SPEAKS

International Uniform
Sunday School Lessons

Bible Material: Amos 7:7-9; Isaiah 1:10-
20; Micah 2:1-3, 6-8; Matthew 7:15-27;
28:51-46.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 37:1-11.

Final Verdict

Lesson for September 28, 1958

ONE THING the Bible teaches
quite plainly: God is the final
court of appeal, his is the final
verdict. This is true in two ways.
First, only God's judgment is
final, because all other judgments
are partial, they are based on a
comparatively ignorant point of
view. We never
see the inside of
people, or not
very clearly at
best. We cannot
even examine
our own mind-
and hearts with
any accuracy.
We are ignorant,
moreover, of
many of the cir-
cumstances surround-
ing up to the acts of other people.
Only God knows man inside and
out, only God knows the "intent-
s of the heart", only God knows all
the circumstances leading up to
men's decisions.

In another sense God's verdict
is final, because it will be the last
one. After all a man's friends and
enemies have had their say, after
history has enshrined him, blasted
him or forgotten him, God will
have the last word. Not man's
opinion of himself, not other men's
opinion of him, is finally decisive.
Every man's destiny depends, in
the long run, on what God thinks
of him.

Justice comes first

The great prophets, and our
Lord who was "more than a
prophet," bring this home to every-
body with a working conscience.
Amos had his vision of God test-
ing the walls men have built, with
his own plumb line, ready to tear
down every wall not meeting the
test. Isaiah tells his church-going
city that God has no use for any
religious thing they do, because
they have been content with in-
justice. The first thing to do is
to "seek justice." Micah pro-
nounces the doom of God on those
who make themselves rich by
making others poor. Jesus in his
great prevision of the Last Judg-
ment, divides men right and left
on the basis of how they have
treated their fellow-men, especial-
ly their fellow-men in distress.
And then there is the Sermon on
the Mount. People argue over this
and try to by-pass it, in many
ways. They debate over whether
it is a practical ideal or not. The
fact is, Jesus presents it as God's
way of life for man. The Golden
Rule, for example, Jesus' princi-
ple of justice in one short sentence
(Matt. 7:12), is not just a nice
idea if you can do it: it is a rock
in life's foundation. Build on
my sayings, Jesus says, in effect,
and your house will stand the storm.
Pay no attention, or memorize
them if you like—just listen and
don't do, and the great storms
will bring your house of life to
cureless ruin.

Justice is not optional

Every one agrees that it takes
all kinds of Christians to make the
Kingdom of God. A Christian can
serve God and men in various
ways. It is by no means necessary
for all Christians to be ministers,
or to enter politics, or to be pro-
fessional men. A good Christian
dish-washer—if that is the most
he can do with the mind he has—
is just as faithful a Christian as
a good Christian governor of a
state.

But there is one thing that is
not optional, not an extra that a
Christian can take on as a hobby
if he likes, but an absolute essen-
tial: justice. We have seen in
these past weeks that the Bible
idea of justice is not confined to
the courtroom (though it is there,
of course). Treating people as you
would wish to be treated, seeking
the good of others as if it were
your own: this is justice, in the
home and everywhere. This is the
ABC of living as a Christian.

Justice Comes First

So it should not be surprising,
though Jesus hinted more than once
that a good many people will be
surprised—it should not be sur-
prising that at the last, when God
sums up the case and his final
verdict, he will judge (I Peter 1:
17) "each one impartially accord-
ing to his deeds." And since it is
very hard to perform any act
whatever without affecting other
people, this means that after all
other judgments are in, God's last
judgment of each of us will be
based on that question: How did
you treat people?

County Board Of Education Asks Bids For
Construction Of Burnsville, Tish. Schools

Contract Will Be Let October 21;
\$165,580 Allotted To Burnsville,
\$136,985 For Tish., \$302,565 Total

The Tishomingo County Board
of Education is prepared to spend
up to \$302,565.00 in new school
building construction in the coun-
ty unit system. Up to this amount
will be made available when the
Board opens bids on October 21,
for the construction of new build-
ings at Burnsville and Tishomingo.

At Burnsville, approximately
\$165,580 will be spent in the con-
struction of 16 new classrooms,
a new cafeteria, new toilet facili-
ties, new sewerage disposal sys-
tem, and new office space. One of
the new classrooms will be used

as a library and one will be used
as a science room.

The new buildings at Burnsville
will connect the gymnasium with
the existing buildings which will
make a large sprawling plant for
educational purposes. County
Superintendent of Education Cle-
ston Scruggs states that new equip-
ment will be purchased as it is
needed.

Schools that will be moved to
the Burnsville attendance center
are Pleasant Ridge and Holloway.
Pupils from the Gravel Hill and
Lambert schools have been going
to Burnsville for the past two or
three years.

Foolishing Spending Can Destroy Us

Continuation of the foolish spending such as was indulged in by the 85th Congress can very well mean the destruction of our economy, and we can be quite sure that once our economy is destroyed our way of life will go right along with it—and that without a shot being fired.

In other words, as has been pointed out many times but generally ignored, what we have to fear is not force from without but weakness from within. No one is ever likely to destroy America but Americans.

Back in the early days of our nation, when the people were interested in their future and their children's future, they crowded around Benjamin Franklin as he came out of the Constitutional convention, and asked, "Mr. Franklin, what do we have?" His answer was, "You have a republic—if you can keep it."

There was undoubtedly some question in the minds of those wise men who founded our nation as to whether people were actually capable of self-government. They no doubt had a feeling that what is everybody's business, as is of course the case with government in a free nation, might eventually become nobody's business. Are we now, some 180 years later, when the people generally are accepting apathetically and without protest the crumbling of our economy, beginning to see that doubt justified?

The Second Session of the 85th Congress, recently ended, can lay claim to one "accomplishment" which no other Congress can claim, namely, that it enacted spending authorizations in far greater dollar amount than did any other Congress in any single peacetime year. This one year's appropriations alone surpassed the total approved in both years of the 80th Congress, just 10 years ago, which the disciples of spending labeled the "worst Congress in our history," because, it is to be assumed, it balanced the budget and refused to go along with wasteful spending. This second session of the 85th Congress was apparently only a forerunner of many deficit Congresses to come, and if a "liberal"

Congress and President get in control in 1960, there is no telling to what extent it might run.

The only remedy would be an enormous increase in taxes to put us on a "pay-as-you-go" plan, which would cause even the low-bracket taxpayers to work about eight months out of twelve for the government, and which it is quickly recognized would be unbearable. But the alternative to pay-as-you-go is drastic inflation which would eventually destroy every retirement benefit, both public and private, every insurance policy, savings account, and every dollar that has been placed in Government bonds.

The only escape from this dilemma of either unbearable taxation or ruinous inflation is a conscientious, economy-minded, budget balancing Congress—something we did not have during this last session and which we have no prospect of having in the immediate future.

One illustration alone will show the foolish, even ignorant, spending obligations incurred by this second session of the 85th Congress—the passage of the National Defense Education Act of 1958. By passage of this Act, the camel of Federal control got its head into the tent of both private and public education, regardless of any disclaimers that might be heard to the contrary.

But when the Soviet sputnik scare hit the country and the Congress in the fall of 1957, all common sense was thrown to the wind, and Congress groped for the answer by appropriating millions of dollars for various educational purposes. What was entirely overlooked, was that the trouble with our educational system was not the amount of money we were spending, but the way we were spending it, the type of "progressive" education we were spending it for. Spending the same money for sound, fundamental education rather than for the frills and furbelows of "progressive" education was all that was needed.

We must get over the fallacious notion that we can always solve our problems simply by spending more money. There are some things

in this world that money won't buy, all beliefs of the "spend and spend" school to the contrary notwithstanding.

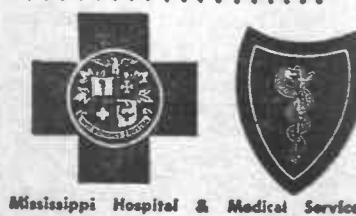

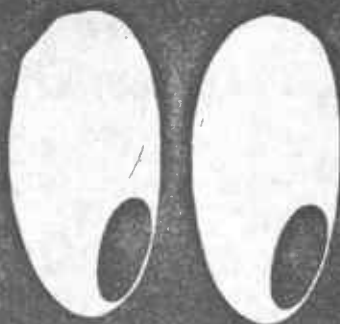

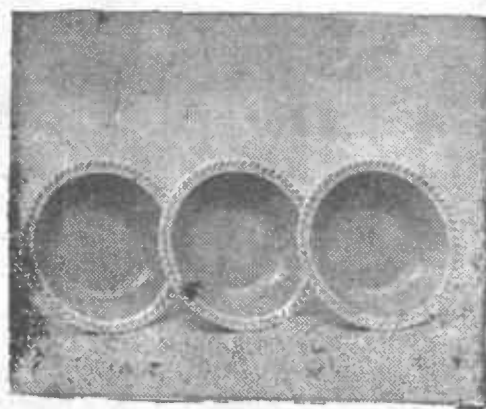

A Congress



Washington this week is watching with more than usual interest the congressional election campaigns that are just now beginning to get into full swing across the country.

Is this, as some of the experts predict, to be a "Democratic Year?" Or, can the Republicans, as others think, regain a majority in the 86th Congress which convenes next January?

There are 34 senatorial elections, two from Alaska for the first time and 436 congressional districts, including one in Alaska, in which election campaigns are being waged.

When the 85th Congress adjourned last month there were 49 Democrats and 47 Republicans in the Senate. The House was divided 233 Democrats, 200 Republicans and two vacancies.

Six Senators have announced their retirement and approximately 40 representatives either have retired or were defeated for re-nomination in the primaries.

The issues being debated in the campaign vary all the way from local to international. Foremost among the latter is the preservation of a just and honorable world peace. The threat of communist aggression continues as a constant peril to the Free World.

The world is taking cautious steps toward the goal of eventual elimination of atomic and hydrogen bombs as weapons which could be used to destroy civilization. The peaceful use of atomic energy, on the other hand, offers undreamed-of opportunities for all of mankind.

Of almost \$80 billion and as a result we will go another \$8 billion deeper into debt this fiscal year.

Integration One of the thorniest issues in the campaign is that of school integration. The Supreme Court, itself, is an issue. Has it exceeded its constitutional authority as the Judicial Branch of government and encroached on the Legislative authority? Congress by a vote of 40 to 41 barely shelved a bill to curtail the jurisdiction of the Court.

Legislation to weed racketeers out of labor unions failed by only a few votes. Candidates will want to know how voters feel about the touchy problem of curbing labor union activities, and especially those of Teamsters' James Hoffa.

In the rural areas farm legislation will be a hot issue. Congress passed a controversial farm bill just before adjourning, but it has as many critics as defenders.

The election campaigning is our best way, in a democracy, of determining the decision of the

American people on the important issues which affect them.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Did you ever realize how many different ways you use vinegar or could use it? For everything from salad dressing to cleaning paint brushes.

Maybe you've tried some of the vinegar use suggestions in this column, but hope you'll find a few new ideas you'd like to try.

In Cleaning . . .
A paste of prepared chalk (which you can buy at a drugstore) and vinegar makes an excellent cleaner for stained aluminum ware.

A paste made of equal parts of flour, vinegar and salt can be used to clean copper.

Hot vinegar will take paint off glass.

Vinegar and water will boil out and clean a steam iron.

A little vinegar or cream of tartar added to the water will prevent discoloration in the bottom of your double aluminum boiler.

To remove mineral deposits from the inside of a teakettle, boil a mixture of equal parts of vinegar and water in the kettle, cool, and let stand for several hours.

Lipstick stains can be removed from white linen by soaking the cloth in strong vinegar. If the stain is on colored material, use equal parts vinegar and water.

Soak neglected paint brushes in hot vinegar to clean and make them as pliable as new.

Clean flower vases quickly and thoroughly with hot water and vinegar.

In Cooking . . .
Put a little vinegar in a new frying pan and bring it to a boil. Food will not stick to the bottom.

When frying doughnuts or any other deep fat frying, add a teaspoon of vinegar to the fat before dropping in the food. You'll find the food absorbs less grease.

If your recipe calls for sour milk and you have only sweet, a tablespoon of vinegar to one cup of sweet milk will sour it for cooking purposes.

Cheese stays fresh longer if it is wrapped in a vinegar-dampened cloth and stored in a cool place—not in the refrigerator.

A little vinegar (teaspoon) in the water where you boil your eggs will cause the shells to slip off easily.

A few drops of vinegar added to water in which are to be poached will make the egg whites hold their shape better.

A good substitute for vinegar in potato salad is the brine left from a jar of sweet pickles.

Uncooked smoked meats stay fresh and sweet longer if wrapped in a cloth saturated with vinegar

and wring out, and then wrapped in wax paper.

Harvesting Corn

It is a good practice to harvest corn early, but do not gather before it is dry enough for storage. Also I believe it a good practice this year to store your corn for a while before selling. The average price of corn in the spring has been around 30 cents a bushel higher than at harvest time for the past ten years.

When using mechanical pickers observe all safety rules. Use the operator's manual for adjusting the machinery.

Senate Bill 4071, the new farm law, deals with the support program and controls for 1959 and 1960. Here are a few major items the new law provides.

(1) Establishes a permanent acreage floor of 16 million acres minimum National allotment, plus 310,000 acre National Reserve for small farms.

(2) If in 1958 your allotment was 10 acres or less you will not have to take an acreage reduction in future years.

(3) Each individual cotton farmer will have a choice in 1959 and 1960 between two plans—"Choice A" and "Choice B".

(4) "Choice A" will provide an acreage of about 8 per cent less cotton than your 1958 allotment, was 10 acres or less you will not have to take an acreage reduction in future years.

(5) Each individual cotton farmer will have a choice in 1959 and 1960 between two plans—"Choice A" and "Choice B".

(4) "Choice A" will provide an acreage of about 8 per cent less cotton than your 1958 allotment, and support price will be about .35c per pound for 1" Middling Cotton.

(5) "Choice B" provides for an increase of about 28 per cent in cotton acres and support price of 29.20 cents per pound for 1" Middling Cotton.

(6) The only way Mississippi can lose any cotton acreage in the future is for farmers to not plant their allotment.

Some important changes have been made in the old-age and survivors insurance program as a result of the Social Security Amendments of 1958 which President Eisenhower signed into law on August 28, 1958.

All of the changes, directly or indirectly, affect the American public as a whole. Working per- sons, both employed and self-em- ployed, need to know about them; their families need to know about them.

In the articles to follow in this newspaper I shall describe singly and in detail these changes. Today I shall restrict myself to a change which, I feel, is very important and that is a change affecting aged persons.

Before the recent change in the social security law, an aged parent, however dependent, could never get benefit payments based on the earnings of a son or daughter if there was a surviving wife, de- pendent widower, or child who was entitled or who could later become entitled to payments. This restric- tion applied even in cases where the surviving wife or children never actually became beneficiar- ies.

I recall, in particular, a case where an insured worker died leav- ing a widow who was no longer living with him at the time of his death. His other survivor was an aged mother who was keeping house for him and actually de- pendent upon him for her means of livelihood. His death left her des- titute. A monthly social security check as a surviving dependent

parent would have prevented this situation. She could not qualify as a beneficiary, however, because of the surviving wife who was not living with the insured worker. Under the new law, this parent would be eligible for survivor's benefit payments. An estimated 30,000 aged dependent parents can apply for benefits under this new provision in the social security law.

An application must be filed for these parent's benefits. To do this, a person should contact the Social Security office in Tupelo or the

representative who visits your county.

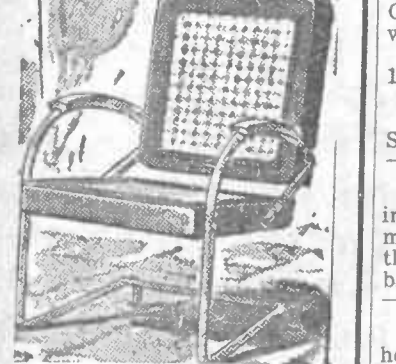

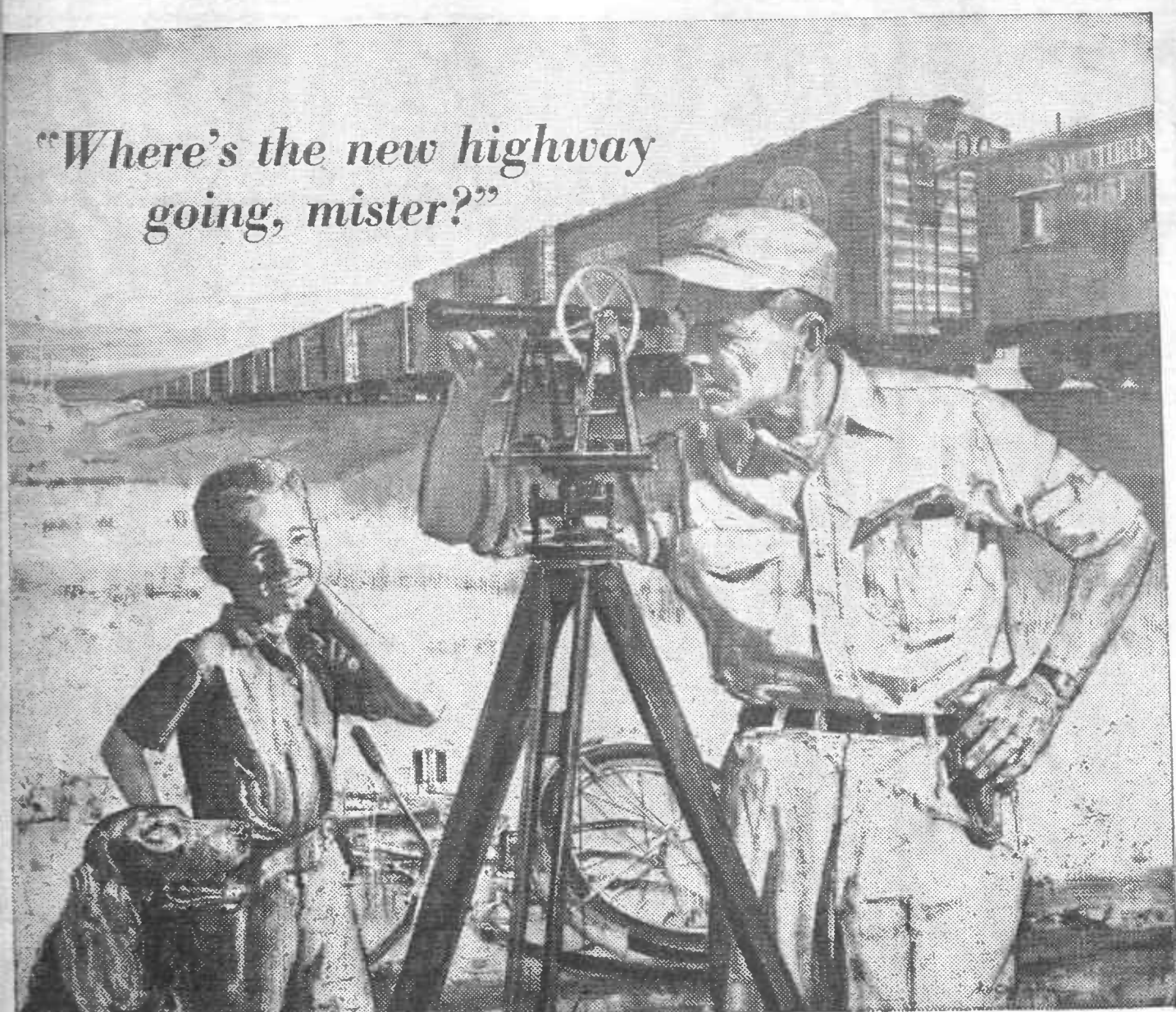

Mikes Clover is a reseeding, white bloom, winter annual that grows tall.

Last year, Bill Brinkley got excellent results by planting it on Coastal Bermuda across the road in front of his house.

"Mikes clover grows in the winter and should be planted in the fall before November 20th. Use white clover inoculator, and plant from two to three pounds of seed per acre. Be sure to inoculate these seed well with white clover inoculation," says Bill.

The Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Commissioners are interested in the results being obtained from Mikes clover planted on Coastal Bermuda. It looks good.
