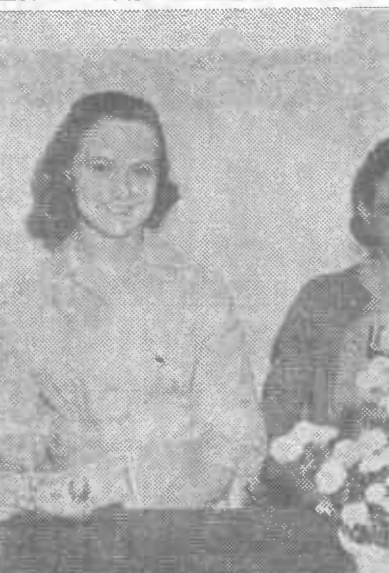
### Silt Gauges Installed In Yellow Creek

## SENSING THE NEWS

FREEDOM OF THE PRESS

The super-state will inevitably control the press if it takes power. This is a truth that should be cry-

stal clear to American journalists, the men who write the first drafts of history—the news reports. But it isn't clear. Some newspapers in this country advocate the programs of Big Government. And the American Newspaper Guild (AFL-CIO), which has a hold on hiring and firing in many newsrooms, especially in the North, goes down the line for the policies of government that lead to the super-state. To think that big government will control business and leave newspapers alone is to be tragically naive. The independent American newspaper is the biggest threat that the advocates of the super-state face in this country. The weeklies and dailies that fight for the Republic are a bulwark against the non-violent totalitarianism of the "liberals."

Remember that phrase: "Non-violent totalitarianism." That's what we are gradually getting in this country. Troops don't march into a manufacturing plant in the United States and announce: "We're taking this over." That's the

way the super-state works in Russia.

But equally destructive practices are coming into being in this country. The difference is that they are more subtle and are carried out under color of law. The case of a Southern textile mill owner comes to mind. He was a stockholder in a textile manufacturing company that had been losing money as the result of Japanese competition encouraged by the federal government. The stockholder decided to close down the mill. But a union, which represented some of the employees, went to the National Labor Relations Board. It persuaded the NLRB to hound and harass the stockholder in question, who also has interests in other mills. The union has kept him before the NLRB. The NLRB has joined in a persecution of this American business man, who enjoys a high reputation in business circles.

The business man who has been persecuted points out that there is no law on the books that requires the stockholders of a company to stay in business if they are losing money. A man has as much right to go out of business as he has to enter business.

But left-wing bureaucrats don't believe that. Every day of the year, they are attempting to fasten the federal hold on private enterprise.

There are many sound-thinking newspapers that realize the danger and point it out to their readers. But there are some journals that don't see the light. There are some newsmen who think business should "get it in the neck." They don't realize what it would be like to write for a press controlled by the government. They would cease being free interpreters of the news; they would become party hacks or be forced from their jobs.

The only way to defend a free press, which has been called the engine of liberty, is to defend the full freedom of American business to do business. There is an intimate relation between freedom of the press and the freedom of economic endeavor—free enterprise.

Freedom has been described as a seamless web. Thus the newsman who fails to fight every federal assault on the right to own and to sell private property is failing to fight for that treasured right—freedom of the press.

Dry up private enterprise, and a free press will die in the United States. This is a fact that totalitarians—non-violent and otherwise—know instinctively. That's why they war against private business. Victory for them would mean an end to criticism of the super-state.

## Brown Williams Announces For Lieutenant Governor

Representative Brown Williams this week made his formal announcement for lieutenant governor.

The 41-year-old Neshoba County Legislator, who is President of the Philadelphia School Board, issued the following statement:

"It is with a deep sense of gratitude and a sincere desire for service to my state that I formally announce for the office of Lieutenant Governor.

"I pledge solemnly that this will be a campaign by and for the people of this great state. Mine will be a platform dedicated to improving the welfare of all the people; not the special interest groups nor the self-seeking politicians.

"I intend to conduct a vigorous campaign dedicated to presenting on behalf of the people of Mississippi their problems and the practical, workable solutions that will solve them.

"Already my aggressive approach in discussing the affairs of state has eliminated some impractical and untimely proposals at not in the public interest. One announced candidate, whose attitude regarding taxes was completely unsound has withdrawn from the race. The leading proponent of a Constitutional Convention has receded from his position and has at least temporarily abandoned his effort to secure a Convention.

"I have made no alliance with any individual or group. While I am an independent candidate, it will be my purpose to work harmoniously with whomever is elected governor.

"However, if the occasion arises when I feel the governor or any other public official is acting contrary to the public interest, I will not hesitate to speak and act on behalf of the people.

"I again publicly reaffirm my complete and uncompromising stand for segregation of the races. There is no place for moderates or disciples of moderates in positions of state leadership.

"As we devote effort to in-

dustrialization of our state, we must also devote equal attention to promoting the agricultural interests, particularly the small farmer.

"I believe that starting salaries of Class A teachers should be at least \$3,000 annually and pledge my effort in obtaining this.

"Without taking from the counties, ways and means must be found to relieve the strained financial conditions of our municipalities.

"There are many other detailed needs too numerous to list here, but which I plan to discuss later.

"I present as qualification for this office a record of service in the Legislature where I feel I have earned the right to ask for promotion.

"Above all, I promise to the people of this state a fair, honest and intelligent administration of the office of lieutenant governor and pledge the power and influence of that office to the people to be used only on their behalf and in their interest."

Williams is a Baptist, member of the Mississippi Farm Bureau, 404 E. 8, American Legion and VFW, and past President of the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce.

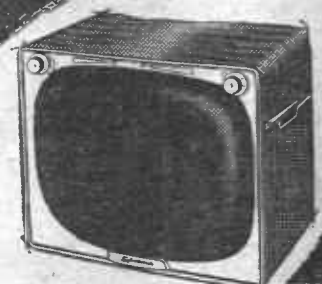

### Dept. Of Defense Making Effort To Reduce Nat. Guard Strength To 360,000

General William P. Wilentz, State of Mississippi, today released a statement from Major General H. Harrison, President of the National Guard Association of the United States, indicating that in 1960, the Department of Defense will make a determined effort to reduce the strength of the National Guard to 360,000. In his statement, Harrison said, "The National Guard increases its readiness, those who eliminate the Guard intensify their efforts. At a recent hearing before the House Armed Services Committee, a high ranking official of the Department of Defense, in explaining for the committee, the 'philosophy' behind the latest move to reduce the strength of the Army National Guard from its present 400,000 to 360,000 said the Department considered the cuts feasible because the Army National Guard's readiness was at such a high level. In other words the better the Army National Guard becomes, the more it can be reduced in size. One could follow this line of reasoning, of course, to its extreme and, in due time, there would be no Army National Guard."

Each year, as Guardsmen will know, we are called on to fight

for our existence. And Fiscal Year 1960 will be no exception. Although the Department of the Army plan for reorganizing the Army National Guard in the Pentomic concept is based on a strength of 400,000, the Department of Defense in its 1960 budget is asking for only enough funds to maintain a 360,000 strength. This is just one of money inconsistencies in the reserve program which make for costly and time wasting instability.

It is interesting to note that the Department of the Army supports the 400,000 strength figure, but is being overruled by the Department of Defense. This very fact should belie those who insist that the termination of the Army National Guard to maintain its present strength is bedded in self interest. The truth is, the Guard seeks a stabilized and reasonable strength level to permit efficient unit training and assure a continued high level of mobilization readiness. Inconsistencies in policies governing strength, training and administration result in greater waste than could possibly be saved in further strength cuts. A reduction of strength will mean a lesser percentage of authorized strength in units and a lower level of mobilization readiness.

In the best interest of national defense, the Army National Guard should be stabilized at 400,000. This would make it possible for our unit commanders to count on a fixed strength from year to year and lead to greater efficiency in administration and training."

### Awards Given Employees Of SS Office

#### Monthly Benefits In County Amount To Almost \$30,000

Cash awards totaling \$540.00 were presented recently to employees of the Tupelo Social Security District Office by Hugh Tigrett, District Manager. These awards were based on sustained work performance and a high work production which could be measured by tangible savings over 12-month period. The awards were made in accordance with Title III, Public Law 763, 83rd Congress, providing for cash awards for outstanding work records and superior accomplishment by government employees.

In addition to Tishomingo County, The Tupelo Social Security District Office serves nine other northeast Mississippi counties. According to Mr. Tigrett, at the time the Tupelo office opened in late November 1956, monthly benefits in Tishomingo County amounted to approximately \$14,000.00 each month. Today these benefits total approximately \$30,000.00 each month. This increase of over 100 per cent during the last two years indicates the increased economic value of Social Security to Tishomingo County and northeast Mississippi. Many of the new beneficiaries became entitled as a result of the recent amendments to the Social Security Law bringing in self-employed farmers. Also, effective July 1, 1957, the staff of the Tupelo office began administering the Disability Benefit Program for disabled people over age 50 who qualify for these payments.

In commenting on the award, Mr. Tigrett stated that the outstanding accomplishment of the office was possible only through the excellent teamwork of each member of the office staff. He further stated that as a part of their service to the public, a representative from the Tupelo office visits the Court House in Iuka each Monday afternoon. Anyone planning on early retirement is especially invited to come in a month or two early in order that their claim may be completed by the time they actually retire.

### Genesco Rejects Union For Third Time In Two Days

For the third time in two days, Genesco employees rejected representation by the Teamsters Union when employees of the Company's General Retail Warehouse on Craighead Street, in Nashville, Tennessee, voted 32 to 26 against this union on Thursday, March 19. The election was held under the direction of the National Labor Relations Board. It was conducted at the Company's big warehouse. On the day before, March 18, the Teamsters Union was rejected by Genesco employees at its big warehouse at 63rd Avenue and Centennial Boulevard, in Nashville. The union did not get a single vote there.

Also on March 18, employees of the Company's Processing Terminal in Fayetteville, Tennessee, likewise rejected the Teamsters Union and again without giving the Teamsters a single supporting vote.

Genesco president Ben H. Willingham commented: "It is a triple compliment to our employees when three separate groups in succession tell the Teamsters Union that they do not want to have anything to do with them. Their ballots are a reconfirmation of their confidence in the management of their company and in dealings on a man-to-man basis for continuing a better standard of living and better policies under which to work."

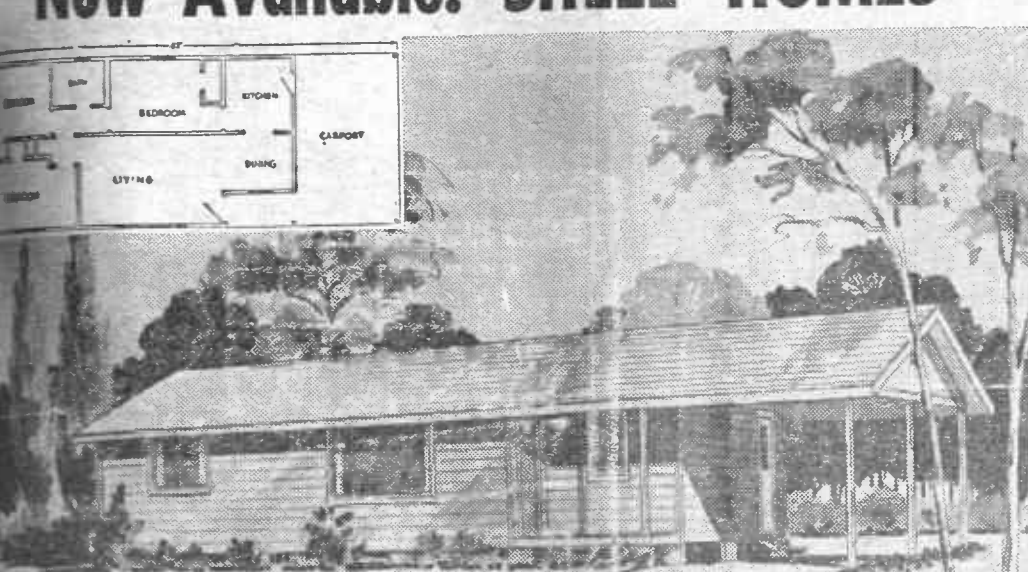

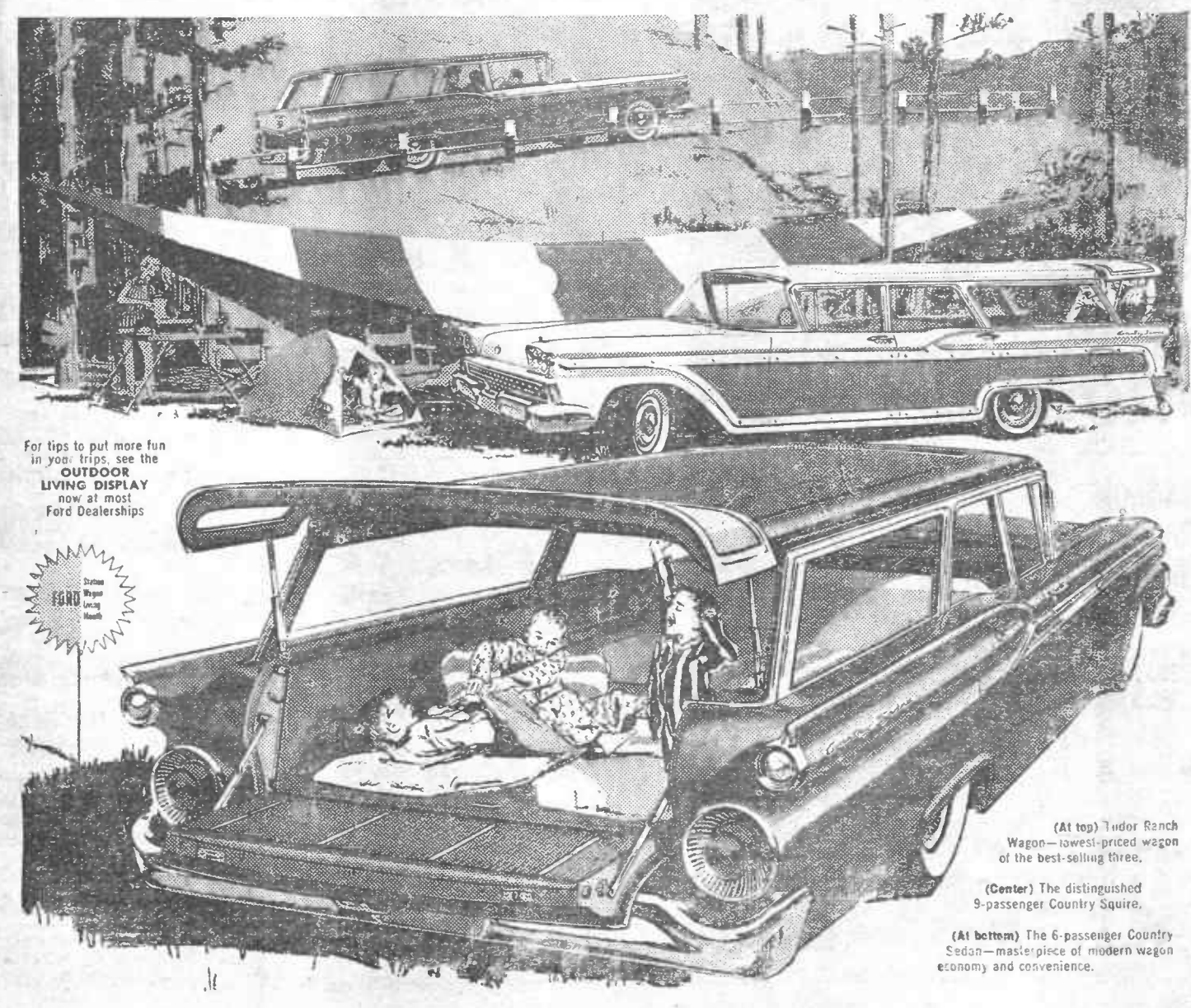

This is a Reminder to you to release your cotton acres if you are not going to plant it. Just release all of your 1959 Cotton Allotment or any part of your allotment that will not be planted.

The Deadline Date for Releasing this acreage will be May 1, 1959. However, we would appreciate you releasing it earlier if you cannot work it or find a rent. This will give the County Committee an opportunity to Reapportion the acres of cotton to other people who can plant it.

Note: This does not apply to you if you are working your cotton or have it rented to someone. Neither does it apply to you if you have already released your acreage. This applies only to the farmer that will not work the cotton acreage on his or her farm.

Our cotton acreage is being cut every year because we do not get it done. If you have cotton acreage that will not be planted, by all means, release it not later than 1-1-59. This will help the County hold the acreage we now have.

If you want to release your cotton acreage and cannot make a trip to our office just write us a letter requesting us to release your cotton acres.

The Deadline for filing application for the Wool and Lamb Payments will be April 30, 1959. We have several farmers in the county that have sheep. If you have sold any Wool or Lambs during the 1958 Program Year be sure to visit the A.S.C. County Office and sign an application for the Incentive Payment by the Deadline Date mentioned above.

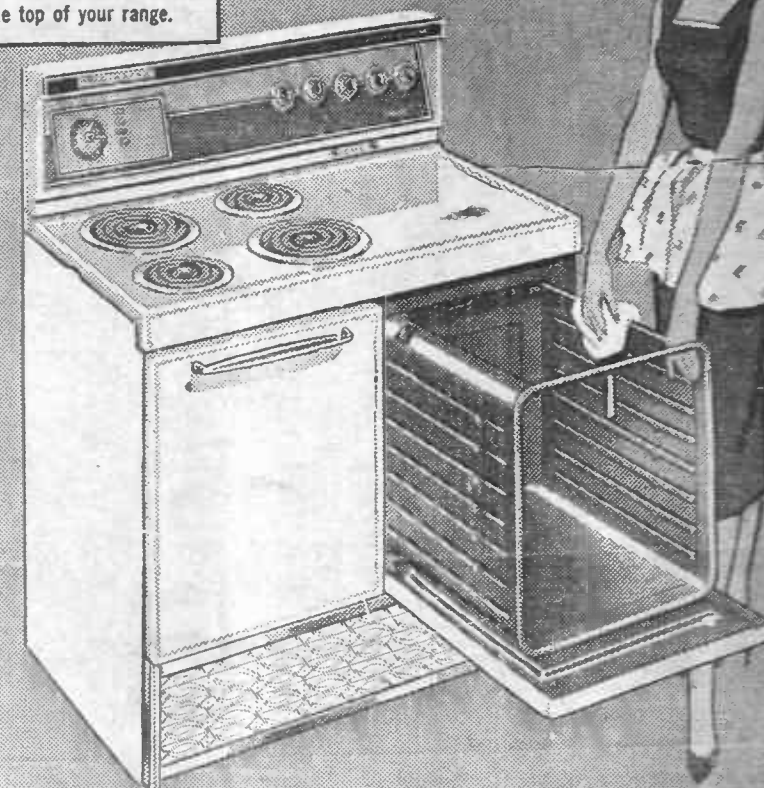

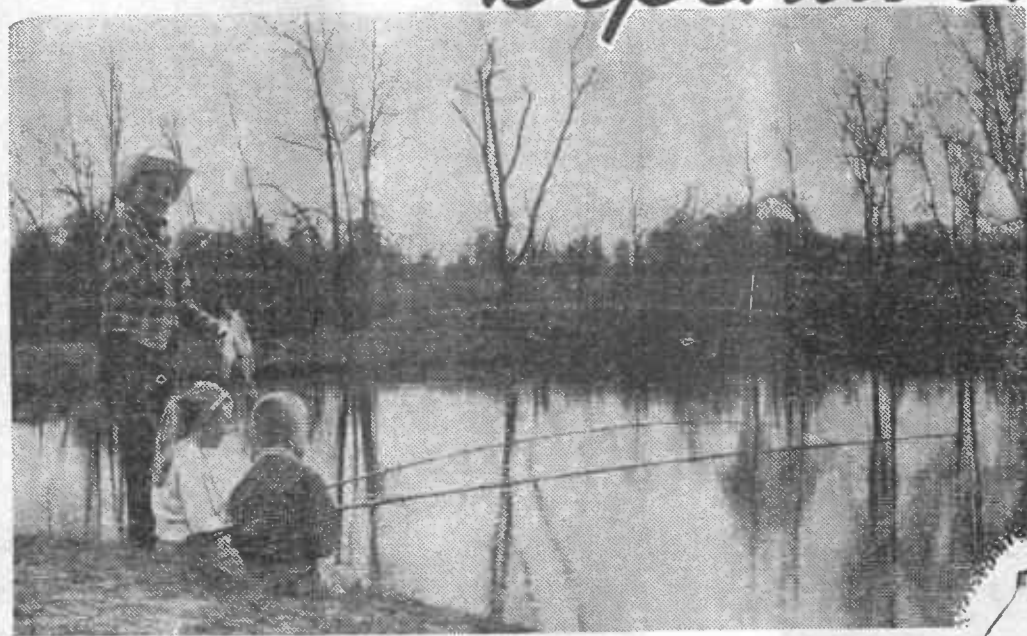

# Pilot Forest Dedication To Held On April 14th On Oris D. Brumley Property In Pleasant Ridge Community

ment of the dedica- woodlands and treatments of the remaining hardwood stand so as to release the planted pine from competition so that it can live and make rapid growth.

If all undeveloped timber land in Tishomingo County were brought into full production, the effect would be the same as a substantial new industry.

Mr. Brumley, the owner of the farm on which the Pilot Forest is located, is delighted with the changes which have taken place on his land.

"Since the forestry experts moved in some two weeks ago," Mr. Brumley says, "we've seen a lot of changes take place. The first operation is underway to replace scrub hardwood trees with top value trees for the eventual production of saw logs and pulpwood. Since I did not have too many acres of farm land, I feel that a great part of my income will come from my timber," he further stated. "When I am not able to farm any longer my timber, which will be kept in good growing condition by keeping it thinned out and otherwise cutting it properly, will furnish an income for my old age."

"I have always spent a good deal of time working with my timber to keep it growing and it looks as though in the future I will be spending even more time working with my timber as this will prob-

ably one day be the most valuable part of my farm," he went on to say.

"Actually, I now realize that my timber is another farm crop just like cotton or corn but a lot easier to grow and will probably be one of my best cash crops from now on," he stated.

In addition to growing pine timber for the market, Mr. Brumley will also cut firewood and fence posts and other products for his own use from the stand of timber. Some areas have been left in such a condition as to provide firewood and fence posts as well as pine for the market. Mr. Brumley is also interested in wildlife and has planted some patches of bi-color lespedeza for food. To show the wisdom of this, he now has several coveys of quail on his place which feed on these food plots.

Surveys on the Pilot Forest indicate the future possibilities of 100,000 acres of woodlands similar to this tract in Tishomingo County. If all this forestland were brought into full productivity, eventually it could mean approximately two million dollars of new income to the county's economy annually.

This is the report made by Mr. Weekley, of Hiwassee Land Company, Chairman of the Pilot Forest Project in Tishomingo County. He said that on the basis of the Pilot Forest survey, productivity on the tract which is considered typical of forest productivity in Tishomingo County could be increased by one half cord of pulpwood per acre per year.

"We intend to show through the Pilot Forest how that gain in production can be accomplished," he continued.

"If the same economical management practices that we are undertaking on the Pilot Forest were to be applied to the more than 100,000 acres of forestland like it

in the county, it would mean an additional production of some 75,000 cord of pulpwood per year when the peak is reached," Mr. Weekley said.

"This would mean a better income to the individuals who own the land, additional employment and increase in individual incomes which would tend to stabilize the economy of vitally important rural areas."

"On Tuesday, April 14, tours will be held on the Pilot Forest beginning each hour on the hour from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. everyone who wishes to see what has been accomplished in converting underproduction land to a fully productive state," Mr. Weekley said.

"I would like to urge all landowners, public agencies and other interested citizens who are interested in the development of Tishomingo and surrounding counties to make every effort to see this project as our guest."

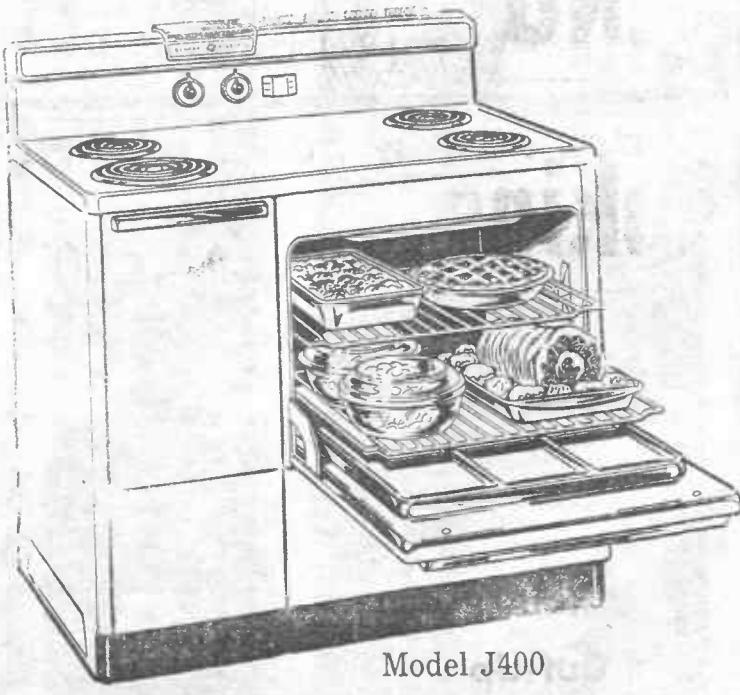

### Officer Material

Lesson for April 12, 1959

THE NAVY HAS a word for a school where men from the ranks are studying to be commissioned officers: the "Officers' Material School." Not every enlisted man can be admitted; only those who seem to have what it is going to take to be an officer, and that is a good deal.

The Bible tells a story of a man from the ranks who was good "officer material" but who (like some Navy candidates) flunked out. He did not fail, however, for lack of the stuff of which success can be made. Next week's study concerns his failure; this week's thought is given to what could have been his success. He held a good hand, we may say, but he played it badly.

### Head and Shoulders

Look over the cards he held. First, he had what everyone noticed: the first moment he looked at him: he stood out in any crowd, head and shoulders above the rest. He would have sat tall in the saddle (only no one around there rode horseback); he stood tall on the ground. He was strong enough to butcher and cut up a yoke of oxen by himself, and in a fight he had proved himself a lion. Men have been successful in life without extraordinary strength; but for a leader of men, a store of extra power and energy is important. Some investigator found that executives in business are on an average, taller and heavier than the men lower down the ladder. The executive needs the extra power for the extra drive. But of course a giant can be a fool. You cannot predict how much of a leader a man will be merely by measuring the distance from his crew-cut to his heels.

"When they molded him, the molder broke the mold," it is said of some people. It could have been said of Saul. He was not only head and shoulders taller than most, he was a head smarter than most. Good brains, originality—always high cards in the game of life. Some people with original minds are quiet, mousy—and un-noticed. If to originality there are added force of character, a quick habit of decision, a forthright approach to all problems—then you have the makings of a great leader. Now Saul started out as such a man. We read of him that a foreign army was besieging the city of Jabesh, and threatened to make a "treaty" by putting out the right eye of every man in the town. All Israel heard about it, and there was loud wailing in the land. But when the news came to Saul he did not weep a tear. He took a yoke of oxen, cut them up with his own hands, sent pieces around to every tribe, with the message: Be at Jabesh, ready to fight, or have your oxen made into soup-meat like this! It may have been rough, but it got results.

### A Modest Patriot

Above all, the Israelites were looking for a man who loved his country, the whole land and people of Israel. Saul by his action at Gilead had proved himself such a person. He not only would make a sacrifice for his country's sake, he had the ability to inspire others also. He had shown there too that he placed the interests of the tribes as a whole above the interests of any one tribe or city; and that conversely the fate of any one city was the concern of all. Our country could use more patriots of this stripe today, men who like George Washington can see beyond the limits of their own state and live as citizens of the American Union. We need men who will not be indifferent to the troubles of other parts of our land, who realize that the tragedy or the glory of one city is the tragedy or the glory of all. We don't need men who shout and brag about how much they love their country. Senators Snort and Phogbound are always with us; but politics with them is a way of making money without too much work. Patriotism is nothing to be shouted about; it is a quality that shines best in a modest life. Saul at the beginning was almost too self-effacing. The office had to seek him, and that was good. He was king only because the people demanded him and God through the prophet destined him.

## The New Draft Law

The new military draft law passed recently by Congress makes an additional 5,000,000 young men subject to induction into the armed forces within the next four years.

That is the number which Selective Service estimates will be subject to the draft, between next July 1 and mid-1963, the next date on which the draft law is due to expire.

We asked Selective Service who and how many it expects to call for military duty and how they will be chosen. Here are some of their answers.

Draft calls so far this year are running at around 8,000 a month. Barring world-wide disarmament or a big shooting war, neither of which is expected, that rate will probably continue. The rate is at about 100,000 a year.

twelve young men who become of draft age actually will be called, Selective Service's figures indicate. How, we asked, will those to be called be selected.

Only those in excellent physical condition and above average mentally will be chosen. The tests on both physical and mental conditions will be more strict than in the past, we are told.

In the past only about 2 out of every 10 called have been rejected, but Selective Service says the rejection rate will be about 3 out of every 10 under the new law.

The President, it was explained, has broad powers to change the number as well as the physical and mental standards of those to be called. Selective Service officials,

however, know of no plans for changes.

The law fixes the age for draft at between 18½ and 25 years, but for those who have been deferred the law makes them subject to draft up to the age of 35. As a matter of practice, most of the draft calls are for the 22 and 23 year olds.

### Deferments

The law does not provide for deferments to permit the youths to continue through high school and college, but Selective Service officials say that unless there is a national emergency the present practice on deferments will be continued.

The present practice, which could, however, be changed by a presidential order, is to defer fathers and expectant fathers, providing they keep their draft board informed of their status.

The law also provides another way to avoid active duty in the military forces. A young man can sign up with one of the military reserve units, including the National Guard, for six months active duty training.

After that he must attend weekly drills and a two weeks annual training period. This would continue for several years, in most cases until he reaches the age of 36 and thus become exempt from the draft.

### Plenty Of Time For Glads

You can plant gladiolus corms, as the "bulbs" are called, all during this month until early July. If you plant some of the corms every two weeks, you will have a succession of blooms through September.

A good distance apart to space them is about three times the diameter of the corm. It is best to grow glads in rows in the vegetable garden. They are too stiff and formal for use in show beds of flowers. You might want a few in back of a bed for height.

### Rules for Taking Medicine

Be extremely careful in taking

medicines. One mistake may be fatal.

1. Never take medicine in the dark.
2. Read carefully the directions on the label.
3. Take the dose recommended by your physician.
4. Pour from the bottle with the label up. (This keeps the label clean and easier to read—a safety factor.)
5. Shake liquid medicines if so directed.
6. Never use medicines originally prescribed and intended for others.
7. Keep medicine out of reach of children.
8. Close the container at once.
9. Never switch tops of covers on pill or powder boxes. (Switching box covers may cause an enormous overdose or a very ineffective dose.)
10. Never pour medicine back into bottle.

### Outdoor Living

Check the tables, chairs and other accessories of your outdoor summertime living. Make your

plans for painting and anything that seems run-down.

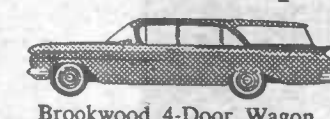

## April 15 Is Deadline For Filing Income

**Farmers Netting \$400 During Year Must File Federal Returns**  
"April 15 is an important date for all of us and especially for farmers and ministers," Hugh D. Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo Social Security District Office said today.

Farmers who have a net income of \$400 or more during the year must file Federal income tax returns and pay the social security taxes and income taxes due by April 15. These returns are used not only for reporting income for income tax purposes but also for reporting self-employment income for social security credits. Since many Tishomingo County farmers were not required to pay income tax because of their exemptions, they have neglected to file returns and have no social security credit on their records. Even though tax returns may be filed at any time, there is a time limit for establishing social security credits. For example, social security credits cannot be given for years before '56 based on returns filed after April 15, 1959.

Mr. Tigrett concluded with the reminder that a minister must file a waiver certificate, Form 2031, with the Internal Revenue Service to have his earnings from the ministry count toward social security protection. April 15, 1959, is the deadline for filing this certificate.

## 17% Increase In Iuka Business

**1947-49 Business Average In Iuka Is 184% Higher**

The monthly publication of the Business Research Station at Mississippi State University showed that activity in the district varied from a 29 per cent increase at Booneville to a 17 per cent increase at Iuka.

General business activity in the Corinth district during February showed an 18 per cent gain over the corresponding month of 1958, according to the recent issue of "The Mississippi Business Review."

Corinth showed a 19 per cent increase and Ripley had a 23 per cent increase.

The district as a whole stood at 168 per cent of the 1947-49 average recorded on the station's index. By the same standard Corinth stood at 162 per cent; Booneville, 212 per cent; Iuka, 184 per cent; and Ripley, 191 per cent.

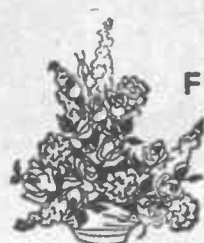

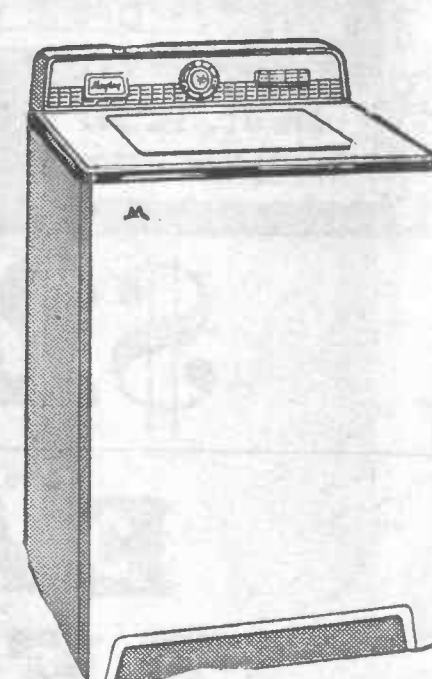

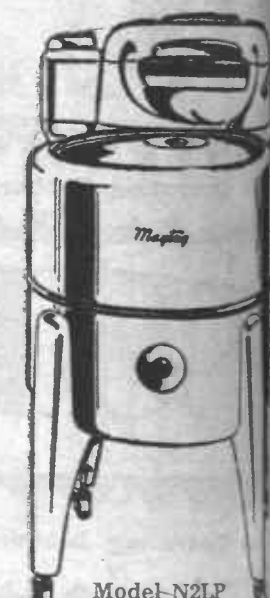
