

Iuka Travels To Kossuth Tonight

LOSE FIRST GAME
TO SHANNON BY
SCORE OF 18-6

The Iuka Warriors lost their first game of the season Friday night at Shannon by a score of 18-6, as they faltered in the late stages of the game after having a half-time lead.

In the first quarter of the game both teams played primarily defensive football. Iuka put together a small drive at the opening of the game which fell dead on the Shannon 45 yard line. However, in the second quarter after taking a Shannon punt on the Iuka 15 yard line the Warriors drove to the Shannon 35 before losing the ball on downs. Ellett Allen was the ground gainer in that drive, going for 23 yards up the middle, and going off tackle for 10 yards. Shannon then took the ball and after running two plays the Red Raiders fumbled and Iuka recovered on the Raider 47 yard line. Four plays later Iuka scored. Ellett Allen went off tackle for 18 yards, the middle for 12 yards and Morrison White went up the middle for 6 yards to the 11. From there Savell scored off tackle. All extra points were missed during the night.

Mallory the Shannon left half took the kickoff and returned it 74 yards to the Iuka 16. From there Shannon proceeded to make a first down on the 5. Then Iuka came through with a formidable line defence which threw Shannon back on the 12 yard line. Iuka then started downfield but the half ran out with the score Iuka 6, Shannon 0.

Ellett Allen was the leading ground gainer in the first half with 93 yards in 11 tries.

The second half had very few light moments for Iuka as Shannon scored 3 touchdowns on runs of 30 and 35 yards by Roberts and 55 yard run by Herndon, and so put up a strong defence that stopped Iuka cold. The only good parts of the second half were the Iuka players ran down Shannon backs. Twice Billy Ramsey, Co-captain, tackled Shannon players from behind. Jim Chambers was the leading player on defence as he played hard and made tackles all over the field.

Both teams made mistakes as Iuka fumbled five times and lost the ball while Shannon fumbled 5 times and lost 4.

Talmadge E. Finch of Tishomingo County Farm Improvement Ass'n. Iuka, has just returned from a trip to Louisiana where he attended a Funk's G-Hybrid Seed Corn Field Day and Meeting. Mr. Finch was one of several hundred dealers selected from the entire South to make this trip. Highlights of the trip were visits to the South's largest corn breeding nursery and the inspection of the South's most modern corn processing plant.

Iuka Business Increases Eleven Pct.

The monthly report of "The Mississippi Business Review," published by the Mississippi State University Business Research Station, shows that Ripley had a decrease of four per cent as contrasted with Iuka which showed an increase of 11 per cent.

Business activity in the Corinth district during July showed a one per cent decrease over the same period last year.

Booneville showed an increase of four per cent while Ripley had a decrease of four per cent. Compared with the 1947-48 average on the station's index the district as a whole stood at 166 per cent.

Corinth stood at 155 per cent on the same index; Iuka, 214 per cent; Ripley, 184 per cent; and Booneville, 202.

County Agent W. C. Hamilton announces cancellation of the appearance of the Sportsman's Quartet that was scheduled for tonight (Thursday) at the Tishomingo County Fair. This group of singers was engaged to perform but due to a number of other activities of paramount importance to citizens of the area, their engagement has been cancelled.

Fine farm produce is in evidence at the fair. Community booths are much more attractive than in past years and the livestock and poultry exhibits are far superior to former exhibitions.

Some of the booths in the Womens' building include the Holcut

community booth, the Burnsville "Fire Ants" booth—the only community-wide 4-H club organization in the county, the Harmony home demonstration club booth, and the 4-H exhibits booth which is made up of exhibits of 4-H club members from all over the county.

Also, on display in the Womens' building is the sewing and needlework exhibits, canning and cooking exhibits, corn cotton, vegetable and other crop exhibits. Also, of particular interest is several industrial exhibits that feature electrical appliances and well-pumps.

In the livestock barn, the greatest poultry show ever assembled in the county is on display. There are 219 birds in the competition which represents 26 individual exhibitors.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL FUND AGAINST THE REPUBLIC

The news that the Fund for the Republic may soon die of lack of funds is great news for the American Republic. Since it was set up six years ago, with a \$15 million nest egg, the Fund has been a rich uncle for the forces creating confusion in this country, especially in the Southern states.

It's possible, of course, that the parent Ford Foundation may put up additional millions. But all indications are that the parent is deeply ashamed and embarrassed by its pinko offspring. Even without new supplies of money, the Fund has \$817,000 left. A lot of confusion, trouble and hatred can be bought with a sum such as that.

The Fund for the Republic refers to itself as "an educational institution." It professes an interest in civil rights and a free society. But it is curiously selective about its defense of civil rights. The Fund's idea of a free society bears scant resemblance to the free society conceived by the founding fathers of the United States.

The Fund worries about the citizen who pleads the Fifth Amendment, is concerned about FBI investigations, dislikes loyalty checks and loyalty oaths, and accusations made by congressional investigation committees. If a witness at a probe refuses to discuss allegations of communism brought against him the Fund rushes to his defense and sheds tears over his rights. But if a state is deprived by federal court edict of the right to operate its public schools as it sees fit, the Fund thinks that's only constitutional. It can rally around the Fifth Amendment Americans, but it doesn't know a thing about the American principle that government derives its just powers from the consent of the governed.

The Fund is concerned about the influence of American industry

on government. It hasn't the least interest in the dictatorial control that some agencies of big government seek to exercise over concerns owned by stockholders who are American citizens. The fund says America has "developed to a fine point in recent years the art of ruinousness by due process of law." What it has in mind is the fact that some teachers are barred under state laws from teaching because they failed to answer questions on Red associations put to them by boards of education. The Fund never thinks about the ruinousness of the South sought in the federal courts.

The Fund for the Republic is, of course, the paymaster of scores of antistates rights outfits in the South. The Fund approves of force bills. It has spent hundreds of thousands, if not millions, giving money to organizations that stir up trouble in the South by making people resentful of existing social arrangements. It gave \$50,000 to the Legal Defense Fund of the NAACP, which financed the Autherine Lucy agitation. It gave another \$50,000 to the National Urban League, which has sought to promote integration in Southern factories. Not long ago the Fund gave \$1,000 to a pro-integration group in Little Rock. The result? More confusion which leads to less progress in the South.

The Fund is an enemy of the South. It is a foe of Southern progress because it is in the business of stirring up trouble. But it is more than a regional enemy. The Fund, as a general rule, has sympathy for the anti-anti communist and criticism for the sincere foe of communism and radical agitation. The question that Americans should ask themselves is this: Just what sort of republic is this trouble-making Fund for the Republic seeking to create?

The New Farm Law



Farm program administrators in Washington this week are trying to solve the farm law puzzle which the 85th Congress tossed into their lap just before leaving town.

The new law calls for changes in programs affecting corn, cotton, rice, oats, barley, rye and grain sorghums. It sets up a whole new set of rules and regulation for growers of those commodities.

Agriculture Department officials have not, so far, been able to make an estimate of how much the new program will cost, or how much it may add to already large surpluses. It may be weeks before an official interpretation of the law is available.

It is, at best, a make-shift program involving many compromises. Congressmen we have talked with do not agree on just what the program is intended to do. They voted for it because they felt it was the best that was proposed.

Corn Allotments Out
The new program abandons efforts, after many years, to control the acreage planted in corn. There will be no corn allotments, starting in 1959. The support rate, to be set by the Secretary of Agriculture, will apply to all corn grown.

The law says, however, that no supports shall be less than 65 per cent of parity. That will be somewhere near \$1.15 a bushel in 1959. It provides that other feed grains — oats, barley, rye and grain sorghums — shall be supported at prices "fair in relation to the feed value of corn."

Congress left it up to the Secretary to make the decision as to the support rate that would be "fair." Support officials estimate that will be "about" 88c a bu. for oats, \$1.25 a bu. for barley, \$1.70 a bu. for rye and \$2.50 a cwt for grain sorghums.

Two Cotton Programs
The law calls for a 16-million acre cotton allotment, starting in 1959. That's about 10 per cent under this year. Growers will choose between two very different programs in 1959 and 1960.

Program "A" says that if they plant within their allotment the government will buy their cotton

at 80 per cent of parity, a national average of about 36 cents a pound.

Program "B" permits them to over-plant their allotment by up to 40 per cent and get price supports at 65 per cent parity, about 31c a pound, in 1959 and 1960 only. After 1960 all growers would have to plant within their allotments to get supports at 70 per cent of parity in 1961 and 65 per cent thereafter.

The rice program continues the national allotment at 1.6 million acres and permits the Secretary to set supports anywhere between 75 per cent and 90 per cent of parity in 1959 and 1960, then drops supports to 70 per cent of parity in 1961 and to 65 per cent of parity in 1962 and thereafter.

This is new wealth because it is something that would not have been done without a Soil Conservation District and conscientious men willing to work without praise and without pay.

This is only the beginning. The time will come, in the not too distant future, when the annual value of accrued soil and water conservation practices applied to the land in Tishomingo county will amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars. These \$100,000.00, will help economy of Tishomingo County.

It is time for all of us who live in Tishomingo county to give some praise to these loyal, faithful servants of the people, the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners, who serve without pay.

HOW GOD VISITED GENERAL CLARK

During our Charleston, South Carolina Crusade, I had the privilege of visiting the Citadel, South Carolina's "West Point." General Mark Clark was my gracious host, and while I was there, he told me the following inspiring story, which I believe he will be glad for me to share with you. God visited the General in a crisis and helped him through one of the most desperate problems of World War II. At the last moment, before the invasion of Europe, orders came from Washington altering the invasion plans and removing the protective covering of 15,000 paratroopers who had been designated to protect the landing of General Clark's men. The General tells in his own words how God helped the Americans to meet this emergency and gave their leader strength and wisdom to lead his men to victory.

"There I was on the night of September 5—my plans twisted, yet knowing we must sail the next morning. "Did the Germans know about the invasion? How much did they know? Just what would we run into?"

"All these things were running through my mind, and with the fate of so many thousands of men, as well as the hopes of the free world, resting upon the success of the invasion, I was literally overwhelmed with a sense of my responsibility.

"Troubled and worried, I went to my cabin. A sense of my own helplessness swept over me. I desperately needed help from some greater power.

"I picked up a little book of devotions and began to read. I turned to the prayer for September 5. There I read the following inspiring lines:

*Father, in Thy name I pray,
Let me know Thy will today.
With Thee I am unafraid,
For on Thee my mind is stayed,
Though a thousand foes surround,
Safe in Thee I shall be found.*

"As I began to read, the words seemed fairly to leap off the page at me. A sense of another presence overpowered me. A great reassurance of the tightness of our cause, as well as the certainty of ultimate victory, came. God was with me. I knew it. I felt his presence! And a glad thankfulness rose in my heart. I knew we would succeed.

"As I finished reading, I was literally overwhelmed. And I can tell you, I slept better that night.

"We sailed early the next morning with a convoy of about seventy ships. . . . Ten minutes before midnight I stood with Admiral Hewitt on the bridge of the *Ancon*. The naval phase of the assault was completed.

"Then the incomparably brave officers and men of the Fifth Army started that last dash toward the beaches. Their fierce fighting, their countless inspiring acts of heroism and the ultimate victory are written in our nation's history—but that is another story. My purpose here is to say very simply and sincerely that I will always thank God for his visit to me in my hour of desperate need."

STATE ENDS BIENNIUM WITH HUGE SURPLUS

State General Fund Balance \$30,122,430.01, As Of July 1, 1958

(Special)—The State of Mississippi started its new biennial 1958-60 with the huge surplus of \$30,122,430.01 after paying obligations incurred prior to July 1, 1958.

Official figures were revealed by State Auditor E. Boyd Whitmire. The Auditor said departmental figures in which the previous biennial obligations, the passing of 60 days, all monies have been lapsed to General Fund.

Official surplus of over 30 million dollars more than bears the official figures of the State Auditor in a speech at Columbus, Miss. on March 17, 1958, in which he stated that a 28 million dollar surplus would be on July 1, 1958, and no new surplus would be necessary.

Auditor's figures and previous ones were hotly disputed by members of the Budget Commission today in Jackson, Miss. "Now that the figures are official and my claims more substantiated, I want to ask the correct, and who told the truth about their tax," the Auditor said.

State Auditor reminds that the Budget Commission, according to report at the beginning of the 1956 biennium, stated to legislators and people that there would be no surplus July 1, 1958, but rather the State Treasury would be over 4 million dollars in the "red."

A 30 million dollar surplus was to start with, together with present tax collections, it is at this time that no new taxes were needed to finance the operations for the years 1958-60.

Tax collections are on increase. The collections for the biennial period 1956-58 amount-

ed to nearly 19 million dollars over the previous biennial period of 1954-56.

The Auditor points out that in the first two months of the current 1958-60 biennial period, state tax collections ran a million dollars more than for the same two months of 1957.

The continuing trend in tax collections shows that a huge surplus is in the making with taxpayers' money that should be in the taxpayers' pockets.

Two Good Crops Made In Plastic Greenhouse Test

State College, Miss.—Plastic greenhouses may solve the problem of farmers and hobbyists who want a greenhouse for growing plants in cool weather but have found the high cost of building discouraging.

Two years' research by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station shows that plastic greenhouses can be built and maintained at relatively low costs. The studies also indicate what returns may be expected from a project of this kind.

Dr. E. L. Moore, in charge of this Experiment Station project at Mississippi State University, has recently published results of two years of tomato production in such a house. Although in his research so far, Dr. Moore has grown only one crop per season he believes an ingenious grower might get two crops per season or follow a single crop with plants grown for sale. Under favorable price and weather conditions it would be possible to pay for the house in a single season.

The greenhouse at State College is 60 by 18 feet. It cost slightly less than \$700 to build. After the first year, annual costs are expected to be about \$200 per year for heat and replacement of plastic. A house this size provides space for 243 tomato plants.

Of nine tomato varieties compared in the plastic greenhouse test, Tuckcross V produced the highest yield, averaging 7.3 pounds

per plant. All the hybrids of Tuckcross Forging parentage yielded well with Waltham Hybrid close behind. The highest producing individual plant in the house was a Tuckcross O which made 15.8 pounds of tomatoes.

In addition to comparing varieties, the study at State College includes studies on the thickness of plastic and the effect of using two layers for covering the house. Dr. Moore's report is published in the August issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

Rotary Club To Welcome Dist. Governor

The Rotary Club of Iuka, September 17, will be host to Herbert Hood, governor of the 680th district of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 36 Rotary Clubs in North Mississippi and Shelby County, Tennessee. He will address the Iuka Club and confer with President Cecil H. Brown, Secretary Ben F. McKee and committee chairman on Rotary administration and service activities.

Mr. Hood is Assistant Vice President of Union Planters National Bank in Memphis and is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of that city. Mr. Hood has been a member of the Memphis Rotary Club since 1935. He is a senior active member, having held former classifications of Curb Service Restaurants and Real Estate, Country Properties. He joined the Union Planters organization in the Fall of 1956. He was elected as a district governor of Rotary International for the 1958-59 fiscal year in Dallas, Texas, U. S. A. last June. He is one of 258 district governors supervising the activities of more than 9,800 Rotary clubs which have a membership of 462,500 business and professional executives in 110 countries and geographical regions throughout the world.

Wherever Rotary clubs are located, President Brown asserted in discussing the governor's visit, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Iuka, because they are based on the same general objectives—developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community-betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions, and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world.

Rotarians in this area join with others in Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi, parts of Kentucky, Missouri and Louisiana to form the Tri-State Association for Cripples, whose objective is the support of the Hospital for Crippled Adults, located in Memphis, Tennessee. This hospital is the only one of its kind. It offers its services to adult persons who can be benefited by orthopedic treatment, but who are unable to pay for such services. Dist. Gov. Hood is a vice president of the Tri-State Association for Cripples and Secretary-Treasurer of the Hospital for Crippled Adults.

Application for admittance can be made through any Rotary Club. This year the Rotary Club of Iuka has as its own community service projects a 3400 square foot Youth and Community Center located in Mineral Springs Park; sponsoring the local Boy Scout Troop No. 26; furnishing a supervisor to direct play of the children of the town; a project donating books to the local library; sponsoring a boy to Boys' State in the state capital and providing an award to be received annually by the most outstanding ninth grade boy.

Rotary Clubs around the world support the Rotary Foundation which has its principle objective the awarding of student fellowships for advanced study in some other country. These awards are for a years study after completion of 4 years of college. Preference is given to students wishing to study in a country whose language is different from their own. The purpose is to create a better understanding between different nations by having these student fellows interpret to peoples of other lands our customs and way of life and also to interpret to his own people the way of life of the country they visit, upon their return home.

To date 1076 fellowships have been awarded to students in 65 countries for study in 43 countries at a cost of more than \$2,600,000. Applications for the fellowships are accepted by all Rotary Clubs.

Each year, this world-wide service organization continues to grow in numbers and in strength. President Brown added. During the past fiscal year, 350 new Rotary Clubs were organized in 51 countries and geographical regions, bringing the total number of Rot-

ary Clubs to an all-time high of nearly 10,000, and eight countries were added to Rotary's roster—British Honduras, Eritrea, French Guiana, Laos, Martinique, Papua, Virgin Islands and the West Indies Federation.

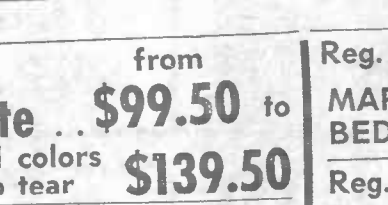

ASC NEWS

Do you have land on your farm that you could retire from crops and receive a nice income each year, thereby, help reduce the large surplus that are growing each year. The Federal Government is offering to rent a part of your farm beginning in 1959. Contracts may be signed in multiples of five and ten years.

The average land in Tishomingo County will pay about \$12.00 per acre, where you rent part of your eligible acres and \$13.20 per acre where you rent the entire eligible acres. Eligible land includes, first any land from which a crop was harvested during the year immediately before the first year of a conservation Reserve Contract, that is any land that grew a crop for harvest in 1958. Land in Non-Crop open pasture and land that was idle in 1958 will not be eligible to rent in the Conservation Reserve.

All farmers have until Oct. 3, 1958 to sign an application for the County committee to establish a rate for your farm. This does not bind you at all so if you think you might be interested contact the ASC Office before the closing date Oct. 3, 1958 and request the Committee to establish your rate.

Did you know that there is a farm Storage Facility Loan Program offered by your ASC Office? This program helps any farmer to buy and erect on your farm a round metal bin in 1000 Bu. or 2000 Bu. Capacity. These bins can be used to store corn or soybeans. You can receive a Farm Storage Loan for your corn and soybeans then hold them off the market looking for better prices out in the spring. The support price on soybeans is \$2.06 per Bu., and the tentative support price on shelled corn is \$1.12 per Bu. If you are interested in purchasing one of these bins contact the ASC Office at once. You only pay one fifth of the cost of the bin at the time you purchase it then you have 4 years to make the remaining payments interest at a low rate of 4 1/2 per cent.

If you would like to see some of these bins go to Mr. E. F. Fancher's farm R-1, Belmont or Mr. W. J. Brinkley farm in Iuka, or Mr. M. L. Hatcher farm south of Burnsville.

Are you planning to sow winter cover crops on part of your farm land this Fall? Your ASC Office in Iuka will be glad to assist you in making application and receiving Federal Cost-Sharing on any of your winter cover crops, vetch, Austrian winter peas, rye grass, crimson clover and fertilizer to go with it. You can sow 1 acre of vetch using 25 pounds of seed and 1 sack of 48 per cent Phosphate for approximately cost to you of \$3.14.

You can sow 1 acre of Austrian Winter Peas using 50 pounds of seed and 1 sack of 48 per cent Phosphate for approximately cost to you of \$3.39.

You can sow 1 acre of Oats for grazing using 3 Bu. oats or 96 pounds and 2 sacks of 33 per cent

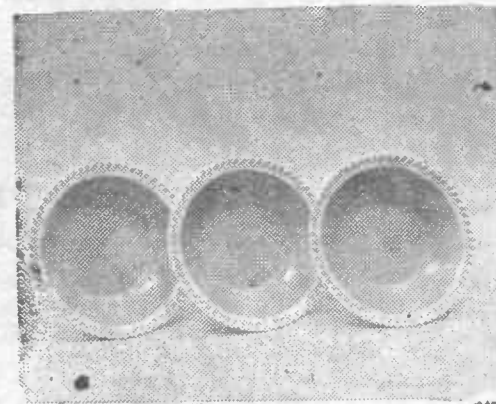

Now is the time to sow your winter cover crop. If you will act now in cooperation with the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee you can sow these winter cover crops and get assistance for up to 50 percent of the cost from the Government.

Here are some examples of how little it will cost to sow an acre of ground:

48 lbs. sack Phosphate cost you89

For minimum requirement to sow 1 acre of Harry Vetch.

Total cost to you \$6.41

For maximum requirement to sow 1 acre of Harry Vetch.

For 1 Acre Austrian Winter Peas
50 lbs. seed cost you\$2.50
48 lb. sack Phosphate cost you89

Total cost to you \$3.39

for minimum requirement to sow 1 acre of Austrian Winter Peas.

50 lbs. seed cost you\$2.50
1 1/2 sacks 14-14-14 cost you\$2.74

Total cost to you \$5.24

For maximum requirement to sow 1 acre of Austrian Winter Peas.

For 1 Acre Of Oats For Grazing

96 lbs. Oat seed cost you\$2.79
2 sacks 33% Ammonium Nitrate cost you\$3.26

Total cost to you \$6.05

For minimum requirement for 1 acre of Oats for grazing.

REMEMBER:—This is only a half of the cost. The Government pays up to 50 percent of the cost which means that if you sow 10 acres of Harry Vetch the cost to you would be \$31.40 and the Government would also pay \$31.40.

Your other seed such as Rye Grass, Crimson Clover, Wild Winter Peas, can be figured at about the same schedule as those given here. See your ASC office in Iuka. The ASC office will also be open in Belmont each Thursday every week for your convenience. These are your offices and the people working in them are anxious to serve you.

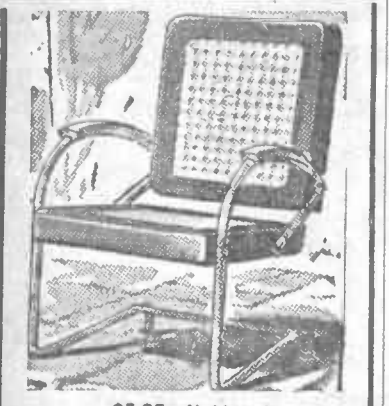

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

God In Business

Lesson for September 14, 1958

WHERE can we find God? In church, yes; in the great outdoors, yes. In prayer in the quiet room, or under the mighty far-off stars. God is everywhere.

But is God in business? We don't mean, is God doing business? He always is, of course. We mean, is God in the business life of our time? Is he on the stock exchange, is he in attendance at board meetings of great corporations, is he in the little country stores, is he in horse trades or on used-car lots? "The Economy" is a phrase used so often nowadays that even teen-agers must know in general what it means. "The Economy" is today's jargon for all the financial doings that keep our industrial and agricultural wheels going, the word includes those four pillars of all business anywhere any time: production, marketing, accounting and finance. Is God in the economy of America?

Simple Honesty

Now it might be that not a reader of this column is a "business man." For all that, every reader is engaged in business some way or other part of the time. "Money isn't everything, but money's into everything." If we live, breathe and eat groceries, we are connected, more or less, with the vast web of buying, selling, owning, renting, earning, spending (yes and wasting, which is economics gone mad), all of which we lump together under the head of "The Economy" or just "economic life." Let us think not of something big, something a congressman might plan for. Let us think of economics on Main Street, at the supermarket, on the bus, maybe our few dollars at the bank. Let's forget about the hundred-dollar bills and think about small change.

Are we honest about all these things? Does our religion affect the way we price what we have to sell (if only a few eggs or bales of hay)? Do we make honest statements about what we buy and sell? The command of God is: "Thou shalt not steal." Nothing said about "Thou shalt not steal a whole lot," or "Thou shalt not steal unless thou canst get by with it!" Taking any kind of advantage of any other person (or corporation, for that matter) so that they are the poorer for what you did, is stealing.

Is it a sin to be rich?

There are so many condemnations of rich people in the Bible, that some readers of it have the impression that God condemns rich people just because they are rich. This is not true. A more careful reading shows that whenever a wealthy person is denounced in the name of God, it isn't because of his wealth, by itself. There are too many highly-praised persons of wealth in the Bible to allow us to believe that wealth is a sin, period. The point is not: How much do you have? or, What is the amount, in dollars, which is the limit a good Christian can have? The point is: How did you get what you have? Jesus' brother James calls down doom on certain rich farmers, not because they had money but because their wealth was gained by underpaying their hired men. Making money by making men poor is stealing, and sin.

Is this spirit possible?

Saint Peter gives us what is better than a rule: he tells us the right kind of spirit that a Christian ought to have. Our gifts, he writes, are to be employed "for one another;" service is to be rendered in such as to glorify God. We all feel that this is the right spirit for "church work." But is it practicable to take this same spirit into business, into our economic life? Is it possible, in business transactions, to serve one another for the glory of God? This is a vital question. If we have to say No, it is not practicable, then we are saying that we can be Christian only in our leisure time, not our workingtime. If we want to live as Christians around the clock, throughout the week then we shall have to think out ways in which we can carry this spirit of devotion to God and man into the dollars-and-cents world. Can it be done? Each reader is challenged to make the experiment.

Local Business

A good salesman never forces
himself on a customer. Or, as a
local merchant puts it: "You just
can't force anything to a person
who is bored or irritated."

This principle of salesmanship
should be remembered when sell-
ing is being done on a mass basis
through advertising. Thus, a busi-
ness man who is careful to select
an advertising medium where his
message will be favorably re-
ceived may choose the local news-
paper with confidence. For the
local newspaper is the only retail
advertising medium which can
consistently give the local mer-
chant a chance to talk with the
customer wishes to listen.

An advertising agency execu-
tive, who selects media for the
world's largest automobile ad-
vertising account, describes the
unique value of newspaper ad-
vertising:

"It is only newspapers which
can give a potential buyer a mes-
sage any time of day or night. The
newspaper reader does not have
to be at a certain place at a cer-
tain time to get an advertiser's
message. He has only to open the
pages of his newspaper wherever
he is."

Numerous impartial surveys
have shown that newspaper ad-
vertising is preferred by the pub-
lic. In a recent survey by North-
western University, 92 per cent of
those questioned said they like
newspapers with advertising; only
33 per cent said they wanted TV

Obey School Laws Warns Comm.

School zones are clearly marked
throughout Mississippi. In most
the posted speed is 15 miles per
hour.

Mississippi law forbids a motor-
ist to pass a school bus stopped
for the purpose of discharging or
receiving riders. The penalty for
violating this school bus statute
is severe.

A. P. Smith, director of school
bus transportation, Department of
Education, states that one child
was killed last school term after
stepping from a school bus.

Because of the normally low
speeds used by school busses in
heavily populated rural areas,
motorists should let the sight of
every yellow school bus, whe-
ther moving or stationary, be a
signal for caution.

"Don't come up on a bus so
suddenly that you could not stop
if the stop marker suddenly swung
out," the commissioner warned.
"This could kill a child just as
quickly as an intentional violation."

He also reminded school bus
drivers of the "precious cargo"
which they carry, and disclosed
that Patrolmen had been ordered
to deal severely with bus drivers
observed violating good safety
practices.

One Spring morning last school
season, two busses were involved
in separate accidents less than 20
miles apart. In both accidents the
bus drivers failed to observe safety
regulations. Already this year, at
least one school bus has overturn-
ed on loose gravel, he said.

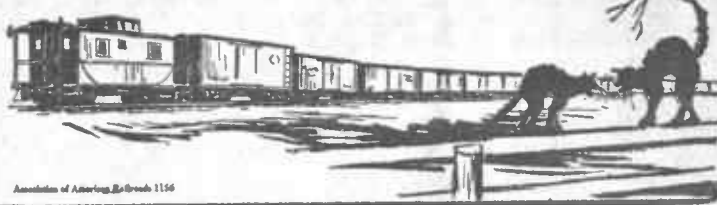
Rail oddities

1957 Traffic Analysis To Be Made Sept. 12

An analysis of Mississippi's 1957 traffic safety activities will be made Friday, September 12, by a representative of the National Safe-

ty Council. Each year Mississippi submits an inventory of its traffic activities to the National Safety Council for study. An analysis, based on similar traffic safety inventories reported by other states, is returned by the Council.

George Simmons of Montgomery, Alabama, regional representative for the NSC, will present Mississippi's analysis at 10 a.m. Friday in the office of Commissioner of

Public Safety Tom Scarbrough.

According to Commissioner Scarbrough, persons interested in hearing the NSC analysis of the 1957 state traffic safety program is invited to attend the presentation. Annually, recommendations are made by the National Safety Council on the basis of the 48 inventories submitted for analysis. Each state inventory is a combined report of all state, county and municipal activities in traffic safety. A recommendation made last year called for an expanded driver improvement program and more strict driver control following licensing. As a result, the Mississippi Highway Patrol doubled its driver improvement section with satisfactory results, according to Commissioner Scarbrough.

60 Persons Killed In Miss. Highway Accidents, Sept. 1957

September is Accident Time. Traffic statistics compiled by the Mississippi Highway Patrol show that September's highway death toll is consistently high. Last September, 60 persons were killed in traffic mishaps.

Highway Patrol Boss Tom Scarbrough states only one other month, December, tops September for traffic smashups. Sixty-five motorists died last December; 75 were killed in December 1956.

"The total death count for the past two Septembers, however, is 113, an appalling figure," Commissioner Scarbrough stressed.

According to the Patrol head, many factors contribute to the high September highway toll. Shortening daylight hours, back-to-school traffic, changing weather, off-to-the-football-game larks, and rush last-minute Indian Summer trips all contribute.

It was at these September accidents that the Highway Patrol directed its enforcement crackdown more than a month ago. Radar was

used extensively throughout Mississippi during August with satisfactory results, says the Patrol.

With the first bloody week of September behind, Mississippi's traffic toll is down more than 50 per cent. As of midnight September 7, the highway death count was reported at 6 killed. Fifteen died the first week of September 1957.

The Highway Patrol says: "Take it easy. Don't let the first nip of Fall nip you like falling leaves."
