Great Increase In Iuka Business

In the district as a whole, business during September was on a par with a year ago, though down slightly from the month preceding. Corinth reported business during September down about one per cent from a year ago; Booneville, up 14 per cent; Iuka, up 45 per cent; and Ripley, up 20 per cent.

Business activity in the Corinth district on September 30 stood at 151 per cent of the 1947-48 level, according to the current issue of "The Mississippi Business Review," monthly publication of the Business Research Station at Mississippi State College.

Schools Close Because Of Flu, 32% Absent In Some

Iuka Schools Will Re-Open Monday; County Schools Re-Open Wednesday

All schools in the Iuka and county districts have ceased operation due to the Asian flu which has reached epidemic proportions in the county.

On Tuesday of this week the Iuka school had 216 or 32 percent

absent. On Monday 185 or 28.5 percent were absent and last Friday 20.6 percent was absent.

"The rate of absentees was increasing so fast," Supt. H. L. Shook stated, "that we deemed it necessary that we close and give the disease an opportunity to abate." The Iuka school has an enrollment of 648. Snowdown and Central attendance centers in the Iuka district also had heavy absenteeism and are closed with the Iuka school. All schools in the Iuka (First) district will resume classes next Monday.

County Supt. Cleston Scruggs states that all schools in the county Unit will re-open on Wednesday, Nov. 13. These schools include Burnsville, Pleasant Ridge, Paden, Holcut, Tishomingo, Midway, Dennis, Golden, Belmont, and Carter's Branch (col.). The county schools closed Tuesday of this week with some of them reporting over 30 percent of their enrollment absent.

Persons Using Electric Heat Are Warned Against Overloading Transformers

Bill Brinkley, manager of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association, states that a few customers are attempting to heat their homes with electric heaters without changing to a larger transformer, and in some instances the transformers have been burned out, thereby causing the user's home to be without electricity until the Association electricians can replace the burned out transformer.

In an advertisement in this issue of your newspaper, Mr. Brinkley has this to say:

"If you are thinking of heating your home with electricity you should contact your power association. They have personnel available to determine the number and size of heaters you should use in your home. They will also tell you what size of service entrance to

An election for a \$600,000 BAWI bond election to finance a huge expansion of the Wurlitzer Company plant in Corinth will be held in that city on Tuesday, Nov. 26. Resolution calling for the election was passed unanimously by the Corinth Board of Aldermen at its regular meeting Tuesday night.

Expansion of the Wurlitzer plant will be north of the present plant in the parking area. The new building will be 192 by 330 feet, or 63,800 square feet. It is anticipated that, when in full operation, the new facility will permit the employment of another 200 persons.

"It is important," Mr. Brinkley continues, "for the Association to know if you are planning on installing electric heat because the transformer serving you now may not be large enough to carry the load your heaters will need. The Association will need time to change the transformer to a larger size. If you overload your transformer and it blows out you will be without service until a new one can be installed. So, if you will notify us of an increase in your electric load it will save both you and us time and trouble.

"If you are already heating with electricity and are not getting the service that you think you should be getting, come in to see us. We can help you," Mr. Brinkley con-

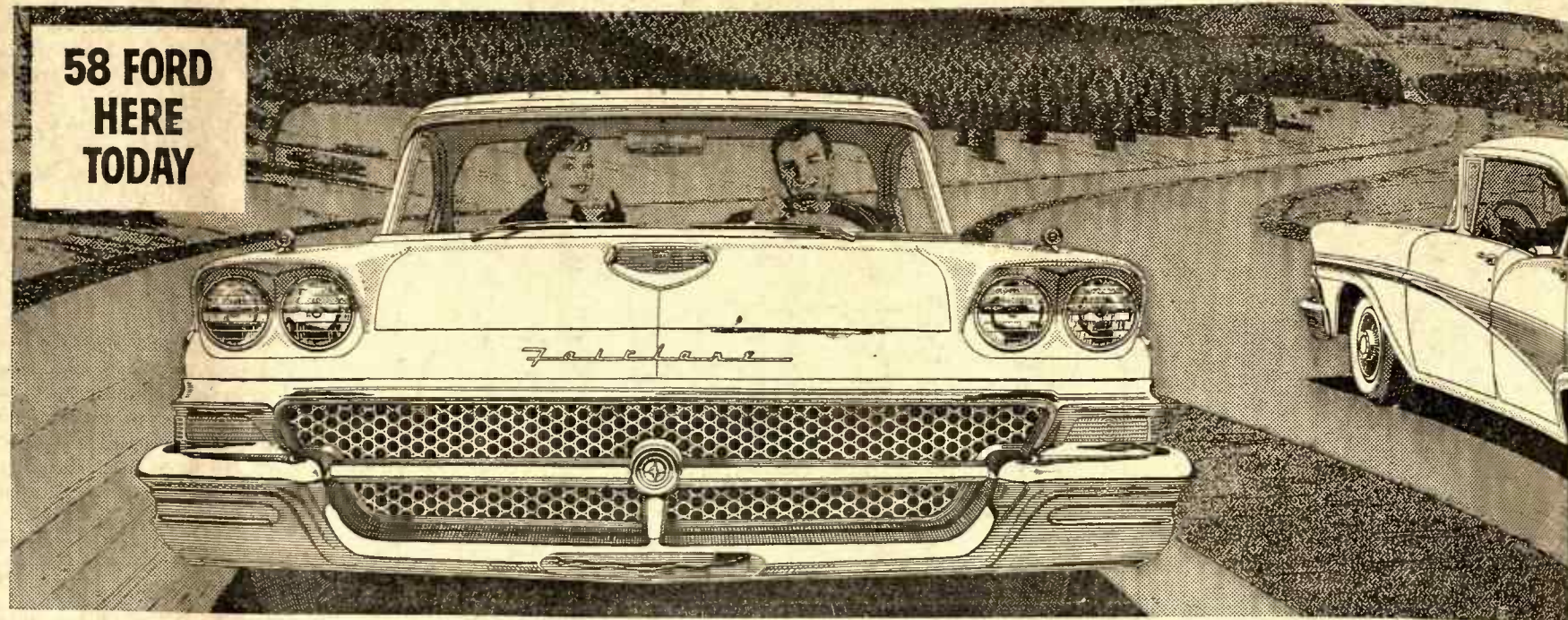

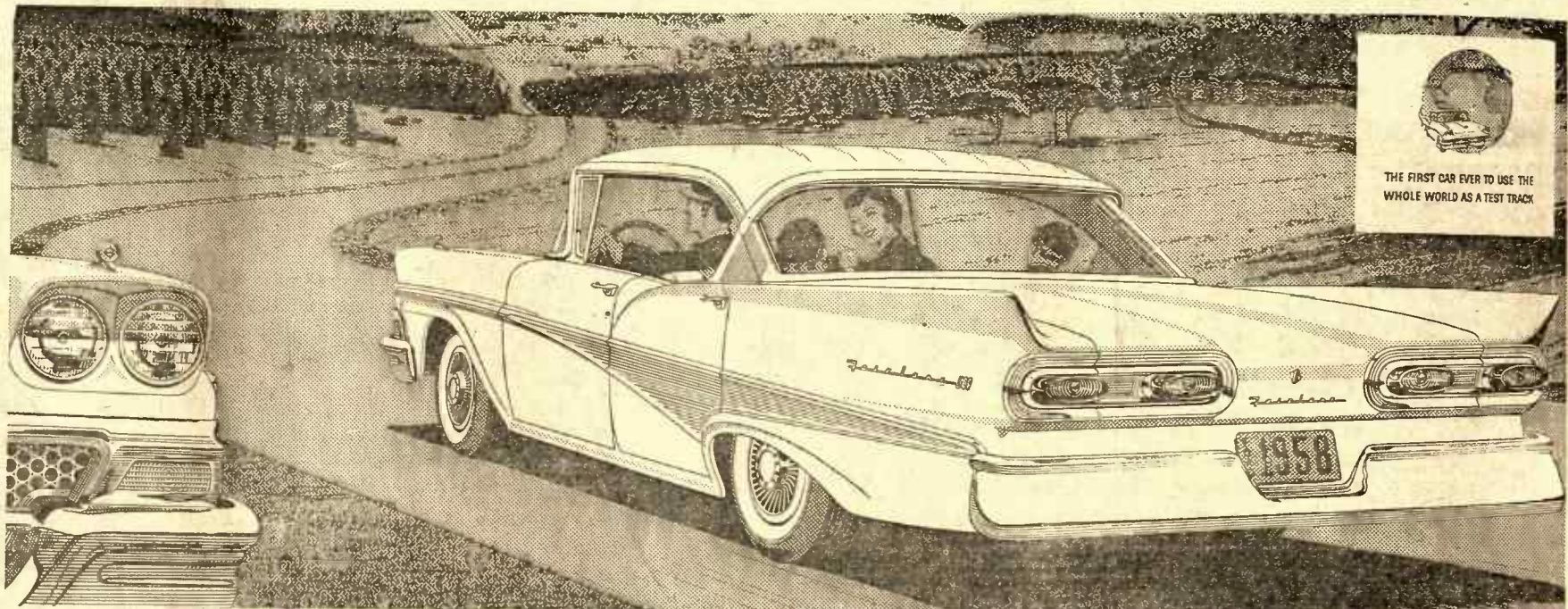

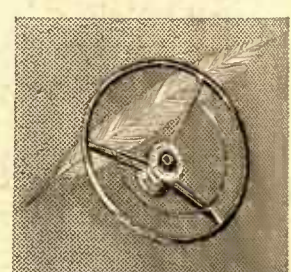

FOREIGN INVESTMENTS DISCUSSED

By Roger W. Babson

Babson Park, Mass., Nov. 7. The devaluation of the French franc and the threat of currency devaluation in other European countries have caused considerable concern here in the U. S.

Good Investment Climate

Usually, I have advised people not to invest their hard-earned money abroad. I have done this not because it is impossible to make profits on foreign investments, but because their proper supervision takes more time and effort than most people are willing to give. Without close supervision, profits are unlikely and serious losses could occur. Sometimes I have advised against buying the securities of foreign companies because of tax complications in the home country of the firm and in the U. S.

However, I have never been against sound foreign investments in cases where the prospective investors were willing to work hard to protect their interests. Some foreign countries,—like Canada,

and, to a lesser extent, Britain, France, Italy, and Spain—provide a fairly good climate for American funds. Others, including some of our neighbors in Latin America, cling to restrictive laws which make it foolhardy for Americans to invest.

What To Look For

When you hear of an investment opportunity abroad, do not jump. Take time to investigate the company. Or if you are going to engage in a foreign business operation, study the laws of the country so that you will know where you stand and what your rights are. You can get expert help from U. S. consulates abroad and from American officials of companies operating in foreign lands. Find out exactly what foreign taxes you will have to pay and what percentage of your earnings you will be able to take out of the country and deposit to your account here in the U. S.

If you do not know the language of the country, employ some trustworthy person who does know it so that you will not lose out through failure to understand contracts and other agreements. Obtain such concessions as you feel are justified and drive as hard a bargain as you can. You will be the better respected for it. Because of low labor costs, good profit margins are possible in some foreign countries, but business moves more slowly abroad and you must have patience.

The Canadian Market

Closest nation to us in time and in economic ties is Canada. As in the U. S., commerce between various sections flourishes because Canada has a uniform currency

which commands the same value throughout the land. In Canada, the people also live and work under a system of private enterprise. Each province adheres to certain principles established in the Federal Law of Canada to foster private enterprise.

Under such circumstances, investments of U. S. citizens have a good over-all chance of prospering. At least, they are not subject to some of the nonsensical restrictions enforced in many other foreign countries. Also, Canada has huge metals and minerals resources which can be developed more

speedily and efficiently with the help of U. S. private capital. In my opinion, Canada is on the way up. There may be setbacks, but I foresee tremendous growth ahead. I unhesitatingly recommend Canada as a good place to direct your money and talents if you wish to invest outside the U. S.

American Companies Abroad

I am in favor of American companies extending their operations to foreign countries where this is practical. Such investment serves to offset the disadvantages flowing from heavy exports to American

by giving us a share in the profits from such trade. Also, such foreign investment creates no sense of charity, but fosters better understanding between ourselves and other peoples.

Eventually, officials of the various Latin American countries will see the light. Then, one by one, the restrictive laws which now curtail U. S. private investment in those areas so important to our welfare will be repealed. I predict that in less than twenty years we shall be able to drive from New York to Argentina over a fine highway.

FORWARD FROM FIFTY

Warriors Slow Down Nettleton Attack, But Lose 25-13; Play Vardaman Tonight

The Iuka Warriors slowed down the strong Nettleton attack but could not come from behind last Friday night in the Warriors last home game of the 1957 season.

The final score was 25-13. The Warriors now have a seasons record of no wins, 7 losses, and two ties.

The Nettleton Tigers took the opening kickoff and drove 66 yards on 4 plays to score the first touchdown of the night. The payoff play was a 35 yard run by the Tiger Quarterback Jim Johnson. The extra point was no good. The Warriors then took the ball for the kickoff but could not get an offense going. Clark punted to the Nettleton 49 yard line and on the next play Halfback Ellett Allen picked up a Tiger fumble on his own 35 yard line and returned it 65 yards for the tying touchdown.
