ASSERTING AMERICANISM

Americans have been going day to day in the current world crisis wondering whether they are on the threshold of another terrible war. Tragedy seems lurk just around the corner.

The use of American troops in the Middle East is being pondered and debated throughout the nation. But there is a widespread feeling that American national self-interest called for a firm stand.

Lebanon was not the moment at all citizens would have chosen nevertheless an end to appeasement tactics fits the American temper these days.

Perhaps the dangerous events of present period may be a turning point in American policy. Americans are sick of the financial burdens of bribery through foreign aid. They are sick of pouring billions of dollars to dubious allies and tepid friends. They are sick of subsidies to states that are with the Soviets, gifts to neo-socialist nations that don't pretend to hide their contempt for U. S. A.

No one, least of all an American conservative, believes that Marines and aircraft carriers should be fixed features of our foreign policy in the years ahead. But the latent power of the republic must be demonstrated to the world if the voice of America is to be heeded. It is our power that results in respect, not our misguided missionary efforts to provide tractors in lands that have never seen steel ploughs.

It is the spirit of firmness that this nation needs to regain in all its dealings abroad. And it is firmness against subversion at home and influences that weaken the fibre of American character and undermine our system that is most needed. A healthy spirit of self-assertion is the beginning of national health. The so-called un-

derdeveloped nations may resent our well-being and our economic success, but that should not be cause for us to talk as though national prosperity were an affront to the world.

The average American is snowed under with talk of guilt—guilt for bold action abroad and guilt for allegedly not giving away enough of their substance, guilt for having a free enterprise system that has made us rich. The task of conservatives is to be self-assertive, to combat the apostles of guilt who would have us retreat step by step from positions of power and success until we are so weakened and so apologetic that we are easy prey for communism at home or abroad.

The risks of self-assertiveness are real. The man or nation who asserts a right runs the risk of being attacked. But risk-taking is the prime ingredient of our free enterprise economic system and our republican form of government. It is the basis of our success. The risk-takers gain opportunities and win leadership.

The Crisis In Schools



In September some 43 million Americans—one out of every four people in the nation—will go to school, most of them to overcrowded, understaffed, and ill-equipped classrooms.

In a nation of abundant production, great wealth and the highest standard of living in the world we have a "backward" school system. When the schools reopen there will be a shortage of 200,000 teachers and 150,000 schoolrooms.

Three million children will be entering school for the first time, and the only way we can make room for two million of them will be by overcrowding still further our already packed classrooms, and by spreading our teachers still thinner.

Those are parts of the distressing story of our school crisis brought out in a nationwide study by groups of educators and laymen and financed by the Rockefeller Brothers Fund. It is called the "Rockefeller Report."

The Worst To Come Our school enrollment is increasing even more rapidly than our total population. Between 1870 and 1955, while our population was increasing four times, our public school enrollment was increasing approximately eighty times.

Some elementary and high schools and colleges have found it impossible to hire well-equipped teachers in such basic subjects as English, languages, and social science. Some have even had to drop chemistry, physics, and mathematics from their curriculum since there were no teachers to teach them.

The pressures will become more severe in the years ahead, when the population bulge will press even more urgently on already overburdened facilities. The shortage of both buildings and teachers is becoming increasingly acute.

Educational Opportunities Limited

The study predicts that elementary school enrollments will rise from about 22 million today to about 34 million in the 1960-61 school year, an increase of over 50 per cent in only three years.

By 1969 high schools will be deluged with 50 per cent to 75 per cent more students than they can now accommodate, and by 1975 our colleges and universities will face at least a doubling, and in some cases a tripling, of present enrollments.

"Not only must our educators handle a huge increase in the number of students," the report emphasizes, "but they must offer higher quality in education."

"We must not be forced to choose between educating the few well or the many poorly. There must be no limitation placed in educational opportunities. Our kind of society calls for the maximum development of individual potentialities at all levels."

Eastland Inserts Provisions In 1958 Farm Bill To Help Miss. Cotton Farmers

Washington, D. C.—A total of 86,930 small cotton farmers in Mississippi will never have their cotton acreage reduced under a provision inserted into the 1958 Farm Bill by Senator James O. Eastland (D-Miss.).

The Farm Bill, passed last week by the Senate, provides among other things that any cotton farmer with 10 acres or less allotment in 1958 can never have his acreage reduced. The provision sets aside 310,000 acres over and above the national allotment to insure the perpetual guarantee against acreage reduction. Of this amount, 29,529 acres will go to small farmers in Mississippi.

The farmer floor on acreage for small farmers was first proposed by Senator Eastland at a meeting of the Senate Agriculture Committee. It was included in the overall bill. When it reached the Senate floor, Senator Eastland successfully defended the measure against attack by western Senators.

Senator Eastland emphasized that the additional acreage to insure the acreage floor will not be taken away from farmers who plant more than ten acres of cotton.

In addition, another Eastland-proposed measure secured a significant victory for the ten-acre-or-more farmer. The Farm Bill provides that the national acre allotment can never be reduced to more than 16 million acres. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson had planned to drop the total allotment to 14.2 million acres next year. This action effectively blocks that plan, and makes it impossible to ever reduce the larger cotton farmers' acreage by more than 10 per cent. This minimum proposal was retained in the bill by Senator Eastland without attack on the floor.

Previously the small farmer had been protected by a four-acre minimum provision, but that legislation expired with this year's crop, and without these provisions the farmer with four acres or less might have received cuts up to 50 per cent of the 1958 allotments.

Senator Eastland said that for the 1959 and 1960 crop years, farmers would receive normal allotments under the law, and price supports determined by present law with a floor of 16 million acres.

However, any farmer, small or large, who desires to increase his acreage allotment by up to 40 per cent may do so by taking a 15 per cent reduction in price support.

Beginning with the 1961 crop, Senator Eastland said, the price support will be 90 per cent of the three-year average market price, or 30 cents a pound for middling inch, or 60 per cent of parity.

The report recommends that local leadership and control over education be continued and that state, local and private funds continue as the major source of school revenues, and that Federal funds without controls, be used only to close the serious gaps in the total educational system.

In November, 1957, Patsy attended State 4-H Round-up as district champion in Home Improvement. In 1958 she was awarded an Elgin watch for placing first in the State Girl's Entomology demonstration. The demonstration was "Control of Garden Insects."

Patsy is a Junior at Burnsville High School where she belongs to the Glee Club, FHA Club, Dramatics Club and 4-H Club of which she is Program chairman and leader for Junior girls 4-H Club. She is secretary of the County 4-H Council and 4-H Honor Club. Patsy is a member and active worker of Rocky Springs Methodist Church.

Every newspaper counts among
its loyal advertisers a merchant
who, at one time, was somewhat
skeptical about the value of ad-

This experience is not uncom-
mon. Henry J. Kaiser, famed in-
dustrialist, recently explained
how his attitude toward adver-
tising went through a similar
evolution.

Mr. Kaiser didn't always believe
in advertising. In fact, up until
1941 he would not allow his name
to be used in connection with his
plants. Since he entered the com-
petitive market in a number of
industries since World War II, Mr.
Kaiser has done a complete about-
face.

Mr. Kaiser now regards adver-
tising as far more than a neces-
sary tool for meeting competition.
He thinks of advertising as a
creative force in bringing about
the development and distribution
of better things "in the new in-
dustry of discovery."

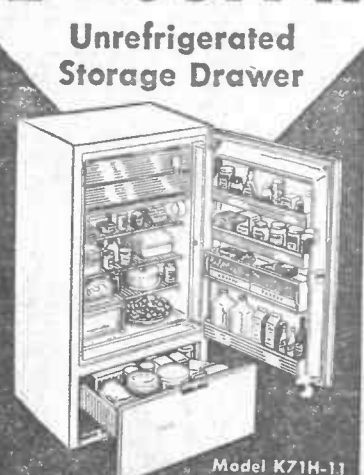
"Through our investment of
millions in advertising, I have be-
come converted to faith in the
tremendous things that advertis-
ing can accomplish," he says.

Modern business management
can not afford to stint on the ad-

Kaiser. In building up his new

a top priority to his advertising

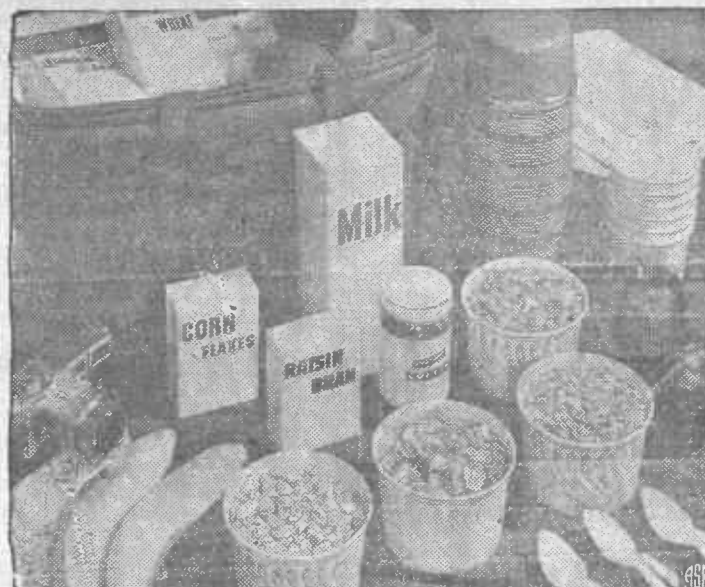

Cotton Insects

The rainy weather the past week has been ideal for a fast build-up of boll weevils. They can knock a big hole in your cotton profits for the year if not controlled.

But while keeping them under control, don't lose sight of the dangers involved in stepped up poisoning. Don't fool around with insecticides. They can be dangerous.

Here are some suggestions on how to handle insecticides safely:

1. Wash after exposure to insecticides and wear approved gloves when handling concentrates.
2. Mix and load equipment only

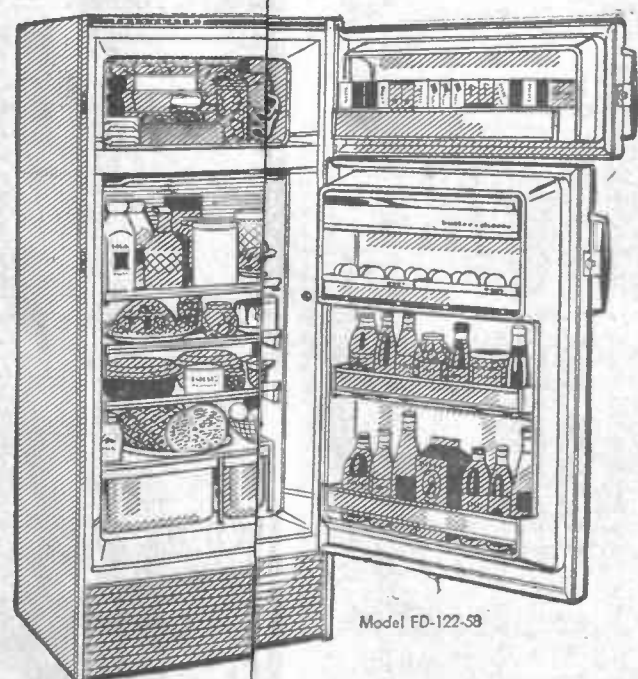

Stop! Don't Do That!

Don't ever use steel wool or steel brushes on stainless steel. It leaves a film of iron that will discolor the stainless.

Particles of the steel may become imbedded in the stainless steel surface and eventually rust. Stainless steel wool or carbon tetrachloride may be used to clean stainless steel surfaces. Polishing with a dry, soft cloth is one of the best ways to maintain the luster. Dry whitening may be used.

On stainless steel built-in ovens and units, the most common stains are heat stains on the surface units and fingerprints on oven doors. It is characteristic of stainless steel to become heat stained and turn a slight blue cast with intense heat.

For ordinary cleaning use a mild soap and water. For more difficult stains and burned on food particles, follow directions already given. Or you may find a commercial cleaner at your grocery store; follow the directions on the container and use a damp cloth to wipe off liquid.

Be sure to rub with the grain of the metal; do not use a circular motion.

Plentiful Foods

PEACHES . . . Watermelons . . . potatoes . . . Summer vegetables . . . fats and oils . . . lemons . . .

These are all on the plentiful foods list for August. Peaches are in capitals because they are the feature food of the month.

Be on the lookout for good buys for eating fresh and for canning, freezing and such for later use.

Peach Waffle Dessert

Place scoop of vanilla ice cream on waffle and top generously with sliced peaches.

You may like to bake extra waffles at breakfast; wrap them in aluminum foil after they cool, and put in home freezer or refrigerator freezer chest. At dinner time, re-

heat the waffles in the oven or toaster.

But you never did think of eating breakfast as a safety precaution. But a 2-year survey by the North Carolina Industrial Commission has showed that is may be.

In a large textile plant, three out of four workers who had accidents had eaten no breakfast.

So play it safe . . . eat your breakfast and begin the day right. Fruit, cereal, milk, egg, and toast may be the lifesavers that keep you from being a vital statistic.
