Final Rites For James Franklin Rhodes, Drowning Victim, Held Sat. Morning

Final rites for James Franklin Rhodes, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Rhodes of Iuka, Route 2, were held Saturday morning at 11 o'clock from the Mt. Moriah Baptist church.

Mr. Rhodes, 27, had been missing since Monday afternoon, Sept. 30, when he failed to meet some friends at a designated point near Yellow Creek on Pickwick Lake. His body was found Friday morning, Oct. 4, within a hundred feet of where his boat was found when he was first missed. His brothers, Harold Lynn and Bonnie Joe Rhodes, were the first to sight the body which had risen to the surface. Finding of the body culminated 3 days of constant search by friends of the family and neighbors.

Survivors, in addition to his parents include his wife, Shirley Hughes Rhodes and a six-month-old son, Keith, of Tishomingo; 3 brothers, Harold Lynn of the Air Force, Niceville, Fla., Jimmie of Burnsville, and Bonnie Joe who lives with the parents; two nephews, two grandparents and a number of other relatives.

Burial was in the Mt. Moriah cemetery with Bros. S. C. Wilbanks of Kossuth and Danny McAlister officiating. He was a Christian. He was a veteran of the army, where he served as an M.P.

\$12,000 Received For Construction of New Plant Building

Carlton Woodley, chairman of a committee on collections for financial aid in the addition of building space on the Iuka Shirt Co. plant, reports that \$12,000 has been pledged thus far on the program and that further pledges are continuing to be accepted. Any one wishing to assist in this worthy cause is asked to contact Mr. Woodley.

Plans are to enlarge the shirt plant building by as much as 10,000 square feet so that new departments that are necessary to the successful operation of the business may be instituted.

Sealed bids for the construction of the added space will be opened Friday of this week. The additional space is expected to increase employment by as much as 60 people, Bernard Lukoff, manager, stated.

Pledges of financial aid from local citizens are being accepted by the company as a loan. All money pledged will be repaid with interest over a period of approximately 10 years.

To Vote Next Tuesday

Election Will Decide Issue On Alcohol, Beer Possession

**Will Make County Laws Conform
With Most Recent Acts Of
Mississippi Legislature**

All citizens of the county will have an opportunity on next Tuesday, October 15, to express their wishes concerning the possession of beer, wine and any and all drinks containing alcohol.

Several weeks ago, the Board of Supervisors received petitions containing approximately 1100 names of citizens of the county asking that this election be held. After purging the petitions and determining that the required number of 20 per cent of qualified

voters was included, the Board ordered the election held.

Purpose of the election is to amend the county law to conform with the law as passed by the 1936 session of the Legislature which prohibits the possession of beer, wine, or any other beverage with alcoholic content. As the law exists today, and according to a recent ruling of the Mississippi Supreme Court, a person is allowed to possess beer, wine or any other beverages of less than 4 per cent alcoholic content.

The election on beer will be held in each precinct in the county and will be in conjunction with an election in the last four Supervisor's districts asking for an \$80,000 school bond issue.

Voters in the First District will receive only one ballot and those in the last four districts will get two: one each for each of the two propositions and shall vote on each proposition separately. Polls at all precincts will open at 8 a. m., and will close at 6 p.m.

Bond Issue To Be Passed On In Districts 2, 3, 4, And 5

**Money Will Be Added To \$470,000
From State To Create \$550,000.00
Project To Build, Repair Schools**

Residents of Tishomingo county will go to the polls next Tuesday to decide two important issues: Facing the entire county will be the election on a proposition to outlaw the possession of beer, wine, or any other and all beverages containing alcohol of four percent or more by weight.

Facing Districts 2, 3, 4, and 5, will be, in addition to the question on alcohol, an \$80,000.00 school bond issue.

This amount of money is being

asked by the County Board of Education. The \$80,000 will be added to \$470,000.00 that will come from the state, thus making a total of \$550,000.00 that will be used in a building program for the schools in the last four Supervisor's districts.

Early this year, schools of the county were re-organized, according to recent acts of the legislature, the Iuka Separate School District being enlarged to include all of the First Supervisor's District and all county schools being organized into a County Unit that comprises Supervisor's Districts 2, 3, 4, and 5.

Five attendance centers will be maintained in the County School Unit, four for white students and one for colored. White centers will be at Belmont, Tishomingo, Holcut and Burnsville. School buildings at these places will be repaired and improved according to their needs, part of the \$550,000 to be used for this purpose. Also, to come out of the \$550,000 school building fund will be a new school house for the colored people. The new building will be located about one mile north of Tishomingo on highway 25.

Polls for both elections will open at 8 a.m., and will close at 6 p.m., Tuesday, October 15. Voters in the last four Supervisor's Districts will receive two ballots: one for the alcohol proposition and one for the school bond issue. One set of election holders will be employed at each precinct. There will be two ballot boxes.

SENSING THE NEWS

APOLOGISTS FOR AMERICA

In all the aftermath of the inexcusable Black Monday decision of the Supreme Court of the United States on May 7, 1954, just about

the most disgusting and sickening spectacle we have witnessed is that exhibited by those weak-kneed apologists who are constantly

stressing, and worried about, the criticism by foreign peoples of the troubles we are having as result of that decision.

The President emphasized the criticism we are receiving from abroad in his television appearance on the Little Rock situation. We are constantly hearing it mentioned by commentators on radio and television, by preachers in the pulpit and others in the field of religious endeavor, by internationalists, one-worlders and do-gooders. Many of our people who have been traveling abroad, including Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt just back from Europe, report that the Russian and other communist newspapers in particular as well as other newspapers over the world are full of it. We even read accounts of our junketing Congressmen, vacationing abroad at the taxpayers' expense, making apologetic statements about the situation here. If one of them has made a statement abroad defending America, we haven't heard about it.

Instead of explaining and de-

fending the situation here in the United States, instead of standing up for the United States, many of our public leaders, our religious leaders, our well-known travelers (whether fellow-or not, we don't know) and news commentators seem to be falling over themselves apologizing for this country and its people. To what low estate have independence and patriotism fallen! Even those who believe in integration could at least have the patriotism to defend the right of the people of the United States to settle their own affairs in their own way!

If space permitted, this criticism by foreign peoples could be answered sufficiently and completely by dwelling on any one of three points

One - Those who criticize are much more concerned with the "mote" in our eye than they are with the "beam" in their own eye. The Russians, for instance, maintain segregated schools in Central Asia, one for the Russians and one for the natives, and they do so pointedly on the difference in race and color. The discrimination of the caste system in India and the violence resulting therefrom

makes anything that has happened in this country along racial lines seem tame by comparison. Many other cases could be cited.

Two - The Negroes of the United States have made more progress in this country than their race has made at any time at any place in all recorded history. And it has only been achieved with the help of the white people, because the Negro race has watched civilization march by them for 4,000 years and more without raising a hand to help itself. Just about every one abroad who is criticizing would jump at the chance to change places with the American Negroes.

Three - It comes with bad grace for other nations of the world, including those which are socialist and communist, who by the end of this fiscal year will have received from us \$66 billion or more in foreign aid since the end of the Second World War, to criticize the handling of the internal affairs of their benefactor. They accepted our aid with good enough grace! Isn't there an old, old saying about the ingratitude of "biting the hand that feeds you"?

The point we are making here,

though, is this - and the people of this country should not overlook it - If we must settle our internal affairs in accordance with the opinion of peoples of other nations, then we no longer deserve our appellation as "the land of the free and the home of the brave." This nation was founded by men who believed in independence, self-reliance and doing what they thought was right without reference to criticism by other nations. In this way only can freedom be preserved.

Of course communist nations like Russia are criticizing, and gloating over, our troubles - but the point we should remember is this: The communists began their gloating when the Supreme Court handed down its Black Monday integration decree. They knew it would bring division and dissension among the people - and that's what communism feeds upon. They

are gloating because this decision was one of the steps in the plan they formulated many years ago to convert this nation to communism. The communists are gloating, too, because the Supreme Court integration decree has brought forth action upon the part of the executive branch of our government very similar to the totalitarian practices followed by communist governments. They are gloating because other decisions of the Court have made it easier for communism to infiltrate our government and our institutions, to undermine the confidence of the American people in their courts and public officials. They are gloating because of the American people in their courts and public officials. They are gloating because we are destroying ourselves and saving them the trouble. Are we going to continue to play into their hands?

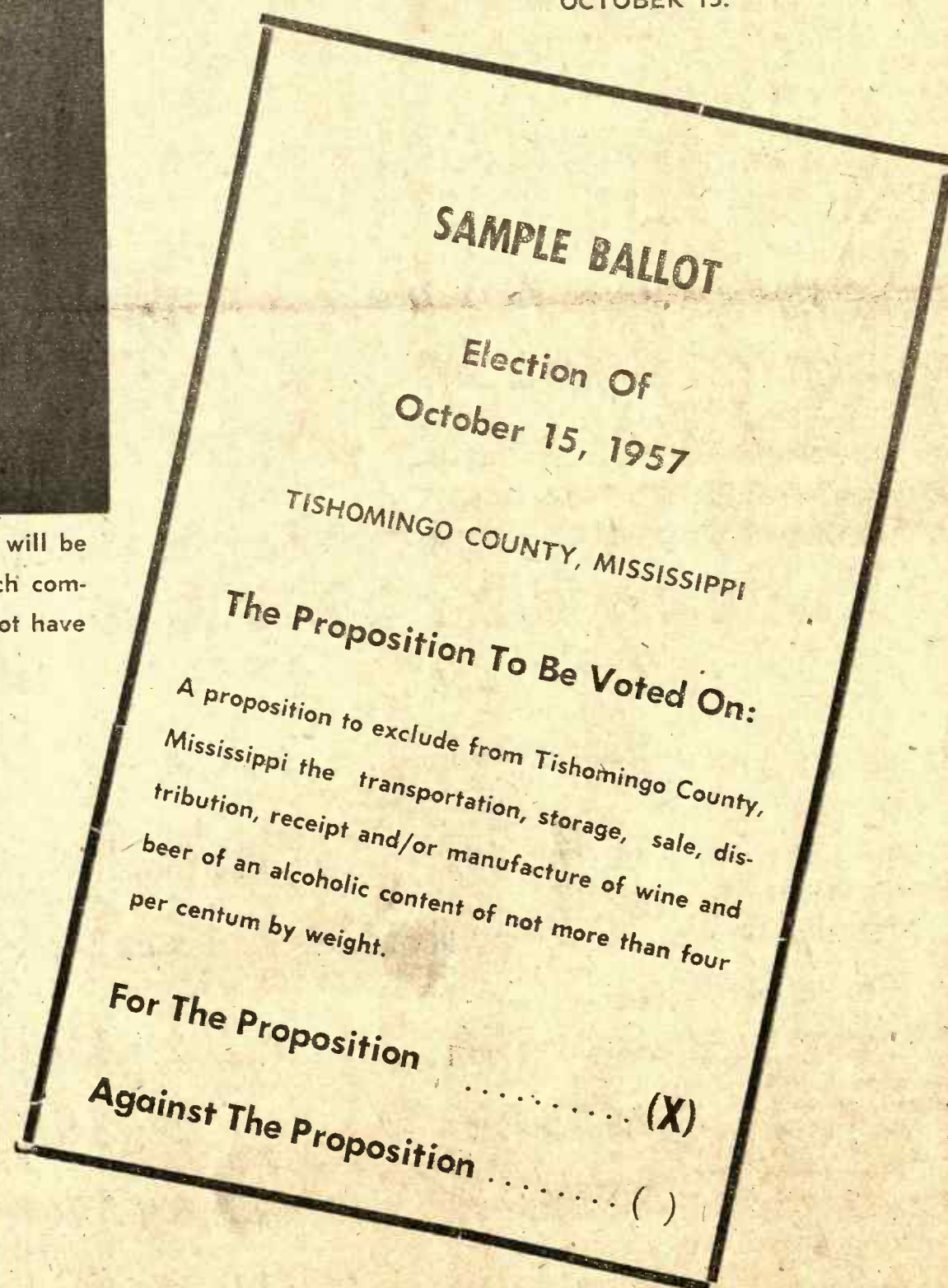

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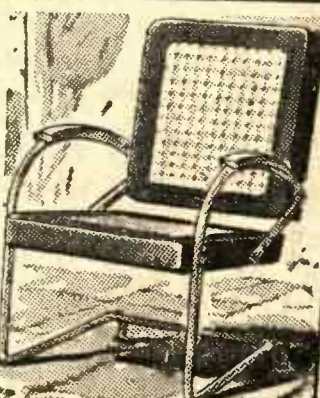

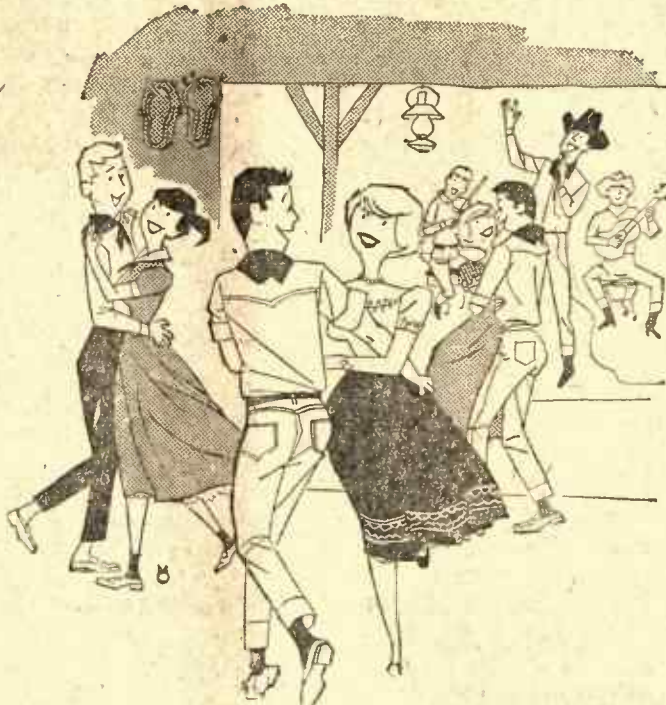

Sweetpotato Harvesting

It is very important to use proper methods of harvesting, grading, handling and storing this year's sweetpotato crop.

Careful handling is necessary to prevent bruising and marring the appearance of the green potatoes. Careless or rough handling of sweetpotatoes at harvest results in poorer grade-out, lower prices and excessive loss in storage.

Be sure to begin harvesting in time to get the entire crop out of the field and in the storage house before danger of killing frost. Sweetpotatoes are damaged when exposed to temperatures of 50 degrees F. or lower.

Partially grade the sweetpotatoes when dug. Carefully place in separate crates the marketable potatoes and seed stock to be cured and stored. Badly cut, bruised and off-grade potatoes should not be stored.

For digging sweetpotatoes use a broad-base tractor-drawn turning plow. It should be set off-center and at the correct depth. It will turn out the potatoes with the least amount of cutting and bruising.

Make sure that you have plenty of labor available to complete the harvest as quickly as possible. Grade, pick up and remove the potatoes from the field as soon as possible to prevent damage from sun scald during the day and cold exposure during the night. A better job of curing is done when storage house is filled within a few days time.

For best results in curing, a temperature of 85 degrees F. should be maintained for five to eight days. Humidity in the house should be 85 to 90 percent. After curing, reduce the house temperature to 55 to 60 degrees F. and maintain this temperature.

Dairying

Giving a dairy cow a six to eight week dry period before freshening can mean she will produce an extra 1,000 pounds of milk during her next lactation.

This dry period gives the cow a chance to rebuild body reserves that have been drained during lactation and to make necessary repair to her udder. During the last two months of pregnancy, the developing calf makes two thirds of its total growth. This takes a lot of feed and will have to be taken care of in the feeding program.

Heavy producers and cows that have had mastitis need a little special treatment. If the cow is producing more than 20 pounds a day, cut her grain and reduce her drinking water. When production drops below 20 pounds, simply stop milking her. But keep a close watch and if the udder gets to tight, you may need to partially milk her again. Too much pressure in the udder of a cow that has had mastitis may cause another flare-up of the disease.

The amount of grain fed during the dry period depends on condition of the cow at the end of lactation. Unless she is very thin, four pounds of grain a day will usually be enough if plenty of roughage is available.

September Rain

Was 6 Inches Over Normal

Rainfall during the month of September was six inches above normal for the month, with rain falling 20 of the 30 days. The weather bureau recorded 8.29 inches of

rainfall compared to the September normal rainfall of 2.10 inches. There only two fair days and seven days had absolutely no sunshine. Four other days recorded only two to 16 minutes of sunshine and most of the rest were partly cloudy. Since Sept. 23 it has been six to 14 degrees below the normal.

Well-Known Writer Discusses Central States' Opportunity; Investments

By Roger W. Babson
Babson Park, Mass., Oct. 10. — Roger W. Babson, one of the great Central West writers, will blossom like a rose. That is why it is called the "Magic Circle." This includes the six states of Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Arkansas, and a total area of about 400,000 square miles.

Called The Magic Circle? Because the area has the potential of being the breadbasket of the United States. It has much sunshine, and, in many years, plenty of rain. Unfortunately, however, it has very few periods for some years, and

climate of various regions. Some day an artificial river will be constructed from these lakes, across the Canadian line southerly to the very Center of the United States. This "Center" will be near Greenwood County, of which Eureka, Kansas, is the hub. From Eureka, canals will radiate in different directions to provide water for all sections of the Magic Circle.

My Personal Investments
I am interested in the woodlands of New Hampshire; in lake-front land in Florida; and, of course, in land in Wellesley, Mass.; but the only pasture land which interests me is in this Magic Circle. I have bought such land because I believe that some day an artificial river will be constructed to utilize this run-off water by sending it southerly to the Magic Circle instead of letting it be wasted in the Arctic Circle. These 400,000 square miles will be glad to pay Canada for this water, which is now of no use to Canada.

Plans should immediately be made and negotiations started. We

should not wait until we are in dire need of the food from the nation's breadbasket. Those who own land which will some day be irrigated by these Canadian waters should retain their land and perhaps buy more. A Federal Authority will someday be organized to build the new river, the bonds of which should easily be paid off by "tolls" on the increased crops. Today we have a surplus of certain crops which we are storing; but this situation will soon change because of population growth and export demand.

Work of John W. Fowler, Jr.
Really, my friend Mr. Fowler of Homewood, Alabama, deserves the credit for this idea although it is only a portion of his grand plan. He believes that as soon as the Government completes its proposed national highways and toll roads for automobiles, it will immediately start on a similar program for water. Mr. Fowler believes that there will be three North and South "toll" rivers built: One along the east side of the Rockies, starting from Fort Peck and following the Rocky Mountains, giving sufficient water supply to Southern California, Arizona, and New Mexico. A second further east would feed the Magic Circle by gravity and would start from an elevation of 2,000 feet; while the third would change the flow of the Great Lakes so that instead of this fresh water running off through the St. Lawrence into the Atlantic Ocean and being wasted, it would flow westerly and be distributed where needed.

These possibilities are clearly shown on the Great Relief Map of the United States (sixty-five feet by forty-five feet) and the World's Largest Revolving Globe (about thirty feet in diameter, weighing over 20 tons), both of which may be seen at Babson Park, Massachusetts.

Just as it is important for Mary and Johnny to learn good breakfast habits and their school subjects, they need to learn how to use money wisely.

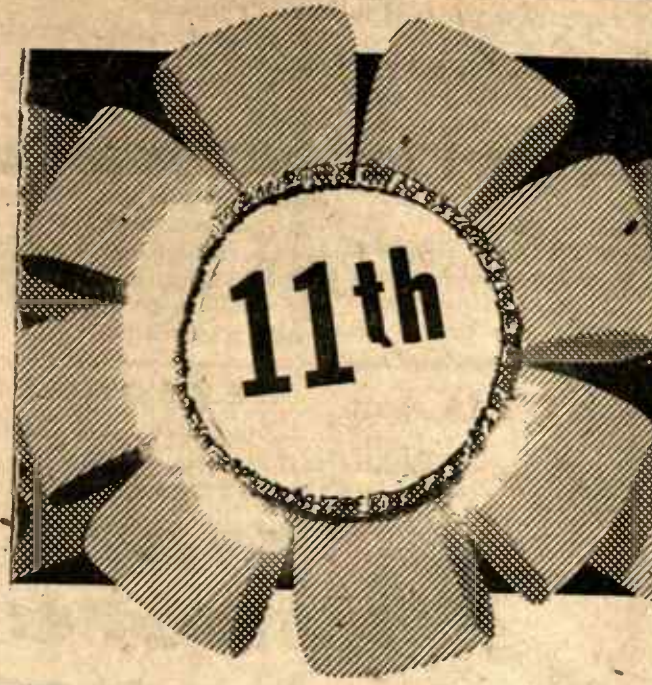
