FOREIGN POLICY AND FREEDOM

The possibility of a summit meeting this summer is proper cause for Americans to do some thinking about the Constitution and U. S. foreign policy.

A summit meeting has long been an objective of the Soviet Union. The President, realizing the propaganda purposes to which the Reds may put such a meeting, has wisely resisted a hasty gathering. But there are pressures at home and abroad for him to sit down at the conference table with Nikita Khrushchev of Russia.

A summit meeting is dangerous not simply because totalitarian Russia, operating in an unscrupulous manner, can change its signals at any time for the purpose of getting maximum favorable publicity, but for other reasons. A summit meeting is properly a de-

vice for governments that possess total authority over their subjects. The United States government has no such authority over free citizens.

A summit meeting suggests centralization of political power that is unbecoming a free republic. In fact, the U. S. Constitution specifically prohibits the centralization of power. The 10th Amendment flatly states: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

It is profoundly wrong for the President of the United States ever to be put in the position where he must commit the country absolutely to any major change of course. Absolute powers

aren't vested in the president or the Secretary of State. Treaties must be ratified by the U. S. Senate. The entire Congress must provide the money to carry out a particular foreign policy. In the last resort, only Congress has the right to declare war. Unlike Russia, public opinion in the United States must be taken into account.

It was no accident that the founding fathers divided power in this manner. They wanted to deprive the head of state of the absolute power of a monarch. They knew that only by such separation of powers could the blessings of liberty be secured "to ourselves and our posterity," as the preamble to the Constitution promises.

President Eisenhower has shown no inclination to engage in the kind of secret diplomacy that some past leaders have indulged in. But the big government advocates always are interested in getting the U. S. government into behavior patterns that set precedents for the future. There are many "liberals" who welcome high level secret negotiations by a handful of government officials.

It also is well for Americans to remember that there is much that is secret in our foreign policy. The Central Intelligence Agency receives tremendous sums from Congress. Only a small group of legislators are given any idea as to how these funds are spent. The general public has no idea whatsoever as to the thinking of the people who staff the CIA. Are they devoted to the conservative principles of the Republic? Or are they for "liberalism"? All we know is that the CIA operates in the deepest secrecy.

The sound instincts of the American people tell them that secrecy and negotiation by a handful of officials are customs that must be minimized, not increased. They know that Congress must not become a rubber stamp for any executive. The people themselves must have a part in national de-

Safety Education Should Begin Before Driving Says Commissioner Scarbrough

The final answer to Mississippi's growing traffic accident dilemma may well rest with the teenager and the degree and quality of safety education which he receives before driving.

According to Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough, safety education should begin long before a person gets behind the wheel of a car, and should occupy as prominent a position as mathematics in every school curriculum. Although math has never killed a student yet, unsafe driving practices have.

And the best way to teach a youngster to drive properly is through a sound driver education program in the school, climaxing a coordinated safety education program begun as far back as elementary grades.

Commissioner Scarbrough points out that now is a good time for schools not offering driver education to start planning a program for this fall. Summer classes for education instructors are offered by Delta State Teachers College, Mississippi Southern College, Mississippi State University, Mississippi College, and the University of

Mississippi. "Young drivers should be trained by a professional driving instructor who has himself been properly trained and accredited," Commissioner Scarbrough states.

The Highway Patrol, in addressing before civic and school parent-teachers' organizations, has repeatedly called for driver education in all schools, pointing out that few teenagers taught under driver programs are involved in Mississippi traffic accidents.

Presently, only an estimated 25 per cent of Mississippi school students are reached by driver education. According to the state Department of Education, only 128

schools, some of which have driver education in the school curriculum, have more than 100 of these schools.

In many instances, agencies have furnished education vehicles for a portable program; however, officials feel that even if the vehicles had been purchased at this price for safety high. Driver education is annually offered, wishing driver education.

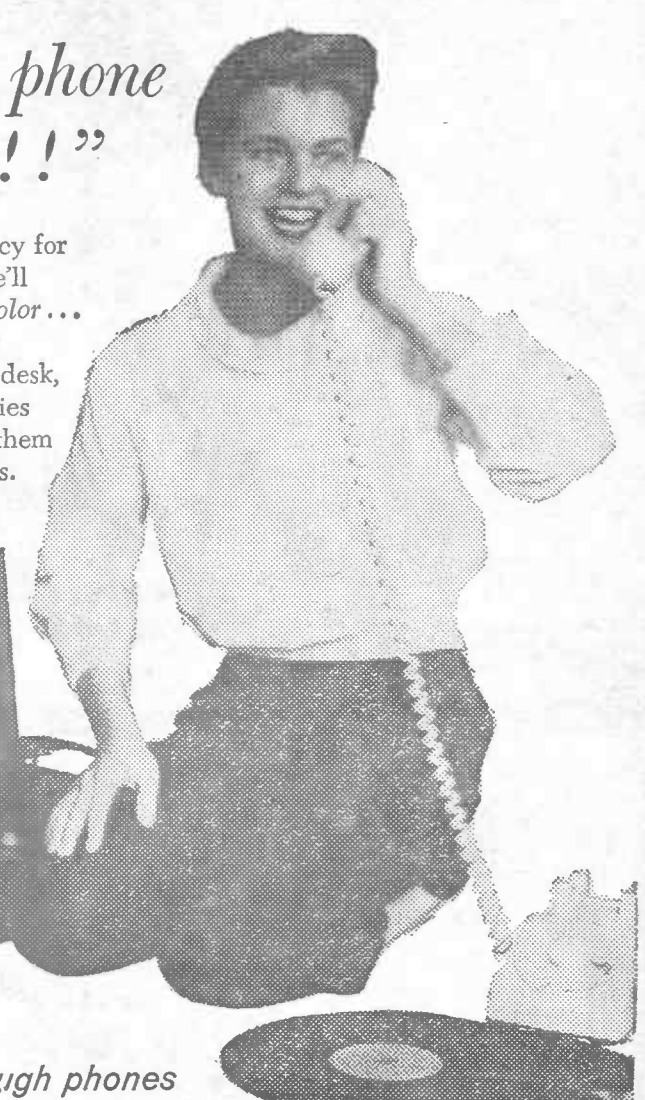

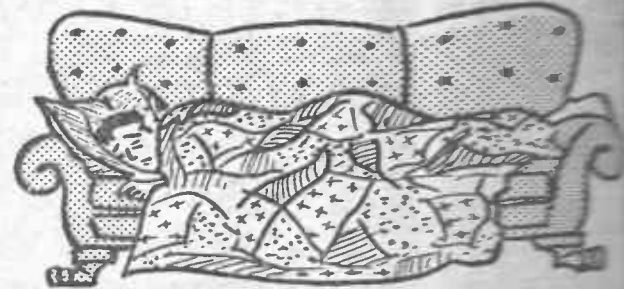

Insurance Head Asks Re-election

HOME AGENT NOTES

How long can I expect my electric refrigerator to last? My electric range? My gas range? Or my washing machine?

This question often comes up in planning family budgets. Maybe some of your appliances haven't lasted as long as you thought they should.

A recent study by the U.S.D.A. on length of ownership of these appliances from all over the United States now gives us an idea of what to expect.

Here's how often pieces are replaced because the old ones are worn out or people want a more up-to-date model:

Electric refrigerator—15 years
Electric range—15 years
Gas range—15 years
Washing Machine (all types)—9 years
Practices of buying and discarding.

ing may change as economic conditions change. A change in living conditions may make a difference, too. And our habits in buying may change if different kinds and amounts of equipment appear on the market.

Save the Seasoning. Don't wash your cast iron utensils with a synthetic detergent. It removes all the seasoning (absorbed grease), causing them to stick or rust. Only soap will protect the seasoning. Shell Color Doesn't Count

Read the label on the carton to see the grade and the size of eggs you are buying. Shell color is no indication of the flavor, food value or cooking problems.

If there is any difference in price of brown or mixed colored eggs and white eggs, the "economy" buy is the one with the lower price tag.

Barbecued Giblets
Next time you're barbecuing chicken, don't leave the gizzard, liver and heart for later use. Barbecue them, too.

Simmer the giblets first for about 10 minutes in slightly salted water. Then half or quarter them and thread the pieces along with the heart and liver on small metal skewers. Place the giblets over the barbecue flame about 10 to 15 minutes before serving time. They make excellent hors d'oeuvres.

SS Cards A Must For Work

"Get your Social Security card now", is the advice of Hugh D. Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo Social Security District Office, to June graduates and students who plan to start working this summer. "One of the first things your employer will ask to see is your Social Security card," he added. "Get off to a good start on your very first job by having your card ready."

The Social Security number is the key to protection under the Social Security program. The employer must have a record of each employee's number in order to file proper tax returns with the Internal Revenue Service. This in turn enables the Social Security Administration to give proper credit to each employee's account. Benefits for employees and their families are based upon these credits.

Social Security cards are issued only by the Social Security offices. However, application forms can be obtained at any Post Office. Those who have had cards but lost them should request a duplicate card. June brides, and others who have

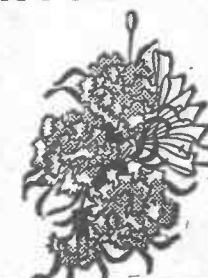

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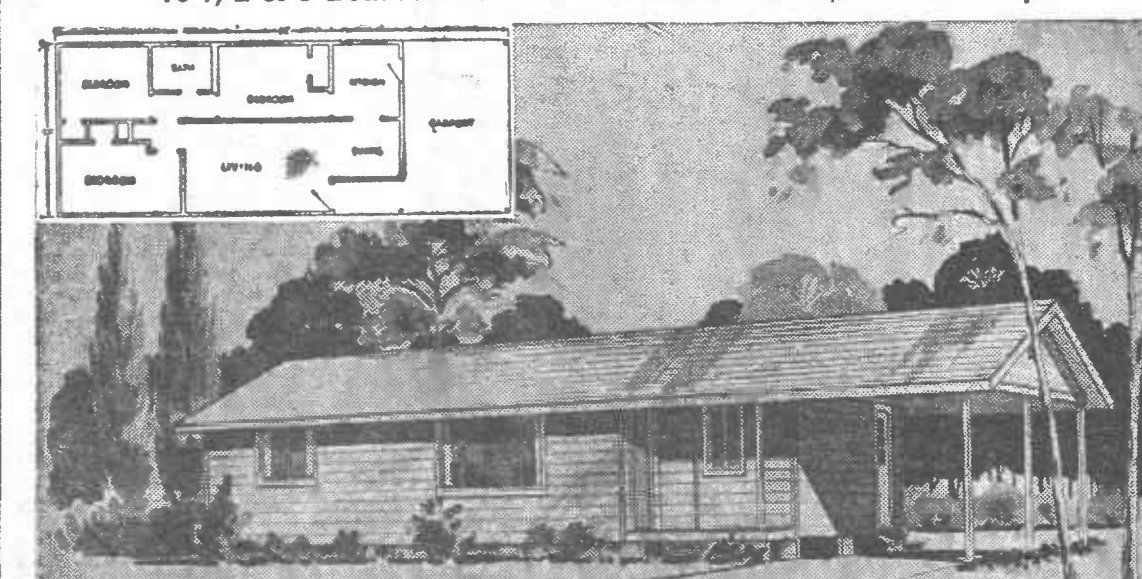

More People Suffer From Mental Illness Than All Other Diseases

Mental illness presents a tragic contradiction. No group of illnesses has a potentially higher rate of recovery. Most mental illness can be cured.

In spite of this proved fact, however, mental illness continues to be the nation's Number One health problem. The result is needless suffering, needless waste of tax dollars, and needless waste of human lives.

Most people do not realize the extent of mental illness because they think of it only as "insanity". Actually, mental illness is very common. It can be as serious as cancer or as mild as a cold. All of us have occasional emotional reactions which affect our happiness, reduce our efficiency or cripple our ability to get along with people.

More than half of all of the hospital beds in America are filled with mental patients. That is, more people are in hospitals for mental illness than for polio, cancer, heart disease, tuberculosis and all other diseases combined. Personality disorders were the largest single cause of manpower loss during World War II. They were the reason for more than half of all the discharges from military service.

Other figures indicate the size of the problem. It is estimated that about 17,000,000 Americans (1 in 10) are suffering from a mental or emotional disorder requiring psychiatric treatment. On any one day of the year there are 750,000 patients in our mental institutions. Over 1,000,000 patients

are treated in the course of a year in our mental hospitals. In addition, it is estimated that 1,500,000 are seen by private psychiatrists.

In Mississippi over 6,000 mental patients are hospitalized with about 3,500 new patients being admitted every year. An estimated 200,000 Mississippians are mentally or emotionally disturbed. One out of ten babies born in Mississippi will spend some part of their lives as a hospitalized mental patient.

Today over \$1,230,000,000 is spent each year in tax funds to care for mental patients. It is estimated that over 1,500,000 working years of life are lost each year by new patients admitted to our mental hospitals. This amounts to \$3,000,000,000 in potential net earnings for each group of patients admitted each year.

How well are we equipped to handle this problem in Mississippi? A study of the conditions at Whitfield will give us the answer. To care for the 4,100 patients there we have only 5 psychiatrists or about 1 psychiatrist per 800 patients. To feed, clothe, and care for these patients the hospital is given \$1.35 per patient per day. We have no facilities in Mississippi for the emotionally disturbed child and only 5 of our general hospitals will accept mental patients.

Is there anything we can do about this problem? The state of Kansas has provided us with an answer. It was one of the first states to have an active organization like the mental health Association. Now 80 per cent of their mentally ill patients return home within one year cured. If we are going to make any real change in the status of Mental health, many of us will have to be more psychologically mature and more social-minded. If you wish to do something about mental health, you can go to work immediately in your community.

In The News

By Congressman Abernethy

Here it is the middle of May and the achievement chart shows less progress on major legislation than at any time in years. Many are already trying to hang around the neck of the 86th Congress the tag which Harry Truman so unceremoniously knotted over the Adam's Apple of that "old good-for-nothing-do-nothing" Republican 80th Congress" as he called it.

But the progress chart may very well be deceiving. Prospects of a good job being done are much, much brighter than that predicted following last year's election. Tagged early as a liberally dominated group which would race the nation toward radical programs, wild spending, higher deficits and extreme socialism, it has come as a great and happy surprise to many that the predictions are just not holding up. Indeed, the possibility still exists and the spark which feeds it continues to glow; but it isn't being fueled to the point of ignition. When adjournment comes

the entire country, except for the extreme liberal fringe, might well be proud and pleased with the product fashioned by this Congress. At least, we are hopeful.

The President as the nation's leader always wields great influence over the people. This is true irrespective of his party affiliation. When he speaks all take notice. Last fall the President began to speak out more and more about the dangers of inflation, high taxes, and high spending. In years past he had been tagged with the dubious distinction of submitting the highest peacetime budgets of any President in all history, which was true. He was being needed for delegating too much authority to his White House advisory staff.

Numerous widely read publications featured articles depicting Sherman Adams as the real "Mr. President." All of these plus the ignominious defeat suffered by his party in the elections either inspired or nettled him into assuming more of a personal role. His newly assumed stand has paid dividends. The caution sign has gone up in every Congressional committee room on Capitol Hill. And, it is being observed.

It is being emphasized over and over that our government will spend during this fiscal year about \$81 for every \$68 of income—a sort of fiscal policy which leads to only one place, the poor house. Democrats boast of the fact that they for the past two years reduced Eisenhower's spending recommendations. They did, but this was not enough. As things shape up for the next fiscal year another deficit is in sight.

United States bonds are proving harder to sell. The proud, great, wondrous United States of America, leader of the world with its great source of revenue, is now forced to pay a higher rate of interest for its borrowed money than is the average municipality with its limited source of revenue. The great, proud, wondrous United States of America has propelled itself into the position of owing more money than all nations of the earth combined. The debt grows with each passing year.

The situation presents only one choice: Stop borrowing and balance expenditures with income or start the presses to printing more money. The latter means more inflation, more debt, higher cost of living, and eventual destruction of that in which we as Americans

pride ourselves—the hard of living in the world. The nation is unbalanced. The view is growing that government finances must be under control. Victory is needed but if the present it will be.

To be sure, wild programs will yet emerge from their ugly heads before the end. But their running full length legislative gauntlet is a

Thus the appearance of another "do-nothing" might well be only a sign of moving slowly, to be encouraged that it is safe. If a better year is done by Congress all year, then let it be.

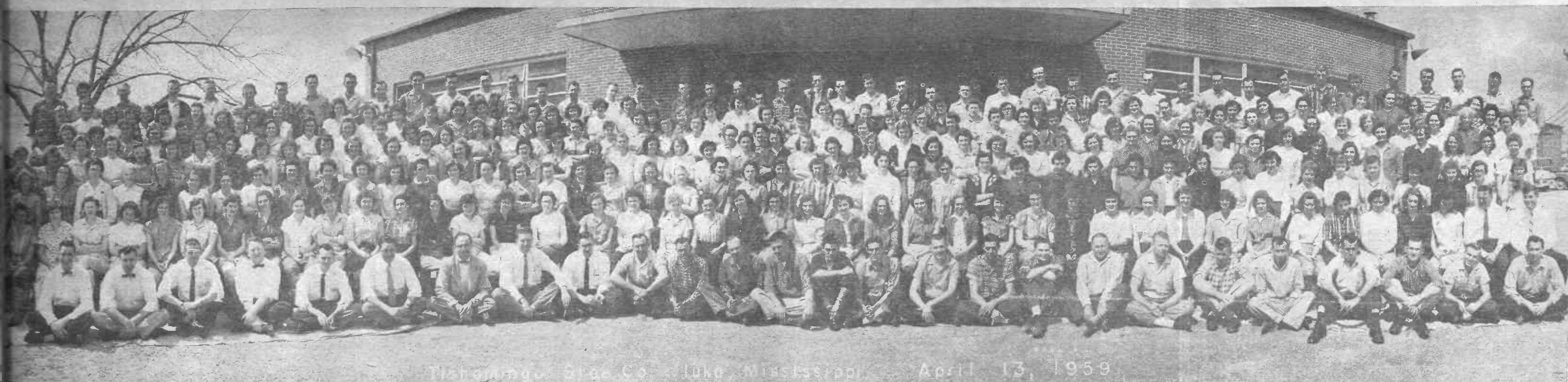

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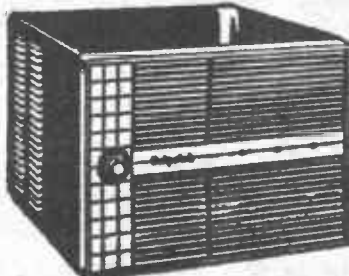
