man. The most recent
Thanksgiving controversy arose
when Franklin D. Roosevelt swit-
ched the date of the holiday from
the fourth to the third Thursday
in November. He hoped to help
business by making the shopping
season longer between Christmas
and Thanksgiving. Newspapers
magazines carried editorials
urging readers to ignore the
President and some Governors
advised their states to cele-
brate Thanksgiving on the tradi-
tional Thursday. Three years after
the change was made, Congress of-
ficially restored Thanksgiving to the
Thursday. . . . In view of
our history, it might be
wise to have a thanksgiving to
thank for Thanksgiving.

DURING THE PAST WEEK,
topmost in the news was President
Eisenhower's statement that he
was going to try to cut the \$12
billion national deficit as much as
\$6 billion during the next fiscal
year. Frankly, we think he is a
little late with his efforts. He
should have insisted on less spend-
ing during the current year in
which the 85th Congress was in
an expansive mood; yet, in most
cases, did not appropriate as much
money as the President asked for.
The ceiling of the national debt
was raised and the actual spend-
ing by the Federal government
amounted to \$152,000 a minute,
around the clock and around the
calendar. . . . Perhaps one way
to get our government to be a lit-
tle stingier with our money is to
write our Congressmen and Sena-
tors and tell them what we think
of this spend-thrift government of
ours. Congress convenes again in
January.

ONE-THIRD of your income
now goes for taxes. The total tax
burden for families at average
national income levels (including
all hidden taxes) now amounts to
about one-third of family monthly
income. The average tax burden
on a \$3,500 income family is esti-
mated to be \$1,050; on a family
with \$4,500 income, the tax bur-
den is \$1,395; and on an \$8,000 in-
come family the tax is \$2,726.

THE TVA has released an esti-
mate of the cost of building a two-
lane roadway and approaches
across Pickwick dam. A distance
of 2.65 miles of roadway will be
involved that is estimated by TVA
engineers to cost \$4,494,000. The
Tennessee state highway depart-
ment has estimated the cost of a
new bridge to be \$5 million. The
estimate in value of time and
money that would be saved by
users of the bridge would be about
\$380,000 yearly, and in addition
would open Miss. highway 25 for
through traffic for persons travel-
ing northward and southward.

TWENTY-TWO new water cus-
tomers have been added to the
Iuka Water System. These new
customers come as a result of the
extension of water lines in the
town plus the completion of new
homes. This number has been ad-
ded to the system this month. . . .

2 Projects Each On
Nos. 4 And 364 Will
Be Started Soon

A work order has been issued by
the State Highway Department for
construction of 7.4 miles on High-
way 364 between Cairo and Mid-
way, Highway Commissioner Roy
C. Adams said today.

Another work order has been
issued for construction of two bridges
in this project which includes
mileage in Prentiss and Tishom-
ingo counties.

Alvie Goolsby of Ripley is the
Contractor for the grading, drain-
age, culverts and topping. His bid
was \$287,484.20.

Contractor for the two bridges
is Dixie Contractors, Inc., of Mem-
phis, Tennessee, for the bid of
\$76,923.80.

Also work is scheduled to begin
on two highway construction pro-
jects on Highway 4 between New
Site and Dennis, according to
Highway Commissioner Roy C.
Adams.

Contracts call for 4.306 miles of
grading, drainage, culverts and
topping and a bridge on this im-
portant North Mississippi Highway.
The Highway Department on
November 17 issued a work order
to Bowyer and Johnson Construc-
tion Company of Jackson, Tennes-
see, for the grading and drain-
age on a bid of \$228,954.26 and for
the bridge on a bid of \$96,478.94.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOCIALISM VS. THE RIGHT-TO-WORK

Clement Atlee, Prime Minister in Britain's Labor Government from 1945 to 1951, is in our country for a series of lectures. During an interview while stopping between planes at Knoxville, Tenn., the other evening, on his way to deliver a lecture at the University of Kentucky—he took pains to severely castigate our right-to-work laws here in the United States.

Such an attitude is to be expected, of course, of one of the world's leading socialist labor leaders—because the socialist philosophy and the right-to-work philosophy are directly contrary philosophies—but it is still repugnant when so flagrantly portrayed while traveling in a foreign country. Who is Mr. Atlee—in effect a guest in our land—to criticize a fundamental principle of individual freedom that nineteen of our sovereign states have now guaranteed their people? And, especially, to express his criticism while being interviewed in one of those nineteen states?

Even so, this expressed attitude on the part of Mr. Atlee provides food for thought for all thinking people in this country, both inside and outside of labor unions. If this is the avowed belief of a leader who brought nothing but decadence and hardship to his people while he ruled over them, then there must be something wrong with his belief.

And that is exactly what happened while Mr. Atlee and his socialist Labor Government ruled Great Britain. Mr. Atlee presided over much of the crumbling of the once proud British Empire; in fact, he pushed it along. While he was in office, goods were both rationed and scarce, and the economy stagnated. He and his Government brought Great Britain to the very brink of ruin, so near in fact that it is sometimes to be doubted if she will ever recover.

The Atlee Labor Government did this by nationalizing major industries, such as the railroads, coal mines, steel mills, etc.—thereby incurring operating deficits that cost the British taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars. They did it through socialized medicine. They did it by stifling individual initiative and private enterprise. They did it by establishing a welfare state that brought everybody down to a common level of mediocrity and gave no one a chance to prosper. They thereby wasted the fruits of private enterprise which had made Britain strong over the years.

Does any sincere patriotic American—either inside or outside a labor union—want this to happen to our country? Of course not. But we can be quite sure that that is exactly what would happen once the socialist labor policies of Mr. Atlee were put into effect here. We have socialists among our labor leaders, and we can be quite sure it would happen here if they ever gain control.

And yet the one thing which this visiting labor leader so gratuitously criticizes us most for is our upholding of the principle of individual freedom, is our opposition to the principle of compulsion, is our belief that there can be no freedom in a government where a man is forced to join before he can go out and get a job and make a living for himself and his family. That is all that the right-to-work means.

Whether Mr. Atlee realizes it or not, it is our support of this principle of freedom that caused the United States of America to seek and gain its independence from his own country many years ago. Whether he realizes it or not, his own Labor Government was—and would be again—just as dictatorial and automatic over its own people as was George III's government over the colonists; in fact, more so.

It might be noted in this connection, too, that there was no lessening of eagerness on the part of Atlee's socialist Labor Government to accept our foreign aid

while he was in office, of which we have extended Great Britain billions of dollars. Does Mr. Atlee and others of his ilk not know—or care—that the aid they have so gladly accepted from us was produced by the profits of the free enterprise system? We know and care whether they do or not. We refuse to be dragged down with them.

The U. S. Department of Commerce has estimated that net savings of American consumers increased more than 19 billion dollars during 1957.

The 1957 gain in consumer savings set an all-time record. It was three billion dollars higher than the previous record set in 1956. The trend continued into 1958.

The figures have a special meaning to American business men. Accumulation of consumer savings indicates the possibility of increased consumer spending in the future. Merchants will recognize increased savings as an opportunity and a challenge to do a better job of selling in 1959.

No doubt the opportunity is there. The American consumer is spending more carefully than he did several years ago; but he has more money clear of debt than ever before. His savings will find its way to the market when advertising advises him that his best interests will be served by spending.

In a situation of increased savings and careful buying, advertising becomes essential to continuing prosperity. More than at any other time vigorous advertising is needed to move available money into circulation. For too much saving leads to depression.

Some business leaders feel that 1959 advertising budgets should be larger than at anytime in the past. One noted economist argues that the percentage of gross income of a business must be constantly increased in order to maintain expanding prosperity.

Our economy depends upon the sale of new and improved products manufactured at decreasing costs. It seems only logical that increasing amounts should be spent of advertising which makes the system work.

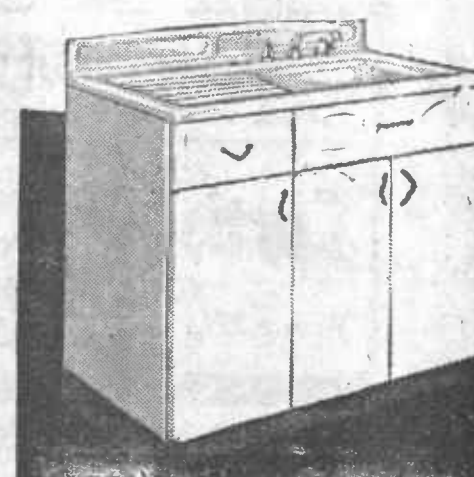

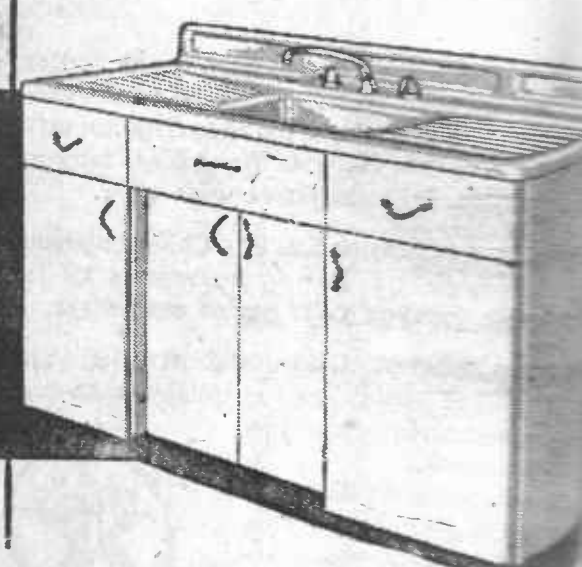

cals were applied at various rates and frequencies. Recommendations based on these tests are:

1. Fertilize in the fall to give the grass added strength for winter and again in the spring to give it a good start.

2. Apply insecticides early in June and again later if chinch bugs appear. Use diazinon 25 per cent emulsifiable concentrate at 1/2 to 1 ounce per 100 sq. ft. depending on level of infestation. If BHC, toxaphene or dieldrin are used mix in some diazinon, TEPP or phosdrin to insure good kill.

3. Water in dry weather to keep in vigorous growing condition.

7 Persons May Die In State Traffic Accidents This Holiday

Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough, head of the Mississippi Highway Patrol, predicts that seven persons may die in state traffic accidents this Thanksgiving.

Commissioner Scarbrough bases his prediction on past Thanksgiving accident statistics and the present upward trend in fatal auto accidents.

Though one of the year's shortest holiday celebrations, usually con-

sidered to start at 6 p.m. Wednesday and end at midnight Thursday, Thanksgiving Day, this annual one-day holiday outing always results in a high death toll.

Approximately 23 accidents last Thanksgiving left 23 injured and 6 dead, all victims of traffic mishaps. Mississippi's 1956 traffic toll was seven killed in 56 accidents, with 27 injured.

Commissioner Scarbrough urges all Mississippi motorists to see "that you are not among these unfortunate seven to die this Thanksgiving. The care you exercise while driving may prevent your being killed or killing someone."

Thanksgiving, he reminds, "is a time for giving thanks, not for taking lives with the automobile."

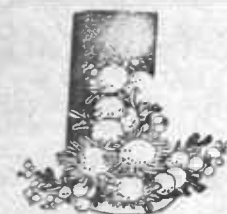

Why Parables?

All good teachers, Jesus was not tied to any one style of teaching. But his favorite style was the story style. To some people Jesus was puzzling, as if Jesus were forgetting his divine mission. You can imagine some intelligence officer, on the spot, for a moment, looking at the large, simple, direct, and down-to-earth Jesus, and wondering what was in that head that was setting such a crowd of people on fire.

Maybe only a traveling magician he would find neither. Only in a fisherman's boat, his voice (for outdoor speakers) booming out over the water, would he find the heart of all things just telling. Very simple stories too, no dramatics. Just about farmers and wheat and fish... everything, harmless and (from the fisherman's viewpoint) meaningful.

Why is this his great Teacher? The Roman would think to himself, "He may be all right for a man, but there's surely no harm in that. The Roman would not realize that he was listening to the best teacher of all time, and in those simple stories, or parables, were wrapped up the things which were destined to change the world.

Why did Jesus choose the story for his teaching? He could have used parables, as for instance the parable of the sower. But according to Mark, he spoke without a parable where in his talk. One reason he did this was for simplicity. The story reduces down a complicated idea, high-lights the

heart of it. People who have difficulty following or remembering a lecture will remember a story.

For Survival

There are still on record the sermons of some of the rabbis who lived and taught about at the same time with Jesus. The are pretty impressive for their scholarship, their quotations from authorities, their pious correctness. But nobody would remember them. They are literally curiosities today, little more. Jesus' little stories on the other hand, are memorable. They have passed into the language and culture of many lands, they comfort the grieving, rebuke the sinful, give a lift to weary hearts.

Strange things have happened to the human race, and will still happen. Our ancestors would find it hard to find their way around our electronic world, and lectures in our class-rooms would bewilder them. If Jesus had spoken in the learned terms of his day, his teachings would have been laid away in obscure libraries like the lectures of other teachers of that time. But speaking as he did, in story form, his teaching endures to this very day, and will be understood in the space-age of the future, if the world lasts so long. Lectures die; stories survive.

For Selection

You remember our imaginary Roman official who went off thinking what a stupid affair this story-telling was? That was part of Jesus' intention. The reader will notice that it was not the chief priests, it was the disciples, who stayed for an after-meeting and asked what Jesus meant by his parables. Jesus' main effort in teaching was to get at his own inner circle of followers. He wanted to stir their interest and curiosity, and at the same time let the careless, the indifferent, the hostile, go their way. The story style which he made his own, was just right for this purpose. The parables were like magnets that would attract only the men with true steel in them. The sophisticated, the know-it-alls, then and now, hearing or reading the parables, think only "What simple stuff!" But the people who are attracted by these tales and feel there is something beneath the surface, find in them a wisdom beyond this world. They are as clear as the night sky through which we see the glory of the stars.

County Agent news

Tips for Planning 1959 Cotton Crop
Have you done some figuring of

both choices "A" and "B" for your cotton crop next year? This is your best guide to a sound decision. Even on farms that may appear to be quite similar, costs of production and other factors may vary a lot.

As you know, whether these price support choices will be available depends upon the outcome of the December 15 referendum. So be sure to vote.

The exact level of price support will not be known until January 31. But, from information available at this time, it looks like 35 cents for "A" cotton at 80 percent of parity. For "B" cotton, do your figuring on both a floor of 29 cents and a ceiling of 32 cents. These prices are for middling one inch cotton.

Look at the representatives case that follows. Then figure your own.

This representative grower figured, based on 35 cents per pound and a bale per acre, that he would gross about \$200 for each acre allotted to him under choice "A" in 1959. The number of acres in his basic 1959 allotment will be about seven percent less than his 1958 allotment, unless he had 10 acres or less in 1958 in which case it is the same as for 1958.

If this same grower makes choice "B" he can plant without penalty one and four-tenths acres for every acre he is entitled to under choice "A" for 1959. Making 500 pounds of lint or more per acre, at the 29 cent support floor he will gross about \$235 from each one and four tenths acres; and at the 32 cent ceiling level this should be about \$255.

Are you likely to do better or worse than this example? Consider your land, labor, equipment, financial situation and other things.

If you want help with this figuring, we'll be glad to do it with you. Fall rains, coupled with muddy pastures and barnyards can mean foot rot for cows. The organisms that cause foot rot in dairy cattle live best in wet, muddy places.

Infection often gets its start from foot and hoof injuries caused by wires, stones or rough places around the pasture or barnyard.

When you notice a lame cow in the herd, check her immediately for foot rot. Some of the symptoms are swelling and redness around the head of the hoof, reduced milk production and loss of vigor.

Recommended treatment includes cleaning the infected foot and washing with disinfectant. If possible, let the cow stand in a foot bath an hour or two each day. Keep the cow in a dry place until she recovers. For best results, check with a veterinarian.

Prevention of foot rot is better than the cure. To help prevent this trouble, eliminate as much as possible, wet areas around barnyard and feed lot.

Make this hunting season a safe one. Remember to treat every gun as if it were loaded. Never point a gun at anything you don't want to kill. Never carry a loaded gun into the house or in an automobile. Make sure of your target before

pulling the trigger.

Power In Congress

The Congress which will convene in January will be among the most powerful ever to assemble in Washington. It will have more say-so over government policies than any Congress since the Civil War. That will be because no President in recent American history has ever had a Congress composed of so large a majority of members of the opposition party.

Both parties have had a larger majority in Congress, but never at a time when the other party was in control of the Administrative branch of government. We'll have a truly two-party government, at least until 1961.

This imposes an unusually heavy responsibility on the leadership of the overwhelming Democratic majorities in both the Senate and the House, and on the chairmen of the various committees which will have the responsibility of developing legislation.

Power In the South

Most of the chairmen of the important congressional committees will be from Southern States. Nearly all of them have a long congressional record of Democratic conservatism on both domestic and foreign issues.

The fact that Southern Democrats will be considerably outnumbered by Northern, Midwestern and Western Democrats, mostly with a more "liberal" attitude toward government policies, poses a problem for the Southern leaders. How well can they control a majority that sometimes disagrees with them?

The most serious clash could be expected to come over labor legislation, taxes and spending. Many of the Northern and Eastern Democrats were elected with the financial support of organized labor. Few of the Southern Democrats had labor support. Southerners, too, are more conservative on taxes and spending.

Committee Chairmen

Most people who are unfamiliar with the inner workings of Washington assume that aside from the President, the most influential men in the Nation's Capital are the members of the President's Cabinet.

They credit the Secretary of Defense, for example, with having more influence than he actually has over military matters; or the Secretary of the Treasury with greater power than anyone else over spending and taxes.

Far more influential in the direction of military matters are Sen. Richard B. Russell of Georgia, long-time chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and Rep. Carl Vinson, also of Georgia, chairman of the House Armed Services Committee.



On matters involving taxes and spending two other Southern Democrats have more influence than the Secretary of the Treasury. They are Sen. Harry F. Byrd of Virginia, known for many years as "the watchdog of the Treasury," chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Rep. Brent Spence of Kentucky, veteran chairman of the House Banking and Currency

Committee. We will report on chairmen of other important committees in subsequent articles on the incoming 86th Congress in the near future.

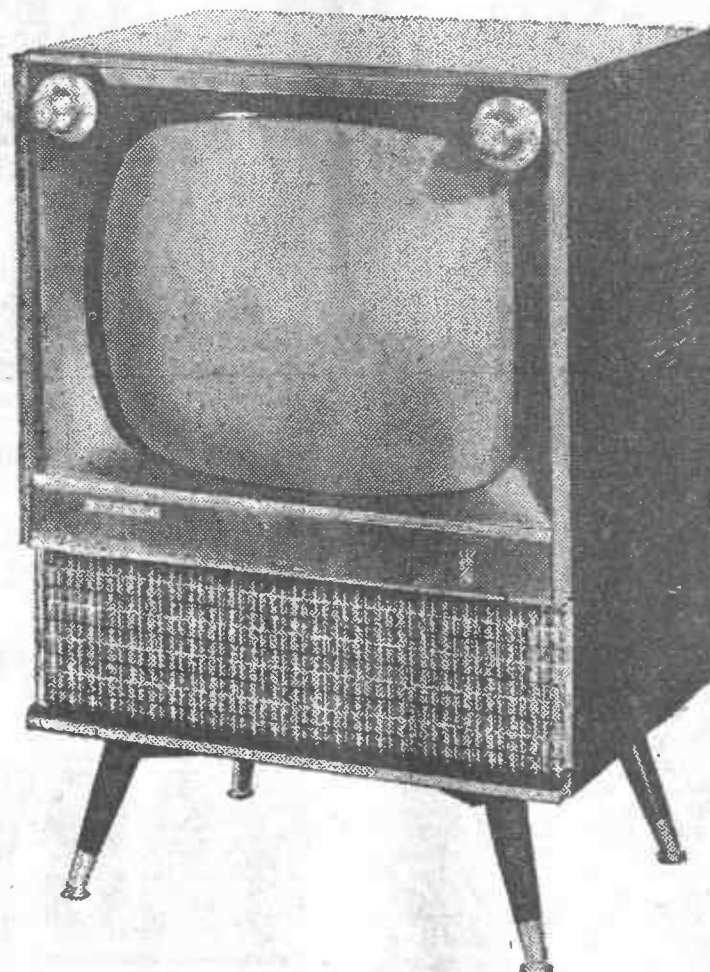

Lincoln Signed First Annual Thanksgiving Proclamation

Although Thanksgiving Day had been celebrated occasionally in America since early Colonial days, it remained for Abraham Lincoln, in 1863, to sign the first national annual Thanksgiving Proclamation, according to Dr. R. Gerald McMurtry, director of the Lincoln National Life Foundation. His signing of the document is depicted in the above painting, created by the nationally-known artist, Dean Cornwell. The scene is historically correct and shows Lincoln in his White House office just after

he had completed his signature on the document. Lincoln's Thanksgiving Proclamation of 1863 marked the beginning of an unbroken series of proclamations, although there was some deviation as to date, by United States Presidents. Lincoln selected the last Thursday in November, which was the last feast day of the church calendar year. For a few years starting in 1939, the third Thursday was named. Since 1941, Thanksgiving has been observed on the fourth Thursday in November.
