Thus, with the \$8,000.00 furnished by the Twentieth Century Club a balance of only \$6,000.00 will be needed and this is the amount the Rotary Club has voted to underwrite.

W. E. Ludlam, finance committeeman of the Rotary club, says he has received pledges that will add up to more than \$2,000.00. This amount has been promised by fewer than forty citizens, and it is thought that with the aid of everyone and all the civic and women's clubs, the money can be obtained without creating a hardship on any one or any group.

Plans are being studied whereby youth of the community may assist in a fund-raising drive.

From there Ripley proceeded to score two quick touchdowns with neither extra point being added. The second touchdown coming after an intercepted pass. The halftime ended with the score being 12-0.

In the second half Iuka kicked off to the Tigers and then held them for four downs. Bill Moore then took the fourth down punt and returned it 12 yards to the Iuka 46 yard line. The Warriors then went the next 54 yards in 8 plays, with Buddy James, Right Halfback, slicing off tackle for the score from 4 yards out. Savell scored the extra point.

The Warriors then kicked off to Ripley and continued to play top football. Ripley kicked on fourth down and the local team started another drive only to be stopped on an intercepted pass. From this point on the game turned into an offensive battle with both teams putting together long drive. 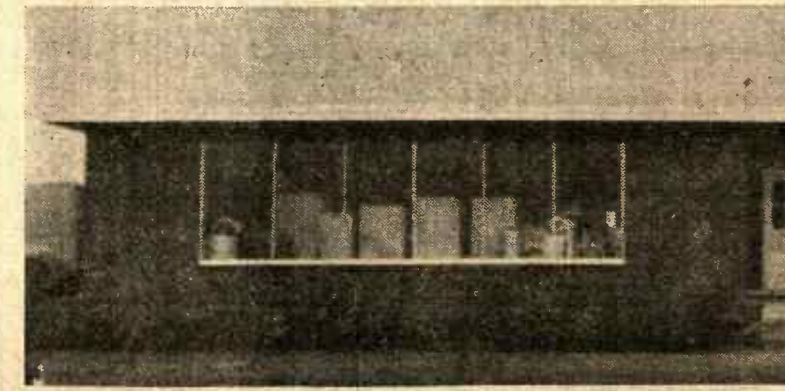
Gospel Singing Concert Program

Iuka Schools Preparing For Expansion Moves

Possible Sites Being Considered; Long-Range Plan Approved

A long-range plan for the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District has recently been approved by the State Educational Finance Commission and plans are underway for a building program for the school district that comprises the entire First Supervisor's District.

Surveys have been made of potential locations for an elementary school. One of the locations is in the northwest section of the Town near the new Iuka Public Housing project. This site, if it is used, will be for an elementary school. Also, it has been proposed to purchase more ground near the present school building in order to enlarge the facilities there for a high school. Other sites have been suggested and are at present under consideration by the Board of Trustees.

Number One priority with the Iuka School district is cooperation with the County School Unit in the construction of a new building for the colored children of the county. Plans, as they were agreed on and established by the Iuka Board of Trustees, the Tishomingo County Board of Education and the State Educational Finance Commission, was the establishment of an attendance center for the colored children. This school is to be constructed about a mile north of Tishomingo on highway 25, the county unit and the Iuka district cooperating in its construction. After construction the school will be maintained and operated by the county with school children from the First District being transferred, along with their money and all funds, to the county.

Number Two priority for the Iuka schools is the construction and establishment of an elementary attendance center. This, as was stated above, will probably be located on the Dexter property in the northwest sector of the Town.

Number Three priority for the local school district will be the construction or repair of a building for the high school departments.

All phases of the school program, before they are put into effect, must be approved by the State Educational Finance Commission.

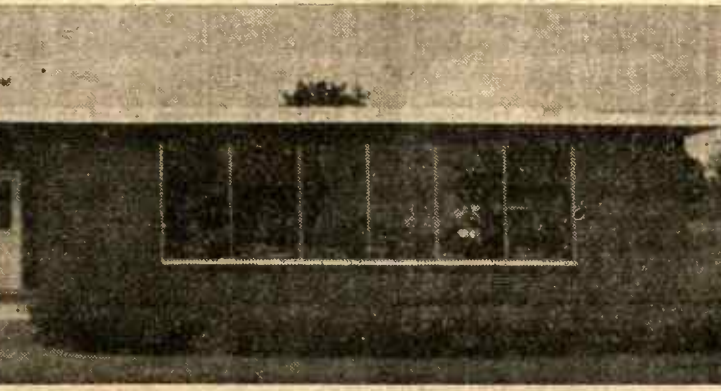
Mr. Parrish received cuts and bruises about the knees. Other occupants of his car were uninjured. Mr. Grisham was alone in the truck.

No, don't tell your family that
steaming hot, delicious smelling-
dish is made from left-overs.

Just tell them to taste and tell
you how they like it. Bet they will
with your special seasonings to
dress-up the left-overs.

Start with the left-over mashed
potatoes. Use them to make a
crust for a baked vegetable meat
mixture. You can cover the top,
too, with the mashed potatoes.

Bake in a hot oven at 400 de-
grees until the dish is hot through-
out and brown on top.

Changes to Save Time

Next time you find you have
a little time of your own—or next
time you wish you have a little
time to do something you want
to especially—take a good look at
where your kitchen supplies and
equipment are.

Wouldn't "extras" of some of
the inexpensive items save you
time, if you placed them in several
places in the kitchen?

For example, a set of measuring
cups and spoons near the range,
another set at the mixing center.
It would be handy to have a small
supply of flour near the stove for
thickening gravies and sauces,
wouldn't it? But keep the main
supply in the mixing center.

Store equipment and supplies
where you will have to do little
stooping and reaching.

Keep all materials you'll use on
a particular job in one place. Do
you have to go to one place in
your kitchen for the coffee canis-
ter? Another for the coffee pot? An-
other for the tea kettle, if you have
drip coffee? And then to the sink
and over to the stove?

A little rearranging might save
you steps, time and energy.

Top Quality Frozen Foods
A package of food, even when

frozen solid, may not be cold enou-
gh to keep at top quality. Some
foods, including most meats, poul-
try and vegetables, are solid at 26
degrees F., but keep best at much
lower temperatures.

Foods lose as much quality in a
few hours at 25 to 30 degrees F.,
as they lose in months at zero
degrees F.

Check More Than Price

The meat cut that costs the least
for a pound is not always the best
buy. The number of servings for
the money is important, too.

A serving calls for a half to a
pound of meat containing much
bone and gristle but only a fifth
to a fourth pound for each serving
of boneless meat.

Home-made backrubbers, properly charged will help greatly in preventing a damaging build-up of cattle lice.
For spraying cattle for lice control use 50 percent wettable DDT or 25 percent DDT emulsion; 50 percent wettable methoxychlor, or 25 percent methoxychlor emulsion; 40 percent wettable chlordane or 45 percent chlordane emulsion;

10-12 percent BHC wettable or 10-14 percent BHC emulsion; 25 percent wettable lindane or 20 percent lindane emulsion. All of these materials do an excellent job. Select the one that is cheapest in cost to you.
On dairy animals and animals for slaughter within 30 days use only methoxychlor, rotenone or lindane.
Dusts to use for lice control in-

clude one percent lindane, one percent rotenone, 10 percent DDT and 10 percent methoxychlor. Of these do not use DDT on dairy or fattening animals.
For more information, come by this office and get a copy of the livestock parasite control leaflet. It is free.

Oats And Wheat

Farmers who failed to harvest a grain crop in the spring and have a heavy volunteering stand can use this for grazing if fertilized. It is not recommended for grain production due to usually heavy weed growth.

All oats for grain should be planted this month. Wheat for grain can be planted in November. If the small grain to be planted now is to be grazed, fertilize now. If no grazing is planned, then wait until spring to fertilize.

Any small grain planted now can be interplanted with clover or vetch at the same time. This planting would be used for grazing and hay.

New Varieties Of Clover Planted By S C D Cooperators

Crimson clover and rye grass

planted on fertile well drained land in proper combination and well fertilized with, in most instances, produce the most winter grazing per acre.

Under less favorable conditions crimson clover will not reseed, nor will it produce as much grazing as the farmer expects.

Reseeding annual clovers that appear to volunteer and grow well on land too poor to produce good crimson clover are being planted this fall by several soil conservation district cooperators.

Two new clovers in particular are being planted for the first time in the county this fall.

These clovers are Ball Clover and Rose clover. They are being used as crimson clover but are not to replace crimson where crimson will grow and reseed successfully.

Most Ball and Rose clover plantings are being made on Bermuda grass or Bahia grass sod. One of the Soil Conservation District Commissioners, Mr. Fay E. Nixon of Holcut, has planted a seed patch of each.

Bill Brinkley has seeded a small field of coastal bermuda grass, across the road in front of his home, to Mike's clover.

In order that you may observe these plants of new clovers being made by cooperators of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District I list their names below.

Raymond Gross, Iuka; 7. L. V. Mink, Belmont; 8. Robert Akers, Iuka; 9. W. R. Dungan, Patrick church; 10. Pat Epps, Belmont.

All these plantings are being made for observation and study. It is hoped that one of these clovers will prove to be a better pasture plant for the poor dry upland of Tishomingo County than any we have had in the past.

Should you desire further information about these new clovers come by the local Soil Conservation service office in Iuka, and I will be glad to tell you more about them.

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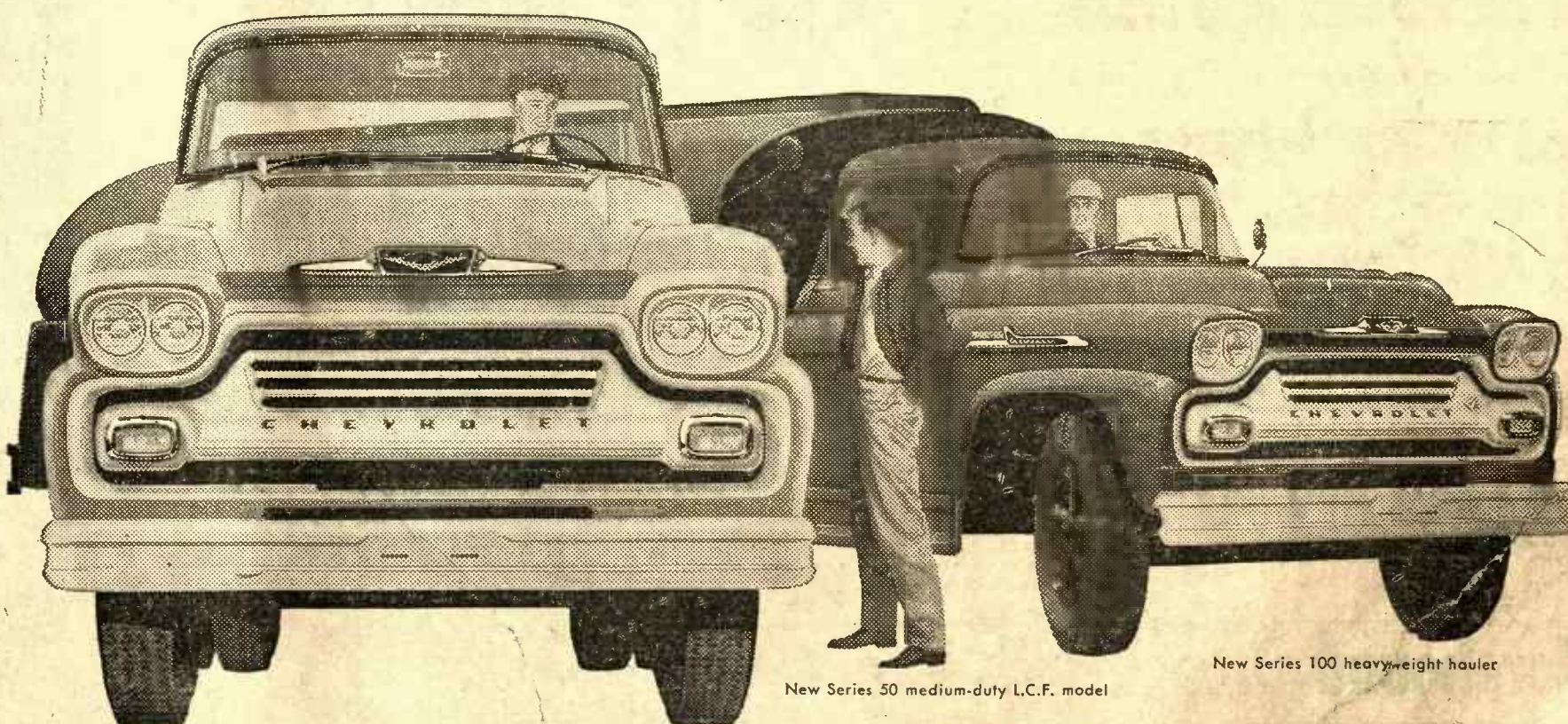

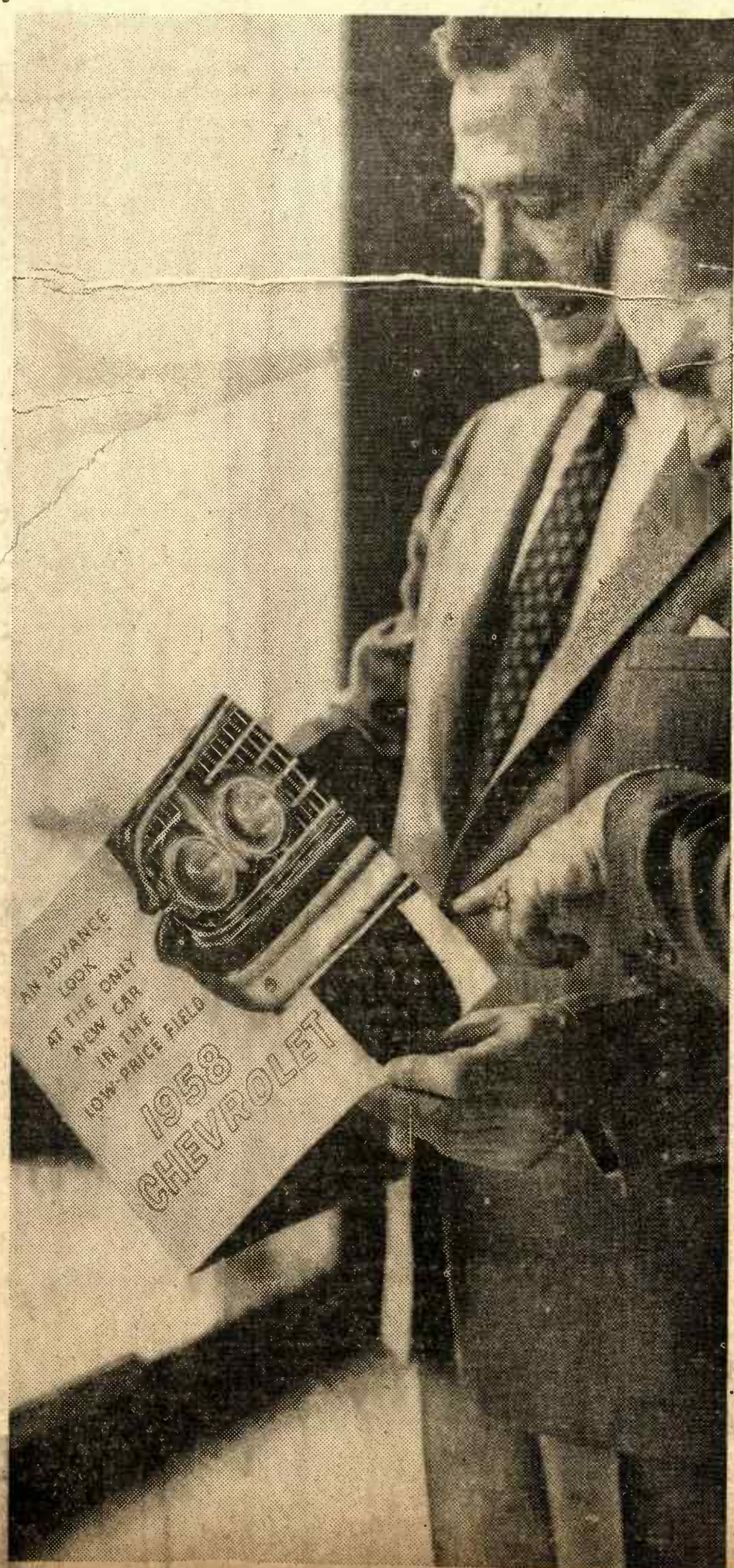

New Soil Map Is Published For Mississippi

State College, Miss.—The Mississippi soil area map in use throughout the state since 1942 is being replaced by a new map which divides the state into land resource areas.

The older soil area map, prepared by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station and published in colors by the State Department of Agriculture, has been used in almost every phase of agricultural work for the past 15 years. A few years ago the Soil Conservation, in cooperation with state Experiment Stations and Land Grant Colleges, began the land resource map project. A number of sample surveys over the state of Mississippi showed that many of the old soil area lines needed revising to improve the accuracy of the map. It was also found that there was very little consistency in naming the soil areas among the states of the South.

As a result of the first preliminary study, it was decided that instead of "soil area" the term "land resource area" would be used. By adopting this term general agreement was reached among the states.

"This is a definite step for improving the soil map for Mississippi because it will more accurately locate boundary lines on the map

and the divisions will join the same divisions in adjacent states," said Dr. H. B. Vanderford, professor of soils and Experiment Station agronomist at State College.

There are nine land resource areas in the state: Upper Coastal Plain, Blackland areas, Interior Flatwoods, Lower Coastal Plain, Coastal Flatwoods, Thick Loess (Brown Loam), Thin Loess-Rolling, Thin Loess-Flatwoods, and Mississippi Delta.

The new map is published in the October issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

BABSON DISCUSSES ANTIQUE FURNITURE AS AN INVESTMENT

Babson Park, Mass., Oct. 24. Of course, antique furniture cannot be bought today and sold next year at a profit.

It has a very poor "over-the-counter" market. The dealers in such furniture are keen and hard to beat. Therefore, you must buy it right—below the market—in order to sell it at a profit. It is usually best to buy it from families whom you know, and sell it to others whom you know—making your own market.

Beating Inflation & Making Profits

We talk about "growth stocks" and "inflation hedges"; but the very best of this group is good antique furniture. A friend of mine in Gloucester bought a highboy at public auction some years ago for fifty dollars. He spent another fifty dollars getting it refinished, as it was very shabby. He sold it to me for eighteen hundred dollars. I have since been offered three thousand dollars. Very few "growth stocks" or "inflation hedges" can equal this investment.

When buying such furniture it is very important to get a "genealogy" of the chair, table, highboy, or bed which you buy. Insist upon a written statement as to the family who owned it and how old it is; in other words, a history of the piece. Then, when wishing to sell, look up some member of the same family who has become well off. He may live in a distant city, but this makes no difference. Write him about his "heirloom." Send him a snapshot picture and quote him a price double what you paid! The chances are that he will purchase it. Furthermore, it will be good investment for his family. He will surely get more pleasure from it than from any other possible investment he could make with that same money.

Men Retiring From Business

I sometimes have letters from men who have been very successful executives, retiring from active business, asking what to do to "keep busy." They may have been retired on account of age or may have had a nervous breakdown, or their retirement may have been due to other reasons. I tell such persons that, under the same circumstances, I would go into the antique business. It is dignified, one cannot lose much money in such a business, and it gives one a place to loaf, to read the newspapers, and to meet a few people each day.

Psychologists tell me it would be unwise for me to remain home most of the day. I should have some place to go every morning and remain for the day. This will give me a different environment, enable me to make new acquaintances and meet with these new friends. I am told that such a change will do more good than pills or any other device for keeping young. The antique business is an interesting business, and the inventory always increases in value. Of course, one should not depend upon such a business for a living, but rather for a life.
