Savings Bond Goal Is \$124,000

\$40,454 Purchased By Citizens In January And February

Mr. R. A. McRee, Jr., Chairman of the Tishomingo County Savings Bonds Committee, gives first report for 1959, and announced that the 1959 Savings Bonds Goal for the County will be \$124,000.

"During the months of January and February, the people of this county purchased \$40,454 in Series E and H Bonds which was 32.62 per cent of our 1959 Goal," he said.

The 1959 Goal for Mississippi is \$23,000,000. Sales during January and February totaled \$4,314,534.95, which represents 18.76 per cent of the 1959 Sales Goal.

"A part of every American's Savings Bonds, to provide for his future and to add strength to the National economy," stated Mr. McRee, County Chairman.

Farmers Deny Security To Their Families

By Failure To File Social Security Tax Returns

Many Tishomingo County farmers are denying their families future social security benefits because of their failure to file social security tax returns. This statement was made by Hugh Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo Social Security District Office, today.

Farmers who have a net income of \$400 or more must file federal income tax returns by April 15th. Social Security taxes must be paid along with any income taxes which may be due.

Late income tax returns may be filed or assessed at any time. However, there is a time limit during which social security credits may be established. For example, returns filed after April 15, 1959, cannot be used to establish social security credits for years before 1956 if the taxpayer uses the normal calendar year method of record keeping.

Mr. Tigrett suggests that those self-employed farmers who have failed to file proper returns do so at once. Failure to do this could result in a substantial loss of benefits. Filing of returns and payment of taxes come under jurisdiction of the Internal Revenue Service and tax returns as well as remittances should be mailed to that office.

A representative of the Social Security Administration visits the Court House in Iuka every Monday afternoon. For more information farmers are requested to contact this representative.

13% Increase In Iuka Business

Iuka Has 244% Increase Over 1947-49 Average

The monthly publication of the Business Research Station at Mississippi State University showed that activity in the Corinth district varied from a 13 per cent increase at Iuka to a 6 per cent increase at Booneville.

General business activity in the district during January showed a 12 per cent increase over the corresponding period of 1958, according to the recent issue of "The Mississippi Business Review."

Corinth showed a 12 per cent increase and Ripley had a 9 per cent increase.

The district as a whole stood at 194 per cent of the 1947-49 average recorded on the station's index. By the same standard Corinth stood at 184 per cent; Booneville, 310 per cent; Iuka, 244 per cent; and Ripley, 194 per cent.

District one, \$900; district two, \$66; district three, \$28; district four, \$200, \$60-50 of this amount was contributed by the Carter's Branch (colored) school, under the supervision of J. Y. Trice. This amount represented 100% of enrollment; district five, \$525. This is an incomplete report and collections will be taken until April 1, at which time a complete report will be given.

Lions Will Furnish Mail Boxes & Nos.

All Homes Must Have Numbers And Boxes To Get Free Delivery

As a community project, the Iuka Lions Club has assumed the responsibility of handling house numbers and mail boxes for residences in the town. All houses must be numbered and have mail boxes installed by July 11, when city mail delivery will become a reality in the city of Iuka.

Anyone wishing to have his mail delivered at home will be able to purchase his house numbers and mail box from the Lions Club, the cost to be determined by the grade of boxes wanted. The minimum price of boxes and numbers will not exceed \$1.50 for both. It is not compulsory that a person use this particular grade of box. 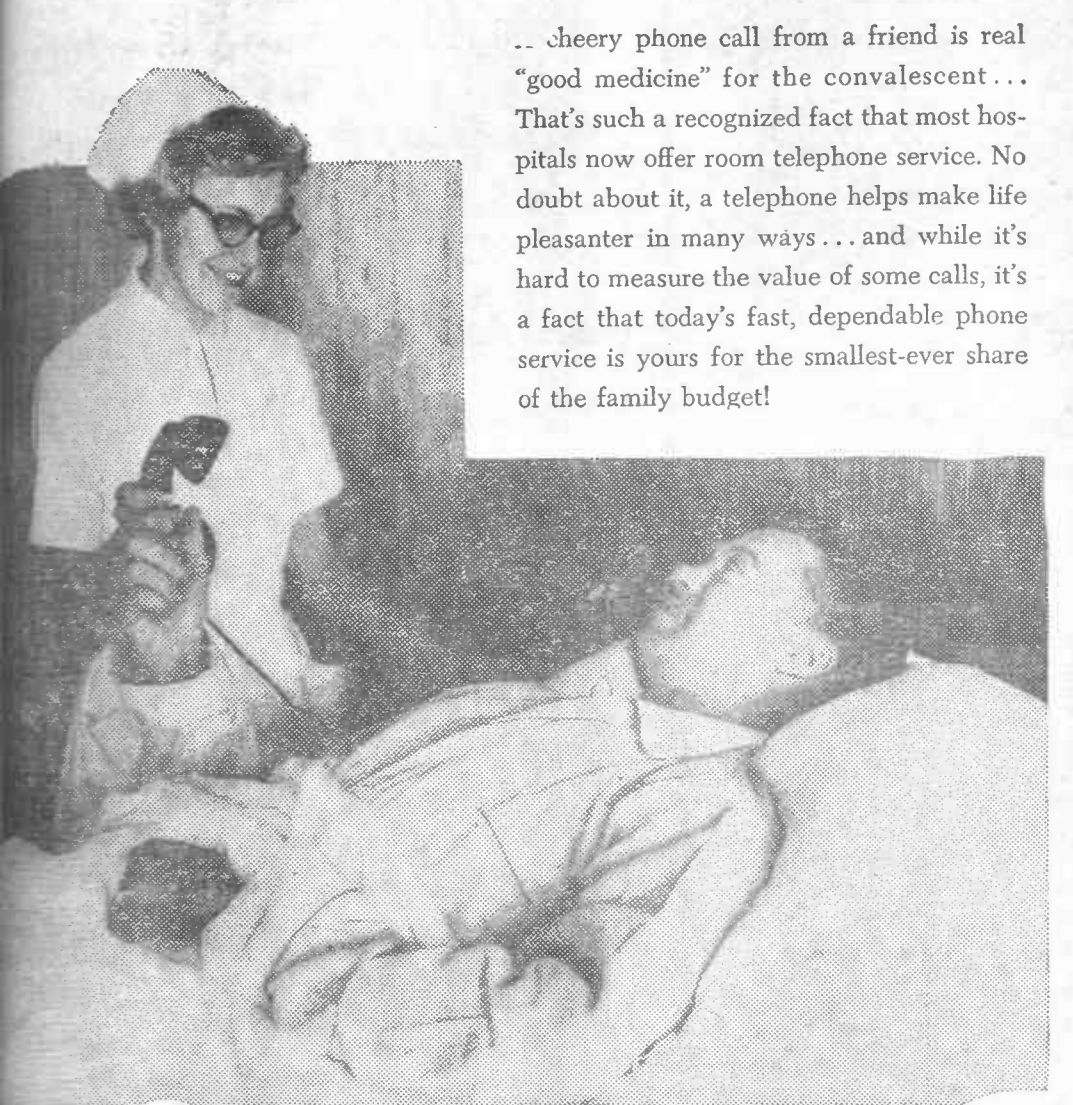

County Agent news

Spraying Pastures

One of the best jobs you can do on permanent pastures is to spray them for weed control. This is a job on which you don't have to wait. On pastures where crimson clover, red clover or vetch are not growing, you can begin now spraying for bitter weed control. On pastures where these clovers and legumes are growing, wait until they are mature before spraying.

One pound of amine 2,4-D in 10 to 20 gallons of water per acre, sprayed solid over the pasture will help control bitter weeds, goat weeds and many other weeds that come up in the spring. You can safely spray with amine 2,4-D until cotton comes up.

Two of the hardest weeds to kill are cypress and mayweed. For mayweed it will take a pound and a half of 2,4,5-T sprayed in April or May.

For cypress weed you will need two and a half pounds of 2,4-D sprayed in May or June, or as soon as the plants come up and begin growing well.

Remember, weed control is one of the most valuable practices you can try out on your pasture this year.

Home Gardening

This is a big planting month in your home garden. You can make a garden mean a lot or a little to you—it just depends on what you plant, when you plant and how you plant.

Here are a few tips toward better gardening: Use a starter solution around plants when setting. You can make a starter solution by mixing one pound of 5-10-5 or similar fertilizer in 5 gallons of water. Keep this mixture stirred and use a cupful of it around each plant.

Do you sometimes think your okra seed is slow to come up? Then try this. Soak the okra seed in warm water for 24 hours before planting.

Electric Safety

When is the last time you checked your electric fence? Better give it a thorough check now.

Be sure to use an approved controller and use it correctly. Connect the controller only to the type of power source for which it was intended and use only one controller for a continuous fence.

Make sure that your electric fence is correctly set up and that everything is operating properly before. Remember a little time spent now, may save you a lot of time later on.

Application cards and instructional materials are available from Selective Service local boards. Men planning to take the test were advised by Colonel Patton to make early application at the nearest local board office for fuller information and necessary forms and materials.

Either the score made on the test or class standing may be used by local boards as guides in considering applications for student deferments. Thousands of students have been deferred since the testing program was begun in 1951. Colonel Patton urged every student to take the test if he believes the test score will aid the local board in determining his status. He pointed out that such information, like other information registrants are required to supply to local boards, is important to both the individual and the Nation. The Selective Service System long has been aware of the need to add to our trained manpower in all fields and has done something about it. The Colonel added, through such programs as that for student deferments in which the test score plays a part.

Stressing the fact that only one test will be offered, the State Director emphasized that men wishing to take the test must submit 1959 application cards for this year's test. Use of old application cards may result in students missing the April 30 test.

Applications for the test must be postmarked not later than midnight, Thursday, April 9, 1959. The test will be administered by the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, New Jersey.

Try A Sod-Based Rotation On Your Steep Cropland

A great many Tishomingo county farmers, through necessity, are cultivating in row-crops, land too steep for continuous cultivation.

When the term "Too steep for continuous cultivation," is used, it means this: If a person works such land in row crops continuously the topsoil and much of the subsoil will finally erode away. Because of this the land will get poorer and poorer.

The problem is how can we use this kind of land, usually Class IV land, for row crops and slow down this loss of topsoil and subsoil. The Soil Conservation Service

has worked on this problem and recommended that such land should be worked in row crops not more than once in every four years. During the other three years it should be used for sod crops.

This means that if a farmer sets up a grass based, or a sod based, rotation on 12 acres he could, under such a plan, cultivate in row crops three acres of this 12 acres every year. The following year he would plant this three acres he had cultivated back to grass, and plow up and cultivate a different three acres. By doing this he will have planted row crops on all the 12 acres every four years.

Is such a scheme practical? This will depend on the number of cultivated acres a man has. It will also depend on whether the farmer has much class II and class III land. These classes are less sloping and may be more desirable, in other ways for continuous row cropping. If a landowner should find that by following a sod of Pensacola Bahia grass and Kobe lespedeza with corn or cotton that he made twice the yield, or that he made as much on three acres as he had been producing on six acres, and that the hay he harvested from the nine acres was equal in value to the row crops he produced on the other acres he could afford to do this.

On the above basis he could afford from the economic standpoint to establish a grass based rotation because, he is breaking even so far as money is concerned. In addition to this he would gain much because he is conserving and enriching his topsoil. A farmer may lose a little money during the first four years of such a rotation, but after that he should break even and actually begin to gain.

Why do I think he might gain after the first four years? Let us look at it this way. In the first place, if the land had been in continuous row crops all these years. In the second place, during this four years, the land has been protected by a sod three of these four years, and has been improved and made more productive while being protected from erosion.

Instead of the land being "torn

down" all the time it is being built up three years out of every four. Top crops producing greater yields produce more litter and plant residue which helps conserve and enrich the soil.

It would be very wise for farmers who are now cultivating Class IV land to begin putting some of this land into a sod based rotation. If you are interested and would like to set up such a rotation come by your local soil conservation service office in Iuka and discuss this with your Work Unit Conservationist.

If you are interested we can get Mr. Travis R. Taylor, SCS agronomist, to come up and help us in

setting up and establishing such a rotation on your farm!

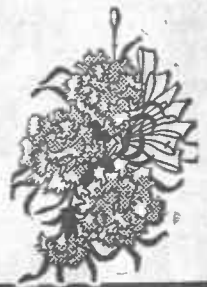
