1st District Schools Open
With Record Enrollment

High And Elementary Dept. Each
Have Same Amount: 319; 638 Total

Supt. H. L. Shook states that
the schools in the First Supervi-
sor's district opened the 1958-59
term with the largest enrollment
in the record of the district. At
the Iuka school 319 students are
registered in the elementary de-
partment with the same number
being enrolled in the high school.
Total enrollment at Iuka is 638.

Initial enrollments for each
grade, as released by the superin-
tendent, are, elementary depart-
ment:
First Grade, 53, Second grade 50,
Third grade 46, Fourth grade 63,
Fifth grade 61, Sixth grade 46.
Total, 319.

High school department: Seven-
th grade 57, Eighth grade 50,
Ninth grade 44, Tenth grade 61,
Eleventh grade 62, Twelfth grade
45. Total, 319.

Mr. Shook stated that another
coincidence with the beginning of
this school term was that at the
end of the first month last year
the total enrollment was 638. The
high school enrollment this year
is the largest in the history of the
school.

First meal of the school year was
served in the cafeteria at noon
on Wednesday when Mrs. Olna
Carter reported 534 servings.

With the additional students at
the school this year conditions are
more crowded than heretofore.
However, this has been relieved
partially with the installation of a
partition in one of the longer
downstairs rooms and with chang-
ing the stage in the old auditorium
into a classroom. Thus two rooms
have been acquired, one of which
will be used for the elementary
grades and one for high school
students.

Grades Seven and Eight of the
Snowdown school have been trans-
ferred to the Iuka school. This will
leave two teachers at Snowdown
and will add one to the Iuka facul-
ty.

Another new teacher at the Iuka
school is Mrs. Joyce Lay, wife of
Rev. L. W. Lay of Tishomingo.
She will teach seventh and eighth
grade subjects.

The crowded conditions at the
Iuka school is a situation of grave
concern to the faculty and school
Board. Mr. Shook, in commenting
on the circumstances said "We
sincerely hope that parents and
pupils will duly understand our
predicament and will bear with
us. If all goes well, we should have
a new elementary building in time
for the commencing of the 1959-

County To Pay
\$1,336,000 Of
State Fed. Tax

Total federal spending author-
ized for the fiscal year 1959 by
the administration and congress
will cause Mississippians to pay
a whopping \$323 million in federal
taxes, the Mississippi Economic
Council-State Chamber of Comm-
erce estimated today.

The MEC said the recent con-
gress increased the fiscal 1959 fed-
eral budget by some \$7 billion,
bringing the total federal spending
program to \$78.9 billion, accord-
ing to official estimates.

An economic index shows that
Mississippi taxpayers bear 0.41 per-
cent of total federal taxes. That
figure applied to the \$78.9 billion
gives the \$323 million cost to
state taxpayers.

Tishomingo County, which, ac-
cording to a state economic index
pays 41 percent of taxes paid in
Mississippi, will be called upon to
pay \$1,336,000 of the state's
\$323 million federal tax bill, the
MEC estimates.

"The figures are staggering, and
hard to visualize," the Council said.
"The economic index for Missis-
sippi uses many factors, some of
them often overlooked in paying
taxes. For instance, when you buy
an automobile, the federal tax may
be paid at the manufacturing point,
say Michigan, but the purchaser in
Mississippi nevertheless pays the
tax."

"The burden of federal spend-
ing to taxpayers cannot be escap-
ed. It will have to be borne by
continued high taxes or inflat-
ionary borrowing, probably both. Con-
gress set a new record in high
spending for a peacetime year."

The organization said the 1959
fiscal year spending authorized was
a \$7 billion increase over 1958,
and was a \$5 billion increase over
what the President had requested
for fiscal 1959. The \$7 billion in-
crease alone adds \$28,700,000 to
the State's share.

Cherokee High Planning New Building,
Bids For Construction Are Opened

Six construction concerns Wed-
nesday entered bids on construc-
tion of the Cherokee Vocational
High School unit with construction
engineers of Jasper, Ala., sub-
mitting low proposal of \$326,387. The
opening of bids was conducted at
the Colbert Board of Education
office in Tusculum, with Howard
Griffin, architect presiding. Other
proposals submitted included: Big-
bee-Morris Construction company
of Tusculum with \$335,000; Sou-
thern Builders, Inc., of Florence,
\$338,750; Craig Construction of
Florence, \$344,512; H. R. Hoar
and sons, Birmingham, \$349,383;
and J. M. Massey Construction
Company of Florence, \$355,988.

The contract award will be made
as soon as the Board of Education
members have had sufficient time
to study all proposals, according
to A. Y. Sibley, Superintendent
of Education. Sibley announced
Wednesday that the architect is
presently working on plans for
five or six other Colbert school
projects which are now under con-
sideration by the board of educa-
tion.

Construction of the new build-
ing at Cherokee will allow the
present building to be utilized as
a Junior high school after being
renovated.

The new construction is to in-
clude an auditorium to seat 800,
a cafeteria to seat 350, a library,
two science rooms, two business
class rooms, 6 regular class rooms,
an art room, a visual education
room, conference rooms and an
office suite. It will be built of
concrete, stone and steel con-
struction and will be situated on
the present school grounds.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL
THE REALITY OF INDEPENDENCE

Despite the obvious will of the majority to have their children educated in peaceful separation, a U. S. Circuit Court composed of non-Southerners has elected to substitute its judgment for the realities in Little Rock, Arkansas. In a decision permeated with petulance, the Circuit Court brushed aside the evidence developed in lengthy hearings that education and integration cannot be simultaneously achieved in Little Rock—even at bayonet point. Even the Little Rock editor whose infatuation with the Northern intelligentsia led him to miscalculate the feelings and misunderstand the faith of people in the Southern state of Arkansas realized at long last that an accommodation with reality was necessary.

But the court's cruel decision—alleviated in no respect by its current stay order—topples the wise plan of delay accepted by the federal judge who knew the temper of the people with whom he was dealing. The avoidance of abject surrender in the face of a hostile federal government, eager for votes in states with powerful Negro minorities and susceptible to the pressure tactics of a hostile national press imbued with socialist ideals of big government, is and must remain the heart of Southern resistance. The task grows more difficult each month and year. It bristles with thorns created by courts unkindly of realities. The South, which is continuing to enjoy tremendous economic growth despite unfavorable public-

ity today a conviction that we can have the kind of government that we want and know to be best for our communities. There is understanding that resistance to big government is not an easy task. But people are willing to assume arduous tasks and struggle for their rights.

While a Circuit Court strikes a blow at peace and good order in a Southern community, thug-ridden unions ride high and extend their dictatorial power over their subjects. One day, perhaps not distant, thoughtful conservatives in the North and West will realize that the mobilization of independent spirit in the South is what the entire country needs to shake off the vicious realities of boss rule. In cultivating the independent spirit Southerners are doing their fellow citizens a favor of the first magnitude.

All these things are true, regardless of what action the Supreme Court may have taken on the Little Rock situation by the time this is printed. After all, the Supreme Court, as the state chief justices overwhelmingly pointed out recently, is no longer a court of law but a court of men, thereby having lost the respect of the people.

BIG MEN



In Washington this week there is time, and quiet, to reflect on some of the events and personalities which were the distinguishing marks of the 85th Congress.

We who write from Washington tend too often to place great emphasis on the events without adequately reporting on the men, and frequently the women, who influence and guide the actions and decisions of the government.

There are two types of officials in Washington. First, the men whose names are mentioned in the headlines, and, second, the men who make those headlines possible. The latter are at least as important as the former.

The men in the headlines were President Eisenhower, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, Defense Secretary Neil McElroy, and Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams. All of them did important jobs well.

Cool Heads In A Crisis
For each man in the headlines there were dozens whose head work and devotion to duty in times of crisis made those headlines possible. Some of those were members of the 85th Congress.

The four named above are in the Administrative branch of government. Few of their decisions and actions which made headlines were taken without having consulted with the important leaders of Congress.

Congress is made up of both Democrats and Republicans and the two frequently have their differences. That can be especially true when we have a Republican President and a Democratic majority on Congress, and it is almost inevitable in an election year.

Congressional unity on important national and international problems was a remarkable accomplishment of the 85th Congress. The credit for that unity belongs in a large measure of four leaders, two from each party.

Johnson, Rayburn, Knowland & Martin
Those are names familiar to most Americans, but they seldom were in the headlines. Few, even in Washington, know the extent to which they put aside their political differences to close party ranks on issues of great national importance.

Sen. Lyndon Johnson, the Majority Leader, worked closely with Minority Leader Sen. William Knowland on legislation vitally affecting the national interest. The same was true to Speaker Sam Rayburn and Minority Leader Joseph Martin in the House.

All four brushed aside both party and personal interests where the national interest was involved. And, they did it without claiming or expecting personal gain or credit.

New Farm Bill Is Great Improvement According To Congressman Abernethy

The new farm bill is not everything our farm people are entitled to. But it is a definite improvement over that which was originally offered.

Except in one respect, differences between the Senate and House of Representatives on the cotton sections were exaggerated beyond all proportions. The two bodies were in full agreement on the minimum national allotment, the minimum farm allotment and the choice plan. The House strongly objected to the Senate provision which abandoned the concept of parity but never regarded the 2.81-cents difference on minimum price of cotton as a major stumbling block.

Given assurance that there would be no junking of the parity concept, the revised version won the support of Speaker Rayburn. Without that unity the 85th Congress would have been far less successful in maintaining national unity at a critical time.

The American people, and the other people of the Free World, are fortunate in having men of their ability and high sense of duty in four of the most important official posts in Washington.

Republican Leader Joe Martin and Secretary Benson fell in line. Thereupon the House promptly passed the bill. The Senate followed suit.

The controversial untitled price support formula included in the original Senate bill as a substitute for price supports under the parity concept would have fixed cotton price supports at 10 per cent less than the average market prices during the three preceding years. Little protection could be expected from a formula which guaranteed a support price of 10 per cent less than the commodity could be sold for in the open market. This new formula, without a floor price as its advocates were pressing for, would have left farmers at the mercy of those who have the power. As these manipulators forced the market down year after year, the support price would proportionately be forced down. Actually, the formula would provide no support price at all. It simply offered a checkrein against a complete price collapse in a single year. Over a short period of years a fair market price could be gradually but surely strangled to death.

Conceding its proponents were sincere in advocating the new formula, it was tailor-made for the mills who buy and use our cotton. Naturally, the mills want cotton as cheap as they can buy it. With numerous cotton and textile mills located in Republican Leader Joe Martin's home state of Massachusetts, it was only natural that he raised the roof about the House Agriculture Committee taking the new formula out of the bill. Of course, his mill folks are interested in cheap cotton and the cheaper the better.

Te be sure, the cotton mills which buy our cotton are important to our farmers. It is important that they be kept humming at maximum capacity. At the same time, southern farmers who produce the cotton out in the hot sun have some right to a little humming themselves.

Conceding there have been broad differences between the Congress and the Administration over farm programs, neither the President nor Secretary Benson has ever appealed to Congress to banish the concept of parity. In fact, their recommendations have included its retention. It is, therefore, somewhat of a mystery how parity ever came so close to being repealed.

So, with all of the shouting, heat and unfortunate eruptions at an end, it is now the judgment of everyone charged with the direct responsibility of enacting legislation, as well as by almost every interested person, that the bill has

been tremendously improved. Our farmers and all people interested in the cotton industry are assured of a new program which has the possibility of putting cotton on its feet in the years ahead.

This will be our last issue of "In The News" for this session of Congress. Through it we have endeavored to bring you the sidelights of events taking place in the Nation's Capital. For the words of commendation which have come from so many of you, we are encouraged, inspired and most appreciative.

Immediately after adjournment we will head for home. After a few days rest we will be hopping around our big 17-county District. Hope to see all of you.

Schedule Of Picture Shows At Area Theatre

Amendments Of 1958 To Provide Increased Payments To 900 In County

The Social Security Amendments of 1958 will provide increased monthly payments to about 900 people in Tishomingo County, beginning with the checks which are being paid in February 1959, according to Mr. Hugh Tigrett, social security district manager in Tupelo.

Amount of the increase will be about 7 percent, although the increase in some checks will be more than 7 percent and in others slightly less than 7 percent in some others.

People who are already getting social security payments do not have to apply for the increase. It will be automatically added to the checks for January, which will be paid out early in February.

Other changes made by the new law, social security benefits will become payable to a number of people not previously eligible for payments. They must, however, apply to their social security benefits before payments can start.

People now eligible for the use of the amendments are: Dependents of people who are now getting disability insurance benefits (children 18 or disabled; a wife of a man who has a child in her care is entitled to benefits; a wife over 65; or a dependent husband over 65).

Disabled people 50 or over

who could not qualify for benefits under the old law because they did not have as much as 1-1/2 years of work in the 3 years before they were disabled. (A total of at least 5 years of work under the law is still required).

Dependent parents whose son or daughter died after 1939 and who could not qualify for benefits under the old law because the son or daughter left a widow, widower, or child.

Adopted children whose adopting parent began receiving retirement benefits less than 3 years after the adoption. (In many cases this provision will also make possible payments to the mother of the adopted child).

A person receiving benefits who marries another person also receiving benefits can continue to receive monthly checks, or can become eligible as a dependent of the new husband or wife without waiting 3 years.

Some people in situations similar to those mentioned above may have applied for benefits in the past and been notified that they did not qualify for payments. These people should get in touch with their social security district offices promptly about filing new applications.

Mr. Tigrett noted that disabled workers whose social security disability benefits were reduced or were not payable because they received workmen's compensation or other Federal disability payments will begin to receive the full amount of their social security disability payments. (These people do not have to file applications. Their social security checks will be started automatically with checks mailed out early in September).

There is a slight change in the rules on how much a social security beneficiary may earn and still get social security benefit payments. Under a new provision a person's social security benefits will not be withheld for any month in which he neither worked in his own business nor earned over \$100 in wages.

Beginning January 1, 1959, the social security tax rate for employees and employers will be 2-1/2 percent each. The rate for self-employed people will be 3-3/4 percent. These rates are scheduled to increase every 3 years until they reach 4-1/2 percent for employees and employers and 6 3/4 percent for self-employed people in 1969.

Starting with 1959 the first \$4800 of earnings in a year will be taxed for social security and will count toward social security benefits.

Mr. Tigrett emphasized that it is not necessary for people already receiving monthly payments to apply for the automatic increase. It will be added to the January checks, which will be delivered early in February.

"Inquires about the automatic

increase will slow down our effort to start payments promptly to the people who can now get payments for the first time," he said.

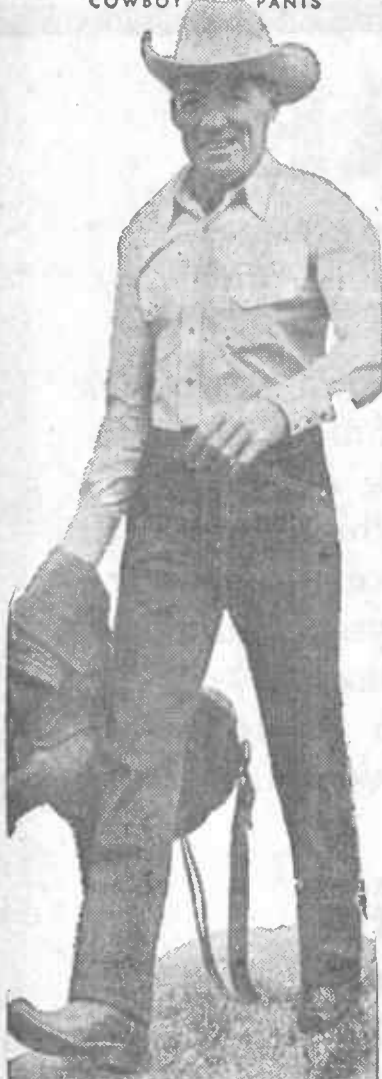

HOME AGENT NOTES

Freeze that leftover fried chicken and eat it later.

Recent research shows that fried chicken looks good and tastes good if leftover pieces are frozen and served even four days later.

For it to be at its best, wrap in foil and freeze within three hours after it is cooked. Thaw at room temperature for serving.

September Plantings

Broilers and fryers are on the plentiful foods list for this month. They are in heavy supply. Be on the watch for good buys, for prices are likely to be lower than last year.

Peach orchards in late-crop states are producing heavily. Milk, potatoes and fresh vegetables are other September plentifuls. And so are canned ripe olives.

Barbecuing Broilers

Do you have a copy of the Extension Service leaflet on Barbecuing Mississippi Broilers? It gives several barbecue sauce recipes and hints on preparing and cooking. Ask at the office for a copy.

How Much Sugar Do You Eat?

The average person eats a quarter of a pound of sugar each day. This amounts to 97 pounds a year for every person in the country.

If you're like most folks, you'd estimate your sugar use at less than a fourth of a pound. A spoonful in coffee, some on cereal and so on won't add up to that much, you say.

But think of the sugar in bakery goods, candy, preserves, ice cream, soft drinks, and canned and frozen foods.

How's Your Weight?

Does reading about sugar, make

you think of those pounds you need to lose. Or, those you need to gain.

Remember, physically active people achieve a happy balance between the energy they spend and the food they eat. Result: They don't gain weight!

You upset this balance when you lose the exercise habit. Because your appetite remains the same, you eat as much as ever. Result: A gain in weight.

This is the time to be more active. Try gardening. Wash a roomful of windows a week. Walk through the park. A regular routine of setting-up exercises. Any one of these may be all that is needed to keep energy calories balancing food calories.

COMMUNITY LEADERS MAY HAVE HANDBOOKS

Mississippi community leaders seeking new payrolls now have a handbook answering most of the basic questions asked about the state by prospective industry, thanks to a special committee of the Mississippi Economic Council State Chamber of Commerce.

The handbook, released in cooperation with the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, is entitled the "Mississippi Industrial Development Manual." Robert Geoffrey, manager of the Vicksburg Chamber of Commerce, heads the special MEC committee that spent two years compiling the manual.

The publication contains eleven sections, each dealing with a topic relating to industrial development. The topics include: people, economic conditions, labor, transportation, climate, fuels and power, state finance, state laws, education and a section on how to utilize the manual.

"When an industrial prospect is called on or when he visits the community, he wants a great deal of information from local people that will help him make his decision," the introduction of the manual states.

"While many of his questions can be answered on the basis of local information, there are often questions about the state or region that would have the same answer in any section of Mississippi."

"This manual is designed to give some of these general answers as well as point the way to sources of other information."

The publication is being distributed upon request to local chambers, utilities, and others dealing with industrial prospects. Due to the nature of the publication, only one copy is being sent to any one community, Mr. Geoffrey said. Data in the handbook is to be kept up to date by the MEC.

Serving with Mr. Geoffrey on the committee are: Oak Duke, Natchez, C. C. Moseley, Meridian, and John D. Wise, Jr., Hazlehurst. The committee is a division of the general MEC committee on services to chambers of commerce, headed this year by Albert Lake, Greenville attorney. The manual was initiated under the 1957-58 committee headed by W. E. Walker, Jr., of Columbia.

County Agent news

Cotton Insects

Boil weevils are out of control in some fields, with infestations running as high as 90 per cent. Protecting the small young bolls is a must. I suggest using one of the phosphates, preferably Malathion, followed in three days with a long killing poison such as Calcium Arsenate, Dieldrin or Endrin. A real good cotton crop can still be made if the top crop is protected.

Cattle Grub Control

Now is the time to treat cattle for cattle grubs with systemic phosphates. Two of them that are on the market now is tolone and Cor-Ral. ET-57 or Trolene as a spray. Be sure you follow directions on container when using either.

These new materials are very effective and last up to 3 months.

Dairymen

Treatment of cows during the dry period can mean the difference between profit and loss to dairymen.

For each pound gained while dry, you can expect the cow to produce 15 to 20 more pounds of milk during the next lactation. This does not mean the cow should be fattened, but it does mean that she should be put in good condition for the 10 month job of milk production.

For this job, a 12-1/2 percent protein conditioning ration works real well.

Give the cows a two month rest and feed them to gain 125 to 200 pounds.

Silage Harvesting

Sorghum: Watch the fields and as soon as the sorghum is ready to cut, cut it. Weather doesn't effect silage harvesting like it does hay saving, so you don't have to plan around the weather so much.

Corn: Most dairymen like corn silage because of its high feeding value and palatability. Harvest corn silage when the corn is well denting. Chop the corn finely—about 1/2 inch long, and pack well in the silo.

Packing well is mighty important, if the corn is to keep well.

You do not need a preservative with corn silage.

Put up a silage, your corn crop will yield around 150 percent of the feed value as will be produced by the mature grain for cribbing.

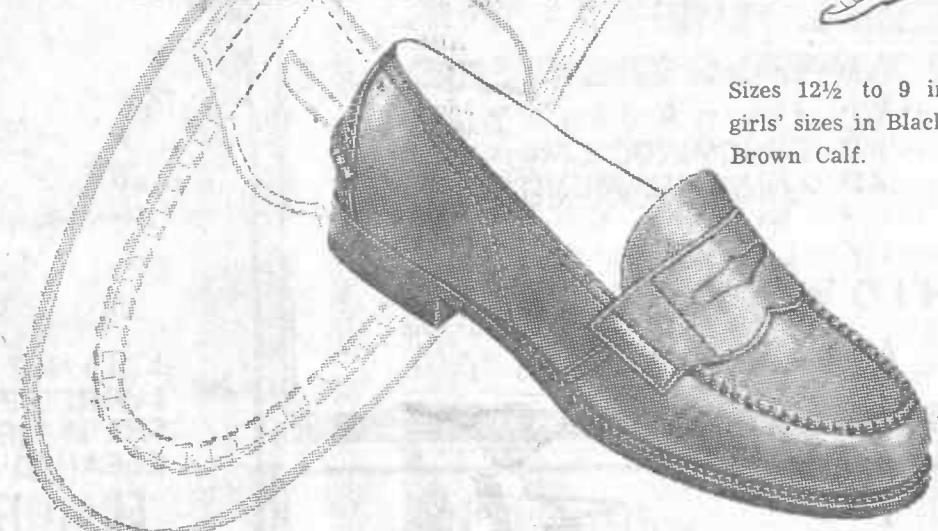

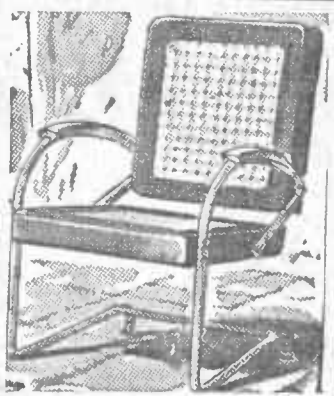

Roadblocks Manned All Over State Highways

"May I see your driver's license, Sir?" may sound courteous enough, but to the luckless motorist who does not have one, these are fearful words indeed.

And it is a request being heard more and more, especially from state Highway Patrolmen.

Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough warns that driver license check roadblocks are being manned throughout the state by Patrolmen as part of the Patrol's crackdown on traffic violators.

A good many such blocks uncover faulty brakes and lighting equipment. Almost all turn up dozens of unlicensed drivers or motorists with expired licenses.

"It is unfortunate," Commissioner Scarbrough said, "that these mass roadblocks are necessary, but licensing and safety equipment laws must be enforced."

The recent rash of Patrol roadblocks have also netted several motorists whose licenses are under suspension, and "some" Scarbrough said, "who have tried, but failed to pass the state's driver licensing examination."

Cautioning persons against driving without a valid license, the Commissioner pointed out that in the event of a ticket, court costs alone might cost an individual more than twice a renewal fee.

"It simply isn't good business," he warned.

Mississippi driver licenses may be renewed by mail to the Driver License Division, Department of Public Safety, Jackson, or in person at any sheriff's or city clerk's office.

The fee is two dollars (\$2.00) for one year; four dollars (\$4.00) for two years.

International Union Sunday School Lessons

Devotional Reading: Psalm 90:1-6, 13-17.

The Day's Work
Lesson for September 7, 1958

CAN WE talk of social justice and our jobs at the same time? If we can't we must admit that social justice will not work where perhaps it is more needed than in most places; it won't work where we spend most of our waking time, in that area of life that means so much to us: namely our jobs. Take away a man's job and you have destroyed the basis of his self-respect. Take his job and you leave him rootless, a drifter, unhappy and without meaning in a world that can find no use for him.

When we turn to the Bible we should expect to find that the book which says so much about social justice (remember, the name is not important but the thing is!), would give some hints about how this principle of all-around fairness affects the day's work of men and women. And such is the case. The Apostle Paul, one of the "work-ingers" men that ever lived, had a problem church at Thessalonica. The Christians there had somehow got the notion that the end of this world was right around the corner. They were like people working in a field when a tornado is moving across the prairie; they take a lot more interest in the tornado than in finishing the job. So these people had quit their jobs and were living, it seems, on their good-natured and still working friends. Paul moved right into that situation with a sharp order. "If any one will not work, let him not eat." Work, in short, is part of a Christian's duty. The world does not owe anybody a living, no matter how pious he is.

"Work, or don't eat"

The Sabbath Commandment does not start with the Sabbath. It starts with the other six days: "Six days you shall labor..." Old Testament and New alike set up work as part of the "whole duty of man."

But—here is where trouble begins. In our society as at present organized, it often happens that a man who wants to work, can't. Farmers sometimes have a hard time understanding that this is so. A farmer can find more to be done than he can do, year in year out. But the factory worker, the professional man, doesn't always find it so simple. The factory has a lay-off, or merges with another one, or just closes down. Thousands of men and women in a distant state can be thrown out of work by one decision in a New York office. As for the professional man, in hard times he does not have the clients he used to have. His expenses go on, his debts pile up, but his patients (if he is a doctor, for example) don't pay, they can't pay because they are out of work. So it may come about that literally millions of people, the highly educated and trained as well as countless unskilled workers, find themselves either working for nothing or not having a chance to work at all.

"Do it with your might"

The wise reader will reflect on many other ways in which social justice and the day's work are related. But let us forget, we must call to mind another important side to this. Suppose I get what the world really owes me—not a living, but the chance to make a living; suppose I have a job, then what? Society has fulfilled its part by making work possible for me. What is my part now? One thing surely is that I should give the job everything I've got. Social justice means seeing that no man is jobless. Social justice also means that no man with a job lies down on it.

There are certain industries where the "workers" have things so well sewn up that it is almost impossible to fire a man unless he actually gets drunk on the job. It is surely social injustice to demand a job, and at the same time demand to hold it whether one really works at it or not. Social justice, applied to the day's work, isn't all the responsibility of society—it is the responsibility of the workers as well. A Christian, especially, shows the genuineness of his Christianity by the way he goes about his day's work.

SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH **Davis Doing Job Woodland**

By A. Jones, Work Unit Coordinator USDA-SCS

Mr. Davis, of Harmony, is doing an outstanding job on his farm woodland. Davis began releasing birds on his farm. He

did this by cutting, and using for full, the black jacks and other undesirable hardwood that were shading and suppressing these small pines. Today he has about 28 acres of beautiful shortleaf pine with very little hardwood on it. There are still about 15 acres needing treatment. "I still need the fuel and the pines need releasing," said Mr. Davis with a smile. He will release this 15 acres of pine. "It is just as cheap and easy to cut for full hardwood that is shading young pines, as it is to cut for full hardwood that are doing no damage," continued Mr. Davis. "All my life I have enjoyed walking through the woods, and I don't like to see the woods burn." My plan now is to disk up the woods roads on my farm and use them as fire breaks," said Mr. Finch as the two of us walked along observing his woodland.

Mr. Davis is to be commended for the fine job he is doing in protecting and releasing his pines. It is as good as any farm forestry job being done in the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District. He has done the work himself because he had vision to see the value of it long before the Government began giving financial assistance to landowners for releasing pine seedlings in Tishomingo county.

There are many landowners in Tishomingo county who can profit by following the example of Mr. Finch Davis.

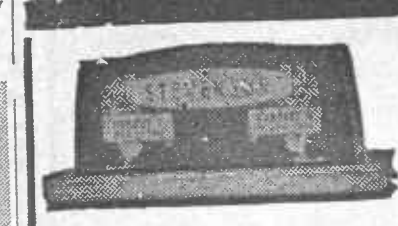
