In the presentation of his work in Japan he pointed out that though medical practice is highly developed in a technical way among the Japanese, the quality of individual care and love so important in the treatment of physical illness is significantly lacking. Especially is it true, says Dr. Clark, in the care of premature babies. These helpless little creatures are looked upon suspiciously as being from evil gods who have become angered, and are therefore destroyed. The Japan Baptist Hospital is becoming famous in Japan for its handling of premature births, and often that concern on the part of the hospital staff has been an important factor in young parents' acceptance of the Christian religion. On Friday, March 20, In Power Ass'n. Offices In Iuka; TVA Leaders Attend

The first meeting of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority was held last Friday, March 20, in the offices of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association in Iuka. Organization of the Authority was completed and tentative plans were made for effecting purposes for which the Authority was created.

The Authority is headed by L. P. Allen, Jr., of Belmont, who is serving in the capacity of chairman. Other members of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority Board of Directors are William J. Pyle of Iuka, and James Walker of Alcorn County.

Adding significance to the meeting was the presence of TVA and

State dignitaries. Those from the Tennessee Valley Authority were A. J. Wagner, General Manager of TVA, Knoxville; Robert E. Lowery, executive secretary of TVA Watershed Program, Knoxville; Richard Kilbourne, Coordinator, TVA Tributary Watershed Program, Knoxville; and William Winter, Miss. State Tax Collector, Jackson.

The Yellow Creek Watershed Authority was created by special act of the Mississippi Legislature during its last session. Purpose of the Authority is development of the Yellow Creek area. This development will include all phases such as, agriculture, forestry, land reclamation, water use, citizenship, and industry. 127,000 acres will be involved in the development. seventy-five percent being situated in Tishomingo county and the remainder being in Alcorn and Prentiss counties. The Authority will be administered by the state in cooperation with TVA, that agency acting in an advisory capacity.

"The Yellow Creek Watershed Authority," Mr. Allen, the chairman, stated, "is a long-range program that will require the concentration of time and effort to bring about the desired result. It is a pilot project and as the program of development proceeds, conducted tours will be held to demonstrate the results of coordinated efforts. There are three other such projects in the TVA system two being in Tennessee and one in Alabama, in addition to our own." Possibly the first step of the Authority will be an agriculture and forestry survey. These should take place within the near future. An announcement will be made concerning these surveys, Mr. Allen said.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Pressure Canner Clinics

This, being the onset of the canning season, every homemaker should get her canning equipment ready for use. Has the gauge on your pressure canner been checked since the last canning season? A pressure canner, if properly cared for and used, is not a dangerous thing as some think, but if the gauge is not checked regularly, the safety valve cleaned after each use and instructions followed accurately during use, then they are dangerous. But, they are the only safe means of canning your non-acid vegetables and meats.

In order to assist the homemakers of Tishomingo County in a successful canning season, the Mississippi Extension Service is cooperating with Mrs. Roberta L. Warren, Home Demonstration Agent, in planning pressure canner clinics throughout the county. Any community desiring a pressure canner clinic call the home agent at Iuka, telephone number 2391 and a date and place will be set for your meeting.

If owners of pressure canners are working and cannot attend, send your cooker with your name on it to the designated places and your home agent will check it. If your gauge tests bad new gauges may be secured from your local distributor.

If you can bring your cooker in person do so as your home agent will demonstrate proper cleaning of safety valve and use of the cooker. If the meeting you plan to attend is scheduled for a morning hour bring a covered dish and work will continue until completed.

If you have a friend or neighbor with a pressure canner bring them with you.

4-H Gardeners Make Summer-Fresh Meals Possible Year Round

From a back yard garden to a full course dinner will be just a step for scores of 4-H Club members this summer. And next winter, a trip to the freezer will produce summer-fresh meals for the entire family to enjoy.

The reason for this handy conversion, reports the county Extension office, is that club members are learning how to grow the best vegetables and fruits, and how to freeze, cook and serve them.

Specifically, these boys and girls are carrying on projects in three national 4-H award programs: garden, frozen foods, and food preparation. Across the nation last year more than a million members were engaged in these projects. This year many more are expected to benefit from the expert guidance provided by the county and state Extension staff.

Through demonstration, exhibits at fairs, and all-round 4-H achievement, club members will compete for awards ranging from county medals to \$400 college scholarships. They are given annually by business firms which have supported the 4-H program for many years.

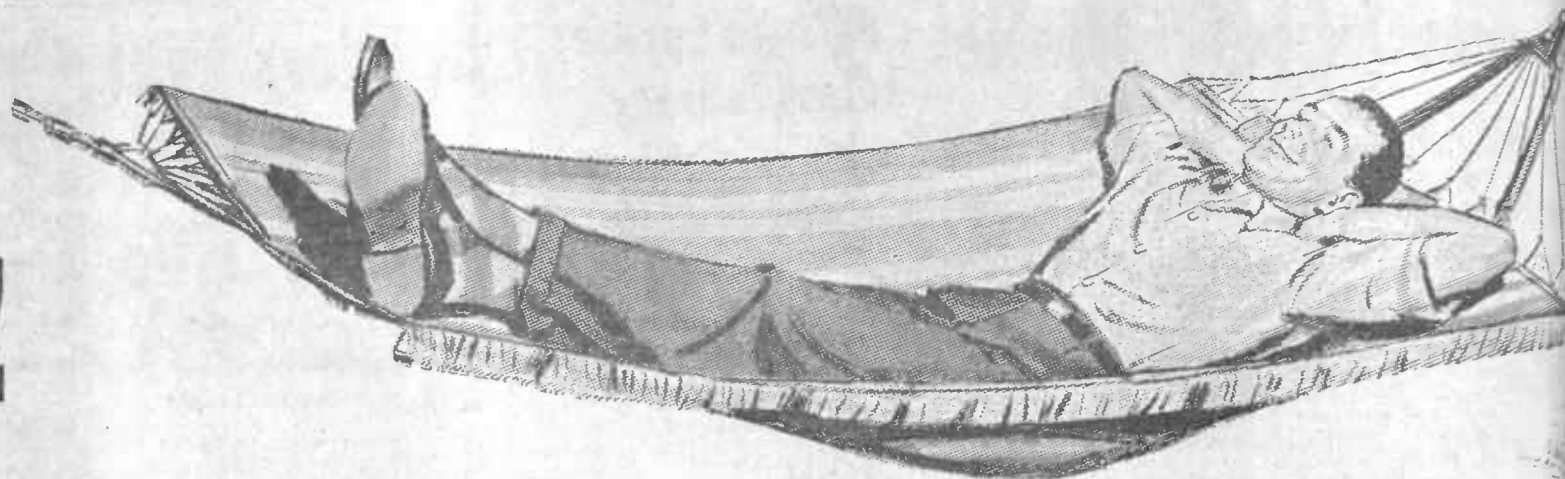
Donor of the garden awards is Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company; frozen foods, Whirlpool Corporation; food preparation, Betty Crocker of General Mills. In addition these firms cooperate with the Extension Service in supplementing project training material.

Perhaps the most sought after reward is the trip to the National 4-H Club Congress held in Chicago right after Thanksgiving. It is the top state award, and is open to 4-H club members over 14 years old who have satisfactorily completed three years of club work, according to the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work which arranges the award programs and the Club Congress.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL THEY SPEAK FOR AMERICA

Members of the legal profession are guardians of our fundamental rights and liberties. How they are protecting our rights and liberties is revealed in the report of the American Association's special committee on communist tactics, strategy, and objectives.

Let me tell you something about that report, which was developed at the association's mid-year meeting. The report is long and packed with terminology. But it is the great public documents of our time and every American ought to know that the American bar has spoken with authority concerning the threat of communism.

There is not one home in our country, "which is infected by communism in its very foundations." The international communist conspiracy, which has brought 900 million people under its control, is waging a campaign of propaganda, subversion, and destruction against our nation.

Our mistaken persons say, "Oh, there are only a handful of

communists in this country. They can't do anything!" The Bar Association report analyzes that fallacy: "It is just as false to measure the strength of communism in the United States by comparing the small number of party members with the large numbers of non-communists, as it would be to measure the seaworthiness of a ship by comparing the area of its holes with the area of its hull. A few strategically placed holes can sink the largest ship."

Those of us who fight a constant battle to preserve states rights, local independence and free enterprise know the truth of this statement in the report:

"The communists have had hundreds of fronts. In addition, they have fronts in front of the fronts. Making use of their fellow travelers and dupes, plus their united front tactic, the communists boast they can have 50,000 letters on any issue sent to Capitol Hill or the White House inside of 72 hours."

There is no doubt about the effectiveness of the communists, their fellow travelers and dupes in the battle for public opinion. Patriots often are stymied in their efforts on behalf of sound legislation by the fact that the leftwingers have literally dozens of organizations that can mount letter and telegram campaigns on the spur of the moment. Conservatives are drastically under-organized for the tasks they face.

One result of this lack of conservative organization is that Americans who work for a free economy or a strict interpretation of the U. S. Constitution are vilified by leftwingers. The American Bar Association report put it this way: "It is now an established fact that every institution, every force, and every person actively engaged in the forefront of the defense of our country against the rising menace of communism becomes the target of attack and vilification by communists, crypto-communists, fellow travelers, their stooges and innocent but beguiled persons."

Let me cite one example of this sort of thing. A special committee of the Tennessee Legislature has recently recommended that the charter of the Highlander Folk School at Monteagle, Tennessee, be revoked. The committee stated that the investigation it made, as authorized by the Legislature, showed that for many years this "school" has been holding seminars for radical, labor and race agitators, that persons with long records of association with communist fronts have attended this school and lectured under its auspices, that it is one of the centers of agitation in the South. It was quite proper, therefore, that its activities should have been probed, but the legislative committee charged with this important task has been subjected to the very sort of "attack and vilification" to which the Bar Association report refers.

The strongest reason for hoping that communism will lose out in the United States in the long run is the enlightened stand of the American Bar Association, representing 200,000 American lawyers. The association's special report has spelled out what the legal profession can and must do. I quote:

"Upon the bar of each nation primarily falls the duty to protect

and defend its constitutional form of government and courageously to lead and soundly to advise the peoples and their governments. By their very training and experience, none more than lawyers should be aware of the dangers and the menace of international communism and, therefore, none is more responsible for the protection of the free world."

With such advocates presenting the case for a free America, patriots can take heart and find hope for the future.

Parallel Terraces Makes Farming Easier

There are three major advantages to parallel terraces. They make planting, cultivation, and harvesting of row-crops easier; result in less damage to crops from turning machinery around in the field, and they save on equipment by eliminating sharp turns in field work.

Two Soil Conservation District Cooperators have constructed parallel terraces on their farms in

Tishomingo County. They are: Mr. Kenneth Mayhall and Mr. B. E. Wright of Belmont, Miss.

What are parallel terraces? They are terraces that are laid off, exactly the same distance from each other from one end to the other. There are no short rows between them.

Parallel terrace systems cost a little more to build, and they are harder to survey out. There are high places to cut down and low places to fill, but when properly

established parallel terraces makes row crop farming faster and easier.

There are not many fields in Tishomingo County that are suitable for establishing a system of parallel terraces. Fields that are suitable, are ones having gentle slopes of approximately uniform grade.

If you have a field that you think is suitable for parallel terraces properly established on your farm you will really like them.



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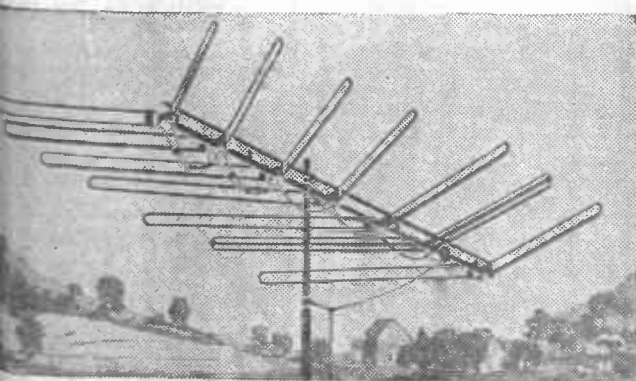

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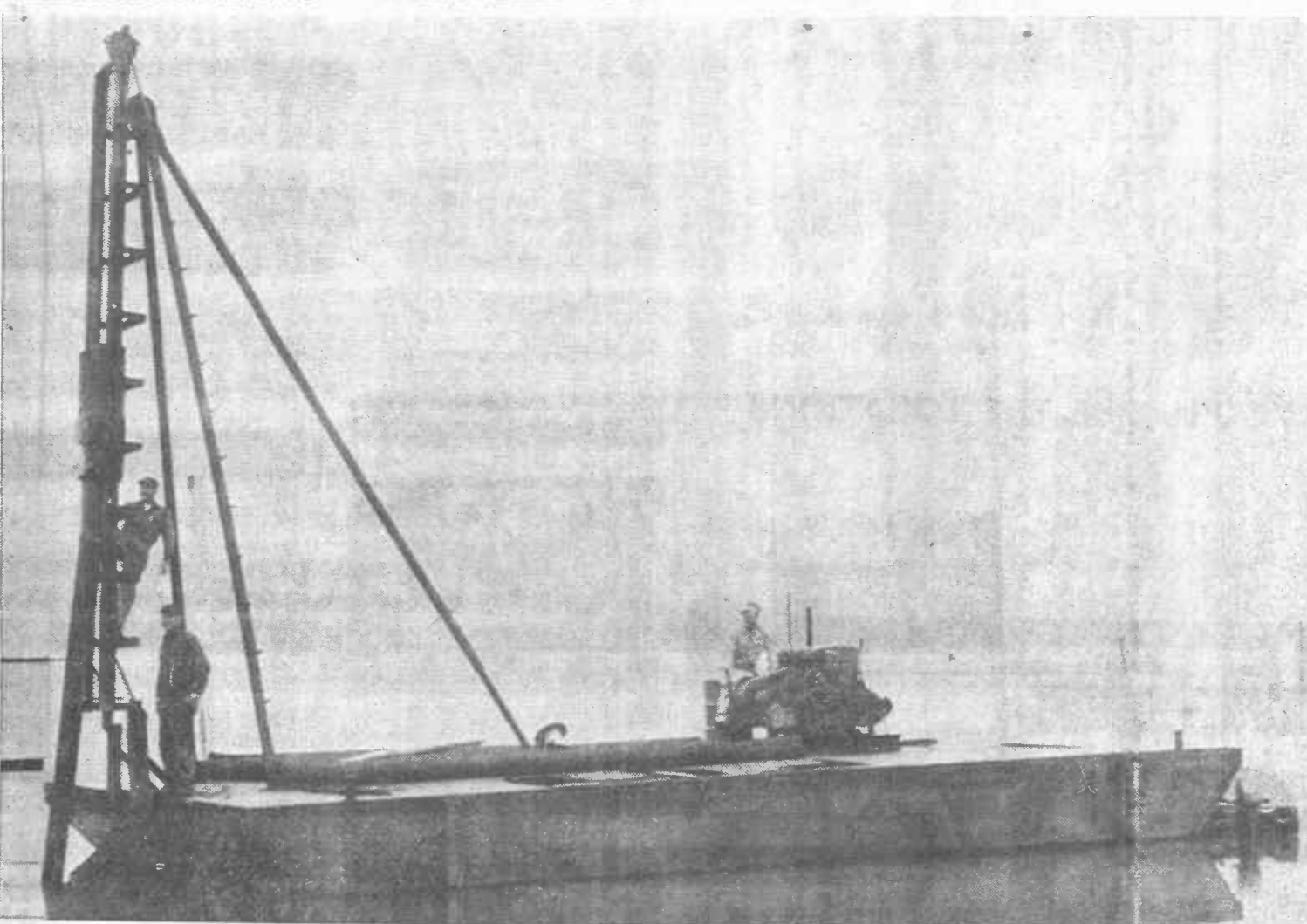

Nurses In Mississippi has a Major Part In Progress Of Mississippi

Nurses in Mississippi and throughout the nation are making every effort to provide the best possible nursing care wherever it is required. Thus, a major objective of Nurse Appreciation Week spot-lights this all-important profession. It also stresses the value of the education a nurse receives, whether she intends to make nursing a career or decides a nurse's education prepares her for a bright and promising future. Without question, Nurse Appreciation Week in March has a special significance to the people of Mississippi in terms of better health and medical progress. **Clean Highways Good**
Advertising For Entire State
Arrival of the 1959 tourist season and the generally increased travel on our highways is giving new emphasis to the importance of neat, attractive roadways in Mississippi. Various communities are doing excellent work in the matter of promoting roadside beautification at the local level. Unsightly litter not only tends to disgust tourists and visitors but it can also hamper the industrial development so vital to Mississippi's future. Clean roadsides are pleasing to the eye, giving visitors the impression that our

people have pride and that our communities are good places in which to live, do business, and raise families.

Old Capitol Taking New Lease On Life

Mississippi's Old Capitol, commanding the city from atop LeFleur's Bluff for the last 126 years, soon will be a museum depicting the state's often-turbulent, often-sentimental history. Work has been underway less than a month. Renovation includes strengthening the building structurally, replacing the worn copper dome with copper sheathing, replacing worn brick and crumbling stone, and restoring the interior to the original splendor that brought an extra surge of pride into every Mississippian's heart.

State Farmers Break Land For Planting

Mississippi Farmers have taken full advantage of favorable weather to break land and prepare for planting the 1959 crops. Farmers are having their soil sampled and are buying seed and fertilizer. The favorable weather helps pastures to grow and fruit trees to bloom. Vegetable crops are growing faster. A few acres of early corn have been planted.

Better Balance In Farming

Mississippi is developing a more diversified agriculture. Dairying, cattle-raising, and poultry production is becoming increasingly important enterprises in the state's agriculture. Farm cash receipts from the sale of livestock and live-

stock products during the last nine months of 1958 totaled \$172,200,000. This better balance of farm enterprises gives added insurance and greater protection of farm income against crop failure and market disaster.

Variety Of Interesting Spots In Port Gibson

Midpoint between Vicksburg and Natchez, on scenic U. S. 61, Port Gibson exemplifies the dignity and charm of the Old South. Preserved there are many fine old homes built in early years of the 19th Century. Port Gibson today is a placid community of oak-lined streets, stately mansions and neat modern cottages. The visitor to Port Gibson is attracted to a variety of interesting spots.

Second Simpson Oil Field Seems Assured

The second oil field for Simpson county appears near with a wildcat flowing 217 barrels of oil per day from a deep sand at 12,458-82 feet. The new discovery is located approximately six miles southwest of Mendenhall and flows oil of 37 gravity from a Mooring's sand. It is reported that operators plan to continue tests in the Paluxy zone at an interval from 11,238 to 12,186 feet where a number of sands indicate possible commercial production. If commercial production is assured in any of these sands, the well will be completed as a dual producer.

State Has Oldest U. S. Oil Mill

Second-hand barrels were used to ship cottonseed oil—seed brought \$12 a ton at the mill—and \$4,650 would equip an oil mill back in 1882 when six Mississippians built at Port Gibson what is today the oldest (but now the most modern) crushing mill operating today. The Mississippi mill, which now uses a most modern solvent extraction method, has been running every season for three-quarters of a century. The first real commercial cotton oil mill operation on any scale in the U. S. was in Natchez in 1834; however, the Natchez mill is gone as are other mills that started about the same time.

Complete Line of Piston Rings Made At Hernando

The only manufacturer in the South making a complete line of piston rings is now in production at Hernando, Mississippi. Housed in a modern brick, concrete and steel building, and plant is located on old Highway 51 north of town. The annual payroll is approximately \$150,000. Designs, patterns and tools used in production are made right in the plant.

Certain State Crops Fared Well In 1958

The State's 1958 corn crop was estimated at 44,569,000 bushels—18 per cent above 1957. The largest crop of soybeans, 18,400,000 bushels, was harvested in Mississippi in 1958. Previous record of 11,894,000 bushels was harvested in 1955. The rice crop in Mississippi was estimated at 1,092,000 bags, which is 10 per cent above last year and the 1947-56 average. Pecan production in 1958 was estimated at 1,092,000 bags, which is 10 per cent above last year and the 1947-56 average pecan production in 1958 was estimated at 14,000,000 pounds compared with 7,700,000 pounds in 1957.

County Agent news

Bulk Milk Tanks

There has been a great deal of talk lately about bulk milk tanks. I am outlining here some advantages and disadvantages for dairymen to consider before making any change from present operations. Advantages of bulk tanks: (1) Drudgery of handling cans is eliminated. (2) Labor requirements reduced. (3) Milk is sold at the farm. (4) You can check tests and weights on your farm. (5) Losses of weight and butterfat may be reduced. (6) A price premium may be received. (7) Milk is cooled quickly which should result in lower bacteria count and higher quality. (8) Closer attention will be given milk quality. Some of the disadvantages are: (1) High cost of equipment. (2) All weather driveways are needed as bulk tank trucks are much heavier than other types. (3) Remodeling and rewiring milk houses may be necessary. (4) Thorough cleanliness and cleaning a must. (5) Failure to pay close attention to milk quality will result in loss of entire tank of milk instead of only a can.

Or-hard Insect Control

Now is the time to spray or dust your fruit trees if you expect quality fruit at maturing time. If spray is desired you can use a mixture of Methoxychlor and Captan. Begin spraying when 3/4 of the bloom petals have fallen and sprays every two weeks for six applications. If dusting I suggest using either 3 per cent Malathion and 40 per cent Sulphur preparation or 20 per cent toxaphene. The same dusting schedule is followed as that of spraying.

Forest Fires

Here are some suggestions to help cut down on forest fires: (1) Be prepared to control any fire that you start. (2) Have adequate help on hand. (3) If burning has to be done, burn near the end of the day when there is no wind. (4) Advise the local area ranger when you intend to burn.

The scrap book program is a part of the publicity program of Public Relations for the Woman's Society which calls for the collecting and saving of clippings and such things as programs, favors, and pictures related to society meetings, social functions, and service activities. It serves to promote interest in the work and provides an excellent way for keeping valuable information and material.

Public Relations in the Methodist organization seeks to give a continuous interpretation of the woman's work. It reaches into all phases of the work and is promoted through good programs, attractive meeting places and friendly activities such as visits, courtesy notes and telephone calls. And through publicity the story of the work is shared with others. Warning Issued Against Illegal Termite Operators

Home owners should be on the watch for illegal termite control operators with the signs of spring and warmer weather.

This is the warning issued this week by Dr. Ross Hutchins, Entomologist and Executive Officer of the State Plant Board located at Mississippi State University. Citing a recent arrest in Pearl River County, Dr. Hutchins said that fake operators who have not been licensed by the State Plant Board will prey upon home owners this spring when the termites begin to swarm.

A man arrested in Pearl River County had taken \$177.26 from an elderly lady in 1957 claiming that her house needed treating for termites. Under the guise of a government inspector, he said that he had been sent to exterminate the termites.

"This is not an uncommon practice in Mississippi, although the majority of the victims never advise the State Board because they are ashamed," Dr. Hutchins said.

R. P. Colmer, Chief Inspector for the State Plant Board, estimated the several dozen complaints are

received each year; but by the time the Board is notified, the fake exterminators are out of the country.

Dr. Hutchins advised home owners, in case they think they have termites, to get three competitive bids from termite control companies that are licensed by the State Plant Board. "No house is so bad that it will fall tomorrow," he said.

The unlicensed termite control men seem to prey upon elderly people, saying that their house is badly damaged and for a nominal fee the termites can be exterminated. This "nominal" fee usually turns out to be several hundred dollars.

The State Plant Board is a department of the state and one of its many functions is to advise and license termite and pest control operators.
