Election Holders Named For October 15 When County Will Vote On Beer Question And \$80,000.00 School Bond Issue

The Tishomingo County Election Commission released for publica-
tion this week the names of per-
sons who will preside at each pre-
cinct during the double election
that is scheduled for Tuesday, Oc-
tober 15.

Issue to be voted on will be
the possession of beer or other
beverages of alcoholic content of
more than 4 per cent content and
an \$80,000.00 bond issue for
for schools of the county. A bal-
lot will be used for each proposi-
tion. Voters in the First district
will cast ballots only on the beer
question. They will not vote on
the school bond issue as all the
First District is included in the
Iuka Special Municipal School Dis-
trict that will not share in the
use of the \$80,000.00. Voters in
Districts 2, 3, 4, and 5, will re-
ceive a ballot for each of the
questions and will vote on each
separately.

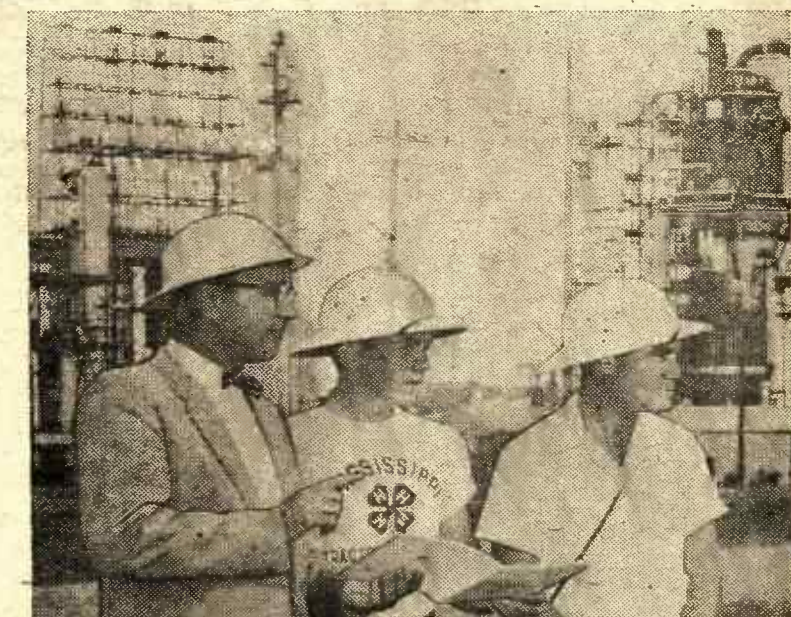

New Auto Tags Go On Sale In Sheriff's Office

The new 1958 automobile tags
went on sale on Monday of this
week at the sheriff's office in the
courthouse. The new license
plates have a bright yellow back-
ground and have figures in black.
"Although citizens of the county
have the entire month in which
to purchase 1958 tags it would be
wise for them to come in early
and avoid the last minute rush,
eventhough they cannot legally
be used until November 1," stated
Sheriff Wilson. "Anyone purchas-
ing a new car before Nov. 1,
will have to buy a 1957 tag for it
if he expects to drive the new car
before that date," he said. Only
one month's charge for the 1957
tag will be made.

Sheriff Wilson also stated that
a citizen, in order to purchase his
1958 tag, would need: "in addition
to your ad valorem tax receipt for
state and county taxes, we are now
required to see your city tax re-
ceipt, if you live in a town or mun-
icipality that collects taxes;

"If you have been a resident of
the State of Mississippi for thirty
days, or will have been prior to
October 31, 1957, you must pur-
chase a 1957 license plate before
we can sell you one for 1958;

"Out of state license plates,
even though current, must not be
used by residents of Mississippi;

"If you owned your car on or
before January 1, 1956, please
have your 1956 tax receipts for
county and city taxes when you
come to buy your license plate,"
he continued.

"Mr. A. S. Green, stat: field
man for the State Motor Vehicle
Comptroller's Office, will be in
my office each Tuesday and Friday
mornings through the month of
October to assist truck owners in
filling out their applications for
big truck tags and H-bus tags," the
sheriff concluded.

Searchers Dragging For Body Of James Franklin Rhodes; Boat Found Near Shore, Out Of Gear and Gas

An intensive search is being
made in the area of the mouth of
Yellow Creek on Pickwick Lake
for the body of James Franklin
Rhodes who is believed to have
been a victim of drowning.
Young Rhodes, 28, a commerci-
al fisherman, was on a fishing ex-
pedition Monday afternoon and
was last seen about 2:30 o'clock
when he left Eastport in his motor
boat. He was to have met two
of his fishing companions at what
they called the upper landing on
Yellow Creek, Rhodes going by
boat to the meeting place and the
companions, William Edgar and
W. T. Lambert, brothers, going
by auto around to the rendezvous
point. The brothers arrived and
waited for Rhodes to appear. The
trip by boat ordinarily took from
thirty to forty minutes from East-
port.

After waiting a length of time
the Lambert brothers returned in
search of Rhodes to Eastport with
the thought in mind that some-
thing might have caused him to
turn back. Not finding him (Rhodes)
at Eastport, the Lambert broth-
ers went again to the designated
meeting place and after searching
the area and failing to find Rhod-
es decided to go for assistance.

By this time night had fallen
and the auto the brothers were
driving failed to start, when they
decided to go for help. They walk-
ed to the Yellow Creek area to
the W. W. Johnson fish market
on highway 25 about two miles
north of Iuka. There they found
assistance and a search party went
out looking for Rhodes.

A group with Jimmy Rhodes,
brother to the victim, found the
boat (Rhodes') in a cove in the
Yellow Creek area about 2:30
Tuesday morning. The motor was
out of gasoline and was out of
gear, the boat floating a few feet
from the shore.

At daybreak Tuesday morning,
searching parties were organized
and dragging operations commen-
ced. This effort was continued all
day and was resumed again on
Wednesday morning with approxi-
mately 20 different boats and pos-
sibly fifty men taking part. Efforts
to locate the body are expected to
continue for several days.

Among those who have assisted
in the dragging operations are
highway patrolmen Audie Marl-
lar, Ralph Pennington, Creekmore
Wright, and John McCauley. Sher-
iff Whit Wilson assisted Wednes-
day and it is reported the Coast
Guard was in the area for a while
Wednesday morning. Many friends
of the young man and his family
and neighbors were also among
those who were searching for the
body.

Mr. Rhodes is the son of Mr. and
Mrs. Frank Rhodes who live on
highway 72 west of Iuka. He at-
tended and was graduated from
Burnsville high school and attend-
ed Northeast Jr. College at Boone-
ville. His wife is the former Shir-
ley Hughes; they have one child.

Governor Coleman Expresses Opinion On Little Rock, Arkansas, School Crisis

"The unfortunate turn of events
in Little Rock has not changed the
firm resolution of the State of
Mississippi to control its internal
affairs in public schools and other-
wise. This is not done in bias and
hatred, but simply because we
know it to be for the best interest
of all concerned, both white and
Negro. I hope all Mississippians
of all races will continue to take
just pride in our previous ability
to work together for the best in-
terest of all, instead of having our
State torn asunder in a manner
that cannot benefit anyone. What
one obtains by force of the United
States Army, they will have to
have the Army to maintain, and
troops cannot operate a public
school system.

"To those Mississippians who ap-
pear to be so greatly alarmed and
upset by the Arkansas situation,
I must point out the sad fact that
in a large measure Arkansas brought
these unhappy events upon it-
self. It was the local school board
there which, over two years ago,
recommended the integration of
the races in Little Rock; it is the

local school board which is con-
tinuing to keep the school open in
the face of the circumstances pre-
vailing," the Governor said.

"The people of Mississippi will
remember that in the campaign
of 1955 I said repeatedly that the
National Guard could not be suc-
cessfully used to maintain separa-
tion of the races in the public
schools, and I gave the reasons.
Events in Little Rock have clear-
ly proven the correctness of my
views. A show of force against an
overwhelmingly stronger force is
simply to invite annihilation, es-
pecially since the Guard is a mili-
tary arm of the United States Gov-
ernment and can be inducted into
the federal service upon call of
the President.

"Many of my friends have said
that Mr. Eisenhower would not use
federal troops to integrate the
schools. I have told them that in
my judgment he would do so the
first time it appeared to his ad-
vantage. The fact that he may be
legally wrong in doing it does not
change the fact that it has been
done. No doubt, as a result of this

episode, there are race-mixers who
are trying to devise some kind of
way to get these troops sent to
Mississippi if we can be goaded
into furnishing an excuse for it.

"I repeat what I have so many
times previously requested: I ask
all the people of Mississippi to
keep cool heads and calm minds
and leave the solution of these
problems to our duly chosen offi-
cials, which is the only way it can
possibly be done.

"The people of Mississippi may
be assured that the governor and
the legislature have no intention
of surrendering at any time or
any place to any unjustified, il-
legal, unconstitutional interference
with the rights of this State and
of its people. The governor and
the legislature are in constant con-
ference to this end. Success will
not be attained by loud talk and
muddy thinking, but by well plan-
ned action.

"We did not make the mess in
Little Rock. Let us not lose our
heads and permit it to cause a
mess here in Mississippi," Gover-
nor Coleman concluded.

Southern States Industrial Council PRESIDENT DECLARES WAR ON ARKANSAS

Somewhere a long the golf course at the plush vacation resort of Newport, Rhode Island, President Eisenhower took time out to press the state militia of Arkansas into federal service. Then a few holes later, on behalf of the rest of the United States, without consulting

Congress about it, and without prior notice to the Governor, he decided to declare war on the State of Arkansas.

This showed real dedication to his job, as the President doesn't often let anything interfere with his golf game. It also took cour-

age, such would be shown perhaps by an old military man, because population—wise he only outnumbered his foe 168 million to 2 million.

Of course, not all this 168 million are with him on this decision—not by any means—but he is the commander-in-chief of the army, and what can defenseless people, without any troops of their own, do against military might? It is also true that the members of the national guard of Arkansas who were pressed into federal service only to prevent their use by the Governor would resign if they could, but they are also under military rule and can no longer make decisions for themselves.

However, since this drafted army cannot be expected to be sympathetic to the purpose for which they were forced into service, the President also sent into the state a tough contingent of paratroopers, black and white, from the federal army, with all battle equipment, to make sure that Arkansas should be awed and subdued.

Thus the the rights of a Sovereign State, guaranteed under the Constitution, thwarted, ignored and abrogated. We have indeed reach-

ed a sorry state of affairs. The second Reconstruction Period is now upon us. The people of Arkansas are not only now under the military rule of their own troops, along with those brought in from the federal forces, but they are also helping to pay for the cost of occupation!

What Arkansas should really do is declare war upon the United States, get defeated, then be rebuilt and live at ease ever after on foreign aid!

To show the President's real dedication to his job in this case, he had no more than declared war upon Arkansas until he flew back to Washington for the evening to make a nationwide television appearance, on all networks, to explain to the people why he had taken this action. For all the satisfaction it gave those who listened, he just as well have stayed on the golf course and finished his round.

The main reason the President gave for sending federal troops into Arkansas, and the one upon which he dwelt the most, was that old moth-eaten, illogical, thoroughly discredited and actually unpatriotic excuse that he had to do so because what was happening in Little Rock was discrediting us in

the eyes of the rest of the world. Now, we ask you—is the handling of the internal government of the United States of America to be based upon the opinions of the peoples of other nations of the world who have made a sorry mess of their own affairs, and just about everyone of whom would jump at the chance to change places with the Negroes in this country? That is the real question. If the answer is yes, then we want none of it. It should be pointed out, too, that these nations have been very happy to accept more than \$60 billion of our foreign aid since the end of the World War II without criticism. Such is their gratitude!

It is also a question of the preservation of the constitutional republicanism from of government under which we have lived and prospered as a nation. The cornerstone of that form of government is states' rights. If these rights are to be destroyed, then we no longer have the form of government created for us by our forefathers. There was never any reason for the infamous Black Monday decision of the Supreme Court. It could never be enforced in those states who do not want integra-

tion without the connivance of the Executive. The situation in Arkansas was not a question of anarchy, as the President claimed; the Governor of Arkansas, under his constitutional rights, would have had no trouble whatever keeping order in his state if he had not

been deprived of this authority by order of the federal court.

If the President of the United States were thinking more of the welfare of his own people and less of world opinion, if he would listen to his own conscience more, perhaps, and less to poor advisers,

he would call Congress back into session and recommend amendment of the Constitution to put the power of the states back into control of their own schools.

Clergymen May File For S S Benefits Under New Law

Those clergymen who did not file waiver certificates before April 15, 1957 and lost their right to elect coverage as self-employed persons under the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance program now have another chance, Hugh Tigrett, District Manager, Tupelo, Mississippi stated today. An amendment to the Internal Revenue Code gives them an extended period of 2 more years to secure old-age, survivors, and disability protection for themselves and their families. This new period will expire on April 15, 1959.

Ministers who file waivers during this extended period will be mandatorily covered for 1956 and subsequent years for which they have net earnings from self-employment of \$400.00 or more from the pursuit of their ministry. In addition, any minister who filed a waiver before August 31, 1957, but who filed it too late to secure coverage for 1956, may elect coverage for 1956 by filing a supplemental waiver during the extended period. The law does not permit ministers to elect coverage retroactively for 1955.

Mr. Tigrett also pointed out that the new law provides that for taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1957, ministers will include as net earnings for social security purposes the rental value of a parsonage or rental allowance furnished them as part of their compensation and the value of meals and lodgings furnished them for the convenience of their employer.

Any minister who has a question about his status under the new law should contact the representative from the Tupelo Social Security Office who visits the Court House in Iuka on the first and third Mondays of each month.

Good Returns Continue From Winter Grazing

State College, Miss.—Results of 1956-57 winter grazing tests at the South Mississippi Branch Experiment Station show that ryegrass-crimson was the most profitable, followed by rye-ryegrass, oats and wheat in that order. Results were measured in pounds of beef produced per acre.

The crops were planted October 11 to 13 and all made good growth during October and November. Oats gave a per-acre return of \$43.68 above costs, wheat \$32.34, rye-ryegrass \$45.64 and ryegrass-crimson clover \$53.09.

Steers were bought at \$16.80 per hundredweight and sold at \$21.00. Grazing began November 30 and extended until May 9 on all paddocks except the wheat where it ended April 10.

Commenting on the test, Agronomist Clyde Blount said: "The 1956-57 grazing season was below average with dry weather in January and the development of disease in February as the cause of the low gain. The net profit was still satisfactory.

"Ryegrass was affected less by disease than the small grains therefore ryegrass gave better results than the small grains.

"The average for four years

shows oats, rye-ryegrass and ryegrass-crimson clover all produced about the same return per acre with the difference reflecting the difference in cost of seed. Wheat did not produce as much as the other crops due to the shorter grazing season. There was no advantage in favor of the ryegrass combination over oats or ryegrass and crimson and in most years the crimson clover made very little growth in competition with the ryegrass and actually contributed very little grazing to the combination.

"In general oats should be planted on the well drained soils and ryegrass on the poorly drained soils."

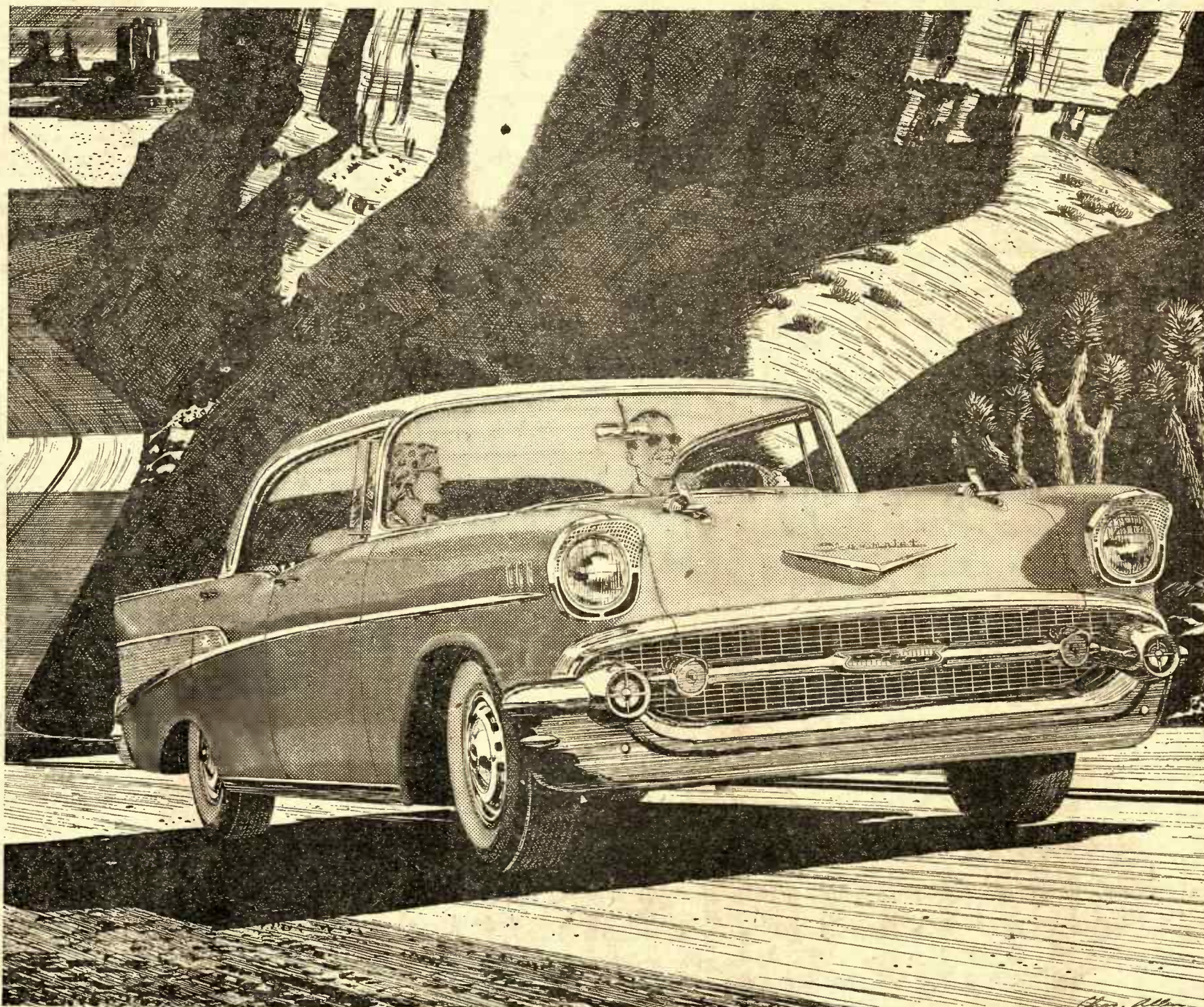

Consumer prices climbed to a record high in August for the 12th consecutive month. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that its consumer price index—a monthly sampling of prices for 300 goods and services across the nation—stood at an all-time high of 121. The August index figure was 2 per cent higher than that of July. Food contributed mainly to the August increase, climbing 4 per cent during the month. OAT CROP HURT IN SOUTH MISS.

The oat crop in South Mississippi suffered great disease damage from crown rust. Victoria and other blight also damaged the corn affecting the heads of oat plants and preventing the formation of grain. Smuts and virus were also present to uncommon degrees, and all of the diseases were present at the same time in some fields. Dr. S. S. Ivanoff of the Mississippi Experiment Station recommended planting blight-resistant oats such as Nortex 107, Delta Red 88, Texas Red, Delair, Camellia, Sure-grain and other when possible. Other recommendations are treating seed before planting with either Ceresam M, 1/2-ounce per bushel, or Panogen, 3/4 per bushel; and avoidance of planting oats for grain on poorly drained land.

The rapid turnover of patrons of any business is another major reason for long-term consistency in advertising. For instance, bicycle shops lose approximately ten percent of their customers to used car dealers each year. In turn, used car buyers just as quickly move to the new car market.

Born of these reasons for consistency in advertising are dramatically illustrated in the baby food business. An official of Gerber's Baby Foods estimates that the baby food industry loses a satisfied customer to adult menus every eight seconds. Therefore, advertising has the task of replacing that

customer every eight seconds. "If there is any audience that calls for consistency in advertising, it is young mothers. You can't win their confidence by advertising that starts and stops, nor with special drives, deals and other hit-and-run tactics," the Gerber executive said.

He added that retail grocers are the most consistent advertisers in the country, and for good reason: "They have found it pays," he said.

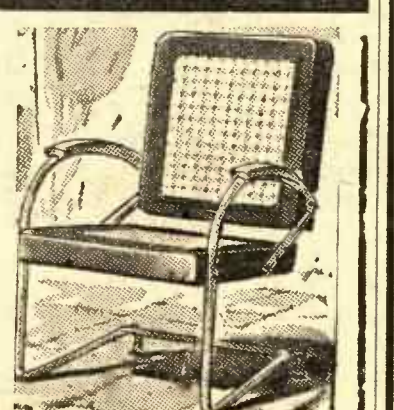

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
 International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
 Background Scripture: I Corinthians 1:4
 Devotional Reading: I Corinthians 3:11-23
Ideal and Real
 Lesson for October 6, 1957

PAUL was not the fly-by-night sort of preacher who passes through a town, stirs up a meeting and moves on, so to speak, without looking back. He was not the kind of missionary who preaches to the natives gathered on the river bank, starts his engine and cruises on down the river, confident that the gospel has been brought to the people. Paul being a statesman as well as a saint, a psychologist as well as a theologian, stayed long enough — when ever they would — let him — in every place he visited, to found a church, a going, active fellowship of believers. Then after he left, he would take time from his more than busy life to write back. He knew that churches, like new Christians, like new babies, need post-natal care. It is not safe to bring them into the world and just leave them.

Called to Be Saints
 No church gave Paul more trouble than the one at Corinth. That city was big, booming and bad. Most of the Corinthian church members had had no background of experience in the high religion of the Jews, but came in from raw paganism. Few of them were persons of great culture. At the time Paul wrote to them first, none of them had been Christians long. And yet Paul writes to them as the "sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints." As J. B. Phillips translates Paul's Greek, these Corinthians are "those whom Christ has made holy, who are called to be God's men and women." Almost every one of Paul's letters to Christian churches begins on this same high note. To the Ephesian Christians he writes that they have been "stamped with the promised Holy Spirit as a guarantee of purchase" (Phillips). The Colossians he calls "saints and faithful brethren." Theologians and others have often discussed the question: Is the church human or divine? If we take Saint Paul seriously, we have to say, at least, that the church is made of persons who have been touched and are being transformed by the divine.

"There Is Quarreling..."
 The ink is hardly dry on the high words, Paul has used to describe his "brothers" in the Corinthian church, when he begins to write in a quite different key. "It has been reported," he says, "that there is quarreling among you." The reader who pushes on through this and the second letter to the Corinthians may be shocked by what he sees. These people are unspiritual (3:1), they are babies (3:2), there is jealousy and strife among them (3:3). Gross sin goes on among them unrestrained (5:1,2). They have lawsuits against one another (6:1). They have to be warned against prostitution (6:15, 16). Some of them came drunk to communion, or got drunk there (11:21). Paul is afraid that when he next visits them he may find "selfishness, slander, gossip, conceit and disorder" (II Cor. 12:20). How can he say such things to people who have been "sanctified" and are "called to be saints"? The truth is, Paul sees the Corinthians, as he saw all his converts and all his churches, in two lights. He sees the ideal church, what it ought to be and what in the mind of God it already is, or more precisely what it is destined to be.

The Answer
 Now the church moves from where it is to where it is to be. But by what power? What is the secret of the church's transformation from what it is to what it is destined to become, from the real to the ideal? The answer is—in one word—Christ. Paul calls him the "power of God and the wisdom of God." In other words, as Christ comes to live in the hearts of these raw, imperfect, quarreling Christians-by-intention, they will become changed, as time goes on, more and more into his likeness. As they face their many problems, they will learn to find the solutions as they learn more and more what the spirit of Christ really is. If Christ lives in his church, the church will not be tempted to confuse what it is with what it ought to be,—it will not mistake the real church for the ideal one; but on the other hand, if He lives in the church, no one has a right to be discouraged, and fear that the ideal will never come true.

Small sweetpotato crop... seasonal rise in pork and turkeys... more milk than last year... by end of year, fewer eggs... as a whole about 3 percent less meat supplies than last year.

Pot Plant in Winter
As the nights get cooler, you will be bringing your pot plants inside for the winter. And you will be using gas, electric or other heat in the house.

The flower specialists tell us that plants in heated rooms often benefit from artificial moisture. One way they suggest to provide this moisture is to put the pots in a shallow metal container of moistened coarse sand. Something like a cookie sheet or shallow pan will be what you want.

The evaporation of moisture from the sand keeps air humid around plants.

Another suggestion: If you use gas, check your burners for leaks. Unburned gas fumes may kill pot plants. Gas that is burned is harmless.

Re-Upholster? Or Not?

Been wondering what to do with that old chair? Thinking about reupholstering it yourself?

Before you decide to do the job yourself in place of hiring it done, ask yourself some more questions. If you can give honest "yes" an-

swers to most of them, it may be better to do your own upholstering. More "No's" than "Yeses" indicate you'd better let someone else do the work for you.

Do you want to do this work? Can you do it well? Do you feel like undertaking the job? Remember there is quite a bit of hard work involved.

Do you have time to do it? A real upholstering job takes time, so do not expect to finish the task in a few hours.

How much will it cost to have the chair upholstered? Will you save much money by doing it yourself?

The farmers of Tishomingo county will soon have all their crops harvested. Then there will be a season when much of the cropland of the county will be left bare.

It is during this season, when the land is left bare, that much of our topsoil is washed away. There are some practices a farmer can follow to slow down this erosion.

First, he can cut his stalks on the hill-land and leave them scattered as a mulch on the land surface. A bush-bog is an excellent tool to use for this purpose, because it will cut cotton and corn stalks into small pieces and scatter these pieces over the surface of the land.

Second, sod seeding small grain and vetch on cropland will check erosion when the seeding is done on the contour. Sod-seeding of legumes and small grain is an excellent soil and water conservation practice, because fertilizer and seed can be placed in the ground without having to break the land. When the land is plowed, or broke, it is exposed to heavy rains and much of it washes away. The sod-seeder leaves most of the land undisturbed while placing the seed and fertilizer in shallow furrows about 20 inches apart.

Third, winter legumes and small grain can be planted in the regular way. Any form of land cover whether it is growing plants, or stalks cut and scattered over the land will protect the land from erosion and will cause more of the water that falls on the land to sink into the soil.

Sociologists for years have pointed out that poorland makes poor people and where the land is fertilized the people prosper.

During the last few years more and more attention is being paid to ground-water. Scientist tell us that water is getting to be our most precious natural resource. Enormous amounts of water is used in manufacturing processes. Regardless of how fertile the land is

Fire Prevention Week
Don't give fire a place to start. Farm fires cost plenty. They sometimes cost lives and always cost money.

Protect your pastures, barns, other farm buildings and homes. A good way to make a start towards keeping these from being destroyed by fire is to build fire lanes between pastures and woods, pastures and public roads; around stacked hay and between pastures and farm buildings.

Fire in woods can and almost always does destroy valuable timber. Use extreme care when in or around the woods.

National Fire Prevention Week, October 6-12, is a good time to take stock and see where you stand regarding fire prevention. It is a good time to check your fire fighting equipment and make sure that it is in good operating condition.

Managing Bermuda Sod

Bermuda sods that are to have oats or wheat interplanted or where white clover, red clover or crimson clover are to be planted or volunteer, it will pay to graze these areas down in October or clip them. Where volunteering peas are to come back, it doesn't make too much difference. They will get through. Leave some Bermuda areas for frosted winter grazing. I would disk fire lanes and not let the Bermuda burn off. There is too much to destroy both from the Bermuda and the young legumes coming up in the Bermuda.

Sweetpotatoes

Remember to get your sweetpotatoes dug before frost. Use some caution in digging them. Don't bruise them. Field grade the potatoes and do not leave them out in hot sun.

Judy Ann Barrett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Barrett of Iuka, was one month old on September 29. She is doing very well and is expected to grow up to be a completely normal girl, according to Dr. John E. Rawls. Her Present weight is 2 pounds, 4½ ounces.

Judy Ann weighed 2 pounds 1½ ounces at birth. Due to her delicacy she was not taken from her incubator for weighing until she was two weeks old. The weight at that time was one pound fourteen ounces. What her least weight was is unknown since she had started gaining weight before this weighing.

The tiny baby is still living in an incubator but oxygen and humidity have been discontinued. She is gently lifted out once daily to change her blanket. Feedings of a formula prepared with simlac are given one-half ounce every two hours. This is still being given with a medicine dropper. A sucking reflex has been present for about one week but is not vigorous enough yet for her to be changed to a nipple feeder.

Just how long Judy Ann will remain in the Corinth hospital cannot be predicted. She will have to remain there until she reaches five pounds.

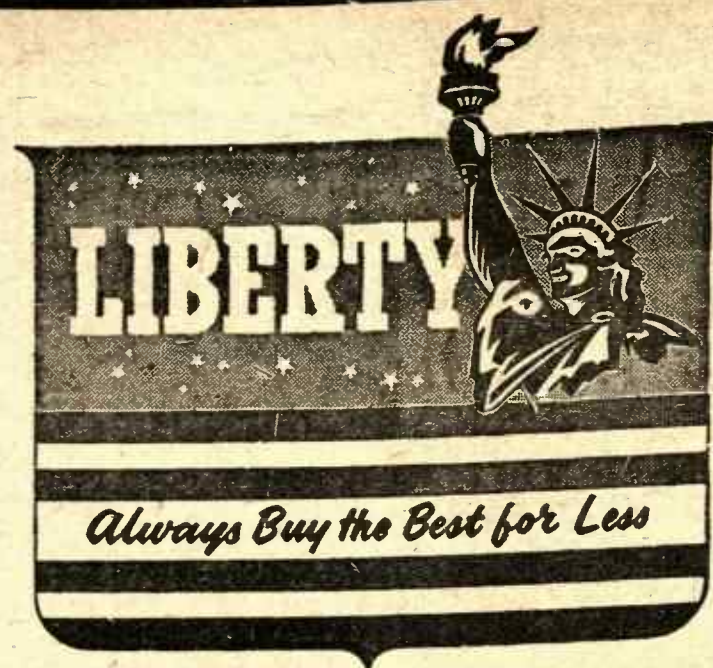
