Loan Rate For
'58 Corn Crop
Is Announced

\$1.12 Per Bushel
For No. 3 Or Better;
Gov't Assistance Offered

The final loan rate for 1958 crop of corn has been announced by the Department of Agriculture and J. R. Flault, Chairman of the Mississippi State ASC Committee, states that the 1958 support rate for corn in all Mississippi Counties is \$1.12 per bushel for corn grading No. 3 or better. This is a decrease of 28 cents per bushel from the 1957 support rate, however, premiums and discounts for other grades are the same as for the 1957 crop. Price support on corn will be carried through warehouse storage and Farm Storage Loans and Purchase Agreements.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL FOR SOUND SCHOOLING

The talk about the possibilities of a genuinely private system of schools, now being heard in several Southern states, is encouraging to believers in sound education. Aside from whatever merits private schooling may have in the South's present situation, education in private schools is substantially better than public education.

George E. Sokolsky, the distinguished newspaper columnist, recently extolled the merits of private schooling. He pointed out, for example, that the first schools in this country were private schools. The founding fathers of the American Republic received their education in schools that hadn't a penny of public support. It is a fact that in hundreds of communities across this nation parents pay double in order to provide their children with the advantages of private education, though they pay tuition to a private or church school, they also pay the school taxes paid by parents who send their children to the public school.

Private schools have many advantages. Classes are likely to be small, with a resulting increase in supervision. Discipline frequently is stricter in private schools than in schools where an occasional application of the hickory stick is prohibited by state law. In private schools, students may receive instruction in religious principles—an essential feature of education usually barred in public schools of today.

The most important advantage of a private school is its freedom from outside dictation. Teachers in private schools are not required to subscribe to any educational or public philosophy other than the school accepts as worthwhile. The directors of private schools are not required to admit students they do not think will contribute to the work or the institution. Private schools are free to discriminate against poor training, bad character, or whatever they deem undesirable. Public schools, which are required to admit all students in a particular area, cannot screen applicants.

Of course, public schools have been very satisfactory in many areas. Such value as they have had has stemmed from the independence of school boards. The Southern states, while handicapped in years past for money to build school structures, frequently had schools which were close to their communities. School consolidation in recent years, while it has resulted in new buildings of glass, brick and steel, has also resulted, in some areas, in building up an education bureaucracy that lessened strict attention to fundamentals & increased attention to education "frills." Now comes the federal government to interfere with the local operation of schools. Such interference means, at the very least, a lowering of standards in public schools and an end to local control that was their one claim to being a valuable social institution.

If public support should be removed from the public schools in some Southern communities, the result might be improved instead of worsened education. After all, the Southern states are rich in private and church-supported schools on all levels. There isn't a single Southern state that hasn't at least one outstanding private or church-supported college. Such collegiate institutions frequently are pace-setters for public education on the university level. The same thing holds true on the high school level.

For several years, thinking Southerners, eager for improved education, have been questioning whether they have been getting a dollar's worth of education for a dollar of school taxes. Education, after all, is a matter of competent teachers of good moral character instructing alert, disciplined youngsters.

Public spending for "education" has soared in the South in recent years. Has learning soared? There seems little justification for answering "yes." A wise people, concerned for education and public thrift, will give the merits of private education a long and thoughtful examination in these difficult times.

Soil Conservation And Profit From Double Duty Land

By Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist USDA-SCS

Messers Parish, Epps, Williams, Armstrong and Fowler believe in double duty land use.

These gentlemen, all good farmers, live about two and one half miles northeast of Belmont.

It is a beautiful sight to drive through this section of the country in the very early spring and see field after field of green and luscious small grain.

As soon as the crops are harvested in the fall these landowners, all Soil Conservation District Co-operators, seed down their fields to small grain and vetch. These crops are grazed during late winter and early spring then turned into the soil as a green manure crop.

Then cotton or corn is planted back on these fields. This has been a common practice followed by these farmers for years. Cotton yields from these fields average a bale to one half bales per acre and corn from 40 to 80 bushels.

This land is being used continuously. It grows crops winter and summer and is becoming more productive through intense use and high fertilization.

The secret of their success is keeping the land continuously profitable.

The Maine

Story

Republican party officials with whom we talk are speculating this week whether the story of what happened in Maine on Sept. 8 will be repeated all across the country on Nov. 4.

If it is, they concede, there will be a Democratic landslide of proportions not seen since 1936. They are banking, however, on Republican candidates, having learned a lesson from the Maine election in which Democrats retained the Governorship and picked up one Senate and one House seat.

Most Republican candidates for Congress were given a confidential report from the Republican National Committee shortly after the Maine election. The "fact sheet" on that election was prepared for the GOP Committee.

The report is notable for its frankness in analyzing the Maine vote and describing how elections

are won, and lost. Like a man who has just been hit by a speeding truck, the first question is: What happened?

"The difference," explains the report, "was the outstanding political work of organized labor in the textile, shipyard and paper pulp towns of Maine. The pluralities piled up in the relatively handful of labor stronghold precincts borders on the fantastic."

How were such tremendous majorities piled up? The report asked the question and then proceeded to answer it.

"Organized labor commenced its operations in Maine early last spring. Headquarters were set up by a top COPE organizer from Washington and by the Democratic Mayor of Hoboken, N. J. As labor's plan began to develop, the strategy called for at least two organizers in every labor precinct. Some 230 organizers were said to have been assigned to the state.

"Well-organized teams directed a campaign of TV shows, radio talks, wide-spread distribution of literature, chain letters, personal contacts and telephone calls."

The point which the GOP was seeking to drive home was that if you want to win elections you have

to reach people and influence them with convincing arguments. Democrats did that in Maine.

A Democratic-organized labor alliance, similar to that in Maine, has been active in most states this fall. The question that bothers GOP headquarters is: Will it be as effective?

For 1960 and afterward the activities of organized labor raises serious questions. Not all union members are Democrats, yet organized labor support is almost entirely for Democratic candidates. Will the Democratic Party become the Labor Party?

The farm vote, though growing smaller, may still be the decisive vote in close elections, and in enough districts to determine the political complexion of Congress. But there is no organized political effort by farm organizations comparable to that by labor.

That is why there is talk now among Republican leaders of an effort to persuade farm organizations to forget some of their differences and become as cohesive a political force as organized labor.

County Agent news

Cattle Lice
With the coming of cooler weather, lice are beginning to build up in numbers on cattle.

Unless controlled, lice will cost you money. They suck blood, weaken animals, and greatly reduce gains and milk production. Controlling lice is a cheap insurance.

Several methods of lice control on cattle are available. Check with your county agent for information on the method best suited to your farm.

Fertilizing Clover Areas
Many clover areas have faded out because the plant food gave out. Many of these can be brought back to good clover production by simply adding potash and phosphate. If you haven't fertilized

your pasture in the past 2 or 3 years, I suggest you do so this fall.

Strawberries
Late October or early November is the recommended time to plant a new strawberry patch. Around 10 days before planting, apply six to eight pounds of a complete fertilizer for each 100 feet of row. Mix it well with soil.

At planting time, set new plants a foot apart on three to three and a half foot beds.

Recommended varieties for use here in the county are—Blakemore, Pocahontas, Dixiland, Allbritton, Massey or Klondike.

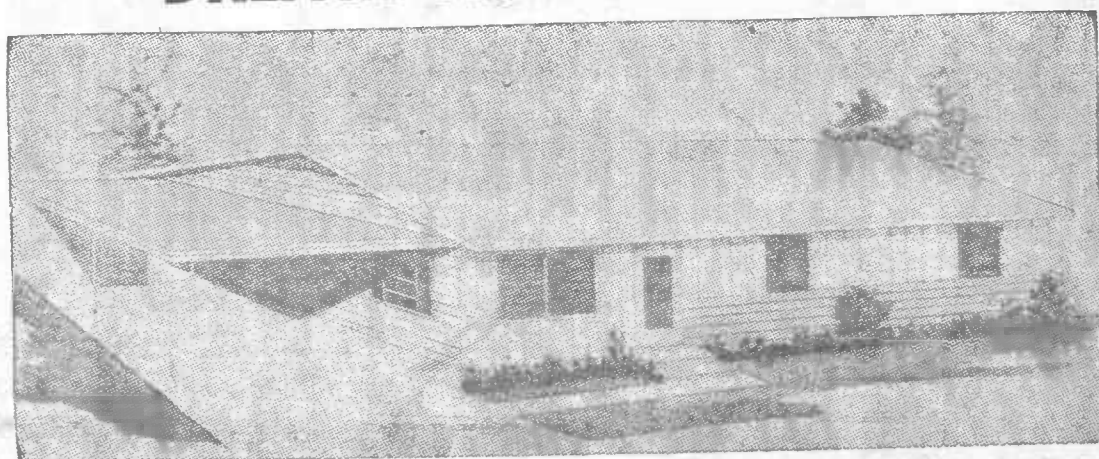

HOME AGENT NOTES

Green . . . Gold . . . red . . . Creamy white . . . whatever your favorite color and flavor, you're almost certain to find a vegetable to fit your taste.

Many of them are rich with vitamins and minerals, too. You and

your family need a raw vegetable as carrots, lettuce, celery, cabbage, every day.

As a skillful, good cook, you will cook your vegetables to keep all these valuable nutrients. Some rules you'll likely observe are:

Save the Vitamins

Trim sparingly such greens as cabbage and head lettuce. Those dark outer leaves are rich in iron, calcium and vitamins.

Cook potatoes in their skins to start such dishes as hash-browned potatoes or potato salad. Jackets keep nutrients in.

Cook vegetables quickly and serve them hot. The longer you let vegetables stay in the heat and the more vitamin C they lose.

Use as little cooking water as possible and save the liquids. These and liquids from canned vegetables

contain vitamin C, and B vitamins and iron which escapes into the water. Use any left-over liquids to flavor soups and gravies.

Waterless Cooking
Any heavy aluminum pan with the right size tight-fitting lid can be used for cooking vegetables the "waterless way."

"Waterless" cooking simply means using an amount of water that will be evaporated by the time the vegetable is done. You must use moderately low heat to prevent sticking and burning.

Braising, baking and steaming also may be called waterless cooking.

Whatever method you use, these tips will help your vegetables turn out flavorful and tempting:

Vegetable Cooking Tips

Cut or peel fresh vegetables just before cooking.

Use as little water as possible.

Cook only until fork-tender.

Cook as fast as possible—start with boiling water.

Do not add soda to vegetables.

Serve immediately after cooking.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform
Sunday School Lesson
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Bible Material: Mark 1:14-39.
Devotional Reading: Luke 4:16-21.

Beginning Here

Lesson for November 2, 1958

THOUSANDS of Americans have visited Galilee. The very name has a glamorous sound. But at the time the events were occurring which lent the place its fame, now famous around the world, it had no glamor at all. It is a little region, no bigger than a county. At the time Jesus lived, it was a part, a very insignificant corner, of a great empire, governed by a politician named Herod with the title of "Tetrarch."

What we today might call a backwoods V.I.P. Dr. Foreman

People look at things differently nowadays. If Jesus had had a public-relations man, or somebody like a Hollywood agent, they would certainly have advised a start somewhere besides Galilee. "Everybody will think you have no background," they might have said. "When people hear you are from Galilee they will just say Oh. If you have any ambition for a career, Galilee is a pretty poor bottom rung on the ladder of success."

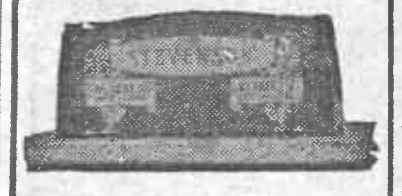
Confusion at the Crossroads
But Galilee was where Jesus was, and that is where he started. It did seem absurd. (Not to him, of course, but to any worldly-wise observer.) Galilee was not only an ordinary dusty unglamorous sort of countryside, dotted with towns and villages most of which have long been forgotten. Galilee was a crossroads, a melting pot. It lay along important highways. It was open to immigration, and there had been lots of it. There were not many Galileans who could boast of proud pedigrees to match those of the aristocrats up in Jerusalem. All sorts of people, with all sorts of ideas and ideals, all sort of customs, yes and all sorts of religions, had come and settled in Galilee. There were towns such as Tiberias, Herod's little back-country capital, that had been settled by so many Jews or half-Jews, that Jews

"In good and regular standing" would not be caught dead in them, and would not even trade in them. Again, what an unlikely region to start a new religion! Religions by the dozens flourished or faded as the case might be, in Galilee. One more religion, an so what? With all the clamoring voices of rival faiths, what chance did the voice of truth have in all that interference? Besides, you would expect the founder of a new religion to take his followers to some remote shrine, where he and they could meditate without being disturbed by newsboys and telephones. Of course Galilee had neither telephones or newsboys; but it had the equivalents of both. And there is precisely where Jesus started, in all the noise and jangle, the competition and confusion.

No Religious Background
People's minds in Galilee were not on religion. There were no great shrines there, no temples like the one in Jerusalem. Priests were few and far between. There was no great religious tradition. "Selling" religion to Galileans was not promising. Granted, the "pious" people around Jerusalem included a number of hypocrites. Still, why not start in Jerusalem where people were already interested, instead of starting cold, in Galilee? Once when Jesus was teaching, never more earnestly or spiritually in his life, one of these money-minded Galileans shouted to him from the crowd: Make my brother divide our inheritance with me! It is hard to get under the skin and next to conscience of people like that.

Galilee is Our Town
All the same, Jesus began in Galilee, and stayed with it almost to the end. He set thereby an example to us. For Galilee is our town. We could make a better beginning somewhere else, we think, but if Galilee is where we live, that is where we must begin to be Christians before we try it in Tokyo or Timbuctoo. A man who is a poor missionary in his home town will not be a good missionary at the ends of the earth. A church that supports foreign missions with enthusiasm but supports social injustice at home is not giving an effective Christian witness. A church that pretends to be Christian but is not interested in people; and if you cannot get interested in the unglamorous Galileans around you, you will not do much better elsewhere.

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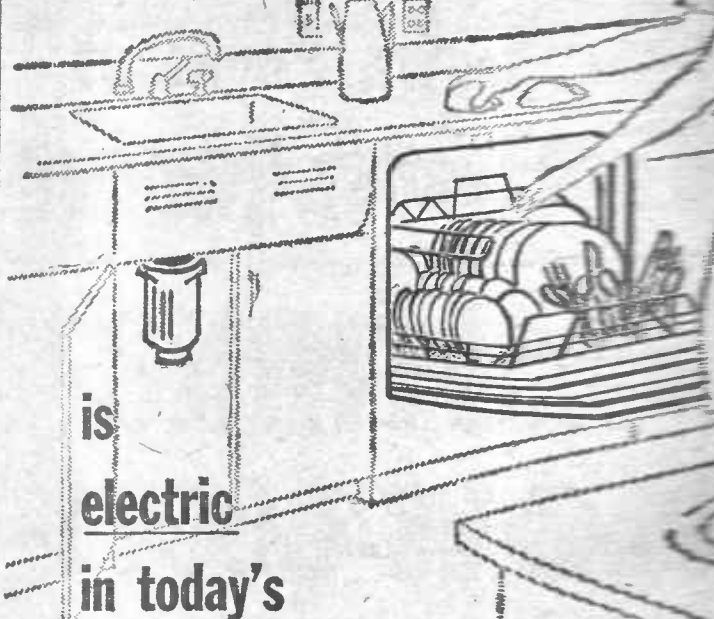

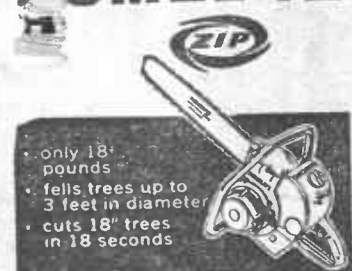
