## Work On Paper Mill Will Start

By Early Summer  
Completion Date  
Set For Jan. 1, '61

G. W. E. Nicholson, president of the Tennessee River Pulp & Paper Co., announces that the contract has been let for the construction of the firm's huge mill at Counce, Tenn. The W. M. Kellogg Company of New York has been awarded the job and designing engineers will be H. A. Simons, Ltd., of Canada. The mill will be a 500-ton capacity kraft pulp and containerboard manufacturing plant. It will use pulp from the surrounding forests in Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee.

Construction is expected to get underway in early summer with completion date being set for January 1, 1961.

A railroad to serve the mill will also be built. It will extend from the Illinois Central to Counce, crossing a portion of Tishomingo county.

## Free Mail Service

Scheduled For  
Iuka By July 11

Congressman Tom Abernethy announces that free mail delivery service for Iuka will be started by July 11, this year. In a telegram to the editor of The Vidette, Mr. Abernethy stated that the Post Office Department had been persuaded to establish the city mail delivery service.

The Town of Iuka will be required to properly number all houses and to appropriately mark all the streets. It is expected that a representative of the Post Office Department will be available for direction of this part of the improvement.

Success of the effort to acquire free mail delivery service came after two previous refusals. Sam Traylor, member of the Town Board of Aldermen, was persistent in the request and his efforts are possibly responsible for the attainment.

## Pilot Forest Work Begun

70-Acre Tract Will  
Be Brought To  
Full Production

Work has been started on the Pilot Forest established in Tishomingo County, located on the property of Oris D. Brumley, of the Pleasant Ridge Community, near Iuka, it was announced this week by Paul Weekley, chairman for the pilot forest program in Tishomingo County.

The Pilot Forest project in this county is part of a south-wide educational program of the Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association designed to demonstrate to landowners the proper woodland management practices of this area, Mr. Weekley explained.

A seventy-acre tract on the Brumley farm has been selected as representative of woodlands in this county and will be the site of a complete forestry program carried out by Hiwassee Land Company, of Calhoun, Tennessee.

The work on the Brumley tract will involve application of all forestry practices necessary to put the property into peak production. Such practices as scientific harvesting, control of undesirable species, establishment of fire control measures and planting of seedlings will be undertaken when appropriate.

"By bringing the Brumley property into peak production, a permanent educational example for this area will be provided with the purpose of encouraging all forest landowners to grow more trees more profitably," Mr. Weekley said.

"In most counties, putting all woodlands into top production will have the same effect on the county's economy as the establishment of a substantial new industry," he concluded.

The Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association, through its member pulp and paper mills, expects to dedicate 93 Pilot Forests in 12 Southern states on the second annual south-wide Pulp and Paper Day, April 14.

## Tribute Program For Iuka's A-AA N. Miss. Champions

Was Held Monday Morning In  
Auditorium; Business Men Speak

A program paying tribute to the Iuka Chieftainettes, A-AA North Mississippi Champs, was held Monday morning in the Iuka school auditorium.

Supt. of the School H. L. Shook presided at the event which was held with the student body assembly.

Mr. Shook, in his preliminary remarks, stated that he was the happiest man in the world as it was the first time for a school of his to attain such honor. He gave a resume of the team's record during A-AA tournament play. In the first tournament held at Booneville Iuka defeated Fulton 58-55, and Kossuth 41-31. In District I tournament held at Amory Iuka defeated Aberdeen 77-48, Amory 48-43, and lost to Shannon 35-41. In the North Mississippi tournament that included the best teams from districts 1, 2, 3, and 4, Iuka defeated Cleveland 42-34, East Tallahatchie 51-41, and Shannon, the seeded No. 1 team, 53-49; thus becoming North Mississippi A-AA Champions.

Mr. Shook explained that A-AA teams came from those high schools having an enrollment of 180 or more and that B-BB teams were from school with enrollments less than 180 students. The division considered as being North Half of Mississippi is all that part of the state north of an east-to-west line from and including Meridian westward to Greenville.

Members of the team were seated on the stage behind the curtain and at the conclusion of his remarks the superintendent directed that the curtains be withdrawn.

A number of business people of Iuka were present for the event and made short testimonial talks. Mayor John H. Allen praised the team for its accomplishments and spoke highly of the skill of the forwards. "But," he said, "we don't want to forget that there are also three other important players on this team and they are the guards. Without these able teammates our forwards wouldn't be able to get their hands on the ball."

Luther Kinard, president of the Lions Club, stated that he wished he were an accomplished orator. "If I were," he said, "I'd use all the fine words in the dictionary to describe how I feel about our team. We are extremely happy over the victory," he said, "and speaking for members of the Lions Club, I can truthfully say that we are 100 percent behind you in all of your games."

Others to speak were Cecil H. Brown, president of the Rotary Club, and Hiram Jones, president of the P.T.A. Harmon Byrom, chairman of the district school board, stated that the girls possessed one of the important factors and that was the winning spirit. "That spirit," Mr. Byrom said, "is something that we all need. With this winning spirit we will be a formidable foe for any team we may meet." The school board chairman also paid tribute to Coach Brison Mann, stating that he was always calm, either winning or losing, and that this was highly commendable in any person.

Coach Mann made a short speech in which he complimented his team, thanking them for their efforts, their cooperation and their determination.

At the conclusion of the program, Mr. Byrom dismissed school for the remainder of the day in celebration of Saturday night's victory.

Leaders of fifteen local churches in the Tishomingo County Baptist Association are busily completing arrangements for their first Schools of Missions Program in several years, to be held March 15th through 20th.

## Chieftainettes Capture North Miss. A-AA Girls Title

Have Record Of 21 Wins And 10  
Losses; Iuka 53-Shannon 49

Class A-AA North Mississippi Girls Champions—This is the honor given to the Iuka High School Chieftainettes after three night tournament play at Amory High School Gymnasium last Saturday night. A winning spirit and great determination helped the girls in their task.

This was the first time in the history of the town and the school that a basketball team had received such a title.

The championship victory over the Shannon Raiderettes was complete revenge for the District 1 loss at the hands of the same team.

The Chieftainettes ran up a quick 15-4 first quarter lead but could not hold it as the Shannon team came within 2 points in the second

quarter to leave the halftime score at 25-23 in favor of Iuka. However, in the third quarter the Raiderettes went as far ahead as six points only to see that lead erased by the end of the third quarter as Iuka led by two points, 41-39. In the fourth quarter the lead changed hands several times before the local team grabbed the lead for good. Shorty Johnson clinched the outcome of the game with two free throws in the last 30 seconds of the game.

Ora Lee Davis tallied 25, Shorty Johnson 18, and Bonnie Sue Gray 10 for the North Miss. Champs, while Devota Garner tallied 21, Brenda Phillips 20, and Martha Phillips 18 for Shannon. Field goals were the difference in the game as Iuka made 22 to 20 for Shannon. The Chieftainettes hit 22 out of 45 field goal attempts for their best night offensively.

To reach the finals the Chieftainettes had to eliminate the Cleveland Kittens in the 1st round. They did so by the score of 42-34. Iuka led in this game 9-8 at the end of the first quarter, 21-20 at the end of the half, 31-24 at the end of the third quarter. In the fourth quarter the lead rose to 11 points and then fell to 3 points with 2 minutes, however, two quick field goals and a free throw brought the lead up to eight points.

Ora Lee Davis tallied 23, Bonnie Sue Gray 10, and Shorty Johnson 9 for Iuka, while Kay Beevers scored 18, and Judy Elliott 14 for the Cleveland team. Field goals made the difference as Iuka made 16 to 12 for Cleveland.

In the semi-final game with the East Tallahatchie team Iuka led throughout to mark up a 51-41 victory. Iuka led 13-7, 32-21, 41-31 in the first, second, and third quarters respectively. Ora Lee Davis tallied 25 points and 17 out of 23 free throws, Bonnie Gray 14, and Shorty Johnson 12 for the Chieftainettes, while Brewer tallied 20, and Deley 13 for ETHS. Free throws made the difference as ETHS made 11-23, while Iuka 21-28.

Shannon reached the finals by defeating Drew 52-26, and Neshoba Central 50-45.

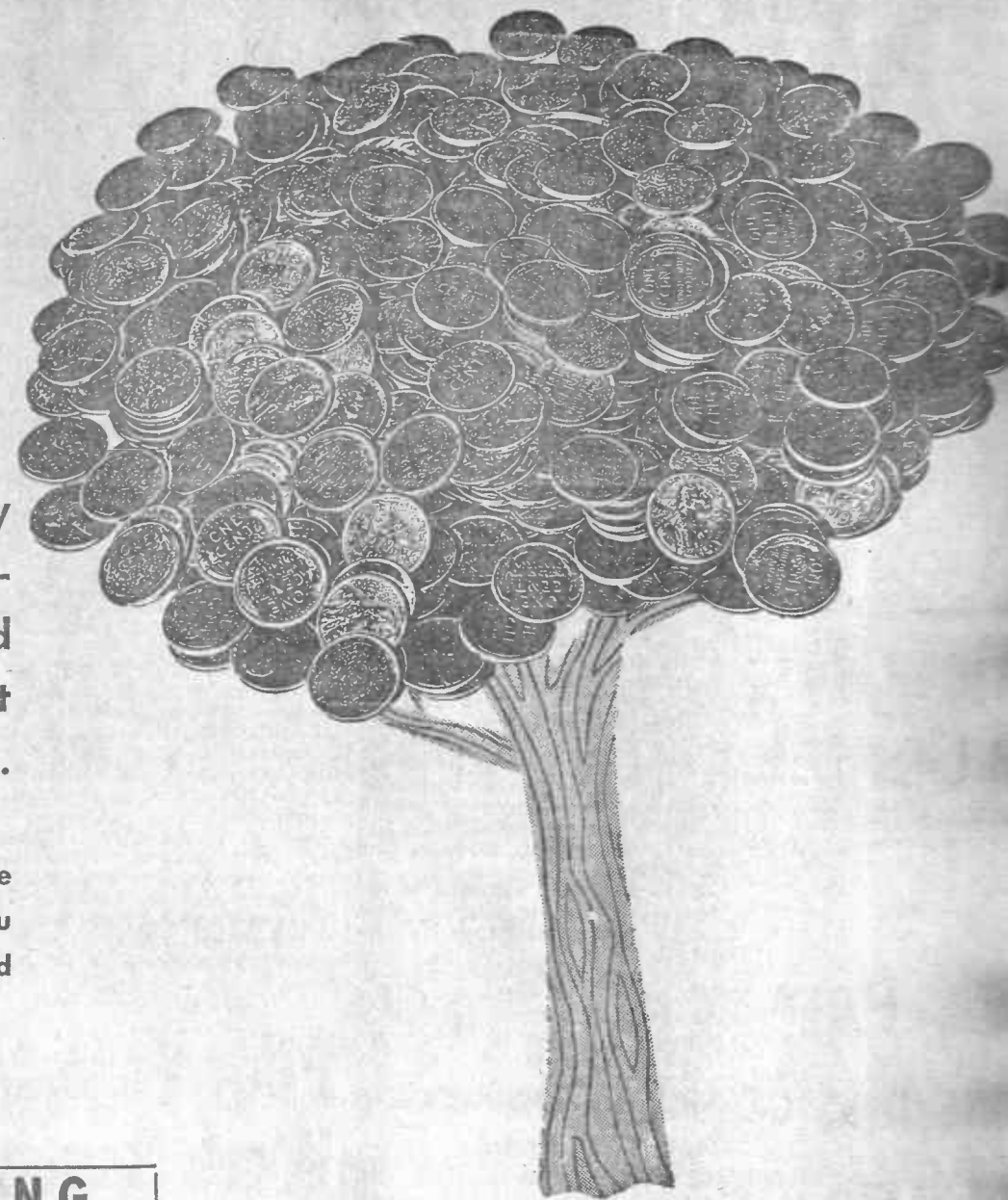

**HOME AGENT NOTES**

**March is National Egg Month.**  
We have more eggs this time of year this year than we did last year. Look for good buys in large size, high quality eggs. Whatever size egg you find at your grocery store, the price should mean you can economically use lots of them. **Which Electric Appliance Most Wanted?**  
What would be your answer, if someone came up and asked you: Which of your small electric appliances do you value most? Or what small electric appliance do you want most?  
Appliance specialists tell us the appliance homemakers want most is the electric mixer. If you are one who is wanting and shopping for a mixer, be sure to check for certain points. By the way, the stand mixer is the most common type in today's kitchen.

First of all check the controls. Control switches should be easy to reach. Near the top and front is usually better. The controls should be easy to read and operate with an adequate speed range for all mixing jobs.

Choose a lightweight yet stable mixer. The power head needs to be firmly fastened to the stand, yet easy to remove if it is a portable mixer. Motors should have sealed in lubrication for cleanliness and convenience.

Are the beaters easy to insert and remove? Attachments, to be satisfactory, need to be easy to connect and use.

You will find smooth blades easier to clean than ridged ones. Check the beaters and bowls to see if they are designed to feed the food into the beaters with the least manual aid.

Consider safety. Beaters that rotate away from each other at the point nearest you are safest. They push objects away rather than draw them into the beaters. Also be sure the mixer you select carries the Underwriter's Laboratory seal.

**Plentiful Foods**  
Eggs, of course, are the feature of the plentiful foods list for this month.

But you have wide choice of other foods in good supply. They include turkeys, pork, lamb, potatoes, dairy products, apples, cabbage, celery, honey, canned peas, walnuts, peanuts, California sardines and dry beans.

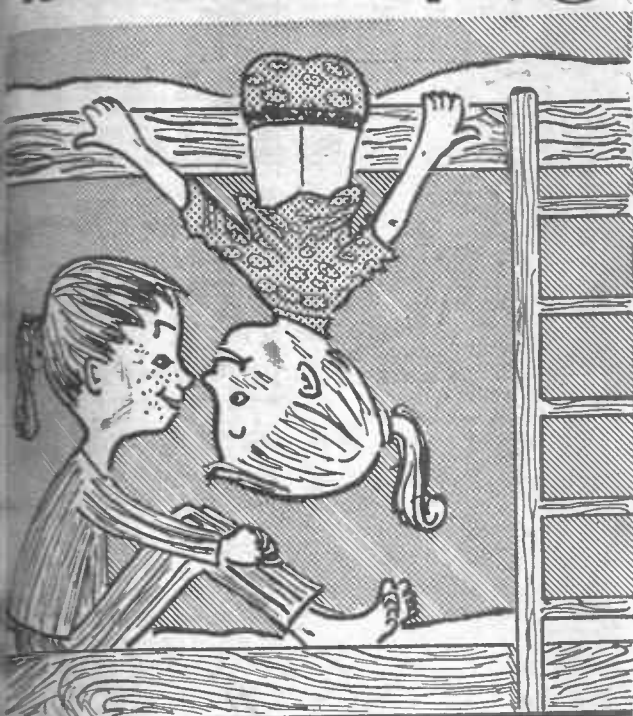

## They Said, "Joe Died Of A Heart Attack Last Night"

Mississippi Heart Association President-Elect

In the fight to overcome heart diseases, mass killer of America, we have but one problem to combat — ignorance.

In the area of heart health this fight on ignorance is called heart research.

The Mississippi Heart Association collects funds from people who have a vision of fewer people dying from heart attacks. Money thus channeled into the study of the hearts of men is achieving amazing results.

The ultimate aim of heart research is longer life and happier living. Surely happier living is attained when people are saved from the excruciating pain and grief which results from heart and circulatory diseases.

This fight with heart funds is expanded through the distribution of information which enables people to better care for themselves when confronted with heart diseases.

This fight is personal. Looking back we know of friends and loved ones who have been sacrificed because of insufficient care and inadequate heart research. Looking ahead it becomes even more personal. It can happen to any of us — or to the ones we love dearly.

All of us recognize the progress which over the years has been made in the conquest of diseases — diphtheria, yellow fever, smallpox, typhoid, polio. Our goal must be, therefore, to continue this spirit of conquest over disease. As others have made life safer for us, we must make life safer, not only for our generation, but for others yet to come. We are obligated to bequeath a heritage in exchange for a heritage bequeathed to us.

Thus far no one has ever offered a valid reason for not supporting heart research and the furtherance of information that can keep men from dying from heart diseases.

The obligation in 1959 is the greatest ever. Research is answering heretofore unanswerable questions; is finding ways to halt heartache by lessening heart attacks. Our research is developing the impact of compounded interest.

Americans abhor the stories of executions in such places as Hungary and Cuba. There is little we can do about them. But in America thousands of people are doomed to execution by heart and vascular diseases. We can do something about them. We can contribute to the Mississippi Heart Association's annual life-saving Heart Fund. We can hasten the day when friends will no longer say, "Joe died of a heart attack last night."

sweat to process and move farm materials.

These farmers are throwing away shovels and pitchforks. They have stopped lifting heavy loads. They are saving hours of time and hard work by doing many jobs with automatic equipment. And you can do the same.

The equipment that you will use for efficient handling of farm materials is motorized, doing many chores automatically. If you have a dairy or raise heaves, you can reduce feeding time from hours to minutes by using an electric feed grinder, mixer, and conveyors. You can grind and mix feed, even add supplements, and deliver the feed to your stock simply by pushing the buttons and setting the controls.

You can use electric grain and hay driers for better feed, feed with a higher food value. With various types of electric elevators, you can move this feed directly from field to stock without strain or hard work. You can also store and dispense silage automatically. Automatic electric feeders and waterers reduce your work to a minimum in raising hogs or in poultry farming. Automatic conveyors, graders, and washers help cut costs in truck farming.

As a grain grower, combine harvesting makes it possible for you to fill storage bins with grain for electric drying without ever handling the grains manually. Using a grain drier helps you reduce field and storage losses and assures you of full market price for your grains. Or you can hook up your grain drying bin with processing equipment and various types of conveyors for automatic feeding. Though some of this equipment for handling farm materials is high in first cost, farmers have found that hired help is even higher. In the long run, they've found it gets their work done faster and easier — and at less cost.

If you would like to investigate the possibility of mechanizing the hauling of materials on your particular farm, your power distributor or county agent has full details about the equipment you will need. Either will give you this information without cost or obligation.



Save Your Soil And Make Money With Cheap Grass And High Priced Cattle

By Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit Conservationist USDA-SCS

One of the best known ways to save soil and stop erosion is to cover land with a thick sod of grass. At this time this is also a very profitable thing to do because cattle are bringing a good price. Grass and cattle go together.

If you are a landowner who seems to always have a good pasture when the price of cattle is low, and a poor pasture when the price of cattle is high, it might pay you well to cooperate with your soil conservation district and have a soil conservation Farm Plan made on your farm.

After a soil map is made of your farm the Work Unit Conservationist will write a Farm Plan for you based on the capabilities of your land. All this will be done at no cost whatever to you.

It is almost certain that the Work Unit Conservationist will plan some of your land for pasture. The pasture plants best suited for your land will be recommended. Fertilizer recommendations will be based on data from the state experiment station, or you will be asked to contact your county agent and have a soil test run on your



land by the State Soil testing laboratory. Then you should follow the recommendations they made regarding the fertilization of your pasture.

By doing this you can at least improve your pasture in two ways: 1. By planting the kind of grass and clover best suited to your land, and 2. By improving the quality and increasing the quantity of your pasture through proper fertilization.

It takes less good grass and clovers of high nutrient quality to produce a pound of beef than it takes of poor grass and clover having low nutrient quality. Proper fertilization and proper care and use of a pasture are of major importance, if this pasture is to be most efficient in holding the land and returning a profit to the landowner.

Three acres of good pasture will support a beef cow and her calf. On good land with plenty of moisture less than three acres of good pasture may support a beef cow and her calf, or a beef steer.

The better the pasture the greater will be the soil protection and the greater will be the amount of money, in dollars and cents, the acre.

A landowner should try always to keep a good type of cattle. A

scrub cow and calf on a good pasture will net little profit to the owner. A purebred Hereford cow and calf on three acres of scrub pasture ("Pore Joe" and bitter weeds with a little Lespedeza) will starve.

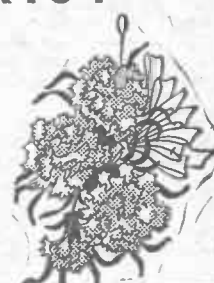

# SENSING THE NEWS

By THURMAN SENSING

Pricing Ourselves Out Of Prosperity

It now would seem as if we are heading into a period of prosperity, but there are economic problems in the background that may cause this to be more apparent than reality. That may call it up short, to rising price tags on our mounting from unrealistic increases and inflation—budget deficits, we are pricing ourselves out of markets—and even out of the U. S. dollar. This trend is causing more concern about the stability of the U. S. dollar. While shared by here at home, is even more abroad, where people experienced more fully the effects caused by inflation and they can get a better look at it than we can at ourselves.

It could happen. To keep it from happening, we must once again make our dollar "as good as gold," something it clearly has not been for many years now.

We could change this gloomy outlook and assure our future prosperity if we would only balance our budget, start paying off our national debt, and place wage increases on a realistic basis.

We could easily balance our budget if we only had the will to do it. One of the first things we should do is stop foreign economic aid. If there ever was a need for this, which is doubtful, it no longer exists. We have now rebuilt these countries and their economy to such an extent that they can easily stand alone. In fact, it is our rebuilding of them that largely makes it impossible for us to compete with them.

with dollar balances they had accumulated. (It should be noted that foreign governments can demand gold for dollars, something that American citizens are forbidden by law to do.) This year it is estimated that the withdrawal of gold will amount to about \$3 billion more. If governments abroad should really become concerned about our willingness or ability to maintain a sound dollar, they have accumulated such dollar balances now that they could demand gold for them and bring our reserves down to \$6-\$8 billion, far below our legal requirements. We don't think it will happen, but there are those abroad who actually believe we shall eventually have to devalue our dollar, just as Great Britain was forced to devalue her pound. It could happen. To keep it from happening, we must once again make our dollar "as good as gold," something it clearly has not been for many years now.

We could also protect our industries and our jobs much better than we are doing. As it is now, the wage scale paid in foreign countries and the low tariff we levy on their products allows them to flood our markets with goods of all sorts, destroy our industrial expansion, & deprive our wage-earners to jobs. These other countries protect themselves. A Ford automobile, for instance, that carries a price tag of \$2,400 including taxes, in California would cost \$3,200 in France with no less than \$3,200 of duties, and \$3,000 in England, with a 30 per cent duty. We do not protect ourselves. Textile mills have had to close down here on account of foreign competition. Many other industries have retracted, too, and had less or no expansion on account of it. One turbogenerator order placed in England recently by

the T.V.A. caused the loss of 1,455,000 man-hours of skilled labor in this country, equivalent to jobs for 350 men over a two-year period. High wage rates have no meaning to a man without a job. In order to compete, some of our big industries have been forced to build factories abroad, and employ the low-priced labor in those countries, to be able to sell in world markets—or even here at home.

We ought to be realistic about these things. We must come to our senses. The way it is now, we are virtually cutting our own throats.

**CAPITOL STATE NEWS**  
**Tomato Plants Must Be Inspected**

Persons who plan to grow and sell tomato plants are urged by the State Plant Board to have their plants inspected before they are offered for sale. Requests for the inspections may be sent to the headquarters of the Board at State College or to the district inspectors who are stationed at various cities over the state. Tomato permits are required on all plants offered for sale in stores or shipped by express or parcel post. In order to prevent the dissemination of late blight, early blight, root-knot nematode and other serious pests of tomatoes, the Plant Board prohibits the importation of tomato plants from all other states. The Mississippi Tomato Plant Quarantine places upon the possession of tomato plants the duty of showing that the provisions of this Quarantine have been complied with.

**To Spend \$11 Million On Chemical Plants**  
Chemical producing factories costing an estimated \$11,400,000 will be constructed in Mississippi during 1959 and 1960. This includes \$4,750,000 for three projects under way and \$6,650,000 for two projects scheduled for early ground-breaking. According to a recent survey, Mississippi chemical producers in 1958 completed six projects at a cost of \$22,800,000, and more than \$63,100,000 has been spent to build chemical plants in Mississippi during the past five years. Chemical production is a steadily expanding industry in Mississippi.

**Farmers Wait For Dry Land**  
Farmers are waiting for land to dry so they can begin spring plowing in a big way. Cattle generally remained in good flesh last week mainly because of heavy supplies of pasture-cured grasses stored hay and grain. In Oktibbeha County, more than one million pine seedlings a record number, have been planted. Clovers are growing well in Simpson County, and pasture fertilization demonstrations are being set up by community clubs in Tiptah County. Oats and turnips are in good condition in Perry County.

**Scott County's Well May Start New Boom**  
The long search for oil in Scott County has ended with the completion of a well located approximately 23 miles northwest of the deep Raleigh oil field of Smith County and six miles southwest of Morton. The new field find flowed at the rate of 135 barrels of 28 gravity oil per day from perforations in the casing at 6410-20 feet. The discovery well was drilled to a total depth of 11,062 feet. The discovery well was drilled to a total depth of 11,062 feet with no deep shows logged, and completion was made in a semi-shallow Eutaw zone.

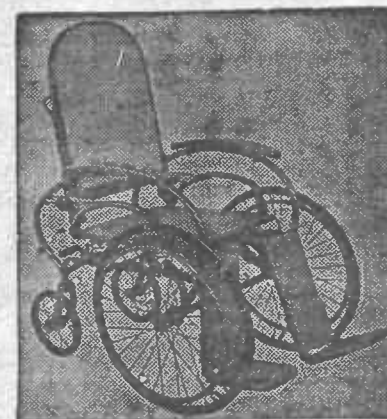

## General Shoe Corporation To Be Known As Genesco

Total Volume Of General Shoe Exceeded \$260,000,000 In 1958

Nashville, Tenn.—America's exclusive circle of great industrial families will add a new name—Genesco—to its roll of quarter-billion dollar companies.

Henceforth, General Shoe Corporation of Nashville will be known as Genesco. Total volume in 1958 exceeded \$260,000,000.

W. Maxey Jarman, chairman of General Shoe Corp., announced that proxies had been mailed to approximately 10,000 stockholders for approval of a change of the corporate name to Genesco as more truly representative of its present growth to world-wide manufacturing and retailing operations.

"We are preparing for our greatest year in history," Mr. Jarman said. "A change in our corporate name is an important part of our program which calls for multi-million dollar expansion of plants and stores, increased diversion through new acquisitions and expected increase in earnings by more than one-third. For Genesco, the future is now."

President Ben H. Willingham

spread to 60 operating companies that range through a dozen diversified industrial areas into the high-fashion and retailing fields.

The corporate body, Mr. Willingham explained, draws its strength from sales of leather and chemicals; from broad lines of manufacturing many of the most famous brands of men's, women's and children's shoes; from the manufacture of flat silver; and from such exclusive retail operations as Bonwit Teller, Henri Bendel, and the world-renowned Tiffany's of fabulous gems.

Its 40 major manufacturing plants, 18,000 employees and 20,000 dealers range from Nashville to New Zealand, in 16 countries covering all continents and into the lives of millions of consumers.

"We enter 1959 operating, in some fashion, in many areas other than shoes alone," Mr. Willingham said. "How big is Genesco going to grow? Nobody knows—but the fundamental principles on which the company was built are as sound today as they were at any

pointed out that from a southern shoe manufacturer founded in 1924, General Shoe Corp. now had time during the last 34 years.

"Obviously, however, our present broad-scale operations demand an all-encompassing corporate name. We plan to make the name Genesco official at the annual meeting March 2."

Long research, a survey of more than 900 possible names, and personal meetings among company executives with leaders in industry and finance were among steps taken to arrive at Genesco as the corporate designation, Mr. Willingham said.

"This will not change our fundamental operating principle which is a Federalist plan in which the various companies and divisions conduct their business almost autonomously," he said. "However, it will serve to link us as a great family, moving ahead together."

Already a number of steps have been taken to bring the corporation "greatest year in history" to fruition.

GENESCO paid its regular dividend of \$1.50 Except for early years when the infant company was building strength by putting all possible cash into facilities and expansion, the company has never missed nor reduced a dividend.

This policy covers a 26-year period. Current orders brought a forecast that 1959 sales would surpass last year's by 10 per cent and that earnings would climb from 1958's common stock return of \$1.89 to at least \$2.50 this year.

During the 1958 general business recession, the company initiated efficiencies which have reduced overhead costs by \$1,000,000 annually, or about 40 cents on each of the 2,471,867 common shares. In this connection, a new electronic computing operation is being established for added efficiency.

Facility-wise and product-wise, the company is initiating programs of expansion and modernization, Mr. Willingham said. No less than nine new plants and the modernization of a 10th either are on the drawing boards or underway.

"Topping the expansion program is a \$15 million project for new world headquarters at Nashville," he said. "This will include a trio of the most modern plants in the American shoe industry on a 50-acre plot together with 'push-button' general offices, so-called because they will be serviced by escalators rather than stairs and containing electronic computing facilities."

Beyond this, Mr. Willingham said was a program to open nearly 50 new retail shoe stores, to move with great strength into the low-price women's shoe field, to expand Canadian operations and to enter the area of manufacturing men's clothing.

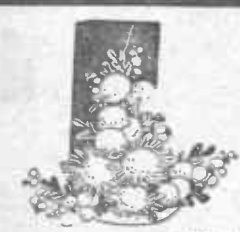
