Iuka Girls Will Compete For N. Miss. Title Friday Night

In Their First Round Of Play Again At Amory; Meet Cleveland

Sudden death elimination contests during the past two weeks has trimmed the field of contestants for the four North Mississippi basketball titles from more than 300 to a mere 32.

Winners and the runners-up in Class A-AAA girls in Districts One, Two, Three, and Four will compete for the North Mississippi crown at Amory starting Thursday.

Shannon and Iuka representing District One, East Tallahatchie and Bruce representing District Two, Cleveland and Drew representing District Three, and Ackerman and Neshoba Central representing District Four are the A-AAA girls teams still in competition.

The Iuka Chieftainettes will play the strong Cleveland girls in the first round of the tournament with a 13-10 record, while Cleveland sports a 24-2 record. The Wild-Kittens from the Delta City were the No. 4 team in the state last year.

One win will qualify each team in the meet to go to the state playoffs next week end at Pearl High School, East of Jackson.

Wins over Aberdeen, and Amory sextets placed the local team in the North Mississippi contests. However, a 41-35 setback at the hands of the Shannon Raiderettes kept the girls from capturing the District 1 title.

The high scoring combination of Ora Lee Davis, Shorty Johnson, and Bonnie Sue Gray plus the fine play of the guards Rosalind Moser, Lola Davis, and Barbara Flynt vaulted the Iuka team into the finals.

A score of 77-48 over the Aberdeen squad placed the girls against Amory. All three starting forwards tallied in the twenties: Bonnie Gray 29, Ora Lee Davis 22, and Shorty Johnson 20 points.

Bonnie Sue Gray tallied 21 points, Ora Lee Davis 19, and Shorty Johnson 8 in the 48-43 win over the Amory Pantherettes. Iuka led at halftime by a score of 26-25.

A lapse in scoring in the finals of the District playoffs cost the Chieftainettes a win toward the title. Ora Lee Davis tallied 16, Shorty Johnson 15, and Bonnie Sue Gray 4 in the title bout. Iuka trailed throughout and was tied three times during the contest.

The girls will play the winners of the Ackerman-East Tallahatchie game if they can get by Cleveland.

Short Illness Fatal To Vernon Blackard

Vernon Blackard passed away in Kennedy General hospital in Memphis on Tuesday morning at 9:30. He had been ill only a short time. Vernon was born in Tishomingo county, living in this county a greater part of his life. He was 43 years of age, a veteran of World War II, serving with the U. S. Navy. RADAR WILL BE USED 365 DAYS A YEAR

Comm. Orders Patrolmen To Use Radar Every Day & Night Of The Week

Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough warns that radar will be used "365 days a year" by the Patrol in an all out effort to reduce highway deaths.

Commissioner Scarbrough said Highway Patrolmen have been ordered to use radar speed-timing device every day of the week and at night.

"Our traffic fatality rate has jumped alarmingly in recent weeks and radar is our most effective weapon in deterring this accident rate. When we ease up in its use, our accident rate climbs." Popular or unpopular, Scarbrough said, radar is now here to stay.

He added that as well get acquainted with the fact that every bush or billboard may be hiding a radar machine.

In his sternly worded warning that radar was back to stay, the Patrol head said Patrolmen have been instructed to move radar sites daily, "twice and three times a day if that is necessary to apprehend speeders."

Mississippi's fatal 1959 death rate has jumped approximately 33 per cent above the corresponding 1958 death rate. According to Patrol accident statistics, 65 persons have died in highway accidents as of midnight February 17. Only 43 motorists died last year through the same period.

GFWC To Conduct "Ballot For Better Driver Licensing" Campaign

State legislators throughout the nation will be alerted to feminine concern over state driver licensing laws as the result of a unique "Ballot for Better Driver Licensing" campaign to be conducted by the General Federation of Women's Clubs, according to Mrs. B. V. Todd, national safety chairman.

The General Federation, which numbers more than seven million members in this country, recently adopted a "Passport to Safety" program to alert its members to the necessity for driver license legislative reforms to improve traffic conditions. The "Ballot for Better Driver Licensing" campaign will dramatize this program and express to state legislators the concern

felt by women over the traffic accident problem, according to Mrs. Todd.

Printed ballots urging legislative action to improve state driver licensing programs will be sent to each of the GFWC's 20,000 affiliates throughout the country for signature by the members who will forward the signed ballot to their respective state legislators.

"We feel that the time has come to step forward and speak out vigorously for driver licensing laws that will operate to reserve the driving privilege for those motorists willing to accept and live up to the responsibilities inherent in the operation of a motor vehicle," Mrs. Todd said. "Our lives and health and the lives of our families have too long been jeopardized by a selfish minority of drivers who are incapable or unwilling to drive safely. In my opinion, this campaign for improved driver licensing procedures is the most significant and satisfying program ever undertaken by the General Federation of Women's Clubs."

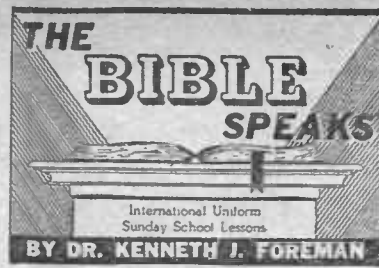

The Great Refusal

Lesson for March 1, 1959

A DOUBLE meaning can be found in some of Jesus' parables. A triple meaning, if you include the simple literal words of the stories. For instance, take the parable which in old-fashioned English is called the parable of the Wicked Husbandmen. In more modern English it would be the story of the Wicked Tenant Farmers. The first and simple meaning is just the story. Like so many that Jesus told, this one both sounds as if it might have actually happened, and as if it were too fantastic ever to happen. It is the story of a farm owner who tried to collect from his tenants. But they beat up all his agents, one after another. Finally the owner sent his son. But this only stirred the tenants to murder. If we kill the man's only son, they said to each other, then the vineyard will be ours. So they killed him.

Shadow of Calvary
Jesus ended his blunt, ugly tale with a question. What will the owner do next? His hearers knew. The least the tenants could expect would be to lose their places. But more likely the owner would destroy them. Their murder would come back on their own heads.

So much for the story itself. But it was more than a story; that is, there was a meaning under its surface. It is on record that the leading citizen to whom Jesus told this tale of brutality and madness, immediately made plans to arrest him. They saw that Jesus was speaking about them. This was no simple rural Who-done-it. It was a sword-thrust, a stern prophecy, and they did not like it, nor him. These men, you might say, were parable-experts, parabolists (sic) themselves. They saw in a flash what the Man from Galilee was

driving at. The owner of the yard was God; the tenants were themselves. The vineyard was the Kingdom of God, with powers and privileges. God trusted the Jewish people, especially their leaders and these chief priests and among them, with his laws, the knowledge of the Bible. But instead of blessing them with these gifts, they selfishly to keep them for very own. They had made God's messengers of the vineyard. Now God's son was in the vineyard... but murder was in their minds.

One of the most chilling Jesus ever said was his parable to these men who were about to kill him. "The Kingdom of God will be taken away from you, and be given to a nation which produces more fruit than you." That was a shocker. That was a warning. That was a challenge. That was a promise. The Tragic Pattern
But with this last word of a third depth of meaning, a parable comes to light. Jesus not only predicting his own death at the hands of those who have made him most welcome, not only predicting the pattern of the Kingdom of God on earth, but also suggesting a pattern which has been repeated over and over again in history. Those wicked tenants are surely certain priests in long-ago salem, they are the Refusers God everywhere and at all times. God gives to man so much, demands (comparatively) as little as the owner in the parable. Man, confronted by God, over and over again the Great Refusal. Man wants the earth for himself, he does not want to give even with the Creator. But who refuse God are in reality destroying him; they are destroying themselves.

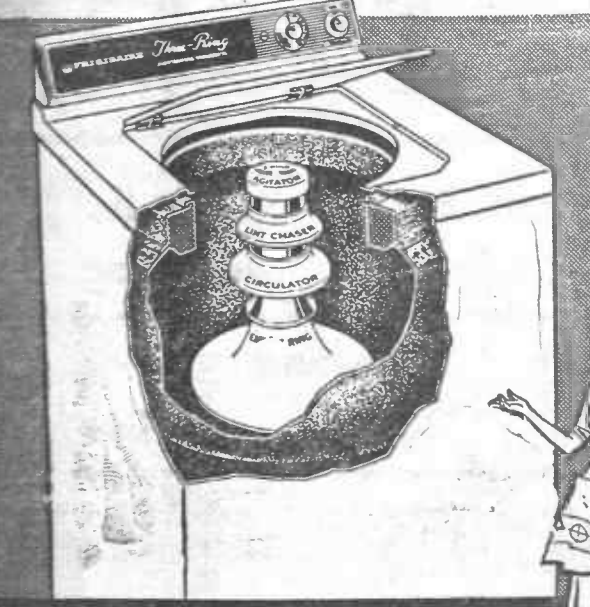
