Christmas Seal Sale Opens Friday Nov. 14

An American tradition, more
than half a century old, will be
renewed on Friday, November 14
with the mailing of Christmas Seals
to residents of Tishomingo County.

Over 2500 letters bearing the
colorful Christmas Seals were placed
in the mails on Wednesday by
Mrs. W. C. Hamilton, chairman of
the Tishomingo County Tuberculo-
sis Association. These letters were
prepared for mailing by members
of the Lucy Rowe Study Club spon-
sors of the annual sale in this county.

Proceeds from this year's Christ-
mas Seal Sale must do more than
maintain present tuberculosis con-
trol. It must expand efforts in
finding all unknown cases of tuber-
culosis lurking in this county. It
must help ex-tuberculosis patients
get back on their feet. It must ex-
pand its educational program.

More money must be put into med-
ical research. "We want the people
of this county to know what they
are paying for when they contrib-
ute to the Christmas Seal Sale,"
stated Mrs. Hamilton.

The Christmas Seal Letter is the
tuberculosis association's only ap-
peal for funds to support its year-
round program on local, state and
national levels. Of every dollar
contributed, 94 per cent remains
in Mississippi and 6 per cent goes
to the National TB Association.

The county association keeps either
50c or 66c of every dollar con-
tributed in the county.

Throughout the Seal Sale, which
will continue through December,
the Christmas Seal Sale Committee
plans to use every available means
to tell the Christmas Seal story.

Citizens of the county are urged
to give the letters their immediate
attention and return them as soon
as possible so that they will not
get misplaced during the Christmas
rush.

Youth Suffers Gunshot Wound

Jerry Kay In Corinth Hospital With Injured Liver And Kidney

Jerry Kay, 19 year old son of
Mr. and Mrs. Herman Kay, is re-
covering in Corinth hospital from
a gunshot wound.

Young Kay was at home alone
Monday afternoon about 2:30 when
by an undetermined manner, he
shot himself in the upper right
abdomen. First knowledge by
other people of the tragedy was
when he stumbled toward the Ross
Tucker grocery near which the
Kays have lived for several years.

He was seen by Mr. Tucker who
asked him what was wrong? "I've
been shot," Mr. Tucker and his daugh-
ter-in-law made him as comfortable as
possible and called an ambulance
and Dr. Lewis George who has
been Jerry's doctor for several
weeks, treating him for a case of
the flu. Upon the doctor's examina-
tion and orders he was sent to
the hospital in Corinth where an
operation was performed Monday
night.

The bullet from the .22 caliber
rifle entered the upper right side
of young Kay's abdomen, passing
through the liver and the right
kidney. A Corinth doctor who per-
formed the operation stated Wed-
nesday afternoon that he was com-
ing along alright.

Jerry's parents were in Gunters-
ville, Ala., where Mr. Kay has
accepted a position with a super-
market. Several weeks ago Jerry
entered a business school in Mem-
phis but for the past few weeks
has been home at different inter-
vals because of a minor illness.

Iuka Hi Annual Staff To Stage Beauty Revue Friday

The Annual Staff of Iuka High
School will stage its annual Beauty
Revue on Friday night at Howard
Memorial Auditorium, beginning

Paul Edmondson, vice-chairman
of the State Park Commission, an-
nounces that the State Building
Commission granted \$120,000.00 for
construction of a modern restau-
rant and dining room and a motel
that will consist of from 16 to 20
units on the state park site at
Cooke's Landing on Pickwick lake.

The allocation was made Tues-
day morning at the regular meet-
ing of the State Building Commis-
sion in its offices in Jackson. Ap-
pearing before the commission
with Mr. Edmondson was Senator
Flavous Lambert of Belmont. Gov.
J. P. Coleman, chairman of the
Commission, presided over the
meeting and suggested that the
above stated amount be granted

for the initial construction of pub-
lic facilities on the new park.

At the last meeting of the State
Park Commission, Vice-Chairman
Edmondson introduced a resolution
that the new park be named "The
J. P. Coleman State Park" in honor
of the Governor. The resolution
was unanimously adopted by all
members of the park commission.

First grant of money to be used
on the new park was \$25,000.00.
\$15,000 of this amount has been
used in clearing of the site, build-
ing boat docks, digging a water
well and installing a water system
and for the construction of a park
caretaker's home. These develop-
ments are already completed.

Mr. Edmondson states that the
Commission expects to be able to
ask for bids for construction of
the motel and restaurant within
60 days. And it is expected that
the buildings will be ready for use by
early summer.

The park proper will be opened
in the early spring for use by
the public, as the boat docks and
picnic areas including barbecue
facilities are already available.

"Roads leading to the new J. P.
Coleman State Park," Mr. Edmond-
son said, "will be the responsibility
of local people; also the streets
within the park. First District Su-
pervisor Herbert Biggs has already
completed a road almost to the
park."

"We are very grateful," Mr. Ed-
mondson said, "for the support,
aid and assistance of our Super-
visors and other interested citizens in
the development of this great pub-
lic facility on Pickwick lake. We
are sure that, in time to come, it
will be of inestimable value to the
county and the area," he said.

The J. P. Coleman park site is on
a tract of land that lies west of
Indian Creek and includes approxi-
mately 600 acres of a scenic wood-
ed area.

Thursday P.M. Wreck Injures 4

Occurred At 5:15 On Burnsville-Doskey Road; Charges Filed

A two-car collision that occurred
late last Thursday afternoon on the
Burnsville-Doskey road sent four
men to Corinth hospitals.

The crash occurred at 5:15 about
one-fourth mile north of the rail-
road at Burnsville. Spencer Thor-
n of Glen, driving a '48 model
Ford, received chest and head in-
juries. Charlie Thorne, also of
Glen and a passenger in the Ford,
received a broken right knee and
head injuries. He is 69. Alfred
Pruitt, of Burnsville, the other
passenger in the Ford, sustained
head and chest injuries. He was
unconscious for 2 hours after the
wreck.

Other vehicle involved in the
smashup was a '57 Ford pickup
owned and driven by J. C. Fields
of Doskey. He suffered 3 broken
ribs and injuries to his left leg
and arm. Fields was traveling to-
ward Doskey with the Thorne
Ford going to Burnsville.

Both the Thornes and Pruitt
were treated at Community Hos-
pital and Fields was carried to
the Corinth hospital.

Patrolmen Marlar and Pace in-
vestigated the accident. They state
that Fields will be charged with
reckless driving.

Winter Dairy Tips

Get your dairy herd ready for winter by selling unprofitable cows while beef prices are good. Here are the kind to sell: Cows in advanced lactation and soon to go dry, and not yet safe in calf; low producing cows; cows with diseas-

ed udders; cows with damaged udders; and those producing far below the herd average.

Feed plenty of hay and silage now and feed a balanced ration according to production. You can get more hay eaten by feeding it five or six times a day. In this way, cows eat more and waste less. Give the cows protection from cold, damp weather. Good shelter on bad days will pay big dividends and help hold up milk yields.

Water is the cheapest part of

milk... make it available to the cows 24 hours a day. Put your dairy herd on a business like footing and realize the profit you should make from an efficient dairy program.

Benefits of Liming

Liming the soil to the desired PH makes more phosphorus and potash available for growing crops and offsets acid forming effect of applied nitrogen.

Lime can furnish calcium and sometimes magnesium for plant growth. Lime helps increase the number of beneficial bacteria in the soil. Lime helps produce better legume stands and makes most other crops more vigorous.

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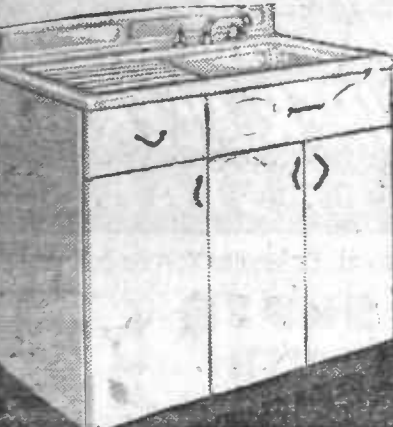

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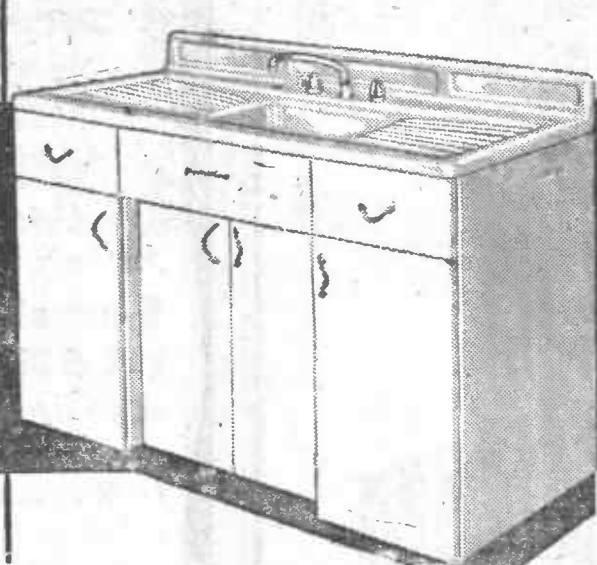

Body and Soul

Lesson for November 16, 1958

DRIVING through the typical American community, the visitor gets the impression that healthy people live here. All the persons he sees are able-bodied and active. But if you laid out on the courthouse lawn all the sick, the lame or the incapacitated, who belong to that community, you might think it a pretty sickly town. Nowadays we keep our sick folk carefully out of sight.

But is it different in the Orient, where people with all sort of diseases are to be seen on every street. It was different in Palestine in Jesus' time. One late afternoon, we read, they brought all the sick people in town (including some mentally ill) to the house where Jesus was staying, and collected around the door, a melancholy sight.

People are More Than Souls

That happened to be a Sabbath day, and Jesus had been (as we would say) to church and had taught there. He had also restored a man who had been under the influence of a screaming devil, if indeed he was not one himself; and more quietly and privately he had healed his host's mother. In the morning she had been too sick to go to church; after Jesus had cured her she was able to get a meal for the family. (Jesus' cures were not half-way starts.) You might think he would be tired, and probably he was; but this yard-full of sick people, out under the twilight sky, moved him to action.

He did not say, and he never said on any occasion of record, to the sick that their sickness was doing them good, just accept it! He did not say, "I am a physician of souls—my interest is in the spirit of man, not his body." And above all, he did not say, "All your pain and suffering, your broken legs, your ulcers, are not real, they are only mistakes in your mortal mind. Think you are well and you will be well; for pain and illness do not exist." Quite the contrary: Jesus was concerned for these people's physical health, he made cures of real diseases. For he was interested above all in people, and people are more than souls, they are souls-in-bodies.

Body Supports Soul

The Christian church today is coming awake to this fact. We knew it all the time, but now we are doing something about it. The great interest in healing which is now being shown by even the "old-line" churches, the growth of hospitals operated by the church, and the contribution the churches make (as in Boy Scout work, in playgrounds and in good-health instruction toward preventive medicine, are evidence of this.) A man who has been raising funds for a Christian hospital in the southern mountains writes, "The appeal... is meeting with almost unbelievable success, thanks to the Great Galilean whose spirit is the challenge."

One of the reasons why Christ first, and the church after him, have been interested in physical health is that if we are interested in the human spirit—as indeed we must be—we cannot afford to neglect the body as if it did not matter. Bodily illness affects the mind and the soul. A healthy body supports a healthy mind and soul.

Soul Supports Body

On the other hand, Jesus himself more than once showed that he knew this works both ways. If body supports soul, so soul supports body. Some doctor has calculated that more than half the patients in American hospitals, on any given day, would not be there if they had a different attitude toward life. A young man lay dying of pneumonia, away back B. P.—Before Penicillin—with a nurse on duty, when there was a knock at the door. No one thought the patient was conscious; but he was, and all set to die, till he heard the visitor whisper, "How is he?" The nurse answered, "He won't last till morning." The physical disease was not touched by those words, but the young man's spirit was. "I made up my mind I'd get well," he said... and he did. Long ago it was a proverb: "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine, but a broken spirit drieth up the bones."

HOME AGENT NOTES

By Roberta L. Warren
Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service

Be careful about waste as you prepare and serve meals. Five cents a meal each day adds up to \$54.75 in a year.

What Size Turkey?
I'm going to have 10 people for dinner Sunday, and I think I'll have turkey. Wonder what size turkey I ought to get?

Or you might be looking ahead to Thanksgiving and wondering what size turkey you need.

Figure this way: If you need 4 to 10 servings of turkey, get a turkey weighing from 4 to 8 pounds. For 10 to 20 servings, you need a turkey 8 to 12 pounds; 20 to 30 servings, 12 to 16 pounds; 30 to 40 servings, 16 to 20 pounds; 40 to 50 servings, 20 to 24 pounds.

This is based on a generous serving from each 3/4 to one pound of ready-to-cook turkey, if the turkey weighs less than 12 pounds. If it weighs over 12 pounds, you can get a good serving from each 1/2 to 3/4 pound of the ready-to-cook turkey.

If you have folks who like "seconds," consider that in deciding on the size turkey to get.

Fruit Trees
It's time to plant those apple, peach, plum or pecan trees you've been planning for your home grounds or orchard. November and December are fruit tree planting months.

Ask at the home agent's office for a copy of the latest issue of the Garden, Fruit and Flower guide,

which lists the recommended varieties for a number of fruits.

Plant Spring Flowers Now
Don't be one of those who make the mistake of waiting until spring to plant some of your favorite flowers. The seed of many flowers need to go in the ground in the fall. These include Queen Ann's lace, strawflower, pink, calendula, larkspur, verbena, poppy, phlox, sweet pea, pansy, snapdragon and calliopsis.

Perennials to be planted now are sweet william, forget-me-not, holly hock, foxglove and delphinium.

Everybody's hamburger will be the same size, if you use an ice cream scoop to measure meat. Scoop is ideal for this purpose and is easy to clean.

You can save time frying bacon by criss-crossing the slices and turning them all at once with a pancake turner. Cooks more at a time, too.

Easy way to mix flour and water is to beat the mixture with an egg beater. Use a blender if you're whipping up large amounts. For small amounts put in small jar, screw on top and shake vigorously.

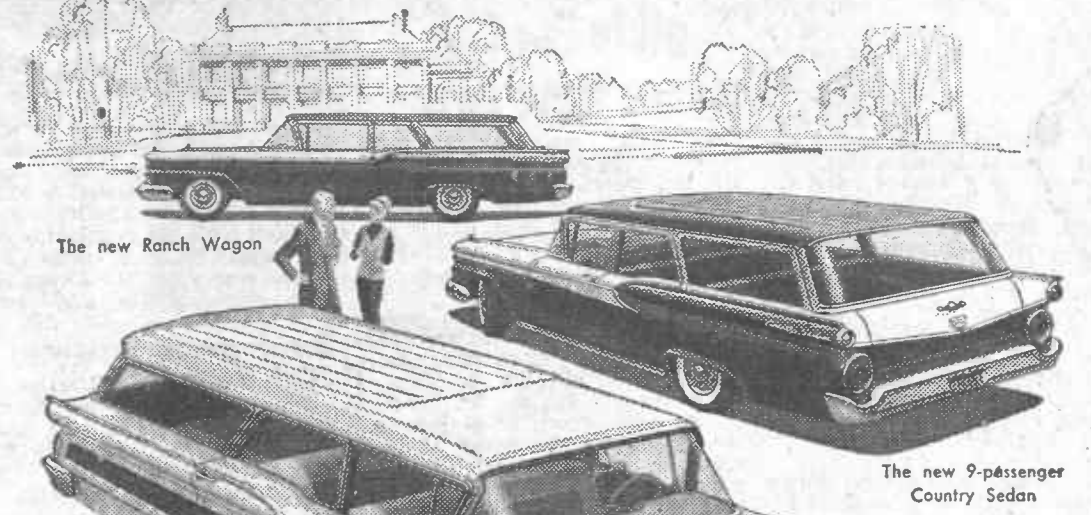

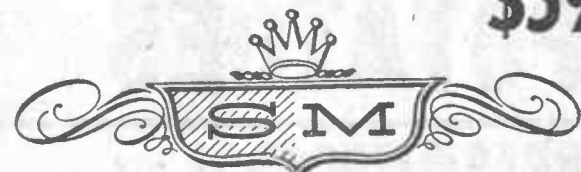

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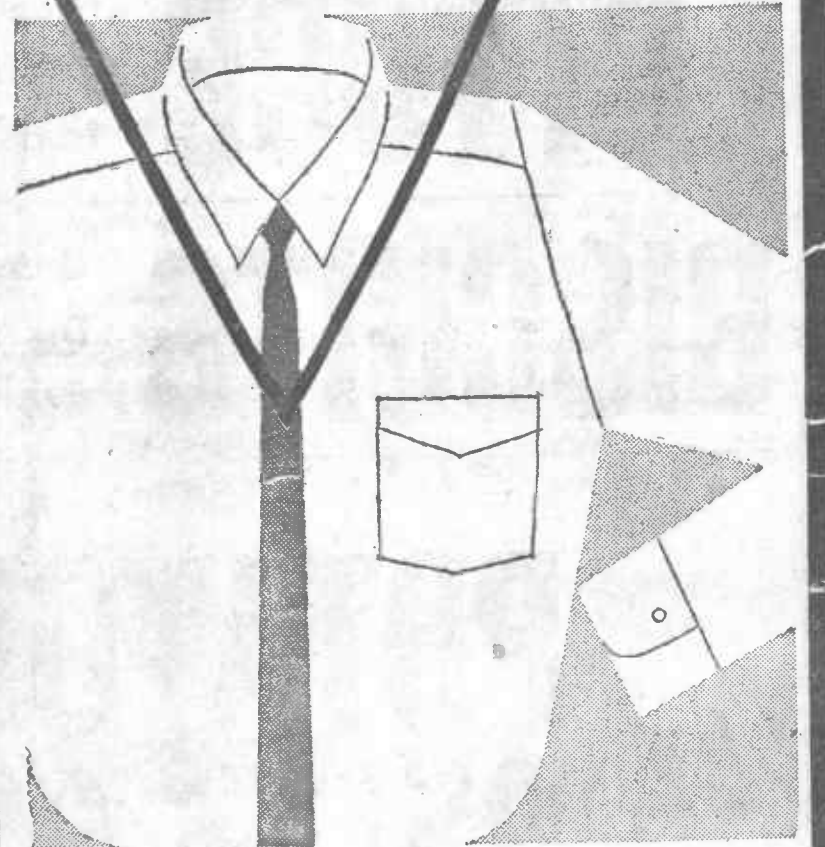

Many Children May Be Benefited From Social Security Under '58 Law

Children have for a long time been the persons who were likely to benefit most from social security protection. Here in Tishomingo County, about 175 children are now receiving benefits as the minor or disabled children of retired or deceased workers.

Now, with the 1958 amendments to the social security law, many more children here in the Iuka area can qualify for benefits. Formerly, a child living with a retired worker could also receive social security benefits, but only if he were the natural or step-child of the worker, or if he had been legally adopted for 3 years. The law provides now that a child who is adopted by a worker receiving retirement or disability benefits can also become entitled to payments immediately with the month in which he has been adopted. Without a doubt, there are many retired persons in this area who have the responsibility for the raising of orphaned or deserted grandchildren. Legal adoption can now mean social security payments to these children also, without a 3 year wait.

This change also affects minor or disabled children who were living with and dependent on a worker when he died. A child could not formerly qualify for benefits if he was not the worker's natural or step-child or had not been legally adopted. The child may now be legally adopted by the widow of the worker, even after the worker's death—if within 2 years, and thus qualify for benefits. But the child must have been a member of the worker's household at the time the worker died. Also, the child must not have been receiving regular contributions from any other person or from a welfare organization.

Next week I will discuss some other important changes in the social security law.

More Children Eligible For S S Under New Law

In another article in this newspaper, I explained the change in the law which makes many more children eligible for benefits. I mentioned that it is no longer necessary that a child be adopted for 3 years before he can become entitled to benefits. Today, I would like to tell you of another change in the law affecting children. This change applies to disabled children.

Under the old law, a disabled child was not eligible for benefits unless proof could be shown that the child was receiving at least one-half of his support from the parent upon whose social security record the child's benefit would be based.

Under the amended law, a disabled child is now considered dependent on a parent under the same rule as followed in the case of children qualifying for regular social security benefits. In other words, they do not have to prove that they are being supported by the parent.

During the last year there have been several claims in Tishomingo County for childhood disability benefits that had to be rejected because of lack of proof of dependency. These children, or their parents, should file another application promptly with the Social Security Administration, as they may be entitled to monthly benefits beginning with the month of September, '58. These applications may be filed with the representative of the Tupelo Social Security District Office who visits the Court House in Iuka each Monday afternoon.

BULK TANKS AND CANS COMPARED IN DAIRY STUDY

MISSISSIPPI EXPERIMENT STATION ECONOMISTS FIND BULK TANK SYSTEM CHEAPER WHERE LABOR IS CONSIDERED AS A COST ITEM

The old milk can and the newer bulk tank systems of cooling and storing milk on the farm were compared in a recent study by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station.

The study was based on the Noxubee Milk Producers' Association which changed from cans to the bulk system in the fall of 1956. Records and experiences of 41 producers were checked before and after the change.

Cost of cooling and storing milk under both systems was evaluated for ten levens of production, ranging from 20 to 200 gallons per day. When labor was not considered a cost item, cost for the can system was less than the bulk system at each level of production. However, when labor was included as a cost item, cost for the can system was consistently higher than for the bulk tank. Cost items compared included depreciation, interest on investment, repair, electricity, cleaning materials and labor. Greatest saving offered by the tanks appeared to be labor.

No significant differences in butterfat tests could be attributed to either system. Bacteria counts were more closely related to the producer than to the system used. In general, producers with high bacteria counts with cans also had relatively high counts after changing to tanks.

The investment required to make the change ranged from about \$1,500 to \$3,500 for direct-expansion tanks and about \$200 to \$300 less for ice-bank type tanks. Part of the investment was recovered through sale of cans, although as bulk tanks are installed on more Grade A farms, opportunity for this resale value may decline.

Dr. A. D. Seale, Jr., of the Agricultural Economics Department at Mississippi State University, has published results of the study in the November issue of Mississippi Farm Research. This publication is available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

Joe Grisham Does Good Job On Woodland

Mr. Joe Grisham, of Hubbard
Salem community, has done an ex-
cellent job of establishing and re-
leasing Loblolly pine on his wood-
land.

Two years ago Mr. Grisham set
about two acres of Loblolly pine
under a heavy growth of young
hardwood on steep hill land. He got
excellent survival, practically all
of the pine seedlings he set lived
and made some growth. This fall
Joe has cut the hardwood bushes
off this area and the pines are look-
ing fine.

Had these pine seedlings been
set and the hardwood left on the
land very few of them would have
ever grown out above these oak
and blackjack bushes.

The Soil Conservation Service
personnel recommends, as do all
the other agricultural agencies in
the county, that pine trees set
under hardwood should be released
by girdling of removing the hard-
wood the following year.

Plant pine under hardwood this
year, release them the next year.
Joe Grisham has proved that this
works in Tishomingo County.

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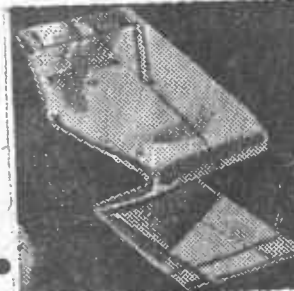

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL THE BUDGET IS RUNNING WILD

So far as sound budgetary procedure is concerned, it would not seem to make much difference any more whether the Democrats or the Republicans are in control of Congress. The majority membership of both parties appropriated the taxpayers' dollars recklessly and extravagantly during the past session, so much so that it is estimated, officially and unofficially, that the deficit for the current fiscal year ending next June 30th will amount to \$12.2 billion—the highest peacetime deficit in our history.

At the same time the groundwork was laid for spending at least as much, if not more, during the fiscal year 1960. Whether or not the nation's economic recovery will be such as to yield sufficient taxes to cut the deficit to \$6 billion, as is now estimated, is problematical.

But even so there will be no basis or room left for cutting taxes, a development that is quite necessary to get back once more on a sound economy. Whereas federal, state and local taxes thirty years ago took less than ten percent of the nation's income, they are now taking more than thirty percent—a level of taxation that is recognized by all sound economists as being a dangerous one. Tax cuts are badly needed to relieve the individual of the heavy burden of income, the increase in the cost of living; they are needed to allow expansion in industry and the creation of new jobs to relieve the present heavy unemployment. The possibility of such cuts, however, are now nowhere in sight—not on a sound basis.

Many people have been misled to believe that the big jump in spending for this fiscal year over last is for defense purposes, that all the increased spending has been to offset the threat of the Russian Sputnik scare, etc. That is by no means true. Only about twenty-eight percent of the increased spending was appropriated for defense purposes; the remaining seventy-two percent went for nondefense outlays. Every major nondefense spending category in the national budget will require more money this year than last!

Any sensible budgeteer, in order to balance a budget, will cut expenditures in less vital sections of the budget in order to offset what may seem to be very necessary increases in the vital categories. The last Congress completely ignored this sound precept of budget making, and thereby gave no regard to the present and future economic welfare of the nation.

Continuation of this attitude on the part of Congress will lead this nation in the course of time to the condition which France occupied last spring when it was definitely faced by bankruptcy within six months. What was their solution? The acceptance of a virtual dicta-

torship. Is that what we want to some day happen to us? This will happen—or worse—unless the people of this country fulfill the responsibility that goes with citizenship in a free nation, unless they quit asking more of their government than they are willing to pay for, unless they demand of their representatives in government that they quit promising everything to everybody and quit borrowing the money with which to fulfill their promises.

There are sound members of Congress. Congressman Leon Givins, of Pennsylvania, in the closing days of the last session, warned against the continuation of fiscal irresponsibility. "Certainly," he said, "we did not build our country on subsidy programs. America was built by hard work, thrift and frugality. Unless we change the trend I am quite certain we will end up with a bureaucratic Government overloading all phases of our economic and industrial life."

Congressman Keith Thomson, of Wyoming, chimed in by saying, "To meet this situation, we, as Members of Congress, must evidence 'backbone' instead of 'wish-bone'." Really what is most required is for individual Americans to realize what is being done "to them" instead of "for them."

There were other Members of like soundness, but theirs were "voices crying in the wilderness"; they were in the district minority. The one thing the American people should demand, above all others, of their representatives in Congress during the next session—of which ever party—is that they cut expenditures, not only in sufficient amount to balance the budget but in sufficient amount to cut taxes and balance the budget.
