# Mrs. R. B. Dean To Represent County At National Conv.

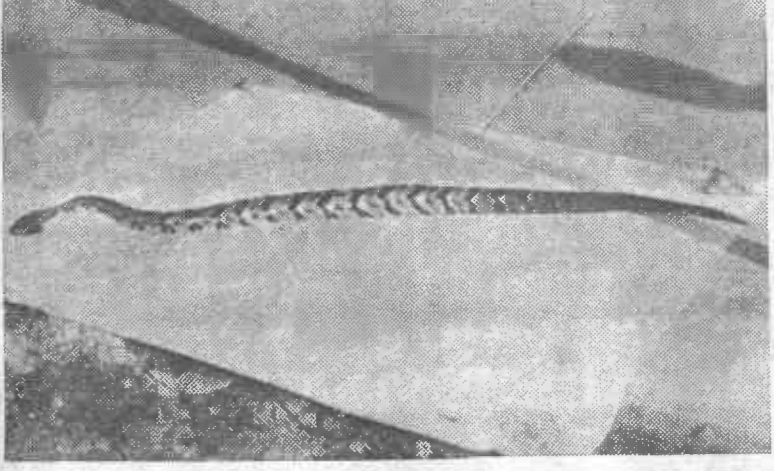
Mrs. R. B. Dean of the Rocky

# Chieftains Fall To Strong Okolona, 41-19; Play Fulton Friday Night, There

The Chieftains will travel to Ful-  
ton Friday night in seek of their  
1st win of the year. The Fulton  
Team has a record of 3 wins, 2  
losses.

The Iuka Chieftains fell behind  
to Okolona quickly last Friday  
night in a 34 point blast by the  
visiting team.

Adron Earnest started the scor-  
ing barrage for Okolona on a 4  
yard off tackle slant early in the  
first quarter. Johnny Kerr tallied  
the extra point. Guy Robbins com-  
pleted the scoring in the opening  
quarter on a 7 yard end sweep.  
Kerr again scored the extra point.

Okolona scored three more  
times in the second quarter as  
Richard Moore went 35 yards on  
an end around and 40 yards on an  
intercepted pass. Kerr made the  
first extra point. Guy Robbins  
went 20 yards on an end sweep for  
the last touchdown of the half  
for Okolona. Billy McRaney talli-  
ed the extra point.

Iuka's only touchdown in the  
first half came on an 8 yard pass  
from Van Savell to Freddy White,  
who carried it over. The extra  
point try was blocked. The  
touchdown was set up on a 45  
kickoff return by Van Savell.

At the end of the first half  
Okolona led 34-6.

The Chieftains took the second  
half kickoff and proceeded to drive  
75 yards in 9 plays for the touch-  
down. The biggest gain of the  
drive was a 45 yard run by Freddy  
White on an end around. Short  
passes from Savell to White also  
helped. The scoring play was a 5  
yard off tackle slant by Savell.

The extra point try was wide.

Okolona scored only once in the  
second half on a 12 yard jaunt by  
Johnny Kerr. Kerr also scored the  
extra point.

In the fourth quarter the Chief-  
tains finished the scoring for the  
night on a 5 yard pass play from  
Eddie Byrom to Freddy White.  
Savell tallied the extra point.

The Chieftains completed 8 out  
of 11 passes for a total of 79 yards  
gained.

Freddy White was the big of-  
fensive threat for Iuka as he  
caught 8 passes for 79 yards, run  
for 65 more and scored 2 touch-  
downs.

# TISHOMINGO TO LEVY ADDITIONAL SALES TAX

To Go In Force November 1st;  
Need For More Funds Is Reason

The Mayor and Board of Alder-  
men of the Town of Tishomingo in  
regular meeting Tuesday night of  
this week passed a resolution an-  
nouncing the intention of the board  
to levy a one-half of one percent  
city sales tax for the benefit of  
the Town.

Mayor C. L. Trimm stated that  
the Town's treasury was badly in  
need of more funds. "We must  
have more money if we are to do  
the things that we have to do,"  
he said. "Our streets that were  
paved a few years ago are begin-  
ning to need re-surfacing and we  
don't have the money to do the  
job. We don't want to let the  
streets go down for lack of main-  
tenance and all of us, including  
members of the Board of Alder-  
men, believe that the residents  
of our fine community will be  
willing to let a half-cent sales tax  
levy pay for this needed main-  
tenance," the mayor said.

Members of the Board of Alder-  
men state that it is their aim and  
intention to lower the advalorem  
tax if they are allowed to levy  
the additional one-half cent sales  
tax.

The state of Mississippi collects  
three percent sales tax on all retail  
sales, all of which goes to the state.  
With the addition of the one-half  
percent the total tax collectible  
within the corporate limits of Tish-  
omingo would be three and one-  
half percent, with the one-half  
percent going to the Town's  
treasury.

An election to levy the tax will  
not be held unless 20 percent or  
more of the qualified electors of  
the Town sign a petition request-  
ing an election.

education work in China before being  
transferred to his present assign-  
ment. He is a graduate of Wash-  
ington and Lee University and  
George Peabody College.

terest where there will be leaders  
for the young people and adults.  
This rally is designed to reach the  
Missionary and educational in-  
terest in each local church of the  
district.

### HOME AGENT NOTES

How does a peppermint milk  
shake sound to you?  
For the youngsters' after school  
snack or to accompany a meal for  
them or other members of your  
family.

Just add crushed peppermint  
stick candy to chilled milk, and

with ice cream and shaved sweet  
chocolate.

#### Fire Prevention Week

Fire! Fire! What a chill those  
words give us! And especially on  
the farm or in the country where  
we don't have the help of a fire  
department.

This week—National Fire Preven-  
tion Week—is a good time to take  
a good look at your home water  
system. Will it do the fire fighting  
job you might need around your  
home and other buildings?

One point to check—and a vital  
one—is the wiring of your water  
system. Is it protected from the

possibility of burning out during  
a fire?

The pump should be on an en-  
tirely separate circuit from other  
equipment. It's a good idea to run  
the wiring connected to the pump  
underground rather than along-  
side a building where it could be  
burned.

If the pump is located in one of  
the buildings, it should be fed by  
an individual circuit with a separ-  
ate switch clearly marked as the  
pump switch only.

#### Shall I Buy Small Eggs?

You've probably been seeing a  
good supply of small eggs at your  
grocery store the last few weeks.  
And at good prices, it seemed. But  
are they or the large eggs really  
the best buy, you've probably ask-  
ed yourself.

Here are some suggestions to  
help you decide which to buy.  
Small eggs weigh about one-four-  
th less than large eggs. If the price  
spread between Large and Small  
eggs is as much or more than 15  
cents, the small size is the econ-  
omy buy.

For example, if the Large Grade  
A eggs sell for 65 cents a dozen,  
Small (or pullet) eggs are an  
equally good buy at 50 cents a  
dozen. You've probably found a  
wider spread than this, with Small  
eggs selling for as little as 39  
cents a dozen.

If the spread in price between  
Large and Medium eggs is 8 cents  
or more, Medium eggs are a better  
buy than Large ones. Small eggs  
are a better buy than mediums

when they are 8 cents less than the  
Mediums.

More Medium and Small eggs  
are coming to market now, because  
of the unusually large number of  
pullet chicks raised this year.

Through the vision of your co-op Board of Di-  
rectors and management a corn sheller has been  
installed at the Iuka Feed Mill. Our fee for shell-  
ing will be 10c per bushel, then if you desire you  
will be able to retain your cobs and shucks crush-  
ed by paying the small crushing fee. If you desire  
you could have syrup put on them which would  
make a mighty good filler feed, especially for  
dry cattle.

The only disadvantage that we have is that we can only run  
our customers through at about the same speed since we have to  
crush all of the waste from the shelling. Below we list one or two  
things that will keep us from being handicapped:

1. If you plan to bring OVER 35 or 40 bushels at a time, do so  
around 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon.
2. Let our feed mill men know immediately when we start shell-  
ing your corn if you want the cobs and shucks.
3. Bring as much as 10 to 15 bushels at a time if at all possible.
4. We will not close as long as we have a customer. This is your  
sheller and feed mill and it is our every interest to see that  
You are served in a way that will be pleasing to you.

**AN ORDINANCE BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI, ANNOUNCING THE INTENTION TO LEVY A ONE HALF OF ONE PER CENT (1/2 OF 1%) CITY SALES TAX IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE CITY SALES TAX ENABLING ACT, CHAPTER 114, LAWS OF EXTRAORDINARY SESSION OF 1955.**

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Tishomingo, Mississippi, in regular meeting assembled, that, pursuant to and as authorized by Chapter 114, Laws of Extraordinary Session of 1955, it is the intention of the governing authority to impose and levy, effective on and after the first day of November, 1958, for the benefit of the city of Tishomingo, Mississippi, upon all persons engaged in any of the businesses taxed by Section 2c, 2d, and 2f of Chapter 119, Laws of 1934, as amended, or as may hereafter be amended, an additional tax of one-half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) on retail sales or gross income, except in the case of sales of industrial gas and electricity the rate shall be one-fourth of one per cent (1/4 of 1%), but not to include that derived from sales classed as wholesale under said Sales Tax Law or exempt thereby.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in a local newspaper having general circulation in the municipality, and posted in three (3) public places for at least twenty-one (21) days in compliance with Section 1 (c), Chapter 114, Laws of Extraordinary Session 1955.

SECTION 3. That if not less than twenty per cent (20%) of the qualified electors of said municipality shall file with the Clerk of the municipality before the first day of November, 1958, a petition requesting an election on the question of the levy of the tax herein mentioned, then and in that event such tax levy shall not be made unless authorized by a majority of the votes cast at an election to be called and held for that purpose. If such election is held and said tax levy is authorized, then the proposed tax levy shall, by the final levying ordinance, be made effective and after the first day of the month next succeeding the date of such election.

SECTION 4. That immediately upon approval of this Ordinance of intent a certified copy thereof be forwarded to the Chairman of the State Tax Commission by the Clerk of the municipality.

SECTION 5. The Ordinance was read and considered Section by Section and then as a whole. Alderman H. C. Nichols moved the adop-

tion of the Ordinance, duly seconded by Alderman A. W. Dean. The vote was taken by the Mayor with the following result:

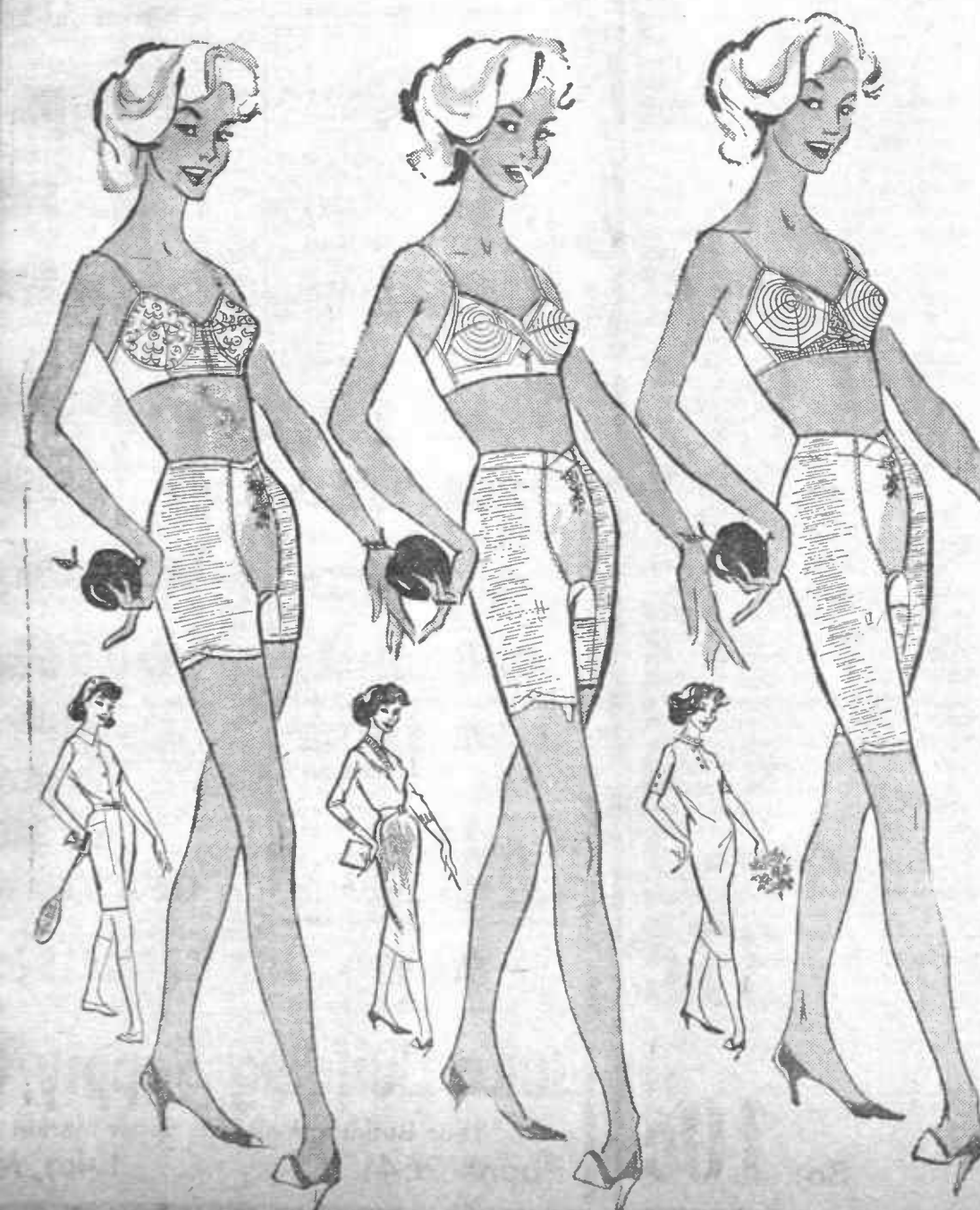

## HARDWOODS,— They Are Not All Culls

Tom C. Robbins does not think all hardwoods are culls. Tom has girdled hardwood on pine sites up in the hills on his 800 acre farm in southwest Tishomingo county. About half of his land lies in the rolling hills, but the other half is in the flat Mackey's Creek bottom.

Down on the bottom land pines will grow, but hardwoods are naturally there. Foresters speak of hillland as being a pine site, bottom land as being a hardwood site, and bench land as a pine-hardwood site. With this definition of forest sites in mind Mr. Robbins, a soil conservation district cooperator, has set 20,000 loblolly pine seedlings on his hill land. He will girdle the hardwood on this area to open up and permit sunlight to reach these young pines so they will grow faster.

In the bottom he will also remove or girdle types of hardwood considered valueless, such as: Blue Beech and Iron Wood. But woe to the man who cuts a cherry-bark oak or yellow poplar. Tom wants them to grow.

There has been so much girdling of hardwood on the hills, to release pine seedlings, that many people of Tishomingo county think of hardwoods as a type of inferior trees.

It depends on the type of hardwoods growing, and kind of land they are growing on as to whether they are inferior or not. On bottom land they are definitely the right kind of trees to grow.

To say that all hardwoods are culls is not true.

The SCD commissioners and the local soil conservation personnel urge land owners to take better care of their hardwoods growing on hardwood sites.

The soil conservation farm plan Mr. Tom Robbins has on his farm suggests the following general management practices to care for his 385 acres of hardwoods growing in Mackey's Creek bottom:

1. Protect from fire. Fire severely damages hardwood even to a greater extent, at times, than it does pine. 2. Protect from grazing. Animals grazing reduces the stand of desirable types of hardwood. 3. Cut or girdle Blue Beech, Iron Wood and other cull types to make way for the more desirable species of hardwood. 4. Thin stand to required spacing through improvement cutting. 5. Allow best trees to stay and grow to financial maturity.

Mr. Robbins will, over a period of years, carry out these practices. He thinks as much of his hardwoods as he does his pines.

"Some hardwoods are culls but all hardwoods are not culls," says Mr. Robbins.

The fact to remember is that good hardwoods growing on bottom land or bench-land are valuable, and they require about the same management practices as do pines. All Hardwoods Are Not Culls.

### The World's Hope

Lesson for October 12, 1956

IS THERE hope for the world? Is there hope for me? One way or another. For all citizens of this planet, with very few exceptions, can see that this world is not as it ought to be. The more unselfish, the more public-minded, the more sensitive to the needs of human beings a person is, the more deeply he will feel the woes of the world.

All persons not smothered in the selfish enjoyment of their own private paradise (if they can afford one) will agree that this world sorely needs hope.

### Prisoners of Hope

But is there hope? Here opinions differ. Some of those who are most keenly certain that the world is in a bad way, are sadly convinced that it will not grow better—it can't. The ancient Greeks, and many other races besides, thought of history as going around in circles. The world would go downhill and up by turns, around and around the wheel of fate. No disaster, and no improvement, would ever be permanent.

But the Jews were a peculiar people. They were peculiar among other things for their hope. Alone among the ancient peoples of the world, the Hebrews thought of history not as a circle but as a straight line, an arrow with a point, aimed and going somewhere. If ancient men thought of a Golden Age, they placed it in the far past. The Jews dreamed of a Golden Age, too, but theirs was never in the past.

This hope, as centuries went on, became centered in one Deliverer to come. They called him by various names: Messiah, Son of David, God's Chosen One, the Rescuer or Savior. It is clear from the stories Luke tells that even very old people like Anna and Simeon lived in hope that they might see the coming of the New Age. Somehow when they saw the baby Jesus they felt sure that the great Hope was now becoming real, at last. Imprisoned in circumstances they might have been; but always as "prisoners of hope."

### Hope Deferred

The sad thing was that the great majority of the Hebrew people, when the long-awaited Messiah really came, could not recognize him. Jesus the carpenter, Jesus the radical teacher, Jesus the friend of sinners, did not fit the patterns and the formulas by which they had described the Coming One. As they would have said, "He does not fulfill the Prophecies." Nevertheless, some did see that he fulfilled the deeper meaning of the ancient prophets' hopes. And so by degrees the number of believers in the Messiah (or Christ, which means just the same thing) grew and grew. Most of the Jewish people were left with a sense of hope deferred. And indeed many Christians were likewise disappointed. For it appears to have been the expectation of the early Christians that Christ's absence in heaven was only temporary, that is to say for a very short time, a few days, weeks, months, years perhaps. Every one hoped and most of them expected to live to see Jesus bursting through the blue sky, riding on a cloud, coming to be King of the World. But Jesus did not come that way. Even in our time some Christians expect to outlive the world's time.

### Hope Abides

Nevertheless, and despite all the disappointments and misunderstandings, the hope lives on. Most Christians no longer expect to see Jesus coming on a space-ship. But all Christians do live by hope. That Christ will reign is a hope and a faith that will not down. That in the long run his cause will conquer, that "the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdoms of our Lord and of his Christ," this the church believes. We have to be modest and humble, or we should be so, about the "how" of hope's fulfillment. For we remember how mistaken the Jews of Jesus' time were, in their interpretation of prophecy, and we know how many Christian interpretations have been smashed by history's matter-of-factness. But we shall not be dashed. We believe that God is not going to be defeated, we believe that against Christ and his church even the gates of hell shall not prevail.

## SENSING THE NEWS

### SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL BILLIONS FOR WASTE

American taxpayers who have read the news that a \$12.2 billion deficit is facing the nation this fiscal year—compared with a surplus of \$500 million estimated as late as last January—may say to themselves, "That's terrible news, but the extra money is going for defense—and we can't spend too much to protect our country." The fact is, though, that the deficit is not the product of spending for military preparedness against Russian aggression. The money is being dribbled away for nonessential projects.

The Bureau of the Budget has come up with a set of figures that makes that dismaying news abundantly clear. Let's look at the figures.

ures on the mid-year review of the government's finances!

The expenditures estimate last January for the current fiscal year was \$73.9 billion. It is now \$79.2 billion—an increase of \$5.3 billion! The January estimate for spending on national security was \$46.3 billion. The current estimate is \$46.8 billion. That's a hike of only \$500 million—only ten per cent of the total.

In line with the old policy of making political hay with federal farm programs, Congress authorized spending on agriculture be increased a whopping \$1.3 billion. This huge jump in federal farm payments comes at a time when the country has had a spectacularly successful farm production year and government warehouses are jammed with surplus farm commodities.

An even bigger increase was authorized by Congress for various commerce and housing projects. For filling and pork barrel to capacity, a hike of \$2.1 billion was agreed upon. There is debate in the nation as to whether the armed services are getting the best missiles and enough nuclear submarines. But there's no room for debate over the amount of expensive housing that's being built at military installations across the world. If the next war were to be won with PXs, the U. S. federal funds to correct municipal ills that they themselves are capable of remedying if they make half increased spending.

The \$500 million boost for the defense budget is overshadowed by new spending for labor and welfare programs. An increase of \$700 million over the January spending estimate has been permitted. It is a strange but revealing comment on the character of the last Congress that it couldn't find a way to check the aggression of the Hofas but had no difficulty passing legislation to aid those who live off the tax-paying public.

These figures make abundantly clear that Americans aren't buying a vast increase in defense protection with this extra money. The additional spending of \$5.3 billion above the January estimate will go for projects that are essentially political—handouts to farmers, housing for minority groups in big cities, into public works that the public could dispense with or pay for itself on the local level, and into government pay raises.

The rest of the \$12 billion deficit results from a slump in tax revenues. The current estimate for individual income taxes shows a \$2.5 billion drop below the January estimate. Corporate income taxes are expected to drop \$3.5 billion.

What's happened, of course, is that business growth and expansion have been cramped by the frantic spending policies of the federal government. Americans have had such a large share of their income tapped by the federal government that creation of new income has slowed down. And heavy taxation, such as exists in this country today, is a threat to individual and corporate incentives.

The moral in these figures is that welfare-staters are digging a deep grave for their country. They are the permanent inflation-makers—and therefore paving the road to ruin.

## County Agent news

### Sweetpotato Curing

For best results in curing sweetpotatoes, provide a storage house temperature of 85 degree F. as the house is being filled. Maintain this temperature for five to eight days.

The humidity in the house should also be kept high—85 to 90 percent, both in curing and for storage.

In most cases it is best to keep all doors and ventilators closed during the curing period, except to prevent drops of water from forming on walls and ceiling.

After curing is completed, reduce the house temperature to 55 to 60 degree F. as quickly as possible. Maintain the house at this temperature during the storage period. Do not let the temperature drop below 50 degree F.

Many clover areas have faded out because of the lack of plant food. Many of these areas can be brought back to good clover production by addition of phosphate and potash. As you know, clovers use higher rates of phosphate and potash than grasses. If clover pastures have been mineralized during the past few years, 60 pounds of each of these will grow good clover. If they have not been mineralized in the last two years, most farmers will want to apply 100 pounds of each of these plant foods.

### Corn Picker Safety

Mechanical corn pickers can be the most dangerous of farm machines when carelessly operated.

Here are some tips to make your picker operation safer:

1. Stop the picker before oiling, adjusting or unclogging. Make shutting off the power a habit every time you leave the tractor seat.

2. Keep shields in place. Never operate the machine without safety shields. Use tractor engine shields for fire prevention on mounted pickers—keep a fire extinguisher handy.

3. Dress for the job. Always wear fitting clothing that is warm and comfortable. Make sure no one else is on the machine with you.

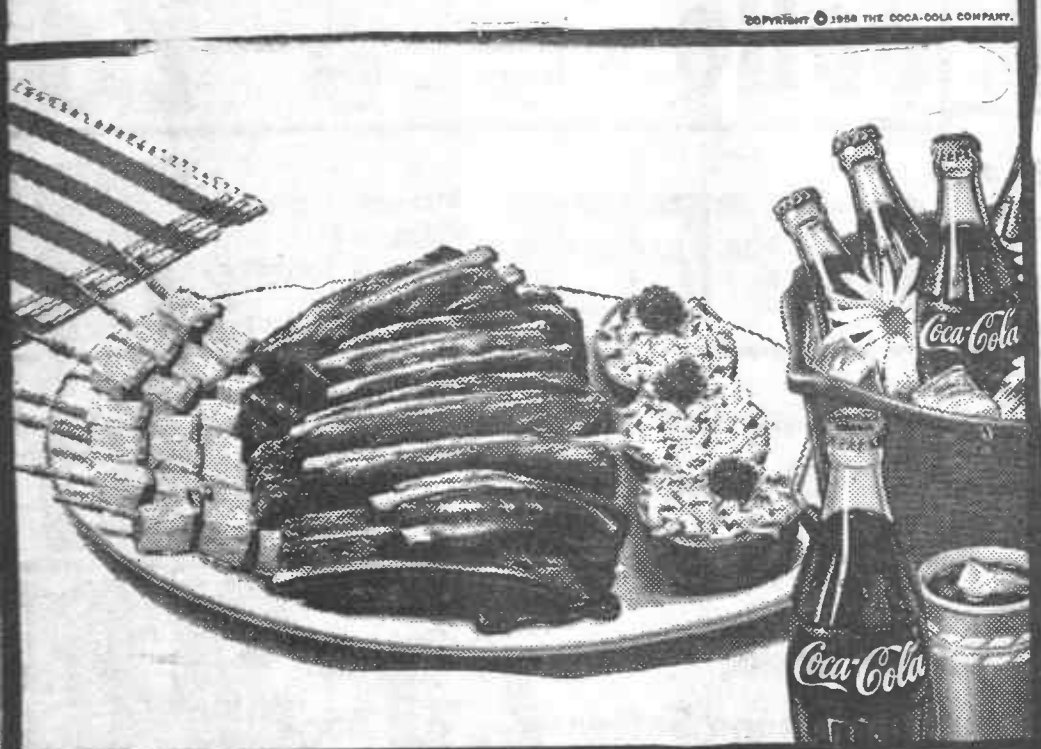

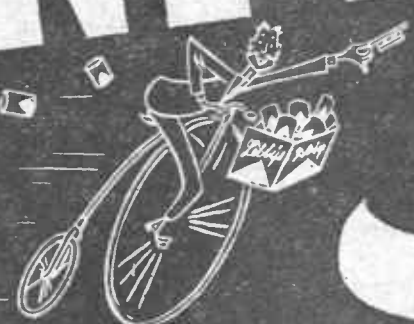
### H D C Plans Work For Coming Year
