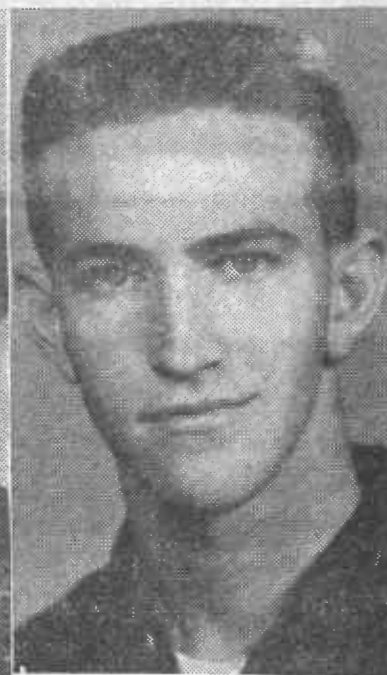

Five Deer Killed During Recent Hunt

'58 Season Ended
Monday At Sundown;
9 Taken This Year

Five deer were killed during the last 4-day season of the year, Game Warden Buster Marlar reports. The 4-day period ended at sundown Monday and brought to a close the 1958 split season in which nine deer were taken in the county. Four were bagged during the 4-day open season at Thanksgiving. Those getting their deer during the latter period were Estes Joslin of Iuka route 4, a 125 pound, 3-point buck; Jack Sharp of Iuka Route 4, a 200 pound, 7-point buck (Mr. Sharp is 78 years old). These two were taken in the north end of the county.

Others being lucky were Edward Carter of Belmont, a 220 pound, 8-point buck; Arnold Cleveland, Belmont, a 123 pound, 2-pt. buck, and Clyde Jackson of near Belmont, a 200 pound, 6-point buck. The latter three were taken in the south end of the county.

Arthur Pruitt Fatally Shot At Home Near Cherokee

Tragedy Occurred Monday Night;
Eugene George Is Held In Jail

Arthur Pruitt, a son of Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Pruitt, was fatally shot at his home Monday night about 9:30.

Held in Colbert County Jail in Tuscumbia is Eugene George, a 17 year old boy, who did the shooting. By late Tuesday afternoon no charges had been placed against young George pending an investigation by the Colbert County Sheriff's office.

The shooting occurred about 4 miles north of Cherokee. Young George and Ray Pruitt, eldest son of the dead man, had been hunting Monday afternoon, returning to the Pruitt home. Arthur Pruitt and George became involved in an argument in which Pruitt slapped George. Pruitt's wife and son succeeded in getting him to quiet down and young George prepared to leave. As he went out the door Pruitt again slapped him down. George got up and continued to make his way out. Pruitt followed the youngster and when he got outside pulled a knife. At this time George shot, hitting Pruitt in the short ribs in the right side. He was pronounced dead on arrival, according to Colbert County Sheriff's office. Weapon used was a 12 gauge shotgun.

In addition to Pruitt's family, others present were Jack Posey, a neighbor, and Elmer Horn of near Iuka.

Mr. Pruitt was a veteran of WW II and was a lifelong resident of this area. In addition to his parents of Eastport, he is survived by his wife, Eddie Mae Crowell Pruitt; seven children, Ray Delton, 16, Jackie Leon, 14, Dorothy Angela, 11, Jimmy Dale, 9, Sarah Mae, 6, Karen Jane, 4, and Debra Sue, 3; three brothers, Lester and Vester Pruitt of Iuka, James Pruitt of Chicago; four sisters, Mrs. Virgil Ledbetter of Iuka, Mrs. Gail Nolen of Baton Rouge, La., Mrs. Junior Harp of San Diego, Calif., and Miss Betty Pruitt of Eastport.

The body is at the home of his brother, Vester Pruitt, in the Jones subdivision at Iuka. Funeral services will be held at the Morris Hill church in Colbert county at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon. Brown Service of Tuscumbia is in charge. George is being held without bail during the investigation by Colbert County Deputy Sheriff Donald Files. Mr. Files states that in all probability young George will be charged with first degree murder pending presentation of the case before the Colbert County grand jury. A preliminary hearing has been set for January 12 in the Law and Equity court in Tuscumbia. Judge Leonard Burt will preside.

THE GIFT OF FREEDOM

The Christmas season in America is a season of giving presents. The material gifts that appear under Christmas trees during this time are always welcome. But Americans, living in a free nation under God, should never forget they have a gift, handed down to them by their forefathers, that is far more valuable than any material gift. That gift is the gift of freedom, the love of liberty.

This nation of ours may not have been founded by Divine Guidance, but it was certainly founded under fundamental Christian principle of the freedom and dignity of the individual, the right of the individual to carve out his own destiny and choose his own future. This is the gift Americans should cherish above all others. The price of keeping this gift is eternal vigilance.

Not every citizen can lavish on his family gifts of great value from the material standpoint. But all citizens can give to their children and to other persons this priceless gift of love for the liberty our forefathers won for us.

There are persons and groups in this country who say this appreciation of the gift of liberty is out of fashion. They urge that Americans put their trust in the "gift" of the welfare state, in a socialist brand of collective security, in the wisdom of the economic planners and alien ideologies of one sort or another. Such gifts are harmful; they should be rejected. Urging free citizens to accept the present of doctrines destructive of traditional American liberty is like urging a person to accept a narcotic as a gift.

There are many occasions during the Christmas season for appreciating the meaning of liberty, our greatest gift. This is a season in which the fantastic abundance and richness of this land is revealed in countless Christmas stockings and around a myriad of trees. For Americans of all ages, this is a time of plenty. The wonders produced by American industry fill the stores of the nation. The relatively small number of Americans who live lives of poverty are the recipients of charity on a colossal scale.

This immense outpouring of gifts at Christmas time testifies to the fruitfulness that results from a climate of liberty. For people in socialist countries, richness and abundance are not the result. Socialists feed people on promises that they are unable to fulfill. They also feed people on hatreds of the capitalist lands that produce real goods, not political quackery. Whether Americans are to enjoy abundance in the years to come will depend, however, on the degree of appreciation in their hearts and minds of the gift of liberty. Abundance comes from liberty to work as one pleases without the crippling restrictions imposed by bureaucrats and government planners. In recent decades a distressingly large number of Americans have failed to value this gift of liberty. If this number increases, the fruitfulness the nation enjoys may disappear. Socialist authority and drabness may replace the plentifulness of free enterprise America.

This is a prospect that should be considered at Christmas time. In viewing their many gifts at this season, citizens of this bountiful land should remember the greatest gift of all. They should remember that a New Year follows close upon the heels of the Christmas season. The New Year is a time for making resolutions. A new resolution to work for individual liberty and against the forces that threaten to destroy it in tomorrow's America should be made by every citizen. We should all be trustees of the gift of liberty so that it can be bestowed on the next generation of Americans.

Food for '59

Food . . . the cost and supplies . . . are important to homemakers in 1959. Will food cost more? Or less?

The prediction from the U. S. Department of Agriculture is that the food bill may be a little less this year. For some items at least. You can look for more meat, especially pork and broilers. If we don't have a repeat of cold and freezes of last winter in the vegetable and fruit growing sections, we should have more of these foods. And lower prices follow where we have increased supplies.

Another prospect in the food picture is a new food products. They will be familiar foods in fresh combinations and forms. Be on the watch for them. They will save time and work, especially for the growing numbers of wives working away from home.

Expenses of Working Wives
Are you one of the wives who work away from home? Or one who is considering a job?

A "yes" answer to either of these questions, will interest you in comparing your family and home situation to the results of a recent survey made in Georgia.

The women interviewed in the survey were wage-earning wives in small cities. They reported what they made and what they spent.

About 30 cents out of every dollar they earned went for expenses directly related to their jobs. This included social security payments, income taxes, transportation and lunches.

In addition they had expenses for hired help for child care, laundry, sewing and general housework. These costs were higher for them than for families with full time homemakers.

Spending for hired help was especially high in families with children under six years old. The working wives also spent more for their clothing than other wives in families with the same income.

January Plentiful
Back to the food situation for the present month. Young chicken and potatoes are the headliners among the January plentiful foods.

We have enough broiler-fryers for every person in the United States to have at least six during January. Try your six in your favorite ways . . . fried, barbecued, broiled. Oven barbecues now are just as good as those outdoor ones in the summer time.

Apples will be in good supply, too. For cold-weather meals, try hot apple pie with melted cheese on top, hot baked apples or hot apple sauce.

Other foods you may find as specials and good buys this month are canned and frozen sweet, tender green peas, dates and nuts, vegetable fats and oils and salad oils.

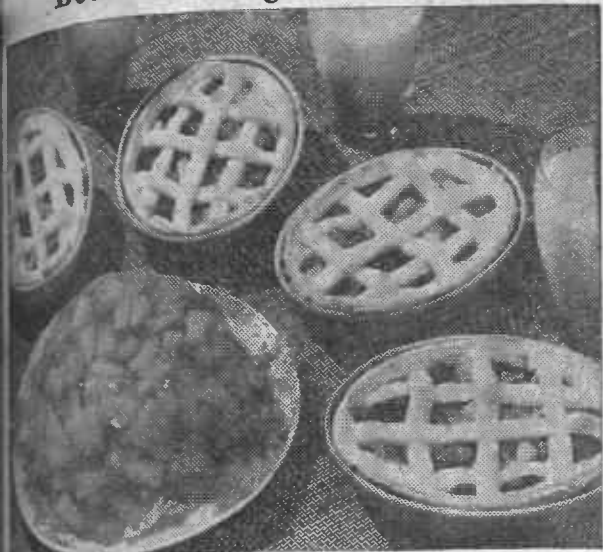

Beef and Vegetable Pies

BEF AND VEGETABLE PIES
 1 cup sifted enriched self-rising flour
 2 teaspoons salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 1 pound beef stew meat, cut in 1-inch cubes
 2 cups shortening
 2 cups water
 1 small bay leaf

4 small potatoes, cubed
 4 medium carrots, sliced
 1 large onion, diced
 1 cup cooked peas
 2 tablespoons enriched self-rising flour
 1/2 cup water
 Biscuit Strips

Melt shortening in large saucepan and brown meat slowly on all sides. Add water and bay leaf. Cover and cook over low heat about 1 1/2 hours. Add potatoes, carrots and peas; continue cooking until meat and vegetables are tender. Stir in peas.

Add 2 tablespoons flour with water. Stir into stew and cook until gravy begins to thicken, stirring constantly. Fill individual casserole dishes 2/3 full. Top with Biscuit Strips and bake in hot oven (425°F.) 15 to 20 minutes.

BISCUIT STRIPS
 1/2 cup shortening
 1/2 to 3/4 cup milk

Cut or rub shortening into flour until mixture is crumbly. Add milk to make a stiff dough. Turn out on a lightly floured board or pastry cloth and knead about 30 seconds. Roll out to an 8 x 12-inch rectangle. Cut into strips 1/4 inch wide. Place strip around edge of casserole dish. Make lattice tops with remaining strips. Makes 4 servings.

Let Us Resolve To Do More To Save Our Soil In 1959

This is the beginning of a New Year and a good time to resolve to do more than we have ever done before to save our soil.

The fundamental idea behind soil and water conservation programs is to use the land in such a way as to conserve it for future generations.

Each of us are stewards of the blessings God has given us. Chief among our many, many blessings is our soil. It is from the soil that we receive most of our food, clothing and shelter. Without these necessities of life we could not exist. Yet we are most careless in our use of our land.

What are the uses we make of our land? They are: 1. For growing timber; 2. For growing row crops; 3. To produce pasture and hay; 4. To construct our homes, towns and cities on; 5. For highways and parkways; 6. For public parks and playgrounds; 7. Miscellaneous uses including cemeteries, gravel pits, stone quarries, etc.

If land is used for timber it should be established in the most profitable kind of timber it is capable of growing. A dense growth of blackjacks will cover the land and prevent erosion, but blackjacks are not as profitable as a stand of loblolly pines would be.

If you have some acres of woodland now growing blackjacks, resolve now to set these acres to loblolly pines in 1959 and girdle the blackjacks to release these, newly set, pines in 1960.

If you produce row crops resolve now to plant these crops on the most level productive land that you have. You may be able to increase your per acre yield of row crops by proper fertilization and insect control. By producing more per acre you may be able to grow all the row crops you need on your more level land, and then you can plant pasture or sod crops on land too steep for continuous cultivation.

If you have hill pasture that is

mostly bitter weeds and "Pore Joe" resolve now to establish as much of this land to a good sod of Pensacola Bahia grass and lespedeza as you possibly can in 1959.

If you plan to construct a field road in 1959, resolve now to locate this road down a ridge, or around the lower side of a terrace, or a long a stream or ditch bank. Above all resolve now to put a field road up, and down a hill where it may cause a deep gully.

If you do not know what the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District is, and if you do not know how the soil conservation service personnel working through this district's commissioners, can help you with your soil problems, resolve now that you are going to learn all you can about this district and the services rendered by the soil conservation service personnel during 1959.

Resolve now that you are going to be a better soil and water conservation farmer in 1959 than you have ever been before.

The better soil conservation farmer you are, the better steward you will be, the better steward you are the better citizen you become, and the better citizen you become the greater man you will be, so resolve now to be a real soil and water conservationist in 1959.

Local Business

A regular advertiser came to his newspaper with a good piece of news. He was planning to increase the size of his usual advertisement.

"Suppose I double the size of my ad, could I expect my sales to double?" He asked.

"Probably not," was the answer. It would be something of a miracle for sales to increase in exact proportion to an increase in advertising. Certainly, a business may expect more sales from larger ads. And often the additional sales more than pay for new advertising costs in a short time.

One of our publisher friends tells what happened when a grocery store in his city began using more space for his advertising.

The grocer found; that by increasing the size of his weekly ad by 50 per cent he could increase his sales volume by 12 per cent.

In this case, the large ad was immediately profitable. For, while the 12 per cent increase in sales amounted to \$58,000 annually, the 50 per cent increase in advertising costs came to \$1,100 per year.

Thus, newspaper advertising is so economical that even a small percentage increase in sales can more than pay for a large increase in advertising space.

However, immediate increase in sales may not be the most important benefit to be derived from larger ads. Larger advertisements mark a store as being progressive and reliable. The public recognizes the large advertiser as a business with an eye on the future.

Prestige gains from advertising are cumulative. From a long range view, they may be more important than immediate sales gains as a reason for using more advertising space.

Job Total Growing In Quantity And Quality

A substantial and encouraging gain in Mississippi's industrial employment has advanced us a notch, from 33rd place nationally in 1950 to 32nd place in 1957 according to recent reports. Mississippi's industrial employment rose from 64,510 eight years ago to 106,337 last year. Equally encouraging is the fact that our manufacturing employment has been making gains in higher paying categories. These solid gains in a relatively brief period of time establish beyond question that Mississippi is on the march.

Fire Prevention Schools Throughout State

The State Forestry Commission has planned a series of county-wide forest fire prevention schools that are to be held over the state. The purpose of the schools is for promoting a more effective fire prevention and control program. This is especially important at this time for this is the period in the year when our woodlands are in the greatest danger of burnings. The latest techniques in fire prevention and control are given and a schedule of countywide meetings will be set up.

History of Honey Reaches Back To The Earliest Times

Honey is a natural food that has a long history to substantiate its goodness. Even in prehistoric times, pictures show that man sought

honey. Just as in the ancient world honey was highly regarded and versatile, so today honey is known to be pure, valuable in food content, and adaptable to many uses. Bacteria which harm human beings are unable to grow in honey. Honey is composed largely of sugars that are readily absorbed by the body and do not tax the digestive system.

Towers of Strength In Modern Living

The Church is the greatest factor for building strong character in the modern world. It is the house of spiritual values. Four good reasons why every person should attend services regularly and support the Church of his choice are: (1) For his own sake. (2) For the sake of his children. (3) For the sake of his community and nation. (4) For the sake of the Church itself, which needs his moral and material support. The character and quality of American society is necessarily based on a strong religious foundation.

Make Plans For Forest

Eight areas in Mississippi have been selected for Pilot Forests in connection with one of the most intensive forest development programs ever undertaken for small woodlands, which is being sponsored throughout the South by the Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association. The Pilot Forests will be located in Tishomingo, George, Lawrence, Madison, Lincoln, Clarke, Jackson and Jefferson Counties.

Predict New Record In Construction Work

Mississippi's steady gains in construction, one of the most reliable of all economic gauges, have continued month after month during the current year and may well set some new records in 1959. Our optimism is based on a current estimate that next year's national construction volume will probably top the \$70 billion mark for the first time in American history. The construction industry this year has been important. Assuming that Mississippi will enjoy a proportionate share in this new construction, the forecast is significant and encouraging.

A-1 Pecan Crop Seen For State This Year

Statistics indicate that Mississippi's entire pecan belt will harvest approximately 135 million pounds this year, or some 20 million pounds more than last year's crop. Local buyers are said to be paying from 20 to 26 cents a pound at present in the South Mississippi area. 1958's exceptionally fine and abundant pecan crop has offered additional employment and is a real boost for the economy of these counties where pecan raising and marketing is a major enterprise. While not a leading item in Mississippi's agricultural picture, pecans afford a welcome source of profit for a sizable number of people.

Business Unusually Good In Meridian This Year

Construction permits, new records in retail sales, bank clearings and other important economic factors point to a great year for Meridian. Expansion of trade and marked increase in construction were the high points of the year. Retail sales through October totaled \$52,730,000 as compared to \$51,445,000 in the same period in 1957. This was an increase of 2 1/2 per cent. Building permits for the same period jumped to \$4,735,000 as compared to \$2,835,000 in 1957—100 per cent increase.

Berries In Profusion

Weather conditions have been ideal this past summer and during early fall resulting in the most gorgeous display of Holly berries in history at Holly Bluff Gardens near Bay St. Louis. Especially colorful are the native holly varieties which are heavily covered with berries. Other varieties in full color are the Chinese Holly and English Holly and many other rare displays of this traditional Christmas decor-

Bogue Chitto Farmers Find Farm Workshop Pays Well

Bogue Chitto farmers are finding that a farm workshop can save them vast sums of money and endless hours of valuable time, as well as provide them with labor saving tools and make possible the enjoyment of numerous pieces of farm, home and lawn equipment. Four have already set up their own farm shops and others are planning shops on their farms.

Electronic Equipment Will Be Used

The Delta Weather Station, established at Stannettville to coordinate with agricultural research will soon be the first weather project in the nation using electronic computation. The aspects of the weatherman's job are: (1) in research, to prelate the vast information about weather to agriculture in a pilot program that may be expanded elsewhere; (2) in forecasting weather specifically for the Delta area with interpretation as to how the farmer can best use the information, and (3) in getting this information out as quickly as possible.

modern apartment houses,—especially of the co-operative type. Old houses of all kinds will depreciate during 1959.

36. Woodland will continue to be in demand during 1959. This especially applies now to pine, which is used for the best lumber, and to spruce, which is used for pulp. Hold woodland in 1959.

37. More Russian imports of pulpwood may be expected in 1959; but this should largely be offset by the increased domestic demand for cartons and packages for shipping and displaying merchandise.

38. Both timber and oil reserves of Canada will gradually increase in value. I am bullish on many Canadian and African investments.

39. The greatest factor in determining the price of city land and businesses in general is the automobile and availability of parking space. This is responsible for both the boom in suburban real estate and the decline of city property. Buying city real estate without nearby parking facilities is a great mistake.

40. I was wrong in my forecast a year ago as to the Dow-Jones Averages. Although many stocks sell lower today than a year ago, the Dow-Jones Averages—especially the Industrials—sell higher. However, I will again run the risk and forecast that they will sell lower sometime in 1959 than they do today.

41. My forecast of the bond market for 1959 was correct. I am inclined now to reverse that forecast in the case of long-term nonconvertible corporate bonds,—that is, they should sell for less sometime in 1959 than they are selling for today.

42. I continue to forecast that high-grade, cumulative, noncallable first preferred stocks will sell higher sometime during 1959 than they do today.

43. I repeat what I said last year regarding "cheap" stocks. "The large fortunes made in the stock market have come from buying non-dividend-paying common stocks at \$5.00 a share or under. These will be the first to reach a buying level. If you are to buy these low-priced common stocks, you should seek companies without too much prior debt or cumulative preferred stock outstanding. They are the best common stocks for "capital gains."

44. Convertible bonds should hold up fairly well during 1959.

45. The best investment policy for 1959 is for one now to have a good bank account so funds will be available to buy bargains when a sufficient break comes in stocks, bonds, real estate, and commodities.

46. There will be many failures in hastily organized electronics, nuclear, and similar companies during 1959.

47. With two or three exceptions, railroad stocks should be avoided during 1959, and until a definite long-range program of government aid is assured.

48. For steady income and fair marketability, well-established utility stocks should be the best for conservative investors not looking for profit. This especially applies to cumulative first preferred non-callable utility stocks.

49. The three handicaps to American business are the fear of inflation, the fear of union labor leaders, and the fear of President Eisenhower's physical collapse.

50. The three hopes for America are our churches, our schools, and a desire to "pay as you go" for these to function properly we must depend upon the parents of our nation.

County Agent news

Happy New Year

Your county agent and his co-workers wish you and yours a very happy and prosperous new year.

Take some time off the next few days and make a few resolutions for 1959. Not the kind that you will break tomorrow, but the kind that will help you make a larger profit from the coming crop year.

Check outlook information and see what is expected price and supply wise during 1959.

Some of the suggestions for 1959 made by your agricultural workers include fertilizing permanent pastures for increased grazing without increased acreage.

Make every acre of cotton pay big dividends. Follow recommendations regarding fertilization, planting, insect control, harvesting and marketing.

If in the past you have neglected your corn crop and have not made good yields, you can do something about it. We hear someone say

every now and then that they can buy corn as cheaply as they can grow it. This might be true when yields are less than 40 bushels per acre. But when proper fertilization is used, when adapted hybrid seed corn is planted and the corn is

Legislator Lashes Moderates; Calls For Tax Reduction

Rep. Brown Williams Warns 'False Security' Is Dangerous

A Mississippi legislator Tuesday lashed out at moderates on the question of segregation and states rights and warned against falling into a sense of false security because there has been no racial violence in Mississippi.

Representative Brown Williams of Philadelphia, who has announced his intention to run for lieutenant governor said "it is not a work of solitary genius that has kept us free from trouble. It is the unconquerable will and determination of our people to maintain these laws and customs."

In a speech at Macon, he called on Mississippians to "reinforce our determination with uncompromising diligence instead of weakening it with moderation."

He said, "The instant our determination is weakened by the slightest compromise the forces who want to overturn our laws and customs will strike with all their force."

"We must," he said, "reaffirm allegiance to ourselves, and our state, making it unquestionably clear we will not swap our time-honored traditions for the tainted glory of National recognition."

Representative Williams declared "this solemn pledge should not be made in the disguised language of political doubletalk, but in simple words of truth that even a child can understand."

The Neshoba County lawmaker warned, "We must not fall into a sense of false security by constantly reminding ourselves that so far no efforts have been made to overturn our laws and customs."

mended reducing the income tax as an inducement to industry and said the total state income could be increased and at the same time have a lower tax rate.

"We can't afford not to reduce our taxes," he said.

"Industrial experts agree that a tax reduction would increase our total income. They are anxious to come to Mississippi and invest their dollars. They like it here—we have an ample supply of raw materials, a central market location in the South, and a good climate."

"Our tax rates now are as high as we can stand them. We can't raise the rates to get more money on which to operate the state, yet demands on the state government keep increasing."

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

On the subject of industrial development Williams said, "Mississippi is losing out to neighboring states in the race to attract industry because the administration-controlled Senate refused to make our tax laws competitive despite the efforts of some thoughtful senators to do so."

The legislator, who is also president of the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, charged "Until we substitute a statesmanlike attitude for petty politics in our industrial program, we will continue to lose industrial payrolls."

"Whatever success we are having," he said, "could be increased greatly by making our tax laws more reasonable."

He called attention to two legislative committees which recom-

The recent period of usual cold, and the possibility of more such weather, makes cattlemen keenly aware of the winter feeding problem. A timely report on wintering cattle was released recently by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station.

A group of heifers wintered on silage with no cottonseed meal lost an average of 54 pounds each during a 65-day period. A similar group receiving silage and 1 pound of cotton seed meal daily gained 24 pounds during the same period. Two pounds of meal with silage produced average gains of 71 lbs.

The heifers which lost weight during the winter did not overcome this loss, despite good spring pastures. Eight months after the test ended they averaged 42 pounds less weight than heifers fed 2 pounds of meal the previous winter, and 14 pounds less than the 1-pound group.

Besides weight loss that may ever be overcome, cattle that lose considerable weight are much more susceptible to diseases. They may even die as a result of malnutrition and disease.

When cattle have to forage for their feed under adverse winter conditions, it is particularly important to feed a protein supplement such as cottonseed or soybean meal. Otherwise, the cattle will be listless and tend not to go out and get such feed as is available.

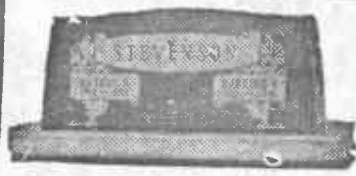

communities no one will give them jobs at all.

Can Faith Cure Everything?

Aside from all other questions of what faith can do, take this one: Can faith cure everything? We know now (that is, doctors know) that faith goes a long way in the healing process of any disease, and may be a major force in some cures. It has been reliably estimated that more than half the patients in American hospitals at any given time would be discharged at once, if their attitude were changed; in other words more people are hospitalized for basically psychological reasons than for physical reasons. The physical trouble is there, but it's the mental slant that causes the physical spill. But can faith cure everything? Can faith ward off everything? If a smallpox epidemic were threatened, should a Christian refuse vaccination and rely only on his faith? Most Christians would say No; all health departments would say No. And all Christians agree that some troubles are not curable by faith. You cannot pray a broken, torn-off arm back into existence. Destroyed brain cells never grow again, for saint or for sinner. The very church that believes most in miracles is the one most famous for its hospitals.

Three Questions
Nevertheless it was at the bottom of the mountain that faith was most needed. The reader is invited to picture the story for himself. A crowd of bystanders... most of the incidents recorded in Jesus' life had this background of the gawking crowd. The disciples, red-faced, hot and flustered, trying to do a miracle and falling flat. The boy and man who were the center of the "crowd"; the boy an epileptic perhaps even then in a convulsion, and his distracted father, begging for help but getting none.
Epilepsy is a disease of the nervous system which is always embarrassing and sometimes dangerous. In those days (and in these too, without special medical help) attacks would come on without warning. The patient falls unconscious; if near water, he may drown, or if by a fire, he may burn to death without help. Epileptics are not crazy, indeed they are often brighter than "normal" people. But they cannot often hold well-paid jobs, and in superstitious

Can Your Faith Help Me?

Another question: Can one man's faith help another man? In this story it was the father's faith that helped his boy. Is this always the case? Again we have to say sometimes yes, sometimes no. Jesus himself performed more than one cure, on the faith, not of the sick persons but of their families or friends. Christians should of course pray for their sick loved ones, pray for doctors and nurses and druggists too, without inquiring, "How much faith can this patient himself have?" Yet there are limits to this. Saving faith, the faith that is a turning from darkness to light, from evil to God, always has to be one's own.

What is Faith's Power

The third question can be answered in very few words. What is the secret of faith's power? It is right in the story. The disciples were powerless, for their trust was in themselves. They had forgotten to pray. Jesus connects faith with prayer. Faith alone is nothing; it works, only if and because it lays hold on the power of the mighty God.

Apple Trees Provide Fruit And Beauty For 20 Years

College, Miss.—An experimental apple orchard, planted in 1938 at State College, is providing information useful to Mississippi homeowners. A report on the crab apple part of the experiment was made by J. P. Overcash and Dr. I. of the Experiment Station.

Crab apples, the horticulturists point out, are useful for home jelly making, preserving, and blending in ciders. The symmetry of tree and beauty of bloom and tree warrant their widespread planting solely for ornamental purposes. Crab apples should be sprayed or dusted three or four times during the season to control diseases and insects.

The relative sizes from the largest to the smallest trees are: Trans-

endent, Yellow Siberian, hyslop, Dolgo, and Florence. Florence is inclined to be a dwarf type tree and is heavy fruit producer. This variety could be used advantageously on small city lawns as an ornamental. Transcendent is exceptionally vigorous and has outgrown most standard apple varieties at Mississippi State University. The fruit of Dolgo and Yellow Siberian are small and that of Florence, Transcendent and Hyslop are large.

The normal time of ripening for these five varieties is July at State College. Their order of ripening from the earliest to the latest is Florence, Yellow Siberian, Dolgo, Transcendent and Hyslop. Homeowners can select varieties suited to their needs. Sources of trees can be obtained by writing the horticulture department at State College. Trees should be planted during the dormant season from November to March.

Are Taxes Too Low?

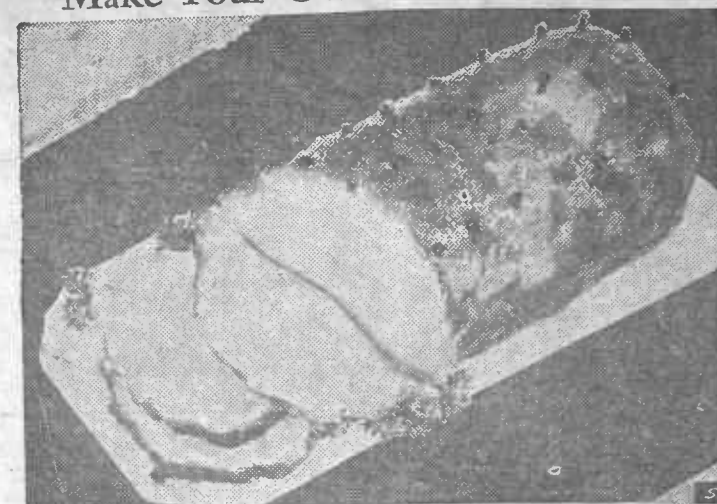
Congress returning to Washington this week for opening of the 86th Congress face a grim warning that all thought of a general tax reduction in 1959 must now be abandoned.

President Eisenhower, it now seems certain, will send to Congress a Federal budget calling for somewhere between three and five billion dollars more than presently estimated revenues for fiscal 1960. That will put the burden on the Democratic-controlled Congress to (1) slice the budget, (2) approve an increase in the Federal debt, or (3) find ways of increasing tax revenues.

There is very little in prospect, either in the international or national situation, to encourage expectation that Federal spending will be substantially reduced anytime soon. Despite all the economy talk Congress isn't likely to cut Federal spending appreciably.

Tax Revision Due
There is strong resistance to Congress and among Administration fiscal experts to a continuing increase in a Federal debt that already is nearing \$290 billion.

Congress will be concentrating on ways to increase income from taxes.

Some indication of what congressional tax experts will be considering is given by Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee which has the job of developing "ways and means" of financing the Federal government.

Rep. Mills, considered by many to be the nation's top tax expert, says he will favor a revision of taxing methods rather than an across-the-board increase in present tax rates. Tax income, he thinks, can be increased without an increase in everybody's taxes.

His thinking on taxes is worth close consideration. The job of re-vamping the nation's Federal tax structure is long overdue. It should be based, as Rep. Mills points out, on ability to pay without stressing a "soak the rich" approach.

Broadening the Base
One of the things that Rep. Mills will be aiming at is increased emphasis on direct rather than indirect taxes. He is against hidden taxes. "Taxes should be imposed in such a way that the taxpayer is aware of them at the time he pays them," Rep. Mills said.

He says he is not ready to propose a Federal sales tax, but he thinks the way should be left open

for that method if it becomes necessary sometime in the future.

"A great deal of revenue could be provided," he said, "by a broadening of the tax base, removal of some special deductions and preferences, and an increase in rates on some specially favored income."

He favors a "flexible" system of taxes that would raise them during periods of national prosperity and lower them during business recessions. "The tax system should be geared to collect proportionately more taxes in good times and proportionately less in bad times," he said.

Rep. Mills' recommendations make sense and, although tax increases are never popular, they deserve the careful consideration of all congressmen.

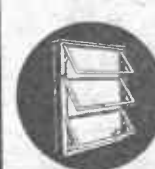
