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Bids Asked For Furnishing Household Items To County

Will Be Used In New Home That Is Nearly Ready For Occupancy

Household items for furnishing the new county home will be purchased by the County Board of Supervisors on Monday, February 2. The governing body is asking for bids for all the necessary items that will be required to put the building in comfortable living conditions.

Members of the board state that the new building will probably be ready for occupancy by the middle of February. Plans have been proposed to hold open house in the new building. Date for this event will be announced later.

Flavious Lambert of Belmont is contractor for the building which is constructed of brick and concrete and is as nearly fireproof as possible. Included in the new home

are 16 guest rooms that are designed to accommodate two persons each; a large dining room and a large living room. Also in the building is private quarters for the superintendent of the home. There are two complete baths and automatic electric heat will be used throughout. Outside walls are brick and the floors are concrete covered with asphalt tile.

The new building has been constructed south of and slightly to the rear of the old larger structure. All guests of the home will be housed in the one building. Herebefore, the inmates have lived in cottages and have had to go to the larger building for meals and other necessities. This inconvenience will be eliminated with the completion and occupancy of the new home.

A number of clubs and organizations have voted to pay for the furnishings for some of the rooms, but the Board reserves the right to select all items since it is desirable that all rooms be furnished alike. Among the many items that will be purchased for the new home is a complete hospital bed. This, the Board states, is a necessity since, at various times, inmates become ill and proper care cannot be taken with out proper equipment.

To County Tax Collector; Check Delivered This Week

Southern Railway reports that it will this week present the tax collector of Tishomingo County with a check for \$34,734.21 in payment of its 1959 taxes.

Total of all 1959 direct taxes, state and local, paid or to be paid by Southern Railway System in Mississippi is estimated to be more than \$627,000.

Comments on the railway's tax payments, Harry A. DeButts, the railway's president, said:

"We recognize that business firms as well as individuals should be taxed to support services which all citizens require. It does disturb us, however, when we see increasingly large amounts of tax money spent lavishly on highways or airports or waterways or other facilities which our competitors use by paying little or no user charges.

"A tax payment for the common good is one thing, but it is a horse of a different color when taxes are used to provide subsidies—in one form or another—for our competitors," he said.

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Ellis West Is Traffic Victim In Alabama

Apparently Killed By Hit-Run 20 Miles West Of Birmingham

Ellis West, a 47 year old local resident, was victim of what appeared to be a hit-run accident early Wednesday morning. The tragedy occurred 20 miles west of Birmingham, Ala., on U. S. Highway 78.

Mr. West had gone with Garvin Davis to Birmingham to carry a load of scrap iron and to bring back a load of coal. The truck which the two were using belonged to E. D. Davis.

According to the story told to Alabama highway patrolmen by Garvin, their truck developed engine trouble several miles out of Birmingham. The two (Garvin and West) decided to look for help. Garvin going in one direction and West in the other. Garvin traveled several miles on 78 and, failing to find assistance, caught a bus back to the truck. He worked with the engine and finally got it started. He then drove in the direction in which West went, and had traveled only a few miles when he came upon a number of cars and trucks. He stopped and discovered that Mr. West had been fatally hit.

Alabama highway patrolmen who investigated the tragedy stated that as far as could be determined Mr. West was the victim of a hit-run driver. The investigation is being continued.

Funeral services for Mr. West will be conducted today (Thursday) at 2 p.m., by Rev. Carmon Savell at Mt. Evergreen church. Burial will be in Toenal cemetery with Cutshall funeral home directing.

Surviving are his wife, Frances; three daughters, Betty Jean, Martha and Donna; one son, Walter; four brothers, Willie T. of Corinth, Warner A. of Sheffield, and Clarence and Frank of Iuka.

High Winds Cause Damage Across County Wed. Morn.

Roofs Blown Off, Barns Blown Down; TV Antennas, Trees Also Suffer

Winds of near tornadic velocity swept across Tishomingo county in a southwest to northeastward direction causing considerable damage Wednesday morning.

First area to be hit was in the Mt. Pleasant church community about 4 miles southwest of Tishomingo. Rufus Ginn in that community sustained possibly the greatest damage, his barn being blown away and the roof of his home being demolished. Others in

that area to feel the effects of the storm were Chambliss Deaton, Arthur Slack and Mrs. Mary Smith whose house had the roof blown away.

A chicken house belonging to Frank Dawson about 4 miles north of Tishomingo on highway 25 was blown away. Another area to be struck was northwest of Tishomingo near the Zed Osborn home. Houses sustaining damage were the homes of Hubert and Dewey Anglin.

Farm buildings belonging to Spacy Cox were demolished; they included cribs, barns, and hog houses.

Minor damage was also apparent in the Town of Tishomingo where a number of roofs were harmed, tv antennas demolished and the store front of O. B. Tittle was most extensively damaged.

Another area in which considerable damage was noted was in the Sidney Quillen neighborhood.

The Power Association reports that its electric lines were badly damaged in all sections of the county where the storm hit.

Mrs. Rosemary Clark, executive secretary of the Tishomingo Chapter of American Red Cross, states that all families in need of assistance have been taken care of.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL PROFIT, PRINCIPLES AND PATRIOTISM

The spectacle of large groups of industrialists in such centers as Cleveland, Detroit and Chicago enthusiastically applauding the luncheon talks of Anastas I. Mikoyan, Soviet first Deputy Premier, is revolting to anyone who believes in the principles of Christianity and the patriotism of America. Just to attend the meetings was bad enough, without going overboard in accepting his overtures for enormously increased trade between the United States and the Soviet Union.

It is worth noting the areas which Mikoyan is visiting while in this country. Those who scheduled his trip knew where to send him. It is not to be believed he would obtain any such reception in the Southern region.

Looked at from a distance, it would seem these industrialists allowed their greed for profit to overcome their sense of reason. No one believes in the profit system more than I do, but that does not mean I rank it number one among our objectives. There are some other things more important.

Did these industrialists allow the emotion of the moment to cause them to entirely forget to whom they were listening? Do they think for one moment that communism, as exemplified by the Government of Russia, has changed its spots? Don't they remember that only recently Khrushchev said, addressing his remarks to the United States, "we shall bury you" economically? And really he meant much more than economically.

The whole philosophy of communism is to overthrow the existing order, in whatever way it may be accomplished. For us, the existing order means the profit system, the American system of free enterprise, the principles of free government, belief in a Divine Being. If they can do that in this country through encouraging race tension, class tension or in any other way, we can be quite sure they will enter wholeheartedly into the effort.

We should always keep in mind that years ago Lenin made the very definite statement that he and his fellow communists expected to cause us to spend ourselves into destruction. In the years since then, we seem to have been doing everything we can to make his prophecy come true—witness our continued budget deficits and our increasing national debt. We have over those years spent more than \$70 billion of the taxpayers' money in aid to other nations, in many cases subsidizing socialism and even in some cases directly assisting communism. We seem determined to keep it up. Have we been completely brainwashed in this respect? How simple can we get?

Getting back to Mikoyan and his increased trade, we should note that he has not yet got around to mentioning the terms under which this would be done. The fact is, though, we already know the terms, because feelers in this direction were put out by the Soviets not many weeks ago. At that time, it was made quite clear that they wanted us to extend them about \$3 billion in credit to finance their end of the trade. It is ironic to note this overture was made just about the time they declared economic warfare on us. As Secretary of State Dulles very well put it, "It now looks as if the Soviet Union wants to get credit from us so that it can more successfully pursue its economic warfare against us." That shows how simple at least the Russians believe we are.

We should not be impolite to foreign visitors—but at the same time we should not allow our desire for increased trade and world peace and any other highly worthwhile objective upset our sense of balance. We should never forget that the Communists, by the very nature of their philosophy, are liars, thieves, and murderers. One can get along with a liar if he accepts everything he says as the gospel truth; can get along with a thief if he calmly hands over his purse; can get along with a murderer if he submits without struggle to having his throat cut. But men of spirit have no desire to get along that way.

Our nation and our government was founded under principles in which we believe. Other nations may accept these principles or not, as they wish—but certainly there

is no reason whatever why we should have anything to do with them unless they do.

Right to Command

Lesson for January 25, 1959

THE Teachers' Union in Jesus' time was made up mostly of priests. Some of these were mere political hacks, but many of them belonged to the old aristocracy, with pedigrees running back for centuries. They were no better than mediocre teachers themselves, but they didn't like any one else moving in to their preserves.

So when Jesus came to Jerusalem, the big city, from up-country, and began to teach in the very shadow of the great Temple, the authorities were aroused. He could teach in Galilee all he liked and they wouldn't interfere—much. But let him come to the priests' capital city, where they were the ruling class, and they were determined he should line up as they told him—or else . . . What that "or else" was we know too well. But first they tried to get him into trouble with his public. For Jesus had what actors and writers call a "public," people who heard him every chance they had.

Show Your License!

The first move the priests tried was the same kind of thing a police officer does to any shady salesman or careless driver. Show us your license! they said, in effect. If Jesus said, God gave me the right to teach, the priests would surely retort, What conceit! How could God authorize you except through us, God's representatives among his people? Or if Jesus said that some man, any man, gave him the right to teach, the priests would lose no time in telling him that they were the official Teacher's License Bureau and had never given him permission to speak. Either way, they figured, he would lose face with his public.

Jesus' answer stunned them. It meant: You tell me about John the Baptist and I will tell you about me. This was not off the subject, as we might think. Expressed more fully, what Jesus meant was: "Very well, suppose I received my authority from John the Baptist, as some of you may think? Where did he get his authority?"

From Popular Consent?

There used to be a man who had no degree but his college A.B. The members of his church called him "Doctor" all the same. He used to say that his degree had been conferred by vote of the people. More important matters than titles can be conferred, in our country, by vote of the people. The authority of a president or governor comes from the people themselves. There is nothing essentially wrong about authority that comes from men at large. Indeed, unless the people consent, no man can wield authority. In one sense Jesus' authority came from the heart of the people. The common people heard him gladly, we are told. "This is our man; he knows!" Unless a leader has something like that effect on people, he is a leader in name only.

From Personal Force?

But of course popular consent, popular enthusiasm, can be quite wrong. Look at Hitler in the height of his power. Every Nazi, millions of them, went screaming for him. He was Germany's "new Messiah." But that did not make him right. He was horribly wrong, in fact, for all the cheering.

There is another kind of authority, which comes from within. The man who has it does not need to appeal to any one else, he does not need to produce a license, he needs no sponsors. Now Jesus had that kind of authority and every one of his friends and admirers felt it. We read that after his "sermon on the mount" the people were astonished because he taught as one having authority, and not as the scribes. We know how the Scribes taught. They quoted authorities. Jesus had it.

From God?

Highest and truest authority is that which comes from God. According to the fourth Gospel, Jesus denied saying anything strictly on his own account. He spoke God's words, his teaching were God's teaching. "My teaching is not mine, but his who sent me," he said (John 7:16). Now every Christian in the world admits this. We all claim to believe that Christ's authority is divine. But do we act as if we believed it?

opening day offered as much drama as did that of the 86th Congress. The occasion was festive and gay. Gleeful Democrats overflowed the Republican side of the aisle where there was nothing but gloom and discord. The large class of new Members smilingly waved at their families who had filled the galleries for oath taking ceremonies.

Deposed Joe Martin, Republican Floor Leader of year's standing, and Arkansas' freshman, Dr. Dale Alford, got the most attention from the onlookers.

Dumped unceremoniously from his lofty position, Martin was a sad figure in the midst of his depleted and discordant Republican colleagues. There was bipartisan sympathy for him but it was not quite as deep as it might have been. A large segment of the Southern Members, with whom Martin is most popular, will long remember the 19th day of July 1956, when Martin charged down the aisle, planted his feet and hands firmly, and with a flushed face angrily admonished Republican colleagues that they would "rue the day" if they "followed Southern Democracy" in support of a motion to strike the enacting clause from the pending Civil Rights bill. Odd thing was, the motion had not been made by a Southerner but by one of his own eastern Republican colleagues and a courageous one at that. His highly sectional and partisan challenge, hurled with deep emotion, somewhat cooled the warm friendships so long held for him by many of his Southern admirers. Even so, he had the sympathy of old friends from down Dixie way.

Then there was Dr. Dale Alford of Little Rock, who in the shortest Congressional campaign in history, bumped the moderate Brooks Hays from eminence. Alford has an attractive personality and has already demonstrated that he is one of high intellect. He bears none of the violent features molded for him by his would-be liberal enemies.

Marked for immediate liquidation by some ultra-liberals and the NAACP, he sat smiling and confident. His supporters were prepared with a block-busting counter move against three other Members, which for them would have touched off a far more serious problem than could have been made for Alford. With his friends standing by loaded with real dynamite there was never any doubt about his being duly sworn. Only three weak voices, two from the Democrats and one from the Republicans, voted "no" on the the resolution to seat him. The publicity and noise has served to make Alford one of the more popular new Members.

The President's message was one of his best and well received by both Republicans and Democrats. Except on the Civil Rights issue, he appeared to be quite sincere and endeavoring to avoid partisan political statements.

The Congress can now get down to serious business. The times demand it. There are problems at

home and abroad. Inflation and federal spending appear to be unmatched in prominence and importance.

Many assume the last election was a mandate for higher spending, more deficits and higher taxes. The country can be assured that there is a very large bloc in the House of Representatives which does not accept this view. It is ready for action and could be very effective, especially if the President is dead serious about his postelection appeal for economy. If he will put his full weight behind the effort, something he has never done before, it will succeed.

The first session of the 86th Congress will be interesting. We hope it will be constructive.

At this hour when our government is beginning a new day, it is interesting to note that it has been ushered in through the power of ballots, whereas with our neighbor below she begins anew through the power of bullets. It's a privilege to be American, isn't it!

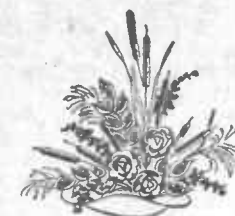

No Let Up In Miss. Traffic Law Program During '59 Warns Comm.

Commissioner of Public Safety Tom Scarbrough promises there will be no let up in Mississippi's traffic law enforcement program during 1959.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol head, admittedly displeased with the increased 1958 death rate, said traffic-violating motorists can expect little sympathy from Patrolmen. "So-called petty violations cause accidents; accidents kill, he emphasized.

During 1958, the Patrol started issuing written warning tickets. though the warning ticket became a part of the motorist's permanent driving record, it saved the violator a trip to the judge. There will be less of these warning tickets written this year, according to the public Safety Commissioner.

Last year, 547 persons died in 437 fatal traffic accidents. Commissioner Scarbrough calls this loss "tragic and unnecessary, for most part the end result of careless, irresponsible driving."

Commissioner Scarbrough places speeding at the top of irresponsible driving acts, along with improper passing and following too close.

"Speeding, cutting those yellow lines, passing when there isn't enough time to insure safety, rushing along bumper-to-bumper, this is kid stuff. And worse, it kills!" he stressed.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol's policy has always been one of strict enforcement, according to Scarbrough. "You don't turn enforcement on and off like a water faucet," he explained. "You just keep your shoulder to the wheel and push."

"This is exactly what your Highway Patrol is going to continue to do: push against the cause of accidents, traffic violations."

Soybean Meal Better Than Tankage For Pigs

State College, Miss., Soybean meal gave better results than tankage as a source of protein for pigs in two recent tests at the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station. Even when tankage-fed pigs got extra vitamins they still did not gain as fast as those on soybean meal.

Dr. B. F. Barrentine and C. B. Shawver conducted the tests at Mississippi State University to learn more about the value of tankage and how it might be supplemented.

Two sources of tankage were used in the first test. They were compared to soybean meal in an 13 percent protein ration. Pigs on soybean meal gained 1.38 pounds daily in the 35-day feeding test. Those on tankage gained only half as much. Equal parts of soybean meal and tankage produced 1.22 pounds of daily gain.

Next came the vitamin test which lasted 76 days. Here the daily gains were as follows: Soybean meal, 1.60 pounds; tankage alone, 1.11 pounds; tankage plus vitamins A and D, 1.02 pounds; tankage plus Aurofac, 1.20 pounds; and tankage plus amino acids, 1.19 pounds.

From these results, Dr. Barrentine concluded that none of the supplements corrected the tankage deficiencies. Preliminary work indicates that the calcium in tankage is poorly utilized by pigs, probably because of the large bone size. Further studies are planned on this problem.

Besides being cheaper, soybean meal appears to be the better protein supplement for swine, although it does require additional cal-

cium such as ground limestone or oystershell flour.

The complete report is published in the January issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

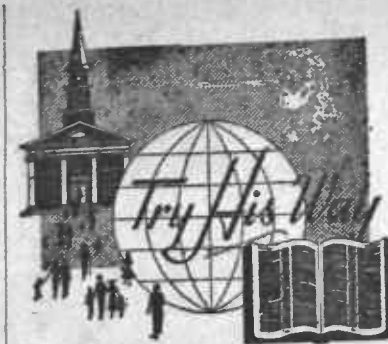

Lespedeza Rotated With Cotton More Than Doubles The Yield On Marshall County SCD Cooperator's Farm

Lespedeza, Rt. 3, Holly Springs, Miss., is sold on conservation. The farmer, Lespedeza, turned under a five-year-old sericea in the spring of 1957. However, Early the cotton following sericea yielded the continuous cotton. Early harvested 602 pounds of lint cotton per acre, the year after sericea, as compared to 270 pounds per acre when cotton has been grown continuously. "Insects were only controlled; fertilizer was the same for both years as long to pick the cotton following sericea, but I did not at all," said Lespedeza. Lespedeza, Chairman of the Marshall County Soil Conservation

HOME AGENT NOTES By Robert L. Warren Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service

Next time you buy a chicken, look at the wrapping or somewhere on the package to see if it bears the small round U. S. Inspected label. You will probably find it, for ever since the first of the year, all chickens going into interstate commerce have had to have U. S. Department of Agriculture official inspection.

This inspection is required by the Poultry Products Inspection Act, passed by the Congress last year. It went into effect January 1, 1959. It requires the compulsory inspection by the USDA of all poultry and poultry products that move in interstate or foreign commerce and in certain areas of the United States.

Many of the tender young broilers and fryers you've bought in the past have been inspected through arrangements by the processor. Under this new program, trained government inspectors check on the sanitation of the processing plants and examine every bird to be shipped across state lines.

You may find the U. S. Department of Agriculture inspected stamp on wing tags, outer wrappers or boxes or on giblet wrappers. Check with your grocer to see if the chickens you buy from him are inspected. Don't confuse this inspection with grading. If the poultry meat has passed inspection, you know it is wholesome food. Grading comes after inspection. Poultry grades are Grade A, Grade B and Grade C. The grade shows the tenderness and eating quality of the poultry. Look for the "shield" grade mark for this.

Clean Hair A "Must"
Yes, clean hair is a "must" for skin beauty! A smooth complexion depends as much on having a clean, healthy scalp as it does on washing your face properly. Shampoo your hair regularly, as often as needed. This is usually once a week, for normal hair; every four days for oily hair; every 10 days for dry hair.

A Good Pot Of "Greens"
That's what a lot of folks get to wanting in the wintertime. And green leafy vegetables are important in meals, especially in the wintertime, because of their vitamins. They're a good source of both vitamin A and Vitamin C. In figuring how much greens you need for your family, plan on 4 or 5 servings from a pound of mustard or turnip greens, cabbage or collards. This allows for waste you discard and shrinkage caused by cooking.

Cook the greens with little more water than stays on the leaves after washing. Long cooking will make them limp and change the color and flavor. Check the prices of frozen and canned greens and compare with fresh ones. Which gives the least cost of each serving?

County Agent news By W. C. HAMILTON

Make Dairying Pay
Remember, when you feed low producing cows high cost feeds you are not making money. Two cows that produce 7,500 pounds of milk a year each will make you the same profit as eight cows producing only 4,000 pounds of milk a year each. But to know which cow is producing, you must keep records. The weight-a-day-a-month records will help you in this. Here are some more tips toward more money from your dairy cows: 1. Keep replacements only from the top cows in the herd. 2. Breed to the best bulls obtainable. Feed ade-

quate roughage at all times—you pay for it whether you feed it or not. 3. Feed grain according to individual cow production. 4. Keep a record of breeding dates so you will know when to turn cows dry. 5. Control your breeding for fall freshening.

Corn In '59
In planning your 1959 corn production program, remember to put enough land in corn to grow your feed needs. Select good land, use the right amount of fertilizer materials, plant a recommended hybrid seed and then control weeds and grass. If you do this, the chances are you'll produce 60 bushels of corn or more per acre.

New Weed Control Material for Corn
Simazine, a new material, is being recommended this year by the Mississippi Experiment Station for chemical weed control in corn. When used as a pre-emergence treatment for corn, Simazine will control most annual broadleaf weeds and some grasses such as barnyard grass and crabgrass. In tests conducted at Mississippi State University, Simazine has given good control on weeds in corn without any injury to the corn plant. The material can be applied broadcast prior to planting the corn or as a band treatment. Local soil types will require from 4 to 6 lbs. of this material for broadcast application. Use about 4 pounds for sandy or low organic soil or 5 to 6 pounds for our heavier clay soil. When applying the material on a 12-inch band basis, about 1 pound per acre is adequate on sandy or low organic soil and about 1½ pounds for our heavier clay soils.

New GOP Management

President Eisenhower's program of conservative Republicanism is under new, more aggressive, management in Congress for the final two years of his Administration. The selection of new minority leaders in both the Senate and House was the tip-off that the President plans a hard-driving campaign for legislation that will benefit his foreign and domestic policies.

Everett Dirksen and Hiram Boren, the new GOP leaders, are expected to work closely with the White House and their predecessors, Senator William Knowland and Rep. Joseph Martin.

Dirksen is a veteran of scores of legislative battles, first in the House and since 1950 in the Senate, who loves rough and tumble debate in which no quarter is asked or given. He abhors compromise and demands strict party loyalty.

Halleck is equally hard-hitting and aggressive in support of programs backed by the President. He was the majority leader in the 80th and 83rd Congress, when Rep. Martin moved up to Speaker of the House.

Conservative Emphasis

The selection of Dirksen and Halleck by their colleagues moves Republican congressional leadership from the West & East coasts to the more traditionally conservative stronghold of Republicanism, the Midwest. Dirksen is from Illinois and Halleck from Indiana.

Both have staunchly supported foreign aid programs in an area supposed to be more "isolation-minded" in the past than other sections of the country. They have a reputation of being down-the-line Old Line Party Republicans.

The President can count on both to support him in his fight to hold down spending, keep foreign aid going strong, get labor legislation

aimed at curbing racketeering, and passing new farm laws.

Dirksen may have more trouble keeping Senate Republicans in line with Administration policies than Halleck has in the House. While the fiery Illinois Senator was strongly opposed by a small group of GOP "liberals," Halleck drew support from both liberals and conservatives in the House.

Democratic Cooperation

How well Dirksen and Halleck succeed in getting the President's avowedly more conservative legislative program adopted by the 86th Congress will depend, in a large measure, on how much cooperation they get from Democrats who outnumber Republicans almost two to one.

On many issues they can expect support from conservative Southern Democrats. That, however, does not include new civil rights legislation, which the Southerners will unanimously oppose.

It is significant that the "liberal" majority of Democrats is headed by Sen. Lyndon Johnson and Rep. Sam Rayburn, both Texans and both rated as Southern conservatives. They may, however, be able to agree about as often with the Republican leaders as with a majority of their own party.

What the 86th Congress does this year and next will depend largely on how much support Johnson and Rayburn can or will give the Republican leaders on legislation requested by the President.

Telephone Numbers Of Senators And Congressmen Listed For Constituents

Do you expect to write your senator or congressman, or to telephone him, this year?

"I would be a good idea, then, to clip this 'directory' and paste it somewhere handy, because the vicissitudes of Washington have influenced many legislators, from throughout the nation, to have unlisted telephones installed in their homes.

This is primarily to protect members of their families from being annoyed by calls from "crackpots," here in the nation's capital.

Of course, it's easy to write your senator or congressman at his Capitol Hill address, or to call him, during the day, at his suite, in either the Senate Office Building or the House Office Building.

None of them object, of course, to the "home folks" knowing how to reach him. And that's why most of them welcome publication "back home" of such a "directory" as this.

Senators To Move

Senators James O. Eastland and John C. Stennis have been assigned suites in the new Senate Office Building, to be ready soon, on the corner of Constitution Avenue and First Street, N. E., across First Street from the Senate building now in use.

But the new building will not be completely ready for occupancy until about mid-March. So the Mississippi solons will continue to occupy their offices in the so-called old building.

A switchboard in the Capitol receives all Capitol Hill calls for senators, congressmen, and congressional staff members. The calling number is Capitol 4-3121. It's preferable that callers know the extension number of the legislator sought, so as to prevent loss of time in having the Capitol information operator look it up.

Here's the data about how to reach Senators Eastland and Stennis.

Eastland—Suite 411, Senate Office Building, phone extension 5054; residence phone, EMerson 2-8898.

Stennis—Suite 453, Senate Office Building, phone extension 6253; residence phone, WOODley 6-4427.

Two House Buildings

There are, at present, two House Office Buildings, one known as the "old" building, the other the "new". But they're so numbered as to make them distinguishable without use of the words, old or new.

Office numbers in the old building carry only three digits, with those on the first floor in the 100's, the second floor in the 200's, and so on, up through the top floor, which is the fifth.

The eight-story new House Office Building has a somewhat complicated system of numbering offices. The street level at the rear is one floor lower than the street level at the front. Offices carry four digits, to distinguish them from suites in the old building.

But the confusing part of the system is that offices off the corridors which lead to the street level in the rear are numbered from 1000 to 1099, or thereabout, while offices off corridors leading to the street level in front are numbered from 1100, upward, but under 1200.

This means that offices on the eighth floor of the new building are numbered from 1700.

A third House Office Building, now under construction, will be known as the Rayburn Building, for Speaker Sam Rayburn, Texas.

When the Senate is in session, those desiring to reach either Senator Eastland or Senator Stennis might expedite their calls by asking the operator to seek them through the Senate Democratic Cloak Room. And when the House is in session, it's likely that Mississippi's congressmen may be reached through the House Democratic Cloak Room.

There are, of course, often periods when a senator or congressman cannot be reached by phone. These are usually when the legislator is in a committee session, or during a roll call vote on an important measure.

Senators and congressmen frown upon night calls at home, but most often forgive the caller during an emergency, or when the subject matter of such a call may be considered as justified by its importance.
