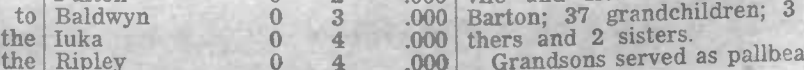

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL SELF-RELIANCE THREATENED

Chronic handouts can result in the death of a community's morale. For that reason, we should all be thankful for President Eisenhower's veto of the so-called depressed areas bill. The federal aid to communities provided for in the

bill would have been as hurtful to the country as federal aid to education.

The bill would have put a federal bureaucrat in city treasurers' offices across the country. The bill called for federal grants and loans

to cities undergoing economic troubles. The idea was that Washington would provide loans for communities to establish new industries, launch public works, and engage in slum clearance.

The principle of the bill was dead wrong. In the first place, it would have applied a brake to change, the force that is basic to this country's economic health. True, some areas, such as the old textile belt in New England, are chronically depressed. Why? Because mill owners have learned of the advantages of moving their plants South and have done just that. Taxpayers across the nation should not be asked to help such depressed areas simply because better climate, a good labor force, and an absence of union dictatorship and hoodlumism have pulled industry South.

This nation was built by self-reliant people who didn't wait for bureaucrats to give them grants-in-aid but who went out and created opportunities. If the depressed areas want to cure their bad conditions, they should correct troubles in their own communities, improve their attitude toward free enterprise, and get out and sell their communities. Many an area that has lost its old businesses has also, after a real effort, won new business. If the people of an area are worth their salt they can do this job. To suddenly demand that Uncle Sam do the job is unfair to

communities that have demonstrated self-reliance.

The South has everything to benefit from economic change. To freeze the current situation by subsidizing depressed areas in the North would be, in effect, penalizing the initiative and enterprise of Southern communities. Furthermore, economic change is something that should happen in the marketplace. It is not for a group of bureaucrats to say that a community is to be given special protection. Such dependence on federal efforts would soon damage the moral fiber of the people of American communities—even as it aroused the resentment of progressive, hardworking areas.

Many an American community loses its head when it gets the smell of U. S. money wafted down from Washington. Some people who should act responsibly forget that Washington hasn't any money of its own—the funds that are being given away are drawn from the pockets of the taxpayers. If big government and federal control over business is ever to be halted in this country, communities must call a halt to accepting handouts that are paid for in liberty. When the national government starts signing paychecks, it also starts telling communities what they can do and what they cannot do. It is no use for solid citizens to vote for conservative political leaders and hope for a return to

MR. FARMER

Through the vision of your co-op Board of Directors and management a corn sheller has been installed at the Iuka Feed Mill. Our fee for shelling will be 10c per bushel, then if you desire you will be able to retain your cobs and shucks crushed by paying the small crushing fee. If you desire you could have syrup put on them which would make a mighty good filler feed, especially for dry cattle.

The only disadvantage that we have is that we can only run our customers through at about the same speed since we have to crush all of the waste from the shelling. Below we list one or two things that will keep us from being handicapped:

1. If you plan to bring OVER 35 or 40 bushels at a time, do so around 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

2. Let our feed mill men know immediately when we start shelling your corn if you want the cobs and shucks.

3. Bring as much as 10 to 15 bushels at a time if at all possible.

4. We will not close as long as we have a customer. This is your sheller and feed mill and it is our every interest to see that You are served in a way that will be pleasing to you.

Local Business

The results of good advertising are often so impressive that even those who are in the business of selling space are amazed at times.

Several months ago a real estate company in a southern city ran a special promotion on a new development project in their local newspaper. No other advertising medium was used — just a special section in one newspaper.

The newspaper used for the promotion has a circulation of 30,000. On the basis of expenditures the real estate company felt that their advertising would be worthwhile if it could bring 3,000 visitors to a model home display.

After the promotion the company wrote an enthusiastic letter of appreciation to the newspaper. A tally of visitors showed that 22,000 people turned out to see the new home. The advertising had been 700 per cent more effective than the company's expectations.

In this case the number of people stimulated to action by newspaper advertising totalled 70 per cent of the newspaper's circulation. This was true even though the readers had to travel to a distant suburban section to take action on the advertising.

Plenty of proof can be presented to show that nearly everyone reads local newspaper advertising. In instances such as the real estate promotion the "usually" could be eliminated; for, apparently everyone in the local community reads some newspaper advertising.

And, more important, if the advertising touches the right interests, nearly everyone will act on newspaper advertising.

"The Old Gray Mare ain't what she used to be." Neither is our soil what is used to be. But we can do something about our soil.

This has been proven over and over again by Soil Conservation District cooperators living in Tishomingo county.

Soils that have been considered worn out, have in the past few years, been made vigorous, fruitful and profitable again.

This has been done by protecting the soil and feeding it properly. If you want beans to lay eggs you protect and feed them properly. If you want a pig to grow you protect it and feed it properly. The same thing is true with our soil. Under protection and good treatment soil will become revitalized.

Have you seen Orville McNutt's farm lately? Orville is a dairyman and needs pasture and silage. The hill land in front of his house is covered with pasture grass. This grass protects the land, it can't wash away. Orville is feeding this land by applying minerals and applying barnyard fertilizer. He has applied litter from chicken houses. His plants silage in the bottom. Claude Morton is now producing more cotton, corn, hay and pasture grass per acre than his father did. He has done this by terracing his land, growing winter

legumes, applying minerals and returning all crop residue to the soil.

Lester Skinner has covered most of his open land with a heavy sod of pasture grass. Thus, he protects his soil and feeds it with minerals.

THIS WEEK In Washington

With Davidon Washington Ink

Americans have become increasingly biased about the rate of the Federal government's spending our money and sinking deeper into debt.

Each \$550 the average man, woman and child in Federal taxes, either directly or indirectly, Washington and \$420.40 during the fiscal year ending June 30.

Share of the Federal debt, June 30, will amount to a total of \$1,645. That will be a capita national debt, and an increase of \$70.45 at June 30.

You may never pay off that debt, but you can't escape paying your share of the interest on it, amounting to \$42.50 a year. It costs the Treasury Department \$7.3 billion a year to pay the interest on the debt.

Congress either appropriated or authorized \$79.2 billion to be spent this fiscal year by Federal agencies. That is \$12.2 billion more than estimated tax collections of \$67 billion.

The record peacetime deficit is in sharp contrast with the official estimate last January that the government would end this fiscal year with a "net surplus" of \$500 million in income over outgo.

Mr. Stans explains this "mistaken estimate" by pointing out that (1) Congress okayed spending of \$5.3 billion more than was budgeted, and (2) tax collections now are expected to fall \$7.4 billion below the earlier estimate.

Where Your Money Goes. The biggest slice of your tax dollar, as well as the increase in debt, goes for items under the general heading of national defense. Defense spending will set a peacetime record of \$40.8 billion.

Interest on the national debt at \$7.3 billion is second, farm aid is third and foreign aid is fourth. The largest increase over the January budget was an added \$1.6 billion for the Department of Agriculture. The Post Office Department, despite increased mail rates, expects to spend \$735 million more than it collects in stamp sales. That is due to the increase in wages voted postal employees by Congress, Mr. Stans explains.

Other increases over last year include \$225 million for Health, Education and Welfare Department public assistance grants and research; \$199 million more for the Export-Import Bank, \$225 million for surplus sales of farm products, and \$92 million for the newly authorized Small Business Administration loan program.

We asked both the Republican and Democratic national headquarters for a list of what they consider the major political campaign issues. Neither mentioned Federal spending or the public debt.

County Agent news

Sweetpotato Harvesting And Handling

Careful handling is important when harvesting sweetpotatoes. Carelessness and rough handling of sweetpotatoes at harvest results in poorer grade out, lower prices and excessive loss in storage.

For digging sweetpotatoes, a broad base, tractor drawn turning plow is considered best. This plow, run off center and set at the proper depth will turn out the potatoes, all to one side of the row with the least amount of bruising.

Have enough labor on hand to complete harvest as quickly as possible. It is important to grade, pick up and remove sweetpotatoes from the field as soon as possible to prevent sun scald during the day and chilling at night. A much better job of curing is done when

the sweetpotato storage house is filled within a few days. To obtain the highest yields, delay harvest until fairly late in the fall. But make sure that all sweetpotatoes are dug and out of the field and in the storage house before danger of a killing frost. Temperatures below 50° damage sweetpotatoes.

Fire Lanes

Since there is a great amount of forage this year due to excessive rainfall, fire lanes will be of benefit to you, not only in timberlands but also in pastures. These lanes can be constructed at this time of year with bush and bog disc or breaking plows. Be sure to make fire lanes at least 10 feet wide.

Pine Tree Seedlings

Applications for pine seedlings will be taken at your County Agent's Office until October 15. The prices for seedlings this year are the same as last year—35¢ for the first 1,000 and \$4.85 for all additional thousands.

Cotton Reminder

Do not sell your cotton below loan levels. Cotton of lower grades and staple is not in demand by mills consequently the price is low.

Changes In Your Social Security

In my article last week I outlined the change in the social security law affecting aged parents. Today, I shall discuss the change in the law which concerns families of insured workers who are no longer able to do gainful work.

Monthly benefit payments to qualified disabled workers have been made since July, 1957. But, until this recent change in the law, no payments were possible to their families. Payments to dependents could not be made until the disabled breadwinner reached age 65, or died before that time. In other words, the disability benefit payment to the disabled worker offset in part his loss of earnings from work, but they did not provide the disabled person's child-dependent family. The medical expenses alone incurred through disability are a major financial problem for most families. Furthermore, the children are often more dependent than are the children of retained workers since it is often necessary that the mother remain at home rather than work and supplement the family income.

Insurance protection in the form of monthly benefits are now provided the disabled person's children under 18 and any older children under a disability beginning before he became 18. Benefits are also payable to a disabled person's wife if she has in her care a child eligible for benefits. We estimate that there are 180,000 dependents of disabled workers who can qualify for payments under this provision in the amended law. An application must be filed before benefits can be paid. Any disabled person receiving disability insurance benefits and who has eligible dependents should contact the Social Security Administration immediately. These payments can start with the month of September, 1958. There are a substantial number of these eligible dependents residing in Tishomingo County. A representative of the Social Security Administration visits the Court House in Iuka on each Monday afternoon. He may be contacted after 1:00 p.m. Applications for these new benefits may be filed with our representative on these dates.

90,000 Miss. Driver's Licenses Expired Monday

Some 90,000 Mississippi driver's licenses which expired September 30 have not been renewed, according to the Highway Patrol.

Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough urges motorists to check the expiration date of their license.

"You may be driving with an expired license and not know it," he warns.

The Patrol drivers license division only recently discontinued for economy purposes the sending of renewal reminders to license holders.

The failure of these notices to be mailed out this expiration period is thought responsible for the slow renewals.

Approximately 115,000 licenses expire September 30. Less than 25 per cent renewals have been reported.

"Check your license," urges Commissioner Scarbrough. "Your license may be expired."

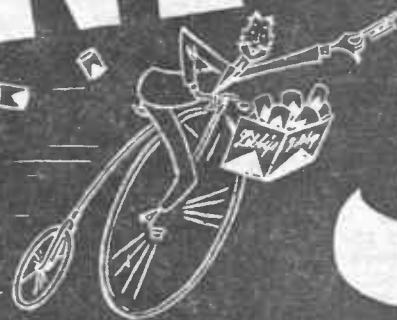
