## Bid Accepted For Building New Iuka School Structure

\$239,154 Was Lowest Offer For  
34,444 Square Foot Structure;  
To Be Completed By March 1960

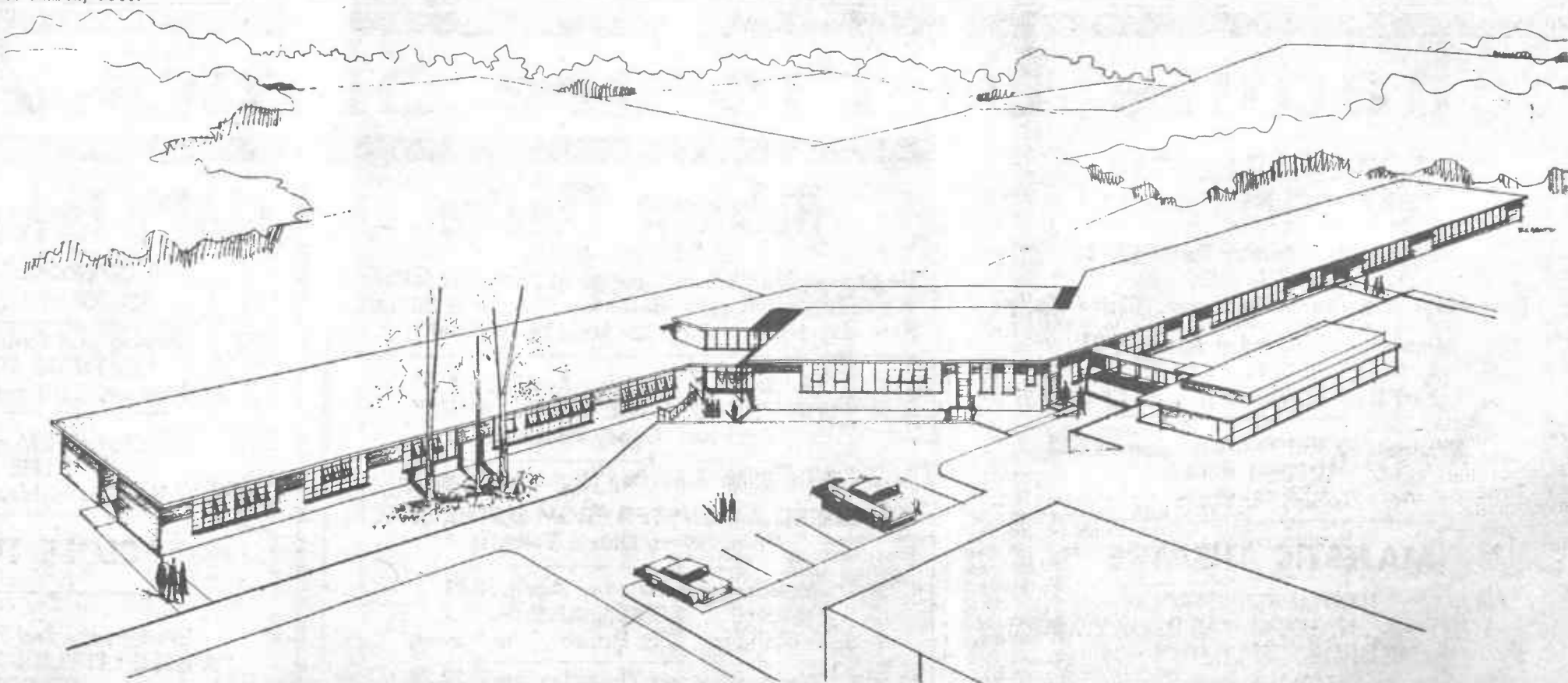
Lashlee-Rich Lumber Co. of  
Humboldt, Tenn., and University,  
Miss., was low bidder for the erec-  
tion of the new school building at  
Iuka. This firm's bid was  
\$239,154.00. Other firms and the  
amounts of bids offered were H  
& H. Construction Co., \$254,987-  
00; G. L. Wilmon Lumber Co.,  
\$257,971.00; Frank Hardin, \$258,  
282.84, and Kimberley Bros. Con-  
struction Co., \$265,859.00. The bids  
were opened Wednesday afternoon  
in the auditorium at the Iuka  
School.

The new school building will  
have a total of 34,444 square foot  
feet and will be constructed on  
three levels. It will contain 26  
classrooms and a cafeteria. Outside  
construction will be of brick  
and the kitchens and rest rooms  
will have quarry tile flooring. The  
cafeteria will serve as a cafeteria  
and an auditorium, this room be-  
ing 90x36 feet in overall size. It  
will be equipped with a stage for  
general assemblies. The building  
that is now used as a cafeteria will  
be remodeled and converted into  
a library and will be connected to  
the new cafeteria by a breez-  
way.

A breakdown of the classrooms  
shows that there will be 15 for  
elementary grades, 3 for either  
elementary of high school use, 5  
for high school, one large home-  
making room, 1 science classroom,  
and one science laboratory.

The new building will be situated  
behind the present school build-  
ings. The east end will terminate  
east of and south of the present  
parking area at the rear of the  
gymnasium. From east to west  
the new building will be approxi-  
mately 580 feet long, the floor lev-  
el rising with the natural eleva-  
tion of the ground. Center of the  
building, the cafeteria, will be  
8 feet higher than the east wing  
section, and the west wing section  
will be three feet higher than the  
cafeteria. The western extremity  
of the the west wing will terminate  
directly behind the present elemen-

tary building.  
B. A. England, architect, states  
that a work order will be issued  
as soon as the bid is approved by  
the State Educational Finance Com-  
mission. Construction will com-  
mence within 20 days from the  
date of the work order. The First  
District School Board will allow  
270 calendar days for completion  
of the project, and according to  
Prof. H. L. Shook, the building  
should be completed by the first  
of March, 1960.

Wednesday at noon.

W. E. Ludlam, program chair-  
man for the meeting, introduced  
the speaker. Mr. Gardner spoke on  
the parkway and stated that rang-  
ers who patrol the scenic drive  
are on duty to give information  
and assistance to travelers. "Of  
course," he said, "there is always  
a fly in the ointment and that is  
our 50 mile-an-hour speed limit on  
the Parkway. The reason for this is

## A LESSON IN CAPITALISM

Japan could teach the world a lesson—if peoples would only pay attention. The lesson would be entitled "How To Practice Free Enterprise of Socialism, and Make

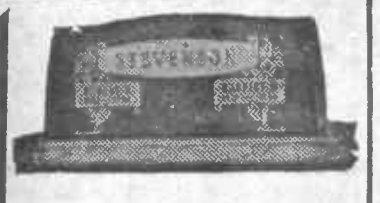
The overcrowded island empire, shattered by U. S. armed forces in World War II, has made an amazing comeback. And as in the case of West Germany, the reason for the comeback has been reliance on free enterprise, not government controls and bureaucratic planners.

In 1946, the year after Japan surrendered, the nation's gross national product—total value of goods and services produced—was only one-third what it was in the 1930s. Today the GNP of resurgent Japan is two and one-half times what it was a generation ago.

Japan is busting out all over in her economic boom. Japanese shipyards are busy with orders from all the important maritime nations, including the United States. Japanese cameras are giving Germany camera-makers a run for their money. As for Japanese enterprise in the textile field, the textile-manufacturing states of the South know from bitter experience the business aggressiveness of that nation.

Of course, Japan has received tremendous help from the United States since World War II. It has been and is favored by American trade regulations. Japan, for example, can buy raw cotton at a lower price than the American textile manufacturer can buy it.

But think of the nations that have received massive help from the



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Fire Lanes  
Are Important

One forest fire can destroy acres and acres of pines it has taken years to grow.

This is the time of year farmers are burning ditch banks and the fire might get into the woods. If you are a landowner and have woodland it could burn.

Lightening can set woods fires, but far more forest fires are caused by human carelessness. A light-

USA and which, nevertheless, have failed to get moving economically. Most of the nations of Southeast Asia have received foreign aid from the U. S., but most of them are in serious economic trouble. The Japanese, on the other hand, are on the way again to be one of the major trading nations of the world. Though far smaller than many other Asian nations, Japan is rapidly becoming a real power in that part of the world.

Are the Japanese smarter or harder working than other Asians? Maybe. But that hardly seems to account for their staggering success in business. The biggest single factor in their progress, in my opinion, is their reliance on traditional capitalist methods of doing business. The Japanese have had a balanced budget since the war. They have checked runaway inflation. They have accepted their obligations and paid their debts. The Japanese didn't pull any phony socialist tricks after the war ended. They told the world that they would pay their international debts. And they have done so. The result: When the Japanese government offered \$30 million in bonds for sale in this country recently, U. S. investors snapped up the offering. American business firms have not hesitated to invest in Japan, for they consider the government business-like and stable.

A financial weekly recently brought out the fact that thrift is really being practiced in Japan. The record shows that 15 per cent of Japanese personal income after taxes is invested. Thirty per cent of the gross national product is reinvested. Obviously, such habits make possible sound business growth.

Now, since Japan is well able to stand on her own feet, I believe that U. S. aid ought to be curtailed. Special trade advantages ought to be ended. But Americans can learn from Japan's experience. They should recognize that the way to grow strong is the old fashioned way—by saving, balanced budgets, and tight checks on inflation. If that way works for a country that has been smashed in a war, it certainly will work for a country that has never undergone such a devastating experience. If Americans won't heed the lesson of Japan—and instead follow the advice of the spenders and the budget unbalancers, the USA will lose strength. That is the way for a nation to become a second-class power.

ed cigarette or a burning match thoughtlessly thrown down in grass or leaves are the source of many destructive forest fires. There are very, very few people who willfully burn the woods, yet there are dozens of forest fires every year in Tishomingo county.

If you are a landowner there is something that you can do to help protect your woodland from fire. You can keep fire lanes disked up or plowed through your woodland.

Your local soil conservation service personnel recommend that you construct and maintain fire lanes throughout your woodland. Disk the woods roads in the spring and in the fall to bury or destroy

all grass and leaves that will burn. If practical, construct with a bulldozer, fire lanes around the boundary of your woodland. It takes only a few hours to do this. Most bulldozer operators will do this work for \$10.00 per hour.

Forty dollars (\$40.00) spent on the construction of fire lanes might save you a thousand dollars \$1000. worth of timber. Once constructed, they are easy to maintain.

A well constructed fire lane could stop a slowburning fire. They will not stop a hot fast burning fire. However, the landowner can use them to backfire from if necessary. Firelanes, serve as roads for fire fighting crews to drive into your property. This can make

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their work easier or more efficient. These men are doing a splendid job in Tishomingo county, but we need to do all we can to help them in the protection of our own woodland. Fire is the greatest menace we have to the woodland of our county.

When pines are set in old fields construct a fire lane, and maintain it, between the natural woodland and the new planting. The above photo shows such a fire lane constructed on the property of Mr. Leslie C. Moser, who is a soil conservation district cooperator.

In 1958 District Cooperators constructed more than 28 miles of new firelanes in Tishomingo county to protect their woodland. Most of these were constructed with farmer equipment at very little cost. It is better to be safe than to be sorry. Your timber is valuable, protect it from fire.

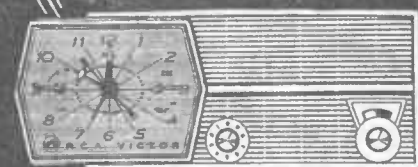

Mrs. J. M. Ewing, State President, urged members of the P-TA to strengthen the ties between home and school and named three things which children must get in the head: a sense of moral responsibility for the sort of community, state and nation they are to have, a sense of security and courage.

Those attending the convention were overwhelmed with a pageant, "Our Heritage," presented by approximately 200 Murrah High School students which told the story of Mississippi, the P-TA, and the U. S. over the past 50 years. This parade was reenacted beautifully and skillfully by talented high school students. **Aged And Disabled Get Increase In Monthly Benefits**

Welfare Commissioner W. E. Holcomb today announced that maximum assistance for the aged and disabled has been raised to \$33 per month.

This action, approved by the State Welfare Board, was in keeping with legislation passed in 1958 giving the Board authority to make payments as high as \$35 per month, providing funds are available. Payments made to the needy aged and disabled are on the basis of the unmet need a person has. In every case this need is established by the use of a budget showing both

income and expenses of the individual.

Recent changes in Social Security payments brought about a reduction in the number of persons receiving Old Age Assistance and a change in the budget of many who were not removed from the rolls altogether. This made more funds available from those monies already appropriated for welfare services.

The Commissioner pointed out that while this increase is only \$1 from the \$32 now being received it will bring the average payment nearer to the \$30 which is the figure at which maximum federal matching funds are received. The change will be effective May 1st to those whose budget shows greatest need.

There are approximately 176,000 people in Mississippi past 65 years of age, of whom 80,718 received some Old Age Assistance in March. Those who get some assistance from OASDI may also be eligible for some welfare payment. The amount of such assistance depends on the deficit shown by the budget. The Commissioner pointed out that it is the policy of the department to go far toward meeting the people's unmet need as is financially possible.

In Mississippi, he said, company vehicles during 1958 traveled 289,000 miles per accident. The Bell System's national average was less than 90,000 miles per accident.

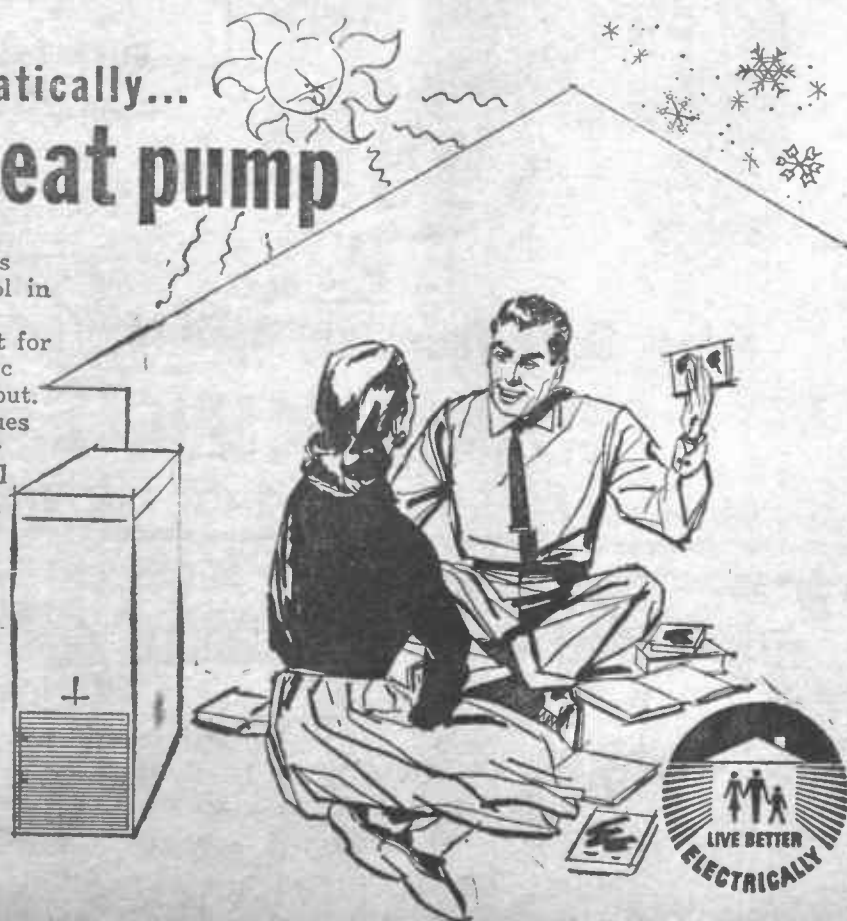

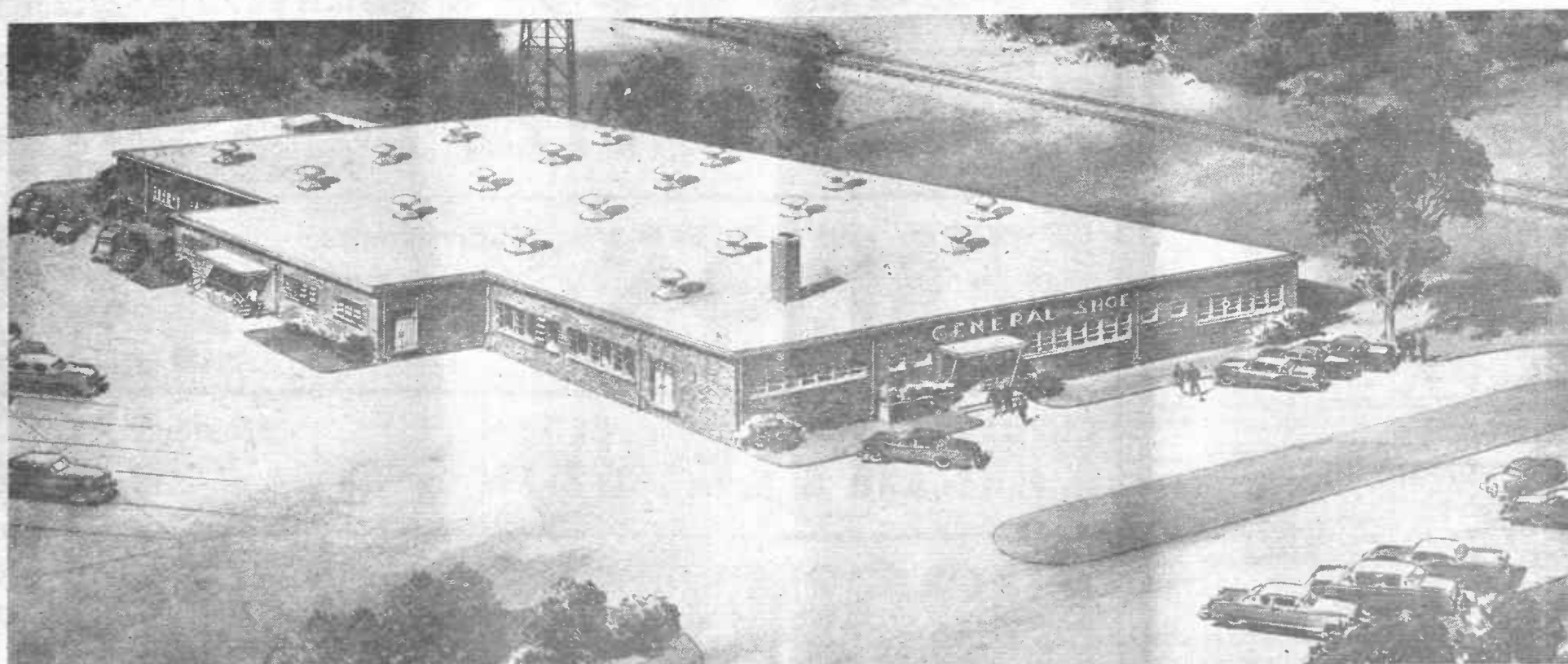

## Decline In April Traffic Fatalities

April traffic fatalities are declining sharply, according to the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Records at highway patrol headquarters in Jackson, show only four highway deaths through mid-night April 9. The corresponding toll for the first nine days of April last year was 15 killed.

Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarborough said this April reduction in traffic deaths is the first major downward trend in fatal accidents this year. He expressed optimism that the declining death rate might continue as the Patrol's accelerated enforcement program gains momentum.

Several weeks ago, the Patrol head announced that Radar would be worked night and day, and that every bush and billboard might hide a potential radar machine. This has been done.

The state's traffic death rate is still up, however. The death count through midnight April 9 stood at 130 dead, 20 more deaths than was reported last year. In mid-March, however, this margin of increase stood at more than 30 dead.

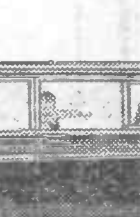
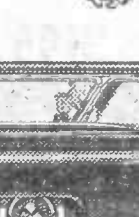

must be durable. Purely decorative  
pieces that you won't be wearing  
much may cost less and still give  
you satisfactory service. Whatever  
pieces you select, choose them  
with an eye for beauty.

## Golden Yellow Bananas

The color of the banana peel is a  
good guide to use in selecting  
this popular fruit, may vary from  
green, to yellow flaked with  
brown.

At a room temperature of about  
70 degrees, the starch of the un-  
ripened green fruit changes into  
the sugar of the yellow ripened  
fruit.

If some of the green shows at  
the tips, you may bake or broil  
the bananas. They are still slightly  
underripe. If the peel is entire-  
ly yellow, you can cook or serve  
the fruit as a vegetable. Or it's  
ripe enough to eat uncooked.

If the peel is yellow flaked  
with brown, the banana is fully  
ripe. It's ready for immediate use  
in cereals, salads, desserts and to  
eat out of hand. You can digest  
the yellow bananas flaked with  
brown more quickly than less ripe  
ones. They have more flavor, too,  
than the yellow or s.

spots free from fire's favorite fuel  
—rubbish. It may be discarded  
clothes, lampshades, newspapers,  
old paint cans. Clean up now for  
a fire safe home. Don't give fire a  
place to start.

## Store Clean Clothes

As you begin putting away cold  
weather clothes, be sure they are  
thoroughly clean before you store  
them. Perspiration and other  
stains can cause the clothes to  
deteriorate and length of time.

Protect also from moths and  
other insect pests. Ask for a copy  
of Publication 245, Kill Household  
Insects.

## Grain Sorghum

Advantages: You can plant it  
as late as July and still get a grain  
crop or graze it down.

Grain sorghum will stand dry  
periods and still recover and make  
a good crop.

Grain sorghum will out-produce  
corn on drouthy land.

It lends itself well to farms hav-  
ing combines available.

Disadvantages: Insects present  
more of a problem with grain sor-  
ghum than they do with corn.

Grain sorghum deteriorates rap-  
idly when left in the field after  
it matures. This means drying fa-  
cilities on the farm or a good dry-  
er available close-by. If weather  
for harvesting is bad, you might  
lose a grain crop.

Tips on Planting: Uniformity is  
the key-word! This means plant  
at a uniform date, at a uniform  
depth and with uniform fertilizer  
application. Staggered plantings  
usually mean a lot of midge trou-  
ble and a lot of damage.

Varieties recommended include  
open headed D-50 and R.S. 610;  
two shorter stalked varieties are  
D-44C and D-56 E for pull-type com-  
bines.

Seeding rates are seven to 10  
pounds per acre. Fertilizer recom-  
mendations are 36 pounds nitrogen,  
40 pounds of phosphorus and 40  
pounds of potash at planting time.  
This side dress with 40 to 60 lbs.  
of nitrogen.

## Tips On Cattle

How to Make Money: Increase  
the calf crop percentage. During  
the 10 years 1946-57, Mississippi  
cattlemen got only 72 calves out  
of each 100 cows.

Increase the weight and grade  
of calves. Each time the grade  
falls from one to the next (choice,  
to good) it takes an extra 50 lbs.  
of weight to make up for the money  
lost in down grading.

Make calves more uniform; stop  
year-round breeding. Don't breed  
heifers too early.

Use better bulls and make sure  
that there are enough bulls avail-  
able to get cows properly bred.

Provide plenty of pasture and  
avoid overgrazing—both are basic  
in a cattle program.

Avoid selling light calves. If it  
costs \$50 or more to produce a  
calf, you won't make much when a  
175 to 250 pound calf is sold.

Do a good job of dehorning and  
castrating. These may increase  
market values of calves \$1 to 4 a  
hundred pounds.

Marketing is most important.  
Some cattlemen do a good job of  
production and management for  
364 days, then fail the last day by  
doing a poor job of marketing.

Tracy Trim of Houston, Texas, formerly of Tishomingo, a perky 65-year-oldster whose infectious grin belies a history of hardship, is not the kind to let a few hard knocks get him down.

He's been without the use of his legs for almost 25 years.

Whizzing about his house at 441 Beggs on a platform roller contraption this genial Houstonian is too busy thinking about the future to spend time dwelling on the past.

Finding time is a bigger problem than finding ways to spend it.

Tracy spends his days tinkering with any electrical gadget you can name—radios to radios—sometimes for amusement, more often for profit.

His specialty is repairing radio and television sets, a trick he learned while recovering from the injury which paralyzed him from the waist down.

It was on dark September day in 1935 that fortune frowned. Loading oil into a railroad tanker he slipped and plunged to the tracks. The diagnosis was a broken back—Trim would never walk again.

He spent nine months in a hospital. Another three were spent lying in a bed of pain. It never killed his spirit.

With his twin girls, Ruthie and Ruby, pitching in to help their mother, the family somehow pulled through.

There was another benefactor Trim doesn't forget. He remembers well that day late Abraham Turboff walked into his hospital room with comforting word that his family need not worry for food.

Turboff, who became one of the city's most successful independent grocers, died in 1951.

"His help was the big difference," Trim said. "We made it over the hump, and haven't had to ask for anything since."

"Lots of fellows just give up when things go against them," says the silvering Trim. "But I figure there's a way out if you want it bad enough."

Sing no sad songs for Tracy, he had no ear for doleful tunes. Tracy is a brother of the Trims in Tishomingo. He is a native of this county.
