Workmen Busy On New State Park

For the past two weeks, workmen have been busily engaged on the new Mississippi State Park at Cook's Landing on Pickwick Lake. A small building that will serve as a concession stand and construction house has been erected. A "bush-hog" for clearing underbrush has been in use all this week and construction of a boat dock has been started.

A new road extending from highway 25 north to the park site is under construction and First District Supervisor states that this project will be completed as fast as and as soon as weather will permit.

The new park is being built on land deeded to Mississippi by the Tennessee Valley Authority. Approximately 2000 acres was involved in the transaction, the land lying on both sides of Indian Creek. The portion being developed into a state park begins at Cook's Landing and extends up Indian Creek on the west side toward Iuka. There are approximately 600 acres in this new park area. Park Commissioner Paul Edmondson states that architects are in the process of drawing plans for a lodge and restaurant that will accommodate 200 guests at one time, a motel, swimming and boating areas and various other improvements.

Community And Youth Center Gets Underway

Community Center got under way this week with the building of forms in preparation for pouring a foundation for the flooring.

Original spot of construction in the southwest corner of Mineral Springs park was changed due to a slight objection raised by some residents living adjacent to the park. However, after discussion a new site was selected near the center and all interested and affected parties have mutually agreed for the erection of the building in the new location.

The Community and Youth Center will be 82 feet long and 42 feet wide, having a floor area of 3,444 square feet.

Building of the Center is the result of a campaign started several months ago by the Twentieth Century Club's donation of \$8,000.00. A balance of \$4,000.00 was raised by public subscription, making a total of \$12,000.00 with which to start construction. The building will cost \$17,276.50. Community and civic leaders of the area have signed a note for the balance of the cost which is to be retired in four years.

The Iuka Rotary Club underwrote the project after the Twentieth Century Club's donation, and a group of Rotary members headed by W. E. Ludlam has been the driving force that has raised the balance of the money to date.

Kimberly Bros. Was Low With \$263,480 Offer

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously Monday of this week to accept the bid of Kimberly Bros. Construction Co. for the erection of the county hospital.

Mr. Kimberly's bid of \$263,480.00 was lowest of the five offers received by the Board. Date and time for opening the bids was Monday, August 4, at 11 A.M. Other construction firms and the bids of each were, Building Service of West Point, \$269,950.00; Southern Builders, Inc., Memphis, \$272,801.00; The Whitaker Co., Tupelo, \$296,763.00; and Capitol Construction Co. of Jackson, Miss., \$310,000.00.

A number of alternate bids were offered by the contractors, but the Board voted to accept the Kimberly bid that included all portions of the specifications.

A definite time for starting actual construction on the new county facility has not yet been set since there is still a quantity of paper work to be done in the forming of contracts, etc.

SENSING THE NEWS

IF WE PAID OUR WAY?

The current Congress, as a whole, seems to have gone "spending crazy." By the time the session ends, it will undoubtedly be recognized as one of the most recklessly extravagant and spendthrift Congresses of recent history.

What has happened to Congress? Has it been brain-washed by do-gooders at home? Has it been ear-washed by events abroad? Is it all just because it is an election year—a year during which Congress is traditionally in a generous mood with the taxpayers' own money? Has Congress lost all sense of responsibility to the taxpayers back home? Has Congress lost all regard for the future financial stability of the nation, and at the same time for the future welfare of generations of our people unborn?

Events have been piling up to make all these questions both necessary and pertinent. We ended the last fiscal year, June 30th with a deficit of \$2.8 billion! It is generally conceded we shall end the current fiscal year next June 30th with a deficit of at least \$12 billion. And now it is reported that preliminary work is already under way on another \$80 billion budget for the fiscal year beginning next July 1st that will entail an additional deficit of \$8 billion to \$10 billion. All this means a deficit for these three years alone of \$23 billion to \$25 billion!

All this means, also, that our national debt will have increased by the same \$23 billion to \$25 billion in three years time. Already the debt limit has been increased to \$280 billion to take care of what has happened to date, and the Administration has requested that it be raised to \$288 billion to take care of what is patently going to happen in the next few months. After that, under our present way of doing things, it will have to be increased again.

And thus the nation runs headlong down the road to overpowering debt and disastrous inflation. What is the answer? Is there a solution? The natural response is that the people can stop it, if they will only demand that it be stopped. But can they? A great outcry came from the people to

Congress in the Spring of '57 about the proposed budget for the ensuing fiscal year. Congress seemed to pay attention. Proposed increased spending in many directions was not approved. The people were happy. But then the hullabaloo died down—and Congress later slipped in the appropriations which they had not dared make while the people were excited. As a result, the budget was larger than ever and the deficit was incurred.

And so, as matters now stand, the answer does not lie in the hands of the people. And certainly nothing can be expected from the government. It is the nature of governments, any and all governments, to spend all they can get their hands on. And to borrow more—if they are permitted to do so.

The answer, therefore—so far as our government is concerned—lies in an amendment to the Constitution requiring us to pay our way as we go along. A law making it impossible for us to spend more than we receive.

This means that if we want to spend \$4 billion for foreign aid, and our income does not permit us to do it without incurring a deficit, taxes must be raised by an amount sufficient to bring in an additional \$4 billion. If we want to subsidize farm crops by \$5 billion, we must raise taxes by \$5 billion. If we want to subsidize public housing and education and highways and a dozen and one other things by billions of dollars, then we must increase taxes by billions of dollars.

If this would not take the people up, nothing would. And we can feel quite sure it would. If, whenever Congress appropriated money—for whatever purpose—beyond our income, each taxpayer in this country knew that his taxes would be immediately increased to take care of the expenditure, then—and not until then, it appears—would we cease an end to waste and extravagance to profligate spending and total disregard for the financial welfare of the nation.

After all, why shouldn't we pay our own way? Surely, we do not expect our children and our children's children to pay our way. How low can we get?

County Agent news

Cotton Insects

Field inspections show a county wide boll weevil infestation of 12 per cent, numerous fields with boll worms, and some infestations of plant lice and red spider.

For adequate control, use 20 pounds dust per acre every four days. Boll worms can be controlled with 20 DDT mixture, or Endrin. Any of the regular poisons will take care of the weevils, along with 10 per cent Malathion.

Spiders and plant lice can be controlled with either Methy Parathion, Parathion, Aramite, or 10 per cent Malathion.

There is only about 20 more days to set a cotton crop, so following a sound poison schedule is a must.

Fall Grazing

There is still time to follow land for September planting. Even one month's preparation of soil, if disked two or three times will give a much better stand and quicker growth of oats and wheat than if the land is prepared just prior to planting.

If you plan to plant oats or wheat this fall, you had also better check into your seed supply. If you have not already made arrangements for seed, do so immediately.

Good small grain seed are scarce. Recommended oat varieties are Red Rust Proof, Victorgrain, and Nortex. Wheat varieties for this area are Atlas 66, Chancellor, and Coker. Two major items to study on seed are variety and purity. Germination counts too, but ordinarily the purity is in worse shape because of the weed seed content.

Cattle Grub Control
Systemic insecticides now available for cattle grub control are Dow ET-57 (Trolene and other trade names for ET-57) and Bayer 21/199 (Co-Ral).

The ET-57 is administered orally by bolus with a balling gun. Co-Ral is used as a spray.

Precautions when using these materials include: Use the recommended amount—do not overdose. Exercise care with the balling gun—do not force. Lubricate bolus.

Use sprays with enough pressure and in a way that the insecticide will thoroughly penetrate the hair coat over the entire body.

Do not market animals for slaughter for 60 days after treatment.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Now is a good time to cut back your old pot plants, and root cuttings or "slips" for new ones.

The plants from which stem cuttings can be rooted are fuchsias, sultanas, winter begonias, geraniums, wandering jew, coleus, ivies, philodendron and pothos vines and jade plants.

Make cutting 3 to 4 inches long. Cut on base just below a leaf joint. Remove about half the leaves on each cutting. Put cut ends in damp sand in clay pots or a wooden box. Keep the sand moist.

After the cuttings are rooted, transfer them to pots of rich garden soil.

Wandering Jew and coleus can be rooted easily in water.

Drying Tips

For those of you who still have an automatic clothes dryer on your "want" list, here are some line drying tips. They will help you hang articles so they will be easier to iron and fold.

Hang shirts by tail with a turnover of 6 inches. Pin at sides and center. Straighten collars and cuffs.

Hang shorts and trousers by waist. Pants hanger can be used for trousers.

Hang dresses by shoulder seams or on rust-proof hangers.

Place sheets (hems together), pillow cases, table cloths, and other flat articles with a 6 to 8 inch turn over the line. Pin small pieces on both ends; larger ones at ends and middle.

Place heavy articles such as blankets and quilts over two parallel lines to speed up drying and distribute weight.

Attach clothespins at strongest points of small straight articles as handkerchiefs, diapers and wash clothes. Hang them evenly on the line. Hanging by corners causes "dog ears."

Mixed Fresh Lime Mold

Wash Watermelon Balls

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin

1 cup cold water

1/4 cup chopped fresh mint

2 cups boiling water

1 cup fresh lime juice

1 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

Few drops green food coloring

3 cups fresh watermelon balls

Fresh mint leaves for garnish

Soften gelatin in cold water.

Steep mint leaves in boiling water.

Strain and pour over softened gelatin. Stir to dissolve gelatin.

Blend in lime juice, sugar, salt and green food coloring. Turn in to a 1-quart ring mold.

Chill until firm and ready to serve. Unmold on serving plate and fill center with watermelon balls. Garnish with fresh mint leaves. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Sharp Decrease In Unemployment In Miss. During July

Mississippi's insured unemployment registered its sharpest decrease of the year in July, Marx Huff, Executive Director of the

Mississippi Employment Security Commission, announced today. The average for the first three weeks of the month stood at 16,641—the lowest for 1958 and a decrease of 17 per cent from average insured unemployment for June.

A general improvement in the economic situation, with a statewide upturn in construction (particularly Highway Construction) and a pickup in the Service Industries on the Coast during the peak of the tourist season, were chiefly credited for the decrease in unemployment. Callbacks in Garment Manufacturing after layoffs for vacations and changes in patterns also contributed.

The early-July insured unemployment average was only 20 per cent above the average for the comparable period of last year and marked this year's closest approach to 1957 levels. The July decrease is a hopeful sign, Mr. Huff stated, particularly in view of the fact that comparable figures for 1957 and 1956 showed increases of 4 per cent and 11 per cent, respectively, over the average for the previous month, in contrast to the decrease shown this year.

Developments in the Middle East have caused Washington to look upon our \$8 billion stockpile of farm commodities as one of our strongest assets instead of the burdensome liability of only a few weeks ago.

In an area of the world where hunger is always present, and starvation is a constant threat, an abundance of food supplies gives the Free World an advantage that can, in the long run, be more decisive than nuclear weapons.

Last summer, Nikita Khrushchev told an American television audience that Communism would win its contest with Capitalism when the Soviet's per-capita production of meat, milk, butter surpassed that of the United States.

He was reminding us that a nation is as strong as its agriculture, and he was acknowledging that the balance of power between Communism and the Free World is in the hands of the American farmer.

Communists Fear Hunger

More than the great destructive power of our A-bombers, the communist leaders fear hunger. They have been unable to build a defense against the threat of starvation in almost 40 years of strenuous efforts.

Intelligence reports from behind the Iron Curtain reveal that Russia, China and their satellite nations have a food reserve of less than 90 days. Some estimates place the reserve as low as 60 days.

In contrast, the United States has in storage or nearing harvests a supply of food sufficient to maintain an adequate diet for more than two years. We have a four-year supply of bread grains.

The Communist Bloc has a population of almost a billion people, nearly one half of whom are farmers. But, the thirty million American and Canadian farmers have the capacity to produce more than almost half a billion communists.

War Are Gaining

Farm experts tell us that we are operating our agricultural plant at only about 75 per cent capacity this year while producing an all-time record supply of farm products. Our capacity to produce is being expanded at a rate of more than 5 per cent a year.

Nineteen years ago, when World War II broke out in Europe, American farmers produced 2 1/2 billion bushels of corn on 85 million acres. This year they will produce 38 per cent more corn on 18 per cent fewer acres. In 1939 we harvested 740 million bushels of wheat on 53 million acres, but this year we are growing 1.3 billion bushels, almost twice as much, on 10 million fewer acres.

Cotton acreage has been cut by more than half since 1949, but total production is down only 5 per cent. Milk production is up down by 20 per cent. Total farm

production is up 40 per cent, but the number of farmers is down by one-third. American production per acre is double that of Russia, and per farmer it is eight times the Russian average.



Land Drainage And Good Crops

The word is going around that the fellows who have irrigation equipment are trying to sell it.

There has been a little need for irrigation in Tishomingo county this year as a pig has for a side-saddle. oDn't give your irrigation pumps and pipes away boys the time may come when you will need them.

This is the year that farmers are talking about the value of their drainage ditches.

Everyone knows that Mr. R. C. Tice is an expert when it comes to getting excess water off the land. The drainage work he has done on the farms of Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Co-operators, who live in Tishomingo county, is paying off this rainy year.

Two SCD Co-operators who seem particularly well pleased with the ditches constructed on their farms this spring are: Messrs. H. E. Hester and Roy Boothe. We should not fail to mention Mr. Harvey Davis, Elbert Robinson and G. C. Scruggs. Mr. Scruggs is so well pleased with his ditches, which drain about 30 acres, that he can't talk about it without laughing for joy. He really likes those ditches!

Those who have seen Roy Boothe's crop say it is the best crop he has had on the Lela Whitfield place in years. One mile of open drains, many of them V-ditches, has carried excess water off of some 40 to 50 acres of flat, yellow creek, bottom land.

Zeke Hester likes to talk about his ditches too. He constructed this spring, about one mile of second bottom land that he and Braxton cultivate. According to Zeke, these ditches make the difference between a good crop of corn and a complete failure on a big part of the 20 acres they drain.

If you want to hear the latest on

"Dry Water" ask Bill Brinkley. He is the authority on "Dry Water" in this town. If you should want to see any of this "Dry Water" you are too late. A ditch constructed, this spring, right down the middle of the swag where it was has drained it off into Indian Creek.

So it goes from day to day. Your local Soil Conservation Service technicians are at work helping farmers with their soil and water problems. This year it has been chiefly water problems. Next year you may need that irrigation equipment and you will be glad that you have it.

The Re-Election Of Governor Faubus Was A Mighty Blow To Mixicrats

Faubus By A Landslide!

It was a mighty blow to the mixicrats who remake the South. It was a blow to political meddlers and to those who put their faith on the side of might instead of right.

Up-country meddlers and politicians were banking heavily on a Faubus upset. It is reported that they poured big money into Arkansas in their zealous effort to defeat him. Had they succeeded the carpet baggers and scallawags of a hundred years ago would have arisen from the dead. The urge would have been too strong for them to lie still.

Use of force in Little Rock achieved nothing. It did not improve relations between the races. It made them worse. It did not improve educational opportunities. It made them worse. A school cannot function with troops stalking only wrought ill-will and just plain ordinary hatred and disgust.

It left the entire nation disappointed and disgusted with our President—a man who was presented to the country by his party as one who would be an inspiring leader. It was never suggested that his leadership might at times include the nudge of bayonets.

For almost a year now the people of Arkansas have been subjected to abuse and ridicule. Every news medium—television, radio, newspapers, magazines and so on—swopped down on Little Rock and made their time and space available for the cheapest type of belittlement of the fair name of a

fine City and a fine State. Our own government has posted an ignominious reference to Little Rock in the United States Pavilion at the World's Fair in Brussels. This reference and its use of bayonets reminds us of how strangely our government sometimes treats its own people. If a situation comparable to Little Rock had happened in a foreign land, instead of ridiculing and suggesting that they put it down with bayonets, Eisenhower and Secretary Dulles would have been busily engaged sacking up untold millions of dollars to send as evidence of our love and friendship.

Fortunately, the South has many stalwart political leaders who do not knuckle to abuse, ridicule or bayonets. Unfortunately, we have a few, with another or so joining every year, who do knuckle, duck, dodge, pussyfoot and piddle with the issues and who refuse to get in the fight. They stand with one foot on one side and one on the other. The South can still defeat the attempted invasion of its rights, even in the face of threatened force, if all its political leaders will get on the side of the South, stay on it and let it be known that they have taken their stand down to the end.

Arkansas has firmly stamped its condemnation on this Administration's philosophy of "Brotherhood by Bayonet." It has served notice that the South is not going to voluntarily yield to the rights of the sovereign states. The Faubus landslide has been a stimulant to constitutionalists everywhere.

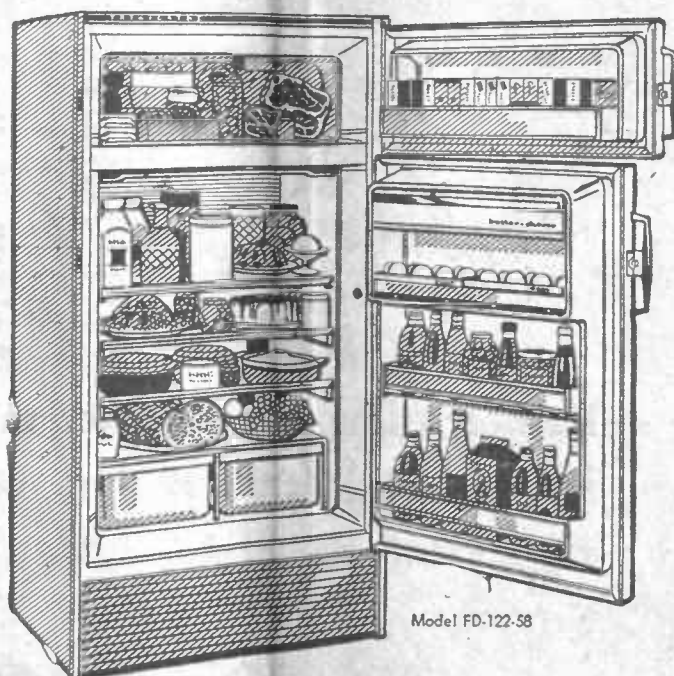

But Jesus came to set the captive free. In Him there is freedom from

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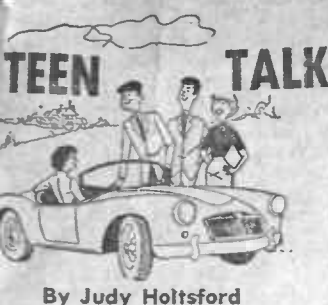

Lesson for August 10, 1958

WHEN a preacher tells the truth about liquor from the pulpit, that isn't news. But when a preacher in a New Jersey church took out a bottle of liquor from the pulpit, and told his congregation where he got it, that was news. It was a college town and there were laws closely regulating the sale of liquor, only the police paid little attention to the laws and the public paid rather less. Preachers aren't supposed to know where illicit liquor can be had; but this one did. He made things so hot for the police department that finally he was offered the job of mayor—and he took it. His congregation gave him a leave of absence, and he went to work trying to get the laws enforced. His enemies made it hard for him. He himself was "tailed" (as the detective stories put it) day and night; if he drove one mile above the legal speed limit, some policeman was right there to give him a ticket. But he outlived the embarrassments and he outthought the underworld and he showed that you can have good government if you want it. And then he went back to his preaching again. People listened more than they used to, for now they knew this was a man.

A vice president of the United States stepped off the train in a big city. Even a vice president rates at least one reporter, and so there was one there. He asked the V.P. his views on a matter in the public eye at the time, but the high official did not oblige. "I came here," he said, "to speak to a men's Bible class. Politics and religion don't mix." "Politics and religion don't mix" is what every shady character in or on the fringes of politics would like us all to believe. Men who view public office as a chance to build up their private fortunes are only too glad if the church people will look the other way. Religion that is worth anything, religion that resembles and is drawn from the religion of the Bible, is interested in political questions. We cannot escape from government of some kind.

Politics and Religion
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Eyes to See
Norman Thomas, a Presbyterian who was a sort of perpetual and never successful candidate for President, years ago, was talking to a room full of students for the ministry. "Don't use your pulpit for a political platform," he said. "If you feel called and impelled to go into politics, get out of the ministry at least for the time being, and do your fighting in the political arena." Mr. Thomas was warning against a real danger. It is true that what a minister is trying to do, and the way he tries to do it, are different from what (let us say) a good congressman is trying to do and the way he tries to do it. It is also true that most ministers are not trained in political science and still less fitted for the sort of scramble that most legislative bodies are. Nevertheless, the minister, and the church generally, ought to be able to see the moral issues involved in public affairs, problems and decisions. Most "political" questions, local or national, affect human beings; and whatever affects human beings is a concern for all Christians.

In There Fighting
The church, as an organization, should never turn itself into a political pressure group. A church no better than a political party need not be surprised if it receives no more respect than a political party. Nevertheless Christian people, and their churches, ought to be, and are, in there fighting for better government, juster laws, better law enforcement. In our Congress and Senate there are many convinced and committed Christians. At a great Christian men's convention last year the most effective speaker (many believed) was none of the visiting spell-binding preachers, but the Christian governor of the state. Every branch of government can use, and sorely needs, Christian men and women who will try to apply in public affairs the sturdy faith that is in them.

Create More Profitable Future Miss. Is Aim Of Retail Merchants

Mississippi retail merchants are trying to learn how to create a more profitable future in Mississippi by their annual meeting on the 10th.

A two-day event has been set for 10-11, at the King Edward Hotel in Jackson and a large part of the state's retailers is expected to be on hand. The future for retailing for and state will receive special attention from the national-retail business leaders who have gathered as featured speakers. Mississippi Retail Merchants' convention is in its second year and is expected to draw a large voice of some 20,000 Mississippians.

The association sponsored several sessions which resulted in the last session of the legislature. Among the accomplishments were measures to protect the merchants' shops and writers of checks written into the laws of the state.

A. Egger, Columbus, MR-president, estimates that these measures should result in a 100 percent reduction in loss per cent of the state's retailers. He is delighted by the tremendous decrease in the number

of checks drawn on "insufficient funds" accounts. Egger continued, "and the accompanying decrease in volume of money lost through such practices. A retailer cannot serve as a 'banker' without some form of protection against fraud of this type."

The "action team" for retailing in Mississippi sponsored the passage of a shoplifting law which defines shoplifting and provides rigid penalties in addition to permitting merchants and sales personnel to question suspected shoplifters without fear of law suits.

According to Egger, "This year's meeting will contain something for every kind of retailer, both large and small. The program is designed to give them helpful suggestions and new ideas on how to make more profits."

An innovation this year is a workshop in which various aspects of retailing will be covered, such as merchandising, financing, expense controls, and employee training.

Non-members of the association are invited to participate in the workshop type of meeting and to join the organization in its program of work.

Kitchens Get Eat-In Treatment . . . Range Features Make Cooking Easier

"No matter where I serve my guests, they all prefer my kitchen best." This sampler which adorns the walls of many kitchens—in town and country—is taking on more meaning every day. It is an indication that time is being turned back, at least in a construction sense. For kitchens are becoming larger and of the "eat-in" variety.

Crackdown On Driver Violations Announced By Public Safety Comm.

Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough went into a huddle Tuesday with his nine Patrol district inspectors and mapped out strategy for an all-out campaign against traffic accidents.

It was disclosed that the conference, held in the Commissioner's private office at Patrol headquarters, lasted more than four hours.

Of the forthcoming Patrol safety campaign, Commissioner Scarbrough said: "You may call it a crackdown if you wish. We are definitely going all out after the cause of accidents—driver violations!"

He stated that Patrolmen are

The picture which accompanies this on-the-farm report was taken in just such a kitchen. Among the new things which had just been installed was an exhaust fan. Located above the electric range, the fan keeps the kitchen free of all cooking odors. We learned that its installation was the first step in a planned remodeling job, which included the purchase of a new electric range. The next range, we were told, was to have flat sides and sharp corners so as to fit tightly against new base cabinets to provide that built-in look.

Other features being considered varied from adjustable broiler racks to simplified clock-controlled ovens for automatic cooking. Actually, what to get in a new electric range does present a problem. Some ranges, for example, have vertical broilers that suspend food between two heating elements to broil both sides at the same time. There are ranges with removable doors and those with deep well cookers which perform a variety of cooking jobs. More electric ranges have automatic temperature-controlled surface units with sensing elements in the center to maintain constant temperatures. A number of ranges now are designed to operate rotisseries, and others have plug-in meat thermometers for automatic roasting of meats.

Also, oven liners are lighter and brighter. Backsplashes are higher and some have shelf space on top. And, you'll find that the light located on the higher backsplashes gives better illumination of surface units.

ed this reduction commendable, but stated that enforcement will be tightened even more during the coming weeks.

Use of roadblocks for driver license and vehicle checks was also planned in the Tuesday conference. Brakes, lights, and proper safety equipment will receive close attention.

"In fact," Commissioner Scarbrough stated, "We discussed our accident chart in general, vehicle equipment, high accident frequency areas, and types of violations causing our accidents."

The crackdown, to be launched Friday, August 1, is reminiscent of the widely publicized "Operation Attack" of October 1956 when the Highway Patrol deployed its units into wolfpack teams, striking accident prone counties with systematic precision.

This drive cuts accidents back more than 50 per cent in many areas. Speeding citations by Patrolmen jumped more than 200 per cent during the same period, according to the Patrol records division.

It will be difficult for the Patrol to cut back its August traffic death toll, however. Records show that only 32 highway fatalities occurred in August 1957, second lowest monthly traffic figure of last year.

September accidents are normally high, however, with last September's death count reaching 60 dead. It is at the consistently high September slaughter which the Patrol is airing its present campaign.

The Public Safety Commissioner called for cooperation of the public.

He warned that persons apprehended drag racing and committing other "wilful, flagrant traffic violations" will be dealt with severely. This could mean suspension of all driving privileges.

The Middle East study gives a significant insight into the contributions of the Christian church in the Middle East, also into other religions and secular forces at work in this resurgent area.

"Understanding Other Cultures" points to the contribution of the church toward understanding other people, and the study of Isaiah interprets a prophet of rare talent and his message for the world.

The church-wide study, "Methodism in Alaska and Hawaii," is an introduction to Methodism's Pacific outpost missions.

Instructions and helps for teaching these studies are made available for local societies of the district through the School of Missions, August 18-22, at Lake Stephens Methodist Camp, Oxford, Miss., and the district Seminar, August 26, at New Albany. Also plan and suggestions may be found

in the Methodist Woman and other publications.

BUSINESS ACTIVITY STILL ON UP SIDE

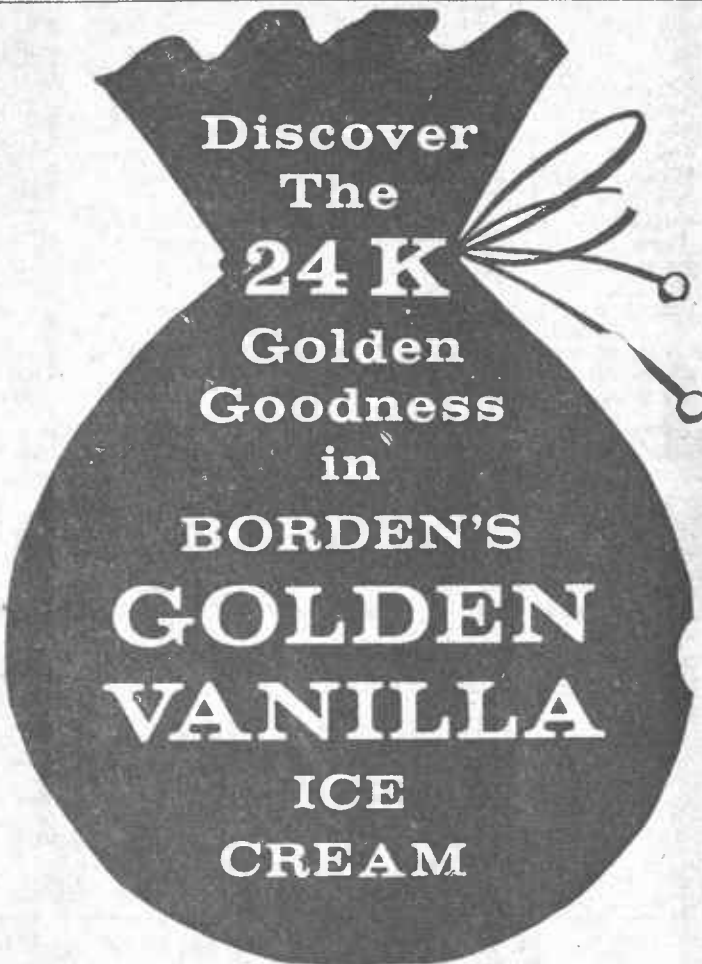
