THE SCHOOLS of the county, no doubt, will receive an overwhelming endorsement in the bond election on October 15. If voters cast ballots in the forthcoming election as they have in the past, the school issue will pass by a substantial margin.

SIXTY PERCENT of those voting must vote for the bond issue, if it is to pass. In other words, if 5 people cast ballots and 3 of them are in favor of the \$80,000 bond issue then it becomes a law that the county can sell bonds in that amount to apply on the schools of the county.

SUPT. SCRUGGS states that he cannot remember a time when the voters of the county did not favor their schools in bond elections to build better school buildings. "All previous elections concerning our schools have gone over in a big way and I believe this one will also," he said in talking about the bond issue.

ONLY VOTERS living in the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th Districts will vote on the school bond issue. Those living in the First District are in the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, therefore will not have a voice in this bond issue election. An election will be called at a later date, it is expected, in which First District citizens will vote on school issues. The last four districts are in the County Unit System as it was organized earlier this year and all citizens in those districts are entitled to vote on this \$80,000 school bond issue as the money will be used on school buildings in each of the last four districts.

IF YOU LIVE in Districts 2, 3, 4, or 5, then you should certainly cast a ballot for the bond issue. With the \$80,000 that will be voted in by the county the state will add \$40,000, making a total of \$120,000 that will be spent within the next immediate months on Tishomingo County School Buildings. With our school buildings repaired and remodeled our children should have better opportunities to gain the education they need, thus preparing them for future useful lives. And with properly equipped, progress of the county should continue at a rapid pace.

Plans Progressing On Shirt Factory Expansion

Bernard Lukoff, manager of the Iuka Shirt Co. states that plans are progressing and that he should be able to submit an architect's drawing for bids for construction within a few days.

Iuka Scores First Touchdown Of Season Against Booneville; Calhoun City Next

The Iuka Warriors held the strong Booneville Blue Devils to a close ball game the first half and the score of 33-7 did not reflect the actual closeness of the game. If it had not been for the speed of Roger Smith the game could as easily had a 14-7 final score.

The first quarter was tightly played with both teams exchanging punts freely but in the second quarter the Booneville offense started rolling and before the half the Blue Devils had scored twice. Billy Ray Howell, the Fullback, scored on a 11-yard slant and Roger Smith went over left tackle 65 yards for the second tally. Davis converted both extra points. The halftime score was 14-0, Booneville.

The second half started off just as the 1st ended, with Booneville scoring twice in quick succession. George Oakley scored on a 13 yard thrust and then two minutes later Oakley threw a 50 yard pass to the end Clayton, who went over to score. Davis converted the extra point. In the fourth quarter the Iuka offense started rolling and with a sustained drive of 85 yards went on to score. Mrs. Hollowell returned to Iuka for an indefinite stay.

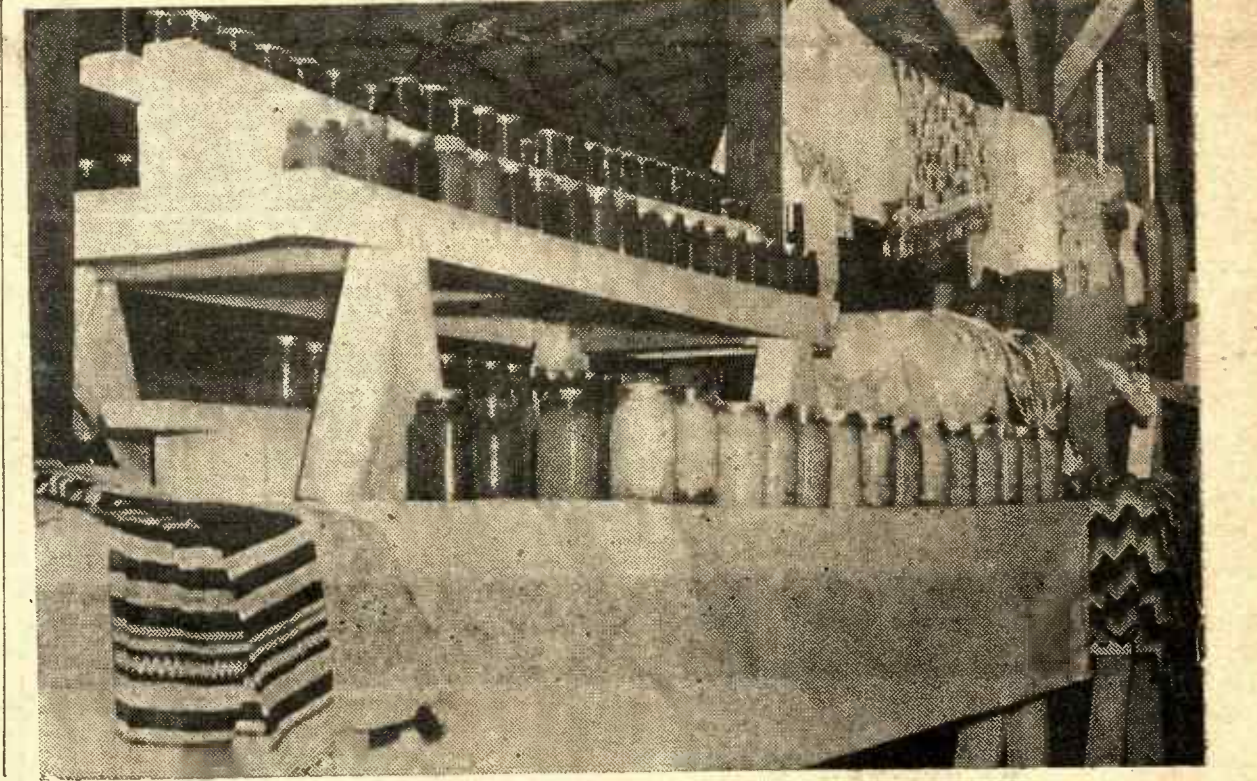

Bookmobile Service Furnished County 16,429 Books Last Year; 3,000 Books Read By Children In Contest

The report of the Northeast Regional Library service to Tishomingo County for the year 1956-57 was presented at a meeting of the Board of Supervisors on Wednesday, September 4, 1957. A total of 11,732 books were left in the schools during the school year by the bookmobile with a 109 requests being filled for the teachers. 2,332 books were left in deposit stations in the smaller communities and 1,401 books added to the collections in the three branch libraries; Total requests for the branches were 431. With 64 gift books for the branch libraries being cataloged and 360 new adult books it makes a total of 16,429 books left in Tishomingo County the past year. This is an average of 4 books per child left in the schools of the total books used in the schools.

The school children read 58,660 books which is an average of 20 books per child. 2,332 books were read in the communities and the branch circulation in Iuka, Tishomingo and Belmont was 19,200 making a grand total of 80,192 books read in the county during the year; this is an average of 5 books per capita.

The Smekey Bear Reading Club for the children this summer, sponsored by the Mississippi Forest Commission, the Mississippi Library Commission, the Iuka Library and the Thursday Club in Iuka as well as organizations in Tishomingo and Belmont, was the most successful summer's programs that the Northeast Regional Library has had in its six years of operation. About 200 children participated in the program, which was planned primarily for the education of children in the preservation of our forest in Mississippi. There was a total of 3,000 books read by the children in the reading club during the three summer months in Tishomingo County.

SENSING THE NEWS

Southern States Industrial Council THE FIRST BUDGET OF THE 85th CONGRESS

If we should sometime have a session of Congress that did not pass any laws at all, it might be the very best thing that could happen to us. There is certainly much to be said for Thomas Jefferson's philosophy that that nation is governed best which is governed least—and there is no question but that we are now burdened with a multiplicity of laws.

The first session of the 85th Congress has now adjourned. What happened? Not much to brag about—but some things were done, among them being the appropriation of money for the federal budget.

Someone might say that this is one action that must always be taken by every Congress, but even that could have been questioned this year. As of last July 1st, there

were unexpended funds already appropriated amounting to \$70 billion—and that was plenty to run the Government for the year without any new money at all. Of course, some of this \$70 billion was no doubt earmarked for certain departments and this would require bookkeeping transfers—but what Congress has the power to give, it should have the power to take away.

There is one thing we can brag about that happened last year; namely, the clamor for economy in governmental expenditures that swept over the country and the demand on the part of the people that the Congress cut drastically the largest peace-time budget that had ever been presented to the American people. We wish we could join those who are bragging about

the efforts Congress made along this line, and would do so except for the fact that there is a great deal of vagueness as to what the cuts actually amounted to and as to what the effects will be on governmental spending.

The Congress claims it cut the President's original budget by \$5 billion or more. In his final press conference after adjournment, the President claimed that all but about \$1 billion of this was "bookkeeping" savings and that some of the claimed cuts were "almost eyewash" because, he said, they will have to be restored. We don't know about the bookkeeping savings—and nobody else seems to know—but as to whether other cuts will "have to be restored," the Congress will have the final say-so on this, not the President.

It is a sad but true fact, of course, that with all the cutting of appropriations—whether actual or bookkeeping—there may be no lessening of spending, due to the enormous backlog of appropriations on hand at the beginning of the year.

During the year, the Senate passed by voice vote a bill to require that Congress appropriate just the money actually to be spent by an agency in one year, as recommended by the Hoover Commission and by others over the years. However, the House took no action on it.

At one time during the last session of Congress, one of the Senators accused the President of having no "fiscal brains." It would almost seem sometimes as if neither the Administration nor a great part of the Congress have any

fiscal brains, else the would recommend and pass legislation to place the budget of the nation on a sensible, cash basis.

Certainly there should be tax cuts and there should be payment on the national debt. What we need is less governmental spending, whether it be brought about by the Administration, by the Congress or otherwise.

About the same situation described above which applies to the whole budget also applies to one of the big items of the budget; namely, foreign aid. Here again, Congress cut the Administration request by about \$1 billion—for which it is to be commended—but there was already \$8 billion authorized but unspent as of July 1st—so what?

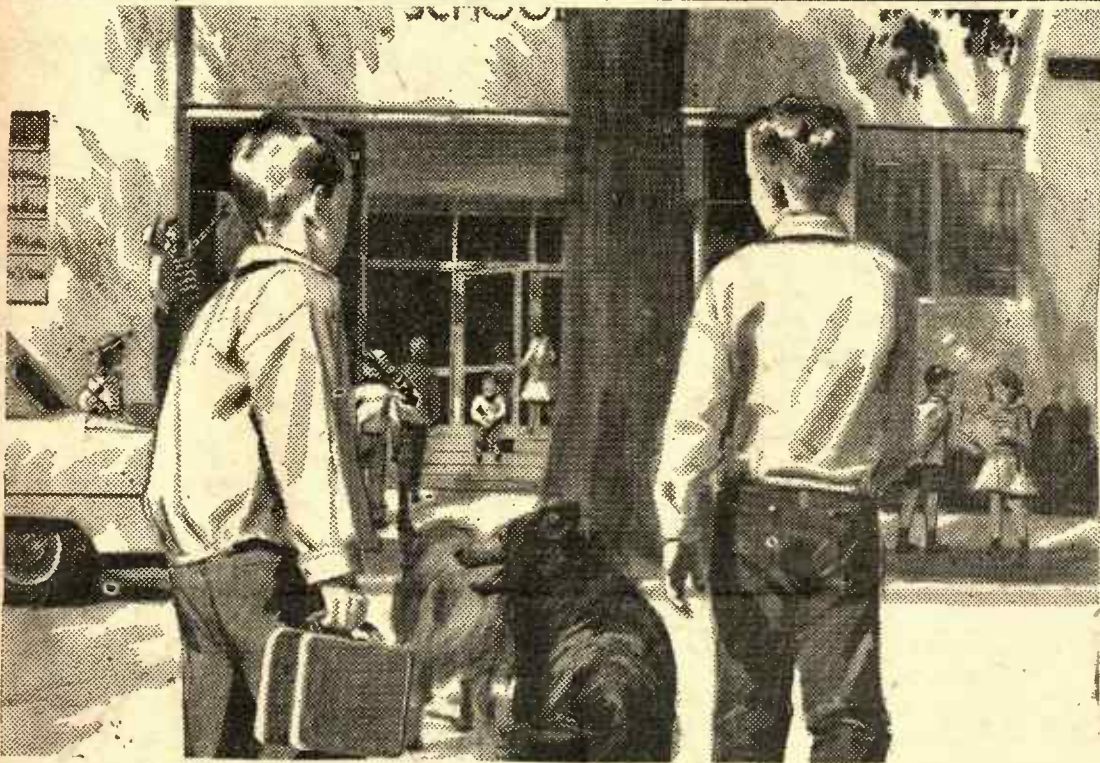

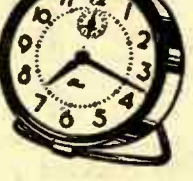

Tishomingo County Pays .4% Of State's Tax Bill

Mississippi taxpayers will eventually save \$24 million because of the \$5 billion reduction in appropriations made by the recent congress in the President's proposed budget, the Mississippi Economic Council estimates.

The Council credits "an aroused public, voicing its criticism of too much government spending" as the major force behind the reduction in the proposed federal budget. The \$24 million in eventual savings is arrived at by applying an economic index which shows the state to pay 0.48 per cent of the federal tax bill.

Tishomingo County, which according to an economic index, pays .4 percent of the state's tax bill, will save \$97,000 due to the reduction.

The MEC, serving the state as its chamber of commerce, said that actual savings to the nation in the 1958 budget will be only around \$1 billion, because at least 75 percent of the appropriations cut were not scheduled to be ac-

ually spent until 1959 or later. This means a saving of some \$5 million to Mississippi during 1958, with the rest of the saving coming through cutting future expenditures below requests made in the proposed budget.

"An aroused public, voicing its criticism of too much government spending, can be given the major credit for the reductions," the Council release said. "Opposition to federal spending reached a high peak during the past session. It behooves individuals to continue to keep an eye on public spending, because the government can only spend what it takes or borrows from people."



Water Made The Difference

The farmers of Tishomingo County are harvesting one of the best if not the best, crop they have ever produced.

The per acre yield of corn, cotton, and hay is above average. Actually there are less acres in crops this year and the total yield may not be as great as in years past, but the average per acre yield is higher.

Never before have so many of our farmers had so many acres of good corn on their upland. The cotton is good too. Nor have the livestock been able to graze and make good use of all the grass produced in the pastures this year. The earth has yielded an abundance.

The chief reason for this good

crop is there has been much more rain this year than we have had for a long time.

Water has made the difference. There has been enough rain this year to produce a good crop. This is the chief reason for the high crop yields being produced in Tishomingo County this year. However, there are other reasons for this good crop. The men who till the land are better farmers than we have ever had before. They have good farm equipment and are progressive in their farming practices. They prepare their land well then they apply large amounts of recommended fertilizer, before planting the best varieties of cotton, corn, hay and pasture crops. After the crops begin to grow, the farmer follows the recommendations of the county agricultural agent in the control of insects and weeds. It takes all of this to produce a good crop. But without the rain, crops would have dried up and failed.

A good farmer on good land will produce a good crop when there is plenty of rain, but without the rain the labor is vain.

The USDA Soil Conservation Service Technicians are seeking practical ways of catching, storing, and stretching the water which falls on the land as snow and rain during the average year.

Most years there is enough rainfall to produce a good crop, but it doesn't always come at the right time. By properly using the enormous amount of stalks and leaves from high yielding corn and cotton moisture can be stored in the land. Cut the stalks in the fall leave them on the surface of the land during the winter, a bush-bog is an ideal tool for cutting and scattering cotton and corn stalks over the surface of the land. Do not disk or plow the land, because disking or plowing will loosen the soil and cause it to wash away.

Just cut the stalks and leave them on top of the land to be turned under next spring. If winter legume or small grain is planted try to plant in such a way that as much litter can be left on top of the land as possible. This litter will check erosion and act as a sponge to hold water to be used by growing crops. Water made the difference between a good and poor crop this year. It can do the same in 1958.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service

How do you like your chicken? Broiled? Fried? Barbecued?

Maybe during October you will have it all three of the ways and others, too. For young chickens are topping the plentiful foods list for October. Watch your local markets for good buys.

October is Cheese Festival Month. Many stores will be having cheese specials. Hope you can find good prices and menu ideas in this cheese promotion time.

Other plentiful to help your budget and give you "what am I going to cook?" ideas include turkeys, pork, apples, potatoes, canned and frozen peas, dry peas, peanuts and peanut butter and canned tuna in oil.

Mississippi specials that you may find in plentiful supply are sweet potatoes and snap beans.

Pink In Poultry

As you are serving chicken or turkey—and especially turkey, you may wonder: "Why does this meat look pink? I know it's cooked well done." Some poultry meat does turn pinkish during roasting,

even when thoroughly done. It is safe to eat and is not changed in flavor or other qualities.

Scientists have found that certain substances in the atmosphere of a heated oven—or in the hot air of an outdoor—may react chemically with substances in poultry meat to give it a pink tinge.

These are the same substances that give a reddish color to smoked hams and other cured meats.

Another question you may ask is: "What makes some poultry bones darkened and reddened?"

The answer is due to freezing and thawing. They break down the blood cells of the bone marrow and cause a deep reddish color to show.

The pink meat and the discolored bones are most often found in young birds.

Cost of Cake Mixes

Here are some figures that will surprise you, I'll bet. They concern the cost of cake mixes compared to cost of homemade cakes.

Yes, I know the exact cost depends on the recipe and ingredients you have to buy. But a recent study did show.

1. The cost of an 8-inch layer of white or yellow cake made from a mix varied from 15 to 23 cents a layer, depending on ingredients required.

2. The cost of ingredients for a standard 2-layer white cake varied from 18 to 24 cents a layer, depending on type liquid, size of eggs and kind of flour.

So you see homemade products sometimes cost more—and sometimes less—than those made of mixes. In general, the cost of a homemade cake and one from a mix is very nearly the same.

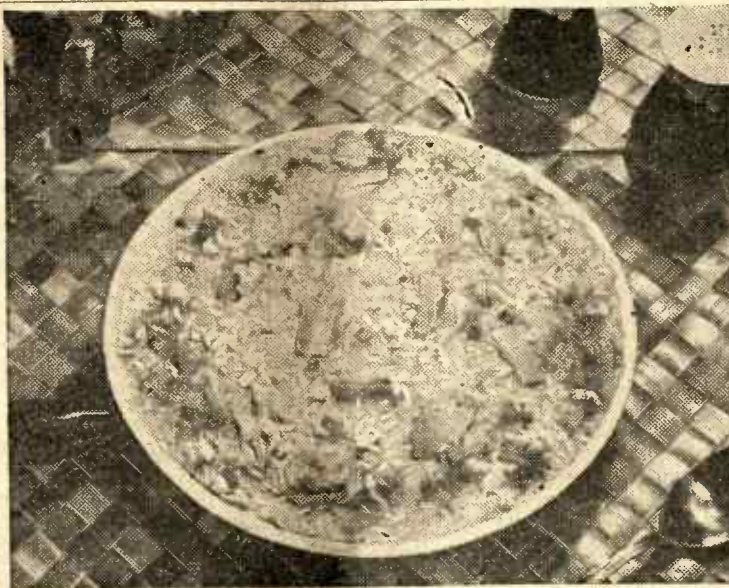

County Agent news

Fall Armyworms

Watch your young oats and wheat for fall armyworms damage. If not controlled, they can destroy stands.

When you seed skeletons of leaves in young grasses or small grains, poison immediately.

Either two pounds of technical toxaphene, or one pound of technical DDT or two-tenths of a pound of technical dieldrin will give effective control. You can use either dust or spray. For spraying use one and a third quarts of six-lb. toxaphene emulsion or a half gallon of two-pound DDT Emulsion or one pint of one and a half pound dieldrin emulsion to the amount of water needed for one acre.

Dust with 20 percent toxaphene, 10 percent DDT or one and a half percent dieldrin. Apply 10 to 15 pounds per acre.

Do not graze dairy animals or fattening animals within 30 days of last application of poison.

Sow Pastures

Pasture, can help you raise more pigs per litter, and make more money from your hogs.

The first step toward insuring big, fine litters of pigs is to keep your bred sows on good pasture. Real grazing from your sows can reduce the cost of raising pigs by 50 percent.

With top grazing, normally your bred sows will need only two to four pounds of a complete ration daily. Keep them in thrifty condition; don't let them get too fat. Hogs prefer legumes and small grains for grazing. Plan now to plant some oats, wheat or rye, or a combination of these. Then in October, plant some clovers.

Alfalfa

September is the time to plant alfalfa, provided the land was

well prepared and fallowed during the summer. If it was not fallowed get it ready at once. Disk it two or three times and plant in early October.

One of the secrets of getting a good stand of alfalfa in the fall is to plant on a good seed bed.

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

Devotional Reading: Psalm 90:1-5.

Patriot in Action

Lesson for September 29, 1957

THERE is no closed season for patriotism. You might think there was, for there is a rash of patriotic speeches and editorials along about the fourth of July, and on Washington's Birthday and similar occasions. This time of year people seem to be thinking more about the hunting season, and school openings, than about our wonderful country. Now, let us admit that patriotic speeches the year around, would be a dreadful bore. Fireworks and oratory every night are not called for. Nevertheless it is true: there is no closed season for patriotism. There is a daily need for patriots.

Counterfeit Patriotism

Patriotism is not noise, not speeches. The patriot is not the man who brags about his country the most. Travelers abroad from America know the nuisance type of tourist who is forever complaining, wherever he is, about nearly everything, loudly telling the world that "We have it better in the States." Such a man is not doing America any good. Hanging out the flag on important days is a good practice, but a man's patriotism is not to be measured by the regularity of his flag-displays. Furthermore, a true patriot is not one who thinks of his own stock as the true Americans, and all others as not quite it. A man like this will think of descendants of earlier immigrants as antiquated, out of touch with life; and the descendants of those immigrants who came later he thinks are "really" Europeans or something, never quite Americans.

Initiative

Many patriots' portraits are to be found in the Bible; Nehemiah is one of these. He was a governor of Jerusalem, under the Persian Empire, more than a hundred years after Jerusalem's freedom had been lost. Jerusalem had had a string of governors before; but not one of them, or all of them together, accomplished for that city and its people what Nehemiah did in his term of office. He was a true patriot, one whose services really benefit his country, one who renders services without asking payment in return; or if he is a man on salary, as Nehemiah seems to have been, he goes beyond what he is paid to do. Nehemiah never had to be pushed or prodded. He was out in front, seeing what had to be done and starting to do it, while other men slept.

Leadership

There have been patriots without much power or gift of leadership; but surely a better type of patriot is a man or woman who can stir other people to serve their country too. This Nehemiah is famous for building a wall; but he may never have laid a brick, personally. He did something far more miraculous than that; for the first time in 140 years, he got the people of Jerusalem hard at work at what they should have been doing long before: getting a wall built around their little city. The people "had a mind to work," but it was their governor who inspired this ambition in them. The great patriots of every nation's history,—David, Scipio, Henry V, George Washington, Syngman Rhee, and all the rest, have been men from whom as from a dynamo electric current flowed to vast numbers of their countrymen. Under their leadership, weak men were brave, discouraged men full of hope.

Religion

Religion, in any nation, is not like an auxiliary water tank, for the use of the fire department,—something that can be tapped in an emergency and then turned off again when the trouble is over. Religion if it is worth anything is more important than patriotism, just as God is more important than any country. Nevertheless, though God refuses to be used as a political ally, as Hitler and others have tried to use him, other things being equal the man with the most vital religion makes the best patriot. For religion is first and last a reliance upon God, as supreme Helper and as final Judge. Nehemiah's religion comes out in many ways, but it is plain that he was no once-a-week believer. His faith in God was woven into all his actions. He never spent long hours in prayer; but there was no corner of his life shut off from it.

Minuteman Discusses Future Autos & How They Affect The public

By Roger W. Babson
Park, Mass., Sept. 26.
The automobile is not only revolutionizing highways, retailing, and the style of buildings and homes. Simple arithmetic will prove that with the narrow business streets in the older cities, one of three things will happen:

evenings. New Shopping Centers are otherwise inevitable.

Smaller Homes Will Be Built

Another example of simple mathematics:—People can borrow only so much money. This limit is fast being reached. If families are to have one or two larger automobiles, these families must be satisfied with smaller and fewer rooms in their home. As autos become larger and more expensive, homes must become smaller and less expensive. I therefore forecast that many of my readers will turn their present houses into apartments.

All new homes will not have garages; but all will have enough land so that the family cars can be kept off the streets. The new

style of architecture will be based on the Old Cape Cod house of one and one-half stories, or else people will live in duplex or co-operative apartments. People gave up their "horse and buggy" when they bought an automobile. They will learn to give up their present style of homes. Putting more money into the automobile may result in putting less money into the home. This will especially be true if we are facing either war or disarmament.

What Rooms will be Retained

The future home will have no "dining room"; and the orthodox "parlor" is definitely doomed. Weddings, funerals, and receptions will be held outside the home in places which have proper parking space. There will be one large "living room" in which the family will live, cook and eat. There will be no "kitchen." With frozen foods and infra-red cooking, only a few minutes will be needed to prepare a meal. From such cooking there will be no mess or odor.

Every house will, however, have two bathrooms,—one for the parents, who will sleep on the first floor; one for the children, who will sleep on the second floor. Typical bathtubs of the present day will be seen only in museums. Bedrooms will be much smaller, comparing more with the state-rooms on ocean liners or on deluxe trains. Heating and air-conditioning will be much cheaper and more common. Both hot and cold air will come into the houses through underground pipes as gas and water now come. Electricity will be very much cheaper. "Bottled gas" will be used more.

What About Clothes?

Clothes can be much cheaper. Cloth will no longer be woven as cloth is today. Cloth will be made like paper cellophane. This unwoven new "synthetic cloth" will come out of a machine as finished dresses for the women and children, or as finished suits for the men. Some women readers will say, "Impossible, women will insist on wearing different dresses and hats. These, of course, can differ in colors, but women will then be satisfied with standard clothes. The automobile will standardize clothing. There will be a few different makes of clothes at different price ranges. Auto dealers and gas stations may carry clothing.

Yes, revolutionary changes to be caused by the automobile have just commenced. Far greater changes are ahead. As "drive-in theatres," are following indoor theatres, so "drive-in schools" and

"drive-in churches" will follow. Banks are now taking many of their deposits direct from customers who drive up in automobiles to a special window. Store show-windows, which have been a fruitful source of advertising for their merchants, will become of less value as more people pass in autos. More duplex and co-operative apartment houses are coming. Renting automobiles will largely take the place of buying them. This same may apply to furniture, and even clothes. This will especially be true if our nation is facing either War or Disarmament due to the threat of Russian Fallout.

1300 Telephone Directories Delivered In Area; Annual Record Of Expansion

The newest edition of Iuka's most-used reference book is off the press and citizens of the area should already have one in their possession.

It is Southern Bell's annual record of expansion in this area—the telephone directory.

Delivery was begun Sept. 18, according to W. G. Hardin, Southern Bell Manager.

This year's edition contains approximately 1200 alphabetical listings in its white pages and approximately 250 in its yellow classified section.

Some 1300 directories were delivered in this area. All deliveries should have been completed by Sept. 19. If you have not received your directory you should

notify the Telephone Business Office.

Hardin suggests that you throw away your old directory when you get the new one. That way, there's no chance of your looking in the old directory for a number, and possibly getting the wrong one.

The compilation and production of your directory is a time-consuming, never-ending job for Southern Bell's Directory Department employees in Jackson.

Listings must be added, corrected or deleted as often as people have telephone service installed, change telephone numbers or addresses, or move out of town. Every change in listing must be checked by the Directory Department. There, the listing is edited and abbreviated—directory style—and then sent

and up-to-date.

There are some 50 employees in Mississippi engaged in keeping 68 directories up-to-date.

There are an average of from 12,000 to 18,000 directory changes, additions, and deletions each month for the 68 directories in Mississippi.

More than 400,000 directories are printed each year for Mississippi exchanges. These require some 80 ton of paper and two tons of glue.

In addition to the normal directory changes, all listings must be changed in directories for exchanges changing to dial or "2-5" number system.

Your name gets into a directory like this:

When a request to install or move telephone service is received, a copy of the order is sent to the Directory Department. There, the listing is edited and abbreviated—directory style—and then sent

to a compilation clerk.

She adds, deletes or changes the listing, as the case may be, on a master manuscript copy of the directory. These changes are made continuously throughout the year.

Then once a year the corrected and up-to-date manuscript is sent to the printer. The final job is that of delivery, either in person or by mail.

Then you get to see your own name in print.

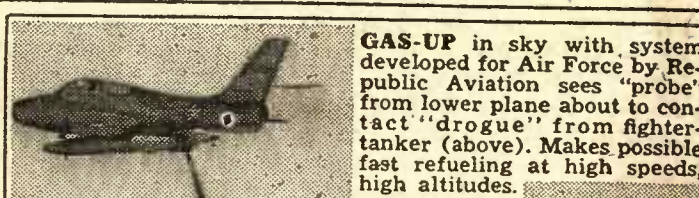

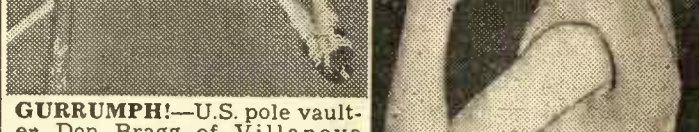

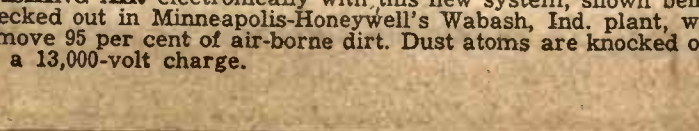
