SENSING THE NEWS

TIME TO RALLY

How to break the stranglehold radicals undoubtedly will have on the next session of Congress is a question every conservative ought to start considering right away—and this has nothing to do with political parties.

Make no mistake, the situation will be serious between now and the 1960 elections. All the wild spending schemes that were threatened in the last Congress but failed to pass because not enough votes were available, are likely to go through when Congress convenes. The country has just witnessed a radical sweep. Though the landslide didn't directly affect the South on November 4th, the South will feel shocks for months and perhaps years to come. Staunch defenders of free enterprise such as Senators Knowland of California and Bricker of Ohio were beaten by the massed power and propaganda of union bosses. In many ways, they fought the good fight for our way of life.

Conservatives shouldn't say, "All is lost." Those who lie down and quit in the face of adversity do not deserve to win. Sometimes it takes a reversal for a man or a movement or a country to realize the need for making a big effort. There will be blows ahead. Most probably Senate Rule 22, which guarantees unlimited debate, will be knocked down by the radicals. The result will be phony reform legislation that will be aimed at the Southern States. Congressional committees, of which outstanding Southern conservatives are chairmen, may be filled up with politicians who owe their election to Walter Reuther and his cohorts. Chances of getting a real labor reform bill through the next Congress, for example, seem virtually non-existent. Too many members of the incoming Congress will owe their election to the union bosses.

The nation can expect a spate of spending bills such as the Area Development Bill which failed to pass in the last session. This measure, killed by the House, would have had Uncle Sam go into the business of financing public utility works in local communities. One Washington observer has said it "covered everything from water troughs to opera houses."

It is very likely that more and bigger bribes will be offered in the way of federal bossing of cities and states—to a degree not known now.

Conservatives should not forget, however, that though radicalism may do a lot of damage, the country has survived other explosions of big government and the spending mania. For example, after years of New Dealism, the country returned a sound-thinking, conservative Congress in the year after World War II. Left-wingers in government and the Dealer press said "it couldn't be done." It was done.

A reversal of progress—and that's what the election means—should lead to reeducation to states rights and free enterprise. For the South, the months and years ahead should be a time of self-examination. Southerners should say to each other and to themselves, "Let's look at the realities! Let's team up with conservatives elsewhere in the United States."

This is still a conservative country, no matter what the vote totals are in certain states or how effective the union bosses were in crushing outspoken advocates of the right-to-work.

The conservatives are simply handicapped in that they are divided. If they get together, they can prevent the country from moving to the left.

Southerners surely are too smart to let their opportunities drift by

in a time of crisis. The future of the South and of the nation depend upon how conservatives rally together to resist the leftists who seek to spend the U. S. into totalitarianism and utter dependence upon the welfare state philosophy.

There is a traditional rallying cry of our nation that has always appealed to the courage of the people. It should be especially appealing right now to conservatives generally—"We have just begun to fight."

Farm Issues

Now that the election excitement has died down in Washington, farm issues are shaping up as one of the most important problems which the new Congress will face when it convenes in January.

Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson will insist that farmers be given more freedom to plant and market as they please. The new Congress will be equally concerned in "protecting" farmers from excessively high production and resulting low prices.

The most pressing farm problem which both Congress and Mr. Benson must deal is that of mounting surpluses. Government holdings of farm commodities may reach, and possibly exceed, \$10 billion by early next year.

The government is now spending more than \$4 billion a year in an unsuccessful effort to dispose of surpluses through (1) acreage allotments and direct payments to producers and (2) subsidized disposal of as much of the excess as possible.

Bank Flop

The billion dollar a year Soil Bank under which farmers have been paid to retire 25 million acres of land from production has failed to stem the rising tide of surpluses. The Soil Bank acreage reserve program is being discontinued after the year.

Total crop production this year is up any previous year by more than ten per cent. This record has been set with fewer acres in cultivation than any year since the 1920s, and by a third fewer farmers than there were 25 years ago.

The government is spending more than \$1 billion a year to cover losses and storage costs on surpluses. It is spending another

\$2 billion a year in financing surplus disposal, mostly through what amounts to a give-away program abroad.

Gigantic Stockpile

Our stockpile of wheat, corn, sorghum grain, soybeans and barley is at an all-time record high. Wheat supplies in October were more than two billion bushels; enough to fill two freight trains with their engines in New York and their cabooses in San Francisco. Farmers are harvesting a record 3.8 billion bushels of corn to add to an already record 1.5 billion bushels left over from previous crops. It would take five across-the-country freight trains to carry that much corn.

The next Congress must face up to the problem of how to stem that tide of excess production. It will find urban taxpayers pressing it for a good reason why the government should continue to spend billions of dollars a year on programs about which both farmers and city people complain.

Mr. Benson's proposal is simple: Ease government planting restrictions and lower price supports to the point where there will be a market for everything farmers produce. Lower prices, he argues, will result in increased exports and in new uses for farm products in this country.

Congress, in the past, has contended that this would drive prices so low that two million farmers would be bankrupt within three years. Mr. Benson retorts that it would be better to bankrupt two million farmers than to continue an unsound program.

The next Congress will be pressured, both by Benson and by city taxpayers, to reduce the cost of farm programs. That may be the big farm issue.

County Agent news

Winter Care of Hogs

Here are some tips that may help you more successful in your hog program during this winter:

1. Provide a shelter that is free from drafts—this is especially im-

portant when hogs are kept on concrete.

2. Avoid dusty quarters as dust encourages respiratory trouble.

3. Keep small pigs on concrete well bedded with shavings, straw or other bedding material.

4. Use heat lamp on suckling pigs. This will not only help prevent the little pigs from getting chilled, but will also help keep them from the show and reduce losses from the sow mashing the pigs.

5. Keep farrowing pens and the nursing unit clean. Disinfect these areas between litters.

6. Hogs, especially those under 150 pounds, being finished on concrete should have bedding to keep them from lying on the cold concrete.

7. Provide plenty of clean drinking water and remember, there is no substitute for proper nutrition.

Poultry Records Pay

It will pay you to keep simple but adequate poultry records. Record dates of all purchases, daily feed consumption, egg production, mortality and vaccination dates.

You will want to know the amount of feed needed to produce a dozen eggs.

Well-kept records make it possible to know the value of a quality poultry feed and provide a guide for you in improving your profits and efficiency.

Orchard Notes

Tree planting time is here. During November and December is the best time to plant peach, apple,

plum and pecan trees. Plant now, in early winter, you have a choice of better varieties, sizes of trees and usually prompt delivery.

For details on varieties to plant, how and where to plant them, consult your county agent.

Sod Seeding

This is an ideal time to do some sod seeding in sod area. Sodded areas have now stopped growing and planted now with small grains, they should make ideal spring grazing areas.

Use oats or wheat on sodded areas and ryegrass on clover areas. Be sure to put down fertilizer, and enough of it, when you plant. Then manage the sod seeded area and do not overgraze.

Fields With Established Waterways Should Be Terraced Now

Landowners having cultivated fields with established waterways should terrace them NOW.

As soon as the crops are harvested terrace lines should be surveyed and the new terraces constructed.

The first step in terrace construction is to plow the old terraces down and level the area where they were. If this is done first the actual job of surveying and constructing the new terraces will be made much easier, and a better job can be done.

By building terraces on the land in the fall or early winter the win-

ter rains will settle them. The following spring they can be plowed up, planted and cultivated.

The purpose of vegetated waterways are to drain the water off the land slowly. Before this can be done, the water from the field must drain into these waterways at the proper speed. This can be done by emptying correctly surveyed and constructed terraces on rows with proper fall into them.

There are soil conservation district cooperators, in Tishomingo County, who have gone to the trouble and expense of establishing good vegetative waterways in cultivated fields, but these same cooperators have not had this land terraced and the rows arranged to slowly drain off the water. It would be of great benefit to the land to do this.

Those who have established waterways and are interested in getting their land terraced should contact the local soil conservation service office for assistance.

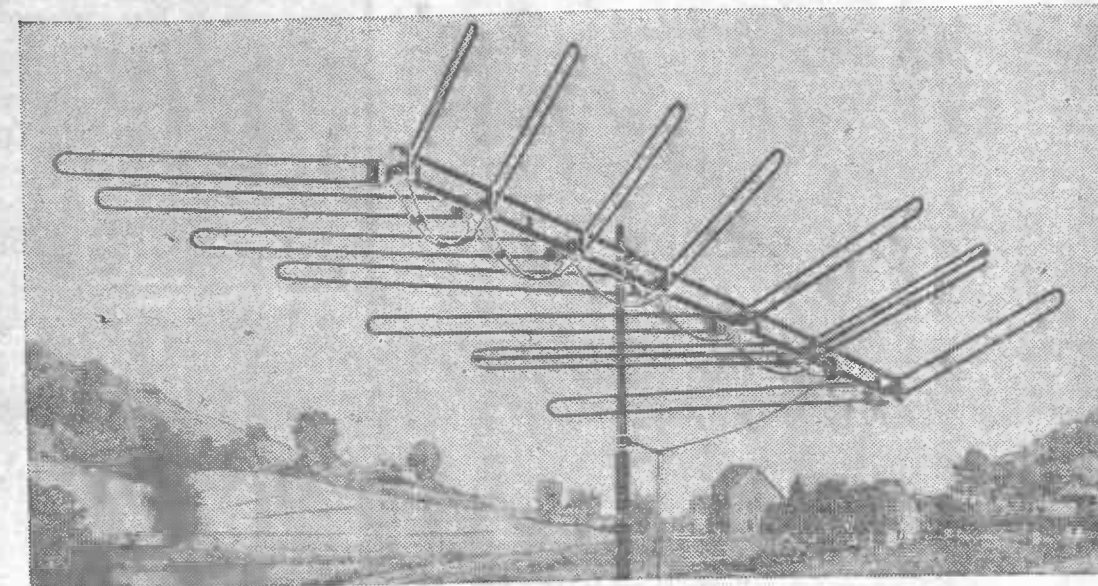

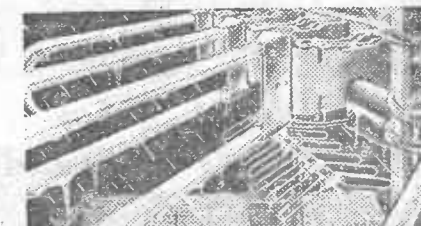

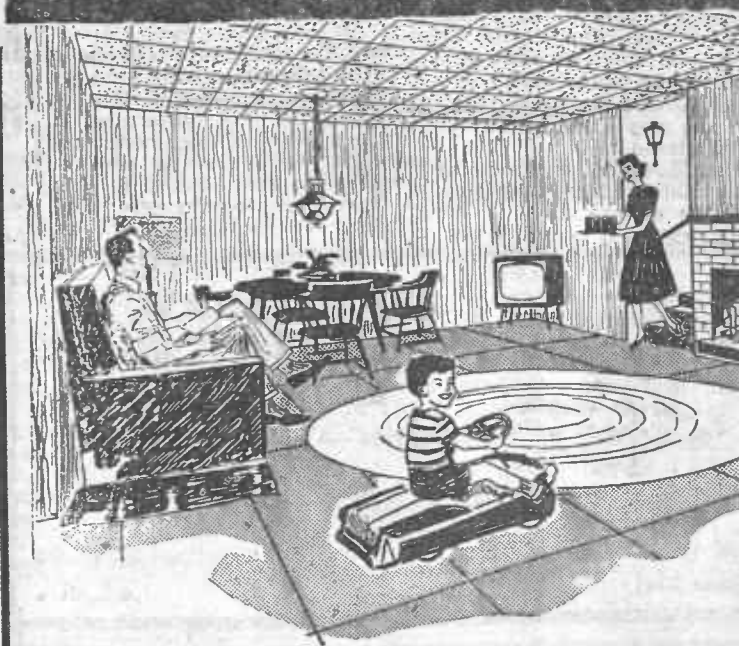

Negro Pedestrians Should Carry White Handkerchief In Hand At Night

The high frequency of night Negro pedestrian deaths has prompted Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough to urge Negroes walking along highways at night to carry white pocket handkerchiefs in their hands.

To date this year, 105 Negroes have been killed in traffic accidents in Mississippi. Many were pedestrians.

In urging Negro pedestrians to carry white handkerchiefs when walking along highways after dark, Commissioner Scarbrough cited a recent personal experience.

"When driving near Jackson one night recently, the headlights from my car reflected on a small white object several hundred yards down the highway. I realized immediately that the object was moving, and when I approached, closer, saw a Negro pedestrian wearing dark clothing walking down the highway carrying a white pocket

handkerchief in his hand as a signal.

"I considered this a smart man." The Patrol urges all pedestrians to walk facing oncoming traffic, to keep off the surfaced roadway wherever possible, and, if crossing the highway, to look both ways before attempting to cross.

Good pedestrian safety practices save lives.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Union Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Bible Material: Mark 2:1-3:6.
Devotional Reading: I Peter 4:12-19.

Opposing Jesus

Lesson for November 23, 1958

WE COMPLAIN about other people on account of their faults. Suppose we met a man without fault? We should probably go right on complaining. We can be very critical of other people's sins; but suppose we met a sinless man for once? We should probably not know it; for we would, by long habit, go right on carping and complaining.

This is not just imagination. That was precisely what happened to Jesus of Nazareth. Many wonderful stories cluster about him, but one of the most amazing facts is that he had enemies. You would think that surely when the Divine Love in human form "went about doing good," the welcome would be unanimous. But it was not.

Breaker of Patterns

We should not forget that Jesus did not die a natural death; he was murdered. And this not by some alley assassin, some mad crank. He was done to death by the forces of "law and order," by people high on the ladder of respectability. His opponents were not obscure persons from the criminal classes, they were people who had front seats in church. The murder on Calvary, for murder it was, like all events had its beginnings long before. What did Jesus do, what did he say, to induce solid and respected "pillars" of society to suspect, tear, hate him?

It was chiefly that he was a breaker of patterns. Those who disturb or even criticize other people's ways of life, ways of thought, always run into storms of opposition and abuse.

God on Our Streets

One of the familiar patterns that Jesus broke was theological, an idea about God. This idea-pattern was that God was far off, "high and lifted up," remote from the stirrings and scramblings of men. But Jesus said things, strange things such as forgiving the sins of a man who had not so much as opened his mouth to say "I repent," so that it sounded as if he were actually claiming to be equal with God. A God in heaven men could understand, or thought they could. But a God who walks on our street, who talks to shady characters and even eats with them? A God focused in one human personality? No, this could not be, though the theologians, the Pharisees... and the spiritual descendants of the Pharisees to this very day oppose Christ, and the high claims made in his name, for the same reason.

"Our Way of Living"

For one person who opposed Jesus on theological grounds there must have been many more who opposed him on social grounds. Many church people will permit their preacher, for example, to have any theology he pleases; right left or center. But let the preacher move just a trifle to the left socially, and his resignation is requested. Jesus experienced this. He broke through old social patterns. It was thought then, just as many think today, that men can be measured by the social class to which they belong; and that there should never be crossing of class lines. Jesus broke with these old social patterns. "A man's a man for all that" describes his attitude to men. He knew that individuals are far more important than their class-status. But for this completely democratic attitude to men, he was opposed... and still is.

If Jesus stirred opposition by his claims to deity and his ignoring of many established social patterns, he aroused real horror in some people by his fresh and free attitude to moral problems. His healings on the Sabbath Day were cases in point. No one had a higher regard for the law of God than Jesus did. But his critics confused the law of God with their own interpretations of it. Jesus on the other hand would not believe that moral problems can be settled by formulas, or that the formulas of yesterday are always and invariably right for today. Laws are good; but Jesus did not accept even the law of Moses as God's last word. Jesus' approach to every moral problem was to ask, in effect, What is this doing to people?

CHANGES IN SOCIAL SECURITY
By Hugh D. Tigrett, (District Manager of the Tupelo District Social Security Office)

For the past several weeks I have explained different changes in the social security law brought about by the 1958 amendments to the law. Today's article is the last of this series and I would like to just mention briefly all of the changes I have discussed during the past several weeks. The major changes are as follows:

1. A general benefit increase effective with the payment for January, 1959. This increase is automatic.

2. An increase in the taxable earnings base from \$4200 to \$4800 per year, accompanied by an increase in the tax contributions rate of 1/4 per cent each for employer and employee and 3/8 per cent for the self-employed person.

3. Removal of the requirement that a disabled worker must have worked 1-1/2 years out of the 3 years before becoming disabled in order to qualify for disability benefits or the disability "freeze".

4. Payments to dependents of disabled workers who are receiving a disability payment.

5. Monthly benefits to dependent parents, even though their son or daughter was survived by a widow or children.

6. Many adopted children previously ineligible can now qualify. If a child was living in the deceased worker's household as a member of the family, the surviving spouse can adopt the child and make him eligible for monthly benefits, even after the wage earner's death.

7. Length of marriage requirements have also been liberalized in many cases.

These are the recent major changes in the social security law. There are others. If you think that any of the changes may affect you, let me encourage you to get in touch with us. HOME AGENT NOTES

Ice cream can be stored satisfactorily for about one month in the home freezer... if it is firmly frozen and is protected from melting in transferring from the store to the home freezer.

... if it is stored at a uniform temperature of zero F. or below. When using any part of a carton, make sure to return the unused ice cream to the freezer before any of it thaws.

Ice cream you buy in ordinary waxed cardboard cartons will keep its quality longer in your home freezer if you overwrap it with heavy foil or other freezer wrap.

Fabric Fire Safety
You can use everyday household chemicals to make a solution in which to treat rugs, draperies or other fabrics that might be fire hazards in your home. The recipe was developed by USDA research-

ers. This treatment is good for ordinary cotton, linen and rayon, but not for acetate, nylon, orlon, other synthetics or crease-resistant fabrics.

Make a paste of 3 ounces (slightly more than 1/4 cup) of powdered boric acid and a little water. Dissolve this paste in 2 quarts of hot water. Then add 7 ounces of borax (slightly less than 1 cup) and stir till it also dissolves.

You may need to double or even triple the recipe for large items like draperies or rugs.

Be sure the fabrics or clothes you're going to treat are dry. Then soak them in the solution until they're thoroughly wet. If a fabric doesn't soak up water easily, add one teaspoonful of liquid detergent for each gallon of solution used.

If you use the spin cycle of your automatic washer to get out most of the moisture, be sure to rinse out the washer immediately afterward to remove deposits left from the solution. Dry the fabrics on a clothesline, and for ironing use only a moderately hot iron.

The treatment easily washes out of treated materials, so it has to be renewed after each laundering.

To test the effect of the flame-retarding solution, try it out on a small scrap of the fabric used in the items to be treated. When the test sample is dry, touch a match to it.

Be careful not to hold the fabric in your hand for this test. Also, don't lay it on a surface that fire might damage.

The fabric will burn as long as it is in contact with the lighted match, but if properly treated, it should stop burning as soon as you take the match away. The glow remaining in the charred portion should die in a few seconds later.

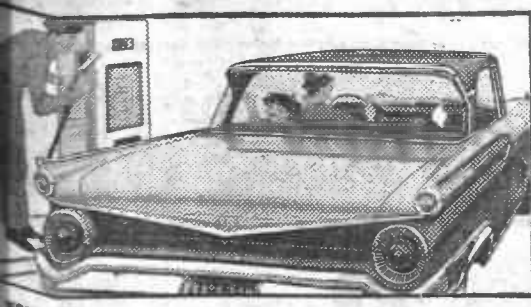

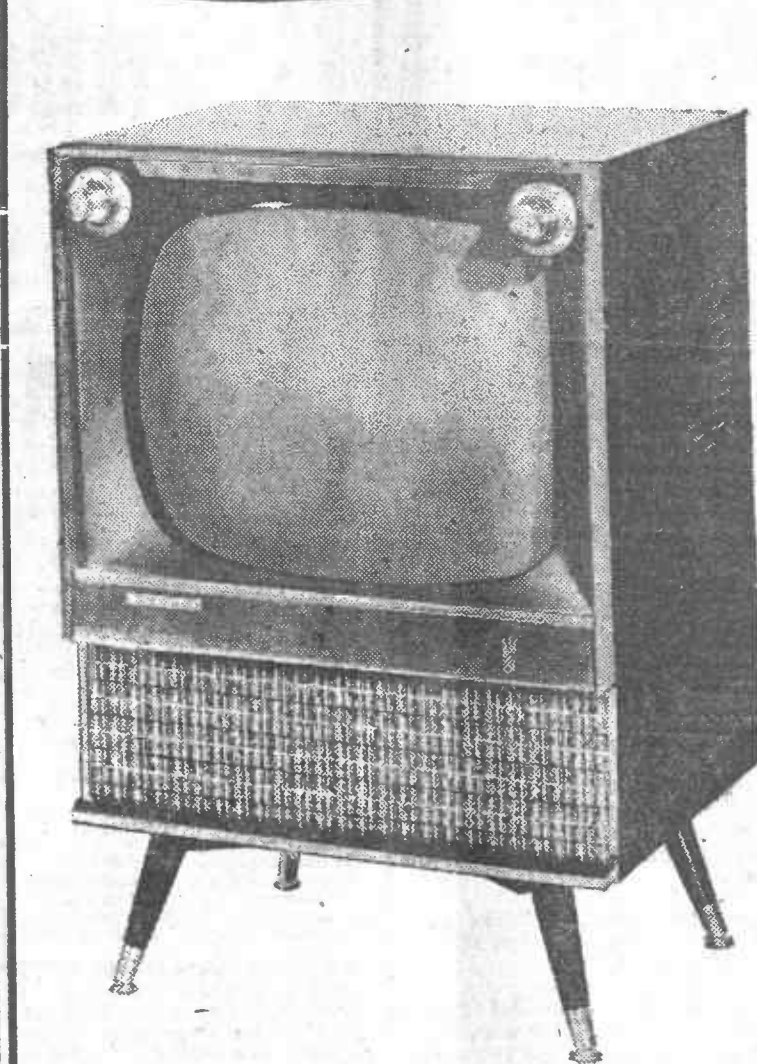
