Rotary Hears State Health Head Discuss Financial Problems Of County Project

Dr. Archie Lee Gray, Executive Director of the Mississippi State Board of Health, was guest speaker at the weekly Rotary club meeting held Wednesday at noon in the Iuka Methodist church annex. Dr. Gray's remarks dealt with the financial contributions of the county Board of Supervisors to the county health department. The speaker said that the county had given \$3900.00 each year since 1942 as its share of the operation at cost of the department. Total yearly cost has been approximately \$12,000.00 with the remaining amount over \$3900.00 being furnished by the State and Federal Governments. The doctor said that this situation could not continue to exist as it was not fair to other counties in which up to 80 percent of their cost of health departments was born by local levies. Light Vote In Election

**Jarvis Re-Elected;
Constitutional
Amendment Carries**

An unusually light vote was cast in Tuesday's elections. Only 1301 ballots were cast in the Circuit Judge primary, which is less than one third of the qualified electors in the county.

Judge Raymond T. Jarvis, incumbent, was successful in his bid for re-election as judge of the First Judicial district. The judge lost Tishomingo county to his opponent, Marshall T. Adams, but gained enough in the remaining 6 counties to carry the election by over a thousand votes majority. Unofficial returns gave Judge Jarvis landslide proportions in Alcorn, Itawamba and Monroe counties, and close votes on Prentiss and Lee counties. Like Tishomingo, Pontotoc county went strong for Mr. Adams, who carried all of the precincts except four small boxes in Tishomingo county.

In the special election on the constitutional amendment that is intended to make amending the constitution easier, Tishomingo county went in opposition to the amendment. The vote was 592 against and 562 for. However, statewide, the amendment carried by a 3 to 1 majority.

Criminal Court In Session This Week; Several Cases Heard; Jarvis Presiding

A number of criminal cases were disposed of in sessions held on Monday and Wednesday of this week in the criminal division of Circuit Court.

Among some of the cases heard was one in which Melvin Yarborough of near Paden was charged with stealing merchandise from the Stevens store in Paden. Yarborough was sentenced to 3 years in the penitentiary with the sentence being suspended and the plaintiff being placed on probation.

William Edgar Gilley of Dennis, charged with child desertion and non-support drew a 2 year sentence to the penitentiary with the last year being suspended.

Theo Pickett was fined \$100.00 and cost on a drunk driving charge.

Jasper G. Clark was also fined \$100.00 and cost on a drunk driving charge. However, the fine was suspended, the defendant paying only the cost.

GIVEAWAY IN A NEW GUISE

Of all the "liberal" phrases, "regional economic development" is the most intriguing to the giveaway planners. Those who promote Dealer schemes for the United States and the world are forever asserting that the hopes of the future rest with schemes to "assist and accelerate improvement in the living standards."

President Eisenhower was the public figure to use these very words in his recent address before the General Assembly of the United Nations. In the blue-and-gold hall, where world planners think they can solve all problems and

resolve enmities that have existed for centuries, the President posed a familiar type of solution for a world crisis. He pledged U. S. financial aid for such a regional economic plan in the Mideast.

It should be obvious to President Eisenhower that he can't speak for the American people in pledging kingsize giveaway. There is rising opposition in the nation to this business of substituting bribery for foreign policy.

The objectionable features of all giveaway programs are compounded in the plan set forth in the President's regional development program in that the control would be international, depending only on the U. S. purse for its funds.

The rabble-rousers of the Mideast say our money is tainted with imperialism. They will accept our money, they now say, only when it is channeled through an international committee. They apparently have no use for the old truism that he who pays the piper has the right to call the tune. But worse than that, there are powerful "liberal" lobbies right here among us that are only too pleased to second such arrangements.

Paul Hoffman, one of the kings of the giveaway business and former chief of the Economic Cooperation Administration, believes that foreign aid should be distributed by the International Development Fund, which is a U. N. organization.

Were such a procedure accepted, the U. N. would get the credit for any good will and good works and the U. S. would get nothing but the bill for costs. U. S. taxpayers wouldn't have a bit of control over the money they furnish. U. N. officials from 61 countries, including Russia and the Soviet bloc nations, would have the say in the spending of money raised in American Communities.

Such a giveaway program would be ideal from the standpoint of the Soviet Nation. The resources of the U. S. would be tapped to aid those countries that the Russians have been courting. But the credit wouldn't go to the United States. In fact, the Russians most probably would receive credit for fore-

ing the United States to abandon its so-called "unilateral" foreign aid programs.

The Future
Is Bright

If you know someone who worries about business and frets about the recession you can cheer him up with some good news. Tell him that if he takes a two weeks vacation and comes back and finds a brand new city of 130,000 people built up around him, not to be surprised. It's happening all the time.

Our net gain in population, the Census Bureau informs us, is at the rate of 9,300 people each day, 65,000 a week and two and a half million a year. The total will be 200,000,000 by 1970.

We will have to put up new plants and expand the production of present factories to build the automobiles, home appliances, homes, schools, hospitals and many other things just to keep up with the increasing population.

Every Twelve Seconds
There are almost three times as many births as there are deaths in this country each day. The birth rate is one every eight seconds, and the death rate one every 21 seconds.

Counting one immigrant every two minutes, the net increase in population is one every 12 seconds. If automobile factories, for example, operated 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, they would have to INCREASE their production rate by 120 each hour just to keep up with the increase in demand due to the population growth.

It was only about 25 years ago that the experts said the population "ceiling" in this country would be about 150,000,000. We couldn't, they said, find jobs for very many more people and, besides, we couldn't feed them. Not enough land, they said.

Now we have a population of 172,000,000 and almost twice as many people employed. Not only that, but people eat more and better food, dress better, live in better homes and have more savings than ever before.

The Farm Problem

The problem of feeding this big increase in population is no small job in itself. Every 12 seconds

farmers must increase their food production by 60 pounds of pork, 86 pounds of beef, and 28 pounds of poultry. That is the per capita annual consumption rate.

Egg production must be increased by 344 eggs each 12 seconds and milk production must go up by 384 pounds just to take care of the increase in population. There is demand for 121 pounds more wheat, 141 pounds more fruits, and for 282 pounds of potatoes and other vegetables.

Farmers must do this with little or no increase in the total number of acres in production. If they can do it, and the experts say they can, it will be the most significant accomplishment of the 20th century. It can, as a matter of fact, be done with two million fewer people on farms.

September days are still hot enough that we want to continue our summertime practice of simple meals with as little time in the kitchen as possible.

Planning ahead pays off in meal preparation. Keep your shelves well-stocked to save trips to the market. Prepare some of the din-

ner or supper dishes in the cool of the morning.

Whatever you build your meal around, nothing adds more to a hot weather meal than a cool, crisp salad.

Salad Hints

Before putting salad greens away, wash them clean and drain well. Keep your supply of fresh, washed and crisp greens in a tightly covered refrigerator container. With them and the well-seasoned French dressing you keep on hand, you can quickly toss together a green salad.

To mix, use a large chilled bowl in which to toss ingredients. Rub bowl lightly with cut clove of garlic for a subtle flavor. Tear large leaves into small pieces. Shred any old or tough outside leaves. Mince the highly flavored ones. Then add French dressing, a little at a time. Toss greens lightly with salad fork and spoon to coat all leaves well. Add dressing just before you serve the salad to keep greens from wilting.

Try different kinds of salad greens: lettuce, endive, red or green cabbage, celery tops, cress, spinach, chard.

For flavorful additions try: chives, parsley, carrots, onions, cauliflower, green peppers, tomatoes, celery, cucumber, radishes, bits of cheese, avocado, apple, grapefruit, shredded raw beets, pineapple, chopped olives, nuts or raisins.

Salad Dressing

We mentioned French dressing

with a green salad. French is one of three groups of dressings. The others are mayonnaise and cooked.

French dressing is a combination of oil and acid with seasonings. Mayonnaise is a rich emulsion of oil, raw eggs, acid and seasonings. Cooked salad dressings are made of a custard foundation to which various seasonings are added.

It's the dressing that lends a distinct flavor to a salad.

French Dressing. Combine 1 1/2 cups vinegar, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon paprika, and 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard. Shake vigorously in a covered container, or beat with an electric mixer.

Lemon juice may be used in place of vinegar, if the dressing is for fruit salads.

Vitamins in Vegetables

If your salad greens or any other vegetables have wilted, it's a safe bet that not much of the vitamin C is left. Even if they are revived or "crisped" in ice water or in the refrigerator, their vitamin C is not restored. They may have some vitamin A left and minerals, but not vitamin C.

175 TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS
ANTICIPATED OVER
LABOR DAY WEEKEND

The Highway Patrol anticipates some 175 traffic accidents over the long Labor Day weekend.

Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough, basing his prediction on traffic patterns of five past holidays, warned that approximately 82 motorists will be injured. The death count may reach seven killed.

August 1958 traffic fatalities are already well ahead of the figure reported for last August. A high death count for the Labor Day weekend, considered summer's last fling, could push the 1958 highway death rate well toward a record slaughter, the public safety commissioner warned.

Lumping together its usual "word of advice to holiday motorists," the Patrol simply cautions: "take it easy, don't rush."

The Labor Day weekend starts at 6:00 p.m. Friday, August 29, and extends through midnight Monday, September 1.

International Union
Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Bible Material: Proverbs 23:29-35; Daniel 1:1-20; Habakkuk 2:1-16; Romans 13:11-14:23.

Devotional Reading: Isaiah 5:1-26.

Is It Fair?
Lesson for August 31, 1958

EVEN the people who talk most about social justice are often silent about one thing which readers of the Bible will find plainly there: the drink problem. It should be remembered that whiskey was invented long after Bible times. All the warnings about strong drink, in the Bible, are about wine and the equivalent of beer, the "lighter" liquors. The passage from Proverbs gives a vivid picture of personal trouble caused by such liquors. Daniel Dr. Foreman gives the story of the first total-abstinence society on record, an outstanding success on a health basis. Habakkuk the prophet lines up "giving his neighbor drink" right along with stealing and murder. Paul puts the whole thing in a new light: the truth of Christian brotherhood.

Ask A Modern-Day Question!
Is It Fair?

All of which raises the same question, in various ways. Isn't the use of liquor, as it is done in the United States in this 20th century, a very obvious example of social injustice? Social justice, we may remember, is just carrying into all relationships the spirit and principle of the Golden Rule. It is being fair to all concerned.

But is it fair to give a lame person a shove? Is it fair to put a stumbling block in front of the blind? Alcoholics are called "sick" and alcoholism a disease. But it is a fact that it is a disease of the diseases of our nation. Alcoholism would never get a start without the background of social drinking. No drug used by "addicts" gets nearly as many people into trouble as does alcohol. Is it fair to give the weak as much of a push downhill as American society does?

Policeman's Friday Night Offers
Insight Into Problem

A young minister spent his Friday nights, one summer, riding around with policemen in squad cars. With very few exceptions, the calls for help were due to drink. Family quarrels, thefts (to get money for liquor), beatings, rapes, and murders: all starting from a few friendly drinks. This young man came to the conclusion that the money put into that city's treasury by liquor licenses was more than matched by the money taken out of treasury and private funds to pay for the damage the liquor creates. It is true, that city claims to be the "whiskey capital of America," but the reader is invited to look around in his own town and figure the cost to the taxpayers of troubles caused by alcohol. Is it fair?

Movie Make-Believe Paints
Problem in Wrong Color

Movies sometimes do the same kind of harm. Some years ago there was a popular series of movies featuring a husband and wife who were married both on the screen and off. In all their pictures they were a gay, happy couple. He drank "like a fish" and she drank with him and it never seemed to affect either of them. (How could it? Stage liquor is like stage money—a weak imitation of the real thing.) Not long after that, the papers reported that this actress had divorced her charming Prince Barleycorn. And for what? Doing in real life what he was paid to pretend doing in pictures: drink when he felt like it. Real life and real love was vastly different.

Land use depends on many
factors, of which the one
most important is the soil.
In the Tishomingo County
area, the soil is generally
shaly and sandy. This
type of soil is not well
suited for growing crops
of corn and soybeans.
However, it is well suited
for growing alfalfa and
other legumes. These
crops can be used for
fodder for livestock or
for silage. The soil is
also well suited for
growing fruit trees and
other orchard crops.

to the land and these fields are
properly mowed.
Seemingly there is a shortage
of labor to do the job in applying
soil and water conservation prac-
tices to the land.
Since the beginning of World
War II young people have been
leaving the land. Their fathers and
mothers have been left on the
farm, now they are old and un-
able to do the work needed for
good land use. There is no one to
do this work on these farms.
Vendors (people who perform
for a wage certain land use prac-
tices) are a partial answer to this
problem.

The trend at present is toward
larger land ownerships in Tisho-
mingo County. Also toward sub-
sistent homesteads where the family
lives on a few acres and produces
part of their living from the soil
while earning most of it by work-
ing in a nearby factory or at some
public work.
Work on soil and water conserva-
tion continues in the Tennessee
River Soil Conservation District.
It is believed that the changes
taking place in land ownership rep-
resents progress and a better way
of life for all our people.
A knowledge of the factors re-
sulting in good land use is needed
in order, that together we can all
join hands and do a better job
of applying faster good soil and
water conservation practices to our
land.
