First District Schools Open Friday, August 29th

Schedule For Opening Day Is Given, Faculty Is Now Complete

As previously announced, the 1958-59 session of school in the Special Separate School District will begin on Friday, August 29. All schools in the district, both white and colored, will be guided, with whatever modifications principals may consider necessary, by the following calendar of opening activities for the Iuka center:

Friday, August 29, 8 to 12, general assembly, followed by registration and presentation of the schedule of high school classes. Bro. Carmon Savell will bring a brief inspirational message to the assembly.

Monday, September 1, from 7:30 to 12, will be devoted to issuing

textbooks and making lesson assignments for grades 10, 11 and 12.

Tuesday, September 2, from 8 to 12, will be spent in similar manner for grades 7, 8, and 9.

On Wednesday, September 3, the regular schedule (8 a.m. to 3 p.m.) will become effective, and the school cafeteria will serve the first lunch of the new session.

The faculty for 1958-59 has finally been completed, the vacancy created by the resignation of Mr. Truman Holley having been filled by Mr. John F. Meeks, of Kossuth, Mo. Meeks, who is a graduate of Mississippi Southern College, will be assigned mainly to 7th and 8th grade subjects, and will assist in the athletic program.

Will Be Crowded

For the coming session, no relief is in sight for the crowded conditions in the Iuka buildings, and some undesirable situations will necessarily prevail. After this year, school authorities are expecting the new elementary school building, and possibly the high school building, to be ready for use.

J. D. Clark, attorney for the board of supervisors, indicates that building funds from the recent bond issue will soon be available. T. H. Naylor, Executive Secretary of the State Educational Finance Commission in a telephone conversation with school officials last week, explained that action on the approval of the building site had been delayed because of the illness of Mr. Luther Upfen, Commissioner for the 1st District. Mr. Naylor expressed the feeling that, inasmuch as he & Mrs. Pullen have come to an understanding about the matter, the site would be approved at the next meeting of the Commission. As a matter of fact, Mr. Naylor has already submitted the Department of Education for Study the architect's tentative building plans for the proposed site.

With bond technicalities cleared up and the site approved, the building program should move forward rapidly.

Next Tues. Is Election Day

Primary For Judge And Amendment To Be Decided

Voters of Tishomingo county will go to the polls next Tuesday, August 26, to nominate a candidate for Circuit Judge and to decide the fate of a constitutional amendment.

Incumbent Raymond T. Jarvis of Booneville is opposed in his race for re-election to the office of Circuit Judge by Marshall T. Adams of Tupelo. Judge Jarvis has held the office for a number of years.

Polls will open at 8 a.m., and will close at 6 p.m. Circuit Clerk Alver Belue states that it will be necessary for those voting in the primary election to present their poll tax receipts for 1956 and 1957.

W. R. Nettles, chairman of the county election commission, states that members of the Commission will meet in the Circuit Clerk's office on Wednesday, August 27 (the day after the election), to tally the votes and he requests that all custodians of ballot boxes be certain to have their boxes in the clerk's office no later than one o'clock in the afternoon of that date.

Circuit Court In Progress; Criminal Division Next Week

19 True Bills Returned By Grand Jury; Report Given On County's Facilities

August term of Tishomingo County Circuit Court got underway Monday morning of this week with Judge Francis Zachary of Forset, Miss., presiding in the absence of Judge Raymond T. Jarvis. Judge Jarvis was absent from court due to illness in his family. He probably will be in court next week for at least a portion of the criminal division.

The Grand Jury returned 19 True bills from its investigations.

In the report on facilities in the county, the Grand Jury found the county jail to be in a poor condition of repair. Its recommendation to the county Board of Supervisors was that a new structure for the jail should be erected since the Jury believed repair of the existing building would be economically impractical. The Jury recommended that the Board make plans for a new jail.

Also, the Grand Jury report showed that the County Auditor's books and the County Tax Collector's books appeared to be neat and well kept and in balance. In the Jury's investigation of manufacturing plants, movie theatres and hotels a favorable report was returned. However, an investigation of a drainage and disposal situation in the Town of Tishomingo was condemned and the Jury recommended that the condition be corrected.

Most of the cases in Civil division of the Court have been disposed of in various ways, with the exception of the Pyle-Curtin case in a litigation with the Southern railway system. The suit comes as a result of a car-train wreck that occurred in May of last year when Billy Pyle and Norman Curtin were fatally injured. This case is scheduled for Thursday of next week.

Among criminal cases to appear next week is the State vs. L. M. Ross who is charged with the murder of a Mr. George at Belmont. (This case was erroneously reported in last week's paper as being scheduled for the first week. This was an error.) A number of cases from Justice of the Peace Courts is also expected to be heard next week.

Hospital Contract Signed

A contract for the construction of the county hospital was signed and became effective as of Monday of this week, August 18. Principals signing the contract were Fourth District Supervisor Lunceford Stormer who acted in his official capacity as president of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, and Sam Kimberly, owner and operator of Kimberly Bros. Construction Company, low bidders for the job.

Sealed bids for building and equipping the hospital were opened on Monday, August 4, with Kimberly Bros. offer of \$263,480 being accepted by the Board of Supervisors. Approval of the bid was given by the State Hospital Commission in a letter received by the supervisors last week.

A work order to commence construction is expected today.

Fallacious Sunday School Teaching

This writer has just finished reading the discussion of the Sunday School lessons for August, 1958, in the Adult Student, published by the General Board of Education of The Methodist Church at Nashville, Tennessee. It was a most disheartening experience—and not the first one of its kind we have had along this line. The discussions of the lessons were fallacious and dangerous, not worthy of a great denomination of the Protestant church and certainly not representative of the thinking of the rank and file membership of the church.

Since this is our own denomination, we feel more free than might otherwise be the case to be critical of the discussions, even as the author was critical of views opposite to his own. It would be easy and less disturbing, of course, to let it go and ignore the matter altogether, except one can hardly rest freely with his own conscience when he sees promulgated in the name of his own church doctrines which he considers highly dangerous and at such variance with the principles of freedom on which our government is based. After all, a church publication can be

the most dangerous of all publications—just because it is a church publication and therefore entirely too many people accept the views expressed therein without question.

Space does not allow us to quote copiously from the discussions of the Sunday School lessons, but we are constrained to give one substantial quote because it shows very clearly the devious "hitting below the belt" approach of the author. The following quote leads off the discussion of the August 10th lesson, which bears the heading, "Justice in Government":

"In a certain congressional district Mr. X ran for a seat in the House of Representatives. He belonged to no church. He was known to drink heavily. He advocated policies inconsistent with those held by The Methodist Church or the National Council of Churches: little foreign aid, higher tariffs, weak support of the United Nations, and adoption of the Bricker Amendment.

"His opponent, Mr. Z, was a staunch member of a local church, had been moderator of a section of his denomination and had served on its state social action committee. He was a total abstainer and possessed a fine family. His attitude toward international policies agreed closely with positions taken by major denominations; a deep concern for world peace, strong support of the United Nations, understanding of the need for more world trade through trade agreements, adequate foreign aid, and belief in basic human rights.

"In this district the majority of the people belonged to some church and were to be found in their seats on Sunday morning. One would expect Mr. Z to win by a landslide! Instead Mr. X won by a landslide! How does one explain such a vote?"

"Such actions lead Christian citizens to inquire: How can justice in government be obtained? There it is! Note the underhanded approach used by the author in presenting this entirely hypothetical case. The candidate who believed in 'little foreign aid, higher tariffs, weak support of the United Nations, and adoption of the Bricker Amendment' belonged to no church and was a heavy drinker; the candidate who took the opposite position was a staunch member of the church, was a total abstainer, and even possessed a fine family. It is simply dishonest to imply, as the author does, that one who supports the views of Mr. X is immoral, while one who supports the views of Mr. Z is entirely moral.

In fact, it is ironical—and would be amusing if it were not so serious for the author to raise the question. "How does one explain such a vote?" In raising this question at all, he unwittingly "hoists himself upon his own petard"—catches himself in his own trap—because the answer is simply that all those fine church-going people in the district support "Mr. X's" views on these questions and do not agree at all with the views of "Mr. Z". There are plenty more like them in other districts—and for good reason.

All the lesson discussions for August are permeated with this type of comment. Thoughtful people will be able to evaluate them for what they are worth. The danger is that so many people—and naturally so—accept church publications, especially their own, as the law and gospel.

A Salute
To Congress

The 85th Congress heads for home and the election campaigning with a record of accomplishments that has earned the respect of everyone who has worked closely with it.

Few Congresses in history have faced up to more critical problems, or worked more strenuously to solve them. At the start of the second session early this year the most urgent problems were the Russian sputniks and the deepening economic recession.

Congress was caught in a dilemma between the two. There were urgent demands for more government spending to meet the Russian missiles threat and, at the same time, an insistent public clamor for tax reductions to counter the recession.

Growing unemployment was a serious problem. More than five million people were without jobs. Industrial production was declining. There were demands for increased unemployment and other social security benefits.

Foreign Aid

With economic troubles at home and growing communist activities in nations friendly to the U. S., Congress debated whether to continue spending billions of dollars to bolster the economy and military strength of the alliance of Western nations.

The decision to expand our military research at the same time, continue economic and military assistance to friendly nations, meant (1) no general tax reduction and (2) a substantial increase in the national debt.

Those were difficult decisions, and more especially in a year in which all of the House members and one-third of the Senators must face voters in re-election campaigns. It took statesmanship of a high order to make them.

The crisis in which we sent troops into the Middle East during the latter days of the session brought closer the threat of World

War III. The decision to defend the freedom of friendly small nations was one in which the Congress concurred with the President.

Record Work Load
Even without those major decisions to be made, the 85th would have been one of the busiest on record. More than 17,000 bills were introduced during the two years it served.

Among them were bills to reorganize the Pentagon defense set-up, raise the pay of government workers, new farm legislation, anti-racketeering labor legislation, extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act, a \$2.5 billion public works program, and a \$40 billion national defense budget.

Each of these bills received careful consideration by committees. Some involved weeks and months of hearings, then long debate in the Senate and House. Congress did a tremendous amount of work in the seven and a half months between convening in January and the end of the session.

Sowing, Grazing And Mowing

Sowing, grazing and mowing can, and is, returning a profit and checking the erosion on hundreds of acres of hill land in Tishomingo County.

We are using yesterday's agricultural research to live better today. The plant breeders and agronomist have given up plants and information about these plants.

It is by the use of these improved plants and the information concerning them that farmers are now able to produce good yields of pasture and hay crops on the sloping upland in Tishomingo county.

Good seed and correct information concerning them does not always bring success.

Some farmers succeed where others fail. This often occurs where the same kind of seed are sown on similar land and both fields are fertilized the same.

Overgrazing is the cause of much pasture failure. However, there are instances where the grass grows so fast that it gets ahead of the cattle and other livestock grazing it and it should be mowed.

Some of the pasture grasses will, when not grazed, grow to considerable height and in the winter fall down and cause such a dense cover that the young plants are smothered the following spring, such areas should be kept mowed.

This year there has been ample rain. In Tishomingo county there are many good to excellent hill pastures. These pastures are there for all of us to see and to study. The landowners who have these good to excellent pastures will gladly answer questions concerning them. Always it has been a good idea if you want to learn how to do something go to the man who is doing it and learn from him.

The purpose of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District program is to assist landowners to earn a profit from their land and protect it from erosion at the same time. Proper sowing, grazing and mowing is one way of doing this.

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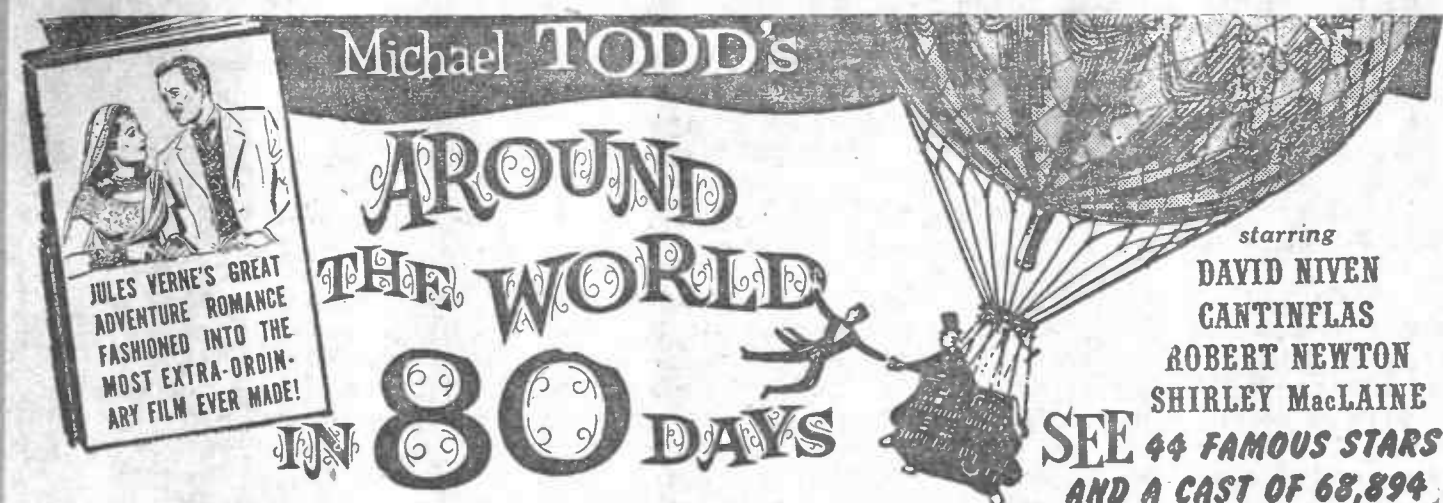

Remember, if you travel with foods—cooked or uncooked, play safe and keep them cold to prevent spoilage.

Use only live coals and allow no flames. If heat becomes too high, spread the coals thinly; if too low, push them together.

When cooking large roasts or other large pieces of meat, keep reserve hot coals by adding a little extra charcoal around the edge.

Keep chicken, turkey and meat that takes more than an hour to cook, at least 10 inches from the coals.

Steaks, hamburgers and other fast-cooking meats may be grilled four inches from the coals.

Jumbo Sandwiches
If your outing calls for sandwiches rather than food grilled on the spot, why not try jumbos for a change.

Slice a long loaf of French bread lengthwise. Spread mayonnaise, butter or margarine, or a favorite sandwich spread on one slice. Then arrange slices of meat and cheese and the extras such as lettuce, onion, pickle and olives. Top it with the remaining slice. Now cut finished sandwich crosswise into servings.

Another jumbo is the triple decker club sandwich. Use white and whole wheat bread. On the first layer use turkey and corned beef. Second layer—tomatoes, lettuce and sweet onion. Third layer—sharp cheddar cheese and mustard.

Open Face Sandwiches
If your sandwich ideas aren't quite this big, maybe an open-face sandwich will be good and a little different.

How about:
Broiled Boston Treat—baked beans, bacon strips and grated cheese on dark rye.

Hawaiian Treat—pineapple slices, bacon strips and cheese slices on rusks, broiled.

Good Sandwich Secrets
Freshness is the secret to good sandwiches.

For sandwiches to be eaten later, give lots of attention to making and packing to keep their fresh appeal.

Sandwiches can be wrapped and frozen for use a week or two later. Allow three hours for thawing. Leave out the lettuce or mayonnaise.

Butter both sides of sandwich to keep filling from soaking into bread. For extra flavor, cream the butter spread with a little mustard, deviled ham, horseradish, chives or favorite cheese.

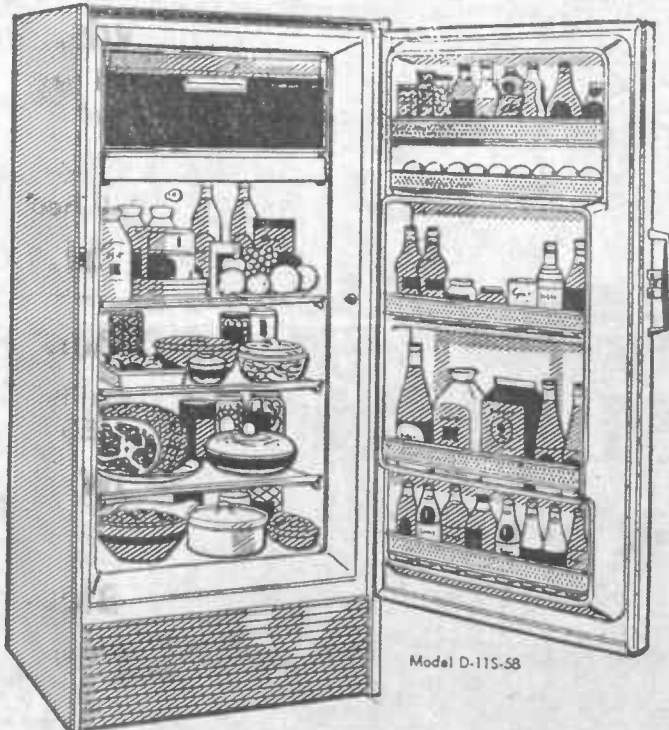

We commend Judge Raymond T. Jarvis to you as a good, sober, honest, and honorable Christian gentleman.

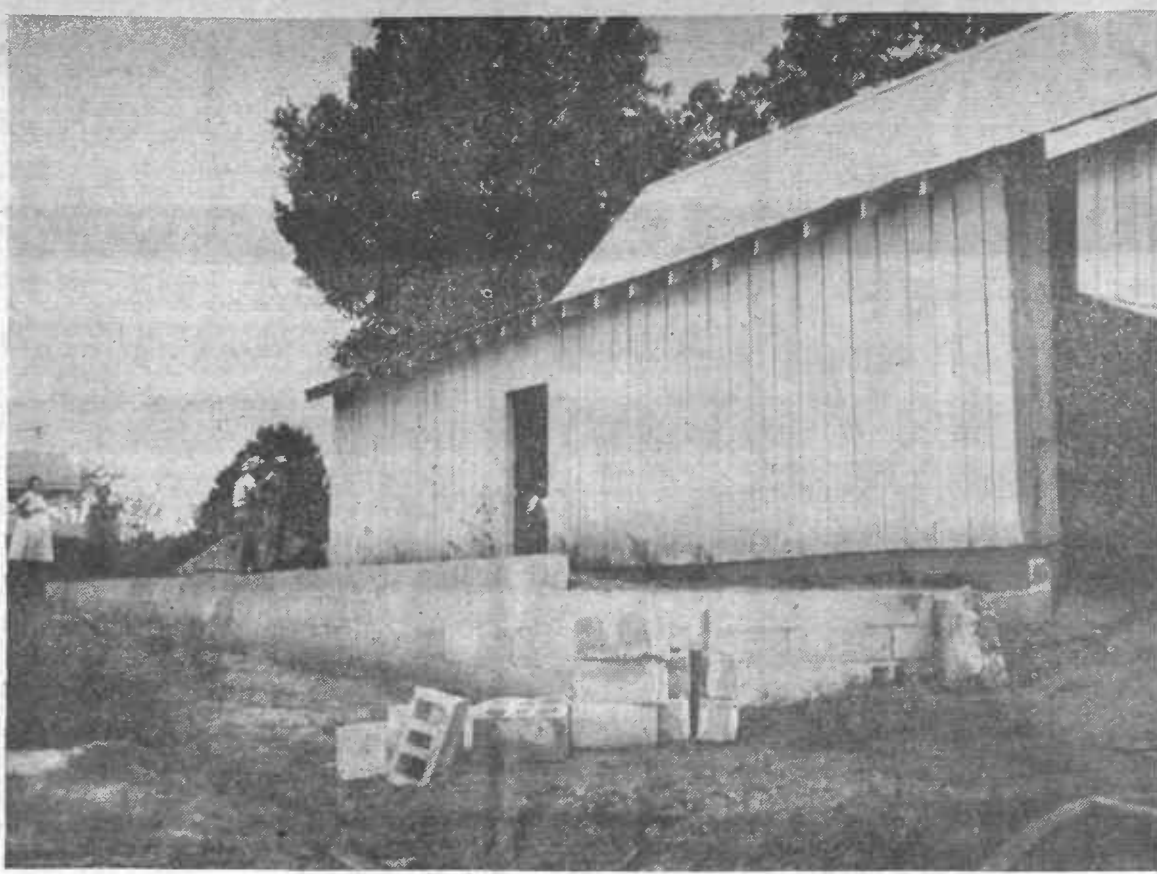

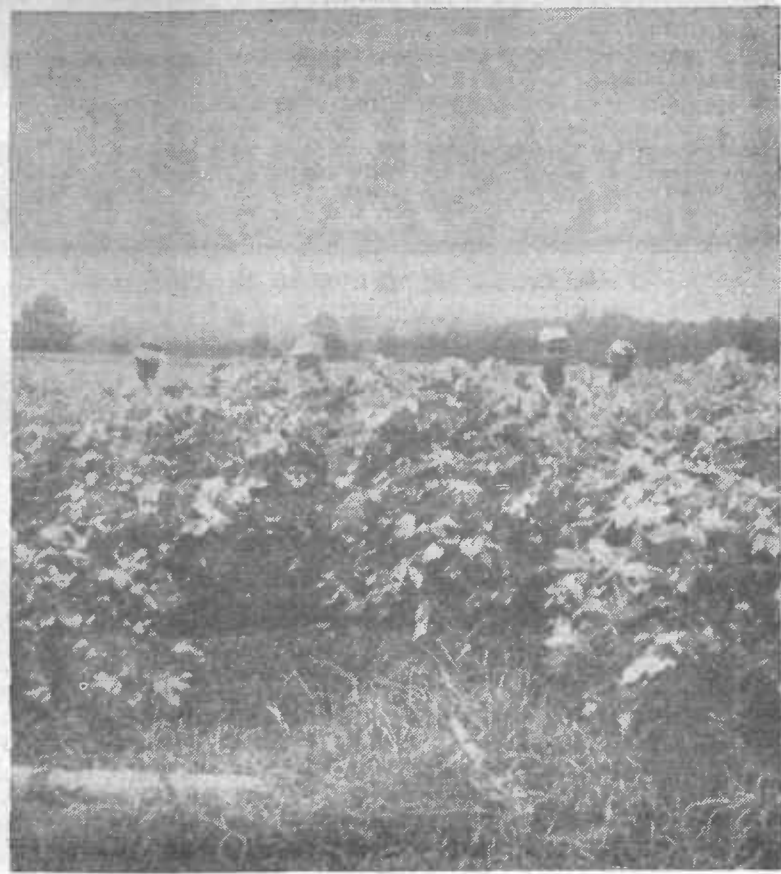

CAL WEED CONTROL—Outstanding among the demonstrations farmers witnessed during last year's farm tour of test demonstration farms in the county was this field of corn on the J. C. Deaton farm near Paden. Here Mr. Deaton used a chemical for the control of weeds in this field. The right show the area was not treated with the chemical. Here morning glories and cockleburbs are growing profusely while the rows at left are a part of the area treated. In the left portion, the corn is completely free of all weeds, cockleburbs and morning glories. All this field of corn received the chemical being applied at the same time the last plowing was done. The field of corn received no further attention. Thus with chemical weed control, a corn crop is made with only one plowing and no hoeing.



HOG RAISING PROGRAM—County farmers also viewed the hog barn that is under construction on the Harvey Davis farm near Burnsville. Here Mr. Davis, in cooperation with his two sons, Harold and Edward, is planning on raising hogs in large quantities. Farrowing stalls and a sun porch are under construction and the Davises plan to maintain 100 sows that will produce upwards of 1500 hogs a year. The Davises will feed out all the pigs they produce and expect to use all the corn that they can grow on their farm in addition to a quantity that they will have to purchase. It is estimated that they will use approximately 20,000 bushels of corn a year when the program gets in full swing. The Davis farm is also one of the test demonstration farms in the county. Farmers are urged to watch this hog-growing program as it promises to be one of the largest operations of its kind in the area.



IRRIGATED COTTON—This field is a demonstration of irrigation cotton farming. The field is located on the Grady Taylor farm near Belmont. Even though rainfall has been fairly plentiful this year, this field was irrigated during some of the drier times. Fruiting is heavy and indications are for a bumper crop on this field. 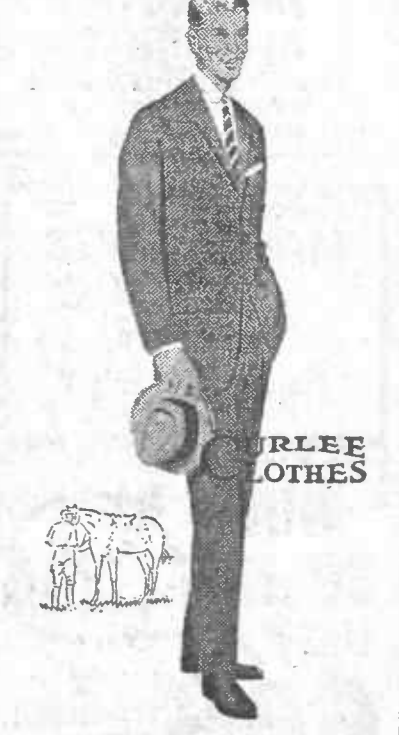

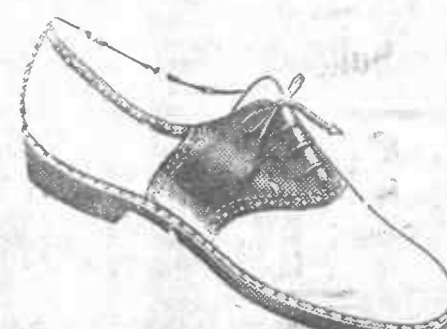

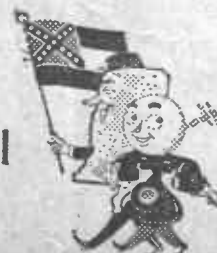
