106,000 Residents
Driving With
Expired Licenses

Comm. Warns
Delinquent Drivers
Of Roadblock

More than 100,000 Mississippians are driving with expired driver's licenses.
According to the driver license division, Mississippi Highway Patrol, approximately 90,000 licenses which expired December 31 have not been renewed. An estimated 16,000 more unexpired licenses expired September 30.
Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough warns that driver license checks are being made by Patrolmen, and urges motorists to renew their licenses before being stopped at a roadblock check point.
There is no penalty for a late renewal; however, the renewal period must date from the time the license expired. For instance, a license which expired in September must be renewed back in September.
In Mississippi, driver licenses expire at quarterly periods: March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31. Renewals may be made for one or two year periods at any Sheriff's office or renewal agent or at Highway Patrol headquarters, Jackson.

County To Pay \$1,335,642
Of 1960 Federal Budget

County's Share Is .41 Percent
Of State's Taxes

Citizens of Tishomingo County will have to pay \$1,335,642 of the 1960 federal budget, if the President's proposed spending program of \$77 billion is adopted by Congress.
That is the estimate of the Mississippi Economic Council-State Chamber of Commerce, which says a reliable national economic index shows the state will have to pay .42 percent of the total federal bill, or \$323,400,000.
This county, according to a state economic index used in figuring pro-rata shares in education and other funds, pays .41 percent of Mississippi taxes. That figure applied to the \$323,400,000 gives the total estimated cost of local citizens.
"Federal spending is too high," the Council release said. "Money for operating the growing federal government is already outstripping taxes for state and local programs."
"For instance, in the fiscal year 1958, state taxes paid by Mississippians amounted to \$162,585,000. Add this amount, plus local taxes paid, to the amount being asked for federal spending and you get a good idea of the tax burden being borne by citizens."
"The MEC is opposed to increased federal spending, and especially an unbalanced budget. Federal spending needs to be curtailed wherever possible. The tax burden is already too high and endangering the nation's economic structure."
"The only money the federal government has is what it gets through taxes, or through borrowing against the future income of citizens. In either case, the money must eventually come from taxpayers."
"Citizens need to speak out against unwarranted expenditures for government, be it at the local, state or federal level."

Finch, general manager of the Tishomingo County Farm Improvement Association, announces that the farmer-owned, farmer-operated cooperative will open its third business in the county in Tishomingo on Monday, Feb. 2. In his statement concerning the opening of the new store Mr. Finch said: "After much planning and discussion we have decided to expand and I can't think of no greater service than the addition of a new store in Tishomingo."
Free prizes will be given away on the opening day. At 10 a.m., 2 30-minute battery will be given, and at 2 p.m., a bushel of Funk's seed corn and at 4:30 p.m., a pair of 6.70 x 15 whitewall tires will be given away. A drawing will be held for each of the prizes and to be eligible to win visitors will be required to register.
"The Tishomingo County Farm Improvement Association," Mr. Finch said, "is the only business in the county that pays its profits back to its patrons. Within a few weeks, annual checks will be mailed to our patrons who favored us with their business in 1958."
The farmer's cooperative, in addition to Tishomingo, has stores in Iuka and Belmont. The firm also operates a feed mill in Iuka.

For TVA
Is Introduced

Hearings Scheduled
For Early Date; Has
Good Chance To Pass

A self-financing bill for the Tennessee Valley Authority was introduced in the House of Representatives Clifford Davis of under the joint sponsorship of Representatives Clifford Davis of Tennessee, Robert E. Jones, Jr. of Alabama, and Thomas G. Abernethy of Mississippi. The bill is in substantially the same form as that which passed the Senate and was reported by the House Public Works Committee last year.
Representative Abernethy stated that the bill would adequately provide for a self-financing program and take care of the anticipated expanding power consumption. He also stated that it would "free TVA from the bitter Congressional battles in which it has been embroiled since the advent of the Eisenhower Administration."
The leadership of the Public Works Committee of the House of Representatives has agreed to schedule the bill for hearings at an early date. A careful survey indicates that prospects of approval are considerably improved over those of last year.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL THE MOUNTAINS: A PARTNER

What's bad for "liberals" is bound to be good for the country. That's a sound working theory for citizens who try to size up the words and deeds of politicians. It can be profitably applied to the actions of the new Congress.

A case in point is the bitter comment of Senator Paul Douglas (D-ILL), spokesman for the spenders and the new abolitionists, concerning the defeat of his gag rule proposal in the Senate January 12th. "The old bipartisan coalition has been working beautifully," he said. "Conservative Southerners on the Democratic side; conservative Republicans on the other side. This is the coalition that has been operating for 20 years. It is still in effect."

Suddenly, Senator Douglas shifted his fire to a new target. "Now," he said, "I shall say something which will hurt me, but in the interest of fairness I have to say it. They have been joined in this struggle largely, but not exclusively, by the small states, particularly of the West."

"I criticize no senator for his vote; but if we examine the votes, it is apparent that a third element has now been added to the coalition, namely, most of the small states of the West. We now have a coalition in the main, of the Mountain states, the small Western states with the old coalition of conservative Republicans and Southern Democrats."

For Senator Douglas and the legion of spenders, South-haters and bureaucracy-worshippers, this coalition is bad news. For the South and other sections of the country that are devoted to American liberties and free enterprise, it is good news.

Whether Senator Douglas is absolutely right in saying that the Mountain states of the West have joined the conservative coalition, only time will tell. But it's a fact that he didn't have any of the Mountain state senators with him in his attempt to gag free debate in the Senate. Even those newly elected senators from the Mountain states who are supposed to be "liberals" hung back from silencing a minority. And that's a mighty encouraging sign.

Of course, there is plenty of evidence that the Mountain states ARE swinging toward a conservative coalition. The Mountain states face many of the problems that Southern states face. They seek new industry and are in the midst of a changing agricultural economy. The Southern states, with their textile mills, see in the threat of unrestrained competition from subsidized foreign firms the evil effects of most-favored status for foreign countries. The Mountain states of the West, with mining a substantial part of their economy, have been cruelly hurt by the same sort of governmental favoritism of foreign countries. While the government has been buying minerals abroad at high prices, Western mines have suffered.

In addition to the fact that the South and the Mountain West have certain similar economic problems, there is the matter of spirit. The Mountain West, like the South, has a tradition of rugged individualism. People in many of the Western states resent the Welfare state approach that treats free citizens as mere production units that can be bossed.

Yet another link between the two regions is the fact that both are semi-rural, with small towns and cities, not huge sprawling cities dominated by totalitarian labor bosses. Neither region is in the grip of the leftists and the labor hoodlums.

In the years ahead, common interests should make for a common-sense strengthening of the conservative alliance. The rugged Mountain West is an ideal partner for Northern and Southern conservatives in the struggle to put down the modern rustlers of socialism—the spenders and radicals in Congress.

More than eleven billion dollars will be spent on advertising during 1958, according to the best estimates now available.

FARM AGREEMENT

Davidson

Eisenhower is on sound ground when he complains that the farm surplus is now in effect a burden on the nation. In addition, ineffectual farm price controls are likely to be done about

of his contention that farm costs are too high, and that the U. S. Department of Agriculture's fiscal year will be a record for support of farm prices

on a very few farm products. There would be less quarrel with that huge sum if it were resulting in prices generally fair to both producers and consumers. It could be justified if it showed a reasonable promise of bringing production into balance with market demand.

\$2,000 Per Farm
The Department of Agriculture is spending at the rate of more than \$7,000,000,000 a year. That figure on the basis of 3,500,000 farms, at some \$2,000 a year per farm.

By no means all of that goes to farmers. About 25 per cent goes to operating expenses, including salaries to the more than 80,000 USDA employees. Another 25 per cent is the cost of export subsidies, school

lunches and other surplus disposal. During 1958 the government paid farmers more than \$1 billion as a part of the cost of taking land out of crops under the soil bank and other conservative programs. Yet farmers, on the smallest number of acres in cultivation in 40 years, produced 11 per cent larger crops than ever before.

Government holdings of farm surpluses, Mr. Eisenhower estimated, soon will reach \$9,000,000,000, another record high. The cost of handling and storing that surplus, he estimated, will be a billion dollars a year.

The President points out that such expenditures might be justified for a temporary period if they were leading to a sound solution of the farm problem. The farm situation, though, is getting worse instead of better.

What Next?
The situation, Mr. Eisenhower emphasized, "calls for prompt and forthright action." We need, he said, new legislation. Congress can find no fault with the President's demand for action.

Congress has adopted many of the recommendations made by Secretary Benson and backed by the President. It has, however, refused to go as far and as fast as this Administration would have liked.

Most crops were supported at 90 per cent of parity when Mr. Eisenhower became President in 1953. Congress has agreed to a lowering of supports on most of those to 75 per cent of parity, and to 60 per cent and 65 per cent for others.

"We still need," the President told Congress, "greater freedom for our farmers to manage their own farms and greater freedom for markets to reflect the wishes of producers and consumers." By that he means fewer production controls and lower price supports.

The responsibility rests on Congress either to accept the President's farm recommendations, or develop some program that would begin to make some sense to both farmers and consumers.

Deadline Near For Reporting 1958 Wages
Cash Paid To Farm Employed In 1958 Must Be Reported

January 31, 1959, is the deadline for reporting the cash wages paid in 1958 to farm employees, Mr. Hugh D. Tigrett, Social Security Administration, Tupelo and Mr. J. L. Enoch, Internal Revenue Service stated today.

Farm operators or farm owners who have paid as much as \$150 in cash wages to any farm worker in their employ during 1958 must file an employer's tax and information return for such farm employees. They must also report each farm employee who worked for them on 20 or more days during 1958 regardless of the amount of those wages if they were figured on a time rather than a piece rate basis.

For 1958, the social security tax rate is 4 1/2 per cent (2 1/4 each for employer and employee.) This tax applies to cash wages paid to a farm worker up to a total of \$4200 in the year. The tax amount must be entered on Form 943 (Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees) together with the total amount of cash wages paid to the farm worker. It is required that the farm employer do this and file the return with the District Director of Internal Revenue at Jackson on or before the due date mentioned above. For '59, the social security tax rate will be 5 per cent (2 1/2 per cent each for employer and employee.) For 1959 and years thereafter this tax will apply to cash wages paid to a farm worker up to a total of \$4800 in the year.

Mr. Tigrett points out that when a farm employee meets the 20-day

a year test the farm employer should count only days for which the employee works for cash wages figured on a time basis. However, if the worker meets this test, the farm employer must pay social security taxes on all cash wages paid the employee during the year (whether on a time, piecework, or other basis.)

Farm employees include household workers if they are employed on a farm operated for profit.

Starved Soil, Low Crop Yields And Poor People

By Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist USDA-SCS

The average per acre yield of

all crops grown in Tishomingo County is about double the per acre yield of 20 years ago. A yield of 100 bushels of corn per acre, (2) two bales of cotton per acre, or (3) three tons of hay per acre is not unusual occurrence today. However, there are still hundreds and hundreds of acres of class II and Class III cropland, land suitable for row crops, this is still yielding (20) twenty bushels of corn, one-half bale of cotton or a ton or less of hay per acre.

During the past seven years the writer has urged landowners to plant row crops on their most level productive land. To a great extent this is now being done, by most soil conservation district cooperators. The farmers who have moved their row crops off the steep hill-sides to their more level land are to be commended because less of their topsoil will be washed away.

However, the planting of row crops on more level land does not necessarily mean higher crop yields. And in those instances where cooperators have always used their more level land for crops, yields may be low.

Last week, in this column, the story was told of how a Marshall County, Mississippi, farmer doubled the yield of his cotton by using Sericea in a sod-based rotation. Any time a farmer can double the yield of his crops it requires only half as many acres to produce the same amount of cotton, corn and other crops.

If you did not read last week's column is might pay you, well to read it. You may be able to do what this Marshall County farmer has done. Too, have you had your soil tested to learn the kind and amount of commercial fertilizer you need to apply on your crop land? If you have not done this you still have time to get this information before planting time. This might be the one thing that would pay you more, provided the soil samples are properly taken and the recommendations given carefully followed, than anything else you do in producing this 1959 crop. If you are interested in getting your soil tested you should contact your county agent who will instruct you how to get it done.

The higher the crop yield the more the land is protected from erosion, and the more litter there is to plow into the soil. As more crop residue is plowed into the soil, the more water it will soak up and the more alive the soil becomes. It must be remembered that stalks and straw require nitrogen to make rot. For this reason stalks should be cut early to let them decay as much as possible before planting time. The cutting of stalks in the fall and letting them lie all winter on the lands surface is a good practice except in bottoms that overflow.

Productive soil is full of life. This life requires feeding through both fertilizer of the right kind and proper amount and plant residue.

A soil can starve just as you and I can starve. A half starved soil will produce half a crop and the farmer who continues to produce half a crop will become poorer and poorer.

Why not feed your soil, increase your yields of row crops, in your more level land, and become richer and richer. Land will take care of any man who takes care of it. programs.

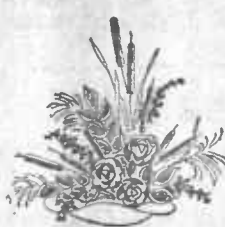

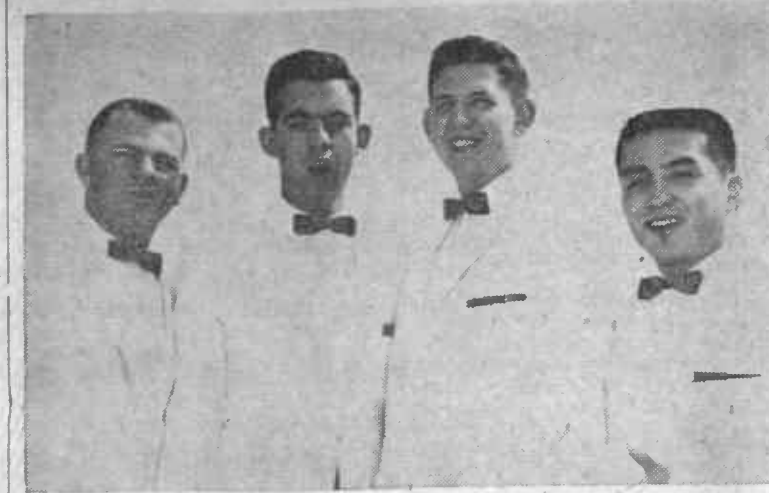
