44% Increase In Iuka Business

The monthly publication of the
Business Research Station at Mis-
sissippi State University showed
that district activity varied from
a 44 per cent increase at Iuka to
an 11 per cent increase at Boone-
ville.

General business activity in the
Corinth district during March
showed a 27 per cent increase over
the corresponding month in 1958,
according to the recent issue of
"The Mississippi Business Review."

Corinth showed a 26 per cent
increase and Ripley had a 14 per
cent increase.

The district as a whole stood at
178 per cent of the 1947-49 aver-
age recorded on the station's index.
By the same standard Corinth had
a 163 per cent; Iuka, 253 per cent;
and Ripley, 192 per cent.

YELLOW CREEK FOREST SURVEY IN PROGRESS

Three Men Will Be Employed Two Months Sampling 225 5th-Acre Plots

A forest resource survey of Yel-
low Creek Watershed was started
Monday, May 4. L. P. Allen, Jr.,
Chairman of the Yellow Creek
Watershed Authority, announces.
Speaking for the Authority's Board
of Directors, which includes James
Walker of Rienzi and William J.
Pyle of Iuka, Mr. Allen said the
survey would be made by TVA
under the Board's cooperative

agreement with that agency.
The TVA foresters who are col-
lecting the field data are William
Buckley, Ralph Carden, and Rob-
ert Drexler. The Yellow Creek
survey is similar to TVA surveys
completed in 65 counties and six
other small watersheds in the
Tennessee Valley.

Mr. Allen said the survey team
will be in the watershed about two
months taking measurements and
collecting data on about 225 fifth-
acre plots. This random sample
will provide the Yellow
Creek Watershed Board rea-
sonably accurate and up-to-
date information on the forests of
the watershed, including data on
forest area, timber volumes, and
stand conditions.

Estimates made by TVA about
five years ago indicate that about
80,000 acres of the watershed's
127,000 acres were forested at that
time. When the present survey is
completed, comparisons will be
made with previous surveys to de-
termine changes that have taken
place and predict future trends.

This survey is part of the Yel-
low Creek Watershed Board's plan
to obtain basic data on current
land use, land and water problems,
and opportunities for future de-
velopment of these resources in
the watershed.

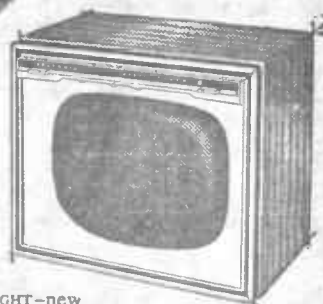

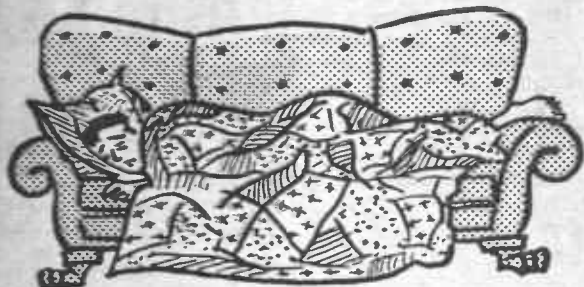

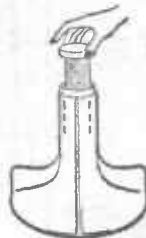

Soon The Label Will Tell Us
Is this material all cotton? Or is it part man-made fiber? If it is wool, is it all wool? How can we tell?

Right now we can't determine the fiber content of most fabrics. We look at it, we feel it, we ask the sales person, and, sometimes, we look at the label. But usually we buy it or not, never knowing for sure.

Beginning in March 1960, we will know. The Textile Fiber Identification Act, which will then become effective, requires the manufacturer to tell you, the consumer, what kinds of fibers are present in most textile products.

Each fiber that makes up five percent or more of the weight of a product must be named on the tag or label. And the label must tell what percent of the total each fiber is. The fibers must be listed in decreasing order, the highest percentage being given first. For example, a blanket label may read—90% cotton, 10% wool.

Fibers making up less than 5 per cent of total weight must be listed as "other fibers."

The Fiber Identification Act applies to wearing apparel, yard goods, draperies, floor coverings, furnishings, bedding and other household textile goods, reused stuffing in upholstered furniture, mattresses and cushions, and other wool products not already covered by the Wool Products Labeling Act, which has been in force since 1933.

The act will not cover sewing thread, upholstery fabrics, outer coverings of mattresses and box springs, linings or interlinings used primarily for structural purposes, rug pads, trimmings, textiles in shoes, overshoes, and head-

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wear or new upholstery stuffing.

Don't Feed The Garbage Can

Is your garbage can a heavy eater? How much does it cost to feed it for a year?

The average American feeds 225 pounds of food a year to the garbage can, according to recent studies. That's two-thirds of a pound a day.

For a family of five that would add up to 3 1/3 pounds a day or 1,125 pounds a year. At the low rate of 25 cents a pound, this means a family of five pays \$281 for groceries they do not eat.

The four most common causes for food waste in the home are:

1. Lack of good planning and buying, which can result in overbuying
2. Poor preparation and serving of food
3. Poor use of leftovers
4. Improper preservation and storage

Control Poultry Pests

Poultry Lice feed on hairs, skin and feathers of the birds. These and other pests like mites and "stick-tight" fleas" weaken the birds, cause them to drop off in egg production and lower meat gain.

Roost paints made with lindane, malathion or nicotine sulphate will control poultry lice; or use sprays and dusts directly on the birds made from: spray, malathion; dusts, rotenone. You can use the pinch method of applying sodium fluoride.

Litter sprays for controlling lice can be made from malathion or lindane. For litter dust use 5 percent malathion.

The "stick tight" fleas can be controlled with malathion. Control mites by spraying or dusting walls, roosts and litter. For sprays use lindane or malathion; for dusts use 5 per cent malathion or sulphur dust.

Caution. Do not apply lindane directly to birds. Avoid getting any insecticides in feed or water.

Cotton News

Since a good number of farmers are using chemical weed control (pre-emerge) on cotton this year, here are a few points to remember in case a stand is not ob-

tained at the first planting:

1. Do not pre-emerge the second planting. Drag off the top inch of soil on old bed. This operation removes chemical as well as grass and weed seed not germinated.
2. Rain following the use of pre-emergence materials Karmex D L (Diuron) and CIPC is necessary for best results. The grass germinates, comes up, and the tender roots absorb the chemical, then the plants die.

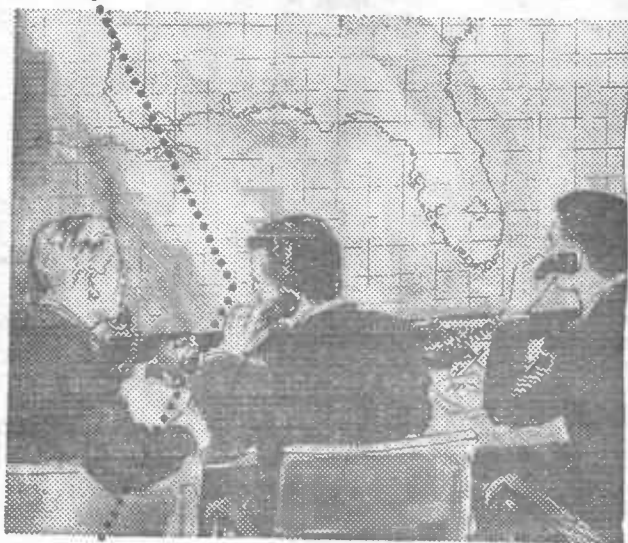

Naval Air Reserve Offers Special Training Program

Mid-South high school students between the ages of 17 and 18½ are now being offered the opportunity of a paid summer vacation, with a part-time job included, by taking advantage of the Naval Air Reserve's Accelerated Training Program.

The program, to get underway June 8th at the Memphis Naval Air Reserve Training Unit, will consist of 85-days of active duty as a member of the Naval Air Reserve. During the period of training trainees will receive basic recruit training which include instruction in seamanship, first aid, military drill, aviation indoctrination training, personal hygiene, and a full program of competitive sports.

In addition to the excellent training participants will receive food lodging, medical care, uniforms, and pay of approximately \$78.00 per month.

The Accelerated Training Program, conducted for the 11th consecutive year at the Memphis Unit and Naval Air Reserve activities throughout the United States, is designed to afford youths between the ages of 17 and 18½ who face certain military obligations under Selective Service an opportunity to start meeting that obligation while remaining at home in a civilian status through membership in the Naval Air Reserve.

Upon successful completion of the 85-day program in early September, trainees will be fully qualified for promotion to the rating of Airman and will be returned to civilian status to continue their military obligation as "Weekend Warriors." As such the trainees will be assigned to one of the Memphis based Naval Reserve Aviation Squadrons and drill one weekend each month with pay.

As required under Selective Service non-veteran Naval Air Reservists will be required to serve a two-year tour of active duty with the Regular Fleet within a six-year period.

Full particulars on the Naval

Air Reserve Accelerated Training Program may be obtained by visiting the Recruiting Office at the Memphis Naval Air Reserve Training Unit (located 14 miles North of Memphis at Millington, Tenn.) Qualified personnel will be on duty Wednesdays through Sundays from 8 A.M. to 4 P.M. Inquiries from parents are especially invited. Applications will be taken for this selected program through May 20th.

Modern Highways Lace Mississippi

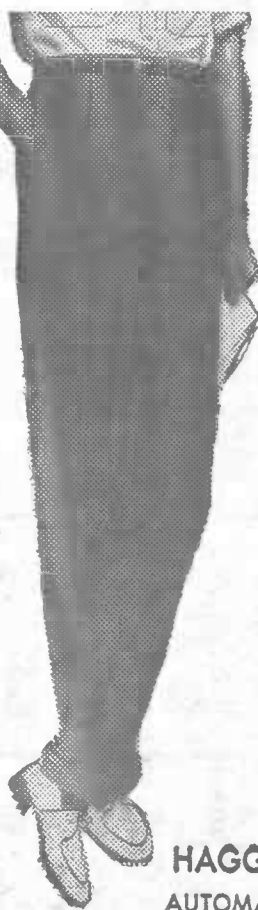
Paper Industries

Study Use Of Antibiotics For Hens In Cages

State College, Miss.—Caged layers don't need high levels of antibiotics continuously, Mississippi researchers have concluded after two years of testing involving large numbers of birds.

Commercial operators should probably limit high-level antibiotics, even on intermittent basis, to cold weather or other stress periods such as might be caused by disease or extremely high temperature. This is the opinion of Dr. Charles H. Thomas and his associates.

However, Dr. Thomas expects to continue a study of the antibiotics question. It is difficult to know when low level infections are present in laying flocks or to foresee certain stress periods. For these reasons, poultrymen need to know more about the most desirable method and economical level of antibiotics to use.

Two locations were used in the Mississippi tests. At State College 420 White Leghorn pullets were used in a study of seven dietary rations. Almost 1900 birds were involved in the tests at the Black Belt Branch Experiment Station at Brooksville, Mississippi. Here half the hens received terramycin and zinc bacitracin 4 days month to test the value of intermittent treatments.

A complete report of this experiment is published in the April issue of Mississippi Farm Research. The authors are Dr. Thomas and Dr. E. J. Day of the poultry department staff at Mississippi State University, and Louie Walton, superintendent of the Black Belt Branch Station at Brooksville. The report may be obtained from the

Agricultural Experiment Station at State College, Mississippi.
