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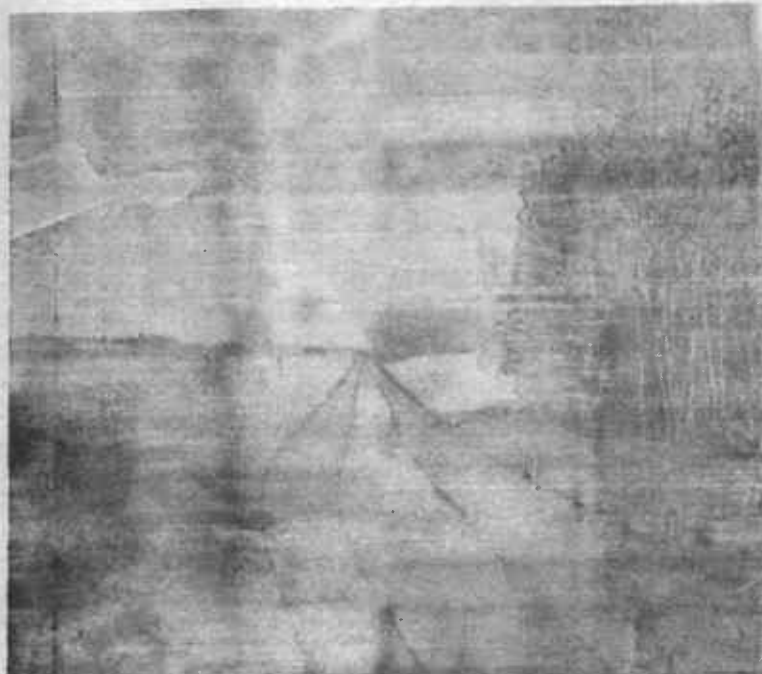

Drain Bottom Land Then Fertilize For High Crop Yields

Mr. Doyle Brumley, an SCD Cooperator who lived in the Pleasant Ridge community, is proud of the new ditch the Soil Conservation Service boys helped him cut. Doyle remembers the year he planted most of this 12 acre field in corn, and harvested a total of 17 bushels of corn off of the entire field. His average yield of corn per acre on this field that year was less than two (2) bushels per acre.

He had prepared his land, fertilized it well, and had planted good seed, but the rains came and his corn crop, except 16 rows, drowned out. "It is risky business for a farmer to buy high priced fertilizer and seed, and spend his time planting row crops on improperly drained bottom land," said Mr. Brumley. "I am really proud of my new ditch and firmly believe it will mean the difference between a good crop of corn and no corn at all on most of this field during a wet year," continued Doyle. Then he added, "I won't be afraid to buy and apply all the fertilizer needed to produce 75 or more bushels of corn per acre now that I'm sure my crop won't drown."

Properly established secondary drainage ditches on good bottom land is helping many Soil Conservation District Cooperators, in Tishomingo County, to make better use of their land. These land owners have moved their row crops off the steeper slopes to their more level land, and have set these steep area to pines, or they have planted them to pasture or permanent hay. On many Tishomingo County farms a good drainage ditch is the key that unlocks the door to better use of the land. If you have land drainage prob-

lems come by your local soil conservation service office in Iuka we may be able to help you.

Field Pond Management

Weeds in farm ponds can cause a lot of trouble to the owner. There are three general types of pond weeds. They are: (1) Floating type without roots, (2) Rooted submerged type, (3) Rooted emergent weeds. To control the floating weeds or scum use eight pounds of Copper Sulphate per three acre feet of water. The other types of weeds can be controlled to some degree with 2-4D mixed with fuel oil.

Hornflies

Hornfly season is just beginning and now is a good time to spray cattle for this pest. Excellent control can be expected by using either DDT, Toxaphene, or Methoxychlor. These materials can be secured in either a wettable powder or liquid emulsion. Follow directions of manufacturers label or consult your county agent for direction to use.

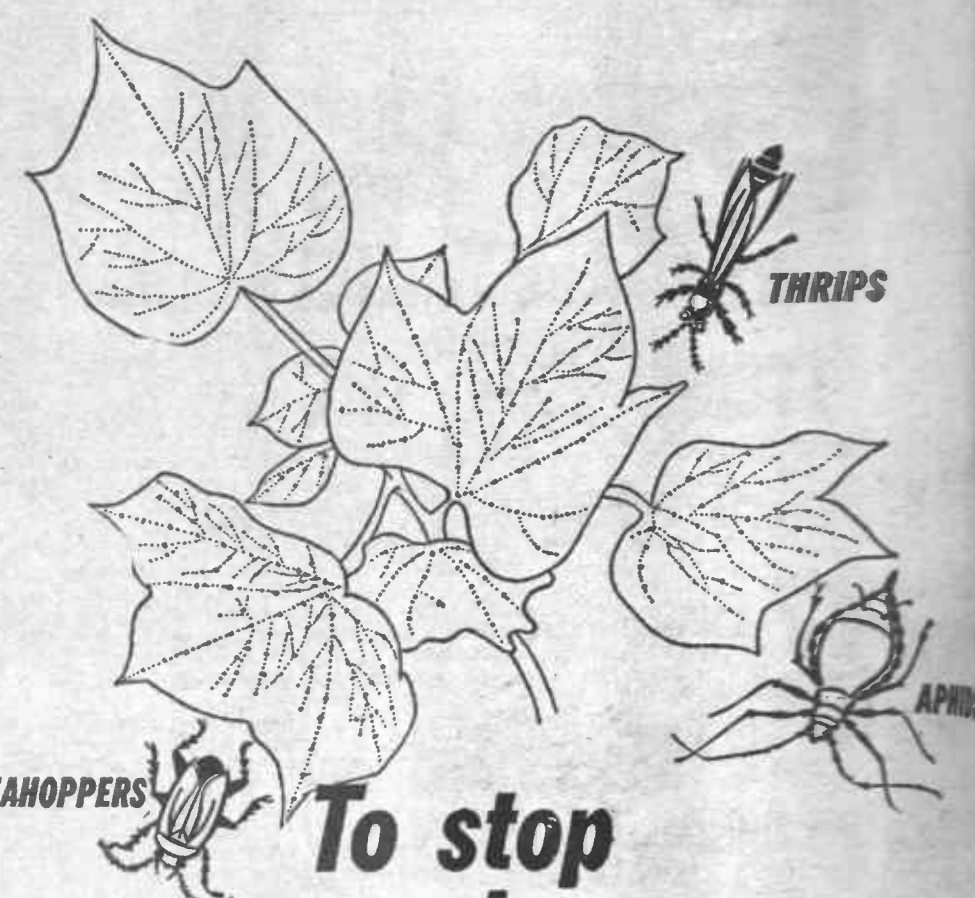

TIME TO TALK FREEDOM

What's happening to patriotism in this country? It's a question every American ought to ask himself. Senator Harry Goldwater of Arizona recently said that there is a sign on the West Point parade grounds: "When the flag passes, gentlemen will remove their hats." Watch the average parade, said the senator, and see how many hats you see still on when the flag goes by. "You ought to walk up and knock them off," he said.

The senator's point was that Americans should be more aggressive about their patriotism. We should be proud to stand up for our country, its institutions and its way of life. The flag is not a partisan matter; it has nothing to do with the Republican party or the Democratic party. It is a symbol of, and a mark of respect for, the philosophy of freedom under which this nation was founded.

How many buildings have flagpoles? How many companies show the flag on national days? How about this great country of ours and its freedoms? The lack of aggressive patriotism, said Senator Goldwater, may be a sign that we may be further down the road to socialism than we like to think. The proletarians and the welfare

statists have so derided this republic, the constitution, states rights and other glorious features of the United States that many Americans don't fight back in conversation.

Senator Goldwater, who is a department store owner in private life, charges that many American businessmen have been subjected to so much "liberal" propaganda that they are beaten down. "I watch them come to the halls of Congress," said the senator, "and testify before our committees as whipped dogs." Speaking sternly to businessmen, he said: "You businessmen have made America and will keep making it, but not when you are cowards."

"You are in business to make a dollar. Don't be ashamed of it. The free enterprise system is the only vehicle that can provide profit and can provide jobs for millions and millions of American workers."

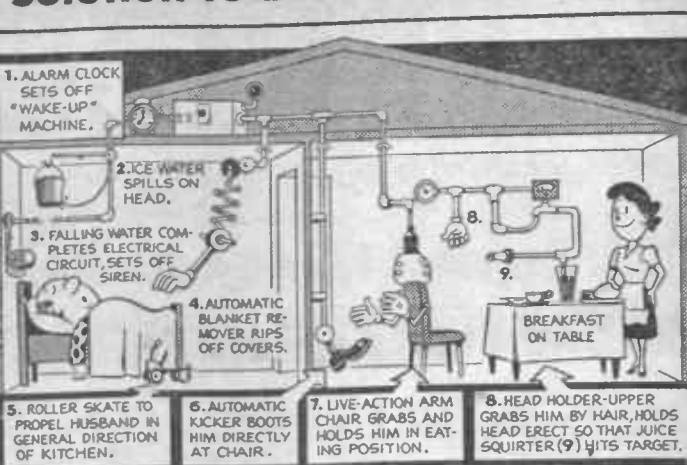

Breakfast, according to those diet authorities, should supply about one-fourth to one-third of the daily food requirements. They point out that the "let's skip breakfast" people prove to be less alert, less efficient and more susceptible to fatigue than those who eat a good morning meal.

The human body is so constructed that for maximum health it requires fairly even intakes of food at regular intervals. You can't make up for the lack of a good breakfast.

People who are troubled in holding the right weight should eat a good breakfast. If they neglect breakfast they may eat too hearty a lunch or dinner. And they just might have a snack or two between meals.

What constitutes a good breakfast? The foods essential to the day's first meal include fruit or fruit juice, cereal, milk or other beverage, and several slices of toast. Eggs and breakfast meat frequently should be included.

These foods are necessary both for children and adults. They supply the nutrients essential for the physical and mental stimulus for work—and play.

Millions In Hospital Construction In Just Ten Years

Hospital construction costs in Mississippi have topped \$40,000,000 during the last decade though an additional \$9,634,066 is listed as "current construction." That figure does not include, however, the proposed construction of an \$11,300,000 new Veterans Administration Hospital of Jackson. Bids are at present being called for on this project. Almost every citizen of Mississippi is now within twenty-five miles of a community hospital. Of the 82 counties in Mississippi, only eight counties are without hospitals.

Mississippi Has Thirteen State Parks

There are exactly thirteen Mississippi State Parks that promise to welcome a person for any occasion. Swimming, boating, fishing, group camping, hiking, tennis, soft ball, water skiing, relaxation, or just plain picnicking is available for all ages. These parks are literally spread across the state.

450 Stock Ponds Built In Warren

A total of 450 livestock ponds have been constructed in Warren County since 1940. The construction of these ponds has been a popular and effective conservation practice. The construction of a dam in a particular section will retard erosion and permit a more even distribution of grazing over pasture land, thereby retaining a satisfactory cover of grass and legumes.

Summer Crop Set At Lorman

Farmers in the Lorman community of Jefferson County will have a new crop this season. Approximately 200 acres of cucumbers and pickles will be planted. This will be a supplementary crop maturing before the cotton crop. It is believed that this additional crop will provide an in-between revenue so that the farmers in the area will have a better diversification program.

State's Lumber Supplies Much Industry

With 54 per cent of all Mississippi's land in forests, lumbering and its related fields compose a major industry of the State. There is a wide diversification of many lumbering industries—from saw mills to millwork plants. There are more than 1150 plants in the State using raw materials that come from the forests. Of the timber, 54 per cent is pine and 46 per cent is hardwood. Nearly 90 per

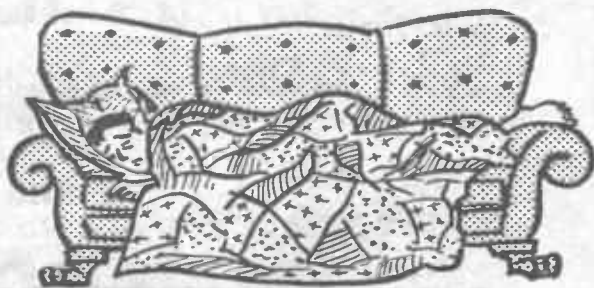

Unemployment Sharp Decrease In

Unemployment in Mississippi in March of this year, as reflected by claims for unemployment insurance, showed a sharp decrease of 32% from the March 1958 level and a somewhat slighter decrease (8%) from that of March 1957. Mark Huff, Executive Director of the Mississippi Employment Security Commission announced today. Chiefly responsible for the decline was the improvement in weather conditions (as compared with those of March 1958), which permitted work in construction, lumber, and Agricultural activities.

Approximately one-fifth of the average of 16,402 persons filing claims for works of unemployment in March 1959 had become unemployed in other states and returned to their homes in Mississippi to file claims against the state in which they had lost their jobs. Such claimants represented a high-

er percentage of total claimants this March than for March of the two preceding years, the 20 per cent in March 1959 comparing with 18 per cent for March 1958 and 14 per cent for March 1957. The March 1959 unemployment average showed a better-than-usual decrease from February, dropping by 16 per cent this year as compared with decreases of 4 per cent for February-March 1958 and 1957. A total of \$1,303,093 in unemployment insurance benefits was paid in March, bringing the total for the first three months of 1959 to \$3,710,638. For the first three months of 1958, \$4,840,835 was paid and for the first three months of 1957 benefits totaled \$3,549,679.

Variable Annuities

A recent Supreme Court decision placing companies that issue a relatively new form of annuity insurance under the Securities and Exchange Commission affords added protection to those who invest in order to provide income in their later years.

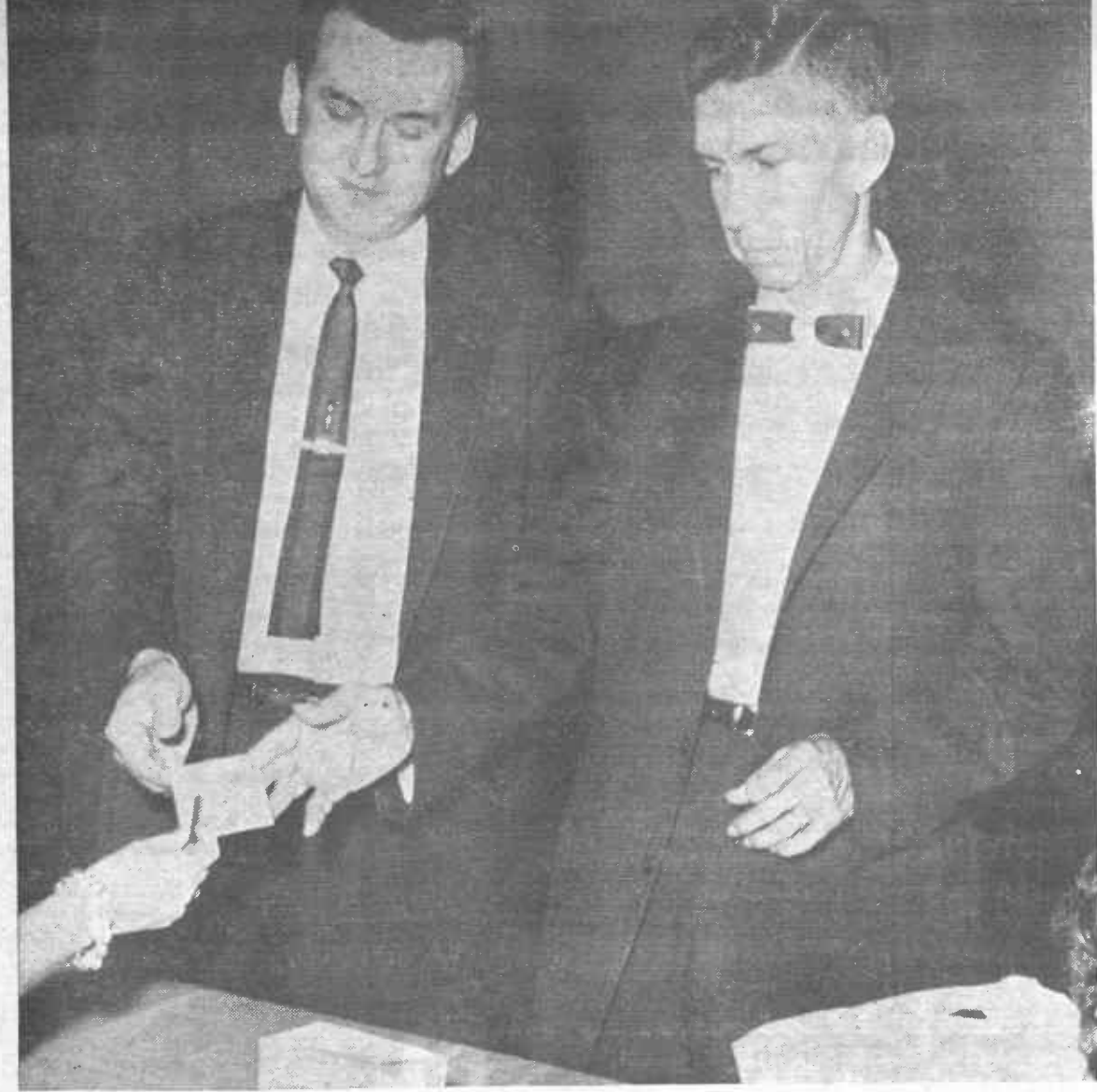
The decision applies only to Variable Annuities, so called because the income from such annuities varies with changes in the purchasing power of the dollar. They protect the holder against inflation that would reduce the buying power of his income from the annuity.

Through a regular annuity, you can purchase a fixed income for life. For example, a man aged 65 can pay \$10,000 to a life insurance company and receive \$783.30 a year for as long as he lives. The payment remains the same regardless of the purchasing power of the dollar.

Under the Variable Annuity plan the dollar amount of the annuity fluctuates up and down in accordance with the market value of the stocks in which the annuity company has invested its reserve funds. When stock prices rise the annuity increases, and when they decline the annuity does also.

Decision Ends Dispute
The S.E.C. claimed that a variable annuity is not life insurance but is essentially a security and that companies issuing the new form of annuity should be regulated by it under powers granted it by Congress.

The companies issuing variable annuities claim that these are life

insurance contracts, the same as a fixed annuity, and therefore should be regulated by the state laws that govern life insurance. State laws covering life insurance vary from state to state.

The life insurance field is one in which I worked full time from 1912 to 1938. During the last seven years of that period I wrote more life insurance each year than anyone else in the world. Based upon this experience, I believe the decision to place the companies which issue variable annuities under S.E.C. regulation will be helpful to all those who purchase such annuities.

Regulatory Agencies
Two divisions of the S.E.C. will

supervise the companies effected by the court decision. They must register with the Corporate Finance Division, and they will be regulated by the Division of Corporate Regulation.

Mr. Harry Heller, Assistant Director of the Corporate Finance Division, has been with the S.E.C. for more than 20 years and is well qualified to see that complete information regarding the issuing com-

panies is available to all purchasers of variable annuities.

My experience indicates that the purchasers to variable annuities will be much better informed than the average purchaser of a life insurance policy.

Mr. Lawrence Green, Assistant Director of the Division of Corporate Regulation, has also had more than 20 years experience with the S.E.C., and has made an outstanding record in regulating investment trusts, often called "Mutual Funds."

Largely because of the record of these men, I was pleased when the Supreme Court decided that companies issuing variable annuities must be registered with, and regulated by, the S.E.C.

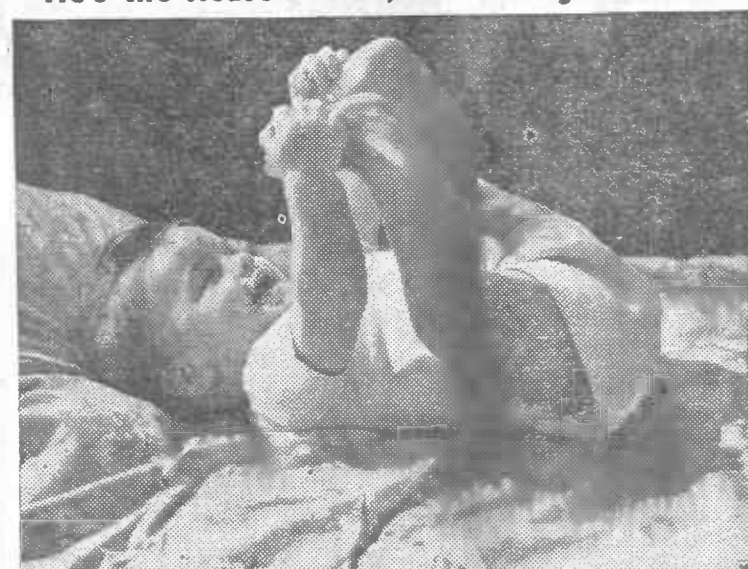

For the first year or so of a baby's life he uses so many diapers per day that his mother can be forgiven for thinking she is chained to the washing machine. It is loving bondage to be sure, but she can make it a lighter one.

As soon as baby is changed, wet diapers should be placed in a covered enamel pail containing a tablespoon of fabric-safe chlorine bleach beads to a gallon of water. Soiled diapers should be held in the toilet bowl and flushed clean and then added to the pail. This immersion starts diapers on the

road to stainless cleanliness and serves as a gentle deodorant too. For the thorough washing that diapers require use hot water and a detergent that is suitable for baby clothes as well as safe bleach beads in amounts recommended on the package. This gives you a solution that cleans effectively but with complete fabric safety.

The last step is thorough rinsing, three warm rinses to remove every bit of detergent and bleach. Never iron diapers. They are softer and more absorbent if they are just hand-smoothed before folding

He reminds that Patrolmen have the authority to arrest wrongdoers observed in the act of committing such thefts. Also, the value of some green finery runs well in excess of \$25.00, the point of no-return petty and grand larceny.

One civic group reports having borrowed considerable monies to buy shrubbery, and then having worked in sub-freezing weather to set out their plants along the highway through their city, only to have several of the more attractive shrubs stolen. This isn't playing the game according to Hoyle, they feel, and the Highway Patrol and Chief Hood agree.

Persons observed wrongfully removing shrubs from highway rights-of-way risk arrest and prosecution, Chief Hood warns.

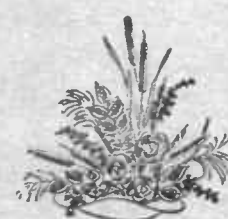
Motorists are also reminded of Mississippi's anti-litter law making conviction for littering the highway punishable by a fine up to \$50.00.

He states that acts of highway beautification are quite widespread, and Highway Department has complaints similar to those received by the Patrol.

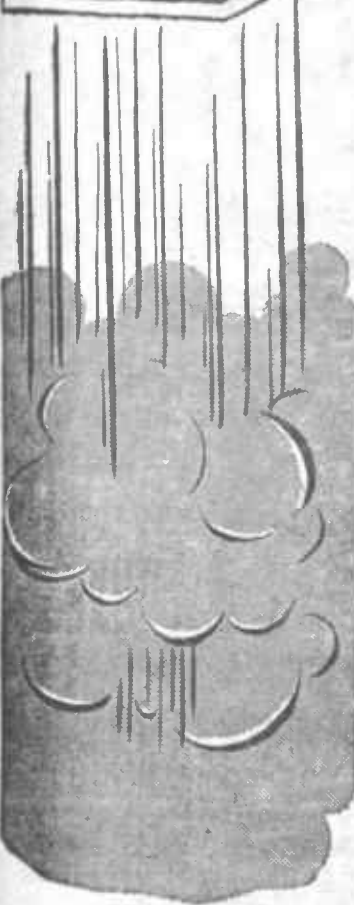

Hydrological Installations In Yellow Creek Watershed

Paul Allen, Jr., chairman of the Yellow Creek watershed Authority, states that preparations for the collection of rainfall, streamflow, and sediment information in the Yellow Creek watershed of Tishomingo, Alcorn, and Prentiss Counties have been started by TVA. On April 9 a party of engineers from the Authority's Hydraulic Data Branch moved into the area to begin installing stream gaging stations on the main creek and its tributaries and rainfall gauges over the whole watershed.

These installations are part of a study of the watershed that is to be carried out by the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority through its board composed of L. Paul Allen, Jr. of Belmont, W. J. Pyle of Iuka, and James Walker of Rienzi. The State of Mississippi and the TVA will assist in the study. The general objective of the hydrologic portion of the study is to develop information useful in establishing the problems with respect to floods on the creek and its tributaries and arriving at solutions to these problems that might be suggested to the landowners.

Residents of the Doskie vicinity are familiar with the measurements of the flow of Yellow Creek that TVA engineers have been making since 1937 at the Moser Bridge, where the drainage area is 143 square miles. Arnold Hammer of Doskie has often assisted them in the work there. Gauges similar to the one at Moser Bridge are being installed at seven other locations. Two of these are on Yellow Creek near Burnsville and near Cairo. Others are on Little Yellow Creek, Berea Creek, Coke Creek, Caney Creek, Cold Mill Creek, and Walker Switch Branch. With these gauges the TVA can maintain a continuous measurement of the

amount of water in each stream and particularly of flood discharges and the frequency of flood occurrences.

Twenty-three rain gauges will be located over the watershed to measure the rain that falls on each tributary basin. Two such gauges are already in the area. One has been at the Burnsville TVA substation since 1939; the other has been on the J. A. Coker farm since 1950. Six of the new gauges will record rainfall automatically on a chart. The others will be observed every day by residents of the Yellow Creek watershed under contract with TVA.

HOME AGENT NOTES

We've had several warm spells, when it seemed time to put blankets away. And then it turned cold again.

But the time for storing blankets for the summer is sure to be here soon.

Whether your blanket is cotton, wool, electric or not, the first thing is to be sure it is thoroughly clean. Then fold it loosely. Place loosely in box with a generous amount of naphthalene or paradichlorobenzene crystals between the folds. It takes from 1 to 3 ounces for each blanket.

Wrap each box in heavy paper and seal the edges to make them airtight.

This method of packing will preserve the fluffiness of the blankets and protect them from moth attack. If you pack your blankets down too tightly, they may lose some of their resiliency with a possible sacrifice of their warmth giving qualities.

Keep Liver Quality
One of the requirements for ser-

ving top-quality liver is keep it only a short time before use. Fresh liver is somewhat more perishable than other meats and should be used within a day or two after you buy it.

Remember to store liver in the coldest part of your refrigerator. Put it in a place where the temperature is as low as possible without actually freezing the meat.

Do not wash liver before you store it. It will keep better if its surface is not damp. A little drying on the surface keeps bacteria from growing as quickly.

Plentiful Foods
With warmer May weather we begin to move some of our cooking outdoors to the broiler and barbecue grill. And what is better than either broiled or barbecued chicken? You can almost smell it cooking, can't you?

Broiler-fryer chickens are topping the list of plentiful foods for May. Watch for good buys and the first warm evening treat your family and maybe some friends, too, to some of your special outdoor cooked chicken.

Don't think it has to be cooked outdoors. Everybody likes fried chicken or oven-broiled or barbecued chicken, too.

For some suggestions on sauces and grills and outdoor cooking, ask at the home agent's office for a copy of Extension Publication 351, "Barbecuing Mississippi Broilers."

Other plentiful foods for the month include eggs, pork, lamb, turkeys, celery, potatoes, milk and dairy products and vegetable fats and oils.

Room Size Rugs. For a well furnished effect, the rug should come to within 8 inches of the wall in a small room; 12 inches in a large room.
