The Benson Boom



A man Republican party chieftains wanted fired only three months ago, Ezra Taft Benson, this week is being quietly groomed for entry into the 1960 presidential race.

As recently as last July many of the top Republicans in Washington labeled Benson a failure as Secretary of Agriculture and too big a liability to carry into the 1958 election campaign.

Why this sudden reversal? What has happened to change the quiet-spoken church official from Utah into a political hero almost overnight? His is, beyond doubt, one of the quickest political comebacks on record.

There are several reasons given, but the most plausible are that (1) the farm revolt against him has quieted down; (2) he is popular with many city voters; and (3) he is a good speaker and campaigner.

Benson has been one of the most controversial men in President Eisenhower's Cabinet. He has taken without flinching criticism that would have discouraged many men

He has unswerving confidence in his principles.

Farm Program

The Administration farm program which features more freedom for farmers from government pricing and production controls has been more popular with consumers than with farmers or, for that matter, with Congress.

Despite lower supports for many crops, the index of farm prices now is 5% above a year ago, although still 15% below 1952. Benson recently released figures to show that farm income so far this year has been 19% higher than in the same months of last year.

Late in the past session of Congress Benson teamed up with congressmen from urban areas to defeat a farm bill backed by the Democratic majority, and then push through a bill which it was claimed will result in lower farm and food prices.

A Taft Man

Benson was a close friend and political supporter of the late Sen. Robert A. Taft, a distant relative. His middle name, Taft, is a family name. It is reported that Sen. Taft recommended him to President Eisenhower.

The quiet campaign to promote Benson for President is being backed by many of the former Taft supporters. They comprise what is generally described as the "conservative" wing of the Republican party.

Although Benson has been a staunch supporter of president Eisenhower, he has not become too closely identified with Eisenhower-

Republicans branch of the party. He, however, campaigned for the re-election of Mr. Eisenhower in 1956.

Benson is a tireless and convincing campaigner. Since the close of Congress he has been making

three and four speeches a week in support of his farm program and Republican congressional candidates, some of whom have in the past been critical of him.

He is a deeply religious man, having taken leave as a member of

the Council of Twelve Apostles of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints to become Secretary of Agriculture in 1952.

Operations such as "Barnstorm" serve to keep ships of the First Fleet in a high state of combat alert in a high state of combat to the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH The Good Earth

Men still ask where did I come from and where do I go? The best authority says we came from the dust of the earth, and that we shall return to dust again.

We know our lives are sustained from the products of the soil. Even the fish of the sea depend on minerals from the soil.

Agricultural research has shown that good fertile soil produces good nutritious food, and that poor soil produces food of a low quality.

This is like the small boy who told his dad that he knew a dime was a lot of money when he was a lad but dimes have changed. So have our soils changed.

What the public demands now is food of high quality. Food containing a high content of minerals and vitamins. Today people want food that will nourish their bodies and give them good health, not food that fills the stomach but starves the body.

What the farmers of Tishomingo County want to do, and the thing that some are now doing, is to conserve the life giving qualities of their soil.

Cows grazing on pastures growing on land high in organic matter and containing an abundance of phosphorus, calcium, potassium, and other mineral elements will produce good wholesome milk. The people who drink milk from cows grazing on such pastures are getting good food. Poor pastures produce poor cows, poor milk, and poorly nourished people.

The same thing is true for vegetables, corn and all crops. High quality food is produced on well fed, well managed land.

How do we manage our land to produce good food? Just feed it. How do we feed soil? The best way is to keep it sown down in a highly fertilized sod crop as much of the time as possible, and not overgraze it. The leaves, roots, and stems from grasses and clovers accumulate and form humus in the soil. This humus makes unavailable plant food, locked up in the soil, available to plants.

Barnyard fertilizer and fertilizer from chicken houses applied to row crop land will build it up. It is the working together of the organic material and mineral substances in the soil plus balanced fertilizers that produce high quality plants. In turn these plants produce good food.

The whole idea is that every landowner can make the good earth on his farm better.

It is to this end that the personnel of the USDA Soil Conservation Service is working.

Mrs. R. E. Wasson Urges Cooperation In Youth Work

These are interests which are a part of the concerns of the program area of Christian Outreach.

The plan of five program areas as a design for youth experience was adopted by 39 denominations in 1953. Christian Outreach, one of these areas, is the particular concern of the secretary of Youth work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, although she is always concerned with the total MYF program. And to be most effective in this it is suggested that the secretary of Youth work study the MYF Handbook and other related materials, to prepare as a resource person and be ready to help with local MYF activities.

In speaking of Youth work, Mrs. Wasson referred to meeting the pledge, saying "Our goal on MY Fund for New Albany District this year is \$1800.00, an increase over last year." She called for the organization of World Friendship groups during the year, the reading of the Methodist Woman, and the study of the MYF Handbook.

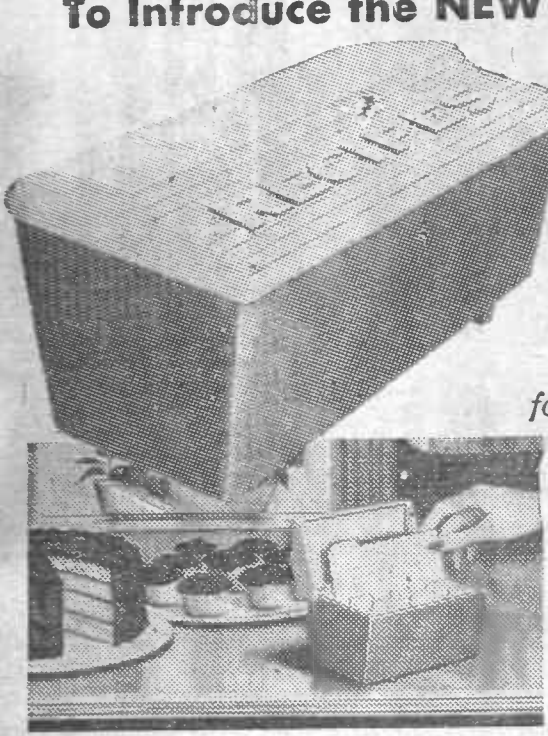

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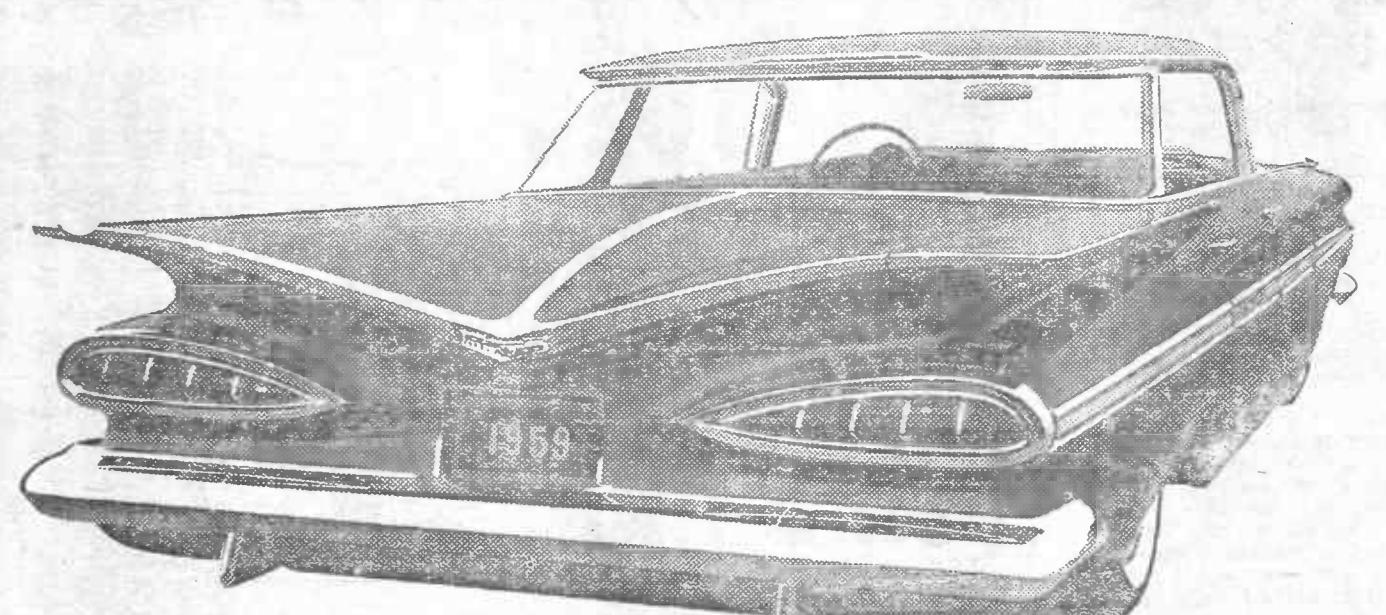

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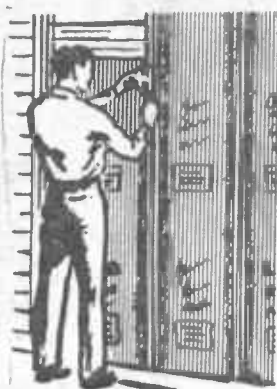

AN ORDINANCE BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI, ANNOUNCING THE INTENTION TO LEVY A ONE HALF OF ONE PER CENT (1/2 OF 1%) CITY SALES TAX IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE CITY SALES TAX ENABLING ACT, CHAPTER 114, LAWS OF EXTRAORDINARY SESSION OF 1955.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Tishomingo, Mississippi, in regular meeting assembled, that, pursuant to and as authorized by Chapter 114, Laws of Extraordinary Session of 1955, it is the intention of the governing authority to impose and levy, effective on and after the first day of November, 1958, for the benefit of the city of Tishomingo, Mississippi, upon all persons engaged in any of the businesses taxed by Section 2c, 2d, and 2f of Chapter 119, Laws of 1934, as amended, or as may hereafter be amended, an additional tax of one-half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) on retail sales or gross income, except in the case of sales of industrial gas and electricity the rate shall be one-fourth of one per cent (1/4 of 1%), but not to include that derived from sales of whole sale under said Sales Tax Law or exempt thereby.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in a local newspaper having general

circulation in the municipality, and posted in three (3) public places for at least twenty-one (21) days in compliance with Section 1 (c), Chapter 114, Laws of Extraordinary Session 1955.

SECTION 3. That if not less than twenty per cent (20%) of the qualified electors of said municipality shall file with the Clerk of the municipality before the first day of November, 1958, a petition requesting an election on the question of the levy of the tax herein mentioned, then and in that event such tax levy shall not be made unless authorized by a majority of the votes cast at an election to be called and held for that purpose. If such election is held and said tax levy is authorized, then the proposed tax levy shall, by the final levying ordinance, be made effective and after the first day of the month next

succeeding the date of such election.

SECTION 4. That immediately upon approval of this Ordinance of intent a certified copy thereof be forwarded to the Chairman of the State Tax Commission by the Clerk of the municipality.

SECTION 5. The Ordinance was read and considered Section by Section and then as a whole. Alderman H. C. Nichols moved the adoption of the Ordinance, duly seconded by Alderman A. W. Dean. The vote was taken by the Mayor with the following result:

County Agent news

Cotton Stalk Destruction

The boll weevil resistance problem emphasizes the urgent need for early destruction of cotton stalks. By killing the cotton plant as early as possible before the first killing frost prevents further build up of weevils and forces them into starvation before they go into hibernation for the winter. Modern mechanical stalk cutters and shredders facilitate early stalk destruction and complete coverage of crop residues. Plowing under the stalks as soon as possible after the stalks are cut will further reduce the survival of boll weevils.

Rat Control

Average rat population on Mississippi farms is estimated at about 100. Some farms may have as high as a thousand rats. On other farms, where cribbing and bins are rat-proof, where no harboring places exist and where there is no spilled grain for food, the population may be considerably less than a 100.

On the average farm, costs of a poison-bait program to take care of the hundred rats already populating cribs and other structures will be approximately \$1.25. This cost is based on materials you will need to mix your own poison bait. 4 1/2 pounds of roughly ground yellow corn meal, 1/4 pound of warfarin, pival or PMP concentrate poison and 1/4 pound of cottonseed oil will make a total of 5 pounds of poison bait.

Cattle Lice

Now is the time to control lice on cattle to insure beef gains and increase milk production. Damage is usually most severe in the winter and early spring when the coat becomes thick and long, and the skin relatively dry of oil. Treat now to prevent a damaging build-up of lice later.

Insecticides most effective in controlling lice are Malathion, Toxaphene, Lindane, Methoxychlor & Rotenone.

Materials For Beef Cattle

Mix 20 per cent Lindane Emulsion at the rate of 3/4 pint per 50 gallons of water; or use 1/2 gallons of 5 per cent Malathion Emulsion to 50 gallons of water; or mix

60 per cent Toxaphene Emulsion at the rate of 2-3/4 pints per 50 gallons water.

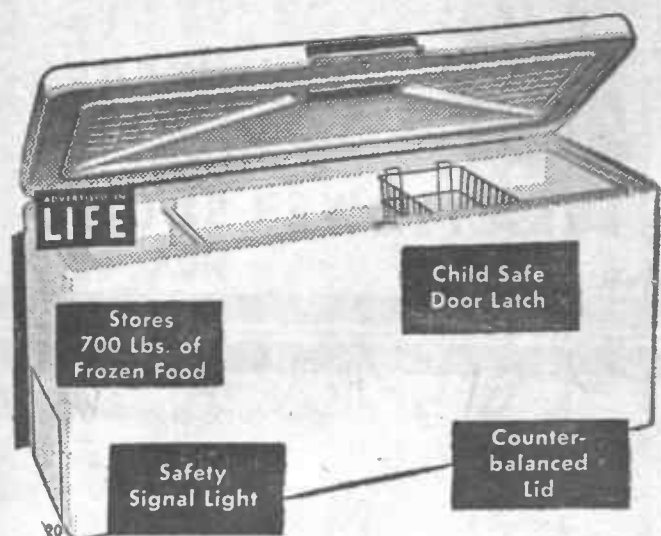
