Area Road System Discussed By Commissioner Adams In Meeting Held Recently At Clausil Hill; Improvements Are Scheduled

On Friday night, December 5,
some 250 persons attended a meet-
ing at the Clausil Hill Church near

old Cairo to discuss area road
work with State Highway Com-
missioner Roy C. Adams. The meeting
was arranged by Milton Phiffer at
the request of citizens of this area.

In the evening's discussion, Com-
missioner Adams explained the
process whereby a road becomes
a highway. The first step, he noted,
is for the legislature to designate
a road as a future highway.

This action authorizes the county
Boards of Supervisors and the
Highway Commission to work to-
gether to bring the road up to
standards necessary for transfer of
ownership to the Highway Depart-
ment.

Many times, the Commissioner
explained, work of this type must
be financed by local bond issues or
be done section by section over a
long period of time.

"Just a few years ago," he pointed
out, "the highway between North
Crossroads, Burnsville, and
Cairo was a county road. So was
the road from four miles west of
Cairo to Rienzi. Now both are state
owned roads."

They would still have been
county roads," said Mr. Adams,
"without the cooperation and ef-
forts of the Boards of Supervisors
of Alcorn, Tishomingo, and Prentiss
counties. These boards have
worked diligently toward bringing
roads up to required Highway De-
partment standards."

Due to the increasing costs of
maintaining area roads, the com-
missioner said that "the Highway
Department must discourage the
addition of roads to our highway
system in the future, except for
those that will be important con-
nections and will help to form a
better balanced highway system."

In discussing the possibility of
construction projects on roads in
this area in the future, Mr. Adams
said that "these highways can be
compared with the conditions that
one existed on highways 30 and
4 east of Booneville. At one time,
both of these highways were on the
secondary system. We succeeded in
getting Bureau of Public Roads ap-
proval for placing Highway 30 on
the primary system while leaving
Highway 4 on the secondary sys-
tem."

"Because we receive more pri-
mary funds than secondary, we
were able to spend primary money
on improving Highway 30, while us-
ing secondary funds on improve-
ments to Highway 4."

Commissioner Adams noted that
the highway from Midway through
Rienzi is on the secondary highway
system. Work scheduled on this
road is as follows:

(1) Grade, drain, and bridge pro-
jects between Midway and Cairo
and from approximately 3 miles
west of Rienzi to Highway 45. Cor-
tract has already been let on this
section.

(2) Grade, drain, and bridge pro-
jects from the vicinity of the GM &
O railway east of Rienzi to ap-
proximately 3½ miles toward Ja-
cinto. This project is now program-
med and should be advertised for
contract by the fall of 1959.

"Due to shortage of funds for
secondary construction, it is im-
possible to say when the remain-
ing portion of this road will be
placed under contract," said Mr.
Adams. "We do, however, recog-
nize its importance to this area, and
want to finish it as soon as financ-
ing will permit our doing so."

The Commissioner noted that the
road from Burton to Cairo to Cross-
roads has been made a part of the
federal aid primary system upon
recommendations from the High-
way Department. Plans for this
road include:

(1) A project from Burnsville to
North Crossroads which includes
drainage, grading, and bridges. This
should be advertised for letting in
the winter of 1959.

(2) Grading, drainage, and bridge
work from Burton north to Cairo,
a distance of approximately 7 miles.
This project should also be adver-
tised for letting in the winter of
1959.

"Because this road is on the pri-
mary system, we will receive more
money for its construction than if
it were a secondary road," said
Mr. Adams, "and, therefore, con-
struction progress should be made
at a satisfactory rate of speed."

In discussing these road plans,
we do not want to make any mis-
leading statements," he said, "but
with the cooperation of the citizens
of this area, we can, I think, pro-
vide a program of road improve-
ments that will be pleasing to
everyone."

Board Of Water Comm. Set Dec. 31 As Deadline For Filing Commercial Claim

Deadline for filing claims by persons and firms using surface water prior to enactment of the 1956 water rights act is December 31, the Mississippi Board of Water Commissioners has warned.

The deadline was set by the legislature and unless prior users file their claims before that time they will be considered along with new applicants according to the priority in which the applications have been filed.

"All claims (except for Domestic uses) received after December 31, 1958, will have a priority corresponding to the date the claim is received at the office of the Board at 429 Mississippi Street in Jackson," Jack W. Pepper, Water Engineer for the Board, stated. "With the extension of time granted by the 1956 Legislature, the persons who were using surface water prior to April 1, 1958 have had at least two years in which to have their claims established."

Mr. Pepper said, "In order to protect the priority date based on the date that the use was initiated, claims must be filed at once. After December 31, 1958, the claims, regardless of date of initial use, will be given priorities in exactly the same manner as that used for the application for permits—the date that they are received at the office of the Board."

"All uses beginning after April 1, 1958 must make an application for a permit. Before making an application, the applicant should secure assistance from reliable sources to plan the proper equipment for the proposed project."

"Domestic Uses defined as the use of surface water for ordinary household purposes, the watering of farm livestock, poultry and domestic animals and the irrigation of home gardens and lawns—are not affected by the amendments to the act, and continue to be recognized as the highest priority."

"The Board must have a record of all domestic uses of surface water or approval of permits for other uses may cause critical shortages and unnecessary expense."

"Forms for claims and for applications may be obtained from the county agent's office in each county, and any of the county agricultural workers can furnish assistance in completion of the forms and the preparation of the necessary maps."

The Mississippi Board of Water Commissioners has established surface water rights for approximately 1000 persons who actually made beneficial use of water from water-courses, lakes, or other natural water bodies of the state, prior to April 1, 1958. Rights have been established for all municipal users of surface water, and the Board

feels that most of the industrial users have had their rights established. There are still a few agricultural users who have failed to file a claim for the establishment of their rights.

Safety Council Urges Awareness Of Parents' Responsibility To Children

The Mississippi Safety Council urges parents to be aware of their responsibilities to their children and to their community to Christmas time this year. John C. Underwood, President of Mississippi's citizens' safety organization, specifically reminds parents that their obligations go beyond that of providing a suitable number of toys and

gifts for their children.

"Since many children," stated Underwood, "will receive fireworks, guns and engine-powered vehicles for Christmas, their parents must accept the responsibility of teaching them the proper use of such gifts." He further stated, "Improper use can quickly change the gift into a lethal weapon, but much of the danger can be removed by the application of a few simple safety rules. But each parent must remember that he is responsible

for his own child's safety and actions."

"Christmas giving is an established institution in our state," Underwood said, "but the Mississippi Safety Council would be derelict in its duty if we did not urge parents to accept the added responsibility of instructing their children in the proper use of potentially dangerous gifts at Christmas time."

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500 People Died In Traffic Accidents In Miss. This Year

Mississippi's 500th traffic victim of 1953 is dead.

The 500th victim, 21-year-old Robert Hearn Kimbrough of Morgan City, died Wednesday, December 10, in a Memphis hospital of injuries received in a two-car collision near Greenwood November 28.

The young Mississippi State University student and two fellow students were occupants of a late model station wagon which swerved into the path of another vehicle 1 mile east of Greenwood about 1:30 a.m. November 28.

All three, home for the Thanksgiving holidays, are now dead, and young Kimbrough, who hung on tenaciously to life for 13 days, earned the dubious distinction of being 1953's 500th fatality.

The wreck which killed the three Mississippi State University students is typical, according to the Highway Patrol, of the tragic accidents now occurring on Mississippi

highways: a multiple fatality wreck caused by a careless mistake and subsequent traffic violation.

The best which investigating officers could determine from the wreck, the right wheels of the station wagon in which young Kimbrough was riding as a passenger dropped from the paved surface onto the shoulder. The vehicle then swerved out of control into the opposite lane of traffic into the path of an oncoming car. The station wagon, occupied by the three students, was struck broadside.

There were no survivors in the station wagon.

Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough has repeatedly warned in press and radio appeals to motorists that the one-two Sunday punch which is causing Mississippi's mounting highway toll is simple acts of carelessness, followed up by death-dealing traffic violations.

The Greenwood accident was apparently such an accident.

"Driving an automobile is serious business," states Commissioner Scarbrough. "And the only way to drive safely is to drive alertly and properly."

The Highway Patrol head grimly predicts that Mississippi's 1953 traffic toll will jump slightly above last year's death count.

Last year, 526 were killed in motor vehicle accidents.

Already this year, the 500th victim has become a statistic.

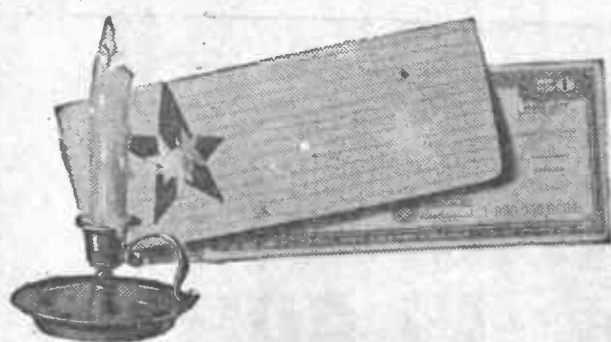

Highest Accident Rate On Christmas Eve; Make This One Safe

More fatal traffic accidents, involving more pedestrian deaths, occur each Christmas Eve than any other comparable time of year. "This fact," states John Underwood, president of the Mississippi Safety Council, "has been determined through study by the National Safety Council." Underwood, "can make this the safest Christmas season in years simply by observing the basic rules of driving." "Darkness, bad weather, speed, alcohol and pedestrian errors are given as the causes of most of the accidental deaths on Christmas Eve." "Certainly by being more aware of these hazards Mississippi families may escape the tragedy of a saddened Christmas Eve."

Underwood further warned, "Business firms can do much to avoid the Christmas week accidents by avoiding the drinking office party. Information shows that 55 percent of the traffic accidents occurring during the Christmas week period involve drinking drivers."

Not Depleted By Ten Years Of High Corn Yield

Iuka College, Miss.—Close spaced and high fertility, practices can have boosted per-acre corn yields in Mississippi about 50 percent in recent years, apparently do not deplete soil resources. Research agronomists continue to get high yields year after year in a study of the long-term effects of these practices at the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station. Edward V. Jordan, soil scientist at the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has recently reported the experiment, which included 10 years of high fertilization and an 11th year when no fertilizer was applied as a test of the cumulative effect of the previous treatments. He reported the following results: During the first ten years the pound-nitrogen, 12000 plant treatment proved very effective. Compared with the least intensive treatment, common when the experiment began, there was an increase of 67 bushels of corn per acre, and the grain was almost two percent richer in crude protein. Residues were increased by more than two tons per acre, and less cultivation was required per year. Intensive cropping may aggravate deficiencies of micro-nutrients

on some soils, although it did not do so in this experiment. Continued use of acid-forming nitrogen fertilizers made it necessary to add lime periodically. Except for increased acidity, the soil of the most intensively cropped plots was not depleted. On the contrary a small, though definite, improvement in bulk density of soil in the plow layer was measured. In the year after fertilization was discontinued cumulative benefits were responsible for a 16-bushel increase in yield. These results indicate that corn can be grown almost continuously by these high-fertility practices on non-erosive soils with reasonably stable structure. Mr. Jordan's complete report is published in the December issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

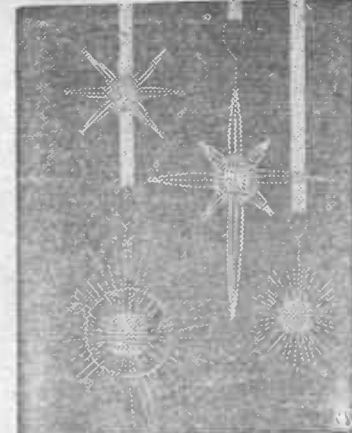

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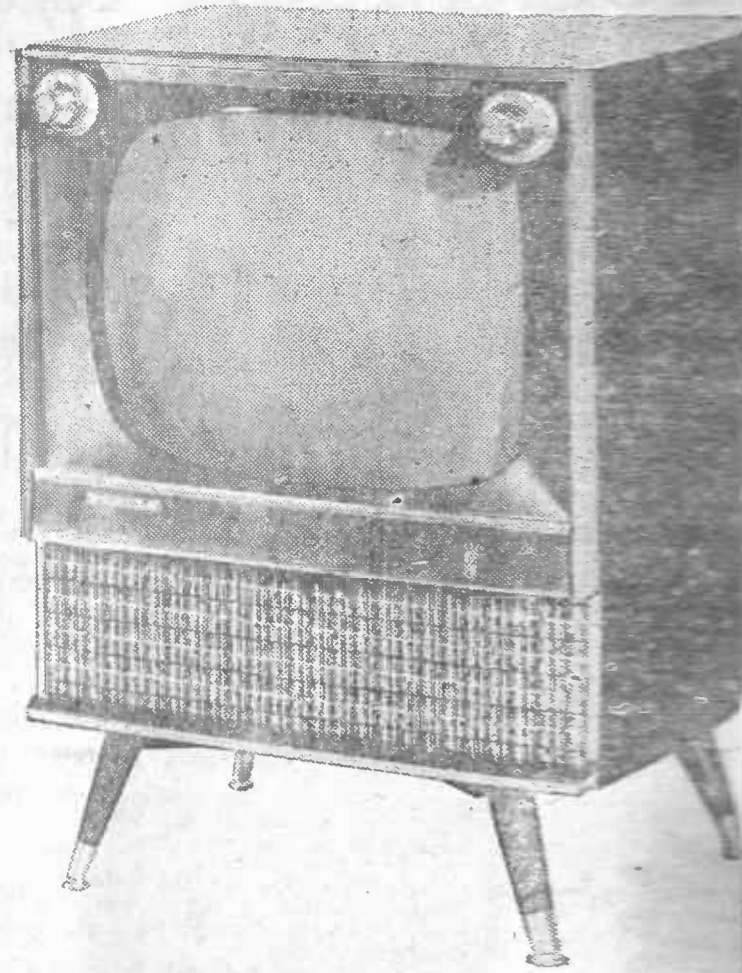

Carelessness Is Main Factor In Highway Deaths; Increase Over Last Year

Automobile in careless punch responsible for today's traffic deaths is carelessness coupled with a traffic violation. Mississippi Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough has recently warned that the one-two

ing up a traffic violation which kills is the Sunday punch responsible for the present upward trend in our highway death rate," Commissioner Scarbrough states. Any traffic violation is dangerous. But according to the Highway Patrol head, the "careless mistake" violation causes more traffic deaths than the deliberate, intentional violation.

"Very few motorists deliberately

set themselves up for an accident by swerving across the center line in front of an oncoming car, or crashing through an intersection stop sign against oncoming traffic. "Most of these violations result from simple carelessness," states Commissioner Scarbrough. Mississippi's October death toll increased 27 percent over the corresponding toll for October 1957. The 55 who died as a result of October traffic accidents brought to 426 the year's highway death figure.

Several multiple fatality accidents contributed to the higher October death count. Also given partial blame by Commissioner Scarbrough were shorter daylight hours for driving and approaching winter

weather. "However, the number one cause of our accidents," Commissioner Scarbrough believes, "is still driver carelessness."

State Harvest Nearly Made, Crops Good

Mississippi's 1958 harvest, just about complete, has produced excellent corn yields, good soybean yields and fair cotton yields. In addition, winter pastures generally are in good condition and cattle are in good flesh. 95 per cent of the bumper corn crop in Greene County

has been harvested and farmers are beginning to receive and plant pine seedlings. Crops are nearly all harvested in Lee, Clay and Marshall Counties. Planting of clovers, grasses and small grains in Scott County is nearly complete.

Christmas Trees As A Source Of Income

Mississippi farmers have an opportunity to expand their income by growing Christmas trees. Tests indicate that the Arizona Cypress apparently is best suited for our soil and conditions. From seven to fifteen years are required to grow trees in some other areas but the Arizona Cypress can be grown to marketable size in as few as three years in Mississippi. Forty million Christmas trees are used each year in the United States with 12 million of these imported from Canada. Home growers might profitably raise more of the trees now being brought in across our northern border.

Anti-Shanty Project Progress

The Delta Council is making progress in its efforts to remove abandoned and dilapidated tenant houses that dot farms. The following reasons for their removal are: 1. They take up land that could be utilized for crop production. 2. They are a winter haven for boll weevils and other insects. 3. They provide an ideal spot for growth of weeds and noxious grasses. 4. They interfere with efficient use of farm machinery, dusting and spraying. Mississippi is getting to be a better place everyday in many ways.

December Garden Work

With the coming of winter, less will be found to do in the garden in December than any other month, however, bulbs may still be planted, but not quite so deep now for good blooms. Now is a good time to do landscaping, especially moving shrubs when the ground is wet. Also, trees may be cut and pruned of dead limbs marked earlier in the year. December is the lull be-

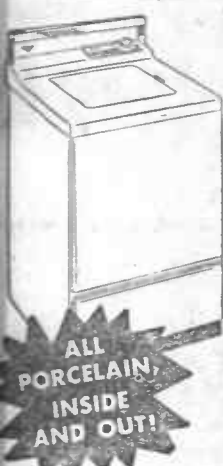

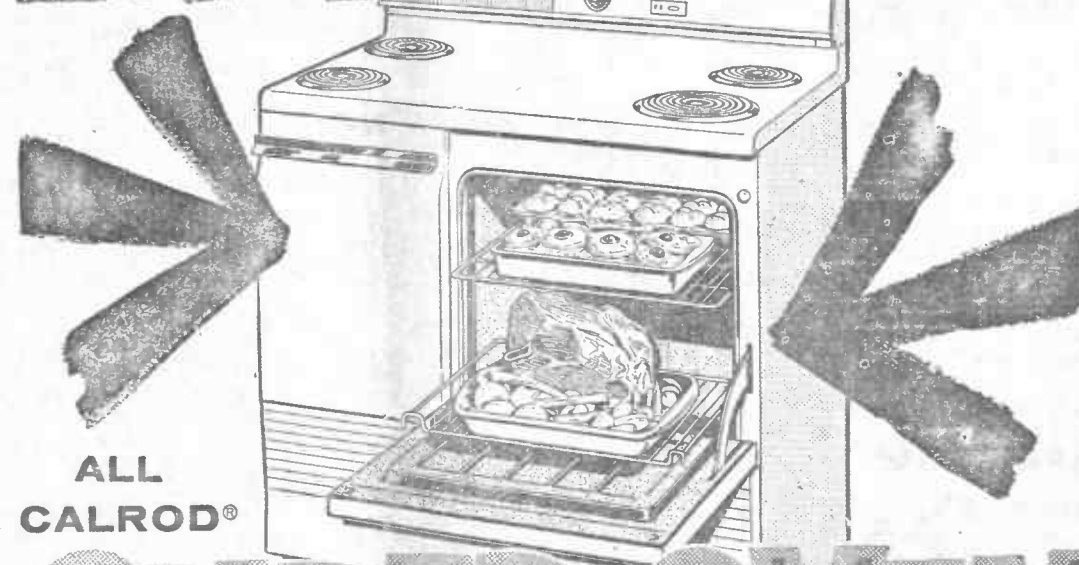

Every family has its favorite Holiday foods—many of them made from recipes handed down in the family for many generations. Some of you may like to mix the "family" recipes with some new ones. I hope the recipes included in this column may add to the Holiday pleasures of your family and friends.

Christmas Cranberry Salad
1 pkg. raspberry gelatin
1 cup hot water
1/2 cup cold water
2 cups cranberry sauce (jellied or whole)

1/2 cup diced, canned pineapple
1 small orange, peeled and diced
1/4 cup chopped nuts
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add cold water and chill until partially thickened. Fold in other ingredients. Chill until firm.

Individual Fruit Cakes
Use your favorite fruit cake recipe. Drop into fluted paper cups placed in muffin pans. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees F.) until done—about 45 minutes. Cool. Store tightly covered.

Sugared Nuts
3 cups sugar
1 tablespoon flour
Juice and peel of 2 oranges
2 tablespoons butter
4 cups pecans
1 cup milk

Combine sugar, flour, milk, orange juice and orange peel, which has been cut into fine slivers. (Peel orange and use scissors to cut the rind into small strips or fine slivers.) Cook to a soft boil. Remove from heat, add butter, pour sirup over pecans, and beat until creamy. When creamy put on waxed paper and separate nuts.

International Union Sunday School Lessons

Joy
Lesson for December 21, 1958

A MAGAZINE which advertises expensive things—cufflinks for \$100 and over, cute little earrings for \$500, mens shirts for \$15 each—carried once a full-page advertisement with exactly eight words besides the manufacturer's name. It read: "JOY—the most costly perfume in the world."

As an ad for perfume, that was obviously silly. It would appeal only to the kind of person who does not ask, "How good is this?" but "how expensive is it?" You do not raise the quality of your merchandise merely by raising the price.

Nevertheless, as a parable, or a starting-point for meditation, that is worth several minutes' serious thought.

Joy Is Life's Perfume

Perfumery is at the same time one of the most useless and yet most popular things sold. How many thousand gallons of it, will be sold for Christmas presents no one knows. And yet what good is it? A very practical-minded character might ask. All it does is to smell good. Ah, but that is just the point. Let the reader think back over the happiest moments of his or her life. Isn't it true that some sort of fragrance pervades each happy memory? The mint in Grandmother's back yard, the turkey at Thanksgiving, the smell of the Christmas tree, and the spring lilacs, and the perfume she wore the night she said "Yes." An odorless world would be a dull world. It's the pervasive and haunting fragrance of life that lift it out of the commonplace.

So with joy. Unlike perfume, it has no market value; but like perfume, its usefulness is mainly indirect. As there are cheap and vulgar perfumes, so there are cheap and vulgar joys. But there are rare and exquisite joys too. The same situation, the same relationship, the same duty, the "same old story" can be for one person a drudgery and for another a delight, because one person lacks the joy the other has. Just as literal odors make past moments memorable, so joy makes life's best moments memorable.

Fragrance of Christmas

Christmas is a time of joyous fragrances; but if they are all for the body and none for the soul, we have missed the true fragrance of Christmas. There is a word in the Greek New Testament which, the first time it is used (John 12:3) means literally fragrance—the odor of the precious ointment which Mary poured on Jesus. Four other times it is used figuratively in speaking of the "fragrance" of the Christian life. This and another word (II Cor. 2:15, Eph. 5:2, Phil. 4:18) suggest that the Christian life is more than correct, it is lovely. Beauty is inwoven with Christianity. The perfume of joy comes to us in the song of the angels, in the song of Mary, in the adoration of the shepherds. Whenever Christ has come, it is as if sour and horrible odors had been replaced by fragrances from beside the River of Life. What are the high days the church celebrates? They are called, and they are, "feasts" or festivals. Christmas and Easter are seasons of joy; not reckless devil-may-care pleasures, which is quite another thing, but joy that links earth to heaven.

Good News of a Great Joy

How stupid and twisted some definitions of religion seem, in the light of the Christmas story! You may detect at least some of the counterfeits passing for Christianity by this, that they are joyless, they are without fragrance. An enemy of Christianity once defined religion as a sum of scruples—in other words, a mess of Don'ts. "A would-be friend of Christianity defined this religion as 'God's attack on man.' We should take our cue from the joyous angels, not from such gloomy scholars. Did the angels sing, 'You'd better be afraid—we have a whole new list of Don'ts!' Did the First Angel shout in a voice of doom: 'I come to announce God's attack on man!'—? Christmas is the word of freedom to men in prison, Christmas is the word of joy to a world in sorrow, the coming of a Rescuer to a world that was lost.

Meat Type Hogs Mean More Money
If you raise hogs for market, meat-type hogs will make you more money.

The more muscular, meatier hogs, cost less to produce, command top prices at market and provide the kind of pork the average consumer demands.

Tests show that meat-type hogs gain just as fast as fat-type and at a feed saving of around \$1.00

for each 200 pounds of pork. The higher percentage of high value pork cuts in meat-type hogs makes them more desirable to buyers.

On a live-weight basis, meat-type hogs yield 34 to 37 percent in the four lean cuts—ham, loin, Boston butt and picnic. Some of the fat-type yield 30 percent or less.

Meat type hogs can be produced by selecting gilts and boars that have adequate length—a 30-inch carcass on a 200 pound hog. They should have thick, muscular conformation with just enough fat at market weight to give quality and flavor to the cuts. They must come from sows that farrow and raise large litters of pigs. They must be fast growing and convert feed pork efficiently.

Strive for nine or more pigs per litter, 100 pounds of 325 pounds of hogs ready to market in five or six weeks.

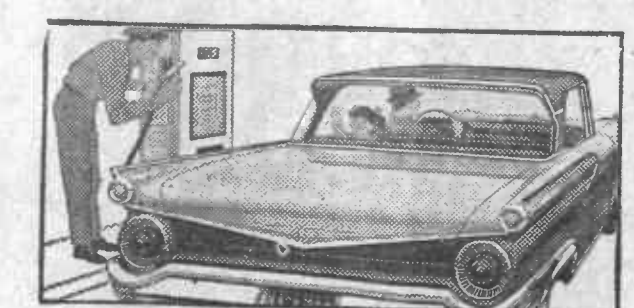

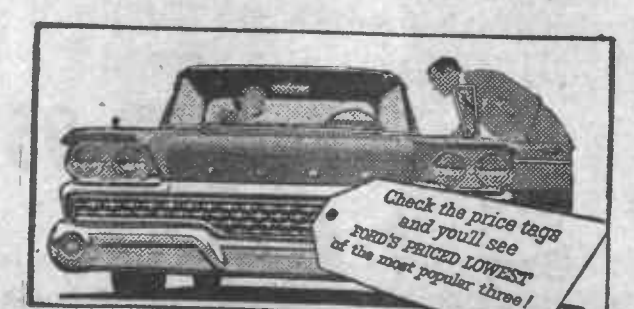
