CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FOR AREA IS PLANNED

Survey Will Be Conducted To Determine Support And Cooperation

An effort will be made to organize and establish a Chamber of Commerce for Iuka and the surrounding area.

Mayor John H. Allen, after being petitioned by a number of business and professional leaders, is proclaiming that a survey be made to determine whether or not the establishment of a Chamber of Commerce would receive the necessary support and cooperation from citizens of the area.

The mayor's petitioners pointed out in their request that a great need now exists for a Chamber of Commerce. They stated that, with the advent of the huge Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Mill at Coun- ce, Tenn., Iuka would be in direct competition with Corinth, Selmer and Savannah, Tenn., and other towns in the area for benefits that will be derived from this mass employment. They further pointed out that since all these other towns and communities have active and aggressive Chambers of Commerce, Iuka would have only a small opportunity of gaining what rightfully should come to Tishomingo County without an effective organization.

The petitioners further pointed out that since manufacturers, in locating new plants, generally do business with chambers of Commerce in the prospective locations it is most imperative that an effort

be made to organize and establish a chamber of Commerce so that the area would have the necessary machinery with which to contact and do business with those manufacturers seeking new locations.

The Mayor's proclamation concerning the establishment of a Chamber of Commerce follows.

Chieftainettes Place Third In The State Tournament

Defeat Shannon 51-43; Iuka's Ora Lee Davis Is High Scorer For Event

No. 1 in North Mississippi and No. 3 in the State—These are the positions held by the Iuka Chieftainettes after four weeks of state eliminations. Only a 65-59 upset by the Forest Hill Rebelettes kept the

Chieftainettes out of the championship finals.

Iuka played the No. 4 team from the South, Collins, and defeated them in a high scoring contest 73-60. In this game the local team started slow and trailed by as much as six points in the first quarter. At the end of that period the girls trailed 18-16, led 33-26 at the half-time, and led 57-37 at the end of three quarters.

Ora Lee Davis poured in the tournament high of 43 points, while Bonnie Gray tallied 23 and Shorty Johnson 7. For Collins, Barbara Harris, their All-State representative, racked up 35 points, while Carol Mitchell tallied 13, and Brenda Mitchell 12 points.

A big Friday night upset by Forest Hill turned the tables for the Chieftainettes as they were knocked out of their four game winning streak and a chance at the Mississippi State Championship. Both teams were playing their finest game of the season as the first quarter ended at a 22-22 deadlock. However, at the end of the half Forest Hill had gone ahead 41-36. The turning point in the game was in the last two minutes of the first half as the Rebelettes scored 8 straight points to wipe out a 36-33 lead by Iuka. At the end of the third quarter Forest Hill had maintained a 5 point margin and led 52-47. An injury in the third quarter to Iuka's Shorty Johnson slowed the Chieftainettes down considerably. Miss Johnson had scored 16 points in the first half.

Ora Lee Davis tallied 38 points, Shorty Johnson 19, and Paula Riley 2 in the Iuka effort. Glenda Doty poured in 42 points and Eva Sipes 21 for Forest Hill.

The Iuka Chieftainettes proved that the position of No. 1 in North Miss. was no fluke as they defeated the Shannon Raidersettes for the second time this season by a score of 51-43 in the consolation game Saturday afternoon. Iuka led 15-9 at the end of the first period, trailed 27-22 at the end of the first half, and regained a 37-32 lead at the end of the third quarter.

Ora Lee Davis tallied 32 points, Shorty Johnson 17, and Bonnie Sue Gray 2 for Iuka, while Devota Garner scored 26, Brenda Phillips 13, and Martin Phillips 4 for Shannon.

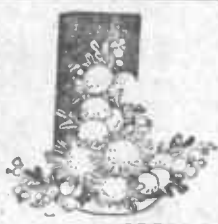

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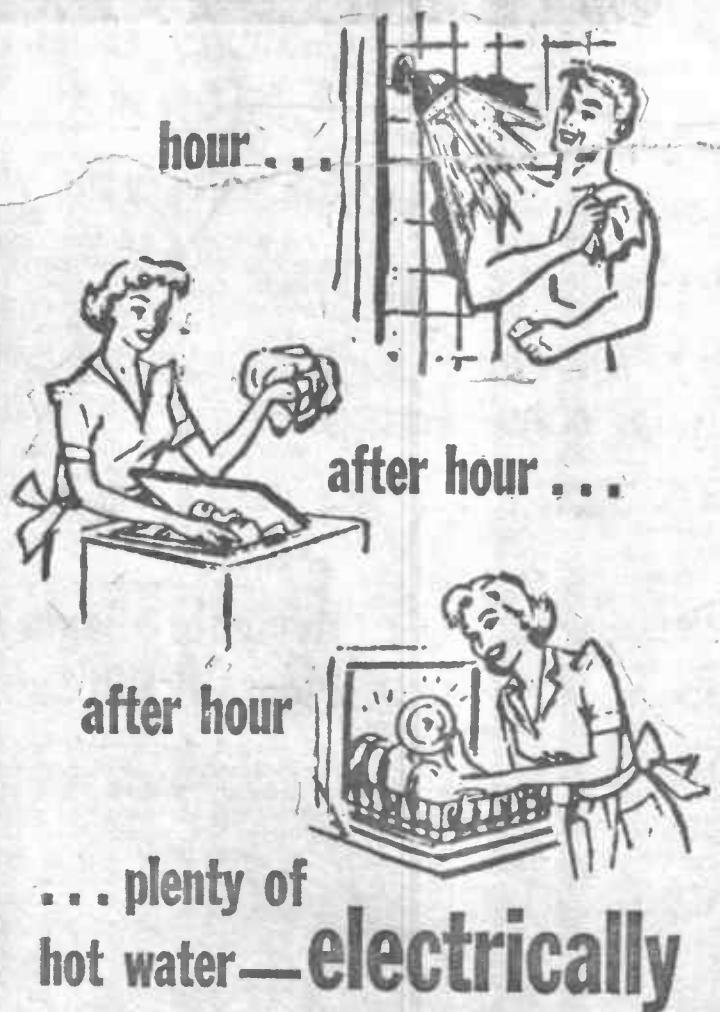

DR. CLARENCE F. CLARK: Pediatrician in the Japan Baptist Hospital, Kyoto, Japan. A native of Cleveland, Tennessee, educated in Vanderbilt University, Carson-Newman College, Jefferson City, Tenn.; M. D. degree, Bowman Gray School of Medicine, Winston-Salem, N. C. Appointed Southern Baptist missionary to Japan, 1953.

REV. AARON W. HANCOCK, Missionary to Choctaw Indians, Oklahoma. Educated in Government Indian Schools, Oklahoma Baptist University; appointed Home Missionary, 1927.

MRS. AARON W. HANCOCK, an Indian woman of great talent and charm, educated in the Indian government school near Shawnee, Oklahoma; appointed with her husband a Home missionary to her own people, 1927.

REV. ARCHIE DUNAWAY, evangelist-missionary to the Batonu tribe of Northern Nigeria, a predominately Moslem area. Appointed by Foreign Mission Board, 1947; he is a native of McComb, Mississippi. Educated in Mississippi College, and holds the Th. M. degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky.

REV. GUY GRAHAM, formerly pastor of churches in Tishomingo county, now pastor of Evergreen Baptist Church, outstanding for its rural church recognition among churches in Mississippi, and Associational Superintendent of Missions in Itawamba County.

REV. EARL WARFORD, Associational Superintendent of Missions, Alcorn County, formerly pastor of West Corinth Baptist Church, and also of churches in Tennessee, he is a popular preacher and missionary in Northeast Mississippi. Trained in Mississippi College and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

REV. LINCOLN D. NEWMAN, Cooperative Missions Department, Mississippi Baptist Convention Board, from Lucedale, Mississippi. Formerly, a skilled Electrical Construction worker, pastor of city Baptist churches in Birmingham, Gasden, and Anniston, Alabama, and chaplain of Birmingham Baptist Hospital. 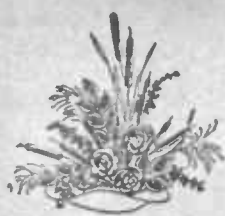

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL COLLAPSE DAY

Michigan, the state of Walter
Reuther and Governor G. Mennen
(Soapy) Williams, was saved this

winter by a group of public-spirited businessmen. The story of how they saved their state from ruin received little display in the nation's press. And yet it is one of the most startling and significant stories of recent years.

On February 15th, the State of Michigan was dead broke. There was a \$110 million deficit. The state has been unable to make payments to Michigan's universities since last November. The universities had been borrowing from banks in order to pay professors and keep the buildings heated and illuminated.

The people of Michigan looked forward to February 15th, using the term 'Collapse Day.' Fortunately, free enterprise came to the rescue. Manufacturing concerns in Michigan handed over to the state government more than \$35 million in taxes from two to four months ahead of their due date. With this cash in the state treasury, Michigan was able to pay some of its bills.

This was an experience that should have given pause even to such wild-eyed liberals as Reuther and Governor Williams. Certainly, it should have shocked the taxpayers of Michigan. With Michigan finances in shambles and the state deeply in the red, the public should have demanded strict austerity. There hasn't been any such demand, however. And Reuther and Governor Williams, like the Bourbon kings of France, apparently have forgotten nothing and learned nothing.

Instead of urging retrenchment and a return to financial sanity, Governor Williams has proposed a constitutional amendment referendum to raise from \$250,000 to \$50 million the amount the state can borrow without express vote of the people. He also has suggested that a veterans' trust fund of \$50 million be made available for collateral. Furthermore, he has proposed heavier taxes on the element that saved the state—the private business firms. He has not proposed cutting public spending at all.

Persisting in this sort of folly, Michigan undoubtedly will face another collapse day. This time the businessmen of the state may not rush to the rescue. A great state may grind to a halt. No one wants a thing like that to happen. Innocent people would suffer. But collapse day, if it comes, would be a warning to all Americans that government cannot borrow and spend its way out of hard times.

What Michigan needs—and the many other states that are attempting to live high on the hog—is drastic cutting of expenditures. For people who have come to expect the soft life to be provided by government, a policy of austerity would be a rough experience. But the only alternatives to austerity in a spendthrift nation are either bankruptcy or dictatorship. The nation of France chose both austerity and dictatorship. Is that what we want here?

Virtually every sort of governmental body in this country has become accustomed to wastrel ways. Millions of Americans expect government aid for everything from sewers to school lunches. Those Americans who expect to live on handouts, must expect to obey the agency that distributes the dole. If state governments live beyond their income, they must expect to lose all authority.

The entire country needs to be told the facts such as they have been revealed in Michigan. Americans must make themselves stand and look at the grim scenes of financial irresponsibility. The "liberals" never run out of promises. But the taxpayers run out of money, and so do the state governments that operate on the basis of free-spending promises. The welfare state of the "liberals" is the twilight before collapse day.

Another lesson in the "spending" philosophy is taking place before our eyes in New York State. Governor Rockefeller is proposing a budget \$240 million higher than the last one, even though a \$424 million deficit is in prospect. He proposes to cover \$277 million of this with new taxes. "Spend and spend, tax and tax, elect and elect."

through the Town of Maben, Mississippi, has been completed with more than 5,000 seedlings and shrubs having been set out. More than 5,000 pine seedlings alone were used at intervals and at desirable places along the highway right of way. Also Crabapple, Magnolia, Phytocaulis and Crepe Myrtle Shrubs were placed at intervals and properly spaced with the pine seedlings. This was a project under the Hometown Development Program.

A State Cow Sets Production Record

Mississippians take pride in the fact that a Monroe County cow has just established a new record in milk production. The new champ is five years old. This registered Holstein was milked twice daily for 328 days. She produced a total of 15,819 pounds of milk and 493 pounds of butterfat during the period according to official records kept. This top honor is further evidence of Mississippi's rapid progress in dairying and milk production, symbolizing the high quality of animals being raised in our state.

State And South Facing A Golden Opportunity for Future Progress

As a strategic hub of the dynamic, forward-minded South, Mississippi is sharing and will share increasingly in the phenomenal economic progress which is causing Dixie to be universally recognized as America's most promising area. Many of the nation's business and industrial leaders predict that the South's economy will top the entire country which make the region well suited for economic development.

Warm Weather Helps Grazing Crops in State

Winter grazing crops have made good growth throughout the State as fairly dry, warm weather moved across the state. Many fields are now dry enough to graze and farmers are turning stock into small grains, ryegrass and clovers. Small grains are being nitrated, and plowing and stalk cutting also is under way.

Booming Broiler Business

Reports of prospective new processing plants for Mississippi broilers focus attention again upon the tremendous growth of the industry in Mississippi during recent years. From a standing start a few years ago, about 90 million chicks were placed in broiler units in the State last year. Placements of chicks in 1958 were approximately 20 million above 1957 in the State.

Delta Has Satellite Station

The wraps were taken off a secret satellite tracking station 10 miles from Hollandale in February for members of the press and a group of leading citizens. The station was built at a cost of about \$500,000 for the U. S. Navy for tracking satellites—friend or foe. It is part of a network of surveillance stations located at strategic points across the extreme southern portion of the United States.

Cotton Farmers May Underplant '59 Allotments

Signs that Mississippi cotton farmers could possibly underplant their 1959 cotton acreage allotments to the tune of 200,000 acres have a state cotton advisory committee scratching their collective heads to see what can be done about it.

The estimate of 200,000 unplanted acres from the '59 state allotment is conservative, agricultural leaders say, and with the cotton income rounded off at approximately \$133 per acre, this oversight, or underplant, could easily cost the state's economy at least \$27 million this year.

The advisory committee studying this problem and seeking steps to lessen it consists of representatives of the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation, the Extension Service, the Vocational Education department, Mississippi Federated Cooperatives, the Farmers Home Administration, state agricultural department, Mississippi Chemical Corporation and others.

The group, meeting in Jackson Tuesday, decided to alert the public to the situation in each county of the state. Through local publicity and action they plan to make available through county committees facts on local county cotton acreage allotments and urge farmers to consult their county ASC offices for specific information relating to individual farms.

It has been pointed out that because of the impending "underplant", it will be possible in a number of counties where there is a reservoir of underplanted acres released for others to use, that farmers may be able to secure additional acres.

The advisory group feels that timely and unselfish coordination of crop plans during the next few weeks can mean even more than \$27 million to the state's 1959 income.

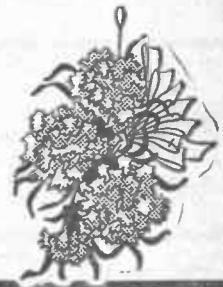

Time To Quit ?

Agriculture Secretary Benson has told Congress he is ready to toss in the towel and give up the battle to support farm prices and control production.
"You must admit," he told the Senate Agriculture Committee, "that our attempts at price fixing have failed, and that attempts to

control production have failed."

"Why," he asked, "continue a program that is bankrupt?" He says farm programs this year will cost taxpayers almost \$7.5 billion and that all the country has to show for that is "artificially high" prices and \$9 billion worth of excess farm crops in government storage.

The way to correct the situation, he contends, is to let farm prices seek their law of supply and demand level. It doesn't make sense, he says, to pay farmers to produce for the government.
Kill Or Cure

It is bitter medicine that Benson is prescribing for farmers. It is the kind of blunt talk that few farmers ever expected to hear from a Secretary of Agriculture.
Benson told Congress that if it will give him a free hand he will start slashing price supports to the point where production will move into use rather than into storage, the cost of which is almost a billion dollars a year.
High price supports, Benson says, are the cause of excessive production. Lower prices, he argues, would cause some farmers to quit farming and others to reduce their production. Food prices, too, would go down.
Congressmen who are opposing his proposals argue that their adoption would bankrupt at least a million farm families and drive them penniless into cities where already there are almost 5 million unemployed.

A Difference of Opinion
Not everyone, and that probably includes a majority of Congress, agrees with Secretary Benson. They point out that in the past six years prices received by farmers have declined an average of 20 per cent and that farm income had declined by one-third.
Those who disagree with him cite USDA figures to show that the average of farm income is less than half of that of the average factory worker, and that the average city worker can buy 50 per cent more food now with pay for an hour's work than he could in 1940.
They also use USDA figures to show that only a fraction of the \$7.5 billion in "farm program costs" actually is received by farmers. A third of that cost goes for export of food and fibers to friendly nations who are helping us fight communism.

Another third of it is spent for such things as school lunches, distribution of food to needy people in cities, forest preservation, meat inspection, soil conservation, and salaries of some 80,000 USDA employees.
If farm prices had gone up (instead of going down 20 per cent) by as much as the cost of things farmers buy since 1952 U. S. consumers would be paying at least \$10 billion a year more for their food and clothing.

It is this difference of opinion that makes the Washington farm battle one of the liveliest in many years.

Roadblocks Placed Over State

Put In Effect By 'Get Tough' Policy State Hwy. Patrol

The Mississippi Highway Patrol has ordered massive roadblocks placed throughout the state this week to check driver licenses and auto headlights.

The roadblocks, which went up at 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 3, extend "from the Tennessee border to the Gulf of Mexico," according to Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough. He said as many as "15 to 20" Highway Patrolmen may be used on some of the check points, and warned that traffic tickets will be written for improper equipment and driver license violations found by officers.

Inspectors of the new Highway Patrol districts received orders Saturday to start planning roadblock schedules on highways through their districts.

They were instructed to periodically switch check point sites, covering all highways in their districts during the mass block operation.

As the Highway Patrol's allotted drive to curb highway accidents slips into second gear, Mississippi's 1959 traffic death count is 25 ahead of last year's corresponding period toll.

On Feb. 19 when Commissioner Scarbrough warned that radar "was back to stay" and would be used day and night, Mississippi's traffic death count was already 22 fatalities ahead of the corresponding 1958 figure. Even more startling, this increase, almost equal to the entire year end increase reported for 1958, had occurred in little more than one and one-half months.

The Patrol's "get tough" policy—or better yet, more driver awareness—has slowed this alarming upward trend, and the Patrol anticipates a downward trend as the effect of the present enforcement crackdown is felt.

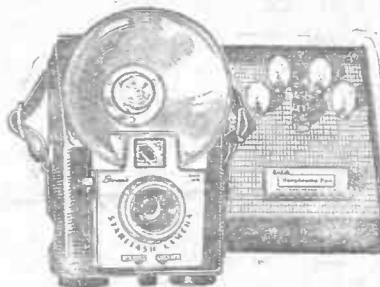

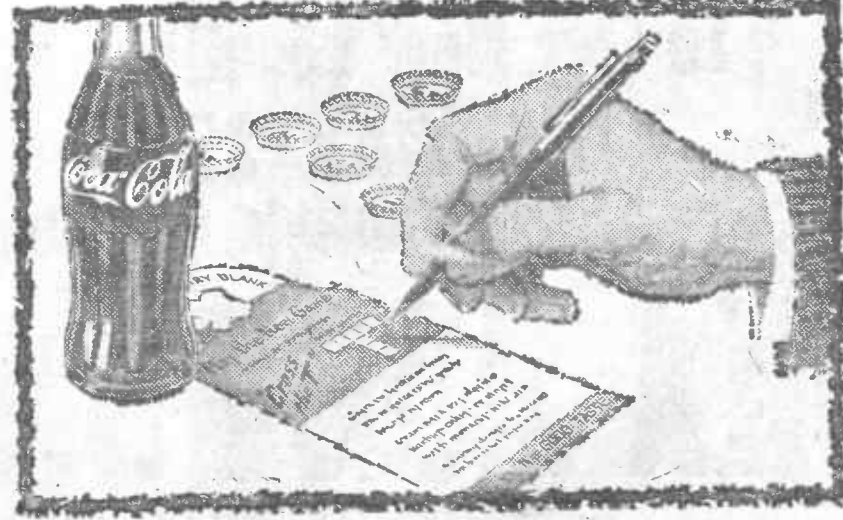

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Carbon monoxide (known chemically by the symbol, CO) is a gas which is colorless and tasteless, a person is exposed to it in a closed garage, and it is often found in the home, on the highway, in the garage, in the industrial plant—and any place where fuel-burning appliances are used, he said.

In describing the symptoms of CO poisoning, Dr. Blakey said mild doses of carbon monoxide may cause a headache, dizziness, sleepiness. Heavier doses cause more alarming symptoms: shortness of breath, nausea, vomiting, fluttering and throbbing of the heart—and, finally, unconsciousness and possibly death. These symptoms especially the milder ones, may simulate other illnesses common during winter months such as influenza. Heavier doses may simulate food poisoning or other diseases.

A person slightly affected by carbon monoxide usually recovers without serious consequences. But if the victim has remained unconscious in the poisoned air for some time, the after-effects may be lasting, resulting in permanent brain damage.

Poisoning from carbon monoxide

Dr. Blakey said that using the oven of the gas range for heating the house is another frequent cause of mild poisoning.

When a person starts a car in a closed garage and lingers there while the motor warms, he is inviting disaster, according to the public health specialist.

To prevent poisoning, Dr. Blakey stressed the importance of connecting all heating stoves, space heaters and water heaters to the outside by using adequate vent pipes. Proper maintenance of these vents is essential also to keep them from becoming clogged.

"When driving a car, a partially-open window is a safeguard against poisoning, but may well be inadequate," said the preventable disease control director.

The exhaust system in cars should be checked frequently, stated Dr. Blakey. "While the life of such equipment is generally long, today's low-slung cars may frequently drag the muffler or tail pipe. This could result in damage and leakage. Too, gaskets and connections do wear out and manifolds become loose. The car floor may have, or develop, holes in the metal. Floor coverings may wear through to other gaps and, with leakage of the exhaust system, combine to introduce carbon monoxide to the

As to safety from carbon monoxide poisoning in public buildings, Dr. Blakey stated that the local health department provides consultative and advisory services in the planning and construction of such buildings as schools, motels, hotels, and nursing homes in order to enable them to meet safety, as well as sanitary, standards. In addition, compliance inspection of public buildings at periodic intervals is a required health department function.

When home owners or renters are in doubt as to the safety of home heating equipment, a qualified serviceman should be called in, advised Dr. Blakey. The local health department can lend assistance in locating firms or individuals specializing in the necessary services.

March is a big gardening month. Be sure your rows are ready—all worked and fertilized... for planting as soon as the time arrives. The list of vegetables for planting gets longer and longer as we get into march and April.

When you figure frost is gone and it's time to set your tomato, pepper and other plants, get them off to a good start with a starter solution. Make it by mixing 1 lb. of 5-10-5 fertilizer in 5 gallons of water. Keep the solution stirred. Use 1 cupful around each plant as you set it.

Did you ever try soaking your okra seed in warm water before planting? Soak for 24 hours.

Powerful American Bar Association Directs Criticism At Supreme Court

Fourth Time In Less Than Year
That Warren Court Has Come Under
Fire From Prominent Sources

The country was heartened recently over press reports emanating from Chicago that told of criticism directed at the Supreme Court by the powerful American Bar Association. Being a dignified and temperate organization, the Association did not directly blast the high justices but strongly denounced many of their decisions and cited them as exhibits of misuse of judicial power.

The report had the effect of a gain bringing the Court under public fire. It is quite significant that never before in its long history has the Association expressed alarm over such an abundance of the Court's decisions and at the same time publicly called upon the Congress to mend the breakage. It caused a stir and the Association undoubtedly knew what it was doing.

This makes for the fourth time in less than a year that the Warren Court has come under fire from prominent sources. Last August the Conference of State Court Chief Justices outdid the Bar Association by not confining their attack to the decisions but by striking at the source—the court itself. They said the Supreme Court has too often adopted "the rule of policy-maker without proper judicial restraint"—just a dignified way of charging the Court with operating outside of its bailiwick.

Then last spring the Senate Intelligence Committee should go along with the plentiful pork supplies we have right now.

Lard goes farther in baked foods. Since it has a greater shortening power than either vegetable shortening or table fats, you can use 7/8 cup of lard to replace a full cup of vegetable fat or table shortening for baking.

The quality of lard has improved with modern processing methods. The word "hydrogenated" on the label means the melting point has been reduced so you can keep it at room temperature without the lard melting. A substance has also been added to keep it from becoming rancid in a reasonable length of time.

Fluorescent Lighting
If you are considering fluorescent tubes for lighting your home, here are a few facts that will help you make the correct decision:

- Fixtures using fluorescent tubes cost more to keep and install.
- You get more light for the money you pay for electricity.
- Fluorescent tubes do not produce as much heat.
- The tube does not last as long when it is turned on and off often. It is better to leave the tube on.
- Less glare makes this light more comfortable.
- Some tubes are slow in starting. There are "rapid start" and "instant start" tubes fixtures on the market.
- The long tube gives better light distribution in a room.
- Fluorescent tubes last a long time.

Most tubes require extra equipment such as starters and ballasts with which the homemakers are not familiar. You must learn how to replace tubes and starters. It would be too expensive to call in an electrician to do this. You must use caution in selecting the color of the tube. "Homeline" is the color usually recommended for use in the home.

ternal Security Committee blasted members of the communists and criminals". In the House of Representatives last summer, the Court was criticized time and again during debate on the so-called Smith Bill which subsequently passed the House by a slam-bang majority of almost 100 votes.

Following the "Black Monday" decision of 1954, Vice President Nixon attempted to make hay for his party by publicly noting that the decision was rendered by a "Republican led" Court, referring of course to Chief Justice Warren. Since that day the Court's line of decisions, its policies, and usurpation of power have made it so unpopular that the leading Republican candidate to succeed Eisenhower is most careful not to further compliment the Court or his fellow Californian. And who would blame him? After all, Dick Nixon is no novice in politics.

The high Chief Justice proved himself to be a man of small stature when he resigned in a huff from the American Bar Association after having been a member most of his mature life. There were no audible words of regret from the Association. The absolute dead silence seemed to boom back "good riddance!" It's too bad the piqued one did not go all the way and resign from the Court. In no other manner could he make himself more universally popular.

The current wave of criticism has been of encouragement to Members of Congress who are fighting for court reforms. Until now, the Executive branch of the government has put its potent influence against reform legislation. With evidence of a rift between Eisenhower and Warren, even though denied, the President and his Attorney General may yet come forward and provide the support needed to put the legislation over.

There is no doubt of the fact that the high Court is taking note of this wave of criticism. Warren's designation from the Bar Association proves it. Like all of us, the high justices are themselves human. They are not sacrosanct. They are not infallible. They are not insensitive to public opinion. The fact that our founding fathers left the way open to their impeachment solidly fortifies the argument that it was never intended for them to be held above criticism.

Criticism is the most powerful weapon reserved to the people in a constitutional democracy. To remove it leads to dictatorship. So whether it be against the President, the Congress, or any other servant of the people, let it continue where justified even against the highest Court in the land.
