SCHOOLS OPENED FOR CONSTRUCTION

BURNSVILLE, TISH. SCHOOLS

Seven Contractors Offer Proposals for Erecting Buildings For Two County Attendance Centers

Contractors offered sealed proposals for the construction of two school attendance centers in Burnsville and Tishomingo. The proposals were opened Tuesday morning at 2 o'clock in the county court room in the presence of the Board of Education and a number of interested citizens.

Sealed bids for the two centers are as follows: Construction Co. that firm's bid being \$312,000; Lashlee Rich Lumber Co. of Humboldt, Tenn., \$352,164.00; D. F. Lambert of Belmont (bidding only on the Tishomingo school), \$143,982.00; E. W. Riley Construction Co. of Fulton, \$342,920.00; The Whitaker Co. of Tupelo, \$358,144.00; Truitt Stockton of Corinth, (bidding only on the Burnsville school), \$180,000.00; and J. E. Staub of Fulton, \$354,675.00.

No contract was let or recommended by the Board of Education until the proposals from all the contractors exceeded the funds available for each of the schools. However, negotiations are underway with Kimberly of Iuka, lowest bidder on the Burnsville school as a single job, and with Lambert of Belmont lowest bidder on the Tishomingo school as a single job, to attempt to bring the contractors within the allotted money for each of the respective buildings.

Actual building funds available for the construction of the Burnsville school is \$157,301.00, and for the Tishomingo school an amount of \$130,425.00 has been allocated; this figure including the building of a gymnasium.

After an agreement is reached with the contractors, the Board of Education will send all contractors' bids, along with the bid accepted, to the State Educational Finance Commission in Jackson for approval.

SURVEY BEING MADE FOR BRIDGE ACROSS RIVER AT PICKWICK; PAPER MILL PRACTICALLY ASSURED

Engineers for the Tennessee State Highway Department for the past two weeks have been making a survey west of Pickwick Dam for a proposed bridge across the Tennessee River. William Suter of the Tennessee Department of highways states that he will make an estimation of the cost of the project when the survey crews complete their work.

Also, TVA engineers are making an estimation of the cost involved and the feasibility of opening a roadway across Pickwick Dam. Either of the two causeways would greatly expedite traffic between Tennessee and Mississippi. The only convenience afforded at this time is a ferry boat that plies across the river below the dam during daytime hours only; or, a person traveling north may go through Shiloh park, an increase of approximately 25 miles between Iuka and Savannah, Tenn. With the completion of a bridge across the river near the dam, north and south traffic would be greatly increased and citizens in the eastern part of Mississippi and in the western part of Alabama would realize a greater convenience for north and south highway travel. Mississippi Highway 25 would be one of the principal arteries leading to the new bridge from the south and officials estimate that through-traffic would increase a minimum of 400 cars daily.

The company, this week, purchased 1500 acres which it has had under option for over two years. It also has extensive holdings of woodland in Tishomingo county and in Colbert county, Ala. It owns more land in this county than in any other political subdivision. The mill, when in full production, will produce 500 tons of liner board (cardboard) daily and will use 1,000 cords of wood each day. Land owned in this county is to produce a supply of wood for the mill. The company will also buy pulpwood from county farmers. At peak production the mill will employ upwards of 1,000 men at the mill and in the woods.

Plans are almost complete for right-of-way for a railroad spur from Counce, Tenn., to Corinth, joining with the Illinois Central mainline in that city.

Total investment of the company, including mill and woodland, will be over 40 million dollars.

Preliminary surveys of possible bridges across the river at Pickwick come as a result of efforts of citizens of Tennessee and Mississippi toward aiding in the location of a pulp and paper mill on the Tennessee river two miles below Pickwick dam at a site just north of Counce, Tenn.

Officials of Tennessee Pulp and Paper Co. state that location of the plant at Counce is more practical since it is the best location to gain the proper flow of water, also the location is favorable for rail facility connections.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL SUBVERSION BY SPENDING

The summer vacation time is past, but Americans are still on a long vacation from reality. They have been on this vacation for years, and not yet has the nation paid the first installment on the bill for its playboy activities.

The long vacation, which will surely prove so costly to the republic in the decades ahead, began at the end of World War II. In 1945, American might was the measure of strength in the World. Devotion to the ideals of the republic was demonstrated in the willing sacrifices of soldiers, sailors and marines. The enormous capacity of our free enterprise business system had humbled totalitarianism. In all things and all ways, the United States led the world.

Today, after an orgy of folly, much of the glory has departed. The realities facing the nation, in a world in which communism is a giant force, are ignored and many of our so-called leaders offer nothing save glittering platitudes.

Somehow our free institutions, which enabled us to win battles from Normandy Beach to win Jim, have been smothered. We need to look at the hard facts. We need to see that the forces of collectivism have grown immensely powerful abroad and, what's worse, at home. We shall not regain our full strength and our old freedom until we wake to this reality.

Such weakness and loss of freedom that we suffer is the result of the efforts of native collectivists, the Dealers, the "liberals" their power by placing crippling restrictions on the forces of freedom and our free economic system. The Dealers are the hidden socialists who profess to believe that if government becomes tremendously strong it will be used for idealistic ends.

But the fact is that power corrupts. The last 13 years of American history demonstrates that "Liberals" in the State Dept., advocates of "agrarian revolution" as they called it, helped pave the way for a communist victory in China. Free enterprise ideas of foreign trade have been buried under international agreements that make trade a government-directed activity. Both major political parties became infiltrated, at the national level, by men who are not committed to the Constitution. Conservatives have been driven out of Congress and denied a hearing in national magazines. The sickness of socialism has spread into our educational system and even into our churches.

The weakening of this country, the assault on free enterprise and other free institutions, has been achieved with funds supplied by the taxpayers. We have been paying through the nose to have our freedom tampered with by bureaucrats who reject individualism. Our foreign policy has been surrendered to an international organization. The President asks that our money be given away by hired agents of an 81-nation body.

It is time for conservatives in the United States to break through the conspiracy of silence and accepted opinion. It is time for patriotic citizens to protest as they have never protested before against using our money to bribe wash us on domestic and foreign issues. We don't need any costly cultural exchanges with a nation to whom culture is a propaganda device. We don't need to pay the bills for organizations that attack capitalism and endorse us. We don't need to underwrite nations that scorn our ways.

More than that, we need to tighten control over spending in our own nation. Too much money has been the undoing of our own government. The collectivists who exert such a strong power over the shaping of ideas in the U. S. could not exist if the bureaus in which they are harbored were eliminated by Congress. We need men in government at every level who will struggle against spending that

makes citizens and property-owners increasingly dependent on the generosity and subject to the controls of big government.

If we are to have a free government, the sheer size of government must be reduced until it can be controlled. The way to reduce the size is to return legitimate functions of government to the states and simply eliminate the unnecessary functions that the Dealers and One-Worlders have given it.

The danger in the government's abuse of the spending power is that it makes citizens dependent and fearful. And a citizenry that is weak and dependent is a citizenry ripe for collectivist rule. This is the situation that the communists is a citizenry sought. They have actively worked to achieve this by agents of subversion. It is time for Americans to bear in mind that wild spending is an instrument of Soviet subversion—a step on the road to defeat and ruin.

AN ORDINANCE BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI, ANNOUNCING THE INTENTION TO LEVY A ONE HALF OF ONE PER CENT (1/2 OF 1%) CITY SALES TAX IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE CITY SALES TAX ENABLING ACT, CHAPTER 114, LAWS OF EXTRAORDINARY SESSION OF 1955.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Tishomingo, Mississippi, in regular meeting assembled, that, pursuant to and as authorized by Chapter 114, Laws of Extraordinary Session of 1955, it is the intention of the governing authority to impose and levy, effective on and after the first day of November, 1958, for the benefit of the city of Tishomingo, Mississippi, upon all persons engaged in any of the businesses taxed by Section 2c, 2d, and 2f of Chapter 119, Laws of 1934, as amended, or as may hereafter be amended, an additional tax of one-half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) on retail sales or gross income, except in the case of sales of industrial gas and electricity the rate shall be one-fourth of one per cent (1/4 of 1%), but not to include that derived from sales of whole sale under said Sales Tax Law or exempt thereby.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in a local newspaper having general circulation in the municipality, and posted in three (3) public places for at least twenty-one (21) days in compliance with Section 1 (c), Chapter 114, Laws of Extraordinary Session 1955.

SECTION 3. That if not less than twenty per cent (20%) of the qualified electors of said municipality shall file with the Clerk of the municipality before the first day of November, 1958, a petition requesting an election on the question of the levy of the tax herein mentioned, then and in that event such tax levy shall not be made unless authorized by a majority of the votes cast at an election to be called and held for that purpose. If such election is held and said tax levy is authorized, then the proposed tax levy shall, by the final levying ordinance, be made effective and after the first day of the month next succeeding the date of such election.

SECTION 4. That immediately upon approval of this Ordinance of intent a certified copy thereof be forwarded to the Chairman of the State Tax Commission by the Clerk of the municipality.

SECTION 5. The Ordinance was read and considered Section by Section and then as a whole. Alderman H. C. Nichols moved the adoption of the Ordinance, duly seconded by Alderman A. W. Dean. The vote was taken by the Mayor with the following result:

It is news when anyone takes a liability or something unproductive and turns it into an asset or something that is productive.

This is being done by some soil conservation district cooperators in Tishomingo county.

Old ditches grown up in briars, weeds, and bushes have been converted into beautiful grassed, or vegetated waterways.

These waterways produce good hay. They are used as turnrows and as field roads to some extent. However, their main purpose is to drain the water off the field slowly, and without erosion to the land.

Those of you have traveled south on highway 25 to Tishomingo may have noticed the field south of Mr. George Blissitt's house, immediately south of Midway.

This field is owned by Miss Gertrude Blissitt of Tishomingo and has about three acres of vegetated waterways in it.

Recently these waterways were mowed for hay. Unfortunately, the rains came at the wrong time, and probably ruined part of it.

Mr. Robert Epps of Belmont had better luck. He harvested approximately 3 tons of fine hay from his waterway that drains 40 acres back of his house.

Where there was once a deep narrow ditch, that made tractor cultivation dangerous, is a carpet of green vegetation in a shallow depression. "I can drive my tractor or across this waterway or use it for a turnrow now," said Mr. Epps. "It has made my farm safer too." Those of you who know Pat Epps remember the tragic accident he had. His tractor tipped over and crushed his leg.

Pat's friends are glad he recovered and that he can now drive with safety his tractor and cut hay from an area, which was once unsightly, unproductive and dangerous, on his father's farm.

Passenger Trains Doomed

The government has just completed a study which predicts that the railroad passenger train will soon join the horse and buggy as a relic of the past.

Passenger trains, says the Interstate Commerce Commission, are doomed. This is saddening news to those of us who thrill to the moaning whistle of the passenger locomotive as it speeds through the night.

The Commission, however, has concluded in a preliminary study that steadily declining passenger traffic will reduce the railroads to hauling only freight within the next dozen years.

"Unless," the report concludes, "some new unforeseen development occurs, parlor and sleeping car service will have disappeared by 1965 and coach service will vanish five years later."

Just as automobiles put the horse and buggy out of business years ago, they now are doing the same to railroad passenger cars. The airplane, too, is taking an in-

creasing number of customers away from the railroads.

Railroad Red Ink

The ICC study reveals that the railroads operated their passenger service last year at a loss of \$113.6 million. The deficit for this year is estimated at \$140 million.

"None of the suggested means of reducing the deficit, such as revision of labor agreements or lower taxes, can be considered promising," the report says.

Between 1947 and 1956 the railroads' share of intercity passenger business dropped from 13.6% to 4%. This year, it is estimated, that will shrink to about 3 per cent and, within 5 years to about 1 per cent.

During the 10-year period between 1947 and 1956 the percentage of passengers carried between cities in private automobiles increased from 78.6 per cent to 88 per cent. The airline share jumped from 1.7 per cent to 3.6 per cent, more than doubling. The motor bus percentage dropped from 6.8 per cent to 3.6 per cent.

Fewer Passenger Trains

Railroads must have permission from the ICC to change their rates or reduce passenger service. The preliminary report, which has not yet been formally adopted by the Commission, makes several recommendations for easing the burden of railroads.

It recommends that the roads be allowed to discontinue unprofitable trains more rapidly than in the past. The result would be to deprive many towns and small cities of railroad passenger service.

Another recommendation is that the 10 per cent tax on railroad passenger tickets be repealed. That is a proposal which Congress debated last summer but took no action.

Still another proposal is that the railroads be exempted from state and local property taxes. The report, however, concludes that this probably is a futile suggestion because "the railroads are defenseless against the tax assessors who seem bent on killing the goose that lays the golden egg."

Planting Legumes In Bermuda Sod

If Bermuda is not too heavy, white clover does well with it. Also Crimson Clover does well on hillside interplanted in Bermuda.

One of the best plants to use on heavy Bermuda sods, especially on bottom land, is wild winter peas. The wild winter peas can come up

and survive in heavy Bermuda where other legumes, particularly clovers, have died out.

Winter peas will volunteer back each year and get through even if the Bermuda is not grazed or clipped off.

You can plant the winter peas two ways: Sow them out on top of the ground and get a slow stand. Seeding rate for this method of planting is 50 to 75 pounds per acre.

Or you can plant the wild winter peas with a sod seeder and get a good stand the first year using a seeding rate of only 35 pounds of seed per acre.

Remember no legume does well without potash and phosphate.

Orchards

If you did not use the DDT spray method of controlling peach tree borers in your orchard, now is a good time to use the ethylene dichloride method.

If you have made your applications of the DDT spray, check the trees and if you find any sign of borers, use the ethylene dichloride.

If you are planning to plant some new fruit trees, now is the time to check on varieties you want, to select and prepare the site and to make arrangements for getting the trees.

Corn Marketing

This has been an exceptionally good year for corn producers. For growers to get the best price for their corn, marketing must be spread over a long period of time. If corn is selling for less than \$1.25 per bushel, think about storing it on your farm or putting it in the government loan.

Better yet, think about how much more you would get for your corn if you feed it to livestock on your own farm—it may bring \$2.00 a bushel or more marketed through livestock.

New Variety Of Crimson Clover Reseeds Well

A new reseeding crimson clover variety, named Chief, has been developed at the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Superior to other crimson clovers in several respects, Chief is the result of a long range breeding program conducted by Dr. H. W. Bennett at Mississippi State University.

Chief is a hard-seeded variety and this is the trait which enables it to reseed itself year after year. Soft seed absorb water and germ-

inate so early that the seedlings die of heat and drought. Chief's hard seed coating delays germination until fall when good volunteer stands are obtained.

Dr. Bennett bred this trait into Chief through years of selection. He began by soaking large masses of common clover seed for three days and then discarding all that were swollen. He planted the water-resistant seed and from the harvest again selected seed by the soaking method. This process was repeated until he had fixed a high percentage of hard seed. Then he began selecting for other desirable traits.

Chief has small seeds, providing more plants per pound of seed. Compared to other crimson clovers it has greater seedling vigor, more cold tolerance, and the ability to produce equal or superior forage and seed yields especially on the heavier soils. The plants are large with deep green color and a high dry matter content. They withstand defoliation well which means more grazing with less danger of reducing seed for harvest or reseeding.

The complete description of the new variety is published in the October issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College. While seed are not immediately available for distribu-

tion, the Experiment Station expects to be able to fill a limited number of requests with next summer's harvest, or about June 1959.

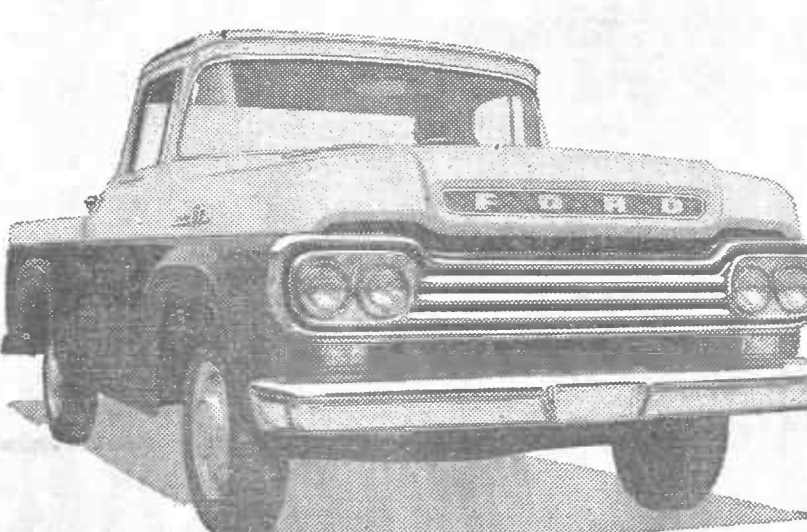

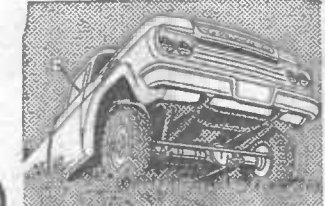

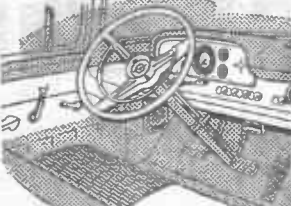
