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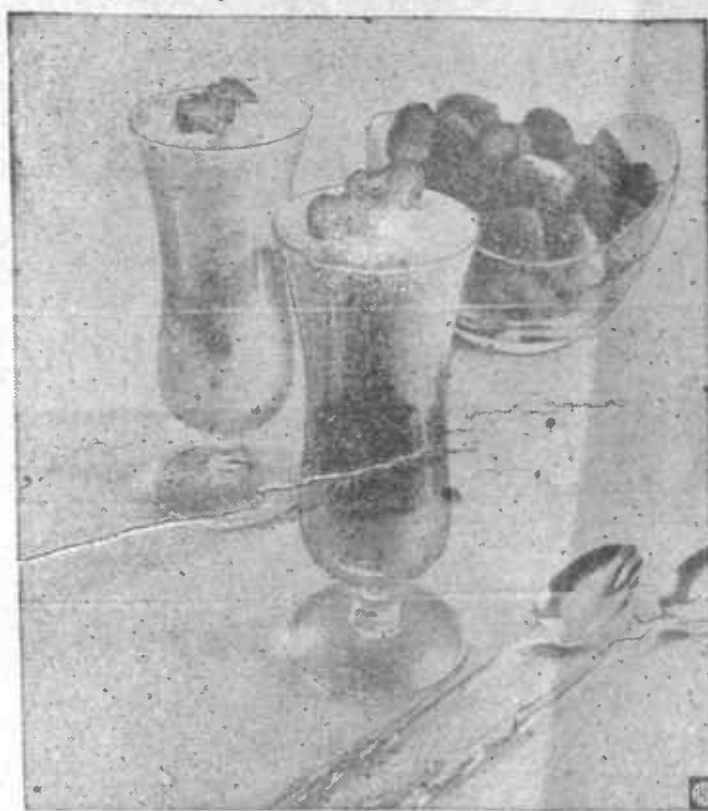

Automation in the home, on the farm, and in industry adds millions of leisure hours to American life each year.

The trend toward a shorter work week is moving at such a pace that economists and representatives of business and labor anticipate a four day work week in the near future.

Every time the working hours of an individual becomes a potential customer for new goods and services. Consumer buying may be expected to increase and drastically change as the work-week becomes shorter. There will be bigger market for sports clothing, garden tools, fishing and hunting equipment, picnic and camp supplies, prepared foods, record players, books, transportation commodities, and thousands of other goods and services—many not yet developed.

Advertising must play an important role in guiding the new and changing leisure-time market. The consumer buying recreational commodities for which he has had no previous use does not move blindly in the strange market. He becomes an avid reader of advertising. From advertising he obtains counsel on how to spend his time and his money.

Here is a rare chance for the alert merchant to develop new and permanent clients. Retail advertising becomes a real service to the new shopper for recreation. The prospective fisherman or gardener must move carefully. He seeks market information in a medium that can be trusted and studied—a medium that can give him comparative details which may be reviewed at leisure. The local newspaper is the only advertising medium which fully satisfies these requirements.

50,000 Acres and Under Fire by State

er C. B. Marlin, but on the brighter side there was a decided reduction in the number of fires from other causes. "Of 5,788 fires," Marlin declared, "over sixty percent were of incendiary origin."

He said the area lost to fires set by incendiaries on protected land amounted to nearly 54,000 acres out of a total loss of 72,500 acres. He said 15,530,000 acres of land are now under forest fire protection by the State.

Compared with the 1956-57 fiscal year, last year's figures show a reduction of about 800 fires with only a light increase in the acres burned.

Marlin created an alert and increasingly conscious public with reduction in the number of fires, along with rain at opportune times. "There is no doubt," he asserted, "that the rain helped the forest fire reduction considerably."

"But, nevertheless," he said, "Mississippians are becoming more and more aware of the tremendously important position timber holds for them and the State economy."

Marlin said the estimated direct loss to Mississippi timber land owners through woods burning alone amounts to over 280 thousand dollars while the job and economic loss to Mississippians reaches near the two million dollar mark.

The greatest losses occurred in the heavily forested southeast district comprised of fifteen counties.

SCIENCE IN YOUR LIFE

Travelers Check
Your travel plans are all set. Whether you're headed for Europe, South America or one of the other 47 states, you aim to "get away from it all."

You know, of course, that there's no getting away from some things. A bee is as likely to sting you on the beautiful English countryside as in your own backyard. But with smart handling, these minor inconveniences need not spoil your trip.

Should a bee of any nationality sink his stinger into you, remove the stinger with a pair of tweezers. A few drops of ammonia or iodine will help ease the pain.

At home or abroad, everyone should know how to cope with fainting, usually a result of temporary blood loss from the brain. If you are in a crowd and cannot sit down, it may help to draw in your abdominal muscles and grunt, forcing blood up to the head.

Another ubiquitous annoyance is the nosebleed. Usually it can be stopped by pinching the nostrils together for a few minutes to help clot the blood.

To avoid sunstroke, take salt tablets and wear a light hat. A sunstroke victim has a red face, hot dry skin, and a high fever. Keep him in a prone position with head raised. Apply ice bags or cold cloths to reduce the temperature.

If this is the case in your home, purchase a sirloin steak cut 1 inch thick.

Steaks—Selection, Preparation
Steaks for broiling are numerous... there's the porterhouse, T-bone, rib, club and top loin in addition to the sirloin. The sirloin can readily be identified by the thin narrow back bone, comments Reba Staggs, meat expert.

When preparing this sirloin steak, simply set the regulator of the range for broiling. Place the steak on the broiler rack. Insert broiler pan and rack so the top surface of a 1-inch steak is 2 to 3 inches from the heat; a 2-inch steak... 3 to 5 inches from the heat. When one side is browned, season and turn and finish cooking on second side.

Time Table
A 1-inch steak requires 18 to 20 minutes for rare steak; 20 to 25 for medium. A 2-inch steak... 30 to 35 minutes for rare; 35 to 45 minutes for medium.

Stepped-Up Program of The Mississippi Agricultural And Industrial Board

Action of the state legislature in increasing the budget of the state's promotional agency, the A&I Board, from \$400,000 to \$750,000 a biennium has sparked action on so many different fronts that A&I staffers have prepared this news letter to keep Mississippians up to date on just what has been up to date.

First Initiatives—It has been the policy of the A&I Board, since its inception, to keep the public informed of its activities. This is accomplished through the publication of a monthly news letter and through the use of other media.

New Services Offered—The bigger budget will make possible the launching of a long-needed program of industrial research, a strong nationwide promotional campaign, establishment of a Chicago office and administration of port development and city planning programs in accordance with mandates from the state legislature.

Advertising Program—Starting immediately, Mississippi's good living conditions will be stressed in a series of 23 advertisements in 17 major magazines and newspapers with a combined circulation of 6,806,436. The series, to run for the remainder of this calendar year, will cost \$51,640.23, or three-fourths of a cent per reader. The theme will call attention to Mississippi as a state which has "Room for business—Time for living," and industrialists will be invited to "Stake your future on growing Mississippi."

Look For The Ads—The advertisements will run in Newsweek, U. S. News World Report, Fortune, Business Week, Nation's Business, Dun's Review, Industrial Development, Daily News Record, American Banker, Successful Farming, Chemical Week, Steel, Electronics, Household and Industrial Woodworking magazines

and in the Wall Street Journal and the Journal of Commerce. The Newsweek advertisement will run September 29. Those in U. S. News and World Report have been scheduled for October 17 and in November. The advertising program is being handled by Gordon Marks and Co., Inc., Jackson.

Fresh New Photos—Supplementing the advertisements and all other promotional activities will be a steady supply of good photographs by the board's first full-time photographer, Phil Stroupe, formerly with the Jackson Daily News. Continuous photo service is essential to a major promotional undertaking such as that for which the A&I Board is responsible, not only in connection with the advertising program itself but for such things as magazine and newspaper requests, the board's own publications, brochures, pamphlets etc., convention posters and exhibits and a multitude of other activities.

Industrial Research—The board at its last meeting approved the establishment of a Mississippi Research Center for industrial research. The center will be directed by a highly-qualified man now being sought. Policy will be set by an eleven-member board of director to include the governor, the presidents of the two state universities and the chairman of the A&I Board, industrial committee and research committee, all as ex-officio members, plus directors representing industry, agriculture, home-owned small industry, the oil industry, municipalities and the state college board—one each. The center is to be set up in Jackson and will be launched with \$30,000 for the first year, with the expectation that more money will be made available for this purpose once it gets under way. The

Arkansas program, for example, works on a \$125,000 budget annually.

Port Development—The last session of the legislature charged the A&I Board with the responsibility of administering the new port development law, and state senator R. H. "Dick" Pridgen has been named as director of this program. Senator Pridgen was a member of the legislative recess-port study committee which visited ports throughout the South and then submitted to the legislature a report on the state's port potential which led to passage of the present law. Development of Mississippi's ports is expected to be a great boon to the economic growth of the state as a whole. Huge quantities of Mississippi export items are now moving through the ports of New Orleans and Mobile.

City Planning—Municipalities throughout the state want to take advantage of the program making federal funds available to cities in drawing up master plans for long-range zoning. The A&I Board has been designated by the legislature as the agency to handle this program in Mississippi, and a city planner who meets all federal qualifications for this post is now being sought. We hope to have more to report on this undertaking later.

Office in Chicago—The A&I Board has voted to establish, in Chicago, an office for the promotion of Mississippi in both the industrial and tourist fields. This Chicago office is to be staffed by an A&I Board representative to be selected from the Chicago area. Not only is this area an important source of good industrial prospects, it also sends more tourists to Mississippi each year than any other region of the country.

Miss Hospitality

All this—and a new "Miss Hospitality" too! The state's new goodwill ambassador, succeeding Miss Jane Farrow, is West Point, is 19-year-old Elaine Lipsey, of Prentiss, a sophomore at MSCW majoring in botany and speech. Born in Hattiesburg, the lovely green-eyed brunette is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Lipsey, of Prentiss. She has already made her first out-of-state trip, representing Mississippi at the Minneapolis Aquatennial, one of the country's biggest travel promotion events. Runners-up in the contest were Joan Warren, of Natchez, as first alternate, and Regina Meadows, of Gulfport, as second alternate. There were 53 contestants this year.

Radio Spots

As one contribution toward encouraging a positive attitude and a full realization of just how much progress Mississippi has made in recent years, the A&I Board for several months now has been sending to radio stations throughout the state a series of brief spot announcements citing state progress in various fields. The Mississippi Broadcasters Association requested this service, and indications are that most radio stations are using the spot announcements regularly.

Far From Home

Contact with foreign lands, too, is a daily function of the A&I Board. Two films, one on Mississippi industry and one on the state's tourist attractions, were sent to Brussels by the A&I staff recently for showing on "Mississippi Day" at the World's Fair—showings worth thousands of dollars in publicity to this state. Material on Mississippi was sent to the Republic of Panama for an exhibit of the 48 states set up by Americans living and working there. Data on our "Miss Hospitality" contest was sent to a journalist in Holland for use in a special feature. Requests for tourist information on Mississippi include many letters from every country.

A recent three-part series of United Press International wire service stories dramatized Mississippi's industrial progress and what industrial payrolls mean to Communities and individuals. The Vicksburg "Showboat" was featured in pictures in the June issue of "Pageant" magazine. John Osborne, Staff writer for Life magazine, visited Mississippi recently, witnessed the "Miss Hospitality" event on the coast and talked to state leaders for several days, promising an article on Mississippi soon.

New Industry

A survey of new industry in the state for the second quarter of this calendar year, compiled by the board's industrial department, shows 28 new industries and expansion of six others, accounting for 1162 new jobs and estimated investment of \$12,100,000. This compares with a first quarter tally showing 18 new industries and 16 expansions providing 1429 new jobs and representing an investment estimate at \$7,150,000.

Competition Tougher

Not to add a discouraging note, but merely to emphasize the need for still greater efforts on the part of all those working for Mississippi's industrial progress, comes word that the constitutionality of the Tennessee industrial development program similar to BAWI has been upheld in court, which means that Tennessee can now do what we've been doing almost exclusively for so many years. The section of Tennessee's Industrial Building Bond Act of 1955 upheld against challenge was one which provides for taxation by counties and incorporated towns for county and corporate purposes but restricts the giving or lending of credit to or in aid of any person or corporation without approval of three-fourths of the voters in a referendum.

October Trip

Plans are being made for an industry "Good Will" trip to New York by members of the A&I Board, to be scheduled some time in October. Over the years, this dramatic expression of this state's positive attitude toward industry has done much to keep this state before industrialists who may be contemplating plant relocations or the setting up of branch plants in the South.

"Mississippi Magic"

The official A&I Board publication, "Mississippi Magic," which has been issued monthly since 1945, will appear bi-monthly in the future. A recent survey of the readers of the magazine reveals an unusually favorable reception to the publication, with 1207 of the 1488 Mississippi readers responding declaring they read "Magic" thoroughly, pass it on to others after they read it and 417 file it. Of the 931 out-of-state readers responding, 495 say they read it thoroughly, 406 pass it on to others after reading it and 229 keep it on file for future reference. Ask any readership survey man, and he will tell you that these are unusually high percentages of favorable response.

Travel Brochure

The board's colorful new 28-page travel brochure has been a terrific hit. Requests for this beautiful full-color booklet have been pouring in from all parts of the country. The brochure is being used not only to answer tourist requests but also to show the country's top-flight industrialists just what Mississippi is really like. The board's advertising program will invite industrialists to send for the booklet.

Industrial Brochure

A new industrial brochure listing the state's advantages as an industrial site is now being prepared. The last such promotional brochure for Mississippi was issued four years ago. The new brochure will be designed in such a way that it will not include any statistics or other data which will go out of date, thus assuring its use as a promotional piece for many years to come.

Manufacturers Directory

Also being revised is the board's directory of industries located in the state, together with their location, the items made and other data of interest. This directory will replace the 1953 document, the last one published. Hundreds of requests for this new directory have already come into the A&I Board office. The directory will be sold, and the income from such sale is expected to cover the cost of its preparation.

Positive Attitude

The importance of a positive attitude and aggressive campaigning for new industry on the local level has long been stressed by A&I Board staffers in speeches and in informal talks with Mississippians throughout the state. This message has been reduced to writing by board director Henry Maddox in a message briefly outlining the board's present duties and responsibilities and the ways in which each community can best help itself win new industrial payrolls.

Tips To Communities

A paper setting forth specific ways in which a town can accelerate its industrial development, written by the board's assistant director and manager of its industrial division, A. E. Gatlin, has had very good response throughout the state following its distribution in mimeographed form and is now being made available in printed form for those interested in keeping such data handy.
