COUNTY LONG-RANGE SCHOOL PROGRAM APPROVED BY STATE

\$80,000.00 Bond Issue To Be Held Within A Few Weeks In County

The Tishomingo County Board of Education is in receipt of a letter from the State Educational Finance Commission in Jackson stating that the long range educational program for county schools had been approved by that state agency. Approval was made on August 9th.

The program, as set up by the county board and approved by the State Commission, included five attendance centers in the county exclusive of the Iuka school. These centers are: Tishomingo, Belmont, Burnsville and Holcut, with the fifth being the colored school which is to be located near Tishomingo. All attendance centers will teach grades from 1 to 12 inclusive.

Priority was also established by the State Educational Finance Commission as to building construction and repair for the five centers. The colored school that is to be located about one mile north of Tishomingo on Highway 25 was given first priority in that a completely new school plant will have to be built before school can be established.

\$80,000 Bond Issue
The four white attendance centers will get new class rooms, and, where needed, new gyms and cafeterias.
A \$550,000.00 school building program will be entered into as soon as a bond issue can be passed to raise the amount to be furnished by the county which is \$80,000.00. The state will put up \$470,000.00 and the county will furnish \$80,000.00 which will make the \$550,000.00 total. An election within five or six weeks for the \$80,000.00 bond issue will be held, according to County School officials.

Record Enrollment Creates Housing Problem At Iuka Schools; 625 To Date

Classrooms at Iuka schools are overflowing, states Superintendent H. L. Shook. A record enrollment of children has created a problem of much concern as to how they will be taken care of. In some of the classrooms seats had to be secured from other schools.

On the second day of the 1957-58 school term 323 students enrolled in the Elementary School. Last year for the first four days of the 1956-57 school session only 292 students were enrolled. This year the first grade has 55 pupils; the second, 37; the third, 71, the fourth, 59; the fifth, 47 and the sixth grade 54.

In the High School there are 302 students enrolled compared with 285 for the first four days of last year. In the seventh grade there are 50 pupils; in the eighth, 27, which is the smallest enrollment this grade has had for several years; the ninth and tenth grades each have 69 pupils; the eleventh, 50 and the twelfth 37. This makes a total enrollment of 625 for the Iuka unit. At the end of the first month last year there were only 598 pupils enrolled in the entire school.

Governor Coleman Schedules Television Appearances To Discuss Proposed Constitutional Convention

Governor J. P. Coleman, in a letter to the editor of this newspaper, outlined a schedule of a series of television appearances he will make in which he will discuss his proposed Constitutional Convention for the State of Mississippi.

The Governor's letter says, in part:
"Next week, I will commence a series of television appearances

during which I will discuss the pressing need for a Constitutional Convention in Mississippi.

"The television appearances which will be seen and heard in your area are as follows:

"Sept. 9, Monday, WTVV channel 9, Tupelo, 8:30 p.m.
"Sept. 10, Tuesday, WMCT channel 5, Memphis, 8:30 p.m.
"Sept. 10, Tuesday, WCBI channel 4, Columbus, 8:30 p.m.
"There has been considerable

misinformation circulated about the proposed Constitutional Convention and I welcome the opportunity in these public appearances to give the true facts regarding this most important issue."

For the past several months, Governor Coleman has been urging that a Constitutional Convention be held in order to bring that state instrument, which dates back to 1890, up to date by modernizing some of the antiquated laws.

Among some of the reasons the Governor has given for the convention are to improve the state's industrial program, to change some of the legislative processes, the legislative reapportionment of the state, and laws concerning the vital issue of Civil Rights.

Plans are to call a special session of the legislature the latter part of this year to set up machinery for the Constitutional Convention to be held next year.

THE LESSON OF FRANCE

There is an old saying I have heard all my life to the effect that, "Experience is a dear teacher, but fools learn by no other." The nation of France has been providing us, and is still providing us, with a perfect illustration of what happens to a country that

ignores the effects of inflation, constantly lives beyond its means and continues to provide its people with benefits for which they do not pay.

As a result, the currency of France is steadily heading toward worthlessness; the nation of France

ce, once a proud nation and a first-rate nation, is sinking lower and lower in influence in the councils of the world.

In many cases, the United States of America has ignored the example set by the nation of France. There is a tendency in many ways to continue to ignore it. Will we continue along this line? Will we be wise men or will we be fools? France did not profit from its own previous example of inflation which took place early in the 1700's. The nation was suffering a sort of depression at the time and upon the advice of John Law, who had been brought over from Scotland to doctor the Country's ailing finances, the King ordered the issuance of France's first paper money. It was a shot of inflation in France's economic arm, and at first it made the people feel real good; both prices and wages went up. The King thereupon got the idea that if a certain amount of paper money did so much good, twice that amount would do twice as much good, and so on. The end result was that the people fled from money into tangible goods, the currency became worthless,

and they had to start all over from scratch.

Of course, the suffering among the thrifty, the savers, the fixed income people was enormous, as is always the case under an inflationary system. In the final analysis, no one profited, everyone suffered; the nation suffered.

Whereas in olden days the monarchs clipped the coins—and at the same time clipped the people—for their own personal profit, now in modern days the governments of various nations have been clipping the people in another way. In order to get elected—or reelected—the politicians have been promising the people all sorts of benefits without regard to where the money was coming from. In order to make good on their promises, governments in the hands of such politicians have been printing money, disregarding balanced budgets, undergoing deficit financing and depreciating the currency.

Such has been the case with France for the last forty years. Their experience of 200 years before had by then faded out of their memory. The French franc forty years ago had an exchange value of five to the dollar, now it has reached an exchange value of 420 to the dollar—and it's the same franc! And considering the fact that the purchasing power of the dollar is less than half what it was forty years ago, one can

readily see what has happened to the French currency.

The French people have been getting all sorts of social benefits and all sorts of subsidies of various kinds for so long that they now refuse to do without them. Yet, in order to continue providing them, France cannot balance its budget, just as it has not balanced its budget for many years.

Even under all these circumstances and with the French government and the French people in full possession of the facts and surely aware of what is happening to them, when the 1953 budget was first drafted it called for expenditures of \$16.3 billion, whereas estimated income amounted to only \$21.1 billion! Under the leadership of the new Finance Minister, Felix Gaillard, the budget has now been reduced to \$14.8 billion expenditures and tax changes make income total as estimated \$12.5 billion—but this still leaves a deficit of \$2.3 billion, 15½ per cent of the total budget. In view of past experience, though, it is to be doubted that the French people will submit to the restrictions of even this budget.

Moreover, all this has come about in spite of enormous economic aid from the United States since the end of the Second World War. France is rapidly going broke; it is just about as broke now as any major nation can be. This

is what happens to nations as well as individuals when they live beyond their means, buy things they cannot afford. The lesson of France is clear.

Christmas Gifts Very Important To American Servicemen Overseas

With American servicemen overseas who know, it's dough, in one form or another, for Christmas, American Red Cross field directors have learned.

The servicemen far away from home have some definite likes and dislikes concerning gifts from families and friends, and the field directors are passing these ideas along to the sisters and the cousins and the aunts of the servicemen.

"Dough, in one form or another, is the top item on the wanted list with the men in my outfit," one serviceman in Europe said. "The guys who don't want it is the form of a postal money order would like it in the shape of homemade cakes or cookies."

American servicemen around the world, by the way, say money orders are much easier to cash than are checks, for which a fee usually is charged.

Servicemen in the Far East, too, say that as a Christmas gift from stateside "there's nothing better than some good, homemade cookies."

They say they would like their folks back home to remember that cookies, and candy, too, should be individually wrapped in foil paper, packed well, preferably in tins, and sent by air mail.

Aside from money and food, servicemen everywhere most enjoy receiving anytime those little mementos of life back home—photographs of the children, the family

and the pets, subscriptions to magazines and to hometown newspapers. They prefer the papers be sent by air mail so that they'll reach the servicemen while the news is still "new."

In Europe and the Middle East, servicemen said they would like to receive such gifts as civilian sport shirts, jackets and other non-military wearing apparel of the new synthetic fabrics which ease the laundry problem when traveling, plastic playing cards, heating pads, electric blankets, and cigars—

On the undesirable list in Europe are such items as cigarettes, watches, ties, cameras and sporting goods. PXs there usually are stocked so well with these items at bargain prices that the servicemen do not want their families to buy them in the states.

Many servicemen in the Caribbean area, where water sports are on a year-round basis, said they would like to receive skindiving or other swimming clothes and equipment as well as various types of fishing gear. Other preferred gifts include civilian shirts, phonograph records and hobby accessories.

Servicemen with families in the Canal Zone, where they say the toy supply is limited, suggested that toys be sent for their children. They wanted their families at home to know that jewelry, cameras and watches are plentiful and cheap in the Canal Zone.

Servicemen in Alaska listed food, candy, jackets and cameras—something they can use but do not own. They cautioned that their families should ask them to be sure not to duplicate something they already possess.

In Hawaii, servicemen stated their preferences for money, phonograph records, shaving kits, electric razors and cameras. They also cited civilian sports clothing suitable for the balmy Hawaiian climate, but warned against sending such items as sweaters and jackets.

Servicemen everywhere asked that families and friends use air mail for all letters—an all-time favorite from home.

They feel that many persons in the States seem to think that an APO address automatically guarantees a letter will be sent air mail with a three-cent stamp. They are very insistent that the folks at home put six cents in postage on letters—and on Christmas cards, too—because regular mail takes up to 40 days for delivery to such far away places as Korea and Turkey.

Finally, and importantly, the Post Office and Defense Department here advise that Christmas parcels should be mailed between November 1st and 20th for delivery by surface mail—ship—to servicemen overseas and between December 1st and 10th for delivery by air mail. They urge that persons in this country should keep in mind that the farther away from the U.S. the serviceman is stationed, the earlier the parcels should be mailed to insure delivery to him before Christmas.

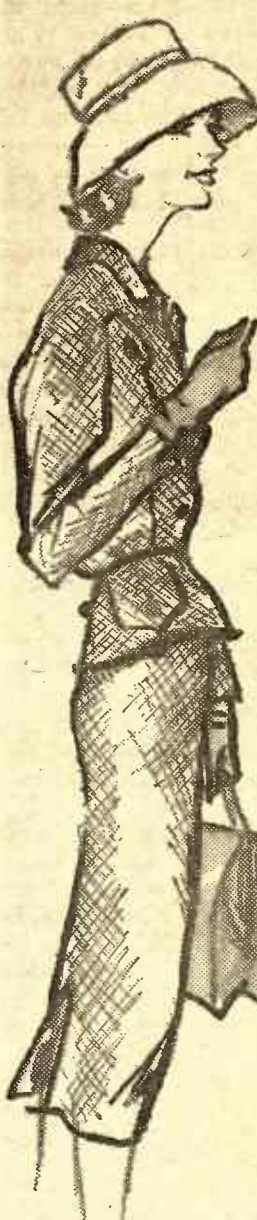

Parallel Terraces Are A Success

If you want to really know about a thing ask the person who has it, works with it daily, knows from experience all of its good and all of its bad points. This is as true about parallel terraces as it is about anything else.

Kenneth Mayhall has some parallel terraces on his farm, but there is no need to ask Kenneth about these terraces. He does know where they are on his farm just south of Belmont on highway 25, but he did not plow the cotton and the corn planted on the land where they are. The man to ask for information concerning them is Mr. Kenneth Embrey, the man who cultivated this land.

Mr. Embrey has a fine crop of corn and some nice cotton on this field. A few weeks ago Mr. J. C. Brooks, area conservationist, stopped by this field of beautiful hill corn to take some photographs and to find out how Mr. Embrey likes these new kind of terraces.

"I like parallel terraces," said Kenneth. Then Mr. Brooks asked why he liked them. "Oh! you mean the reason I like them bet-

ter than the old kind?" asked Mr. Embrey. "The main reason I like these parallel terraces better than the old standard type terraces is that I can plow all the way through from one side of my field to the other, all the rows are long rows, there are no short ones."

The answer is, "Yes." Parallel terraces are successful on land suited for their construction. There is some land, not much but some, in Tishomingo county where terraces would prove most helpful. They are needed there.

The Soil Conservation District Commissioners believe that farmers who have land suited for the construction of parallel terraces should have them. Also that such farmers should ask the local soil conservation service technicians to assist them in getting these terraces properly established on their land.

Mr. Kenneth Embrey says the parallel terraces in Tishomingo county are a success. He is the man who should know, because he is the man who cultivated the land where they are. If you are interested ask him about them.

In October, 1953, the Miss. Forestry Association set up a working agreement with the Southern Pine Association and the Miss. Forestry Council, thus the "Mississippi Tree Farm System" became a reality.

Mississippi's rise in 1955 to national leadership in number of certified tree farms has been no easy task, and the Forestry Association is deeply grateful to all who have assisted in bringing this distinctive honor to the Magnolia State.

At first, forest landowners were reluctant to join. Tree farm signs were supplied by the Southern Pine Association and were limited to 100 per year, for use in Mississippi. This limited the expansion of the program and a policy was set to select the most outstanding properties on well traveled roads so that the public could view the tree farm signs and the improved forest management practices being applied to the approved areas.

It became apparent in 1953 that the Southern Pine association would be unable to continue supplying tree farm signs and other materials. A committee was set up to work out a feasible plan to place tree farming in Miss., on a business like basis. James Craig, acting as chairman, presented a comprehensive "Tree Farm Manual" which was approved by the

Association and has served well in expanding the program. The manual provides, among other things, that the Miss. Forestry Assn. will maintain records, arrange for inspections and reappraisals, and procure tree farm signs and other materials. It further provides that the Association will supply suitable posts, nameplates and certificates. It is set out in the manual; that a \$3.00 service charge is to be collected for defraying expenses of making nameplates, erecting signs, etc.

This manual, or hand book, places full responsibility for financing operating and maintaining the "Mississippi Tree Farm System" on the Miss. Forestry Association. As a result of this new business-like approach, Tree Farm signs and materials can now be purchased when needed. Public tree farm award programs can now be planned without any limit as to number of signs available. The entire pro-

gram is financed locally and the record established for enlisting new properties in the certified tree farm program since the Mississippi manual was adopted is proof that the public has accepted the new look of tree farming.

The records show that during the nine and one-half year period when the old cooperative program was in operation, 433 tree farms were approved in Mississippi. By way of comparison, during the three and one-fourth years of operation by the Mississippi Forestry Association, 688 new tree farms have been added.

This new look in tree farm activity has placed Mississippi well past the tree farms in the nation.

The tree farm idea originated in the state of Washington in 1941. The National Lumber Manufacturers Association for a time promoted the movement nationally through publicity. The American Forest Products Industries, Inc., Washing-

ton, D. C., now assumes responsibility for promoting Mississippi Forestry Association on the activities of the American Forest Products Industries on the activities of the Mississippi Tree Farm Program.

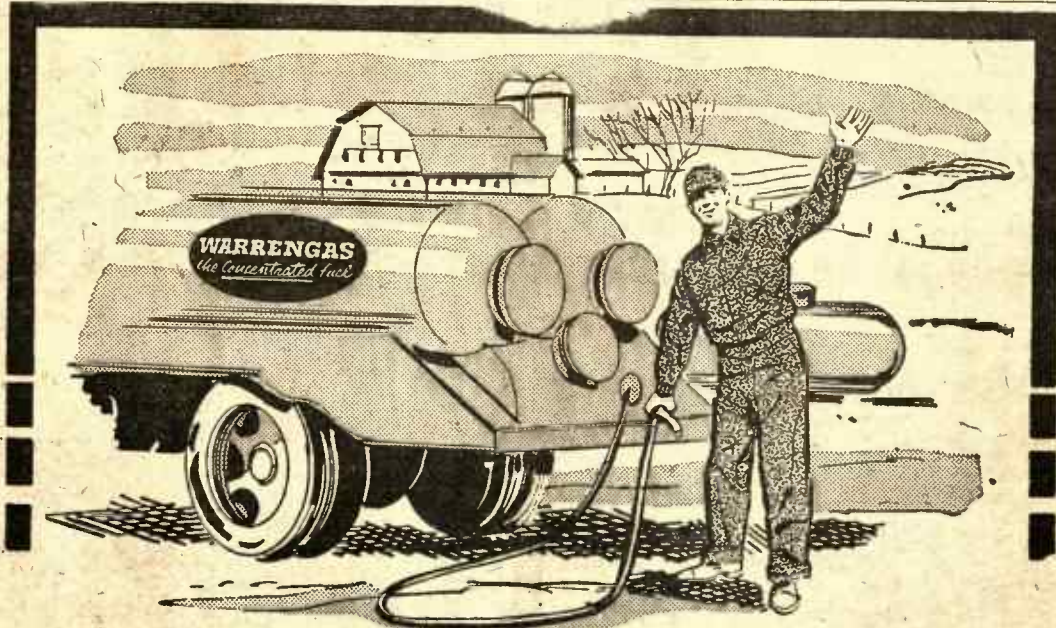

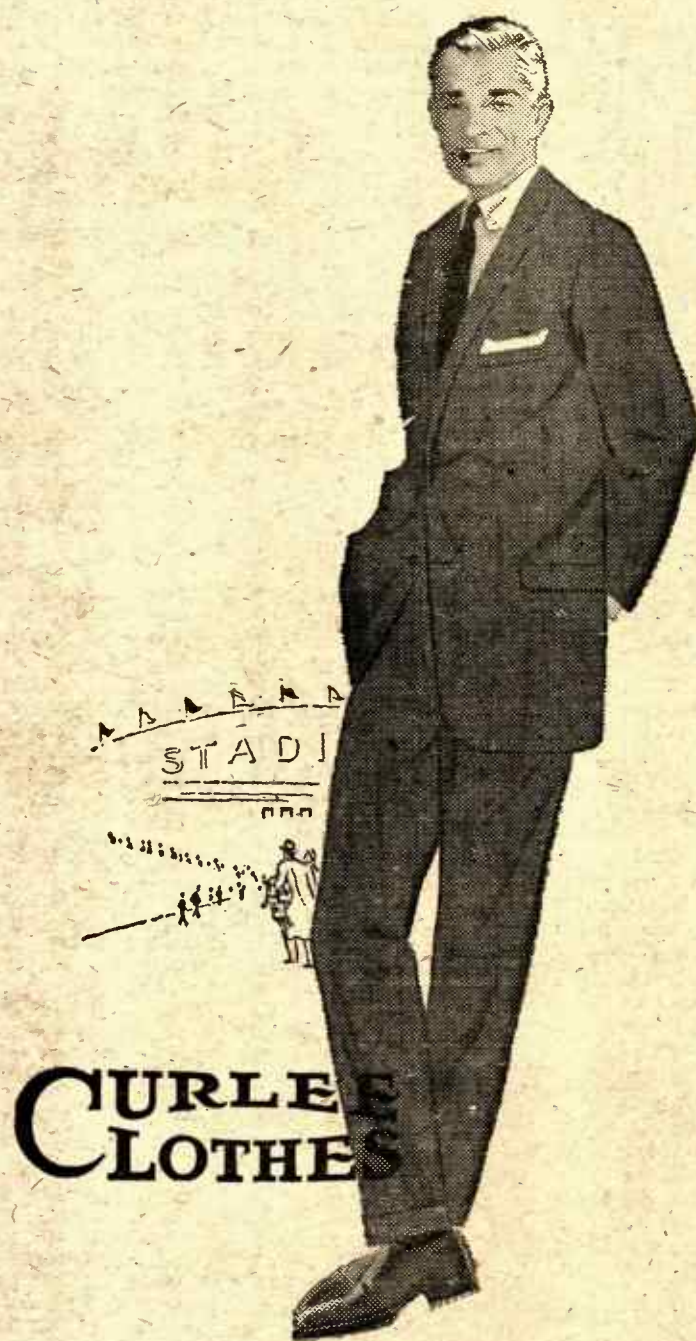

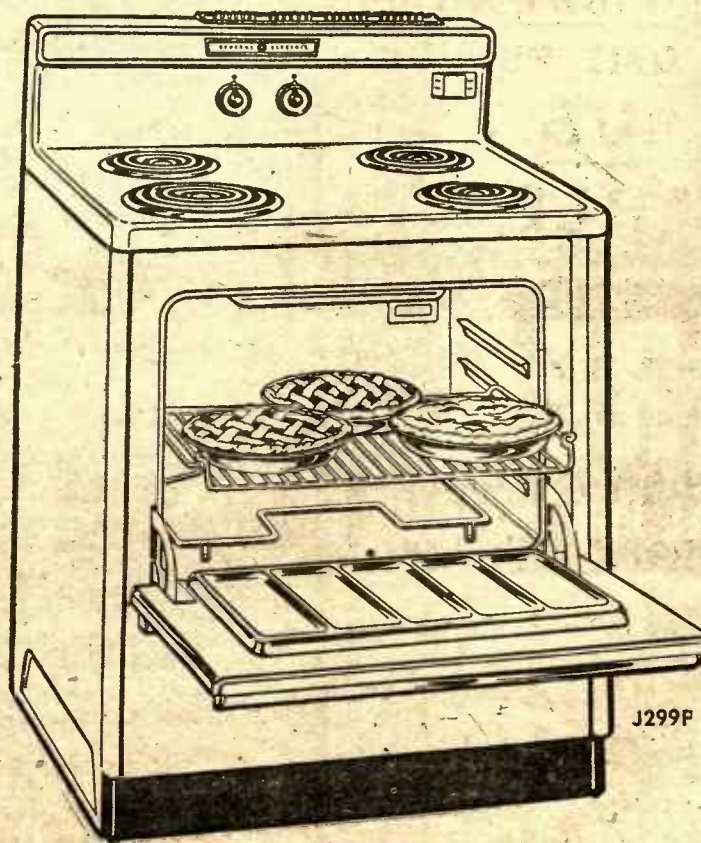

More Than 100,000 Received 1st SS Check In August

More than 100,000 severely disabled persons were made a little happier this August when they received the first of their monthly benefit checks from social security. Mr. Hugh Tigrett, manager of the Tupelo, Mississippi district office stated today.

These checks represent disability payments for the month of July as provided by the recent amendments to the Social Security Act. The 100,000 odd figure denotes only number of cases completed; Mr. Tigrett added, others are still being processed.

He pointed out that those who have filed an application but have not yet received notice of final action on their claim will get payments beginning with a payment for July if their claims are approved.

Mr. Tigrett also urged every disabled person in Tishomingo County who has ever worked in employment or self-employment covered by social security to contact his office for information as to his eligibility for payments if he has not already done so. For the convenience of people in Tishomingo County, a social representative will be at the Court House in Iuka on the first and third Mondays of each month.

Since Monday, September 2nd, is a National Holiday the Social Security Representative for this will be at the Court House on Wednesday, September 4th.

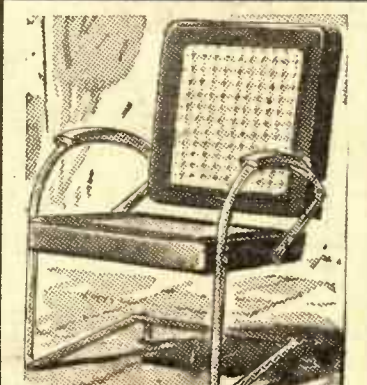

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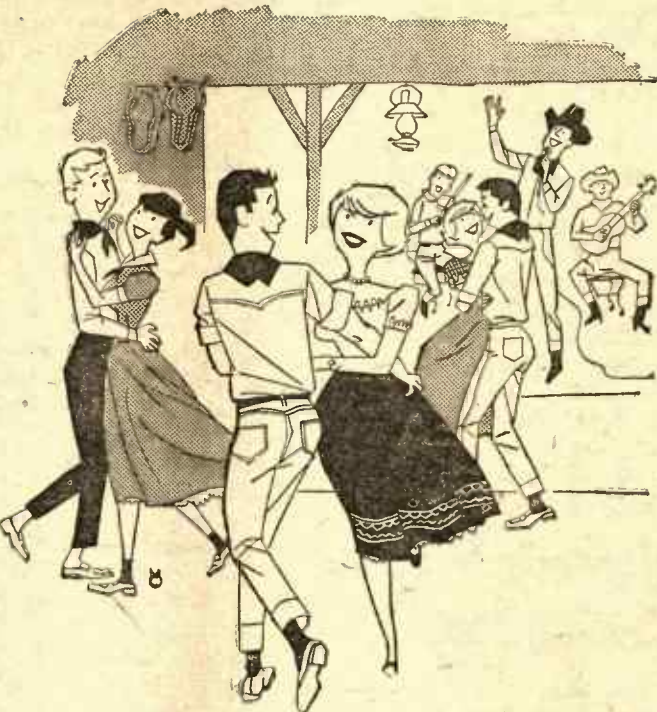

In Capitols

Lesson for September 1, 1957

PEOPLE in capitols have tremendous power. A President, a senator, a parliament, a cabinet member . . . whether it is the county court house or the world-renowned capitol building of a mighty nation, the people who work under the dome, just because they work there, have a leverage

for moving public opinion, for getting things done on an immense scale, a power far greater than any one of them has by himself. The man there in his office, or in his seat in the legislative chamber, may be, and usually is, a man of parts, a man above the average in personality and ability. But however able the man under the dome may be personally, his office gives him even greater power. The voice of the man who was elected carries more weight than the voice of the man he defeated.

November Is Coming

The ancient Hebrews were a democratic people in some ways, but in others they were most unlike us. At the time of King Josiah the kingship was by no means an elective office. "And his son reigned in his stead" is the regular formula. So the Hebrews had at that time nothing to say about who should be their kings. They took whatever son the royal harem produced first. For good ones (there were some) they thanked God, and for the bad ones they were thankful they were no worse. King Josiah, whose story may be read in the Background Scripture, was one of the outstanding good kings. But it was custom and tradition that made him king, not the people. With us it is different. The people have to decide who shall occupy our places of great power. November is coming; many will be elected, many more defeated, in our American elections. It is not too soon to ask ourselves seriously, what kind of men do we want under our capitol dome? Sometimes the choice offered us makes us discouraged so that we stay at home and don't vote. But even if all we have is a choice between two third-raters, a good third-rater is better than a poor one. If we have good men in our capitols, it is our responsibility to see that they get there.

Little Capitols

It's a peculiar thing, but often true, that although candidates for local offices can be better known than those for state or national office, rascals and ne'er-do-wells are more often elected to the small offices than to the large ones. For some reasons, local government gets less attention from the voters than it should. The mayor of a single large city, today controls more power over more people than King Josiah ever did. It is in the "little capitol" if you like, the county court houses for example, that public affairs sometimes take the wrong turn. Where there is a public program well conceived and organized, it can look good as a public law, it can look good as it comes to the states . . . but when it goes through the local court-houses it can turn into some pretty rotten trickery. In a certain state not long ago federal funds for a very good purpose had to be cut off from a dozen or more countries because the officials there had been lining their pockets with easy money. It's a poor voter, one with a small sense of responsibility, who takes pains to elect good senators and presidents, but who when it comes to voting the local ticket, just says, Oh well . . . and votes straight because it's easiest.

Capitols Can't Do It All

The sad truth is, King Josiah's reforms didn't stick. They didn't, because they were reforms from the top. Even an absolute monarch can make his country no better than his people want it to be. It is true, we ought to have the best officials, from town to county to state to nation, that we can elect; but even if they were all praying, intelligent, devoted Christians, they cannot make this a better country merely by passing laws. Like Josiah, our men in government can make this a better country. Only if we the people want to have it so.

Farmers Net Income During First Half of Year, \$12,100,000,000; up 2½%

By Roger W. Babson
Farmers' net income for the first half of the year was \$12,100,000,000, up 2½% from the corresponding period of 1956. The increase was due to a combination of factors, including a rise in the price of farm products and a decrease in the cost of farm supplies. The outlook for the remainder of the year is generally optimistic, with the expectation that the total net income for the year will be around \$24,000,000,000.

production topped one billion bushels by sizable margins. The current crop comes on the heels of a total U. S. carryover on July 1 of 905,000,000 bushels—practically enough for a whole season's normal requirements. Most of this wheat, however, is in government hands and will not glut commercial channels. I do not believe the current crop will prove burdensome.

Mother Nature has been kind to several of the other grains. Outturns of barley, flaxseed, oats, and rye may exceed the 1945-1956 average—barely by 48 per cent, flaxseed by 7 per cent, oats by 3 per cent, and rye by 20 per cent. Total supplies of these grains for 1957-1958 will lean toward the easy side. American housewives should have plenty of new, clean-sweeping brooms this year because the indicated crop of broom-corn is well above average. However, popcorn devotees may have to curb their appetites for this item; planted acreage is 14 per cent below average.

Corn, Dry Beans, And Rice
The outlook for the nation's corn crop is relatively good, but the outturn, which is estimated at around 3,066,000,000 bushels, may

be about 10 per cent under last year and slightly below average. Weather between now and harvest time must, of course, be reckoned with. Supplies will be easily adequate for the 1957-1958 season, since total corn stocks recently were at an all-time high for the date, 1,963,000,000 bushels. If the hog-corn-feed ratio remains as favorable as it is now—16.7 to 1—a lot of corn will be fed this fall and winter. Meanwhile, old-crop corn prices may average somewhat higher but I forecast some seasonal weakness in new-crop corn this fall.

The outlook for dry bean production is less favorable than a year ago. The crop, which is harvested in the fall, may be around only 16,300,000 bags—down 5 per cent from the 1956 outturn and 2 per cent under the ten-year average. Since the carryover will be relatively small, total supplies for 1957-1958 should not be excessive. The indicated U. S. rice crop of 40,500,000 bags (100 pounds each) is 15 per cent under the 1956 outturn and the smallest crop since 1950. This could mean a fairly tight statistical position sometime next year.

Cotton And Soybeans
American cotton farmers in recent years have learned well the art of intensive cultivation. Even on the smallest planted acreage in many years, high per-acre yields

This points to another substantial cut in the still big carryover next August 1. Prices may weaken moderately during the heavy marketing season in the weeks ahead, but should recover thereafter.

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Billy Pyle-Norman Curtin Award Instituted At Iuka High School

In honor of Billy Pyle and Norman Curtin, two of Iuka's young men who lost their lives at McKinney railway crossing last spring, a perpetual memorial award has been established by the Iuka Rotary club, the Iuka school, and other interested organizations and individuals. Name of the award will be known as the "Billy Pyle-Norman Curtin Memorial Award" and shall be presented each year to a boy who shall be a member of the ninth grade in the Iuka school—the grade which the boys were in at the time of their deaths.

Announcement of the perpetual award was made last Friday at the first general assembly of the Iuka school by Supt. H. L. Shook. In making the announcement, Supt. Shook said:

"On the last day of school last year, two of our ninth grade boys were promoted—promoted to a Much Higher Grade—a Grade we all might well try to reach some day.

"Billy and Norman had lived such fine and noble lives among us that it has been deemed most fitting and proper to establish a perpetual Billy Pyle-Norman Curtin Award. I had the honor of being a member of the committee which gave definition to this award, and now in the presence of this entire

school, I want to read to you exactly what this committee set forth. I think you should know that it has the full and official approval of the organization which instituted it, and of the Board of Trustees of our school, as well.

"Purpose of the award is to inspire educational, religious, and character development in ninth grade boys in emulation of Billy Pyle and Norman Curtin.

"The Award: a \$25.00 United States Government Bond.

"Source of the Award: Interest from a fund sponsored by the Iuka Rotary Club (with additional contributions from others) held in trust at Iuka Guaranty Bank.

"Time and place of presentation shall be at graduation exercises in the year the award is earned.

"Basis upon which the award shall be given are divided into three groups:

"I. School life: A. Integrity; B. Scholastic achievement (objective, average mark of 2.3 in ninth grade subjects) (This average was taken because it is the average of all the marks made by Billy and Norman on their ninth grade subjects); C. Courtesy; D. Evidences of culture, as interest in music, literature, science, and history; E. Athletics;

"II. Religious activities: A. Regular attendance, at church, Sunday School, and Youth Activities; "III. Membership in Boy Scouts, 4-H Club, other youth organizations. A. Attitude; B. Achievement.

"The awarding committee shall be composed of the following public officials: Chairman shall be the superintendent of the Iuka Public Schools (the superintendent shall, in determining the school life phase, confer with all teachers having charge of ninth grade boys); other members of the committee shall be: president of the Iuka Rotary club, Scoutmasters, Explorer Advisors, Assistant County Agent in charge of 4-H clubs, and the adult leader of any other youth organization approved by the superintendent of Iuka Public Schools and the president of the Iuka Rotary club."

In concluding his remarks, Mr. Shook said, "it is my hope that through this award the lives of Billy and Norman may be even more inspirational,—not only to each succeeding class of ninth grade boys, but to all of us, old and young alike, so that

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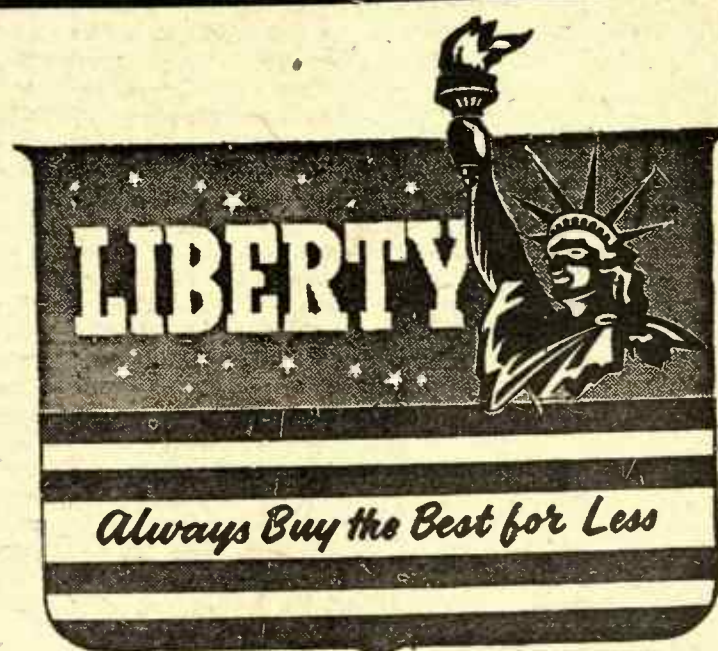
