IUKA SHIRT PLANT TO EXPAND; WILL EMPLOY FORTY TO 50 MORE PEOPLE

New Cutting, Receiving, Shipping,
Storage Departments Will Be Formed

An effort is underway to increase the size of the Iuka Shirt Co., Inc., plant by as much as 10,000 square feet in order to add new departments that are necessary to operate in the present building. Bernard Lukoff, president and manager of the concern, states:

Twenty-five thousand dollars will be needed to build an addition to present building and negotiations have been underway for the past week among business and civic leaders of the town to raise the money for the necessary expansion. Several meetings have been held and a number of the business people have expressed determination to assist in the project as it has been pointed out many times that the shirt plant has been a definite asset to the community and county since it started operation in June of 1955. Among business people who have been taking active part in the promotion are C. L. Woodley who has spearheaded the movement, E. E. Murrah, W. T. Dexter, Benben Grisham, R. E. Dexter, Bill Jones, E. C. Holtsford, George Page, Mayor John H. Allen, Paul Edmondson, C. W. Brackeen, Elmer H. Curtis, C. B. Reid, Bill Brinkley, Herman Gann, Dr. Harry Cosby, Sam Kimberly, Cecil H. Brown and Chester Beard.

Mr. Woodley reported Wednesday afternoon that money would be raised in a sufficient amount to start work on the addition within a week or ten days. Managers of the concern are anxious that the new addition be completed as quickly as possible in order to take care of the tremendous loads of orders that continue to come in for the winter season and also to be ready to start work on filling orders for spring merchandise on schedule.

With the addition of 10,000 sq. ft. floor space, the plant will employ upwards of 160 people, the manager said. Present employment is 110 and the annual payroll is \$234,000.00. When expansion is completed the annual payroll will be in excess of \$350,000.00.

Official Notice This Week Calling School Bond Election

Official notice was published this week announcing an election for an \$80,000.00 School Bond issue for Districts 2, 3, 4, and 5.

Purpose of the \$80,000.00 bond election is to supplement state funds that will be used in constructing, repairing, and equipping school buildings in the county system that is comprised of the last four Supervisor's Districts. The State will furnish \$470,000 to be used on Tishomingo County schools providing the county will furnish \$80,000. Total amount of money to be spent on the county schools is \$550,000. The figure does not include building funds for the Iuka schools.

Wording for the proposition asking for the bond issue and as it appears in the official notice, follows:

"Shall the Tishomingo County School District of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, issue its bonds in the maximum amount of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) to raise money for the purpose of erecting, repairing, equipping, remodeling, and enlarging school buildings and related facilities, including gymnasiums, auditoriums, lunch rooms, vocational training buildings, and libraries in said district."

A vote for the proposition will be in favor of issuing the bonds for necessary school use.

BEER ELECTION

Also, on the same day, an election on the possession of beer will be held at all polling places in the county. Voters in the First District shall cast ballots only on the beer question, and voters in the other four districts shall cast ballots on both the school bond issue and the beer question. There will be two sets of ballots in the county and only one set in Iuka and the First District.

Precincts where only one ballot will be used are: Iuka, North Iuka, West Iuka, and Salem.

Precincts where both ballots will be used are: Sharp, Burnsville, West Burnsville, North Burnsville, Coles Mill, Rutledge, Spring Hill, Holcut, Paden, Tishomingo, West Tishomingo, Dennis, Belmont, East Belmont, Golden, and Cotton Springs.

Polls at all voting precincts will open at 8 a.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 15, and shall remain open until 6 p.m.

THE SUPREME COURT SOWED THE WIND

The Supreme Court of the United States sowed the wind when it handed down its infamous integration decision on May 17, 1954.

It sowed the wind because it disregarded all judicial precedent and based its decision on sociological and psychological textbooks

written by leftwing sympathizers.

It sowed the wind because its decision betrayed the principle of states rights, a principle fundamental to the form of government set up for us by our forefathers.

It sowed the wind because it

usurped the power of Congress and attempted to legislate by judicial decree.

It sowed the wind because it ignored the customs and traditions of a great region of our land.

It sowed the wind because it created dissension where there was no dissension and strife where there was no strife.

It sowed the wind because its decision played straight into the hands of those who believe in socialism and communism, both of which philosophies thrive on division and discord among the people.

The Supreme Court sowed the wind, and we are now beginning—just beginning—to reap the whirlwind.

So far, as bad as the various incidents may seem, we are only feeling the fringe of the whirlwind. It is terrible to contemplate what we may see when the full force of the storm blows upon us.

Those who deplore the violence we have witnessed in these fringe blows in Clinton, Tennessee and Sturgis, Kentucky and Little Rock, Arkansas and Nashville, Tennessee and other places on the edge of the storm—and it is greatly to be deplored—should not forget where to place the blame for its origin—squarely upon the shoulders of the nine justices of the

Supreme Court of the United States.

One of the great dangers inherent in these acts of violence is that those who deplore this violence but who at the same time know the cause of segregation is right and wise may, even so, weaken in the struggle. This would be defeatism and cowardice; it would show lack of dedication to a just cause. An army is not to be condemned because a few of its members have committed acts for which they should be court-martialed.

All reason and logic was against any such decision as that handed down by the Court of Black Monday. It was directly contrary to the "separate but equal" ruling of the Court handed down sixty years before, a ruling under which the Negroes in this country had made more progress than Negroes had ever made in any country at any time throughout history. This arrangement was by far the best plan for both races and the great majority of both races knew it. It permitted maintenance of pride of race, without which no race ever amounts to anything.

Suppose the situation were reversed in this country; suppose there were 15 million whites and 150 million Negroes, with the whites being afforded "separate but equal" facilities. Does anyone

think the whites would demand integration and the same facilities? The question answers itself. As a matter of fact, if history is any guide, we may well believe that the whites would very soon provide for themselves better than the "same" facilities!

It is difficult to assign any basis of reason for the Supreme Court decision. On the face of it, one cannot reach any other conclusion than that it had a political basis rather than a reasonable, that is, a judicial basis. It would almost seem as if the color of the robes worn by the justices had some significance!

Thus do great nations decline. That is the lesson history teaches us from the days of the Pharaohs down to the days of Washington, D. C. The control the central government now exerts over the states may by now have become so strong and the courage of the people so weak that we may find integration forced upon us. What we should now very clearly realize—and this is true regardless of our feelings on the subject—is that upon the day integration takes place, upon that same day disintegration sets in.

State Population Predictions Made

Mississippi's population will be

2,303,000 in 1960 and 2,383,000 in 1965, according to projected population estimates made by the Federal Bureau of Census. The state's population as recorded for the 1950 census was 2,178,914. Thus the census bureau's figures indicate a continuing steady population growth for the Magnolia State.

The projections are based upon use of a "ratio" method which involves comparison of the state's population with those of the country as a whole for the period between 1940 and 1950. This ratio is then applied to the projected population figure for the United States for any given year, thereby

arriving at the projected population figure for each state.

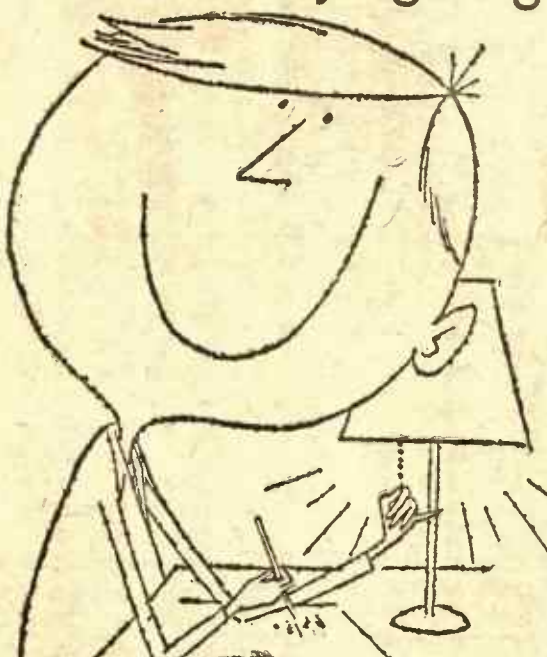

Future Competition And What Retailers Should Do To Remain In Business

Babson Park, Mass., Sept. 19.
Competition will increase constantly and severely during the next few years. This "few years" means until a severe depression comes which will wipe out the weak concerns and leave the field only to the strong.

Reasons For Severe Competition
The basic reason is that manufacturers—in order to counteract increased wage demands—are constantly reducing their other costs of production. Although the retail prices of most goods have gone up, yet, except for labor, the cost of actual manufacturing has declined. New machinery, electronics, automation, and other new developments are seeking to overcome the effects of higher wages. As a result, there is a constant struggle between the labor-leader and the inventor. This results in increased production and a surplus of goods. Manufacturers then are forced to create more customers and sell more goods in order to keep their plants running at full volume. Only as a manufacturer

is running at full capacity is he able to pay higher wages and produce goods at lower cost.

Certainly if farmers—who are really manufacturers—receive subsidies and other helps from Congress, many manufacturers are entitled to the same help. All of this however, results in severe competition which is profitable to no one. To keep labor employed and the factory working at full volume, manufacturers have encouraged installment sales and other means of coaxing people to buy more goods than they really need, or to buy them before they need them. This means that when unemployment begins, housewives will be so stocked with new furniture, electric utilities, and clothes that they will be able to stop buying almost everything other than food. Furthermore, the food bill can be greatly cut, probably resulting in better health for the family.

The future of employment is therefore in the hands of the consumers. As long as consumers continue to increase their purchases, conservative manufacturers will get on satisfactorily. When, however, consumers begin to economize, then unemployment will follow and most manufacturers will be headed for trouble. This means that retailers have a great responsibility. Although retailers are dependent on the consumers, who are source of real power, yet consumer buying is largely influenced by the attitude of retailers.

Most retailers are now not doing their part to prolong prosperity. Golf courses, luncheon dates, bowling alleys, boating, and automobiling are taking the time of retailers who ought to be in their stores. Customers are not being given the individual attention which they like. Merchants are making it harder to buy through self-service, poorly arranged stock, and careless advertising.

What Retailers Should Do
The next depression will be brought on by automobile congestion or by the fear of fallout due to the threatened Russian "tests." Parking meters are helpful in preventing all-day parkers from hogging the streets; but parking meters may reduce the amount of merchandise sold. After I drop my coin into a parking meter, I cannot forget the meter. I have it constantly in mind as I am shopping. This worry about the parking meter causes me to buy fewer goods than I would buy if it were not for my parking meter worry. All of this means that downtown retailing is in a chaotic condition. Evening shopping may be an answer to the parking problem.

I once asked John D. Rockefeller, Sr. how a retailer could make more money. He replied, "Live over the store and be available to customers from 6 o'clock in the morning until 9 o'clock at night." This does not necessarily mean that the store will be "open," or that the retailer will spend more money for more employees. (Mr. Rockefeller, of course, was a great believer in better lighting, whether by candles, kerosene, gas, oil, or electricity.) Then he continued: "Next to welltrained employees and proper lighting and advertising, merchants should keep their stores open longer hours. Evening shopping is coming."

Mississippi's Education Program Is Expanding
Mississippi's young people this

month are picking up their school books and heading for classrooms in an educational system which continues to get bigger and better each year—from the college level to first grade. The next five years will see the expenditure of some \$100 million in state and local funds under a statewide school

improvement program which has revolutionized the state's public school set-up. Another point is that every professional school in the state's college system is accredited by its respective accrediting agencies. Not every state in the union can make that statement. Quality of Mississippi colleges is

indicated, too, by the fact that 15 per cent of their enrollment comes from outside the state.

Cotton Harvest Troubles Plague Work
Uncommonly great harvest-time difficulties have been plaguing Mis-

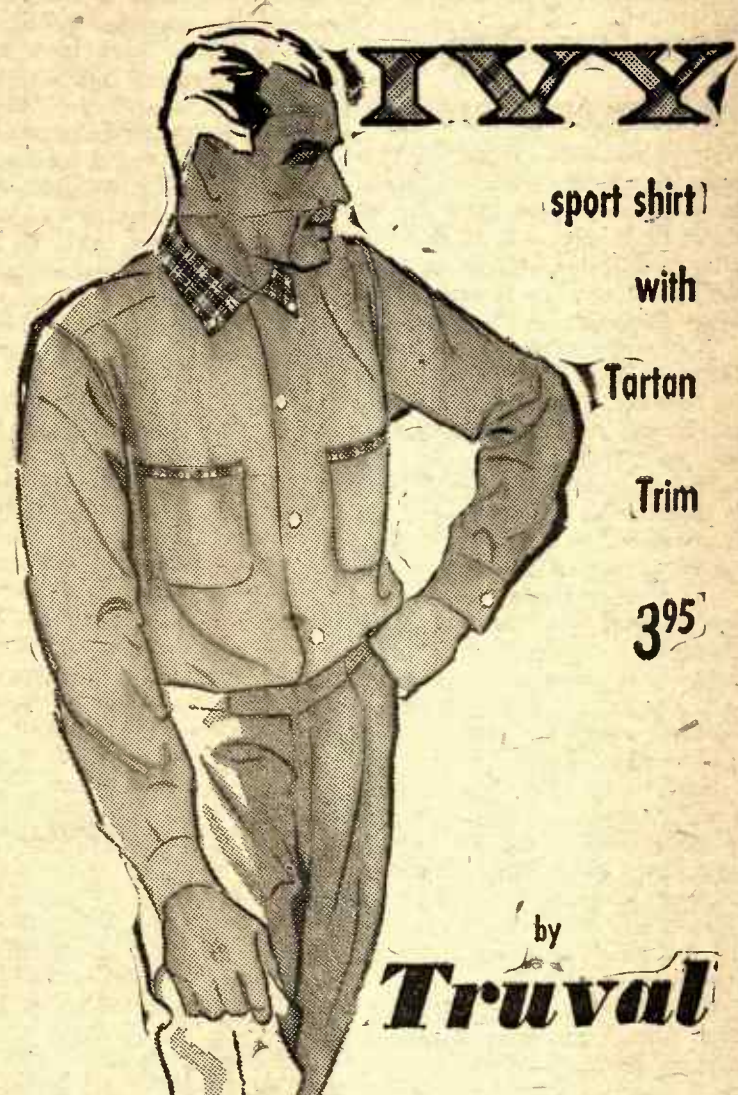
issippi's 1957 cotton crop, estimated as the second in history to average more than a bale an acre. The estimated state's crop total 1,550,000 bales from the 1,350,000 acres scheduled to be harvested. The average would be 551 pounds per acre, slightly higher than one 500-pound bale per acre. Reports have

increased on boll rot particularly in the lower crop, but affecting young as well as older cotton. Defoliation has not started because the top crop is not far enough along. Rank growth, grassy conditions and some twisted cotton all indicate uncommonly great difficulties ahead in the use of mechan-

ical picker. The 1955 cotton crop was the first to yield more than 500 pounds per acre, reaching a record 570 pounds for a total of two million bales.

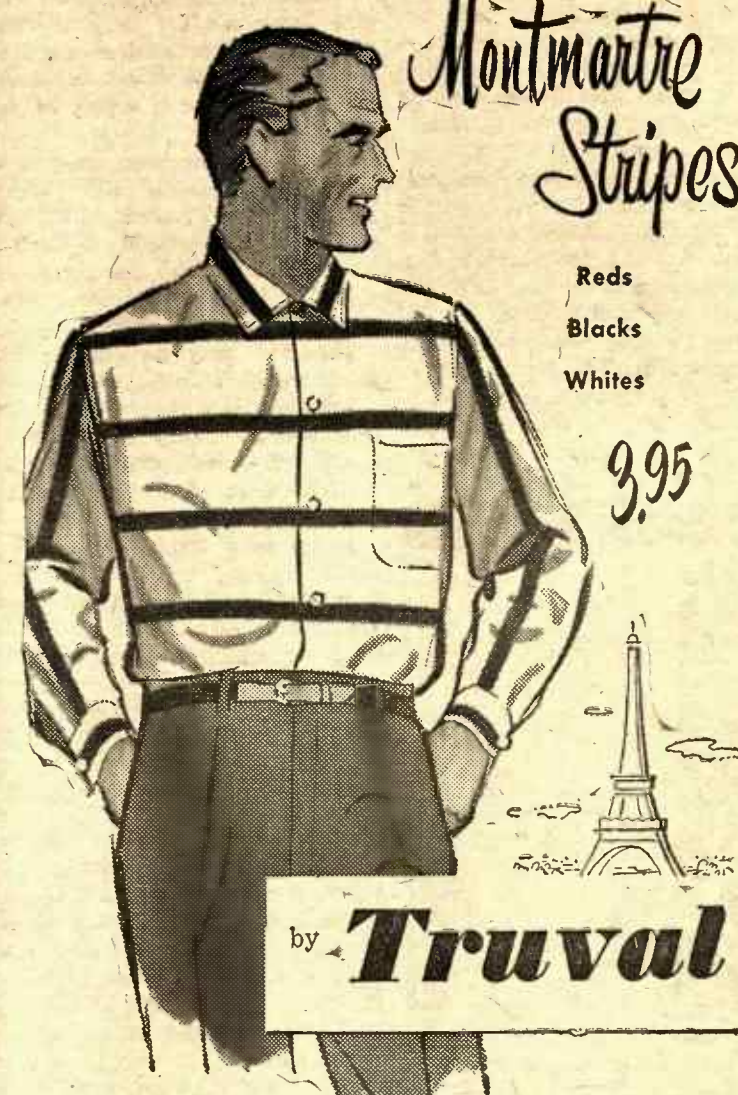

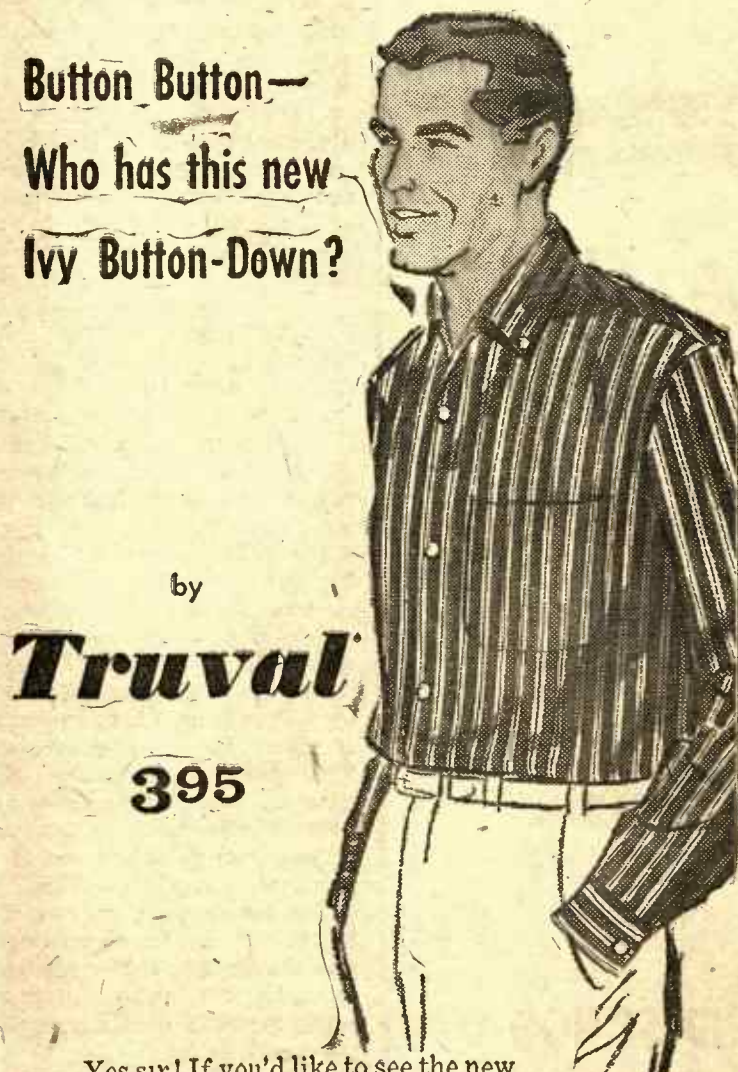

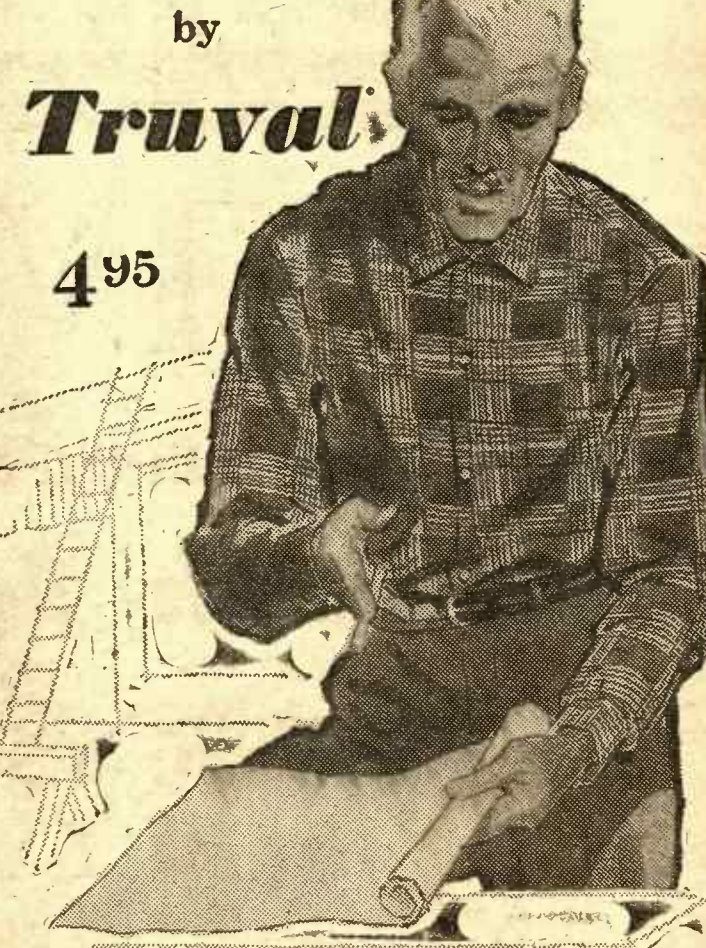

Motorists Must Stop While School Buses Load Or Unload Children

"The law requiring motorists to stop while school buses load or discharge school students must be observed."

So states Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough, who warned that the Highway Patrol will carry violators to jail "if such steps are necessary to insure the safety of our children."

Commissioner Scarbrough, whose own 10-year-old daughter rides a school bus, stressed that such drastic action should not be necessary. "Of all the traffic laws on the book, those laws which directly protect our children shouldn't need enforcing. Observing them should be a habitual act."

The Highway Patrol head states, however, that his office is receiving complaints from school officials and parents of motorists passing school buses receiving and discharging student riders. The frequency of these violations seems to be increasing he said.

Mississippi law states that "the driver of the vehicle upon a highway outside of a business or residential district upon meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped on a highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall come to a complete stop and shall not proceed until the children have crossed the street or highway and the school bus has proceeded in the direction it was going."

SPEAKS**
International Uniform
Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Background Scripture: Daniel 1-6.
Devotional Reading: 1 Peter 5:6-11.

Daring Daniel

Lesson for September 22, 1957

"DARE to be a Daniel" was the name of a song that used to be sung in Sunday schools all over America. Maybe people read the stories of Daniel then more often than they do now. Any one who thinks the tales about this man are exaggerated and sound more like legend than history, might ask himself this question: What sort of man must Daniel have been, what kind of reputation did he leave behind him, to have such stories attach themselves to his name and memory? No meek little-yes-man was he. On the contrary his very name is a symbol of courage against odds.

Two Kinds of Courage

There are two kinds of courage: physical and moral. Physical courage means keeping on doing what you know you ought to do, even when you are being terribly hurt, or about to be hurt. A scoutmaster in a boat with some small boys got into some heavy waves, the boat overturned, and everybody climbed on top of the upside-down craft. Then it became evident that there were too many for the boat in that position. So the scoutmaster, after pulling the last boy out of the water, swam alongside for a while, and when he could swim no longer, quietly sank... dying to save a boy's life. That took courage. Then there is also moral courage, which means doing or saying what you believe to be right, in spite of ridicule or powerful contrary opinions.

Against Orders

Courage always is against something,—danger, public opinion, pain. Daniel's courage sometimes was of the rare and risky sort, courage to defy orders from his official superiors. Daniel's salary

was paid by the royal court, and like many salaried men, when ordered to do something against his conscience and religion, might have shrugged it off: "Well, I hate to do it, it goes against the grain. But this is my job and who am I to talk back to my employer? I've gotta play ball if I stay on the payroll." Daniel was made of stouter stuff. When he knew that God said one thing and his boss said another, even if the boss was a king with powers of life and death, Daniel saw no choice but to obey God rather than men.

Against Custom

Daniel "bucked" not only an old-fashioned, oriental dictator, all dressed up in crown and gown, but something that is just as tyrannical: public opinion and long-standing customs. If he had had the public on his side, he might not have been reported (for example) in the incident of the prayers at the open window. Back home in Palestine many would have known that he was right; here in Persia almost no one agreed with him. To go against "what everybody does"—usually meaning by "everybody" the more important people of a community—takes nerve. It can be wrong, too, for very often public opinion is just about right. One ought to think very carefully before flying the opposite course to every one else. But when Daniel knew he was right, he knew that fifty thousand Medes and Persians could be wrong; and he acted accordingly.

Against Personal Interests

Many people take the easiest way. All they ask is, "What does this get me? Where does it get me? Will this bring me more prestige, will it end in my promotion, will it help me up the ladder?" If the answer is Yes, then they go ahead. They don't dare do anything contrary to their own interests. But Daniel dared. More than once he had the courage to do something or to say something when it looked as if by doing or saying it he would put an end to his career. But the king always kept him on, though for a while he might turn against him. Men admire courage of all sorts, especially Daniel's kind. The king and everybody else knew that here was a man who could be counted on to say and to do what he was convinced was right, even if it hurt him,—even if it killed him. Here was a man who could not be threatened, could not be bought. Such men were not plentiful then, they are not thick as blackberries now. But they are God's men always.

1 pound hamburger meat
1 6-ounce can tomato paste
1 teaspoon salt
1 bay leaf

Saute onion and garlic in salad
oil. Add meat and cook until meat

loses red color. Add rest of in-
gredients and simmer for 1 hour.
Cool, pour into ice cube trays and
freeze.

Sugar Cookies

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup butter
1 cup sugar
1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 tablespoon cream or milk

Sift together 1-1/2 cups flour,
baking powder and salt. Cream
butter until soft. Beat in sugar,

egg, vanilla and cream. Stir in
flour mixture. Add one cup nuts,
if desired. Gradually add remain-
ing flour until dough is just stiff
enough to roll. Form into long
cylindrical shape, wrap in alumin-
um foil or freezer wrapping paper
and freeze. When ready to use re-
move cookie dough from freezer,
slice frozen dough in 1/4 inch slic-
es. Place on greased cookie sheet
and bake in moderate to hot oven
(375 to 400 degrees F) 10 to 12
minutes. Makes 4 to 5 dozen cook-
ies.

Softened gelatin with 2 tablespoons
fruit juice. Dissolve with hot water.
Mix cream cheese with mayon-
naise. Whip cream until stiff,
adding sugar gradually. Add gela-
tin to cream. Combine cream
cheese mixture and whipped cream
mixture.

Fold in fruits and nuts. Pour
into tray lined with waxed paper.
Freeze, package, label and store.
When ready to use, turn out on
platter. Cut into thick slices. Ser-
ve on lettuce leaf. Garnish with
mayonnaise.

Freezing Vegetables

Just a word of caution about
vegetables you freeze. If you do not
blanch them before freezing you
will find they have lost their fresh
color and flavor. This applies to
all vegetables except green pepper.

Ask at the home agent's office
for a copy of the bulletin on freez-
ing foods. It gives directions for
fruits, vegetables, meats and cook-
ed dishes.

Nov. 7 To Jan. 15
Open Season For
Ducks And Geese

The Mississippi Game and Fish
Commission has again selected the
latest closing date for the duck and
goose season and fixed the dates
of the season from November 7,
1957 to January 15, 1958, according
to Rex McRaney, Executive Direct-
or. The U. S. Fish and Wildlife
Service had fixed a framework
of dates from which the Commis-
sion could select the 70 day duck
and goose season from October 1,

1957, to January 15, 1958. Mc-
Raney said that all the states in
the Mississippi Flyway were given
a choice of one continuous 70 day
season or a two season aggregat-
ing 63 full days within the outside
dates of October 1, 1957, to Jan-
uary 15, 1958. The Commission
felt that the seven day penalty
was too high a price to pay for a
split season.

The daily bag and possession
limits on duck (including one
wood duck) remain at 4 and 8, re-
spectively, in all states in the Mis-
sissippi Flyway, with the daily bag
and possession limit of 5 for geese.
McRaney said the limits on geese
may not include in the alternative
more than (a) 2 Canada geese or
its sub-species; (b) 2 white-fronted
geese; or (c) 1 Canada goose or its
sub-species and 1 white-fronted
goose. The single bag and posses-
sion limit of 10 coots will remain
in effect.

The shooting hours for 1957-58
in the Mississippi Flyway for those
states selecting to put a wood
duck in the bag will be from one-
half hour before sunrise to one-
half hour before sunset. These
shooting hours were selected in
order to afford some measure of
protection for the wood duck dur-
ing the late hours in the day when
they are more vulnerable to gun
pressure.

McRaney said the population of
the American and redbreasted mer-
gansers are lightly harvested in
the Mississippi Flyway and as a
consequence, the Fish and Wildlife
Service regulations allow hunters
to take 5 American and redbreast-
ed mergansers daily and retain 10
in possession without regard to
the bag and possession limits on
ducks. The season on Wilson's
jacksnipe shall be from December
17, 1957, to January 15, 1958.

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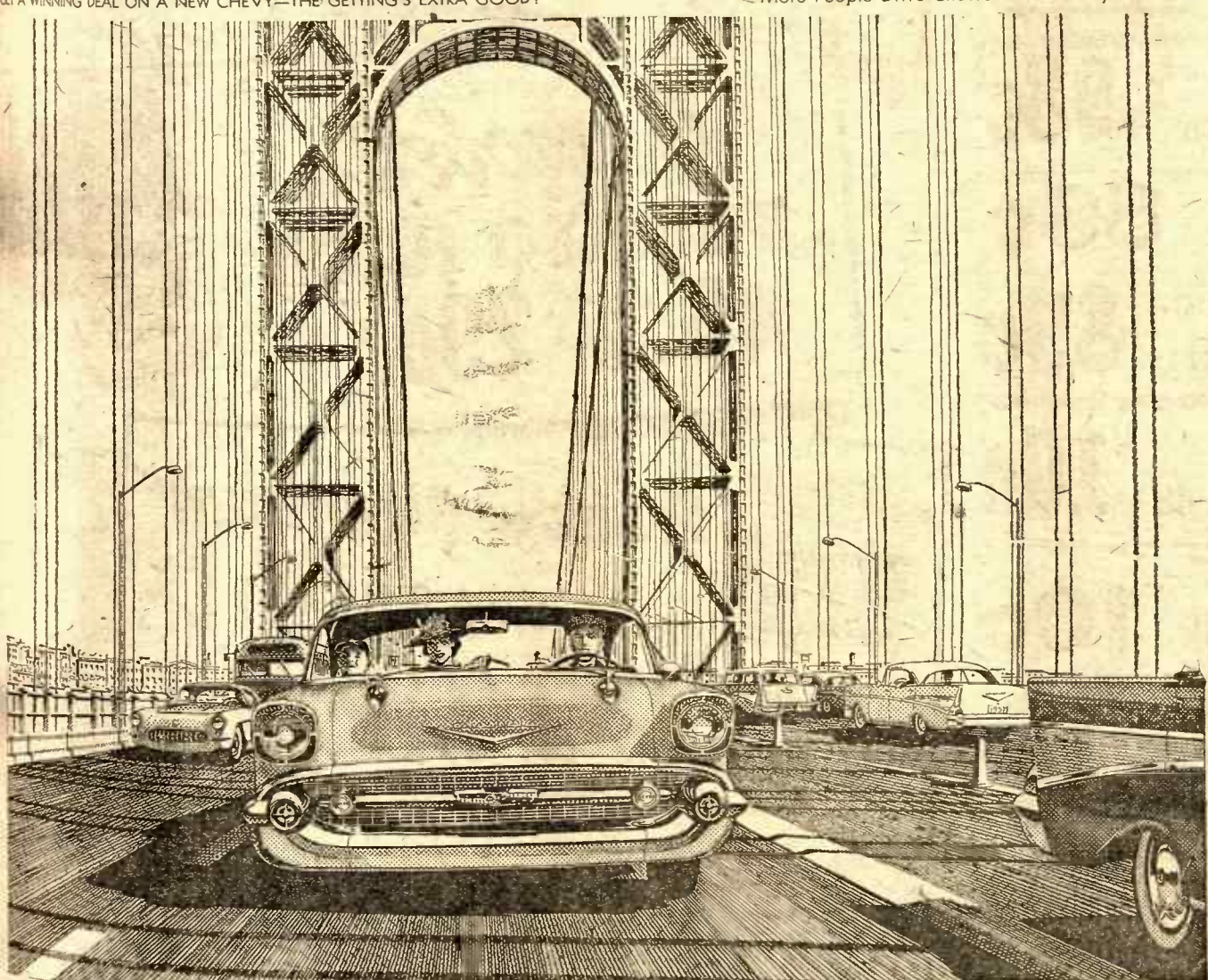
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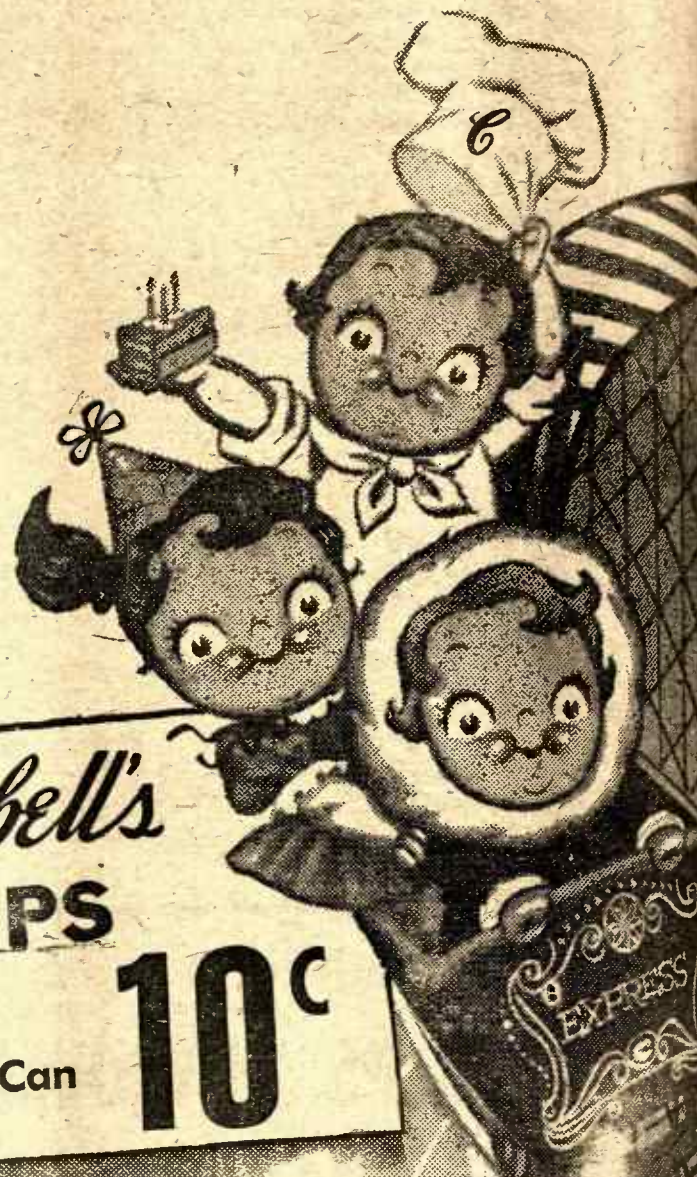
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
