Gen. Shoe Announces Employee Benefit Increases To Go In Effect January 2nd

General Shoe Corporation today
announced a New Year's program
of increased employee benefits at
a packaged cost in excess of \$1,
000,000—featuring a wage in-
crease, new and broader coverage
for hospitalization, interest on
Christmas savings and provisions
that would enable production and
office employees to have one-third

more life insurance.
Nelson Carmichael, vice presi-
dent of General Shoe's Southern
Shoe Manufacturing, announced
the new employee gains and said
that an increase of 5c an hour in
all wage rates for all of the 10,000
production and office employees,
plus the other fringe benefits,
would be effective on January 2
in all of General Shoe's plants and
offices in the five southern states
of Tennessee, Kentucky, Georgia,
Alabama, and Mississippi.

3 Deer Killed In 4 Day Hunt

Game Wardens Marlar and
Holland report that three deer
were killed in the four-day open
season in Tishomingo county last
week. The season opened on
Monday and closed on Thank-
sgiving day.

A phenomenon of the season
was that two of the older sports-
men from the south end of the
county got their buck. D. R.
Cleveland of Belmont, a 72 year
old hunter, and D. J. Hale of
Golden, a 73 year old hunter,
each shot the same deer that
weighed 175 pounds and had 6
points.

Others to get their deer were
W. N. Holcomb of Golden who
got a 3-point, 100 pound buck
and Holland Pharr who shot one
weighing 125 pounds.

The game wardens report that
all hunting was orderly and no
violators were caught.

The deer season will be open
in this county for four more days
during this month, Dec. 26-29,
inclusive.

erage, but it is planned to again
broaden the plan so as to provide
larger payments for employees
with large hospital bills. The de-
tails will be announced in the
near future.

Beginning in 1959, interest at the
rate of 2 per cent per year will be
paid on all Christmas savings ac-
counts established by employees
in the payroll deduction plan.
Every year more than 5,000 em-
ployees use the Company plan for
accumulating their Christmas sav-
ings.

In addition to the wage increase
and other fringe benefits announ-
ced for the coming year, General
Shoe announced that additional
employee benefits have been in-
stalled during 1958. For example,
General Shoe was the first in the
entire shoe industry to give its em-
ployees a Guaranteed Annual Em-
ployment Plan. General Shoe in
1958 increased the Guaranteed An-
nual Employment Plan of its em-
ployees by another 40 hours.

During 1958 it was provided that
employees returning to productive
work while on the injured list will
receive their regular pay.

Commenting on the program of
employee benefits, Mr. Carmichael
said: "We are announcing this
wage increase and the additional
employee benefits because we are
confident of improved business
results in 1959."

"In steady employment, in in-
creased productivity and in all
other ways, we believe that our
employees will enjoy a higher
standard of living in 1959. This is
the permanent and continuing goal
of General Shoe as a corporation."

Employees Collect Christmas Savings

188 PEOPLE GET \$24,451
FOR HOLIDAY BUYING

General Shoe employees in the
Iuka Plant received \$24,451.50 this
past week from their own Christ-
mas Savings Program. There were
188 local employees participating
in the plan this year.

The 188 people in the Iuka Plant
were part of a total group of 5,315
General Shoe employees in the
Company's Southern manufacturing
plants, who voluntarily saved \$1,
366,586 through this plan of pay-
roll deductions. Every cent was
the individual's own personal in-
vestment. The Company acted as
"banker" and administrator.

The general feeling among those
who invest in this program each
year seems to be that it is an easy
way of saving money for use at
Christmas time, or for depositing
in a lump sum to their own savings
accounts. General Shoe makes no
requirement of any employee to
participate. However, it points with
pride to the great number who do,
as another evidence of their "solid
citizenship" in this community.

Referendum Set On Cotton

Farmers Will Vote On
Dec. 15; 2/3 Must Favor

"Cotton growers will make an
important decision on Monday,
December 15," said Mack Sanders,
Chairman of the Tishomingo Agri-
cultural Stabilization and Conserva-
tion County Committee, in remind-
ing farmers of the voting date.

He further stated that, on that
day growers will vote in a Refer-
endum to decide whether Market-
ing Quotas will be in effect for
their 1959 Upland Cotton Crop. All
farmers who engaged in the pro-
duction of Upland Cotton in 1958
will be eligible to vote in the Refer-
endum.

"If at least two-thirds of the
growers voting approve the quotas,"
Mr. Sanders explains, "Market-
ing Quotas will be in effect on
all farms growing upland cotton
in 1959, penalties will apply on
'excess' cotton, and the growers
will have an opportunity to elect
a choice between complying with
their 'regular'—Choice (A)—Farm
Allotments or increasing their cot-
ton acreage by as much as 40 per-
cent; this second choice is called
Choice (B)."

"By complying with the Choice
(A) Allotment, a grower will be
eligible for Price Support at the
full level available—not less than
80 percent of Parity in 1959; by
complying with the Choice (B) Al-
lotment, a grower will be eligi-
ble for Price Support at a level 15
percent of Parity lower than under
the Choice (A) Program.

"If more than one-third of the
growers disapprove Quotas, there
will be no Marketing Quotas or
Penalties, only 'regular'—Choice
(A)—allotments will be in effect,
and Price Support to eligible grow-
ers (those who comply with their
'regular' allotment) will be avail-
able at 50 percent of Parity.

"In either case, Acreage Allot-
ments of some kind will continue
in effect for the 1959 Cotton Crop
as a means of determining eligi-
bility for the available Price Sup-
port."

The Chairman pointed out that
Legislation directs the Secretary
of Agriculture to proclaim Market-
ing Quotas for the next upland cot-
ton crop when the cotton supply
exceeds normal. Quotas are put in
to operation. However, unless they
are approved by at least two-thirds
of the growers voting in a referen-
dum on the question.

Clinton Davidson
War With
China?



The threat of war with Com-
munist China is believed by many
military and diplomatic experts
here to be greater than between
the United States and Russia. They
disagree, however, on how serious
the threat is in both cases.

What Dictator Mao has been
trying to find out by shelling Que-
moy and by other war-like actions
is whether the United States really
means it when Secretary Dulles
and President Eisenhower say we
will defend Formosa.

Some Americans think that For-
mosa is not worth an all-out war.
Mao knows that, but what he
doesn't know is how many feel
that way and what their influence
might be over Congress and the
President.

Some Far Eastern experts here
think Mao may decide to gamble
by sending troops across the For-
mosa Strait, just as he did in
Korea. The thing that may be
delaying such action could be the
lack of assurance that Russia

would join in such a war.

General Wedemeyer

Few Americans who are in a
position to speak out freely on
China know that country as well
as General Albert C. Wedemeyer,
retired. He had tours of duty in
the Far East from 1923 to 1933,
was Deputy Chief of the Southeast
Asia Command in 1943 and Com-
manding General of the U. S.
Forces in China from 1944 to
1946.

General Wedemeyer believes
that the best way to avoid war
stand, and being prepared to back
it up with whatever it takes. Any
sign of weakness or indecision, he
thinks, would be an invitation to
Mao to invade Formosa.

"Probably," he writes, "the truth
is that the Red Chinese leaders,
who are shrewd men, genuinely
believe that America is a paper
tiger which can be bluffed into
compromise or retreat."

"Are they wrong? What does it
look like, as we read our papers
and listen to the pronouncements
of politicians? It looks as though
unreadiness and lack of knowl-
edge and a natural desire for peace
could ruin a too-long delayed
strong policy."

The Bamboo Curtain

Few Americans, General Wede-
meyer thinks, have more than a
vague idea of what is going on in
that "vast and terrible experiment
which is Communism in China."

Reliable information reveals,
General Wedemeyer writes, that
97% of all Chinese farming fam-
ilies have lost their land and stock
and are now paid simply as labor-
ers. They have been made into a
new class of serfs.

"They are the slaves," he re-
ports, "of an all-powerful, totali-
tarian, ruthless state. The people
of China have not accepted this
brutal regime, but like the people
of Hungary, Poland and East Ger-
many are in continued revulsion
against it."

"The great question that faces
our country and the world is:
What shall be our attitude toward
this appalling tyranny, Commu-
nism? At stake is our courage,
fortitude, and fitness to lead the
forces of freedom."

"At stake also," General Wede-
meyer concludes, "is our own free-
dom and possibly our survival. In
the balance is decency in all hu-
man relationship."

Power for Life

Lesson for December 7, 1958

THE CHRISTIAN religion is not and never was simply a set of ideas. Being a Christian is not being an ordinary person who believes some extra things that other people don't.

The Christian religion is not simply a way of living, or a new set of rules for behavior, mostly Don't's. The Christian is not a person with peculiar habits and nothing else to recommend him.

The Christian religion does include ideas, radical and profound. It does involve a way, a pattern for living, but one which comes from the spirit and intent of love, divine love, rather than from a set of rules carefully memorized.

Besides these, the Christian religion is power—not power "over" but power "for." The Christian religion is supernatural, and this most strikingly in the power Christ gives to enable men to live above their ordinary selves.

Giving A Man Back

The story of Jesus and the man calling himself "Legion"—a military word which might be translated "Regiment"—has some very spectacular features. Aside from these, which have seldom if ever been repeated, the story is typical of what the power of Christ can do for a man.

First of all, Jesus gave the man back to himself. He had not belonged to himself while he was "Legion." He belonged to any one of the countless devils that plagued him. He did not even know his own right name. He could not "call his soul his own." But after Jesus was done with him, he was a man in his right mind, under control, a single person with a single mind. Second, Jesus gave the man back to society. (That particular society, alas, did not want him; they would rather have kept their pigs. But that is another story.) He was now able to live with other people and to take his share of the world's work on his shoulders. If his home town would not have him, there were others that would. And in the third place, Jesus gave the man back to God. His instructions were to go and tell what the Lord had done for him.

A Modern Demon

We do not have demons sitting in cemeteries nowadays, not in the ancient style. But as any minister, lawyer or social worker can tell you, there is a modern demon that gets control of millions of our fellow-citizens and takes away their citizenship, reducing them to helpless slavery. This is the demon of alcoholism. Our forefathers had an uglier word for it: the drink habit. It is the fourth most fatal disease in America; and alone among diseases (if we agree it is a disease) it is entirely preventable. It is one of the few diseases known to man which a man can definitely make up his mind not to have. (But of course he can do this only by being a non-drinker. No drinker can resolve not to become an alcoholic; the very next cocktail party may tip him over the edge.) But any one who knows alcoholics, actual or potential, knows how such people are "not themselves" as the kindly phrase puts it. They are no more masters of themselves than that poor maniac in Galilee driven mad by his own demons.

Modern Miracles

Yet the alcoholic is not beyond rescue. Every week some one of these pitiable people is pulled out of the quicksand and his feet set on a rock, by the power of Christ. Men and women find a super natural power that is great enough to accomplish what good resolutions and many preachments and pleadings have not accomplished. Such a man is given back to himself, back to society and back to God. Cured alcoholics are most likely to stay cured when they devote themselves to helping others as they themselves have been helped. The most effective helper of others is likely to be the one who can say himself, "I know what the Lord has done for me." And this is true not only of alcoholics, but of those who are devil-ridden by other destroyers, pride, envy, lust and all the rest. No evil, no combination of evils, that attack and destroy man, can be a match for the Son of God... if only the victim is willing to be rescued!

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL COMPROMISE IS UNPATRIOTIC

There is a single philosophy which doesn't make a bit of sense, it is the philosophy expressed in the Southern States Industrial Council. "If you can't lick 'em, join 'em." How can you consider a movement that you have no intention of beating? You can't, of course, if you are logical. There are powerful journals in the country that are urging conservatives to throw in the sponge and go up with the radicals. A month ahead—in fact, a month and the 1960 elections will be bombarded with arguments that "liberalism" is necessary to win elections. Time and again conservatives will hear the same old line designed to convince their opponents that a setback is a rout.

Socialism has won some big battles in this country. But socialism has not conquered the United States. Back in the 1930's, "liberals" were calling the same tune. They told conservatives: "Give up! This is a new era. If you don't join us, you are finished." Well, conservatives swept the New Dealers and the Fair Dealers out of office. Back in the 1930's, the violently unfair, anti-free enterprise Wagner Labor Act, which was designed to favor union bosses, was the so-called law of the land. But conservatives with fighting spirit replaced it with the Taft-Hartley Law. The union bosses, fearful of losing some of their captives, screamed "Slave labor law." But Taft-Hartley is on the books. The free enterprises have turned back every assault by the radicals.

Back in the New Deal days, Congress often seemed like a pawn of the President and left-wing bureaucrats. For a time, it looked as though Congressional representatives were destined to be nothing but rubber stamps for radicals. But Congress reasserted itself after World War II. Such great independent conservatives as Senators Harry Byrd of Virginia and Robert Taft of Ohio showed what Congress could do to make conservative, pro-American policy.

There hasn't been a single generation in the life of the American people when conservatives haven't had some sort of setback. But conservatives have won their share of the battles. Radicalism was rampant back in the 1890's, but the country finally turned away from the left lane in politics. In our grandfathers' time many people were saying, "Give up. Times have changed for good." That advice wasn't good then. It isn't any better today.

No struggle for good is ever permanently lost. Changes in tactics and leadership sometimes are needed to win a war. While the changes are being made, a battle may be lost. But that doesn't necessarily affect the long run course of the war.

That's the way it is in the United States today. Conservatives may have stumbled recently in not making a good enough case for traditional American principles. But they can walk ahead firmly in coming months, refusing to heed the surrender talk of the radicals. Conservatives can no more compromise with socialism than a religious man can embrace atheism. America wouldn't be America unless there were a free enterprise system. And no patriot would compromise with a system that is un-American.

An exceedingly heartening illustration of the fact that the conservative free enterprise spirit is not dead in the United States is the news that comes in as this is written that the farmers of America have voted overwhelmingly to abolish government corn planting controls which have been in effect since the early days of the New Deal in favor of no acreage controls and lower price supports. People with any love of freedom in their hearts whatever will endure socialistic control of their lives for just so long—and then comes the inevitable revolt.



Herman Searcy Constructs Parallel Terraces

We have all heard that "if a man builds a rat trap better than his neighbor the world will beat a path to his door." This has proved true in the case of parallel terraces.

Kenneth Mayhall of Belmont established the first parallel terraces in Tishomingo county. They were surveyed by the local soil conservation service technicians and constructed under their supervision.

Mr. Herman Searcy heard about these terraces and decided to go and look them over. He liked them because there were no short rows between them.

Herman lives on B. E. Wright's farm near Bay Springs. This summer he decided he wanted terraces

on one of the fields he is cultivating. He contacted the soil conservation service and asked for help. Mr. Tice talked to him. He wanted parallel terraces like Kenneth Mayhall has. He was told if it could be done parallel terraces would be established on this field. But if not standard terraces would be constructed.

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The initial survey showed the field uniform enough for the kind of terraces Herman wanted. After the crop was harvested the lines were run and with the help of his brother, Jack Searcy, another field of parallel terraces were constructed in Tishomingo county. There are approximately one mile of terraces in this system.

The roll was called by the secretary and each member answered with the things they were most thankful for.

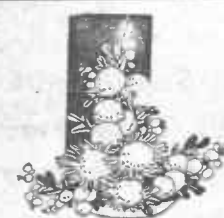
Minutes of the last meeting were read and Mrs. Hampton gave a demonstration on Danish Pudding. Reports were given and the December meeting was planned.

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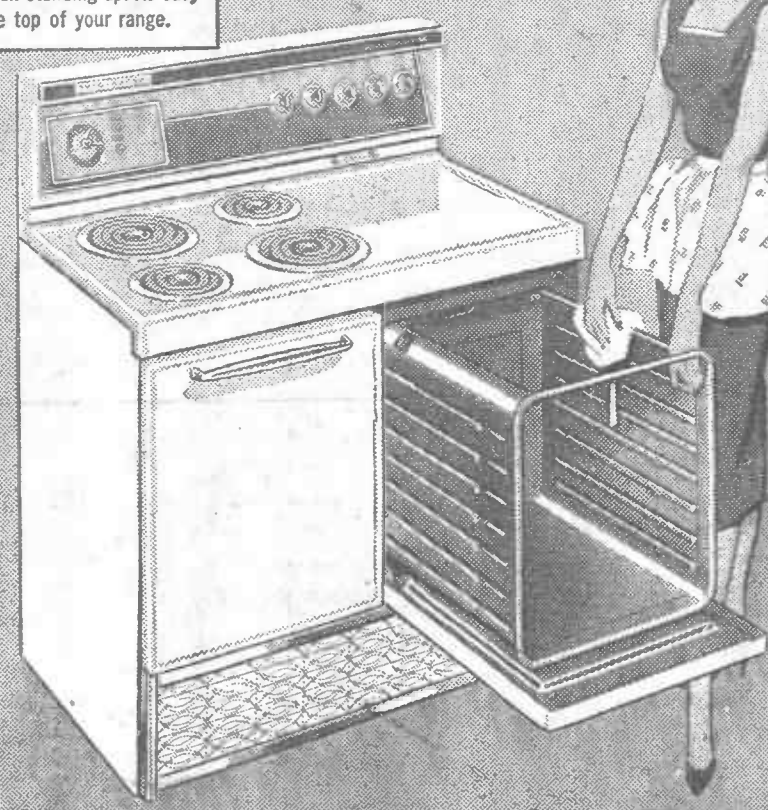
