Memphis, Tenn. (Special)—Interstate Commerce Commission approval of temporary authority to Continental Tennessee Lines has provided a means of restoring bus service between Memphis, Florence, Ala., and Chattanooga, Tenn., over routes of strike-bound American Bussines.
The federal commission order, issued Thursday of last week, was expected to permit the Continental Trailways company to start its first buses from Memphis and Chattanooga during the day Friday. Paul Utter, vice president of Continental in Nashville, said his company expected to have six daily schedules operating east from Memphis by Saturday night. Three schedules will operate through to east coast points such as Norfolk, Raleigh and Jacksonville, two to Birmingham and one to Asheville.
Resumption of service through the area will mark the first Trailways bus services over this route since July 2 when 1200 bus operators, maintenance workers & terminal employees walked out in a dispute over wages and working conditions. Since that time, all efforts to settle the dispute have been unsuccessful.

Open House Slated
Friday For Egg
Packaging Plant

Lester Skinner, local county leader in the production of eggs, states that an open house will be held on Friday of this week for the Mid-South Egg Packaging plant that is located in Booneville. The plant is in the building formerly occupied by the Gentle Hosiery Mill.
The plant went into operation on December 1 with Mr. Skinner being one of the producers to first supply eggs. Other county farmers are expected to use the new facility.
Jack Morris, president of the concern, states that the plant now has two automatic sizing and grading machines in operation and that plans call for the installation of two more. At peak production the plant will handle 500 cases of eggs in an eight-hour day. To provide eggs necessary for full operation will require approximately 250,000 laying hens.

Farmers Vote In Cotton Referendum
December 15; Polling Places Named

Community Referendum Committees who will be responsible for conducting the Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum throughout the county on December 15, 1958, have been announced by the Tishomingo A.S.C. County Committee. All members are farmers eligible to vote in the Referendum. Many of the Referendum Committeemen are also elected Community Committeemen.
Arrangements for the establishment of Polling Places in all of Tishomingo County's fifteen (15) Cotton-Growing Communities have been completed. Notices showing the date of the Referendum, the rules governing eligibility to vote, and the location of the Polling Places have been posted in conspicuous places in the county. Notices are also being mailed to each farmer who has a cotton acreage allotment, informing him of the place where he may vote in the referendum.
All persons who, as landlord, tenant, or sharecropper, engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 are eligible to vote in the upland referendum. If there is any question about eligibility, farmers are asked to check with their A.S.C. County Office.

Elementary
School Burns

35-Year-Old Building
Destroyed About 6:30
Monday; Little Saved

The Tishomingo Elementary school burned to the ground late Monday. The 35-year-old building supposedly caught fire from faulty electrical wiring or from one of the flues, with little of the school equipment being saved.
An eye-witness to the conflagration said "Throngs of people, including the Tishomingo fire department, and those from neighboring towns, stood helplessly by with mixed emotions as the old school went up in a defiant blaze of smoke and fire. To many the old structure represented the only formal education they had ever known." The building was constructed in 1923.
The contents of all the classrooms, music room and the auditorium were all burned. Parts of the office records and a small amount of the supplies in the lunchroom storage room were saved.
Grades 1 through 6 were being taught in the building, employing 5 teachers. Arrangements have been made for the pupils to continue their classes in the Tishomingo Methodist church, in the Tishomingo high school and agricultural building and in the Belmont school.
The old building was scheduled to have been replaced with a new modern elementary school that is now under construction. The new building will be ready for occupancy by the beginning of the next session.

B Cautions Businessmen Against Racketeers

V. Morse, Jr., Manager of the Better Business Bureau in Memphis today cautioned business- men in the Tri-State Area to be on guard against racketeers who prey upon them through the solicitation of phoney labor unions. Such solicitations are being reported in the New York promoters. According to Morse, millions of dollars have been taken from business men in the country over by phoney labor union publica- tions through the fraudulent sale of labor publications have no connection with organiza- tions. They depend for their support upon the gullibility and credulity of businessmen and upon their desire to avoid labor trouble. Morse stated: "The phoney labor union solicitor usually starts with the claim that he is an AFL-CIO paper. After this prospect as a known laborer, he may urge coop- eration in some special campaign to fighting communism, or racketeering in labor. Adver- tising, and if resistance is offered the solicitor may threaten that labor difficulties will be caused. Thousands of businessmen authorized advertising in labor publications grudgingly for getting into possible labor difficulties."

organized labor movement against this racket", Morse said. "The editors of honest un- authorized labor publications are in the fore- front of this fight. These editors are largely carried on the battle to the International Labor Association (AFL-CIO), a pro- labor organization made up of editors of more than 300 of the largest AFL-CIO publications. Code of Ethics is specifically aimed to stamp out improper methods of soliciting advertising and to raise the stand- ard of advertising in all labor publications. Its Code provides, among other things that member publications will not claim endorse- ment by the national AFL-CIO; will employ high pressure long- distance telephone salesmen, or will publish advertising ob- tained through such methods; will not imply that purchase of advertising space will afford any benefit beyond its advertising pur- pose; will not be identified with any book, directory or pro- posed to solicit donations in the name of selling advertising. Solicited by any publication any of these provisions," Morse concluded, "local business- men are urged to ascertain the nature of the publication be- fore considering any advertising in it. Better Business Bureau will try to find out for any local business concern whether any pub- lication is or is not recognized as a member of the accredited labor press."

Free Textbooks Discussed At P-TA Meeting; Iuka School Band Performs

Those attending the regular meeting of the Iuka School District Parent-Teacher Association held on Thursday night were thrilled by the fine performance given by the Iuka School Band under the direction of James E. Vinson, and the enlightening remarks on Free Textbooks by B. L. Mercer, High School Principal.

Mr. Mercer stated that money for free textbooks was appropriated by the legislature and was based on daily average attendance. He noted that the first free textbooks were issued in 1940 and in 1941 were available to high schools. Books are selected by the State Textbooks Commission. They select three and then a committee appointed by the County Superintendent of Education selects one of the three that will be used in the county. This county, in which there are approximately 2,343 white students and 124 colored, received \$8,811.25 to purchase textbooks this term. In the Iuka School District there are 93 white students and 47 colored. This averages about \$2.70 per student. Mr. Mercer gave the cost of a student's books from grades 7 through 12 as being approximately \$84.50. This would average about \$14.00 a year. This is why a portion of old books have to be carried over from year to year. The Iuka school received \$11,000 to buy books for this term, stated the speaker, which had to be divided between the elementary and high schools.

Mr. Mercer stated that in checking the books at the close of the term last spring, 606 high school books and 512 elementary books were torn up or were not usable. He emphasized the importance of parents urging their children to take utmost care in keeping their books neat and clean so at the end of the term they could be turned in in usable condition.

He added that at the present time crowded conditions played a great part in the wear and tear of books. In conclusion, Mr. Mercer noted that lockers in the proposed new building would be a wonderful asset in affording protection for the students' books, and belongings. He also submitted this as a worthwhile project for the P-TA.

Hiram A. Jones, president, praised highly his various committees, work accomplished, and the interest each was showing in getting the organization off to a good start. The budget and finance committee submitted a tentative budget in the amount of \$100.60 to be used as follows: room prizes, \$15.00; P-TA delegate to Jackson, \$50.00; yearbooks, \$20.00, and publications, \$15.60. He also called attention to two bake sales planned to raise funds for the organization, one for December 13 and one for December 17. The program committee submitted a tentative schedule of programs for the next 5 meetings. Mr. Jones urged members to check with Mrs. D. O. Jourdan, secretary for their membership cards.

Attendance prizes were won by Miss Lela Grahams' sixth grade. Mrs. W. C. Foote accepted the award for the 6th grade at Snowdown and Mrs. Willie Mae Robinson accepted the one for Central school.

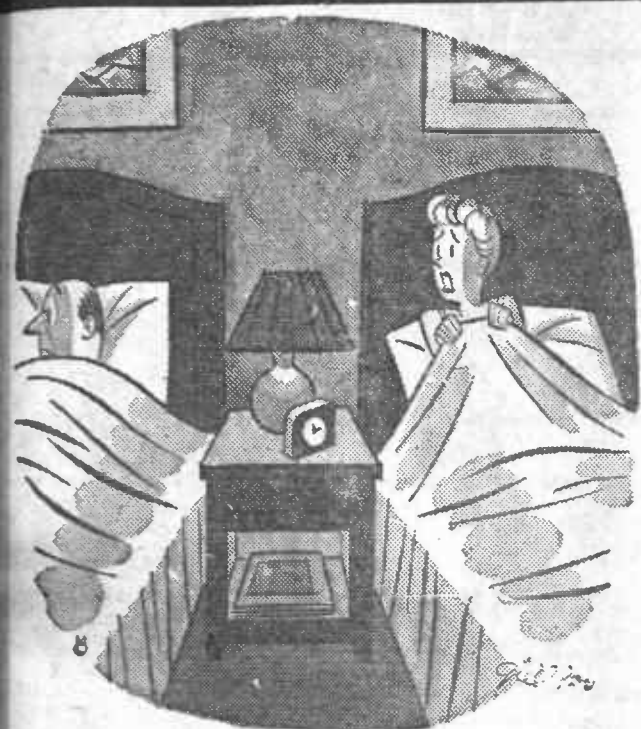

In addition to a big bump of curiosity, the persons sought must have imagination, resourcefulness, and a high potential for research work in engineering or the physical sciences. Eleven of the top government research laboratories located in and around Washington, D. C., are among the Federal agencies seeking the inquisitive college seniors and graduates.

Mechanics of the search is a nation-wide, written civil service examination which will be given in February at more than 1,000 examination points across the nation. To help push the search, deans of college departments and college placement officers throughout the country have been supplied with detailed information about the examination. In addition, most post offices in the country have been given similar information. Qualified applicants may file for the examination from December 1 through March 3.

"The college seniors or graduates who make the grade will be paid a starting salary of \$5,430 a year and can set their career sights on the highest-level research positions in the Federal Government, if they can measure up to the challenges of the research work and grow professionally in their positions," the Commission said.

The persons selected will be working with some of the nation's outstanding scientists and will be given opportunity for further training to help them along the career ladder. Only research positions will be filled through this examination.

The Laboratories are offering career research positions in the fields of engineering, chemistry, electronics, mathematics, metallurgy, and physics. They are engaged in a variety of research programs ranging from the attainment of ever-increasing supersonic speeds to the use of nuclear power. The laboratories are all modern with some of them possessing the best research instrumentation in the world.

To measure the research potential of the people being sought, a tough written test will make up the major part of the examination. The test has been prepared by Civil Service Commission experts in cooperation with scientists of the 11 Federal laboratories. In effect it is a scientists' test to measure scientists.

Government laboratories which will employ the successful applicants are: David Taylor Model Basin, in Maryland, six miles northwest of Washington, D. C.; Diamond Ordnance Fuze Laboratories in Washington, D. C.; Fort Belvoir Engineer Research and Development Laboratories, 20 miles south of Washington; National Bureau of Standards, in Washington; National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Maryland, a few miles north of Washington; Naval Air Test Center, at the mouth of the Patuxent River on the Chesapeake Bay, near Washington; Naval Gun Factory, on the Anacostia River in Washington; Naval Ordnance Laboratory,

in Silver Spring, Maryland, 11 miles north of Washington; Naval Propellant Plant, 20 miles south of Washington; Naval Research Laboratory, on the Potomac River in Washington; and the Naval Proving Ground, Dahlgren, Virginia, south of Washington on the Potomac River.

Further information is given in Civil Service announcement No. 175 which may be obtained from most post offices throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, 25, D. C.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Tishomingo County Ministerial Association wishes to point out that Lotteries, Raffles and other such practices of chance are violation of the Laws of the State of Mississippi.

The following are excerpts from Laws of Mississippi governing such forms of gambling:

LOTTERIES

If any person, in order to raise money for himself or another, or for any purpose whatever, shall publicly or privately put up a lottery to be drawn or adventured for, he shall, on conviction, be imprisoned in the penitentiary not exceeding five (5) years.

SALE OF TICKETS

If any person shall sell, or offer or expose for sale, any lottery ticket, whether the lottery be in or out of this state, or for any other state, territory, district or county, he shall on conviction be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, or imprisoned in the county jail not less than ten days nor more than sixty days, or both.

BUYING OR HAVING TICKETS

If any person shall buy or have in his possession any lottery ticket whether the lottery be in or of or in any other state, territory, district or county, he shall, on conviction, be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, or be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding ten days, or both.

RAFFLES

If any person, in order to raise money for himself or another, shall publicly or privately put up, or in any way offer any prize or thing to be raffled or played for he shall, on conviction, be fined not more than twenty (\$20.00) dollars, or be imprisoned in the county jail not more than one month.

Raffling is where persons pay in shares the total value of an article and then determine by chance which one shall have the article.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT

By Albert Sanders, Ex. Dir. N. Miss. Development Association

A charter has been granted the Corinth and Counce Railroad Company, which will construct a 15 mile railroad from Corinth to Counce, Tenn., terminating at the Tennessee River port and a 23 acre rail yard connecting with the main lines of the Illinois Central and Southern Railroads at Corinth. The new railroad will serve the Tennessee River Pulp & Paper Company at Counce. Additional industrial sites will be available at the port and along the railroad.

Tupelo — Hoerner Boxes, Inc. announced the location of a \$250,000 corrugated box manufacturing plant at Tupelo. Ground breaking ceremonies were held on November 25th with Mr. R. N. Hoerner, Chairman of the Board, announcing the location and turning the first spadeful of dirt at the plant location in the G M & O Railroad industrial area on South Green Street. The company will construct a plant of 40,000 to 60,000 sq. ft. which will employ between 50 and 75 persons when operations begin.

Holly Springs — The City of Holly Springs has requested authority for a \$200,000 BAWI bond issue election for the expansion of Holly Springs Brick and Tile Company. The Mississippi A & I Board now has the request under considera-

tion. Holly Springs—The City of Holly Springs has requested authority for a \$200,000 BAWI bond issue for construction of a new brick plant for lease to Southern Brick & Tile Company of Malvern, Ark. is proposed by Marshall County. Early action is expected by the Mississippi A & I Board on the Marshall County request.

New Albany — Voters in the Third District of Union County approved the issuance of \$340,000 of BAWI bonds for construction of an egg processing plant, to be leased to Mississippi Federated Co-ops. The vote was 1409 for the issue and 22 opposed. The plant will employ approximately 100 persons and process eggs from twenty Northeast Mississippi counties.

Bruce — A charter has been issued to Schoona Manufacturing Company, Inc., a new furniture manufacturing company which is expected to begin operations in Bruce in the near future.

Shannon — The Board of Supervisors of Lee County will receive construction bids on January 6th for the \$100,000 Sesta Manufacturing Company plant at Shannon. The plant will be constructed under the BAWI Plan and leased to Sesta by the County. Bonds were sold to the First National Bank of Mem-

phis for an interest rate of 3.583 per cent.

Batesville — Bids for the sale of \$1,000,000 of BAWI bonds to finance construction of a 200,000 sq. ft. plant for Big M Metal Products Company at Batesville will be opened by the Panola County Supervisors on December 9th. Construction contracts are expected to be awarded on December 17th. The new plant will employ between 150 and 300 persons.

Louisville — Expansions and improvements for the Pet Dairy Products Company at Louisville have been announced by Robert O. Jenkins. Construction is scheduled to be completed early in 1959. Pet recently purchased the plant from Winco Dairies.

I. D. Briefs
The new \$750,000 fertilizer plant operated by Mississippi Federated Cooperatives at New Albany has begun production of clover brand fertilizer. Production is expected to reach 60 tons per hour next spring—Full scale production is expected to begin in February at the new H E F Corporation ammonium perchlorate plant at Columbus. Initial capacity is 4,000,000 pounds per year—Initial production of sodium chlorate at the American Potash & Chemical Corporation at Hamilton is scheduled to begin in mid-December. Pro-

duction employees will begin reporting to work on December 1st. The \$5,000,000 chemical plant has a production capacity of 15,000 tons of sodium chlorate per year.

New information on wintering cattle has been released by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station in a recent report on tests conducted at Mississippi State University.

A group of heifers wintered on silage with no cottonseed meal lost an average of 54 pounds each during a 65-day period. A similar group receiving silage and 1 pound of cottonseed meal daily gained 24 pounds during the same period. Two pounds of meal with silage produced average gains of 71 lbs.

Despite good spring pastures, the heifers which lost weight during the winter did not overcome this loss. Eight months after the test ended they averaged 42 pounds less weight than heifers fed 2 pounds of meal the previous winter, and 14 pounds less than the 1-lb. group.

In reporting these results, Dr. Ben Barrentine said: "Equally as serious as the loss in weight which is never overcome is the fact that cattle that lose considerable weight are much more susceptible to diseases and may die as a result of malnutrition and disease."

"Feeding of a protein supple-

ment such as cottonseed or soybean meal is particularly important for cattle that have to forage for their feed under adverse winter conditions. Cattle that receive no protein supplement are listless and don't go out and get such feed as is available."

Another test, with oat straw as the roughage, indicated need for a minimum of 1.5 pounds of cottonseed meal per day for yearlings when poor quality roughage is used. Dr. Barrentine said this test also showed the fallacy of trying to substitute a little corn for cottonseed meal in wintering rations.

The complete report is published in the December issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

Quite a few American families wouldn't be serving fruit cake as a Christmas day dessert if it had not been for the British sailors of several centuries ago.

Those British sailors must have been as shrewd as they were observant. In the Orient they ate cakes made with fruit. They liked

Although fruit cake was made available to the western world by British sailors, the first fruit cake, as we know it, probably was baked in Egypt several centuries ago. It consisted of several kinds of tropical fruits, sugar, wheat meal, spices, oil and honey, all collected by the Egyptian housewife.

In modern America, the housewife may walk into a bakery or grocery store and buy a delicious fruit cake of almost any size,



and with a minimum of effort. And the cake she buys is the finishing touch for the best meals to be served during the holiday.

Racial Crisis Statement Signed By 97 Methodists

Ninety-seven Methodists are among the 311 clergymen of 17 denominations in Atlanta, Ga., who signed a statement on "The South's Racial Crisis," which was made public Nov. 23. An earlier statement, issued a year ago and often referred to as the "Atlanta Manifesto," was signed by 80 ministers, including 20 Methodists. "The months which have elapsed since the signing of that statement have been a period of deepening danger," the ministers emphasized. The ministers who signed the new statement "do not believe in the wisdom of massive integration and are sincerely opposed to the amalgamation of the races." However, they pointed out that "the Supreme Court's interpretation of the Constitution has the effect of law in our country . . . the citizens of our country have the right to work through legal processes to secure the correction of judicial errors or the repeal of undesirable legislation. They do not have the right to defy laws simply because they personally hold them to be unwise or harmful."

Go!
Lesson for December 14, 1958

A WEALTHY American woman with time on her hands and unable to become interested in any of the things that need doing around our country wanted above all things to "contemplate." She achieved her hope, and incidentally some notoriety for which she no doubt hadn't hoped; but as any one might guess, she had to go outside the Christian religion to find what she wanted. She joined the Zen sect of Buddhism, a sect that specializes in contemplation.

Dr. Foreman

What she was looking for was a spectator religion, and Christianity is not a spectator religion. A spectator sport is one you look at but don't play. A spectator religion is one where you just think. Buddha, the founder of the religion this lady chose, is nearly always pictured sitting down (and very fat he gets, too). The object of life for the Buddhist is to escape life. (Buddha himself started out by deserting his family.) The object of life for the Christian is to take his part in it, and by the way he takes part in it to change it.

"To Be With Him"

A religion which would be all action and no thought, would be as one-sided as a religion all thought and no action. A Christian who never drew aside from the crowd, who never tried to get a perspective on life, who never once asked himself, "What am I doing here? What does life mean? Would be an unbalanced Christian, just as unbalanced as one who took out all his religion in meditation. There are two significant statements by Mark—mere phrase, but illuminating—which illustrate the twofoldness of Christianity from the very first. When Jesus chose the Twelve, Mark says he appointed them "to be with him" (Mark 3-14), and "to be sent out." First of all they had to be with him. There would have been no use in sending them out before they were well acquainted with him, learning his mind and his purpose. It was important then and no less so today that a Christian, to be of service in the world, must live intimately enough with Jesus so that when he does active service he will serve in the spirit of Christ and not only his own.

"To Be Sent Out"

Dreaming is easier than doing. Plans can be made with less effort than production. If Jesus had appointed his apostles simply to be with him, and nothing further, he would have founded what Buddha did, an order of monks. Now there have been monks in Christendom, even "contemplative" monasteries from which no monk ever emerges into the world again. But the leaders of Christianity, from Jesus on, have never supposed that contemplation is the first and last word for Christians in this world. One of the last things Jesus said in the Upper Room, was, "I appointed you that you should go and bear fruit . . ." The very last thing that Matthew records Jesus as saying was a sentence beginning with the word "Go!" Now if a Christian has really been with Jesus, if he has absorbed his spirit and accepted his truth, he will in a real way take Jesus with him wherever he goes. (More correctly, Christ takes him.) Our Lord multiplies himself through these dedicated lives.

The Call Today

All that has been said is true for all Christians. But just as, in those days, some men, the apostles, were chosen as set-apart men with their whole energies given to the Christian witness, so in these days, God calls some Christians to some form of special full-time, set-apart service. Some are called to be evangelists, some pastors and teachers as Paul said. But young people do not always realize that ministers are not the only kind of full-timers there are. Most churches have a variety of places open for Christians of many different kinds of talents. If you will write to your denominations headquarters and ask what openings there are now, here and abroad, for full-time Christian service, you will be surprised—and very likely challenged—by the human needs which are crying, right now, for the help which the church is prepared to give . . . if they can find the dedicated people.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service

What's better than a bowl of hot, tasty soup on a cold winter day? A favorite is the vegetable soup made with soup bone or broth and some of those canned or frozen vegetables from your summer garden.

I have recipes for a couple of other soups you may like to try—one using potatoes and another onions.

Onions . . .

Did you ever think what your cooking would be without onions? How many different ways and dishes you use them besides that pot of vegetable soup?

Remember they make a good main vegetable dish also. They can be baked, creamed, boiled, broiled, steamed and French fried.

Baked Whole Onions
6 large onions
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper

Ground savory, thyme or marjoram

Onions may be baked in their skins. Wipe them, without peeling and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F) 1 to 1 1/4 hours or until tender. Remove from oven and remove skins. Season with butter or margarine, salt, black pepper or
