County Man
Declared Cotton
Growing Champion

Grady Taylor Yields
1,267 Pounds Of Lint
Per Acre Near Belmont

Mr. Grady O. Taylor, Route 2, Belmont, was declared the cotton growing champion of the State last Friday at the annual cotton awards day program held at Mississippi State University. His yield of 1,267 pounds of lint per acre was the highest of any contestant entered. The 1958 Contest was on a total farm production basis, divided into four divisions according to allotments. The divisions were (1) Under five acres, (2) five-fifteen acres, (3) fifteen to fifty acres, (4) above fifty acres. Mr. Taylor's farm allotment of 4.7 acres produced a total of 5,955 pounds of lint cotton with a total production cost of \$470.90 or \$100.20 cost per acre. Varieties grown were Stoneville 3202 & Dixie King. Fertilizers used - 100 units of nitrogen, 52 of phosphate and 66 of potash per acre. The cotton was poised thirteen times, irrigated once.

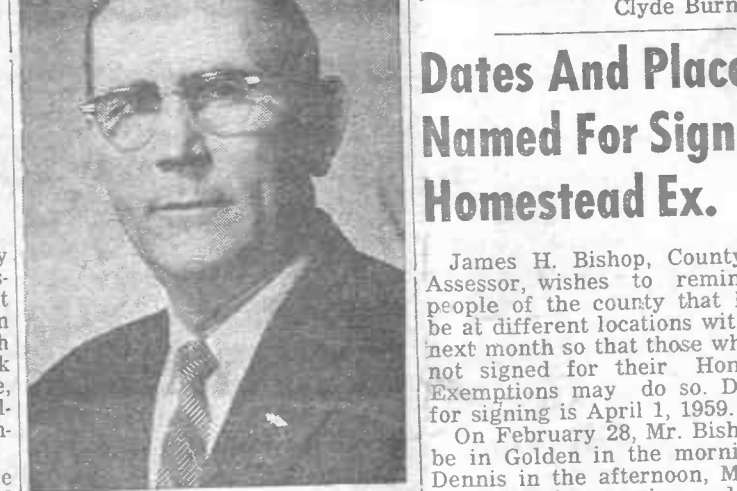
CLYDE BURNS ANNOUNCES AS A

Great Accomplishments From Small Jobs

Great accomplishments may not always be the results of great jobs. More often great accomplishments result from many small jobs well done. This is very true in soil and water conservation.

If a landowner living in Tishomingo County wants to cooperate with the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District, he makes application, either to 1 of the Commissioners, or to the work unit conservationist. A soil map of this persons farm, is then made and a Farm Plan, based on the capabilities of his land is written.

This Farm Plan may call for many different jobs to be done, all of them small when considered by themselves, which taken together would accomplish great things for the landowner and his land.

If the farm planned is an average Tishomingo County farm, the jobs planned to be done might be as follows: 1. A complete water disposal system for the entire farm including, (a) terraces, (b) vegetated outlets, (c) row arrangement, (d) v-ditches, (e) drainage ditches, and, (f) cleaning out and straightening of the main channel—a diversion terrace may be necessary also.

2. In so far as practical, a change in landuse by (a) using the more level productive land for row crops, (b) the poorer-drained and less productive level land and sloping upland for hay and pasture, and, (c) the steep hillland for pines.

3. Changing fences and field roads to guard against excessive erosion.

4. The stopping of gullies.

5. The establishing of a sod-based crop rotation on steeper row crop land.

6. The utilization of plant residue.

7. The suggestion that the farmer have his soil tested and follow the fertilizer recommendations made by the State Experiment Station.

8. The suggestion that the landowner contact his county agent and follow the state experiment stations recommendation as to crop varieties, cultural practices, and disease and insect control.

9. The proper establishment and for care of his woodland, both pine and hardwood.

10. The fitting of all these jobs into a pattern of productive, profitable land-use that will enrich the landowner and conserve his soil.

All this may appear to be quite a big job, but the farm plan is set up to cover a five year period. On this basis one-fifth of the total work called for in a farm plan can be done each year, and all the work planned can be accomplished in five years.

It doesn't take long to stop a gully, to set out five (5) acres of pines, or to build a system of terraces. Many farmers do more than this every year. But the important

thing is to prevent gullies, and where and how terraces are constructed? (Are they correctly surveyed, and do they have the proper grade?). Where are these pines set. If pine seedlings are set in woodland are they released the next year so they get proper sunlight? The main thing for a landowner to bear in mind is—Am I using my land according to its capabilities and teaching each acre according to its needs? If you need help on your land problems come by and talk to your local conservation service personnel, the work unit conservationist and conservation aid. We may be able to help you.

By following a properly made farm plan you may be able, within the next five years, to accomplish great things by doing well a few small jobs each year.

County Agent news

Brucellosis Or Bangs Program
Tishomingo County is an accredited Bangs Free area until September 3, 1960. In order to keep the county accredited all owners of cattle should have their calves vaccinated between ages of four to eight months of age.

While the county is accredited, any animal that contracts bangs should be sold for slaughter and the owner will be paid an indemnity of \$25.00 for a grade animal and \$50.00 for a registered animal. This indemnity is over and above market price received.

In order to qualify for the indemnity, the following procedure must be followed: If you have any reason to suspect Bangs, contact your county Agent's Office and arrangements will be made with a Bureau of Animal Industry Veterinarian to test your entire herd. The entire herd must be tested to qualify for the additional indemnity.

Infra-red lamps are now being widely used for brooding chickens and pigs, but many farmers are not using them right. This improper useage is causing a lot of fires and accidents.

Here are some hints for safe use: Hang the lamps securely by chain, wire or bracket. Do not hang by the cord. Keep the lamps at least a foot and a half away from hay or straw and out of reach of poultry and livestock. Protect them from moisture and breakage with a non-removable safety guard.

Vets May Borrow 94% Of Policies

Veterans holding permanent GI life insurance don't need to surrender their policies for cash in order to raise money urgently needed during financial emergencies.

A. W. Woolford, Manager of the Veterans Administration Center in Jackson, Mississippi, said these veterans may borrow up to 94 percent of their policies' cash surrender value.

Although this reduces the amount of protection for beneficiaries by the amount borrowed, it does leave the policy in force, Woolford explained.

Once surrendered for cash, however, all protection under the insurance ceases forever, since the GI policy is cancelled and cannot be renewed or reinstated, he said.

Annual interest on GI policy loans is charged at four percent on the unpaid balance and must be paid on or before the due date, Woolford warned.

Otherwise, the unpaid interest is added to the outstanding amount of the loan. This would soon eat up the remaining cash value of the policy and the insurance protection would cease.

Loans can be made only on permanent-type GI insurance policies. GI term insurance has no loan value, Woolford said.

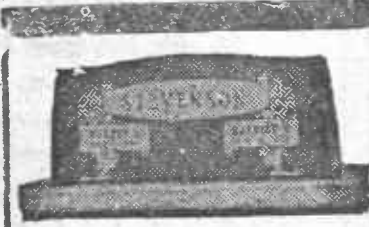

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Bible Material: Matthew 25:31-46; Mark 13:1-37.
Devotional Reading: 1 Peter 4:12-19.

Trouble and Faith

Lesson for February 22, 1959

IT IS A thousand pities, but it is a fact, that the Christian church, which ought to be united by the Bible, has become split over it. Not split by it, but over it, in varying and discordant interpretations of what the Bible means. No passage in all Scripture has been the subject of more debates and differences than this 13th chapter of Mark, along with the parallel chapters, Matthew 24 and Luke 21.

These are the chapters that report what Jesus said as he looked down the vista of time to the "end of the age." (That is a more literal translation of the Greek expression sometimes translated "end of the world.") Many Christians, despairing of getting any unanimous explanation of these difficult sayings, have just given up the whole business as a waste of time. Yet these chapters are not a mere puzzle.

Faith Expects Troubles
Let us stick to one general helpful truth which meets us here, namely the relation of trouble and faith. First of all, as Jesus looks down the years, he does not see the light growing brighter and brighter. At least, he does not see the future with the eye of the unadulterated optimist. He uses some frightening language—wars, earthquakes, famines, "abomination of desolation," tribulation, and darkness at noon as at midnight. Jesus gave no backing to the idea that if you have faith enough "all your troubles will be bubbles" as the song says. Some troubles are very solid, they can smash a man and his hopes. No matter what goodness there may be in the world, no matter how good God is, there are going to be troubles ahead. People who give up their faith in God because they run into a squall-line of trouble-clouds, which they can

Many troubles before the troubles, as he pointed out, expressions like "the beginning of the sufferings of the end of the age." Even in a Christian's ordinary life, one who dies centuries before "end of the age," there are troubles which will be crushing apart from the God. But the point of the chapters on the end of the age, and earth pass away, and the men and women of shall not pass away. Look you, wherever you are, afraid that these things may be swept away? So God's word assures us, swiftly or by slow degrees, wears the solid granite of destruction. But not all is visible! You, the real end, You, will outlive all this. But how? In terror, or in faith?

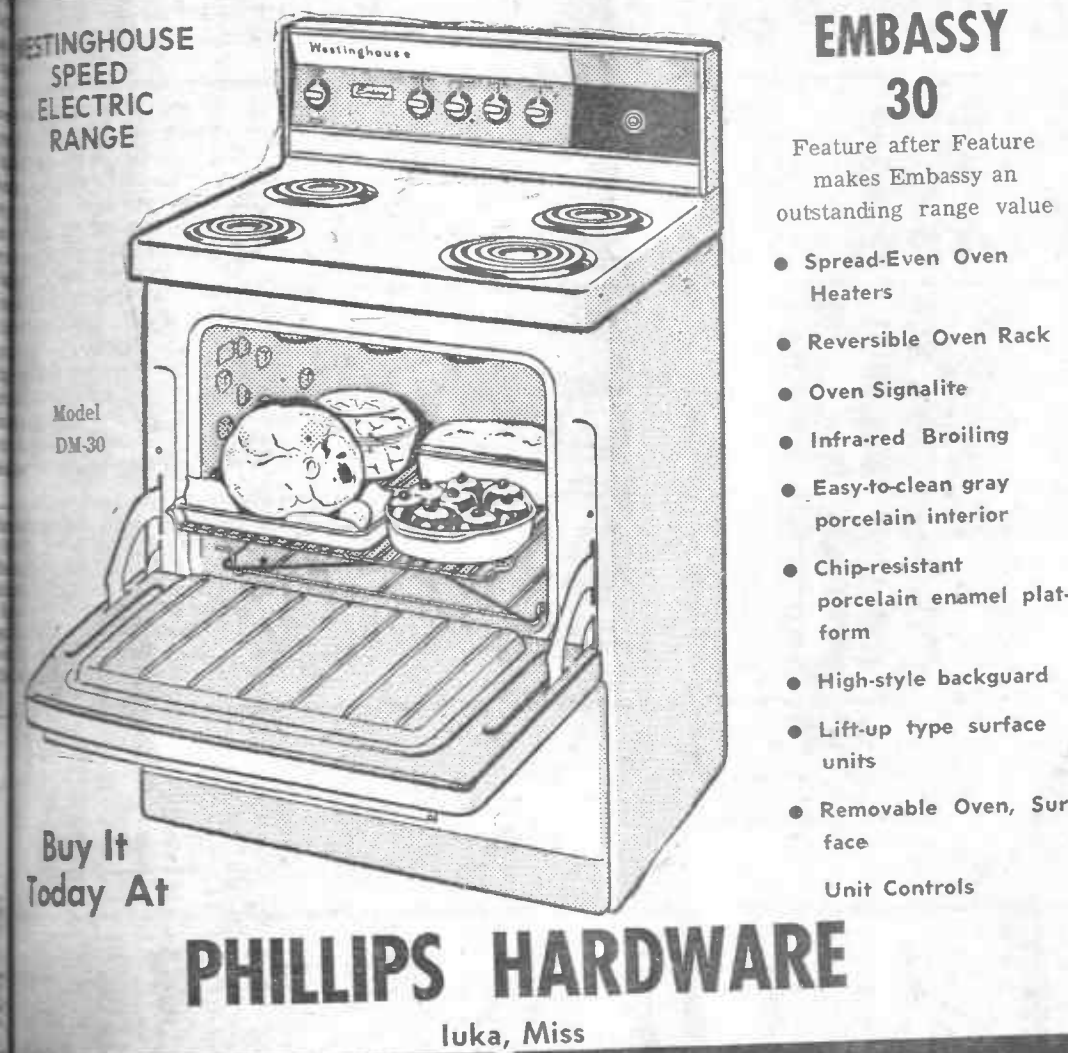
