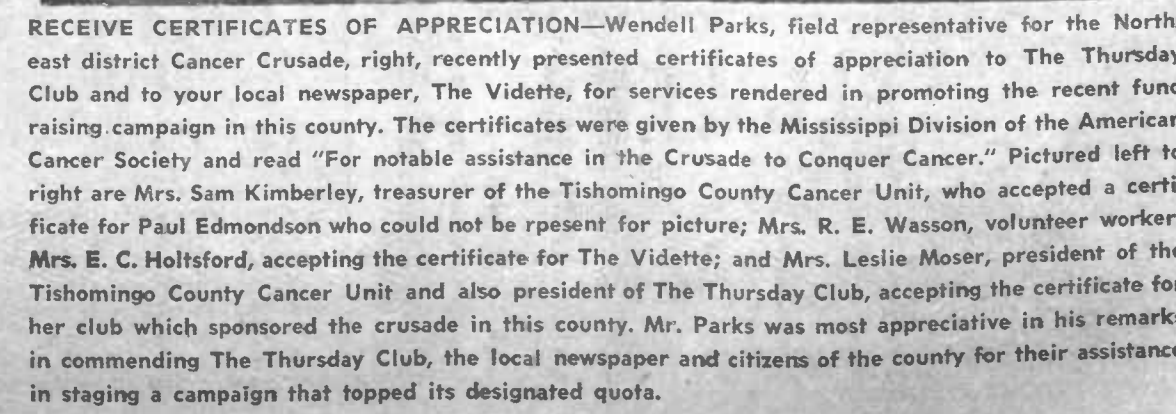

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL RESOLVED TO BE FREE

At few times in the history of this nation has there been the need for making and keeping resolutions as exists at the beginning of this new year. For the most part, New Year resolutions are light-hearted things—jokes that people bandy among their friends. Only in times of great national crisis, as in the midst of a foreign war, have Americans committed themselves at the beginning of a new year to serious resolutions of high importance.

As the year 1959 opens, Americans do not find themselves locked in any shooting war across the seas. Nevertheless, a silent war between the forces of freedom and tyranny is taking place in every American community. There is a fifth column in the United States. It is dedicated to the overthrow of individual liberties, states rights and the free enterprise system. This 5th column is aided by many citizens who mistakenly regard assaults on freedom as progressive reforms.

I am not speaking of any communist conspiracy, though communists have played their part in its origin and development. I am speaking mainly of the campaign being launched by a handful of arrogant union bosses to fasten a hold on American government at every level.

There are 175 million Americans today. Only 15 million are members of unions. Of these 15 million, only a select band of union political agents wield any power. The real powers of decision are vested in a few hands—in the persons of men such as Jimmy Hoffa and Walter Reuther. Despite their small numbers, they hold most of the political power in the country. They do so because they are organized. They have a political apparatus in the AFL-CIO that enables them to raise money and participate in political campaigns from precinct to presidential election. They are able to buy the services of every sort of political worker—from blackjack-equipped thugs to clever, smooth-speaking economists.

This fifth column is infiltrating every area of American life. Jimmy Hoffa has announced that he intends to organize policemen and municipal employees. Victor Reuther, brother of the United Auto Workers chief, tells educators that a corps of speakers is being formed to take the union message to college audiences. The union bosses are planning to deploy 100 paid lobbyists in Washington to bend Congressmen to their will. Many Congressmen arriving in Washington this month for the first time will be owned outright by the AFL-CIO.

The aim of the union bosses is to completely centralize the American government and the American economy, as is the system in Russia. For the time being, they are content with working through existing political parties. But last month President George Meany of the AFL-CIO warned that the union bosses might start a labor party.

If this country were at war with an enemy overseas, every patriotic citizen would resolve to resist with all his might tyranny over America. People would be willing to spend unlimited time and money to preserve local government, free business and grass roots independence.

But a war is raging within this country and these same citizens must resolve to fight right here. The way to fight is by supporting men in public office who won't appease the union tyrants, by joining letter writing campaigns for worthy causes, by urging the local press to investigate the tactics of the unions on the local level, and by actively promoting free, conservative government in one's home community.

If the fifth column of unionist tyranny is to be checked, Americans who love the rights they were born with must work harder and longer than the agents of the Hoffas and Reuthers. To do so is the ideal New Year Resolution for patriots.

Local Business

When does advertising cost too much?

No business can find a ready answer to this question. But often a very large advertising expenditure proves to be inexpensive in terms of results.

For instance, last spring a Chicago department store spent \$10,000 for newspaper space to promote a one-day sale. Yet, at the close of business, total sales for the day exceeded \$2 million. So judged in terms of results, the large advertising investment was small indeed.

At times an advertiser may find it profitable to spend a great deal to reach only a handful of potential customers. A Southern community spent \$12,000 in national newspapers in an effort to attract a new industry to town. Only one "sale" was made.

Expensive advertising? No, because the single prospect located a multi-million dollar electrical appliance plant in the community. Each payday the advertising investment is more than recovered.

These extreme examples show that a business can not expect to find a magic formula for establishing an advertising budget. The situation of each advertiser is unique. Conditions of competition from store to store, from product to product from city to city.

The best way for a merchant to make certain that his advertising budget is large enough for optimum development of his business is through trial and error. A fair trial will prove to some merchants that, relative to profits, more advertising may mean less expensive advertising.

Industrial Development Report

Mississippi — Industrial growth in North Mississippi continues at an accelerated rate during 1958. New manufacturing plants employing 25 or more persons were announced during the year 19, which will provide jobs for 150 persons with annual pay of \$4,550,000. Plant investment is estimated to be over 6 1/2 million dollars.

Major expansions were announced in 11 North Mississippi industries which will employ an additional 1,500 persons with annual payrolls of \$1,573,000. The investment in these expansions will exceed 1 1/2 million dollars for plants alone. Many investments would be made in the future.

Industrial payrolls in North Mississippi in 1958 are estimated at \$4,470,000 as compared with payrolls in 1957 of \$7,730,000 and in 1956 industrial payrolls of \$4,466,147. This indicates the industrial growth occurring in North Mississippi. This area continues to gain industrial payrolls which account for nearly one-half

of Mississippi's gain in industrial employment.

North Mississippi communities obtained 10 of the 22 of Balance Agriculture With Industry Certificates issued by the Mississippi A & I Board in 1958. The proceeds from bonds issued by authority of these Certificates are being used or will be used to construct eight new plants and to provide for the expansion of two other industries.

Corinth—Magnolia Hosiery Mill has purchased additional land on which to build a new seamless hosiery mill addition to the present plant. This will nearly double Magnolia's production and add about 48 persons to the work force, with payroll increase of about \$125,000 per year. The mill is owned by Troy Bumpas, Harry Steen and W. O. Wheeler.

Batesville—Contracts have been let totaling \$863,686 for the construction of a 200,000 sq. ft. plant for Big M Metal Products. The BAWI bonds to finance construction of the plant were sold earlier in December to a group headed by the First National Bank of Memphis at an interest rate of 3.645 per cent. The plant will be leased to Big M Metal Products Co. Production is expected to begin in the summer of 1959.

Corinth—The Corinth & Counce Railroad Company has asked the Interstate Commerce Commission for authority to construct and operate a new 14-mile railroad between Corinth, Miss., and Counce, Tenn. The railroad will serve the Tennessee River Pulp & Paper Company Mill, to be constructed north of Corinth on the Tennessee River. Hatley—Production is scheduled to begin January 15th at Hatley Sportswear Inc. The firm expects to employ about 300 persons in the production of pants.

Verona—Construction has begun on the new cornmeal plant for Sunshine Grain Company. A 4-story steel and concrete plant, 40' x 60' will house the cornmeal operation, and two metal warehouses, 120' x 80' and 60' x 30', will be constructed in addition to the main building. The plant is being constructed under the BAWI Plan and leased to Sunshine Grain Company.

Aberdeen—Dedication ceremonies for the new \$1,000,000 Walker Manufacturing Company Plant were held December 12th. Gov. J. P. Coleman spoke at the dedication ceremonies prior to an Open House and tours of the plant. The plant manufactures tail-pieces and will employ in excess of 125 people.

Midway—Midway Manufacturing Company, manufacturers of upholstered chairs, was dedicated in ceremonies held December 12th at Midway. State Representative Brown Williams made the dedicatory address. Production now is about 40 chairs a day and is expected to rise to 100 per day in February. The company employs approximately 40 persons.

Booneville—Production has begun at the Mid-South Quality Egg Company in Booneville. The plant processes fresh eggs and can handle over 500 cases per day, according to Jack Morris, President. The plant will employ between 30 and 50 persons when full production is reached.

Nettleton—Construction is nearly complete on the 30,000 sq. ft. building to be leased to Sista Furniture Manufacturing Company of Shannon. The company manufactures upholstered furniture and will employ 125 to 150 people in their Nettleton operation.

I. D. BRIEFS

Expanded air service for North Mississippi is scheduled in the near future with Southern Airways to serve Oxford and Corinth in addition to their present service at Tupelo and Columbus. Southern will reinstate its services between Columbus and Jackson, Mississippi. Construction is nearly complete in the new hanger at the Corinth Airport. The Civil Aeronautics Administration has approved a commitment of \$147,000 in Federal aid funds for the Monroe County Airport. The airport will be constructed on Highway 25 between Amory and Aberdeen. The Mississippi Industrial Research Center with Dr. Paul Brann as Director, has begun operations in Jackson. The Center was established to provide research and information to assist in attracting additional industry to Mississippi and to aid in the expansion of the development of Mississippi plants—James Phillip Bitting has been employed by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board as City Planning Administrator. The A & I Board has been designated to act as liaison between

Mississippi Communities and the Federal Government under the Urban Planning Assistance Program. Machinery Products Company at Prairie has been awarded a \$1,666,766 Air Force contract for processing and storing Air Force vehicles at the Prairie depot. The North Mississippi Industrial Development Association has completed its annual industrial wage survey of industries operating in North Mississippi.

A Job For Congress

The 86th Congress convening this week in Washington has its work cut out for it.

N Congress since the first Continental Congress convened 180 years ago, has faced more complex and difficult problems involving not only this nation but all of the world.

Democracy was a struggling infant in a hostile world when the first Congress met. The threat to its survival is no less serious today than it was almost two centuries ago.

The entire Free World is looking to the United States for leadership and support in making democracy the strong hope of keeping men free from the oppressions of communism.

The Verge Of War

We are so close to total war that one false step, by either the leaders of democracy or communism, could plunge civilization back into the Dark Ages. This places a terrible responsibility on Congress as well as on the President.

What price must we be willing to pay for peace? In the coming year we will spend more than \$40 billion for defense weapons, plus another \$5 to \$6 billion in foreign aid, to keep democracy strong throughout the Free World.

Even that does not assure continuing peace. The enemies of democracy must know that we will be willing to spend everything even our lives if need be, to keep democracy alive in the world.

The problem of keeping the United States and our allies free from overshadowing everything else which will come before the 86th Congress. We can maintain our freedom, without war, only if we are strong enough to discourage any aggressor.

High-Caliber Leaders

We are fortunate in that we have capable and experienced men on the Congressional Committees which will be directly concerned with military and foreign affairs. They are men who always place national welfare above partisan policies.

In the Senate the chairman of the Armed Services Committee is Richard B. Russell of Georgia, a highly-regarded member of the Senate for more than 25 years. The ranking Republican member is Sen. Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts, a member of the Senate since 1944.

The House Armed Services Committee is chaired by Rep. Carl Vinson of Georgia, one of the real veterans of the House with 45 years of service. He probably knows as much about military affairs as any man in Washington. The ranking Republican is Leslie Arends of Illinois, a member of Congress since 1934.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee is headed by that grand old man of Congress, Sen. Theodore Francis Green of Rhode Island, who was first elected in 1936. Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin, with 21 years in the Senate, is the ranking minority member.

The equally able House Foreign Affairs Committee is chaired by Rep. Thomas S. Gordon of Illinois, 17 years in Congress. The ranking Republican member is Robert Chipperfield, also of Illinois, member since 1938.

It is reassuring to know we have men of their caliber in responsible positions in Congress.

The Great Crippler Arthritis Pains Plague Millions Of Americans in All Age Groups

(Editor's Note: This is the first of three articles on the nature, causes and prevention of arthritis by Dr. William S. Clark, director of medical care of the National Foundation.)

Despite the prevalence of arthritis, most people are uninformed or misinformed about it. Here are three facts they usually don't know:

- Children sometimes have it. In fact, the disease plagues all ages from the infant to the very old.
- Causes and cures are mainly unknown. There are no "miracle" drugs. Diet neither starts nor stops it. Expensive remedies and devices are often no more helpful than the simplest and most economical ones.
- Nevertheless, there is hope for the arthritis sufferer and he need not despair. Aspirin and hot baths relieve pain. Systematic exercises under proper supervision reduce stiffness and restore joint movement. By the same techniques of rehabilitation used on polio patients, those disabled can, in most cases, be returned to useful life.

In this first of three articles I shall tell what arthritis is. The second will discuss what can be done about it; the third will outline hopes and prospects for the future.

Arthritis, a name popularly given to a group of related rheumatic diseases, is one of the oldest ailments known to man. It afflicted prehistoric animals, and has cruelly plagued the Egyptians, Greeks and Romans.

The Greatest Crippler

Today in the United States arthritis or rheumatism tortures, cripples and deforms more people than any other illness. Nobody knows the number of its victims but estimates range from 11 to 30 million. Though few cases are fatal, homes are disrupted, businesses wrecked, careers ruined.

Because of arthritis and the rheumatic diseases an estimated 320,000 Americans are so disabled

that they can no longer work. The resultant loss to the nation in working hours and production, cost of maintaining victims and decrease in income taxes tops a billion and a half dollars a year. Yet despite the magnitude of this disease and its costly ravages, the United States has only about 400 arthritis clinics, mainly in large cities. Only 700 beds are specifically set aside for it in hospitals. Research funds are woefully inadequate and the number of young doctors and researchers recruited as specialists is far below the need.

A New Impetus

The entry of the National Foundation (originally the National Paralysis) into this field gives hope for a tremendous new impetus in research, treatment methods and the training of additional skilled manpower. Since it was the National Foundation that conceived, organized and financed with March of Dimes funds the research that led to the Salk vaccine and a whole galaxy of vital breakthroughs in medical science, we may expect its grantees to make important new discoveries concerning the cause, cure and prevention of arthritis.

Arthritis is primarily a disease of the joints. Usually chronic (i.e., long lasting), it is apt to flare up and subside unpredictably. There are many kinds of arthritis. They commonly attack the connective tissues of the joints, often causing inflammation, swelling, pain, deformity and crippling of the fingers, hands, arms, shoulders, legs, feet or spine. Some forms of arthritis result in fever, general weakness, loss of appetite and weight. In addition to the joints, the heart, lungs, blood vessels, kidneys, muscles, skin and eyes may likewise be affected.

The two most prevalent types are osteoarthritis and rheumatoid arthritis. Together they account for 70 per cent of all arthritis victims.

Persons Over 60

Osteoarthritis is the milder of the two. Some 80 to 90 per cent of all persons over 60 are afflicted by it in greater or lesser degree. A so-called "degenerative disease" due to aging, it results from wear and tear of joint surfaces. The ends of the fingers and the weight-bearing joints—back, hips and knees—are most commonly involved. Men engaged in heavy physical labor, like farmers and industrial workers, are especially prone to it. The disorder usually begins in the third decade of life, but injury or abnormal use of a particular joint

These seem like little things... but the whole idea is: Choose the best utensil to do each job. Make-do's for Kitchen items that are really not expensive take needless time and energy, give poor results and may lead to injuries.

Rely on a wooden board and large knife to chop vegetables. Use a peeler to peel potatoes or silver carrots for salads. You can save time cutting hardcooked eggs by using a pastry blender. Kitchen shears are convenient for snipping parsley, dried beef and marshmallows. An egg slicer saves time when slicing cooked or canned meats. Keep your knives sharp and can opener in good condition.

frees your mind so you can think about other things. Use a good modern cook book and standard measuring cups and spoons.

Slip Shopping

When you go slip shopping look for good workmanship in four places: seams, thread, straps and trim.

The seams should be as durable as the fabric itself—flat and smooth without thick places. Close fine stitching on plain seams that are pinked and stitched on the right side are good for bias seams. Flat, French and lockstitched seams are used satisfactorily on straight-cut slips.

Fabrics stitched with like thread are more durable, as nylon stitched with nylon.

may precipitate earlier joint damage. It is not usually accompanied by inflammation or fever. Though it is painful, its victims are seldom immobilized; except for discomfort, they are not really "sick." Overweight may be a contributing factor.

Osteoarthritis victims in the U. S. probably number many millions, variously estimated from 10 to 25 million. Of these, a million and a quarter may require medical treatment in any given year.

Rheumatoid Arthritis

More serious by far is rheumatoid arthritis. Called the No. 1 crippling disease of the nation, it is an insidious, progressive disease that affects the whole body and may last a lifetime. During acute attacks, rheumatoid arthritis patients are genuinely sick. People of all ages are vulnerable, many in their most productive years of 35 to 50. Three times as many women get it as men. Young mothers often get it badly, especially after the birth of the first child. Symptoms include fever and general weakness, loss of appetite and weight, muscle aches, inflammation, pain and swelling in the joints. These symptoms may abate from time to time, but they usually return, often in aggravated form.

At least one million persons in the United States have disabling rheumatoid arthritis and require medical care. Probably another four million persons have a mild form of this disease. Severe cases end in deformity and crippling. Even the eyes, heart, muscles, lymph glands and spleen may be damaged. Sometimes the joints become permanently rigid.

Afflicts Children

Contrary to popular belief, children suffer from rheumatoid arthritis. The number is estimated at 30,000, with 16,000 a year sick enough to need medical care. About 5,000 or 6,000 of these may require treatment as intensive as the rehabilitation needed by paralyzed polio patients. As soon as feasible, the National Foundation will give patient aid to arthritis children and adolescents through age 18.

The very young are subject to a particularly severe kind of rheumatoid arthritis called Still's disease, which can impede normal bone growth and may, as the child matures, cause severe crippling.

Besides arthritis, other areas of March of Dimes activity are polio, birth defects and virus diseases.

Made from strips of flaky pastry twisted around quartered apples and placed ends-down in a baking pan, "Spicy Apple Twists" bake in a brief 25 to 30 minutes—compared with 45 minutes to an hour for ordinary apple pie.

SPICY APPLE TWISTS

Pillsbury's Best 10th Grand National Recipe and Baking Contest
Recipe Adapted by Ann Pillsbury

2 baking apples, pared, cored and sliced into eight wedges	4 to 5 tablespoons cold water
1 1/2 cups sifted Pillsbury's Best All Purpose Flour	1/2 cup melted butter
1 teaspoon salt	1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup shortening	1 teaspoon cinnamon
	1/2 cup water

Prepare apples. Sift flour with salt into mixing bowl. Cut in shortening. Sprinkle cold water over mixture stirring with fork until dough is just moist enough to hold together. Form into ball. Flatten to about 1/2-inch thickness; smooth edges.

Roll out on floured surface to 16x10-inch rectangle. Cut into sixteen 10x1-inch strips. Wrap one strip around each apple slice. Arrange in 18x24-inch pan, sides not touching. Brush with butter; sprinkle with mixture of sugar and cinnamon. Pour 1/2 cup water over pastries. Bake in hot oven (450°) 25 to 30 minutes until golden brown. Serve warm or cold, plain or with cream. Makes 16.

Look for self-fabric straps made of a double fold and stitched on each edge. Slips with lace trim should have straps that branch off and attach to the fabric in two places.

The trim on the slip you select should be as durable as the fabric of the slip itself. Lace should be uniform, not thick and thin in places. The trim should be smooth and flat.

Slip Care

Don't let your slips get so dirty you have to scrub them. Even dark slips need regular washing.

You can safely soak white slips in lukewarm water and suds, but wash the dark ones quickly. After washing and rinsing, hang evenly on line or rod to hasten drying.

Nylon slips rarely need pressing, but others may need smoothing with an iron. Have these slightly damp. Press on the wrong side with a moderate iron.

Place a folded towel or soft cloth under lace or embroidery to make the pattern stand up nicely.

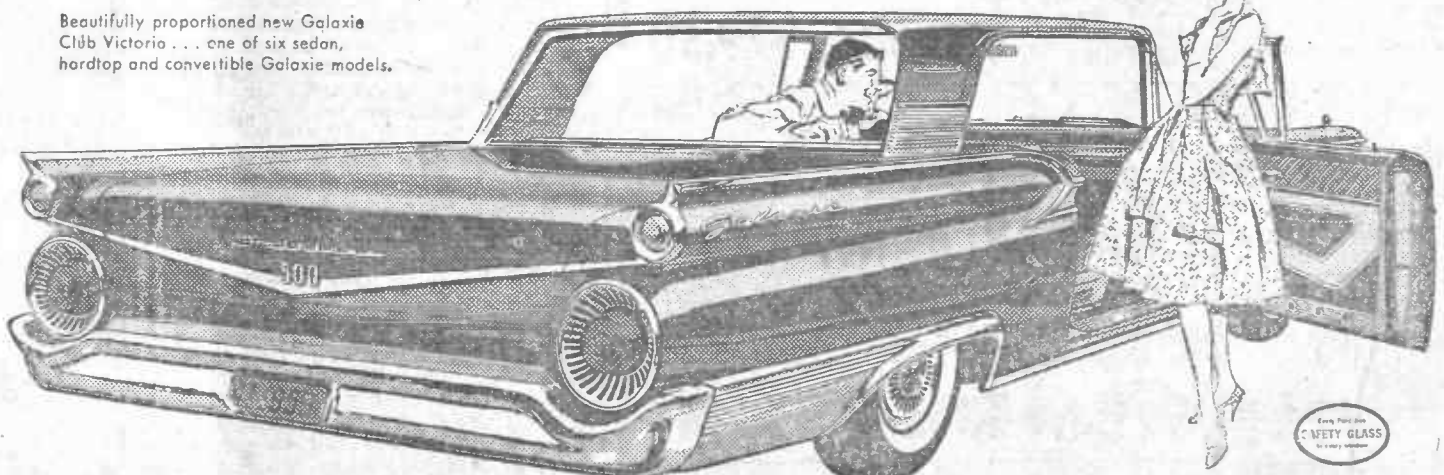

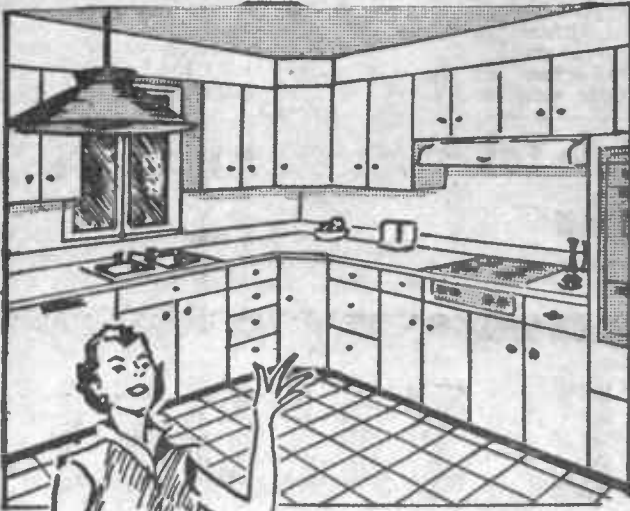

Winter Care of Livestock And Dairy Animals

This cold winter is just as bad on livestock as it is on people. Here are a few things that can be done to help care for your livestock and dairy animals.

1. See that all classes of livestock have shelter and bedding and extra bedding during this real cold weather. 2. Use small grains, ryegrass, crimson clover, fescue and other winter grazing crops for beef cattle, sheep, hogs and dairy cows.

3. Where such grazing is not available, see that the breeding herd has enough roughage, grain and cottonseed meal to prevent loss of weight. 4. Cull and sell unprofitable cows.

5. Vaccinate pigs for hog cholera. 6. Treat pigs for worms. 7. Feed pigs for spring market. 8. Put ewes close to lambing in a small pasture. 9. Make sure lambs nurse immediately after birth. 10. Start creep feeding lambs as soon as possible. 11. Feed grain in proportion to milk production. 12. Do a good job of milking—fast complete and regularly. 13. Check calves for internal parasites. 14. Make sure that dairy animals have plenty of fresh, clean water.

Disabled Vets & Widows To Report Annual Income

Approximately 14,000 disabled veterans and widows of veterans in Mississippi who receive monthly pension payments are being reminded by the Veterans Administration to report their annual income promptly and thus avoid the risk of having their payments stopped.

VA is now mailing to all pension recipients a tabulating card upon which the income report may be made. Pensions cease if the income of a single individual exceeds \$14,000, or \$27,000 if the recipient has dependents. Regulations require payment to be stopped if the income report is not received within 30 days.

VA warned that the tabulating card will be processed mechanically when it is returned and that cutting, folding or otherwise mutilating it will delay the recording of the information and risk a cut-off in payments.

Income questionnaire is sent to veterans or dependents receiving service-connected compensation.

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traffic toll might possibly have run higher except for an unusually low Christmas Holiday Death count.

Only 11 auto deaths occurred in Mississippi between the start of the Christmas holiday and the Year's end, although the highway patrol had predicted 15 would die during the Yule period alone.

According to Commissioner Scarbrough, an alarming high frequency of Multiple Fatality accidents was chiefly responsible for 1958's increased death rate.

He disclosed that of 437 fatal accidents, 66 were multiple fatality mishaps killing a total of 172 motorists. Forty-one accidents killed two each, 15 killed three each, and four resulted in four deaths each. Six died in still another single accident, and eight in still another.

Despite the multiple deaths, however, the past year's traffic toll remained considerably below the 1956 death count of 561 killed and slightly below the 1955 toll of 547 dead. In point of accident prevention—total number of accidents compared with increased miles of motor vehicle travel—1958 was not really such a bad traffic year.

State traffic statistics first jumped ahead of corresponding 1957 figures in April, then saw-sawed back and forth until a high 26-death increase was reached on December 13.

The sharpest increase for a single month occurred during October when the auto death toll jumped from one above to 21 above during the single month.

Through the year, Commissioner Scarbrough warned repeatedly that Mississippi's number one cause of traffic accidents was driver carelessness. "Speed and carelessness always kill when they are combined," he said on several occasions.

At the outset of the new year, he warns that there will be no let up in Mississippi's traffic law enforcement program during the coming months. Those who expect a let up because this is a campaign year are in for a surprise," he states.

"Only safe responsible driving prevents accidents. The Mississippi Highway Patrol is going to do everything possible to insure safety on Mississippi highways.

State Banks Serve Farmers

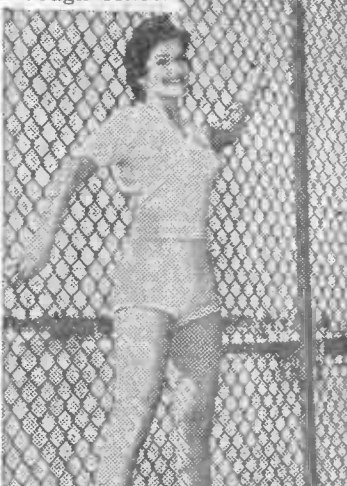
Soil Still Good After Heavy Corn Years

Intensive cropping may aggravate deficiencies of micro-nutrients on some soils and continued use of acid-forming nitrogen fertilizers make it necessary

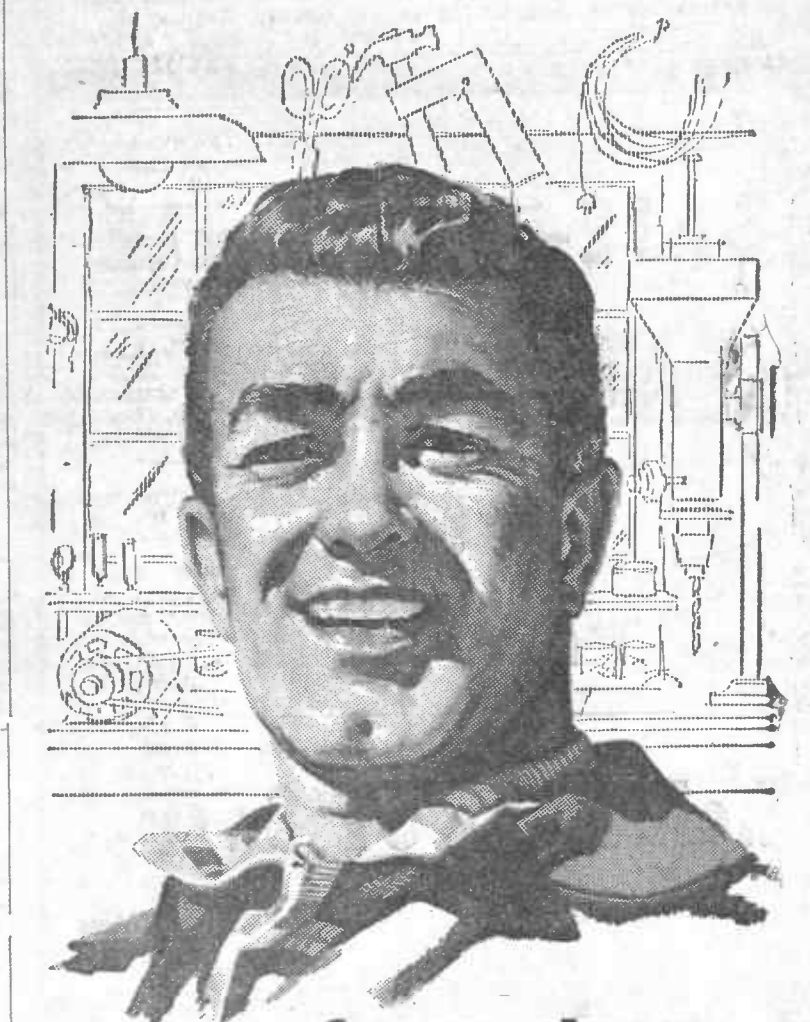

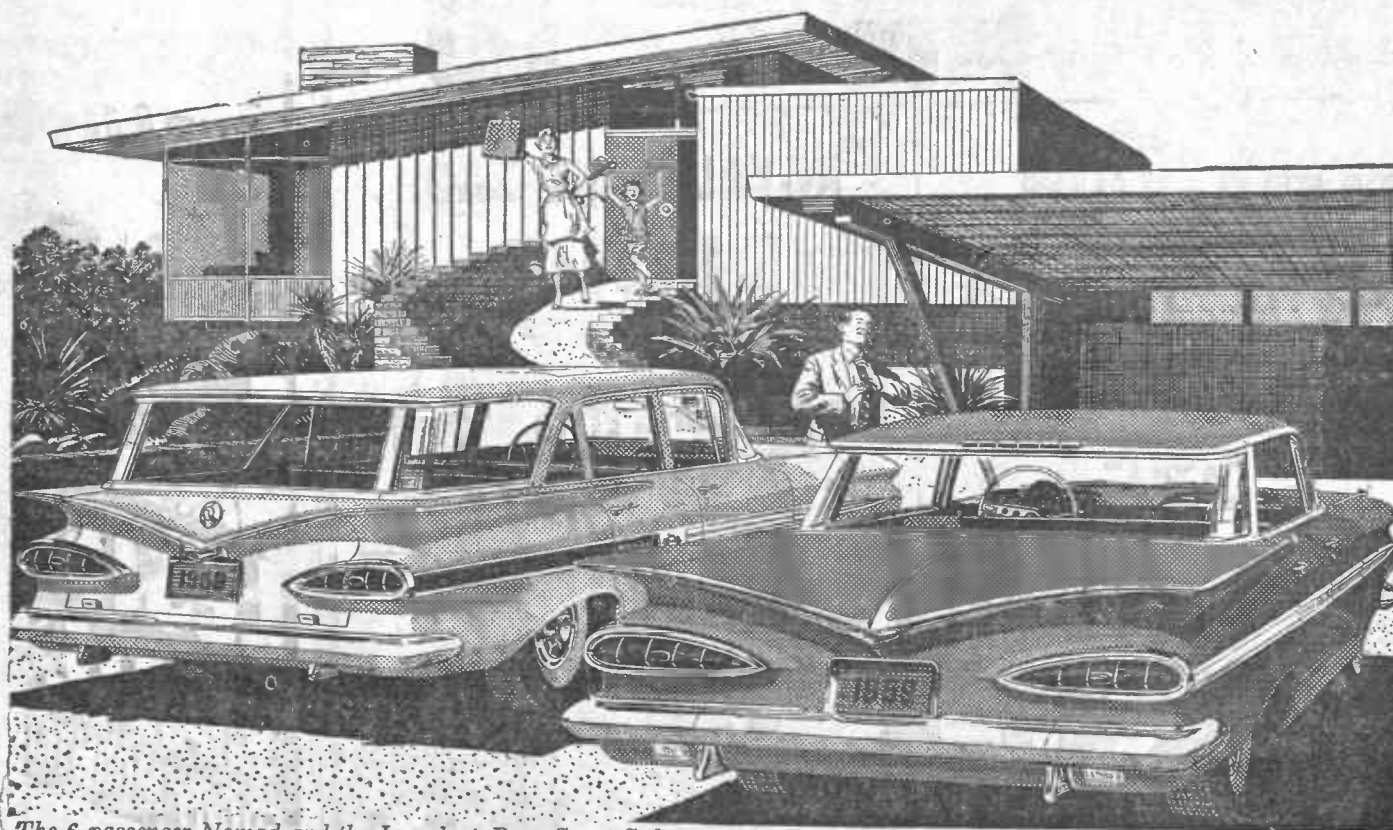

County Committee Announces Jan. 12 As Opening Date For 1959 ASC Program

Practices Are Listed That Farmers May Request Cost-Share

Mack Sanders, Chairman of the Tishomingo ASC County Committee, announces the opening of the 1959 ASC Program.

In a meeting held with representatives of all Agricultural Agencies in the County, January 12, 1959 was set for the opening of the 1959

ACP Program. A sign up period will be held beginning Jan. 12th through January 22nd where all Farmers will be given an opportunity to sign up and request Government Cost-Shares on practices carried out on their farm.

The following practices are listed that farmers may request cost-share: (1) Practice A-2, Initial Establishment of a permanent vegetative cover for Soil protection or as a needed land use adjustment. (A) The Federal Cost share per acre for application of seed and fertilizer and liming material will be 65 per cent of the average cost of performing the practice. (2) Practice 3-A; Establishment of additional acreage of vegetative cover in a crop rotation. Federal cost-share will be 65 per cent of the average cost of performing the practice. (3) Practice A-7, Initial establishment of a stand of forest trees (Seedlings). Federal cost-share will be 7½ cent per tree for machine planting or 9 cents per tree for hand planting. (4) Practice B-1; Improvement of an established vegetative cover for Soil and watershed protection. Federal cost-share will be 65 per cent of the average cost of performing the practice. (5) Practice B-7; Construction of a Pond for livestock water. Federal cost-share will be .13 cents per cubic yard. (6) Practice B-10; Improvement of stand of forest trees on farm land. Cost-Share for release of desirable tree seedlings by removing or killing competing and undesirable vegetation. Cost-Share will be 65 per cent (not to exceed \$6.40 per acre) of the average cost of performing the work. (7) Practice C-1; Initial establishment of permanent sod waterway. Federal Cost-Share will be 65 per cent of the average cost of performing the practice. (8) Practice C-4; Constructing of standard terraces: (a) 12 ft. terraces \$1.55 per 100 linear feet (b) 14 ft. terraces \$1.95 per 100 linear feet. (9) Practice C-8; Channel Clearance, enlargement, or realignment of ditch. Federal Cost-share (a) excavation .13

cents per cubic yard and (b) clearing of channel 65 per cent (not to exceed \$49.00 per acre) of the actual cost of clearing channel, (c) 4 cents per cubic yard for spreading Spoil Banks. (10) Practice C-9A; Construction of permanent drainage ditch. (a) Excavation .12 cents per cubic yard, (b) clearing right of way 65 per cent (not to exceed \$45.00 per acre) of the actual cost of clearing, (c) 4 cents per cubic yard for spreading Spoil Banks. (11) Practice C-9B; Construction of flat-V-Ditches. Cost-Share 12' x 12' \$3.20 per 100 linear feet, 12' x 15' \$3.80 per 100 linear feet, 12' x 18' \$4.45 per 100 linear feet, 14' x 21' \$5.65 per 100 linear feet, 18' x 24' \$6.90 per 100 linear feet. (12) Practice C-9C; Construction of W-Ditches. Cost Share: 20' x 6' \$2.60 per 100 linear feet, 40' x 12' - \$4.15 per 100 linear feet, 48' x 18' - \$6.50 per 100 linear feet.
