Hunting Seasons Announced By Game Warden

Game Warden Buster Marlar announces that the waterfowl hunting season will open on Thursday, Nov. 7, and will close 30 minutes before sunset on Wednesday, Jan. 15.

Duck pounds on Yellow Creek that were constructed back in the summer are being filled with water during the waterfowl season will open to shooters from 30 minutes before sunrise until 12 o'clock noon. Only morning shooting will be allowed on Yellow Creek on the newly constructed ponds down the creek to Smith island. Shooting will be allowed in any other areas during legal hours as prescribed by federal regulations.

Deer season in this county opens on Monday, Nov. 25, and will remain open for four days, closing at sundown on Thursday, Nov. 28.

Bird Season in the county opens on Tuesday, Dec. 10. Hunters are prohibited from training their dogs in the field with guns before the season opens.

"Anyone found in the field with birds and gun before Dec. 10 will be prosecuted. Training of dogs is permissible by licensed hunters without guns," Mr. Marlar stated.

Farm Storage Loan Program Profits County Farmer

W. J. Brinkley estimates that he has profited by using the Farm Storage Loan Program. On December 1729 bushels of corn in loan and ber 20, 1956, Mr. Brinkley placed held it until July 31, 1957, when he repaid his loan and sold his corn. Mr. Brinkley estimates that he cleared approximately \$700.00. In 1955 he placed 1738 bushels of corn in loan and made a profit of \$1400.00.

Another program, Farm Storage Facility Loan, is also being used by Mr. Brinkley. This program will purchase round storage bins to be built on your farm to store corn, so you can receive a loan. At the present time he has two bins on his farm, one 2400 bushel capacity and the other a 100 bushel capacity. He plans to fill both of these bins in corn this fall and place it in the Government Loan.

E. F. Fancher of route 1, Belmont, this week, purchased a 1000 bushel bin to be built on his farm to store corn.

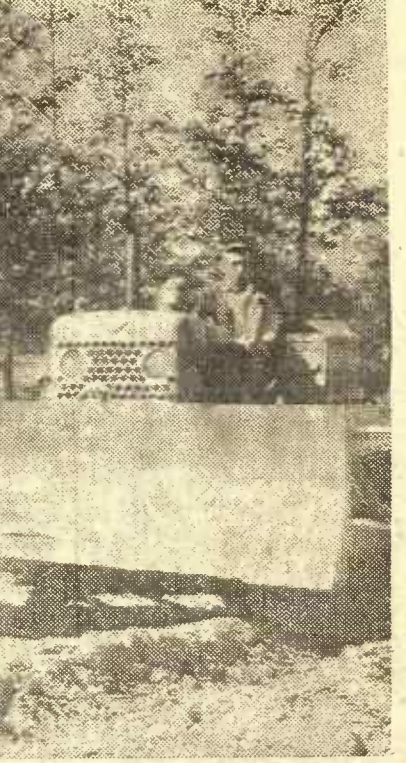

The Iuka Warriors played the Red Bay Tigers to a standstill last Friday night at Red Bay, Alabama. Injuries and the flu which had beset the team, left the Warriors minus an End and the starting Backfield, except for Quarterback Roger Clark.

Red Bay scored their first touchdown of the year and the only one they made, all night on a fluke pass from Jack Bostick to D. W. Cooper, good for 30 yards and a touchdown. The extra point was no good.

The Warriors then took the kickoff and drove back up the field with Fullback Morrison White and Halfback Ellett Allen leading the way. Allen went over for the score from 11 yards out, as the half ended.

In the second half Iuka drove deep into Red Bay territory three times but penalties and fumbles stopped the drives.

Red Bay did not make another drive during the night as the Iuka defenses stopped them cold. Tackle Larry Enlow played possibly the best game of his high school career, as he made tackle after tackle during the night.

SENSING THE NEWS

NEEDED: A SECOND PARTY

Looking ahead to the presidential election in 1960, there has been considerable comment recently about the need of a 'Third Party'. Nor is this comment confined to any one section of the country—it is nation-wide.

As a matter of fact, a great many third parties have already been started, ranging from just a few people in certain cases to many people in others. Which all means,

of course, that they are not third parties; they are simply splinter parties. Each of these splinter parties wants all the other splinter parties to combine with it and do things its way.

This is not what we need. The nation of France has foundered on splinter parties. Our constitutional republican form of government has operated traditionally and rightly on the two-party system. That is the way it should be.

The trouble, though, is that we do not now have two parties. We have two organizations calling themselves by different names—Democratic and Republican—but they are no longer distinguishable as separate parties. As a matter of fact, there is a great deal more difference within the parties than there is between the parties. The need is for two parties that you can tell apart, that give you a choice.

Therefore, if we are to have a two-party system, either the Democratic or the Republican organization must fade out of existence and give way to a 'Second Party,'—a party that gives the voter a real choice between radical and conservative views. Naturally, the political leadership of neither the Republicans nor the Democrats wants this to happen to their organization. That's the way they make their living.

This attitude was brought rather vividly to our attention during a conversation we had recently

with a distinguished Congressman, a gentleman who has done a good job as chairman of one of the important Congressional committees. When we mentioned that it seemed the only possibility of giving a conservative voter a choice in the 1960 election is a strong 'Third Party' movement, which we hoped might eventually result in a real 'Second Party' that would absorb either the Republicans or the Democrats in the course of time and leave us again with a real two-party system, this Congressman objected. He summed up his position in this comment, "My father always told me the way to get rid of rats was not to burn down the barn."

We were glad to have him agree that there are rats in the barns, but that did not seem to us a satisfactory answer. We made this observation:

"Over here in one place is the Democratic barn. Over here in another place is the Republican barn. They are both infested with rats. For at least twenty-five years, those in each barn who are opposed to rats have been trying to get rid of them—but every time they get rid of one rat, two seem to jump up in his place. There are now more rats in each barn than ever before. Since we cannot seem to get rid of them, why not walk off and leave them?"

"Why not go over here in another place and build as nearly as possible a ratproof barn. All those who are anti-rat can repair to this barn, and let the rats have the other two barns. Eventually, there would be no need of two barns filled with rats, and the rats could save money and time and organization troubles by all ganging together in one barn. The abandoned barn could rot down and then there would be two parties left—the Rat Party and the Anti-Rat Party. If this is not done," we concluded, "it seems to us there is nothing ahead but a Rat Government, which is the same as a Totalitarian Government—and it makes no difference whether this government is the absolute rule of the dictator, the planned economy of socialism or the regimentation of communism, we would have lost our freedom just the same. In either instance, we would have only a one-party government—which is not much different from the way it is right now."

Mental Health Service Available To Every Child In Mississippi

Mental health clinic service for children is now available in every county in the state.

A change in the mental health program of the State Board of Health, effective October first, makes accessible for the first time direct diagnostic and consultative services throughout the state.

According to Dr. Estelle A. Magiera, Director, requests for services should be made through the local county health department. When a sufficient number of referrals warrant a clinic, one will be set up as soon as it can be scheduled by the staff of the regional mental health center.

Accepted for services are children with such problems as abnormal fears, extreme shyness, rebellion against authority, school phobia, poor adjustment, feelings of inferiority. Children thought to be mentally retarded are also seen for evaluation and for counseling with the parents.

Referrals may be made by parents, teachers, nurses, physicians, social workers, ministers, and juvenile court judges.

In explaining how the new clinical program operates Dr. Magiera said, "After the child and his parents are seen and the problem involved evaluated by the clinic staff, a conference is held with the local professional persons, in-

cluding the health officer and nurse, who can be of help in alleviating the problem. The staff also gives counsel to the parents. As schedules permit, follow-up visits will be made to the counties for checking the progress of the children seen and for consultation with the persons working with them and their families."

"Children requiring the service of a psychiatrist will be referred by the traveling staff to the child psychiatrist in the Jackson office or to privately practicing psychiatrists," stated Dr. Magiera.

In addition to clinical services, the staff of each regional mental health center will be available, on a limited basis, to consult with staff members of other community agencies regarding mental health problems of children and to plan or participate in educational activities with agency and community groups in the region.

The state is divided into four mental health regions with regional centers in the following locations: Tupelo; Greenwood; Jackson; and Hattiesburg.

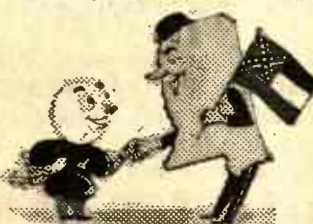

Poultry
This is the time of year to make your hens ready for winter laying. Remember, they respond to care and attention. If you give them the needed attention, they'll make money for you.

Get the poultry house in order. Ventilation just right, no drafts; plenty of feeders and waterers. Build up the floor litter to a depth of six to eight inches. Keep it stirred to insure dryness and remove any wet litter.

Keep fresh feed before the birds, fill feeders around two-thirds full two or three times a day. Make sure that fresh water is before them at all times.

Provide a 14 hour day by using lights over feeders and waterers. Use 40 watt bulbs with 16-inch reflectors 10 feet apart. One light for every 200 square feet is plenty.

Reduce Farm Accidents

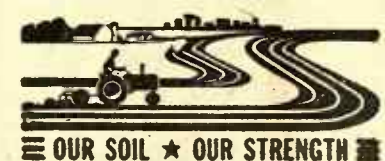
Proper handling and storage of farm tools will help reduce farm accidents. Some of the more common causes of accidents involving tools are failure to use the right tool for the right job, failure to keep tools in proper condition, and failure to keep them in a safe place when not in use.

Here are some suggestions: Keep wood handles firm and smooth to save injury to hands caused by splinters. Keep cutting tools sharp and shape or set them at the proper angle.

When the striking end of a cold chisel or similar tool begins to crack and spread, smooth it down to prevent injury from splintering steel and glancing blows.

Grind screwdriver blades so that the tip has a square edge and parallel surface. Use the correct screwdriver size for the job at hand.

Use wrenches that fit snugly. Do not use pipe to get more leverage from the wrench. Examine hammers, hatchets and axes carefully to be sure that there is no danger of the head flying off. Keep tools and hands from grease.

Good Planning And Good Management Makes Pastures

For the first time in years most Tishomingo county farmers have an abundance of grass in their pastures in the last fall.

The most obvious reason for this is that it has rained much more than usual this year. Too, Tishomingo county farmers, on the average, have fewer cattle than in the past four or five years.

If we stopped here and gave all the credit, for all the good pasture we now have in Tishomingo county, to unusually high rainfall and fewer cattle we could not have given all the facts. There

have been wet years and few cattle, and other farm animals to graze on our pastures before, but instead of an abundance of grass we had Dog Fennel, Cypress Weeds, Bitter Weeds, "Poor Joe" with a little Bermuda grass, Lespedeza and Dallis grass mixed in with it. On bottom land there were areas with few weeds, but sodded so heavy to carpet grass that there was little else.

The good pastures we have in Tishomingo county today are the results of a number of practices properly applied called good pasture management.

Some of the practices good pasture management includes are: 1. The applying of fertilizer of the right kind in the proper amount and at the right time. 2. The planting of the right kind of grass and legumes of the land—The seeding of the kind of grasses and legumes that will grow on high dry upland on the hills and the seeding of grasses requiring a great amount of moisture and high fertility in the rich bottoms.

3. The spraying of pastures with herbicides to control the weeds. 4. The planting of Sudan and Millet for supplemental summer grazing.

5. The sodseeding of small grain and rye grass on permanent pastures sod for winter and spring grazing. 6. The sowing of Rye grass and crimson clover or small grains on cropland for winter grazing.

A study of this list of good pasture practices shows that the farmers of Tishomingo county have made great progress in developing a good grazing program.

The one thing we find hard to learn is that it requires three (3) acres of good pasture for every grown cow.

The one thing that destroys more good pastures in Tishomingo county than anything else is overgrazing. The putting on of too many animals per acre of pasture. Overgrazing is our biggest pasture problem.

We do know how to establish good pastures, and we of the Soil Conservation Service hope farmers will begin to keep their pastures good by not overgrazing them.

Remember, every grown cow needs three acres of pasture, and that these three acres will not be planted to the same grasses and legumes.

It takes good planning and good

management to have good pastures.

Lettuce Is New Commercial Crop For Mississippi

State College, Miss.—Many people in Mississippi do not know that the finest head lettuce found in grocery markets during April can be grown commercially in this State, according to Horticulturist Dan A. Aultman who says that this has been made possible within the past few years as the Great Lakes variety proved to be adapted here.

The variety Great Lakes is a very large, dark green, thick-leaved, slowbolting, tipburn resistant variety, which makes it highly desirable for commercial production under Mississippi's early spring climatic conditions.

Tests by the Truck Crops Branch Experiment Station at Crystal Springs have proved the adaptability of the variety for commercial production. No extensive plantings were made in Mississippi until 1956 when approximately 10 acres were grown by truck crop producers in the Crystal Springs area. As a result of this crop, New Orleans and Jackson markets wanted

all the Mississippi grown lettuce they could get in 1957. This market potential led to planting of 50 acres for the 1957 spring growing season.

This is a new crop to Mississippi growers. For this reason tests are continuously being carried on at the Truck Crops Station to find a better head lettuce than is now available to growers.

Mr. Aultman recommends: "Select good soil and lime to pH 6.5. Add 10 tons of manure per acre if available. Use one of the strains of Great Lakes lettuce.

"Produce stocky well-developed plants. Apply 1200-1500 pounds of 8-8-8 fertilizer per acre as indicated by soil testing under the row anytime before setting. Set plants one foot apart. Do not set deep enough to cover bud. Transplant about January 5 to 30. Use irrigation as needed. Cultivate as shallow as needed. Do not throw dirt on plants. Sidedress with 32 pounds of nitrogen as the leaves begin to cup. Harvest heads when well firm."

COTTON KNOCKED OUT BY RAINS

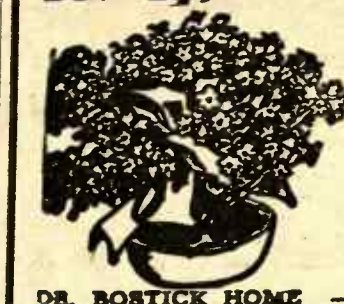

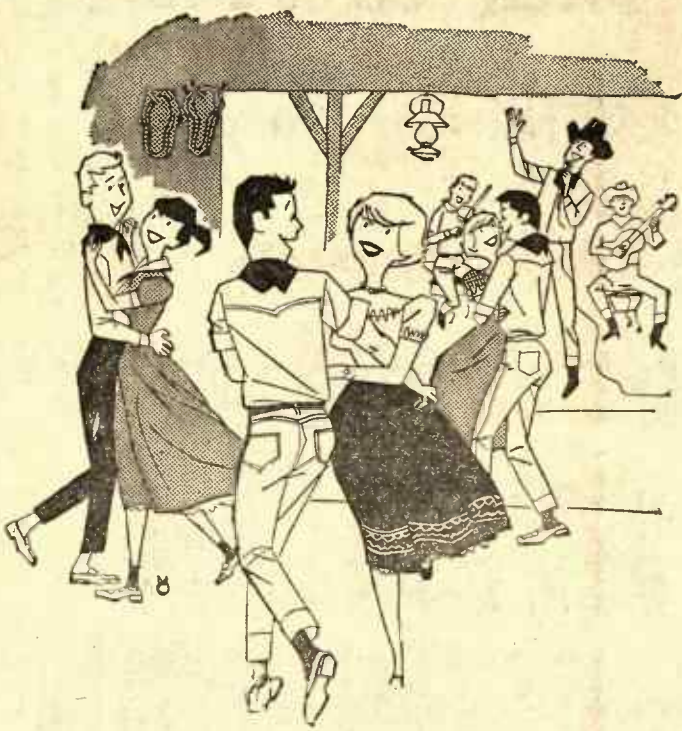

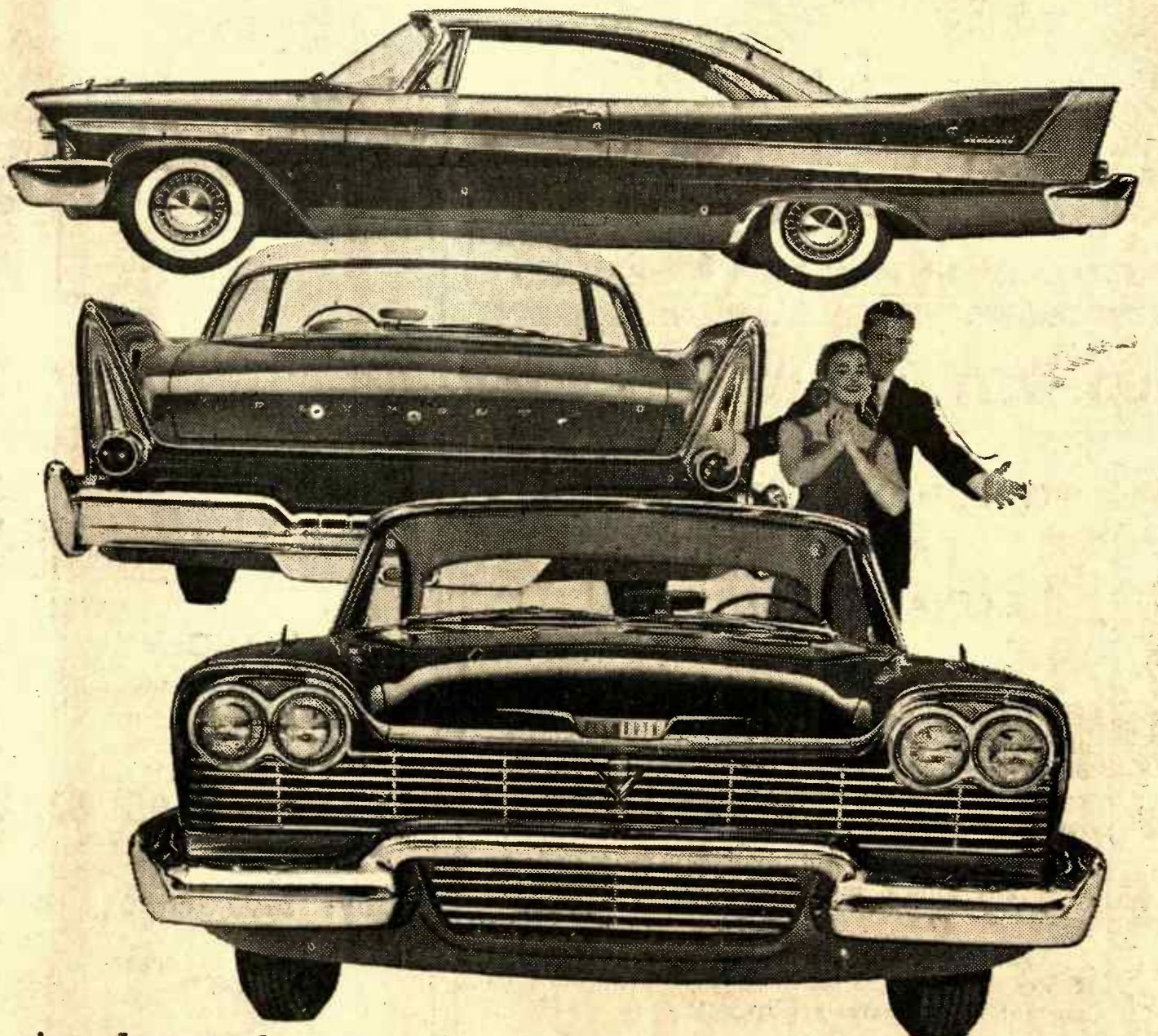

Miss. Cotton Allotment Estimated At 1,660,000 Acres For '58, Says Stennis

Commenting on the 1958 national cotton acreage allotment of 17,660,000 acres, Senator John Stennis today said: "Mississippi's allotment is estimated at 1,660,000—16,500 above the 1957 allotment."

1958. "In Mississippi we will have 280,000 more acres in 1958 than we would have had without those amendments," the Senator said. "Unless necessary legislation is enacted, the national allotment could drop as low as 13,000,000 acres in 1959," the Senator warned. "Such a severe cut is unthinkable and would be disastrous, completely wiping out most of our small farmers and greatly injuring

all producers."

"The provisions of my amendment will not apply beyond the 1958 crop year, but I have introduced legislation making them a part of permanent law, to apply for 1959 and all future years. With the benefits each of the Southern and Southeastern states stand to gain through these provisions. I am confident every Senator and Representative from the area will line up solidly behind this legislation."

Looking ahead to January, Stennis said, "New farm legislation should be a first order of business. Our fight must center around additional cotton acreage. It is the law of necessity."

Auto Sales, Causes Of The Dip, Needs Of People, Size Of Cars, Discussde

Oct. 31. The auto business has had a rather poor spring and summer. However, I look for a good fourth quarter sales-wise. Also, I predict that total domestic production for 1957 will top 6,000,000 units. It may be as high as 6,200,000, or 6.8 per cent above last year. However, that would still be 22 percent below the peak year of 1955.

Causes Of The Dip

Many Competent observers feel that last year's downturn in auto sales and this year's only moderate recovery indicate that we made too many cars in 1955. In that year we produced nearly 8,000,000 units. These people feel that the industry must now undergo a further period of adjustment while the nation "digests" the overproduction of 1955. I think there is some truth in such reasoning. However, there are additional factors involved in the dip in auto sales.

The current rolling readjustment in general business must also be taken into account as an advance sales factor. There are increasing indications that the dip also reflects some sales resistance on the part of people who just do not like the car styling and performance being turned out by Detroit at the present time.

What Do The People Need?

In their haste to turn the tide after last year's poor sales showing, car makers concentrated on extreme-styling eye appeal. They came out with cars longer than necessary. They loaded them with gadgets designed to catch the eye. These longer, heavier cars require more horsepower. They burn more gas and most of them have engines which will operate efficiently only with high-octane gas.

At a time when automobile congestion may choke out the very downtown life of our large cities, car makers have added to the problem by making cars which need more parking space and cost more to maintain. These giant new cars may fulfill the desires and ambitions of many people, but do they meet the needs of postwar America today? Certainly they will be marketable only through intensive advertising.

Make Smaller Cars

Some United States automobile manufacturers contend that they cannot build a small car that will

compete successfully on a volume basis with a good used car of standard size. They may be correct. But the time will come when Detroit must face facts. The automobile has contributed much to our American way of life. It has led to the development of the suburbs. It has provided and it now provides employment for large numbers of our people, directly or indirectly. Ours is a wheeled economy in the best sense of that term.

A good deal of our prosperity today stems from our success in having mass-produced the automobile and having made it readily available to vast numbers of our people. However, that prosperity could be seriously threatened if

we continue to misuse the automobile. The car of tomorrow will be smaller, more functionally styled, though still beautiful. It will be cheaper to buy, to operate, and to maintain. And it will be safer to use.

More Foreign Cars Coming to U. S.

While going all out for size and flashy styling, Detroit is not entirely blind to the fact that there is a market for small cars here. Only one major domestic producer does not have a foreign subsidiary making small, economical foreign cars for export to the U. S. Small car demand has been doubling each year for some time now. If this trend continues, and I predict it will, U. S. car makers may be

forced to revise their thinking of car size.

Perhaps the European cars now being imported are too small to attract wide market support in the U. S. However, their reception has been encouraging. It proves that many motorists are not fully satisfied with what Detroit is now turning out. Somewhere between these monsters of the road and the toy cars of Europe lies the answer to our real needs. Within the next five years I look for standard American cars of smaller, though adequate, size at much less cost. I predict also that improvements in engine design will permit great savings in gas consumption.

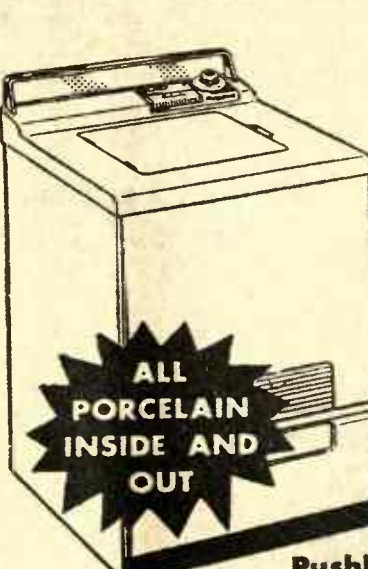

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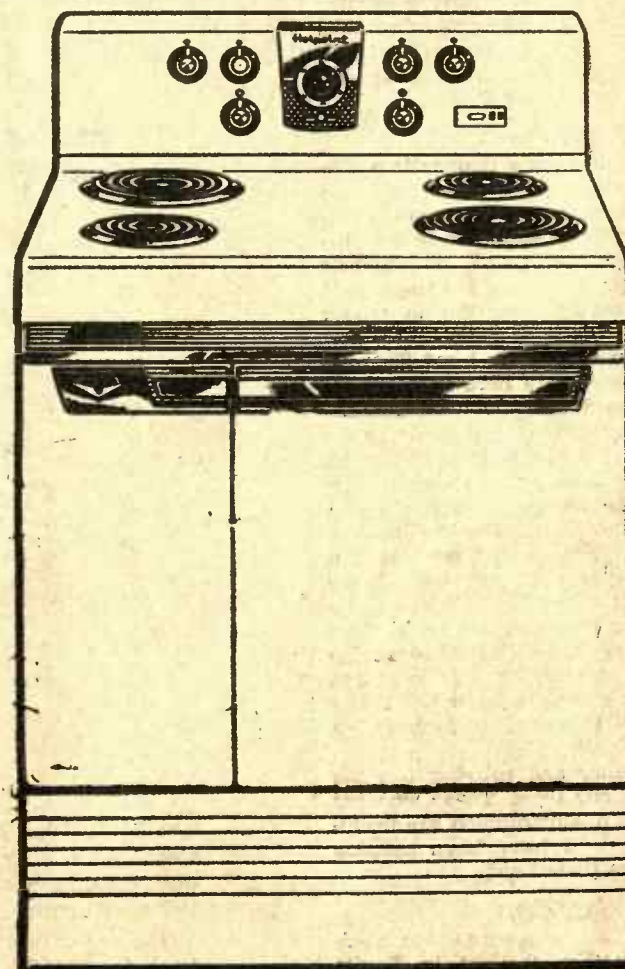

In Worship

Lesson for November 3, 1957

WHY do people go to church? There are very poor reasons, such as showing off a new hat, or keeping up a respectable front. There are reasons which are only middling-good, such as enjoying the music, or going to please your wife. There are also very good reasons; the best of these is simply to worship God.

There are different ways Christian churches use in worshipping God, and it is rarely that one particular service makes use of one way alone. Hymns are one way, and prayer is another, and offering is another. But the way of worship which most churches feel to be most sacred is the observance known by the names of Eucharist, Lord's Supper, Holy Communion.

Long Years, Wide Road

What is the right spirit of worship? In particular, how can we make the most of Communion? Saint Paul offers us some plain and valuable hints in the letter he wrote to the church at Corinth. That church needed some plain-spoken help, for two reasons. For one thing, the Christian religion was hardly thirty years old. There was no long tradition, no prayer-book, no New Testament to go by. For another thing, many of the Corinthians Christians had been outright pagans till recently, and pagans had some very odd notions about how to worship their gods, such as getting drunk in their temples. So Paul had to make some things clear. One is that the worshippers at the Lord's Table are not alone; there is a tradition behind them, there are hosts of other churches also at worship in this way. We worship best when we are mindful of the whole church of Christ. We are travelers on a road stretching through two thousand years now, not thirty years only—a road wide enough to take

in worshippers from every country in the world. Remembering this, we shall be solemnly grateful that we too can share in this age-old Remembrance of Christ.

"In Remembrance of Me"

For this Lord's Supper is a rite of remembrance. How shall we best approach it? To come carelessly, thoughtlessly, is to cut ourselves off from its meaning and its blessing. We should come to it remembering the One in whose Name it is celebrated. But how shall we remember him? There is something more here than simple memory. We do not well remember a good mother's birthday by getting drunk, or by polishing off a shady deal, or by being hateful to members of our family. We best remember Washington not by making speeches about him but by being patriots ourselves. So we can best remember Christ not by being suddenly reminded of him by seeing that this is Communion Sunday, not by merely recalling that once such a Man lived and died. We come and worship in his name rightly when we come remembering, and praying for, his spirit in our lives. Those who get most out of Communion are usually those who have been keeping closest to their Lord.

Remembering Others

Protestant churches take seriously another thought in Paul's lines about the Lord's Supper. That is, that this is not something we can best do alone. There is room for private worship of God, and a necessity for it. But there is also room and necessity for the public worship of God, and the Holy Communion is public, social, communal, corporate, rather than private and individualistic. That is the way theologians would put it. For the plain worshipper, the point is this: In coming to this sacred high-point of worship, we shall get the most out of it if we give thought to others not less than to ourselves. We need to remember the Church in whose company this feast is kept. We need to remember the Body—not only the broken body of Christ, but the Church which Paul (in the very next chapter) calls the body of Christ. We need also to remember those who are in need. Most congregations use the Communion-time for special offerings for the poor or otherwise needy. So again, the right way to approach this hour of worship is to come already in the spirit of unselfishness. It is a poor sort of Christian who has to wait for the Communion service to remind him to love his neighbor as himself.

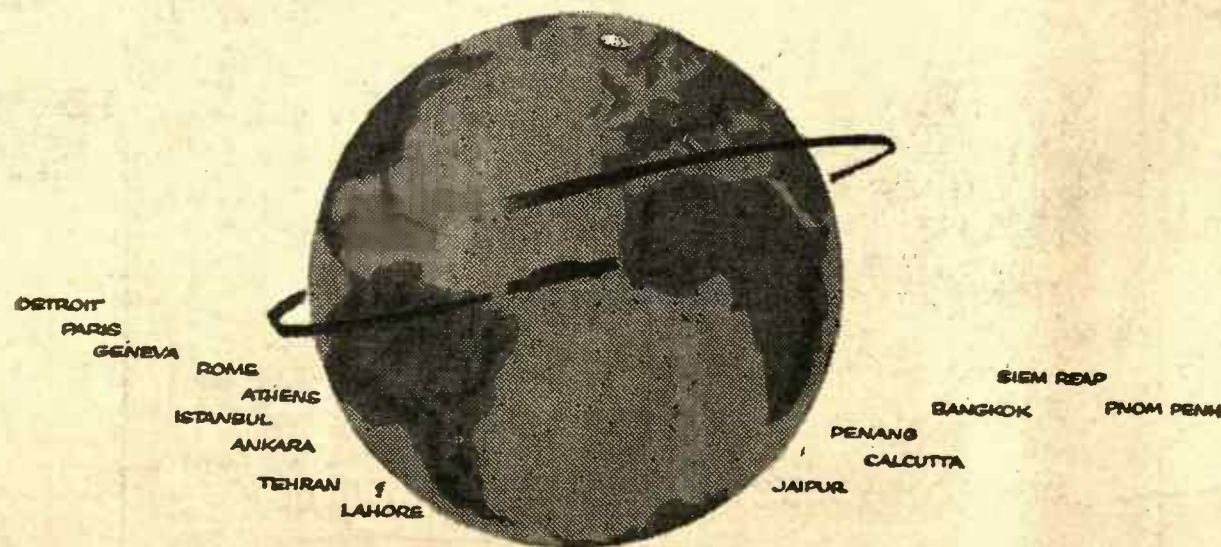
