

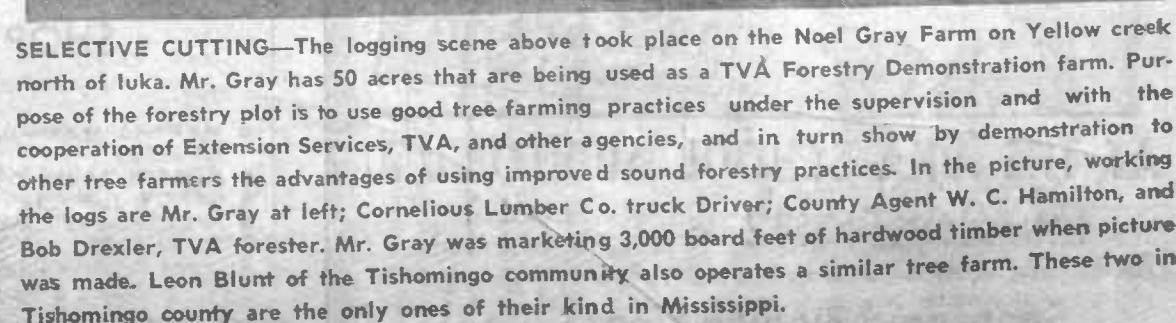
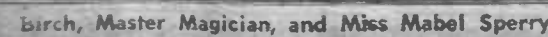

THE BATTLE OF THE BUDGET

There will be many facets to the activities of the 86th Congress now in session, but underlying just about all of them will be the Battle of the Budget.

Now that the budget for 1960 has been submitted, now that the economic message is in, now that the reactions are piling up, we can get a fairly good view of the President's budget, just what it is and what its chances are.

In the first place, the President got the jump on the Democrats by proposing a balanced budget—something that hardly anyone expected in view of the deficit of \$12.9 billion in the current budget. They immediately called it "phony" "delusive" and "political"—but they couldn't avoid acknowledging the fact that on its face it is balanced. He proposed spending of \$77 billion, and estimated income at \$77.1 billion—showing a surplus of \$100 million.

Moreover, the President held out the hope that if his balanced budget is allowed to stand and the expected continued improvement in income is realized, there would be good chance of a tax cut next year.

All this, of course, placed the Democrats on the defensive—and they have got to figure out some way to avoid getting any blame for unbalancing the budget, or get some of the credit for balancing the budget.

Now, a balanced budget is something greatly to be desired by anyone interested in a sound economy for the nation and its citizens. Efforts to achieve a balanced budget will be supported by patriots of both political parties. No one should oppose the idea of a balanced budget. But that does not mean the Eisenhower budget should be accepted at face value. It should be analyzed, and if it does not give promise of actually achieving a balanced budget or being the kind of balanced budget that is most desirable, then it should be revised to make sure it is a balanced budget and the kind we want.

The most valid criticism of the Administration budget would seem to be that it presumes some increase in taxes—about \$600 million. And this is in addition to an increase of 1½ per cent in the federal tax on gasoline, which goes into the highway trust fund. We need tax reform, yes—but increase in taxes, no. \$350 million of this \$600 million would come from an increase in the postage rate to 5½c. If this is not approved by Congress, then the President's \$100 million surplus immediately becomes a \$250 million deficit—and there is great doubt that it will be, or should be, approved. As to the increase in gasoline tax, that tax is high enough; the highway program should simply be stretched out to fit the present tax schedule.

The second criticism of the Administration budget would seem to be that it is overly optimistic, so far as estimated income is concerned. It is to be hoped it will turn out that way, but sound budget making decrees that income estimate should always be on the conservative side. It estimates corporate profits before taxes of \$48

billion, instead of \$36 billion as in 1958; it estimates personal income of \$378 billion, compared with \$353 billion for 1958. As much as we may desire them, these estimates would appear to be too much on the liberal side to be safe. This is especially true when it is realized that highest income the federal government has ever realized amounted to only \$71 billion—in 1957.

If the Democrats also want a balanced budget—and at the same time want to take part of the offensive away from the Republicans—they should come out with a sound one of their own. They should advocate no increase in taxes, they should be conservative about the estimated income, and they should leave a larger margin of safety. There are plenty of dole, subsidy and welfare state projects that could be drastically cut or even discontinued. Senator Byrd recently pointed out that since 1954, spending for defense purposes had actually decreased \$300 million—from \$48.6 billion to \$48.3 billion. During that same period, domestic expenditures have been increased \$14.3 billion—from \$19.1 billion to \$33.4 billion.

The main thing for the leadership of both political parties to do right now—along with all the citizens of this nation—is to make up their minds that they shall let nothing stand in the way of a balanced budget for the next fiscal year, and agree upon such a budget as well as be certain as humbly possible of achieving this goal.

with fear that the advance notice proposal, if adopted, would result in government-administered pricing, just as the Interstate Commerce Commission, for example, establishes transportation rates. The thoroughly disturbed Wall Street Journal, which usually reflects business thinking, recently headlined a warning that Congress plans the "Biggest Anti-Business Drive Since the New Deal."

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce, which also has big business interests, is quoted as saying "they (the committees) won't lay the cause of inflation at labor's door. They have to find a scapegoat, and business is it."

It could be that business men are "talking scared," but if so they are being given some very plausible reasons for doing so.

Many business men are becoming convinced that the government is against them and that any time they appear before a congressional or administrative agency they have two strikes on them.

A Fair Trial

It is entirely within the province of congressional committees and properly constituted government agencies to hold hearings for the purpose of gathering information necessary to carry out their functions.

Those functions, however, should not include the power to act as a court of law to deprive citizens of their liberty or property. That is the proper function of our courts.

Some committees have operated on the theory that if they make their charges and insinuations strong enough a sizable portion of the public will believe there is guilt, even when later evidence fails to reveal wrongdoing.

Business men will be in for a grueling ordeal when they face investigating committees headed by Senators Joseph O'Mahoney of Wyoming and Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, and in the House by committees headed by Emanuel Celler of New York and Wright Patman of Texas.

The charges against business will make sensational headlines, but it would be well to reserve judgment until all the evidence is in. It never is a good idea to pass sentence before a trial.

Of Certified Trees Farms

Mississippi has held on to its national leadership in the number of certified tree farms, also setting a fast pace in the friendly contest with Alabama, Georgia and Florida. This regional competition, suggested last year by Alabama, has stimulated greater interest in tree farming and added thousands of new acres to the four-state total.

A tree farm is a privately owned, taxpaying tract of timberland, owner of which provides recommended protection from fire, insects, disease, over-grazing, along with harvesting trees as a continuous crop.

Charter Boat Requirements

Water sports will reach an all-time high in popularity in Central Mississippi when the 16th Section Lake and Pearl River Reservoir are completed. Prospective charter boat operators will have to meet certain Coast Guard regulations before taking passenger aboard. Safety regulations which took effect last June 1 apply to charter boats carrying more than six passengers in both open and inland waters although the requirements are somewhat different. The requirements are set out in Parts 157.30 and 157.31 of Title 46, Coast Guard regulations.

Develop Better String Bean At Crystal Springs Station

A new snap bean for fresh market on home garden has been developed at the Truck Crops Branch Experiment Station at Crystal Springs. In a wide series of tests this

new bean, named "Longval," has shown advantages which appeal to both consumers and growers. The long, straight, dark green pods are completely stringless. These qualities appeal to consumers. Growers will like the high yields and out of 85 Mississippi gardeners who tested the bean, 81 wanted to continue growing it.

New Phone Lines

An underground rural telephone system under construction now in Scott County will mark a milestone in communication services in Mississippi. The system being installed will give new service to some 40 families in the area of Cash and Midway. Most of the system will be buried underground by a special plow. The system has the advantage in that it can use highway rights of way, requires no poles and avoids costly clearing and maintenance. The method is economical and efficient and may set a pattern for future rural telephone developments.

Red Snapper Bank Planned In Mississippi Gulf Coast

Fishing is expected to improve on the Mississippi Gulf Coast in the near future with the creation of a new snapper bank some four miles south of Dog Keyes Pass near Ship Island. Old barges will be loaded with junk material such as concrete, auto tires and scrap iron and towed to the point of the planned snapper bank where the barges will be sunk. Already on the spot are the remains of an old steamboat, believed to have gone down shortly after the Civil War. The bank should be ready for use within a few weeks.

Assuming that there are 500 Farm Ponds in Tishomingo county that average an acre in size, and that the water level in these ponds are one foot below the spillway, it is easy to see that these ponds can hold 500 acre-feet of water out of the major stream. If the water level in these ponds averaged 2 feet below the spillway they would hold 1000 acres of water one foot deep out of the main stream channels. Therefore, one great use of Farm Ponds is to help prevent the flooding of valuable bottom land. This helps everybody.

Another purpose for which Farm Ponds are used is to produce fish. It seems easier to have a poor fishpond than to have a good one. To have a good fishpond, first, locate the pond so dirt will not wash into it and keep it muddy, second, get rid of all wild fish, third, properly stock it with fish, fourth, keep it well fertilized and fifth, keep it well wished. Fish is heavy after the Bream and the Bass have spawned.

These are the purposes most SCD Cooperators use their Farm Ponds for. However, one cooperator, Mr. T. C. Ables, who lives west of Dennis, had more uses in mind for his pond when he constructed it. They were as follows:

1. For stock water, 2. For swimming, 3. For fish, 4. For flood control, 5. For irrigating a truck patch, 6. For fire protection for his dwelling and barn, and 7. For boating.

Farm Ponds are a definite asset to the people of Tishomingo county. Those of you who need a Farm Pond should make your application to the ASC office, (Mr. Allen's office), and then come by the office of your local soil conservation service and talk to me or to Mr. Tice about it.

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FARM PONDS

Most of the Farm Ponds people see as they drive along the roads of Tishomingo county were surveyed and designed by Soil Conservation Service Technicians. The local A.S.C. office assisted in paying the cost of constructing most of these ponds.

Essentially these ponds were constructed to provide adequate water for livestock but this is not their only use.

One of the main purposes of a Farm Pond is Flood Control. How do these hundreds of small ponds help to control the flooding of bottom land? They help to control flooding by holding the runoff water and preventing it from reaching the main channels. A part of this runoff water is caught and held up on the watersheds and it reaches the main stream channels. For example, very few Farm Ponds maintain a water level high enough to continually run out of the spillway. Most Farm Ponds maintain a water level of about one foot or more below the spillway, when the pond will have to rise high enough to run out of the spillway before any water will flow from the pond to the area below it. The pond has to fill up before water can flow out of it.
