which
the blood of the city flows from
producer to consumer. When mer-
chants are not prosperous, the
community suffers from "high
blood pressure." Instead of reduc-
ing taxes on vacant stores, the
taxes thereon should be increased
until the owner gets them rented.
Every merchant should buy the
building which he successfully oc-
cupies.

Capitalizing The Evenings

The most practical way for com-
munities to lick Shopping Centers
is to capitalize the evenings and
encourage stores to keep open
longer. Every live merchant should
keep his store fully lighted throu-
ghout the evening. Next to good
newspaper advertising, bright
lights are the best "fertilizer" for
merchants to use.

Some readers believe that old-
fashioned two-and-three-story office

buildings may be demolished and
our business streets may consist
only of modern, one-story build-
ings without a basement. I don't
believe this. I believe that the se-
cond & third stories will be devel-
oped into apartments for ambi-
tious clerks who work in the stores
below or nearby. These clerks will
be responsible for their respective
stores for the evening, perhaps up
to midnight. In Europe many suc-
cessful bankers and merchants
themselves live over their stores
and are available at any time, day
or night.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: 11 Kings 22:1-23:30; II Chronicles 34:35.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 119:57-64.

In Capitols
Lesson for September 1, 1957

PEOPLE in capitols have tremendous power. A President, a senator, a parliament, a cabinet member . . . whether it is the county court house or the world-renowned capitol building of a mighty nation, the people who work under the dome, just because they work there, have a leverage for moving public opinion, for getting things done on an immense scale, a power far greater than any one of them has by himself. The man there in his office, or in his seat in the legislative chamber, may be, and usually is, a man of parts, a man above the average in personality and ability. But however able the man under the dome may be personally, his office gives him even greater power. The voice of the man who was elected carries more weight than the voice of the man he defeated.

November is Coming
The ancient Hebrews were a democratic people in some ways, but in others they were most unlike us. At the time of King Josiah the kingship was by no means an elective office. "And his son reigned in his stead" is the regular formula. So the Hebrews had at that time nothing to say about who should be their kings. They took whatever son the royal harem produced first. For good ones (there were some) they thanked God, and for the bad ones they were thankful they were no worse. King Josiah, whose story may be read in the Background Scripture, was one of the outstanding good kings. But it was custom and tradition that made him king, not the people. With us it is different. The people have to decide who shall occupy our places of great power. November is coming.

many will be elected, many more defeated, in our American elections. It is not too soon to ask ourselves seriously, what kind of men do we want under our capitol dome? Sometimes the choice offered us makes us discouraged so that we stay at home and don't vote. But even if all we have is a choice between two third-raters, a good third-rater is better than a poor one. If we have good men in our capitols, it is our responsibility to see that they get there.

Little Capitols

It's a peculiar thing, but often true, that although candidates for local offices can be better known than those for state or national office, rascals and ne'er-do-wells are more often elected to the small offices than to the large ones. For some reasons, local government gets less attention from the voters than it should. The mayor of a single large city, today controls more power over more people than King Josiah ever did. It is in the "little capitol" if you like, the county court houses for example, that public affairs sometimes take the wrong turn. Where there is a public program well conceived and organized, it can look good as a public law, it can look good as it comes to the states . . . but when it goes through the local court-houses it can turn into some pretty rotten trickery. In a certain state not long ago federal funds for a very good purpose had to be cut off from a dozen or more counties because the officials there had been lining their pockets with easy money. It's a poor voter, one with a small sense of responsibility, who takes pains to elect good senators and presidents, but who when it comes to voting the local ticket, just says, Oh well . . . and votes straight because it's easiest.

Capitols Can't Do It All

The sad truth is, King Josiah's reforms didn't stick. They didn't, because they were reforms from the top. Even an absolute monarch can make his country no better than his people want it to be. It is true, we ought to have the best officials, from town to county to state to nation, that we can elect; but even if they were all praying, intelligent, devoted Christians, they cannot make this a better country merely by passing laws. Like Josiah, our men in government can make this a better country. Only if we the people want to have it so.

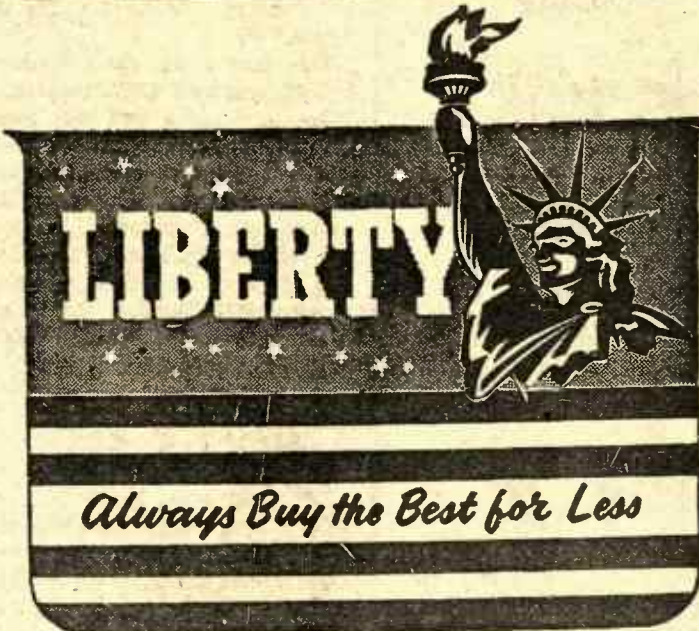
